REPORT OF THE DEC. 28, 1959, FORT WORTH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY MEETING:

The thirty-fourth meeting of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society was held December 28, 1959, in the auditorium of the Fort Worth Public Library. Miss Lena Dunlavy, a founding member of our society, and the Registrar of the Honorable Philip Livingston Chapter, Texas Society, Daughters of the American Colonists, spoke on the "Daughters of the American Colonists." Miss Dunlavy said that members of the Daughters of the American Colonists have proven direct descent from an ancestor who rendered civil or military service in the colonies prior to July 4, 1776. The official publication of the D. A. C. is THE COLONIAL COURIER, edited by Mrs. William C. Langston, 531 Roosevelt Avenue, York, Pa. This magazine publishes a genealogical section with queries and answers and Bible records of colonial families. Miss Dunlavy told of the many historical sites in Texas that have been marked by the Texas Society of the D. A. C. The president of the Honorable Philip Livingston Chapter is Mrs. R. N. Grammer, 4220 Norwich Drive, Fort Worth 9, Texas, who is also a founding member of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society.

Tracy D. Cary, of 430 N. Sumner, Pampa, Texas, told of the historical and genealogical work being done in Pampa and Amarillo, Texas. Mr. Cary is president of the Pampa Genealogical & Historical Society.

It was announced that the next meeting of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society will be held the last Monday night in January, January 25, 1960, at 7:30 P. M., in the auditorium of the Fort Worth Public Library. This will be the annual business meeting of the society. Directors for the fiscal year will be elected. This meeting, like all meetings of the society, is open to the public, and anyone interested in genealogy, history, and related subjects is invited to attend.

THE MODERN RESEARCHER:

THE MODERN RESEARCHER, by Jacques Barzun and Henry F. Graff of Columbia University, (Harcourt, Brace and Co., N. Y., 1957), tells you on page 71, how to search and where for portraits that have been printed in published works, and how to locate autograph letters. This book, like most of those to help the person interested in research, has many helpful hints and shortcuts. It is a book which may be checked out for one month in the reference room of the Fort Worth Public Library, and the call number is "907 B C2."

THE DORSEY FAMILY OF MARYLAND:

In the Sunday, Nov. 15, 1959, column of Hugh S. Watson, Jr., called "CLIMBING THE FAMILY TREE: GENEALOGY: QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS," published by the Daily Press of Newport News, Va., Mr. Watson has printed a DARCY coat of arms, and says, "This arms has been used by the Maryland family of the name of Dorsey though sometimes spelled Darcy. This family descends from Major Edward Dorsey who died 1681 being from England and came to Anne Arundel County, Maryland in 1650; he had wife Ann -----; they had

Colonel Edward Dorsey, born 1645, died 1705, who was of 'Long Reach,' in Maryland...He married 1st, 1675, Sarah Wyatt, dau. of Nicholas Wyatt who d. 1673 of Anne Arundel Co., Md. who had married Damaria; this couple had

John Dorsey, b. 1692, died 1764; married Honor Elder, dau. of John; had Michael Dorsey, born in Md. & was of 'Brothers Partnership' near Dayton, Md.; he married in 1733 Ruth Todd (d. 1777, dau. of Lancelot & wife Elizabeth Rockholder. Lancelot Todd was son of Thomas, who founded the City of Baltimore who married Ann Gorsuch, the granddau. of Sir William Lovelace..."

According to data in ye olde editor's files there seems to be some differences of opinion on the Dorsey, Darcy genealogy. J. D. Warfield's THE FOUNDERS OF ANNE ARUNDEL AND HOWARD COUNTIES, MARYLAND, p. xlii, shows Ruth Todd was the dau. of Lancelot Todd and his wife, Elizabeth Rockhold. It is sometimes found spelled ROCKHOLD. On page 49 of Mr. Warfield's book, it states that Lancelot Todd married Elizabeth, daughter of Mary Rockhold. Their two daughters were Ruth Dorsey, wife of Michael, and Sarah Dorsey, wife of Edward.

THE DORSEY FAMILY, by Dorsey and Nimmo, says Ruth Todd was the dau. of Lancelot and Elizabeth (Rockhold) Todd. She received from her father, 22 Oct. 1733, 250 acres of "Altogether" (A. A. Co. Deeds, R. D. No. 2 f. 8). Lancelot Todd, son of Thomas and Sarah (-----) Todd, b. 1674, d. 1735, Anne Arundel Co., M. Elizabeth Rockhold. Thomas Todd, son of Thomas and Elizabeth (-----) Todd, d. 1677, Anne Arundel Co., Md. Thomas Todd, b. 1610, d. 1671, Anne Arundel Co., Md., m. before 1637, Elizabeth (----). Elizabeth Rockhold, dau. of John and Mary (Richardson) Rockhold, d. 1741, m. Lancelot Todd. Mary Richardson, dau. of Lawrence and Elizabeth Richardson, was named in her father's will of 1666. Mary Rockhold's will was proved May 15, 1704. John Rockhold, b. bef. 1638, d. 1704, son of Robert and Sarah Rockhold, m. Mary Richardson. Michael Dorsey, son of John Dorsey and Honor (STA----((the corner of the marriage register is torn--she is thought to be the Honor Stafford who was left personalty in the will of Honor Marriarte, March 25, 1701), m. Aug. 10, 1733, Ruth Todd, d. Nov. 1789. John Dorsey, son of Col. Edward and Sarah (Wyatt) Dorsey, b. 15 June 1688, d. 1764, Anne Arundel Co., m. 8 April 1708, Honor Sta----. Col. Edward Dorsey, son of Edward and Ann Dorsey d. 1705, Baltimore Co., m. (1) about 1670 Sarah Wyatt, d. about 1692.

In ANNE ARUNDEL GENTRY by Harry Wright Newman, pages 42-43, Mr. Newman gives the genealogy of Colonel John Dorsey, Gentleman, who was born in 1688 in Anne Arundel Co., Md., who on April 8, 1708, married Honor Elder. They were married by the rector of St. Ann's Church. Honor Elder was the dau. of John Elder, a larger landholder of the Patapsco.

Ala., never married, was wounded at same time father, James, was killed. Andrew was a surveyor. Family home, near Honey Grove, Fannin County, Texas.

J. B. Blaylock, Register of Deeds, Yanceyville, N. C., has for years collected family records and put them into a permanent record in his office. He will be most happy to add any that will be sent to him--especially of eastern Carolina families.

In 1836, Mary White Stadler, called Polly, the daughter of Elder John I. Stadler, married Levi Massey and went to Texas. Her two brothers, James and Stephen and her Uncle Robert Stadler also went to Texas. They are buried near Troupe, Texas (so he's been told). He would like to contact any relation of these people. The Caswell Co., N. C. Marriage Records show that Elizabeth Stadler, sister of the before mentioned Robert, married William Brown in 1803; Lidia Stadler, sister of this same Robert, married William Fitz (probably Fitch) in 1805; Polly Stadler, sister to this same Robert, married James Maughan about this period.

HUTCHINS:

SIDELIGHTS TO GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH:

--by Jack Geddie, 358 Majestic Bldg., Fort Worth, Texas

Those interested in Scotland who come across the phrase "of that ilk" should not read over that term carelessly, but should pause and reflect a moment upon its meaning. James Paterson, R. S. A., in his History of the County of Ayr, page 266--footnotes, comments: "Of that Ilk: This ancient and noble title is peculiar to the Scots, and has never been hitherto defined well. It is the title which denotes not the gentleman, as Johnson's degrading appellation (viz., whose surnames and the title of his estate are the same), but also the chief of all the clan of his own surname. It does not necessarily or essentially refer to the estates. Macfarlan, Mackintosh, Brisbane, Tweedie, etc., of that ilk, have never had lands of their surnames. Many chiefs parted with their original estates and afterwards used the title long, or to this day, for example, Porterfield, Halstoun, Whytefurd, etc., of that Ilk. This title shows that the person who uses it is the chief of the clan of the surname in question. It is very honorable and ancient. It gives him the right of supporters in his armorial arms. It is more honorable than the modern title of nobility such as earls, marquises, dukes, etc., in certain respects. This is a nobility really patriarchial, venerable, and ancient. No king or prince can bestow, nor take away, the glory and dignity "of that Ilk."

A GOODMAN IS HARD TO FIND...

The American Society of Genealogists has published an excellent book, Genealogical Research: Methods and Sources, which quotes the wonderful Donald Lines Jacobus as follows:

Ignorance of...rudimentary principles has been responsible for the printing of a great deal of nonsense by amateur family historians. Some have recklessly identified an immigrant ancestor as younger brother of an English knight or peer, when the appellation clearly demonstrate that his ancestry should be sought in the yeoman or tradesman class. The compiler of a Dunham genealogy evolved the fantastic theory that the first John Dunham, was identical with John Goodman of the Mayflower. He could not have considered the prefix "Goodman" as evidential if he had known the frequency with which it was applied.

SOME FOUNDERS OF AMERICA:

WILLIAM BURGESS

Deputy-Governor William Burgess of Anne Arundel County, Maryland, was born in England in 1622, and died in the month of January, the 24th day, in the year of 1686/7. He married three times. His first wife was Elizabeth Robins, (daughter of Edward Robins, who had been born in England, 1602; came to Virginia in the bark Thomas in 1615; the brother of Colonel Obedience Robins). William Burgess married secondly, Sophia _____, the widow of Major Richard Ewen. William Burgess married 3rdly, Ursula Gordon. He was the father of eleven children--seven sons and four daughters, as follows:

- 1) Edward, b. 1650, m. 1675, died 1722; m. Sarah Chew, daughter of Dr. Samuel Chew and his wife, Anne Ayres;
- 2) George, married the widow Katherine (____) Stockett, and returned to Devon County, England;
- 3) William, married Ann (Watkins) Lord, dau. of John Watkins, stepson of Com. Edward Lloyd;
- 4) John, died early;
- 5) Joseph, died early;
- 6) Benjamin, went back to England;
- 7) Charles, married the dau. of Capt. Henry Hanslap;
- 8) Elizabeth
- 9) Susannah Ewen Burgess married Major Nicholas Sewall, and their dau. Jane Sewall married Clement Brooke, grandparents of Charles Carroll of Carrollton, the Signer;
- 10) Ann married Thomas Sparrow and died the same year;
- 11) Unknown.

William Burgess bore arms, as the existing impression of his seal reveals, of a family of Truro, in Cornwall, but was akin to the Burgesses of Marlborough, Wilts County, England. (Or a fesse chequy, or, and gules, in chief, three crosses, crosslet fitchie of the last). He was Commander-in-chief of Maryland forces in 1677 against Eastern Shore Indians. In 1661 he was given command of South River Rangers; Mgr. Sheriff, 1669; Esquire, 1668, 1669, 1671, 1678, 1679, with the title of Colonel; Councillor, 1669, 1682, 1683, 1685; Justice, 1645-1651.

James Truitt, born in Rowan County, North Carolina, Oct. 23, 1795. He was both senator and representative in Texas Republic and after it became a state.

"When he was in his eighth year his father, Levi Truitt, moved to Rutherford County, N. Car., and when he was in his twenty-first year his father sent him to Buncomb Co., N. Car., Swanano to make a crop for his father.

Then in January 23, 1817, James Truitt married his wife, Sarah Hall, daughter of Joshua Hall in Burke Co., N. C., and moved her to Buncomb Co., N. C. to his residence in Swanano and lived there untill the month of February 1825. Then moved to Tennessee Valley on Little Tennessee River in Haywood Co. and afterwards it was cut off and made Macon Co., N. C., and lived there untill January 5, 1839. And in that time he served two years as coroner and then five years as High Sheriff of Macon Co., N. Car.

And then moved to the Republic of Texas. Came by land 150 miles, and then 200 miles in a flat-bottom boat, then got a steam-boat called the "Rover" and came 300 or upwards, and then got in the steamboat called "The Invincible" and came in and about 1000 miles, and got on the steamboat called "Argo", came in it 350 miles and landed at Nachitoches in Louisiana, and then came by land 75 miles into San Augustine Co., Republic of Texas, and stop on 4 of March at my new residence."

TYLGHMAN, TYLLGHMAN, TYLGHMAN GENEALOGY:

--Contribution of Mr. H. Newcombe, 32 Ablett Street,
South Bermondsey, London, S. E. 16, England, of his
genealogical research in 1958

I am writing...a brief account of my research for Mrs. Tylghman into the ancestry of "Bill" Tilghman, the famous western marshal....

Mrs. Tylghman's historical data begins in the U. S. with the arrival of Richard Tylghman, (hereafter known as Richard, the Immigrant), with William Penn. All the information she could give me was that he came from a little village in Kent called Snodland. I took it from there and made a trip to Snodland which lies between the towns of Rochester and Maidstone. After many fruitless enquiries at the village police station, parish, etc., my first real lead came from the rector of the little church, a 12-13 century building with the most perfect set of records, dating back from the beginning of this little village.... It was interesting to note the different spellings down through the centuries--Tyllghman, Tylghlman, finally Tighman.

I uncovered with the help of instructions from these same records the tomb of the family lost for many centuries, sunk so low with time that only the altar top could be cleaned of earth and brambles--yet the records in parchment were clear and precise, "...buried 8 ft. from the East wall between the North tower, etc.; then an old brass plaque under worn plush carpet by a little used nave to William Tyllghman the first and four of his wyves, PRAY FOR THE SOULES OF WILLIAM TYLGHMAM THE ELDER ISABETT AND JOANE HIS WYVES WHICH WILLIAM DECEASED THE 27TH DAYE OF AUG. ANO DM 1541.ON WHOSE SOULES JESUE HAVE MERCIE, AS YE ARE, SO WAS I AND AS I AM SO SHALL YE BE."

The first clue of anything unusual was the crest of a rampant lion at the head of the plaque; then digging into the musty moulding came the full story, "The Holborough Estate Manuscripts," taking in all the present village, pasturage, grazing land--extending practically to Maidstone--a Royal grant from the Crusades; the center of all this being the great mansion of "Holloway Court" of which there is now no trace except in these records. I traced the death and hardships of this family...and the poverty of the woolen industry in the Middle Ages in these few brief passages: "Many so and so died thyse daye buried in woolen witnessed thyse daye, etc (great columns of names--buried in woolen); A SHRCUD MADE OF WOOL STIPULATE BY A KING'S LAW TO HELP THE WOOLEN INDUSTRY; one entry stands out like a sore thumb--Lisabett Anne Tyllghman thyse daye burried in Linen." I wonder what trouble this caused!

(There is) much more of the same; then centuries later the last entry of the birth of a Richard 2nd, son of William and Mary, etc.; then a blank except for death reports.

Were there records of this family recorded in London...?

I go to the Royal College of Arms and Armour and discover with the help of a "Brass Rubbing" from the plaque the full family tree and passed this information on to Mrs. Tilghman (Mrs. Bill Tilghman)...

COMMENT: Mr. Newcombe has presented to the library these facts plus photographs of the tomb, church, a tracing of the crest from the altar of the tomb, and other pictures, including one of a plaque stating, "SIDELL TYLGHMAN OF U. S. A. GAVE LIBERALLY TO THE COST OF THESE BELLS IN MEMORY OF HIS ANCESTOR WILLIAM TYLGHMAN OF HOLLOWAY COURT, HOLBOROUGH. APRIL 1920."

"The ever recurring problem in genealogy is to know where to begin the search. Where did the earliest known ancestor on the line live, or where was he born? Even the tiniest clue must be scrutinized in the hope it will provide an answer to that question. Without that exact place being discovered research will be of little avail."

REPORT OF MARCH ACTIVITIES OF THE FORT WORTH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY:

The board of directors of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society at the March 21, 1960 meeting approved the appointment of Miss Mildred Dulaney as Chairman of the Education and Literary Committee.

The 37th meeting of the society was held Monday evening, March 28, 1960, in the auditorium of the Fort Worth Public Library. Dr. Josiah H. Combs of 1033 East Robert St., Fort Worth, Texas, spoke on "The French Influence on America." Dr. Combs discussed many French place-names in this country. He said that the French are the most intellectual race since ancient Greeks. And, to quote further:

"Paris has been the intellectual, cultural and artistic center of *the modern world since the 17th century. Today there are 30,000 art students in Paris. In the 16th century the French were the great explorers and colonizers. Two hundred years ago the French empire was far larger than the British empire, and there were three Frenchmen to one Englishman. In North America the French explored and settled from the mouth of the St. Lawrence River to the Great Lakes, and down the Mississippi to New Orleans. The English had no such explorers as Cartier, Marquette and La Salle. French place names dot the whole country. The French army at Yorktown outnumbered the Americans. L'Enfant laid out the city of Washington. Thomas Jefferson brought back from France French-Greek architecture for public and college buildings. De Tocqueville was the first man to analyze and write a book on the new American democracy, more than a 100 years ago. Most modern literary and artistic movements originated in Paris. French is the cultural and diplomatic language of modern times. The French gave us Pasteur, and the metric system. They have contributed more scientists even, than the Germans...As Jefferson and Franklin said, 'Every man has two countries: his own; then France!'*"

A FOOTNOTE FROM DE CHAMBRUN'S SHAKESPEARE: A PORTRAIT RESTORED:

Anthony Weldon, in his Court and Character of King James (1675) attests that the king was very witty and used to make many impromptu jokes keeping a straight face and not laughing himself. LETTER TO THE EDITOR:
(RE CLAY AND ALLIED LINES)

The following from Charles H. Young, Route 1, Box 274, Grapevine, Texas:

"In November I flew into San Francisco, and was able to spend several afternoons in the Sutro branch of the library, which has an excellent genealogical collection. They have the Filson Club Publication No. 14 there, and I have copied most of the data concerning my branch of the family--still no mention of Cyprian Clay.

I was very pleased to note your reference to the Trabue family of Missouri, as I have made some progress in that line. I discovered a copy of a letter written to Cyprian Clay's oldest daughter, Mary Ann Clay, by Mrs. Sue E. Glascock of San Diego, Calif., on 24 April 1924. Mrs. Glascock refers to 'The Huguenot, Bartholomew Dupuy and his Descendants':

Magdaline Trabue, born 1748, married Edward Clay, Uncle of Hon. Henry Clay, moved to North Carolina. They had 10 children, as follows: John, Samuel, Martha, James, Francis, Judith, Mary, Phoeba, Edward, Sarah...My grandmother, Jane E. Clay, was born Jan. 1, 1776, died June 8, 1845, was a daughter of Rev. Eliazar Clay, who was a son of James, who was a son of Charles, who was a brother of Hon. Henry Clay. My mother's mother, Jane E. Clay, married Edward Trabue. They lived in Woodford Co., Ky.

I have not yet figured out who the 'Hon. Henry Clay' mentioned by Mrs. Glascock could be, as it wasn't the Statesman, since he had no brother named Charles. However, I have records of several Henry Clays of that approximate generation who had brothers named Charles Clay.

From Mrs. Virginia G. Kettler, 1919 N. Charles St., Belleville, Ill., I received the following:

John James Trabue m. Olympia Dupuy, their dau. Magdalene Trabue b. 1748 m. Edward Clay, an uncle of Henry Clay, and had ten children; their son, Edward Trabue b. 1764, d. 6 July 1814, m. (1) 1786 Martha Haskins, m. (2) Jane E. Clay, b. 1 Jan. 1776. He had four children by his first wife and eight children by his second wife, Jane E. Clay; she died 8 June 1845 Ralls Co., Mo. Their son Charles Clay Trabue b. 27 Aug. 1797, d. 24 Nov. 1851, m. 5 July 1820 Agnes Greenwood, had son named Anthony Edward Trabue.

A couple of weeks ago an uncle shipped a large old trunk to me, which contained many old Clay letters and other valuable family data. There were three old photos of Cyprian Clay. I found one letter in it from Henry Lewis Clay, oldest son of Cyprian, written to his sister, which reads in part:

Jacksonville, Ill. Feb. 1st, 1883

Dear Mollie:

...I wrote respecting Mr. Trabue. I hope, with father's assistance, you will write him full particulars. Rev. John Clay was John, Henry and Porter's father, and it is their father who is the grandfather of Mr. Trabue, and it makes him exactly the same relation to Henry Clay that I am...

Your affectionate brother,
Henry

The relationship he indicates above for Mr. Trabue I think may be mistaken; (I think he is off one generation), but at least it is a definite clue that we are talking about the same John Clay, who was Cyprian Clay's father, as he mentions John's father and brothers by name."

(Mr. Charles H. Young, Route 1, Box 274, Grapevine, Texas, enclosed with his letter to the editor a copy of pages 270-273, Early Settlers of Alabama, by J. E. Saunders, 1899, New Orleans, La., Graham & Sons, Ltd., which gives the genealogy of "The Clay Family." It quotes records from Porter Clay, a brother of Henry Clay, the Kentucky orator, who said that "in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, Sir Walter Raleigh brought over to the Virginia plantations, among others, three brothers, sons of Sir John Clay of Wales, England. He gave them each 10,000 lbs. They were named Charles, Thomas and Henry. They settled on James river, near Jamestown. Charles and Thomas had large families, but Henry had none. Cassius M. Clay is a descendant of Charles Clay; Henry and myself from Thomas Clay." The other tradition is that John Clay, the original stock from whom the numerous families of the Clays descended, was born in England, and came over to America in the King's service, a British grenadier, in Bacon's rebellion. That he had a son named John, and a daughter named Hannah, and John had two sons, named Henry and Charles, and that Henry was grandfather of General Green Clay of Kentucky and Matthew Clay of Virginia, by his son Charles, and grandfather of Henry Clay, the orator, by his son John. I have examined carefully the proofs and reject the tradition of noble descent, and have adopted that from the British Grenadier as the true history. General Green Clay in his family record, and the Clays of Huntsville, assume it to be true, and trace their descent step by step from him. There are some discrepancies, but I think they can be reconciled, and present the following genealogy as being the true one:

1. John Clay was the common ancestor of the Clays of America, but he must have come to America long before Bacon's rebellion, which was in 1676 (Campbell's History of Virginia), whereas his great grandson (as you will see below) was born in 1672.

2. John, son of the Grenadier, had several sons, but we only know the names of two, Henry and Charles, of Amelia county, Virginia.
3. Charles, who was the son of John Clay the II., married Hannah Wilson. He had several sons, whose names are not mentioned in the record before me, entitled "A Table of Consanguinity of the Ascending Line of Green Clay's Family," but the eldest son was Henry Clay.

It was from this Charles, numbered 3 in this line, that Senator Clement Comer Clay, of Huntsville, descended.

4. This Henry was born in 1672, and died suddenly at supper, at the mature age of 92 years, on the third day of August 1764. General Green Clay says that this "Henry was my grandfather, and married Mary Mitchell (daughter of William and Elizabeth Mitchell). They lived and died in Chesterfield county, Virginia, at the old place on the west side of Swift Creek. They had four sons, William, Henry, Charles, our father, and John, the grandfather of Henry Clay, late member of Congress, and negotiator of the treaty of Ghent, and several daughters....")

REPORT OF THE APRIL ACTIVITIES OF THE FORT WORTH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY:

The 38th meeting of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society was a day-time workshop meeting held Monday, April 25, 1960, from 9 A. M. to 3 P. M., in the auditorium of the Fort Worth Public Library. TRAVELS IN THE OLD SOUTH:

Thomas D. Clark, in Volume Two of his bibliographies on Travels in the Old South, entitled "The Expanding South, 1750-1825: The Ohio Valley and the Cotton Frontier," traces some migration trails, which should prove of interest to genealogists and historians alike. On pages xii-xiii of the Editor's Preface, he says, as follows:

...Enormous activities occurred on the southern and western rivers. The Ohio and Mississippi became major passageways to the Gulf...travelers came down the river from Pittsburgh to visit the western settlements. The Ohio disgorged its annual burden of visitors on the shores of Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi, and Louisiana. Kentucky was visited by almost every person who crossed the mountains or who came downstream. Some of these travelers went on westward across Indiana to St. Louis and back by the Great Lakes. Some crossed eastward from Kentucky to Tennessee and the Carolinas, while a great many more continued downstream....

REPORT OF THE MAY ACTIVITIES OF THE FORT WORTH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY:

The 39th meeting of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society was held Monday, May 30, 1960, in the auditorium of the Fort Worth Public Library. Mrs. Hallie J. Gibson, a member of the society, spoke on "The Magna Charta Dames." Mrs. Gibson said that Mrs. Marvin Nichols, another member of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society, is vice regent of the Fort Worth-Dallas Colony of the National Society of Magna Charta Dames. Other Magna Charta Dames in the audience were introduced. Mrs. Charles L. Sarrazin, the second vice president of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society, is the State Registrar for Magna Charta Dames.

Mrs. Landgrave T. Smith, Sr., told of her recent trip to Charleston, South Carolina, where she visited the Charleston Library Society, 164 King Street, and the South Carolina Historical Society, Fireproof Bldg., Charleston 5, South Carolina. She also went to the Historic Charleston Foundation, 51 Meeting Street, and visited the Basement Book Store on College Street, where she found rare books. Of particular interest to Mrs. Smith was her husband's ancestral home, Medway Plantation, once owned by the Hon. Thomas Smith, Landgrave and Governor of Carolina.

Robert T. Gill, new program chairman of the society, spoke briefly on British genealogical references available.

EXCERPTS FROM THE PAPER ON "MAGNA CHARTA DAMES" GIVEN BY MRS. HALLIE J. GIBSON AT THE MAY 30, 1960, FORT WORTH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY MEETING:

The National Society of the Magna Charta Dames meets twice a year in Philadelphia. Programs of each meeting are sent to members here and abroad. This society, an hereditary order, was began March 1, 1909, in Washington, D. C. Eligibility for membership is based on direct descent from one or more of the Barons who in the year 1215, forced King John of England to grant the Magna Charta. Two persons at one time in the same family are included in each continuing membership. Each Primary member may in writing designate a qualified or hereditary successor. The society rests upon a provision quite unique, in that a perpetual life membership consists of two persons at one time in the same family. These persons are known as the Primary and the Hereditary members. While both members are for life, the dual membership itself is perpetual, being carried on by younger members of the family as they succeed to it from time to time upon the death of the Primary member, whose place is then taken by the Hereditary member, who will then name her own successor.

Nomination of friends for membership may be made by any Primary or Hereditary member of the society. Invitations may be issued to these nominees only if it can be shown that they have the required baronial ancestry....

This year a decision was made to colonize the states that wished to be organized into state societies or colonies. Texas had its first State Parliament of the Texas Division of the National Society of Magna Charta Dames on March 19, 1960, in Dallas. Mrs. Harry Joseph Morris of Dallas is State Regent; Mrs. Edmond L. Crow is regent of the Fort Worth-Dallas Colony. Plans are being completed by many members of this society to take the "Journey Back to Runnemede," in time for the program there June 15, 1960....

LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

Troy Young Collins, 2104 Fairmont Ave., Fort Worth 10, Texas, has been tracing the records of his Collins lineage, and he writes that he has received the following letter from the Illinois State Archives at Springfield, which gives information that may be of interest to others seeking family history in Illinois:

..."Your letter of March 26 to the Adjutant General requesting information on the Black Hawk War service record of Elijah William Collins has been referred to the Illinois State Archives which has custody of records of that war.

Elijah Collins served as Private in the company of Moses G. Wilson, Fourth Regiment of the Brigade of Mounted Volunteers commanded by Brigadier General Samuel Whiteside. Colonel Samuel M. Thompson was regimental commander.

The company was enrolled at Rushville, Schuyler County, Illinois, on April 23, 1832. It was mustered out of the service of the United States at the mouth of the Fox River, May 28, 1832, distant 220 miles from the place of enrollment. Elijah Collins was detailed on extra duty. We find no additional data on the service of the soldier.

The roster of Captain Wilson's company is published in the Combined History of Schuyler and Brown Counties, Illinois (W. R. Brink & Co., Philadelphia, 1882), page 160, but this gives no information not found in the official records.

Elijah Collins was an inhabitant of Schuyler County in 1830 and we enclose the listing from the Federal census of that year. Only heads of families were listed by name previous to 1850. Schuyler County was organized under a legislative act of January 13, 1825. The county seat is Rushville.

Since no charge is made for this service the one dollar bill which accompanied your letter is returned herewith....Theodore J. Cassady, Assistant State Archivist."

Fifth (U. S. 1830) Census, Schuyler County, Illinois, page 95, line 2: Collins, Elijah W.; Males under 5 years--2; Males 5 and under 10--1; Males 30 and under 40--1; Females 20 and under 30--1.

Mr. Collins writes that the Bible of an 86-year-old granddaughter of the veteran shows: Elijah William Collins, born 2-5-1797; Jane Murphy, born 6-17-1802; They married 6-16-1819; Edward Fleetwood Collins, b. 4-14-1822 (Mr. T. Y. Collins' grandfather); Robert Murphy Collins, b. 11-18-1826--d. Ala. between 1850-1860; Albion Young Collins, b. 3-12-1829. He notes that the Bible record agrees with the census record. Other children of Elijah William Collins and Jane Murphy Collins listed in the Bible are John Louis Collins, b. 2-7-1831, Palmyra F. Collins, b. 5-26-1833; Mahaley Jane Collins, b. 8-11-1838; and Alfred Clay Collins, b. 6-10-1840.

CORRECTION ON ANDREW PICKENS GENEALOGY:

Miss Janie Revill, Professional Genealogist, P. O. Box 662, Sumter, South Carolina, writes, as follows:

"In your BULLETIN for December, page 8, you have the contribution by Mrs. F. W. Allen relative to General Andrew Pickens; and give the place of his death as being 'Tamassee Co., S. C.' I have never heard of any section of South Carolina called 'Tamassee County'--and certainly there has never been any such regularly established county. Sometimes new settlers called their locations by names of counties from which they came from other places, or names that pleased them, but I have never met with the name 'Tamassee County' of record any place. I rather believe that must have been the plantation name of the home of General Pickens.

You also show 'that during the American Revolution he claimed Abbeville, S. C. (now Oconee Co.) as his home.' Abbeville County is still Abbeville County, and Oconee was never any part of Abbeville.

Old Pendleton District embraced the counties shown on the map I am sending herewith as Anderson and Pickens Counties; these two counties being the first division of old Pendleton District; later, much later, Oconee County was cut off from Pickens County, and it is my understanding that the home of General Pickens was in the part now Oconee (never by that name during his lifetime).

General Pickens first settled and lived in the Waxhaw settlement, his land was same, or adjoined the place where President Andrew Jackson was born, which is now in Lancaster County; and is that kind of jut-off along the Catawba River and Sugar Creek, bordering on North Carolina. At the time General Pickens lived there it was part of North Carolina, and by a new survey was deemed as being part of South Carolina. You can see Waxhaw Creek on the map, and the head of the Creek is where the Pickens land was. My impression now, (without having time to look up my compiled records on the subject) is that the Pickens land was sold, and then another sale to Robert Crawford, in whose home it is claimed General Jackson was born. I cannot say whether the actual Crawford house was on the Pickens land, or on adjoining land--I have never had opportunity to study that out in detail. I do have the deed references for sale of the Pickens land, and the ownership by Robert Crawford. The story is that the wife of Robert Crawford and Mrs. Jackson were sisters, and after the death of Mr. Jackson she moved in with her sister before the birth of Andrew. If that be true, she moved in just about the time the surveyors were passing by--that is why the North Carolina people claim Andrew Jackson was born in North Carolina, while the General gave his birthplace as South Carolina, which it was from the time his memory began...."

REPORT OF THE JUNE ACTIVITIES OF THE FORT WORTH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY:

The 40th meeting of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society was held Monday, June 27, 1960, in the auditorium of the Fort Worth Public Library. Mrs. E. W. Bass, the former Alice Kleberg, spoke on the diary of Robert Justus Kleberg. Following Mrs. Bass's talk, several members told of recent research they have done.

Plans are being made for the July 25, 1960, meeting of the society. The Fort Worth Genealogical Society will meet July 25, 1960, at 7:30 P. M., in the air conditioned auditorium of the Fort Worth Public Library. Mrs. Earl Byers, president of the Governor Thomas Hinckley Chapter, Colonial Dames of the Seventeenth Century, will present a program on the Colonial Dames. This program is one of a series to acquaint genealogists with the various societies that do much to preserve our American heritage such as the Sons of the American Revolution, the First Families of Virginia, and similar groups.

THE AUSTRALIAN GENEALOGIST:

The society has received the Spring 1959, issue of The Australian Genealogist, which, like all our exchanges will be placed in the library. This particular issue has an article on the Bell family, and, of particular interest to those of English descent is an article on Parish Registers in England, from 1538 to 1836.

THE IRISH IN AMERICAN LIFE:

"Since the settlement of this country we have received nearly,

if not quite four million immigrants from Ireland,--a number about two thirds as large as that of the present (1896) population of Ireland....--Henry Childs Mervin, AMERICAN ANTHROPOLOGIST, Vol. 77, p. 289.

EXTRACTS FROM THE PAPER ON "THE DIARY OF R. J. KLEBERG," PRESENTED TO THE FORT WORTH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, AT THE JUNE 27, 1960, MEETING:

"Robert Justus Kleberg (Christened Johnun Christian Justus Robert Kleberg), was born on the 10th day of September, A. D. 1803, in Herstelle, Westphalia, in the former kingdom of Prussia. His parents were Lucas Kleberg, a prominent and successful merchant, and Veronica Kleberg (nee Meier) They moved from Herstelle to Beverungen in Westphalia, where they were quite prosperous for a time. Besides Robert, they had the following children: Ernest, Louis, Joseph, and Banise. At an early age Robert Justus Kleberg entered the Gymnasium of Holzminden. Choosing law as his profession he later entered the University of Goettingen, and in two and a half years received his diploma as doctor juris. Soon after he was appointed as one of the justices in the assizes of Nirhiem, where he remained one year, after which he was promoted to various judicial positions.

In 1834, he decided to come to the United States because, he wrote--

I wished to live under a Republican form of government, with unbounded personal, religious and political liberty, free from the petty tyrannies, the many disadvantages and evils of old countries. Prussia, my former home, smarted at the time under a military despotism. I was (and have ever remained) an enthusiastic lover of republican institutions, and I expected to find in Texas, above all other countries, the blessed land of most fervent hopes.

Texas was yet partially unexplored, but the reports that reached the old country were of the most extravagant and romantic nature, and were well calculated to enthuse the impulsive and courageous spirit of Judge Kleberg. The ardor of his desires to emigrate was heightened by a letter written by a Mr. Ernest, a German from the Duchy of Oldenburg who had emigrated to Texas a few years previous, and who at that time resided in what is now known as Industry, Austin County, Texas. This letter recited the advantages of Texas in the most glowing colors, comparing its climate to the sunny skies of Italy; it lauded the fertility of the soil and spoke of the perennial flora of the prairies....

About this time, Robert Justus Kleberg on September 4, 1834, married Miss Rosalia von Roeder, daughter of Lieut. Ludwig Anton S. von Roeder, the head of an old noble family. It was first contemplated to emigrate to one of the Western States of the United States, but it was now determined to go to Texas.

(The Diary of R. J. Kleberg continued:)

'We changed our first intention to go to the Western States, and chose Texas for our future home. As soon as this was determined we sent some of our party, to wit, three brothers of my wife, unmarried, Louis, Albrecht and Joachim, and their sister Valesca, and a servant by the name of Polhart, ahead of us to Texas for the purpose of selecting a point where we could all meet and commence operations. They were well provided with money, clothing, a light wagon and harness, tools, and generally everything necessary to commence a settlement. They planned to go to Mr. Ernest, the writer of the letter which induced us to go to Texas. Six months after our party left the old country, and shortly after we received the news of their safe arrival, we followed on the last day of September, A. D. 1834, in the ship Congress; the captain, J. Adams.'

The party consisted of Robert Kleberg and wife, Lieut. L. A. S. von Roeder and wife, his daughters, Louise and Caroline, his sons, Rudolph, Otto and William v. Roeder, Louise Kleberg, Mrs. Otto v. Roeder, nee Pauline von Donop and Miss Antoinette von Donop (afterwards wife of Rudolph von Roeder). The other passengers were nearly all Germans from Oldenburg, and one of them was the brother-in-law of Mr. Ernst. They were all bound for the same point in Texas, and after a voyage of sixty days landed in New Orleans.

'Here we heard very bad accounts about Texas, and were advised not to go to Texas, which it was said was infested with robbers, murderers and wild Indians. But we were determined to risk it, and could not disappoint our friends who had preceded us. As soon, therefore, as we succeeded in chartering the schooner Sabin, about two weeks after we had landed in New Orleans, we sailed for Brazoria, Texas. After a voyage of eight days we wrecked off of Galveston Island, December 22, 1834. The Sabin was an American craft of about 150 tons. The Sabin's captain and crew left the island, I think, in the steamer, Ocean. The wreck was sold in Brazoria at public auction and bought by a gentleman who had come in the Ocean, for thirty-odd dollars. Perhaps she was not regularly employed in the trade between New Orleans and Texas, and was only put in order to get her wrecked to get the amount for which she was insured. This was the opinion of the passengers at the time. It is impossible for me to name with certainty the exact point of the island at which we were stranded, but I think it was not far from the center of the island, about ten miles above the present site of the city; it was on the beach side. The island was a perfect wilderness and inhabited only by deer, wolves and rattlesnakes. All the passengers were safely brought to shore, and were provided with provisions, partly from those on board ship and partly by the game on the island. Most of the men were delighted with the climate on the island, and the sport they enjoyed by hunting and fishing. A committee of five was appointed to ascertain whether we were on an island or on the main land. After an investigation of two days the committee reported that we were on an island. The passengers then went regularly into camp, saving all the goods and provisions from the wrecked vessel, which was only about fifty feet from shore. From the sails, masts and beams they constructed a large tent, with separate

(The Diary of R. J. Kleberg continued:)

compartments for women and children. Thus the passengers were temporarily protected against the inclemency of the weather. Two or three days after our vessel had sunk, the steamer Ocean hove in sight and observing our signal of distress, anchored opposite our camp and sent a boat ashore with an officer to find out the situation. The captain would not take all the passengers, but consented to take a few, charging them a doubloon each. I, with Rudolph v. Roeder, took passage on the steamer, which was bound for Brazoria. I went as agent of the remaining passengers to charter a boat to take them and their plunder to the main land. Finding no boat at Brazoria, or Bell's Landing, the only Texas ports at that time, I proceeded on foot to San Felipe, where I was told I would find a small steamer, the Cuyuga, with Capt. W. Harris. I found the steamer but did not succeed in chartering her, the price asked (\$1,000) being too high.

In San Felipe I heard for the first time of the whereabouts of my relative who had preceded us. Here I also formed the acquaintance of Col. Frank Johnson and Capt. Moseby Baker, under whose command I afterwards participated in the battle of San Jacinto. These gentlemen informed me that two of my friends, Louis and Albert von Roeder, had located about fourteen miles from San Felipe on a league and labor of land, but that Joachim and Valesca von Roeder had died. We found them in a miserable and pitiful condition. They were emaciated by disease and want, and without money. Tears of joy streamed from their eyes when they beheld us. After a few days rest I continued on my errand to charter a boat. I had a letter of introduction to Stephen F. Austin and Sam Williams from a merchant in New Orleans to whom our ship had been consigned, which I presented to Mr. Austin's private secretary, Mr. Austin and Mr. Williams being absent. From him I received a letter of introduction to Mr. Scott, the father-in-law of Mr. Williams. From Mr. Scott I finally succeeded in chartering a small vessel for \$100.00 for three trips, and immediately returned to Galveston, landing on the bay side opposite the camp, four weeks after I had left it.

I found the passengers of the old Sabin in good health and spirits. They had spent their time in hunting and fishing. Those who could not shoot were employed to drive the deer to the hunters. There were deer by the thousands. I left the next day with the first cargo of people, including my wife, her parents, and Caroline von Roeder. After a stormy trip we arrived on the evening of the same day at Mr. Scott's place where we were hospitably treated. The next day we reached Harrisburg, where I succeeded in renting a comfortable house, intending to remain there until all the passengers had arrived from the island. The last passengers did not arrive until the winter of 1835 though I hired another small sloop from Captain Smith in Velasco, which also made three trips. The winter of 1836 was unusually severe.

Robert Kleberg, by reason of his superior education, was the only one among those early German colonists who could make himself understood to the few American pioneers who inhabited the interior and acted as spokesman for the rest. Indian tribes, both savage and civil, swarmed throughout the country, and it was necessary for the colonists to explore and to settle the country in communities for self-defense...."--Mrs. E. W. Bass, 2925 Sixth Ave., Fort Worth 10, Texas.

MARRIAGE BONDS OF DUPLIN COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA, 1749-1868:

Cora Bass, (Mrs. Taft Bass, Box 463, Clinton, North Carolina), has published Marriage Bonds of Duplin County, North Carolina, 1749-1868, which may be ordered from her for ten dollars. This book is easy for the historian and genealogist to use as Mrs. Bass has indexed all names mentioned in the text, including brides, witnesses, and bondsmen.

Duplin County was formed in 1749 from New Hanover County. Mrs. Bass records also that Marriage Bonds first came into existence in North Carolina as the result of a Marriage Law enacted in 1741, and this law remained unchanged until 1868. It required that the Clerk of Court of the County in which the bride-to-be resided, take a bond before issuing a license to the prospective bridegroom, to guarantee that there was no lawful cause to obstruct the marriage.

DID YOUR MOTHER COME FROM IRELAND?

If you are descended from the Irish gentry you may have difficulty in finding your ancestor's coat of arms. R. Gayre of Gayre and Nigg, the editor of The Amorial, says in Vol. 1, No. 2, of this new magazine, that "owing to the social conditions of Ireland there has always been a fair amount of slackness in registering arms." You may be able to find your ancestor's arms in Burke's Genealogical and Heraldic History of the Landed Gentry in Ireland, (1958), in addition to information on Irish genealogies and Irish surnames.

The officers of the society are President, Mr. Robert E. Lee, who is also the Director of Extension, Texas State Library; Vice-President, Mr. John A. Gracy; Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. David C. Gracy; and Parliamentarian, Mrs. J. T. Springfield.

WRITING TO THE NATIONAL ARCHIVES:

It has been called to our attention that when you write to the National Archives in Washington, D. C., and send in one dollar with their printed form or a letter requesting information on the military record of some relative, that for the one dollar you are sent only a portion of the material in the files of this relative. For example we sent in one dollar and the printed form asking for the Civil War Record of Douglas Hayden Stockton of Texas, who served in the Confederate Army. We received in due time a verifax copy of some ten items from the National Archives showing he had served in the Cavalry, where he had enlisted for the duration of the war, and the estimated value of his horse and saddle. We gave this paper to a relative and ordered another copy of same by letter enclosing another dollar. In time we received this same record again, but this time there was also a note attached stating that Douglas Hayden Stockton had served in two other regiments and that if we would send two dollars more we would then have a copy of his complete file. Therefore, it might be wise to request the complete file on the individual in which you are interested when you write to the National Archives; otherwise, they will send you what THEY think you want from the file.

THEY'LL DO IT EVERYTIME or WHAT NOT TO DO IN THE PUBLIC LIBRARY!

(A skit by Edna Perry Deckler that was presented at the Family History Workshop of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society, 29 April 1960.)

SCENE: A library-room effect--with large table, two chairs, bookcase, blackboard on wall; a large photo on wall of an ancestor; a card box file, and signs on the wall saying, "Silence!"; "Shhh-h-h!"; "SHUT UP!"; "Don't Put Books Back on the Shelf"; "The Life You Lose May be Your Revolutionary Ancestor!"; and "Don't Write in Books."

LIBRARIAN: (She speaks to the audience):

"Welcome to our library room,
Which ordinarily is quiet as doom;
That is until 9 o'clock each day
When the doors are open and come in who may!"

MRS. IMA BLUEBLOOD CLUTTERBUG enters: (Mrs. Clutterbug is an elderly matron in blue stockings, wearing a large picture hat, crepe 1920 type dress, white face powder, rounds of rouge, much makeup, with her ample bust loaded down with fake organizations' pins and badges and ancestor bars on an ambassador's wide ribbon hanging down to her hem; carrying a huge straw bag. She majestically enters and deposits her straw bag in false-bottom chair behind library table on stage.)

LIBRARIAN: "Here comes Mrs. Clutterbug alone!
Phone rings- "Darn, there goes that telephone!"
She picks up
phone; Mrs. C.
grabs her arm.. "Yes, Mrs. Bug; Mrs. Clutter, no."
to phone..... "Hello." (To Mrs. C.--"I don't know; the slip doesn't show.")

"Please register on the blackboard there
Then sit you down and have a chair;
I must look up the size of shoe
Andy Jackson wore; you don't know do you?"

Mrs. Clutterbug registers on the blackboard--

NAME: Miss Ima Blueblood Clutterbug
Occupation: Genealogist
Organizations belong to: First Families of Dallas; The Royal Order of the Garter-Snap; The Last of the Mohicans; Contemporary Dames; and The Cousins of Wally Warfield.

LIBRARIAN: (To audience in regard to Mrs. C.):

"She is of glorious family genes
She is descended from ancient queens
She is divinely blooded, dear;
In this library she has no peer."

(Librarian returns to telephone while Mrs. C. gets ready to go to work by taking the following items from her handbag and placing them on the table): A large white linen tablecloth, a vase of plastic flowers, a vase, a Mason jar of TRANQUILLIZERS "Milltown" pills, a heating pad, a pillow, a radio, a portable typewriter, a plugged-in lighted lamp, a hammer, a huge pedigree chart made on a roll of shelf-paper that's been edged in white or purple lace, a coffee pot, a cheese board and knife, an autographed picture of Elvis Pressley, a plastic plucked chicken, and what have you...Mrs. C. then picks up a book and reads to herself.

JUAN BEATNICKSKY enters: playing a set of portable Bongo drums, wearing a goatee, pony-tail or Chinaman's queue tied in ribbon, bare feet, beret, paint-stained trousers, dark glasses, and torn old shirt. He takes a cigarette away from someone in the audience and dances up to the librarian's desk.

LIBRARIAN to Beatnick:

"Please register on the blackboard there
Then sit you down and have a chair;
I'm looking for data for a patron now
What was the name of Mrs. Murphy's cow????"

JUAN BEATNICKSKY registers on the blackboard:

NAME: Juan Beatnicksky
Occupation: Artist, poet, coffee drinker, thinker
Clubs belong to: O. P. A.; N. R. A.; W. P. A.; I. W. W.;
I. O. U.; C. O. D.; B. O.; P. D. Q.; etc.

Juan Beatnicksky picks up telephone receiver and says, "Long Distance, please." Librarian grabs telephone away from him and says to audience:

"Man, he's here from outer space
I doubt if he belongs to the human race (Aside---)
He digs this pad is where to find
His first ancestor who lost his mind!"

Mrs. Clutterbug continues to read her book and blow her nose into Kleenex which she tosses about on the floor. Juan Beatnicksky hovers over Mrs. C., reading book over her shoulder; he finds something he likes, grabs book from her and tears out a page and stuffs it in his pocket. Then he does the following: He paints a moustache on the ancestor's picture; he fouls up a roll of microfilm; he fights Mrs. C. for some cheese and accidentally "cuts" her finger, which he wraps up in a white hankie soaked in BLUE ink to appear as her blue-blood!; he takes cards out of card-file, shuffles them, deals a hand, and dumps cards, card-tray and all on the floor; he blows smoke in Mrs. C.'s face and she takes out a jar of Air-wick and puts it on the table; he flirts with Mrs. C. but she ignores him until he looks on her pedigree chart and discovers a mutual ancestor and drawing a family coat of arms from his pocket to show her that they are kin. Then they link arms and go out.

LIBRARIAN hangs up telephone and to audience says:

"Why don't they ever learn to read?
They could do this genealogy with upmost speed
If they'd only learn to use our tools
And, Please, please, follow our rules.

The characters that come in here
And want a book they saw last year
A book that's red or green or blue
That's fat and long and skinny too.

They've no idea what they're looking for
It's something on some kind of war;
We search and search and only find
The book they want is some book of crime.

We want to help and to do good work
But please have pity on us poor jerks;
Use the Cardex--get the name of the book
And we'll find it or die on the look.

Thank you and you and you and you
For listening to our story blue
Any suggestions we'll appreciate
Now let's find that ancestor's date--

To the CARDEX--on--forward--with our search!
You can come up Sunday after church--
Your pedigree's getting longer--and how-- (Phone rings)
Oops, sorry; I've got to run--'Bye now!

EXCERPTS FROM A PAPER GIVEN BY TROY YOUNG COLLINS AT THE SEPTEMBER 26, 1960, FORT WORTH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY MEETING:

"SYSTEM!"

"If I have a system and follow it, I guess I'm systematic. I do have a system, but I haven't followed it very long nor very far.

My oldest sister told something on me that I'm still trying to live down. She said we had a mule colt--which was true. She said he would lie down on my cotton rows--which was true. She said I would sit down on him and hoe all around--which was true. And then I would make him get up and move farther down the rows, and I kept this up throughout the length of the field, until I had hoed a swath six rows wide. Now, I don't believe genealogists would say I was lazy. Instead, I believe they'd have to admit that I was systematic...just systematic.

I worked ten years for the U. S. Department of Agriculture. I remember that its chief of the Soil Conservation Service once said, 'Take each acre and treat it as that one acre should be treated.' Maybe we could get over into the genealogical field and say, 'Take each problem and treat it as that one problem should be treated.'

About 16 months ago, when I began trying to find out more about my ancestors, I knew I had a hard row to hoe. I never saw a grandparent of mine. I've never seen a one of my mother's people. I didn't know where a one of my great-grandparents was buried, and I didn't even know the maiden name of my mother's mother. I'll use the Collins name to illustrate, but McFarland or Murphy or Ward or Erwin would do as well.

A year ago last May, I just dived in and started on the Atlantic Coast, expecting to get my bearings right away, but I couldn't find any footprints. I had expected to go back to Ireland and trace the Collins line from there to America and right on down to 1797, in about two weeks. I did find a book about old-timers who came over in the early 1600's. Some of their given names sounded familiar, and I wanted to make a few notes. But the first thing I did was to begin a register by taking a little card and putting the figure one in the upper left-hand corner. And then I wrote down the title of the book. I call such cards my source-book cards.

About 37 years ago, while browsing around in a library, I found a book that mentioned my great grandfather, ELIJAH WILLIAM COLLINS, and two of his ten children. The book said that he soldiered in the Black Hawk War of 1832. I made a note, but I didn't write down the title of the book. I'd like to see that book tonight.

Within the last 16 months, I've found my great-grandfather listed in one book, and the Illinois State Archives sent me the title of a county history. I've found my grandfather in a history of Lamar County, Texas. I've found my father in two Masonic books. I've found two granduncles in a Texas book, and the husband of a grand-aunt in two Arkansas books. But I had to look in a lot of books before I found even that much.

Since beginning 16 months ago, I've kept on looking in books and making notes, always giving a number of mine to each book I copied anything from. Before long, I had so many source-book cards I couldn't remember them individually. I was stumped, because the library didn't shelve its books in the order I filed my cards. I plowed around that stump by putting a code number in the upper right-hand corner of each source-book card. I got those code numbers from the spines or back-bones

of the library books. Then I could look at the left-hand corner and see my source-book number, and at the right-hand corner and see the code number. But I was still stumped. Well, I plowed around the second stump by making a duplicate set of cards, exactly like the first set, except that I switched corner numbers. I filed the source-book cards, numerically, in a matchbox tray, and I filed the code-number cards, numerically, in another matchbox tray. That was my double-barrel register then, and it's still my register tonight, except that it has grown a lot. I've read of a person who got an answer to a query 13 years old, and I've heard of people who hunted for 30 years. Right now, I'm shooting at 14 more months.

Here is what the upper part of my card on source-book 469 looks like:

The code-number card is exactly the same, except for the switching of corner numbers. Its top line looks like this:

I copy the title and other information from the front and back of the title page. At the bottom I repeat the library code number and the SB number, just in case the upper corners wear away. The SB cards are my working file; I can look at it and go to the book on the library shelf. The code-number cards are my finding file; I can look at it and find the SB number, or I can go to the book on the library shelf.

Sometimes, when I get home and begin transcribing my notes, I find that I've left off a date or a county or a name, or maybe something just doesn't sound logical. I have to go back and find the book that'll complete or correct my note...."

CURIOSITIES OF PURITAN NOMENCLATURE:

Charles W. Bardsley says, "Any number of children in one family of one name might be recorded...a deed dated 1347, is on record, wherein two John de Leightons, brothers, occur. One John Barker had three sons named John Barker and two daughters named Margaret Barker...in Waters' (Parish Registers) pamphlet it is found that John Leland, the antiquary, had a brother John, and that John White, Bishop of Winchester, 1556-1560, was brother to Sir John White, Knight, Lord Mayor in 1563."

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This business of giving children of the family the same name is one of the nightmares all genealogists have to ride. It's probably true in your own family in modern times; at family dinners have you ever noticed this? We've had as many as four Mary's, three Thomases, three Ednas, two Augustas, two Guys, two Walters, etc. You can keep them straight, but pity the future genealogist if you don't leave records for them.)

WHAT'S MY LINEAGE?

STEWART, WINEGARDNER, YORK:

Mrs. C. J. Garrett, R. #4, Burlington, Kansas, wants to exchange data on ENOS H. STEWART, son of William and Hanna (?) Stewart, who was born in Ohio about 1811, (Kansas Census of 1875 gives his age as 64). He married (1st?) and had one son and two daughters. His 2nd wife was LYDIA CAROLINE WINEGARDNER, and they had two sons and three daughters. They came to Kansas in 1869 and the 1885 Census shows Enos in Greenwood Co., Kansas, where he died about 1890. He was a Methodist minister. WILLIAM S. STEWART, son of Enos and 1st wife, was also a Methodist minister. He was at Virgil, Kans., 1871-3. His son Milton was born there. LYDIA CAROLINE WINEGARDNER was born in Ohio in 1822, a daughter of JOHN WINEGARDNER of Pa., and DIADAMA YORK of N. Y.

McMINN COUNTY, TENNESSE:

He wants the full name of "PHENIE" SCHMIDT, who married ERNEST ADOLPH ZIPS, and parentage. "Phenie" and Ernest were both born in Germany. They lived at Fayetteville, Fayette Co., Texas. He is buried in Sunrise Cemetery, Nugent, Jones Co., Texas.

And he wants the parents of ROBERT A. CREATH, b. c 1780, in Kentucky (?) Is he a brother of JACOB CREATH, SR., Baptist preacher for 32 years and then a leader of Disciples of Christ Church for 27 years? ROBERT A. CREATH m. ANN CRAWFORD, 21 July 1800, Garrard Co., Ky., and went to Ind. in 1803. Jacob Creath's brother, William, and 5 nephews were also preachers. Who were they?

SOME ORIGINAL PATENTEES OF LAND IN DENTON COUNTY, TEXAS:

(Contributed by Mrs. Alma Lain Chambers, Drawer 98, Sanger, Texas)

Texas had a land offer to colonists never before, nor since, equalled in the history of the world. Fifty-two million acres of public lands were set aside for public education; no other state or nation passed such an act. Texas used the old Spanish and Mexican system of filing in the Texas Land Office and it is called the best in the world because forgeries are almost impossible.

A portion of this land was acquired by many as bounties for service in the wars for independence; in addition to this bounty and donation land, there were colonial grants, headrights and later sales at 50¢ to \$2.00 per acre from March 1836 to as late as 1887, in certain parts of West Texas.

A look at the abstracts of deeds and records in the County Clerk's Office in Denton County, Texas, shows a most interesting origin of land in the county and a revelation of early settlers.

Mrs. W. E. Langford, 1121 Highland Drive, Henderson, Texas, wants help on some people she thinks were named "REDD" that lived in Athens, Ga., in the early 1800's, and perhaps before that, too.

Her grandmother told her years ago that an old journal she had was kept by her great grandmother, MARTHA REDD. The journal is now in Mrs. Langford's possession, and she finds that Martha Redd, or whoever kept it from 1813-29, failed to mention any family names, not even her own. But Mrs. L. knows enough about her family history to know that it was kept by MRS. THOMAS JONES, her grandmother's great grandmother. The first and last pages of the journal are missing, but the last existant page mentions that she was active in organizing a Baptist church in Athens that year. Mrs. L. wrote to the First Baptist Church there and found that one of their charter members was Martha Jones. The first name is the one her grandmother had given her, so she assumes that Martha Redd was her maiden name, but, of course, has no proof.

Whatever her name, her family was Presbyterian, and her mother died in December of 1817. If anyone had data on a REDD family that ever lived in the vicinity of Athens, Georgia, please write Mrs. Langford.

THE CARUTHERS FAMILY

--By Rhea Kuykendall, Silver City, New Mexico

(Presented to the Fort Worth Genealogical Society, Sept. 21, 1960).

First, I give the data on which I was accepted for membership in the Sons of the American Revolution, (the Fort Worth unit), thru my descent from John Caruthers, Revolutionary War Soldier. His pension certificate, number 25764, is given further along. The number S 32 163, is also given along with 25764.

This John Caruthers was born July 12, 1746, in Baltimore County, Maryland. He was a resident of Ninety-Six District, South Carolina, and Rutherford County, North Carolina, during the Revolution. His wife was Sarah, surname unknown. He died in Clark County, Arkansas, in August, 1841. His son, Samuel Caruthers, was born April 29, 1770. He died August 21, 1847. He was married to Sarah Vaughn on March 2, 1802. She was born November 18, 1774; date of death, unknown. John, son of Samuel Caruthers, was born Feb. 10, 1807; died Aug. 4, 1856; married Frances Murphy on Oct. 28, 1827. She was born in 1810; died, Oct. 3, 1857. Both are buried at Techuacana, Texas. Sarah Frances Caruthers, daughter of John, was born Sept. 3, 1841; died Dec. 18, 1874, in Hill Co., Texas. She was married Sept. 18, 1862, to Aquilla Pierce. Her daughter, Joanna Pierce, was born April 15, 1865; died Oct. 8, 1951, married Dr. Alexander Rhea Kuykendall on Nov. 2, 1887. I, Rhea Kuykendall, was born Feb. 3, 1893, at Morgan, Bosque Co., Texas; on April 16, 1921, married Mary Ruth Moran, who was born Sept. 4, 1891. Dr. Alexander Rhea Kuykendall, my father, was born Feb. 17, 1861, at Gainesville, Greene Co., Ark., and died Feb. 17, 1919, at Waco, Texas.

To complete the above genealogy, my daughter, Bettie Joe Kuykendall, was born at Weatherford, Texas, on Sept. 23, 1927. She married Charles A. Bradley, May 23, 1959.

Here is the pension certificate of John Caruthers, Rev. War Soldier: It is number 25764 - S 32 163 - in the National Archives, Veterans Records Branch, Washington, D. C. "John Caruthers, S32 163, birth July 12, 1746, Baltimore County, Maryland; resident of Ninety-Six District, South Carolina, and Rutherford County, North Carolina, during the Revolution. While a resident of Ninety-Six District, S. C., he enlisted in July, 1776; served in Captain John Carter's company of Rangers, part of the time under Colonel Andrew Pickens. Went on expedition against Cherokee Indians, and was in a battle at 'Crackers Neck.' Then went to Rutherford County, North Carolina, and enlisted as a private under Captains Vel (Ewell) Lampkins, William Whiteside, and Wilson; and Colonels Malmedy and Joseph McDowell. Was in the Battle of Eutaw Springs. Taken prisoner at 'Nob Creek,' a few weeks before the Battle of King's Mountain, and escaped at time of that battle. His entire service amounted to at least four years, and he served till the end of the Revolution. In 1833, he stated that he served two years in the War of 1812, in a company of Rangers under Captain Jacob Short. After the Revolution, he lived in Rutherford County, N. C., for about two years; then he moved to a section later in Tennessee, where he lived for four or five years. Then he moved to Kentucky, where he lived for six years.

John Caruthers then moved to Illinois, where he lived for eighteen years, and then moved to Arkansas Territory. In 1833, he lived in Independence County, Arkansas Territory, with a grandson, and in Clark County in 1839. He died two or three months before November, 1841."

John Caruthers, son of Samuel, born Feb. 10, 1807, came to Texas in 1830; his brother, William Caruthers, came with him. John enlisted in the Army of Texas, June 30, 1836, and was discharged Sept. 30, 1836. He was in Capt. Pearson's Company. One document states that it is his discharge from a company of Rangers. It is dated March 17, 1837, number 3370. He was given numerous grants of land. One was his headright certificate number 336, for one labor of land, issued by the Board of Land Commissioners of Montgomery County; Huntsville, the county seat. He and his brother, Allen Caruthers, are on the first list of tax payers of Washington County in 1837. The tax list for 1840, shows them still there. John later lived at Old Buchanan, 3 or 4 miles west of Cleburne, in Johnson County. Later, he lived at Kimball, Bosque County, on the Brazos, where the Chisholm Cattle Trail crossed. He and his wife are buried at Tehuacana, Texas. Mrs. Walter H. (Florence) Anderson, 3010 Topeka Street, Corpus Christi, Texas, a grand-daughter of Allen Caruthers, wrote me that Allen "lost" John, and could never find him again.

My object in placing this data on file with the Fort Worth Genealogical Society is that if any of their numerous descendants are ever interested in their lineage, they will have a few basic facts that I am giving to start on. I know that after I pass on, the data that I have will not be available, unless I file with some public depository. The descendants of the above are scattered from Connecticut to Los Angeles, California.
