

# THE GRAHAM LEADER Young County, Texas

With this issue, we begin abstractions from the <u>Graham Leader</u>, made by your editor, Catherine Troxell Gonzalez, from microfilm in the Fort Worth Public Library. The following introduction to the series was written by Nancy Timmons Samuels, a native of Young County, whose ancestors—2 grand-parents, 5 great-grandparents, 1 step-great-grandparent, and 2 great-great-grandparents—are buried in the county. Her step-great-grandfather, A. B. Medlan, was the first Treasurer of the county, and her husband's ancestor, Peter Harmonson, was the first Chief Justice of the county.

#### Introduction

The <u>Graham Leader</u>, west Texas' oldest newspaper, is still in existence. With the motto, "Hue the line, let the chips fall where they may," it was established as a weekly newspaper at Graham, Young County, Texas, in August 1876, by CSA veteran, Major J. W. Graves. Issue Number 1 of Volume 1 came out on Saturday, 19 August 1876.

Major Jonathan Webb Graves was of a newspaper family. He was born 29 September 1830 in Indiana, was reared in southwest Missouri, took up printing at the age of sixteen, set his first type in 1847, and by 1849 had his own print shop. Prior to coming to Texas, he was connected with various newspapers in Springfield, Neosho, and other places in southwest Missouri. During the Civil War he served in the 3rd Missouri Cavalry, General Sterling Price's Army, CSA.

In 1855 J. W. Graves married Sarah Inman, native of Alabama. In 1868 he brought his family from Missouri to Johnson County, Texas, where his wife's family already lived. It is said that his sole possessions were a wagon and team and a twenty-five-dollar gold piece. He sold his wagon and team, invested in a printing press, and (associated with Jack Davis) began Cleburne's first newspaper, the Chronicle, the first issue published in October, 1868. Davis, who previously had been publisher of the Observer in Rusk, Texas, for two or three years, remained in Cleburne but a short while. Graves became the sole owner of the Chronicle after five or six issues, and Davis moved on to other places, including brief stays at Junction City, Kansas (as editor of the Tribune), and at Weatherford, Texas.

Major Graves was a hardworking man, who required top performance from his employees. Beginning with few assets, by 1870 he was listed on the Johnson County census as owning \$1000.00 worth of real estate and \$1500.00 worth of personal property. In later years, he mentioned having given several well-known Texans their start, including James S. Hogg (later Governor of Texas), Martin Crane (later Attorney General of Texas), William Ramsey (later a noted barrister), and Alonzo Scurlock (later owner of the Chronicle). Seventeen year old James S. Hogg, a "printer's devil," came with Jack Davis from Rusk to Cleburne, remained to work for Graves, but, finding him too demanding, returned to Rusk before 1870.

In 1876 Major Graves sold the Chronicle and moved to the frontier. In Graham, Young County, Texas, he announced his intention to begin a weekly newspaper, the Graham Leader. At that time there was not a newspaper that far west in Texas. Young County had been one of the few earlier-organized

western counties in the mid-1850s but was disorganized during the late 1860s, due to the Civil War and Indian depredations. When the county was reorganized, the new town of Graham became the county seat.

The earliest subscription list for the <u>Graham Leader</u> is dated 16 August 1876, and the first issue came out on 19 August, although the date is not discernible on microfilm, the first issue being somewhat in tatters. In the beginning, the paper was published on Saturday, later changing to Friday and/or other days of the week. Subscriptions were \$2.00 a year. All issues are extant, except for the period of June, 1919 through the year 1921.

The <u>Leader's</u> "Carrier and Office List" of subscriptions [in possession of NTS], August 1876-January 1881, lists a number of other western Texas newspapers, which evidently came into existence ca. 1877-1881, some being of short duration, others more permanent. Some of those listed are:

Many other newspapers in Texas and other states are on the list, as well as the names and addresses of individual subscribers, both in and out of Texas.

J. W. Graves continued with the <u>Graham Leader</u> for many years. His oldest son, W. Lester Graves, became a printer and editor and later managed the paper for his father. Lester was also connected with the Texas Newspaper Union at Galveston, ca. 1890. Lois Sophia, the major's third daughter, married in 1889 to Phlete A. Martin, who later managed the <u>Leader</u>, and, decades later, wrote a history of the county, which was published, serially, in the paper.

Major Graves' brother, O. C. Graves, was editor of various papers, including the World, at Ottumwa, Wapello County, Iowa. Another brother, Warren H. Graves (from Neosho, Missouri) moved ca. 1875 from Weatherford, Texas, to Cleburne, where in March 1886 he and Dr. Andrew Young established the Cleburne Tribune. A nephew, James W. Graves, a printer working for his uncle, the major, in Graham in 1880, later moved to Amarillo, where he became Tax Assessor of Potter County in the late 1880s.

J. W. and Sarah (Inman) Graves celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary in 1905. He died 3 April 1911. Sarah, born 5 January 1839, died 1 September 1924. Both are buried in Oak Grove Cemetery, in Graham.



## ABSTRACTS FROM THE GRAHAM LEADER August 26, 1876 thru December 31, 1880 Graham, Young County, Texas

19 Aug 1876. "Maj. A.B. Gant of Weatherford, arrived in town late Saturday evening. The Major contemplates opening a Land Office here...." "Wanted--Five hundred gentlemen to emigrate to Graham who have pretty daughters. Would-be sons-in-law numerous." "Messrs. James Floyd and F.M. Burkett are in town, recently arrived from Louisville, Kentucky...." "Badly needed-some good dwelling houses; anyone building will find it a paying investment." "Mr. J.R. Baker, late of Cleburne, arrived here Sunday evening with his family and household effects, and has permanently located in our town...." "By arrangements recently consumated with the United States Military Telegraph officials, we will furnish our readers with the latest Telegraphic news from the outside world in detail." "Col. G.A. Graham purposes constructing a private telgraph line to his new residence on Augustin Heights."

26 Aug 1876. "The old frontiersman, Rev. G.W. Slaughter, was in town last Saturday with a thousand head of cattle..." 2 Sep 1876. "The Comanche and Kiowa Indians are all reported quiet and peaceable in the Indian Territory. No hunting or scouting parties are out at present or likely to be soon." "Seven persons were murdered six miles south of the town of Montague last Saturday night by parties in disguise. It was done with knives and it is supposed to have been for money which was in their possession." Pilot Point, August 31: "Last Sunday Geo. Skinner, aged 21, while trying to pen a horse, ran his pony into a ditch and was thrown and instantly killed by breaking his neck. Funeral the same day." "Messrs. J. & J.R. Farrar wit their families passed through Graham yesterday en route to their homes in Navarro county."

- 16 Sep 1876. The...murder of a family near Montague... "We learn from Mr. Johns, our mail carrier, that a terrible crime was committed last Sunday night, eight miles south of Montague. Ingram, his wife, daughter, and son, were engaged in family prayers when they were attacked and all murdered by a gang of desperadoes -- Cribs, Preston, Taylor, and two others, whose names we did not learn. One son, who was outside the house, escaped.... Fredericksburg, Sept. 13: "An old man named Sol. Pruitt, who has been wandering about the country, was found dead today in the neighborhood of Hudson Mountains....he was homeless." "Plenty of turkeys and squirrels are found within a mile of town. Our young sportsmen play havoc among them." "Our good friend, F.J. Beard, formerly of Johnson county, arrived in our town on Monday last, with his family and household effects...."
- 30 Sep 1876. "Can't somebody get married in Graham, and break the dull monotony of single cussedness."
- 7 Oct 1876. "The Graham Lyceum was reorganized last Monday night. The following officers were elected: Col. E.S. Graham, President; C.W. Johnson, Vice President; J.H. Glasgow, secretary; W.S. McJimsey, Treasurer; A.C. Caldwell, Sergeant-at-arms...."

"DIED of a congestive chill, Tuesday morning, December 19, SUSAN BLACK, wife of Thomas Black, aged 26 years, 1 month and 24 days-leaving a sorrowing husband and a stricken family of five small children...She was born in Missouri, and only a short time of her life was spent among us...."

Myers, Atty-at-Law, also a person by the name of Barron. Bland was wounded in the stomach and died from the effects of it at 11:30 today. Lt. Myers was shot through the arm and bowels and died early today. Barron was killed instantly-being shot through the head. County Attorney Jefferey was shot through the leg, and it is expected that he will recover. Others were shot through the clothing but uninjured. Deputy Sheriff Cruger was slightly wounded. Reed made his escape and is still at large...."

16 Feb 1877. GRAHAM LEADER--EXTRA. (There was a note in the paper the week before that this was the coldest winter since "Owing to the non-arrival of our paper, we are unable to issue a paper this week. It has been on the way for nearly a month, and is doubtless between here and Fort Worth, probably stuck in the mud.... - 12 May 1877. "R.A. Van Horn, editor and proprietor of the Corsicana Observer, died in that city on the 3rd inst."
- 19 May 1877. "We regret to learn of the death of Mrs. Gibson, wife of C.R. Gibson, editor of the Waxahachie Enterprise, which ...occurred on the 29th ult."
- 26 May 1877. "Sterling Price died on Wednesday morning, and the funeral services were held Thursday....We deeply sympathize with the family..."
- 16 Jun 1877. "Hughes, the highwayman, who escaped from the Jacksboro jail some weeks since, was mortally wounded while being captured a few days since." "A difficulty occurred last Sunday seven miles South-west from Jacksboro, between two men named Curtis and Brown, in which the former was killed." Fort Worth Democrat: MARRIED: "MILLER-HOLLIS--On the morning of the 6th inst., at the residence of the bride's father, by Rev. Prof

- Wilson, Mr. Henry Miller to Miss Eliza Hollis, both of this city.... "The newly wedded couple spent several days in this place and were the guests of Mr. G.B. Jewell...."
- 23 Jun 1877. "Fred Douglas recently visited Talbot county, Md., for the first time since he left, forty-one years ago, a fugitive slave. He was welcomed by his old master, Capt. Thomas Auld and by Mr. Wm. W. Bruff, who taught him how to read."
- 7 Jul 1877. A LAMENTABLE OCCURRENCE. "Monday night last our town was thrown into considerable excitement by the report that a woman had been shot and killed a mile north of town.... The woman's name was Louisa Wilson, wife of J.H. Wilson, formerly of Graham...who have been leading a nomadic life, living in camp and on the road. The family consisted of Mr. Wilson and wife and three children, the youngest being a babe two months old. No one witnessed the shooting except a little daughter four years old and the husband of the deceased, he testifying before the coroner's jury: "Was moving camp, wagon drawn by oxen, I sitting on gun; gun lying in front part of wagon; wife seatd in elevated position back of me; told her to take gun from under me; she leaned forward and done so, when the gun off, the muzzle being so close to her that her clothing took fire." .... The coroner's jury returned a verdict that Louisa Wilson came to her death from a gun-shot wound, the gun at the time of the shooting being in the hands of J.H. Wilson.... As the matter will undergo a judicial investigation, we refrain from commenting or giving all the testimony taken by the coroner.... MARRIED: "In Palo Pinto, on Wednesday June 27th, Mr. W.S. McJimsey, of this place, and Miss M.J. McLaren, of Palo Pinto, by the Rev. Dr. Robinson..." "Mrs. Peters, who arrived with her husband from Louisville, Ky., Wednesday, took an overdose of morphine through mistake, on Thursday morning....Friday morning she was considered to be out of danger, but expired at 5 o'clock in the afternoon..."
- 14 Jul 1877. DEATH: "PETERS.--July 6th, at 5 P.M. Entered into rest, Mary Ann Peters, wife of H.J. Peters. The burial service, form the "Book of Common Prayer," was read by the Rev. P. Tackitt, of the Methodist Episcopal Church."
- 21 Jul 1877. DIED: "FORE.--July 15th, at the residence of the husband, NANCY JANE FORE, wife of G.W. Fore, departed this life. The burial service by the Rev. E.S. Coltharp, of the Baptist Church. Sister Fore was born in Pulaski county, Ky., in 1829, was married to G.W. Fore in October 1848....She emigrated to Texas in 1869...her devoted husband, loving children..."
- 4 Aug 1877. A SON LOST. "Please satisfy a distressed mother... About a month ago my son Robert, about sixteen years old, left me without any cause. He was traced to Palestine. He is about five feet high, sallow complexion, blue eyes, with a scar on his forehad. We came to Texas two years ago from Georgia. I suppose he is trying to get back... any one will please address me at Centreville, Leon county... Elizabeth Whiddows.

- 18 Aug 1877. "CLOSE OF VOLUME FIRST. One year ago the LEADER embarked upon the sea of journalism, in the then frontier town of Graham...."
- 8 Sep 1877. "We regret to lose from our midst Mr. G.E. Kumpe, who left on Wednesday for the buffalo range. He won many friends during his stay here, who wish him success in his new field of labor." "Sunday morning, our genial friend, J.E. Ryus, came up town with a broad grin....It didn't take us long to learn that it was a boy...." "We were informed a few days ago that on the 24th inst., 15,000 head of buffalo were seen at the head of California creek, in Archer county, traveling in a South-westerly direction."
- 15 Sep 1877. "Tally two for Judge Williams--it's two girls...."
- 29 Sep 1877. A HORRIBLE OUTRAGE: "On last Friday, the 21st inst., Mr. James Melton, Deputy Sheriff of this county, with a posse of six citizens, went in pursuit of a man named Bob Vandever, for whom he had a warrant...Vandever heard them coming, and jumping out of the wagon entered the house before being caught...Mr. James Stewart, one of the posse also commanded him to surrender when he (Vandever) shot Stewart...He expired within a half hour after being shot, and was buried Sunday morning. He leaves a wife and two small children..."
- 13 Oct 1877. "We are pleased to announce the arrival of Rev. W.M. Goode and family from Missouri...."
- 3 Nov 1877. "Mr. N.J. Timmons was in town yesterday, and seemed to have new life and a business air about him that--well--it's a boy."
- 15 Dec 1877. "Rumors of Marriages. Let the good work go on."
  "A paralyzed man named Peter Henry, was brought to this place about three weeks ago, from the northern part of the county....Everything was done for his relief and comfort, but on Saturday night he died...."
- 22 Dec 1877. MARRIED: "On Tuesday evening at the residence of the bride's uncle, Mr. F.M. Bu..kett, by the Rev. A.K. Miller, Mr. Benton Kramer to Miss Sue Orr. No cards..." "On the 18th inst., by the Rev. Thomas, Mr. W.A. Sitton, to Miss R.E. Timmons." "On the 18th inst., by Mr. J.M. McBrayer, Mr. Matthew Brogden to Miss V.C. Wayne."
- 5 Jan 1878. "Dr. Graves, at one time a citizen of this place, was married on Dec. 17th, to Miss Fannie T. Foote, of Brazoria county, Texas." "Persons marrying will remember the LEADER will publish the same if they will send us the names, and that a chunk of cake would not be amiss..." "CUPID'S HARVEST. The wedding of Colonel W.A.E. Rhodes and Miss Mattie Kenan took place Tuesday evening at the residence of Mr. Geo Wilder. The silken knot was tied by Rev. A.K. Miller....The groom is well and prominently known in legal and business circles...."

- 19 Jan 1878. "J.C. Son, editor of the Palo Pinto Star, was married on the 24th of December to Miss Ida Corbin." HOMICIDE: "A difficulty occurred 1st Friday on Brushy creek in the northern part of this county, between J.D. Taylor and M.V. Adams, which resulted in the death of the latter. It seems that an old feud existed between the parties. Adams made an assualt on Taylor, who was traveling along a public road, firing two shots at him with a revolver, when Taylor returned the fire with a shot-gun, killing Adams instantly...Adams...leaves a wife and three children."
- 26 Jan 1878. INDIAN RAIDING IN MCCULLOUGH COUNTY. "....One man named Doty was killed by the Indians.... A party of citizens from Brady City are also in pursuit. The Indians killed one more man named Palmer, on the night of the 16th, near Brady City....Troops from McCavett have been sent toward Kickapoo, and the Rangers at Coleman are preparing to leave in pursuit of these Indians, numbering about thirteen. " FROM BRECKENRIDGE: January 10th, 1877.(?) "...The examination of Dr. H.S. Broiles, for the killing of Dr. A. Miller, was held on the 27th ult. The leading facts in the case, are Dr. Broiles, in the official capacity of Vice grand, preferred charges in the Odd Fellows Lodge against Dr. Miller of "lying and swindling," which action Dr. M. made the pretext of a personal quarrel with Dr. B....At this instant Dr. B. was heard to say "don't shoot," and immediately two shots were fired almost simultaneously, Dr. Miller missing his aim was mortally wounded near the heart. evidence shows the homicide to have been justifiable. Wm. H. Schermerhorn."
- 9 Feb 1878. MARRIED: "On the 6th inst., at the residence of Mr. J.W. Greene, in Comanche, Texas, Mr. T.R. Hill and Miss Donna B. Hoover...."
- 2 Mar 1878. MARRIED: "On the 21st of Feb. 1878, at the residence of W.W. Edwards, on Clear Fork, by Esq. McBrayer, Thos J. Davis to Miss Susannah Claunch, all of Young county...."
- 9 Mar 1878. MARRIED: "On the 3d inst., at the residence of the bride's parents, by Rev. W.M. Goode, Mr. P.E. Golather to Miss E.A. Cordell...." MARRIED: "BALL--GRESHAM--At the residence of Walter Gresham, Esq., Galveston, by Rev. Wm. Howard, D.D., Feb. 27th, Thos. Ball, Esq., Senator from Jack county, Texas, and Miss Lalla Gresham, of King and Queen county, Virginia..." "The examining trial of Wm. Clark, for the killing of S.M. Weatherford, was had before his honor Judge Hilliard, last Friday and Saturday...the defendant was discharged from custody."
- 16 Mar 1878. "Last Friday evening Dan Fichett, a boy of some ten or twelve years of age, who lives with his brother, W.H. Fichett, in Tonk Valley, accidentally shot and killed his little nephew, Tommy Fichett, a child four years of age..."
- 27 Apr 1878. "...Thursday, April 25th, to witness the nuptials of Mr. J.B.F. Shock and Miss Sallie Richards...."

- 27 Apr 1878. Early History of Young County. "Capt. Wm. Peveler, one of the early settlers in Young county, with his brother James Peveler, brought a small lot of cattle and established a ranche near Ft. Belknap, in the year 1852 where he remained until the war, when he was elected Captain of a volunteer company of Texas rangers. Captain Peveler, with State Cox, Perry Harminson, George Hunter, and Cole Duncan, were driving a small bunch of cattle on the prairie, near the Murphy Station on Salt Creek Prairie when they were attacked by about seventy-five Comanches, who charged them on horseback. being out of reach of any timber, with the exception of two small mesquite trees, they took a stand and found the Indians until State Cox was mortally wounded, when he said to Captain Peveler and the other men, "Boys, save yourselves if you can and don't stay and be killed on my account." At which saying he dismounted from his horse and fought them in deadly conflict until he was overpowered and fell as a hero. Perry Harminson after being shot through the right arm made his escape with George Hunter and Cole Duncan. Capt. Peveler was shot in the temple, in the neck, and in the right shoulder with arrows, and in the arm with a rifle; he made his escape to Flag Springs, where he remained from the 5th to the 22nd of September, 1864, and died. He was buried by the side of his brother Grenup Peveler, who was a member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, and a member of the Belknap Lodge where Capt. Peveler had just been made a M.M. in the Belknap Masonic Lodge. I make this statement in the Church and Lodge for the benefit of his orphan daughters. P. Tackitt."
- 4 May 1878. "On Monday the Grand Jury returned an indictment against P.B. Marshall for the murder of Dora Dees. A motion for continuance was made by the defendant's counsel...." The following are the names of Grand Jurors: Chas. Humphreys, foreman; John Wood, Henry Ledrick, John Paddock, J.G. Vance, Geo. Long, M. Meador, E. Winborn, John Blakely, Jas. Fulkerson, N.D. Williams, and F.M. Burkett.
- 11 May 1878. "The nuptials of Mr. James Melton and Miss Lida Price were celebrated in the presence of a large congregation at the school building last Sunday evening....The silken knot was tied by Hon. J.R. Fleming...."
- I Jun 1878. HYMENEAL: "Mr. W.P. Beckham, was Wednesday evening united in bonds of matrimony to Miss Blanche Burkett. The ceremony took place at the residence of the bride's father, Mr. F.M. Burkett, and the silken knot was tied by Rev. A.K. Miller...."
- 8 Jun 1878. "Parson Richards, who has been visiting his old home in Alabama, has returned." "Plenty of shooting every evening. Our citizens are practicing---probably in expectation of coming in contact with Sam Bass." "The Sheriffs of Young, Jack, Palo Pinto, and Stephens counties, each with a posse of men, and a number of rangers from Ft. Griffin are after Sam Bass and his gang, who are in Stephens county."

- 15 Jun 1878. "Capt. H.M. Black, an old and highly respected citizen of this county, died at his residence on Fish creek last Saturday." DIED: "On Wednesday morning, June 12th, at 7 A.M. Ida infant daughter of T.P. and M.A. James...." "Sam Bass & Co., were overtaken last Thursday, the 13th, in Wise county, by the Sheriff and June Peak. Bass lost one man (Carter) and all his horses."
- 29 Jun 1878. "Mr. W.S. Jimsey smilingly received the congratulations of his friends last Saturday. It's a girl."
  "Mr. S.R. Jefferey left Tuesday afternoon for Fort Worth. He goes for the purpose of purchasing ice, of which he will have an abundance on the 4th, and will supply his customers with all kinds of iced drinks."
- 6 Jul 1878. (There was a story about the first celebration of the 4th of July in Graham the past week; also a description of the businesses in Graham.)
- 20 Jul 1878. Delegates elected to the Congressional Convention at Fort Worth on th 7th day of August were appointed: R.W. Richards, W.T. Lard, John Proffit, D.C. Brooks, Wiley P. Jones; alternates were J.S. Shaw, J.H. Glasgow, Harry Williams, Chas. Humphries, and J.H. Kemble.
- 27 Jul 1878. "Sam Bass and one of his gang, named Barnes, were killed at Round Rock on the 19th. Bass, Barnes, and Jackson were in a store purchasing some tobacco, when they were attacked by Deputy Sheriffs Grimes of Williamson county and Moore of Austin. Grimes was killed and Moore badly wounded. Barnes was killed on the spot, but Bass succeeded in getting on his horse, but was too badly wounded to go far, and was soon captured. He died from the effects of his wounds the next morning."
- 24 Aug 1878. Deaths: "Thursday 14th, little Eddie, 6 years old, only child of Mr. and Mrs. Silas Crawford, living 8 miles north of town, disease Syncope--buried at the town cemetery the following day." "Saturday 17th inst., a child of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Clark, living 4 miles north of town--buried at Graham cemetery last Sunday." "Tuesday 20th inst. James Rudd, of Collin county, at the residence of M.D. Wallace on Fish creek."
- 7 Sep 1878. DEATHS: "Friday August 20th, 1878, A.J. EARNEST, of conjestion of the bowels. Buried on his farm in Goose Neck Bend." "Thursday August 27, H.J. PETERS, of conjestive chill, at his residence on Clear Fork of the Brazos. Buried at the town Cemetery." "Sunday, Sept. 1, 1878, RASMUS MADSON, of consumption. Buried at the town Cemetery." "Sunday Sept. 1, 1878, GUSTAVUS ADOLPHUS, infant son of G.A. and Edmonia GRAHAM. Aged 5 months, 26 days. " MARRIED: "Monday evening, Sept. 2nd, Mr. Wie Williams to Miss Belle Burnham--attendants Mr. G.R. Brooks and Miss Rebecca Ayts, all of Baylor county, Father Tackitt officiating..."


About 1972 I made my first trip to Marion County, TN looking for the graves of a couple of ancestors who died there before 1850. That first trip was unsuccessful, despite a long siege of driving backroads, talking to old residents, and wading through overgrown abandoned graveyards. In 1974, I returned, this time armed with a better idea of where within the county they had lived, thanks to a map made by a Yankee engineer during the area's occupation during the Civil War--he had thoughtfully included their homesite and had named the family living on it. Another two or three days of intensified walking, interviewing, looking, and searching followed, with no results. An old family reminiscence, second-hand to me, talked about "standing in the cemetery at her mother's grave..." so I was fairly sure there was a burial ground to be found and not just a couple of isolated and forgotten graves.

By the end of the second trip there from Texas, I was fairly sure I had canvassed the cemeteries that the residents there now were familiar with and which were still pretty visible. After returning home I bought a United States Geological Survey map of the specific area I had searched, and divided it into grids.

On my third trip there, I talked to landowners and got permission to carefully walk over every part of an area of about two square miles in which I believed the folks were buried. I first walked down the west line of my tract, from north to south, and then moved east about one hundred yards, after which I walked due north back to the north line—then east again another hundred yards and back to the south line—etc. Eventually I found the cemetery known as Shiloh Cemetery, and the graves of my folks who died in 1833 and 1844. To my knowledge it has not been inventoried by anyone else. It was such a pain to locate that I decided to copy all the inscriptions while I was there.

(Editor's Note: Publishing an out-of-state cemetery is contrary to our policy, but Pat Chadwell Jackson and Paul Campbell thought this work such an excellent example of the way to work on locating a lost cemetery that we felt it important enough to publish. The maps and cemetery listing that follow are part of Mike's work. Mike Patterson is with the Tarrant County Historical Commission.)



Scott and Miss Allie Rich will be married tomorrow evening at 6 p.m. at the residence of the bride's father.

John Simpson Broom, born 15 November 1868 Texas, died 22 March 1905, Palo Pinto County, was son of H.D. and Juliann. He married Mattie Agnes Heath, born 28 February 1878 Lewisville, died 25 January 1817 Palo Pinto, on 5 December 1895, recorded at Weatherford. Both buried at Whitt. Mattie was daughter of Thomas Allen Heath and Josephine Gazzaway and Mary (?) in Denton County near Lewisville by 1851. William died there before 1854. Where is Josephine buried (died before 1882) in Denton County or East Texas? T.A. and Josephine Heath were in 1880 census of Denton County. Thomas was son of Lamarcus K. Heath, born 8 November 1808, Tennessee, died 6 January 1903, and Sabine P. ?, born 18 March 1815, died 11 Mar 1900, both buried at old Ebenezer Cemetery near Parris, Jack County. Thomas Allen is buried at Perrin. Would like to correspond with anyone researching these families.

#### INDEXING FOR THE 1910 CENSUS

According to The 1910 Federal Population Census, the catalog published by the National Archives Trust Fund, the 1910 Federal Population Census Schedules for Texas are indexed by Soundex.

Many users have indicated that the sheet numbers given on the Soundex cards for the 1910 Census do not exist. I did some investigating and determined that, frequently, the numbers shown on the cards as sheet numbers were, in fact, visitation numbers.

The basic difference between Soundex and Miracode, as explained in the Catalog, is that Soundex Cards refer to the Sheet Number and Miracode cards to the visitation number. Obviously, workers who did the Texas, and perhaps other state, indexes were confused.

The bottom line is this: if the index and sheet numbers do not conform, look to the visitation number, the first number to the left of the names, in order to find the family for which you are searching.



# PETITION OF CITIZENS OF TARRANT COUNTY AGAINST THE SUNDAY LAWS



28 Feb 1891

To the Honorable, The 22nd Legislature of the State of Texas:

REALIZING the pernicious evils that have blemished the history of the nations of the Old World, by the combining of church and state, and fully appreciating the sublime wisdom of the founders of our country in their unmistakable condemnation and inhibition of such an evil.

THEREFORE, we, the undersigned citizens of Texas, would most respectfully represent that nothing is more obvious than that all Sunday Laws contained in our Statute Books are infringements upon our Liberties and Natural Rights, as defined by our fathers and clearly set forth by them in the Declaration of Independence and Constitution of the United States, and we would most respectfully petition your Honorable Body to repeal all laws requiring the observance of Sunday as a religious institution, or tending to that end.

# ABSTRACTS FROM THE GRAHAM LEADER (Continued from Vol. 29, No. 1)



14 Sep 1878. "Whereas, It has pleased the Great Architect of the universe, to remove from our midst our worthy brother Se... Warden, ARTHUR J. ERNEST....Young County Lodge U.D., A.F. and A.M....That heartfelt sympathy of this Lodge be extended to the bereaved family in their sad affliction...."

28 Sep 1878. "Celebration of the 20th anniversary of the wedding day of Mr. and Mrs. R.W. Richards. Wednesday was the day and 12 o'clock the hour for the joys of the occasion....The Parson...played the host to perfection...." OBITUARY: "Died in Goose-Neck Bend, Young county, on Tuesday morning, September 24th, 1878, VIRGIL JOWELL, aged 24 years....Kind parents, a devoted wife, and much loved brother and sisters, mourn for him...."

12 Oct 1878. "We, the undersigned citizens of Johnson county, Texas, hereby certify that we are well acquainted with F.J. Beard, and have ever found him a reliable christian gentleman and in good standing as such....This September 30, 1878: S.J. Chapman, A.J. Seale, Thos. Rogers, J.M. Anderson, J.R. Kennedy, Allen T. Seale, C. Laramore, W.H. Harris, John Rogers, J.W. StClair, D.J. Boatwright, H.H. Freeman....I, G.H. Maxey, Clerk of County Court of Johnson county, Texas do hereby certify that the above named gentlemen...are citizens of said county...."

MARRIED: "On Tuesday, Octobr 8th, 1878, by Hon. E.T. Hilliard, at the residence of the bride's parents, MR. JOHN RUBENKOENIG, formerly of New Orleans, to MISS ANNIE SCHLITTLER, late of South Manchester, Conn...."

19 Oct 1878. DEATHS: "On Sunday the 23rd inst. Mrs. Haney, living 3 miles west of town. Buried on Monday afternoon at the Graham cemetery." "On Monday, infant son of L.P. Brooks." "On Tuesday morning, infant son of Wm. Drechsel, of this place." "On Wednesday morning, Mrs. Medlin, wife of A.B. Medlin, 8 miles west of town."

9 Nov 1878. "A 12 pound avoirdupois stranger of the male persuasion stopped with Mr. and Mrs. W.C. Bell last Monday morning, November the 4th. Bell is perfectly happy.". DIED: "On Sunday, November 3rd, 1878, MARY, consort of J.I. BOWIE...."

23 Nov 1878. DIED. "J.L. DONNELL, of Donnell's mill, Tuesday Nov. 19, 1878, of dropsy. The vacancy occasioned by the death of Mr. Donnell, in precinct No. 2 will be hard to fill; he was both Commissioner and Justice...."

30 Nov 1878. DIED: "On Thursday, Nov. 28th, LILLIAN, oldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L.T. WILSON, aged 5 years. Will be buried at the new cemetery, one mile East of town....Services at the Presbyterian Church."

14 Dec 1878. MARRIED: "At the residence of the bride's father, near Arkansas City, Chicot county, Ark., October 28th, 1878, by

Esquire Garland, Mr. J.C. Smith, formerly of this county, to Miss S.E. Price." "Graham Cemetery Association...The following are charter members: T.P. James, L.T. Wilson, G.A. Graham, F.M. Gifford, R. Hollingsworth, F.E. Yoakum, J.W. Graves, E.T. Hilliard, J.E. Ryus, S.B. Wadley, and J.E. Hollingsworth..." "Frank James was arrested last Friday by Constable Randolph, and put in the "coop" in default of paying a fine and costs, assessed against him some time ago in the Justice Court."

21 Dec 1878. MARRIED: "Dec. 4th at Leighton, Alabama, George E. Jumpe, Jr. to the sweetest and prettiest girl in Ala....Glad to know you think of returning to Texas...."

18 Jan 1879. MARRIED: "At the residence of the bride's father, Mr. W.C. Beckham, on Thursday evening, 16th inst., by Rev. A.K. Miller, MR. W.L. GRAVES to MISS MATTIE BECKHAM." "A rather unusual commotion was created in this quiet berg by the sudden arrival on Wednesday evening, of a couple in primitive Texas style from our neighboring county Jack--denoting by anxious inquiry, a longing desire to make the acquaintance of a parson, or some one clothed with like authority. Some kind friend directed them to Mr. Wilder's, where Judge Glasgow would be found. They quickly repaired thither and summoned the Judge, who, in his felicitious manner tied a knot for Mr. T.J. Hobgood and Mrs. A.C. Garrison..."

25 Jan 1879 "Mr. A.A. Graham, living in Tonk Valley, died last Saturday, while visiting in Stephens county--aged 30 years..." "Mrs. Nancy Johnson, wife of Moses Johnson, died at their residence last Monday, aged 74 years...The disconsolate family have the sympathy of the community."

8 Feb 1879. "The nuptials of Mr. J.W. Wadley and Miss Dora Bowie, were appropriately celebrated on Thursday evening last, at the residence of the bride's father, Prof. J.I. Bowie. Rev. A.K. Miller officiating...." "Mr. J.R. Green, a highly respectable citizen of this county, died at his home in Belknap, last Saturday, of dropsy. He was buried with Masonic honors the following day." "The following is the list of marriage licenses issued by the County Clerk for the month ending January 31st: T.J. Habgood and Mrs. A.C. Garrison, W.B. Pope and Miss Blanche Williams, R.H. Choat and Miss Flora Laramore, A.B. Woody and Miss I. Hazlewood, Overton Reed and Miss Mollie Woody, W.L. Graves and Miss Mattie Beckham, W.W. Wood and Miss N. Furgerson."

15 Feb 1879. "An immigrant of the masculine gender took up his abode at Ed. Gollahers Monday night. Weight nine pounds."

22 Feb 1879. "....After some twenty-five or thirty shots had been exchanged...the mob retreated, continuing to fire into houses as they passed out of town....After the firing had ceased, one of the party was found upon the scene of battle, and recognized as A.W. Hayes, living at Belknap. He was shot through the head and was properly cared for, but expired about 1

- o'clock....We deem it but just to state that the deceased was the first man ever killed, or even shot, in Graham--a town of three years' growth. His remains were taken to Belknap on Sunday afternoon, where he leaves a wife and three small children..." (Several columns of the paper are devoted to this story, including the Coroner's Inquest statements.) "W.P. Beckham has been receiving the congratulations of his friends since Monday night. It's a girl and weighs eleven pounds." Jacksboro, Feb. 14: "This morning at 6 o'clock Sylvester S. Lipscomb, aged about 45 years, rose early and walked over to get his horse, which was about a quarter of a mile from town. He seems to have been alone, and when found he was being dragged by the horse, perfectly dead and mangled....Mr. Lipscomb has been here only a few days. He came as a jeweler, and leaves a large family in Charleroix, Michigan..."
- 1 Mar 1879. MARRIED: "At the residence of the bride's father, on Thursday evening 27th inst., Mr. J.H. Graham to Miss M.H.E. Johnson. Judge J.H. Glasgow officiating."
- 8 Mar 1879. "Mr. J.H. Mayes, late of Jasper Co., Mo., died at the residence of Dr. Yoakum, last Sunday of pneumonia. Mr. M. was 52 years of age, and was living at the time of his death 3 miles north of town..."
- 15 Mar 1879. DIED: "On Sunday, the 9th inst., of disease of the heart, near Flat Top Mountain, in this county, MRS. RACHEL S. BROWN, wife of Capt. A. Don Brown, late of Missouri, aged 40 years and one month. Mrs. Brown leaves a devoted husband and five children to mourn her death..." CITATION: "...you summon W.A.E. Rhodes, whose residence is unknown, to be and appear before the District Court....to answer the petition of Mattie Rhodes....she the Plaintiff asks for a divorce and decree of nullity...."
- 22 Mar 1879. Brushy Items: "We are sad indeed to chronicle the death of Mrs. Don Brown...." "....has been donated and deeded to trustees by Col. E.S. Graham, on which to erect commodious and elegant college buildings, under the auspices of the Methodist Conference, to be known as Roxanna College, in honor of Col. Graham's mother, now aged 80 years...." Fish Creek Items: "Mr. Joe Catcliff, an old resident of this county, and Mrs. Cox of Fish Creek Prairie were married last week."
- 29 Mar 1879. DIED: "At the residence of Mr. M.A. Wilson, on the Brazos River, March 27th, John Smith, an English stonemason."
- 5 Apr 1879. "We regret to chronicle the death of little Addie Janes, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.S. Janes...."
- 26 Apr 1879. DIED: "At the residence of her husband, Geo. H. Mulkey, in Fort Worth, on Monday 21st., Mrs. Minnie E. Mulkey, daughter of J.W. and S.C. Graves."
- 3 May 1879. IN MEMORIAM: MRS MINNIE ELIZABETH MULKEY (nee

- Graves) was born Oct. 8th, 1856; married Geo. H. Mulkey Dec. 12, 1879; joined the M.E. Church South, in the City of Fort Worth in the year 1873....died in peaceful triumph at her home, April 21st, 1879. She was the mother of three children--one girl and two boys....the girl died in infancy....the boys, aged respectively 2 and 4 1/2 years have become wards of their grandparents, living in Graham." (There follows a long memorial.)
- 10 May 1879. "Billy Brown, a colored man living at Capt. J.C. Brown's in this county, was drowned last Wednesday, while attempting to cross Rock Creek."
- 17 May 1879. "There is joy at the residence of Mr. Mabry. It's a boy." "A baby boy made his appearance at the residence of M.W. Baker, yesterday morning. Ditto, a girl at Mr. Garrett's." Fish Creek Items: "The child of Mr. and Mrs Shelton died last week..."
- 24 May 1879. "Mr. J.W. Marr, living two miles west of town, had his leg amputated last week. Mr. Marr was wounded during the late war..." Briar Bend Items: "Mr. Mundell sustained the loss of one of his children last Sunday...."
- 31 May 1879. DISTRICT COURT: "...announced the names of the Grand Jury: W.T. Bunger, F.W. Ledbetter, G.W. Carrol, S. Foster, Sam'l. Woods, Jas. Rogers, A.C. Gilmore, W.P. Jones, J.A. Culwell, A.J. McCan, John Paddock, Wm. King." "Frank Emerson, a young man living at Mr. Ash's three miles west of town, died last Friday night. He had been living here but a short time, having come to this county from Coryello county."
- 7 Jun 1879. "J.M. Champion and Miss Nora Edge were married on the 29th ult., by Judge Glasgow." "A Negro woman named Susan Wright died in this place Wednesday afternoon and was buried by the county..." "Mrs. Williams, wife of Keel Williams, living near Belknap, was tried before Judge Glasgow, Iast Monday on the charge of insanity. The jury adjudged her insane, and she was placed under the care of the County Judge until her husband returns, who is away from home. Mrs. Williams no doubt will be sent to the asylum at Austin, at an early day. She has six small children, who are left without the care and influence of a sane mother."
- 14 Jun 1879. "Burk Burnett, a prominent stock man of Clay county, shot and killed Jack King, at his (Burnett's) ranche last Saturday. It was said the killing was done in self defense...." "Mr. Charles Horton, a well-to-do farmer and stock raiser, living about nine miles northwest of Denton, committed suicide about 2 o'clock last Monday by shooting himself in the head..."
- 28 Jun 1879. "A female baby stopped at the residence of Mr. F.M. Gifford last Saturday night--weight four pounds."
- 5 Jul 1879. Fish Creek Items: "The child of Mrs. Brockman died

- the 12th inst." MARRIED: On Tuesday evening, 1st inst., by Rev. P. Tackitt, Mr. S.W Goode to Mrs. P.B. Rosson... The... groom... has just entered his twenty-first year....and the blushing, buxom, widow and prospective bride, who is said to be on the shady side of thirty-seven..."
- 19 Jul 1879. "A new barber made his appearance in town last Sunday, at the residence of Mr. Rubenkoenig. The father seems supremely happy, and all are doing well." "Mrs. Hayes, of Belknap, was brought to Graham last Tuesday in a destitute condition, and is now in the care and keeping of the county." "Mr. Jacob Werts and Mrs. R.C. Ridgely, were married at the Court House Thursday afternoon, by Judge Glasgow....The happy couple are beginning life anew at an advanced age...."
- 26 Jul 1879. "....Mr. Robt Holman...will be married at Columbus, Texas, on the 30th inst., and will immediately return with his bride...."
- 23 Aug 1879. "A REQUEST. All editors will bestow a lasting favor on a distressed woman by copying the following description of my husband who mysteriously disappeared on Jun 30, 1879. He is about 65 years of age, gray hair, light blue eyes, sallow complexion; about 5 feet 10 inches high; had on when he left a white palmetto hat with two small patches of white cloth on it. He was raised in Calloway county, Mo.; lived several years in Benton county, Ark. Anyone seeing this notice and having any knowledge of him, wil do me a very great favor by addressing me at Tyler, Texas. LYDIA ARMSTRONG."
- 13 Sep 1879. "The trial of M. Pointer for the murder of J.W. Calder at Dallas terminated last Saturday in a verdict of not guilty...." "Mr. Drechsel was made the happy father of twins, Tuesday morning--a boy and a girl." "Mr. Thomas Tackitt and Miss Lillie Miller were married at the residence of the bride's father, on Thursday evening, Sept. 4th."
- 20 Sep 1879. MURDER. "Last Monday morning news reached this place of the killing of H.B. Dalton by J.B. Gunn, seven miles North-east of town.......Gunn left immediately for parts unknown...Mr. Dalton was a law-abiding man and good citizen.... Mr. Gunn has heretofore borne the reputation of being a good man and is said to be well connected. Both men have families.... The remains of Mr. Daton were interred in the Graham Cemetery Tuesday evening." MARRIED: "In Graham, on 17th inst., by Judge Glasgow, Mr. Newt Bottoms to Miss Clara Eager."
- 27 Sep 1879. MARRIED: "At Church in Farmer, Young county, Texas, MR. C.M. ZINN to MISS SALLIE A. FARMER, by Rev. J.A. Zinn, Sept. 21, 1879...."
- 4 Oct 1879. "A large black bear, measuring 5 feet 10 inches in length, and 3 feet 8 inches in height, was killed six miles Northeast of town, Wednesday night, by Harry Parker and Charley Blakeley." "...the papers were issued this week authorizing the marriage of: W.M. Shed and Miss Mattie Pinkston, A.W. Black and

- Mrs. L.B. Palmer, Wm. H. Peckham and Miss Palestine Timmons, Joel Cates and Miss S.A. Hook."
- 11 Oct 1879. "John T. Simmons, who resides six miles west from Waxahachie, shot and killed Sam Byers, who had insulted his daughter...."
- 18 Oct 1879. Tonk Valley Items: "There is joy in the household of Mr. C.P. Benson. A bouncing boy having made his appearance there Wednesday night." "Two more souls made happy. Mr. Fayette Gardner and Miss Jennie Stanton were married this morning and leave to-morrow for Hood county."
- l Nov 1879. "W.B. Crowdus, a prominent merchant of Weatherford, died on the 23rd. ult." "Mr. J.W. Wadley has a new clerk--a bouncing boy--usual weight."
- 8 Nov 1879. HYMENEAL. "The nuptials of Capt. Geo. Spiller and Miss Belle Loving were celebrated at the residence of the bride's parents in Lost Valley on Tuesday last--Rev. Jno. Brown of Jacksboro officiating..." YOUNG COUNTY MEDICAL ASSOCIATION. ROLL OF MEMBERS: R.N. Price, M.D.; N.M. Reagan, M.D.; Geo. H. LeGrand, M.D.; J. Mc. C. Atkinson, M.D.; O.B. Batchelder, M.D.; W.W. James, M.D.; J.K. Davidson, M.D. "A young stranger of the masculine gender made is appearance at the residence of Mr. Godfrey last Friday evening. So also, a girl at Mr. Hindman's, Sunday."
- 15 Nov 1879. "It becomes our duty to chronicle a cold-blooded and hellish murder...as having been committed in Young county....On the 19th of October, G.B. McDermot disappeared, during the absence of his wife, who was visiting in Parker county. His property...was found in the possession of Jack Post, Nelson Post, and L.W. Smith, who told the neighbors that McDermot had sold them the property and had left the country....The neighbors were aroused and search was instituted for McDermot's body, which, after a long and careful search was found on Sunday afternoon just back of his (McDermott's) field....He had been dead just three weeks...(A long story follows about the inquest and grand jury's report.)
- 13 Dec 1879. "B.R. Webb Esq., a prominent young attorney of Breckenridge was united in marriage with Miss Lizzie Callaway at that place on te 3rd. inst." MARRIED: "On Thursday 11th inst., Mr. A.B. Medlan to Mrs. Elizabeth Willis." DIED: "In this city on Wednesday the 10th inst., infant son of Mr. and Mrs. G.W. Fulton."
- 20 Dec 1879. MARRIED: "At the residence of the bride's father, Rev. S.D. Akin, on Thursday evening, Dec. 18th, Mr. Walter E. Kaye to Miss Mary B. Akin. Rev. ----Hendricks, officiating." "We neglected to note last week the arrival of a wee girl at the residence of Capt. James. Weight 10 lb." "Capt. S.P. Ross, of Waco, was in town Monday. Capt. Ross is the old Indian Agent, and known to all old settlers..."

27 Dec 1879. First Texas Cavalry Reunion: "On the 8th day of January, 1880, the members of the First Texas cavalry—A. Buchel's old regiment—are requested to meet in reunion in the town of Comanche...All comrades from a distance will be liberally entertained. J.M. Holmsley, ch'mn. W. Carnes, sec'y." "It has been rumored upon the streets that Mr. F.M. Gifford, formerly a resident of Graham...died at Honey Grove last week." "The Leader has survived the depressing season—a season almost unparalleled in the history of Texas, and is encouraged with the hope of finding its way into every household in the county...a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year."

3 Jan 1880. "Mr. T.H. Conner, of this place and Mrs. M.J. Miller, of Breckenridge, were united in marriage on Thursday morning, January 1st." "Mr. Robt. Harris and Miss Effie Jones were united in the holy bonds of wedlock on Christmas day, by Rev. P. Tackitt." "At a regular meeting of Graham Council U.F. of T., the following officers were elected for the ensuing term: Wm. Roy, W.P.; J.H. Glasgow, W.A.; W.L. Graves, D.G.W.P.; W.E. Kaye, Chaplain; Wm. Crozier, R.S.; T.L. Caldwell, F.S.; John Humpries, T.; R.W. Mosby, C.; H.B. Spiller, I.S.; T.F. Green, O.S."

10 Jan 1880. "....Since the tragedy of September 21st 1877, in which Bob Vandever killed Mr. James Stewart and shot Mr. Melton, (then Deputy Sheriff of this county,) nothing has been heard of him until a short time since, when Sheriff Melton received information that Vandever was living near Van Buren, Arkansas...On the 20th of December, Mr. Melton left Graham, and arriving in Van Buren, Ark., found to his satisfaction that the report was true....Vandever lived some twenty miles from Van Buren, going by the name of Buck Anderson, and it was agreed that he should be decoyed into town and arrested....Mr. Melton immediately ornamented Vandever with "Texas jewelry" and started home." (The story of the killing of Stewart and the capture of Vandiver is told in full.) "...we chronicle the death of little Jessie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.B. Patterson, which occurred this morning...."

17 Jan 1880. "Mr. Geo. Close has just completed a residence for Mr. Delvicio, who will arrive shortly, with his bride from Kentucky." "The United States District and Circuit Courts will sit here on Monday the 3d of February. Judge A.P. McCormick will have a good deal to say to the grand jury relative to revenue collectors, U.S. Commissioners and U.S. Marshals. Panhandle troubles have all ended, but we understand there is a good deal of business outside of that portion of our state. We have a very neat and comfortable court room, and our town fwill be lively. The grand jurors for the term are: J.A. Ruing, Shackelford county; B.W. Bell, L.E. Brannan, Young; Jno. Traderk, Eastland; T.F. Chedester, Young; W.E. Stewart, Shackleford; E.B. Jones, Eastland; J.M. Conaster, Palo Pinto; J.T. Eichelberger, W.C. Bell, Young; Will Aldridge, Eastland; E.F. Blackwell, Eastland; James Drake, Eastland; J.F. Buck, J.H. Baker, Young; J.P. Lasley, Shackleford; William Sweatt, Eastland; H.T. Graham, Young; S.M. Hale, Eastland; S.D. Davis,

31 Jan 1880. "A Little Early History of Young County. We make the following extract from a letter from Maj. H.W. Merrill, of New Rochelle, N.Y: Perhaps it may be interesting to you to learn that the writer of this is the first white man who ever led a command of U.S. Dragoons into Young county, from Fort Martin Scott, now Gillespie county, in June or July 1851, to the Indian Villages, then just below Graham, and this to recapture stolen horses, and punish the Indians, the Wacos, Ai-qui-quosh, Chief, and Keechies. I was in command of Fort Belknap in 1854, I think, when Col. Jesse Stem, Indian Agent, was murdered on the road, and I had his murderers, two Kickapoos, punished by death." "Mrs. Sarah Jane Taylor, formerly of Hernando Co., Florida, departed this life on the 25th day of January, 1880, in Young county, Texas. The LEADER deeply sympathizes with Gen. Taylor, the bereaved husband, and his children, who are left...without the care of a mother."

"EDITORS LEADER: In your issue of January 31st, 7 Feb 1880. appeared an extract from a letter from Maj. H.W. Merrill, who commanded Co. B., 2nd U.S. Dragoons, stating that he had put to death the Indians who killed Col. Stem. As I was a member of that company and one of a detail of twenty-five men under the command of Lieut. Tree, who was sent in pursuit of the Indians, permit me to state more fully how their death was brought about. After two unsuccessful attempts to follow the trail, by scouts, under H.H. Sibley, a third was ordered under A.D. Tree to proceed to Fort Arbuckle, where upon arriving, we found the Kickapoos flying through the post in great alarm at our approach leaving, as it would seem they knew our business. One George Thompson, a son of Black Bear, then a chief in the tribe, remaining to make some terms with the commanding officer, which terms were substantially as follows: That he (Thompson) would deliver the two murderers at the Post if the Dragoons were not permitted to follow the tribe, which was agreed to. After an elapse of two days they brought in the head of one of the murderers, tied to a saddle. In a few more days they brought the other within three miles of the post and there shot him. The Dragoons went to the place, charged the dead Indian, captured him, and throwing his body into a wagon returned to the Post without losing a man, and thence back to Fort Belknap without having their military fame tarnished by any other smoke than that of a camp-fire. John A. Cairnes." Bastrop, Feb. 5: "Dr. J.W. Wilkins, for thirty years a citizen of this county, died to-day. He leaves descendants to the third generation, to mourn his death." "Wiley W. Sammons, junior editor of the

Albany TOMAHAWK, was married to Mrs. Annie Haley, on the 30th of January." "J.J. Snow, of Missouri, is in North Texas, hunting for the grave of his brother murdered in Tarrant county in 1876." "Mr. Geo. Wilhelm, of Albany, accompanied by his wife, nee Miss Lou Graham, visited the "Gem City" this week." "Mr. W.H. Samson, the genial photographer, has some fine views of Graham taken during the late snow."

21 Feb 1880. "A young man named Everett, died on Gage's Creek last Sunday of pneumonia." ORANGE BLOOSOMS: "On Thursday evening, at the residence of the bride's mother, Miss Mary H. Crain was married to Mr. Robert Dickens; Rev. B.H. Johnson, officiating. The groom is one of Graham's prominent business men..." "Mrs. Birdwell, wife of Mr. George Birdwell, died at the family residence on Conner Creek last Saturday. Also, on Thursday morning, Mr. George Birdwell. They were both very old...."

28 Feb 1880. "Sam H. Meyers is to be hanged at Cleburne, on the 19th of March, for the murder of his step-mother, Mrs. Mary A. Hester, in 1877." "A venerable old gentleman named John Booth, living near Birdville, Tarrant county, hung himself a few days ago. He was laboring under mental derangement." Death of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Birdwell: "....Mrs. Matilda Birdwell was born in 1798, and died on the 13th of February, 1880. Mr. Geo. Birdwell was born on the 23rd of November 1791. He served through the war of 1812 under General Jackson. He entered the Mexican war as a private and was soon made Captain, and was finally a Colonel. He settled in Texas in 1836 and died in this county on the 19th of February, 1880, after an active and useful life of nearly 89 years. This aged couple lived together for 65 years, and were loved and respected by all who knew them. They leave a numerous posterity and a large circle of friends... " MARRIED: "February 22, at the residence of the bride's mother, by S.F. Knox, J.P., Sebastian Foster, of Young county and Miss Jane Welch of Throckmorton county, Texas." MARRIED: In Fort Worth, on the 13th inst., by Elder Gough, Capt. A. Don Brown of Young county, Texas to Miss Theresa B. Holmes of Jefferson county, Missouri."

6 Mar 1880. "Mrs. Buckner, a widow lady, whose husband and little boy were drowned in the Brazos, 1877, was found dead on the floor of her room on the morning of the 15th instant at Granbury." "....I am delighted to hear from one of my old soldiers, and I bear evidence that his statement is strictly correct. I wish to say further that I have preserved in my scrap copy, a letter written by William Burkett, then the Post Sutler, to the Galveston NEWS, which contains a full and very interesting account of the whole matter. He became, subsequently, I think, the first honored County Clerk of young Co., and a most worthy man he was....Yours truly, H.W. Merrill, New Rochelle, N.Y., Feb'y. 23, 1880." "Mr. Jno. D. Godman, our efficient sheriff, was married on last Sunday to Miss Mattie Welch.... " "Mrs. Mollie Young left Tuesday morning for Virginia, where she will join her husband, Capt. N.E. Young." "Miss Nannie Burk of Goose Neck is visiting friends in town."

- 26 Mar 1880. Hymeneal: "On last Sunday evening, at the Methodist Church, by the pastor, Rev. B.H. Johnson, Mr. J.B. Beckham and Miss E. Belle Burkett were united in the holy bonds of matrimony. The ceremony took place immediately after church services and was witnessed by a congregation of over two hundred persons.... "The LEADER is pained to learn of the death of Mrs. Geo. Wright, which occurred at the residence of her husband on Salt Creek, Tuesday morning. Her remains were interred in the old Cemetery Wednesday afternoon. She leaves a disconsolate husband and several children to mourn her death." "Mr. D.H. Harkey and Miss Nannie Burke were united in marriage by Judge J.H. Glasgow, at the residence of the bride's uncle, Mr. F.L. Thomas on last Sunday afternoon." Dallas, March 17: "The authorities here were notified today that John Stroud had shot Jim Castle twice in the head on Saturday last at Mesquite, and that he was not expected to recover...."
- 2 Apr 1880. "We regret to chronicle the death of Mrs. Morrison, the aged and esteemed mother of Mr. Jno. E. Morrison, which occurred on last Sunday. Her remains were consigned to the old cemetery on Monday. She leaves a large number of relatives and friends..."
- 9 Apr 1880. "Another Indian outbreak is expected in Wyoming Territory, and the whites are rushing into towns and cities for protection..." "Two of our citizens were arraigned before Justice Lafferty, last week, for failing to work the road...." "Jeff has inaugurated a Lager Beer boom. Fresh Keg Beer always on hand. Families can be supplied at reasonable prices. Bring your bucket with you every day and get a sufficient quantity for diner."
- 16 Apr 1880. Goose Neck Items: "Mr. J.P. Tucker's pleasant smile has turned into a broad grin. It's a boy."
- 30 Apr 1880. Austin, April 24: "The Governor today commuted to imprisonment for life the death sentences of Benjamin Krebs and James Preston, who were to have been hanged at Gainsville on Friday next for the murder of the England family, in Montague county, in June, 1876." TRIBUTE OF RESPECT: "....upon the death of Brother R.W. Richards....It is meet that we give expression to our sorrow and offer condolence to the widow, children and relatives...." "On Wednesday morning...the death of Rev. S.D. Akin, an old and much esteemed minister of the Methodist church....He was buried Thursday morning with Masonic honors...." DIED: "On Friday evening, April 23rd, Mr. R.W. Richards, proprietor of the Graham Hotel, departed this life....He was forty years of age and leaves an interesting family and innumerable friends....The remains were interred in the new cemetery on Saturday afternoon by Adelphi Lodge I.O.O.F...."
- 7 May 1880. Goose Neck Bend: "Mrs. Mary Parish died at the residence of Mr. Brim, two miles south of Graham, on the morning of the 21st, and was buried at Goose Neck Cemetery...leaves many friends and relatives..." (To be continued.)

LETTER FROM ELIJAH P. AND LOUISA JANE YOUNGER CROWLEY TO ISHAM AND ELIZABETH MEDLIN CROWLEY, 2 AUG 1866

(The original of this letter is in the possession of Jack Crenshaw Grantham, Jr., 10102 Lanshire, Dallas, TX 75238. He is the great-grandson of Frances L. Crowley Geeo, daughter of Richard C. Crowley, son of Isham Crowley.)

Greenville, Clay County, Mo. August the 2, 1866

Dear Mother and Father, Brothers and Sisters:

I once more embrace this opportunity of writing to you to let you no that we are on the land among the living and our health is tolerable good at this time except myself. I am just getting over a spell of sickness. I was confined to bed three weeks. My hert (sic) is not good but I do hope that when these lines reach you they will find you all well and doing well for it has been a long time since we have had the pleasure of writing to each other.

We have seen and felt a great many hard trials since this most cruel and unholy war commenced. Doubtless you have heard that my dear and lovely boy Jack as we always cauled (sic) him was murdered shortly after he came back to Missourie (sic) by a pack of those thieves and murderers called feds for that was their business whenever they thought they had the chance.

He came home on tuesday night the 28 of March 1865 which was very unexpected to us for we told him if he ever got to Texas to stay there until the war ended, but I expect he wanted to see us and no (sic) what had become of us again. He was at home three times, tuesday night, thursday night and friday night. He went to tries (sic) to get away, for the feds was after them and had killed too of the young horses that day. On saturday night he and James Charley was taken prisoner as they was going through Smithville. They kept them there till late Sunday evening. They told them they was going to take them to Ridgely and try them. They went about a mile and a half, took them out in the woods and shot them and left them laying there. An old man heared (sic) their groans and went next morning to hunt them and found them and made his too little boys bury them.

We heard that they were killed we got a union man to go and find about it. We then had a coffin made and sent for him and brought him home on friday and buried him at Bethel Church on saturday the 2 day of Aprile (sic) and I do hope and pray that he is better off than his murderers ever will be and if they do not meet with justice in this world, they will be sure to in the world to come. his tintype that is dear to me. He had it taken and gave it to me before he left home. We have also got the little gray mare that he Perhaps you have heared (sic) him speak of her. left home on. We all think a great deal of her. We would not called her Kate. part with her for no mention on his account. He told us he was with you all and how kind and good you was to him. I hope the Lord will bless every one that was good and kind to him while he was gone. professed religion several years ago and joined the Methodist Church. I hope he had not forgotten it. He was a good and kind

boy to us all and beloved by all. His acquaintance Robert Ellington professed religion last fall and joined the church. He is a good soldier and he had a spell of typhoid fever last winter and came very near dying. He lay...weeks before he could set (sic) up. We had a serious time of sickness in our families at that time. There was five down at the same time there was fever. Nancy, Elizabeth with rhumatism (sic) of the heart.

The doctor said she was liable to die at any time. There was several seeks we had to set up with them but our neighbors was good to come and set up with us but thank the Lord they all got well by the help of a good doctor that had practised in the Confederate Army, ever since the war began.

Our friends and relatives are all well as far as I no (sic). Uncle Travis Finley was here yesterday he is well. He had been down to James P. Crowleys a few days ago. They was all well perhaps you heared (sic) that James had lost his wife and was married again. He married Miss Thude..., and Margaret Crowley was married last spring to a Mr. Hugh Fields. He is a very fine man. Uncle Jack Crowley and family are well.

The blacks have all left him but four, three women and one boy. My mother and stepfather are well. They living in Greenville. This is a real nice little place there is too stores here one blacksmith shop, one wood shop, sadlers shop and too good doctors Denham and a doctor Sheets, a good church. We have preaching once a month by the circuit preacher, southern Methodist and generally every two weeks. they are going to commence a tented meeting here the tenth of this month.

I hope we all have a good meeting. The crops looks well. Corn is very good, wheat, rye and oats are good. We have a good sugar cane patch. We make melons enough every year to do us. The people have got to raising right smart cotton in Missouri, some raise as high as three and four hundred pounds.

I have been wanting to rite (sic) to you a long time but did not no whether letters could get to you or not. Neither do I no whether this will reach you but I hope it will. ... Crowley has been talking of writing ever since he got a letter from Benjamin but did not think they would get it. If you get this immediately and let us hear from you all once more, for we are serious to hear from you all and no how you are getting along. Mr. West left here week before last going to Dallas. We would send a letter by him if we had known when he was going to start rite (sic) soon. Give my love and respects to all and receive a portion yourselves. (Change in handwriting)

This war has been reched (wretched) on us. We have lost a great deal by it. We greatly feel the Knead (sic) of what we have lost. Taxes is about to breake us up. They have been very high for several years but double this year to last year. Times are rather unsettled here. Every few days some are killed. The policy of our State is very bad. The radicals has the rule. We look for bad times at the next election, but the people are determined to change

policy. There is a large majority of Johnson men in this state, if they can vote. Our county has but few radicals. In upwards of 2 thousand in favor of Johnson's reconstruction policy.

I will give you a short history of the times. Money is a little secarser (sic) than it has been, property high good horses 2 hundred dollars, mules about the same, milch cows from 35 to 75 dollars, 3 year old steers 50, 2 year old 35, one year old 20 to 25, hogs from 8 to 10 cts groce per pound. hemp about 12 dollars per hundred. We greatly mourn the loss of our dear brother hiram but we hope he is where all the angels of heaven is rejoicing. Tell his companion to weep not for him for he died in a good cause but trust in God and persevere in holiness.

### PETITION OF CITIZENS OF YOUNG COUNTY REGARDING HOG LAW

15 Mar 1887

To the Senate and House in Legislature assembled: We most respectfully petition for the passage of a general hog law requiring owners of hogs to hold them on their own lands or to so amend the existing law to prohibit hogs running at large in localities where the hog law has been adopted and to enforce it with proper penalties. The fact that hog proof fences cannot be made of the timber growth in this section of the state, that vast damage is annually done to crops and that by existing law all the trouble and expense of impounding is cost on the injured, is just cause for our appeal to the Legislature for relief.

# BOOK REVIEWS

BOOK REVIEWS by Patricia Chadwell Jackson

Massegee, Robert Riley (8ob). Eact, Eancy, Legend: A History and Genealogy of the Masse(A)gee and Associated Eamilies. Edited by Judy Goldston. Granbury, Texas: Author, 1985. \$50.00 plus state sales tax.

Mr. Massagee begins with Benjamin Massaque-Massague, who died in 1697 in Albermarle District, North Carolina, "A Frenchman and an alien" and his wife Mary Ann Waller, and brings the descendants down to the present. He does not claim descent, but makes it very clear where he believes but cannot prove descent. He includes an account of the family by Charles Massegee, along with a number of family stories which have passed from generation to generation.

The book is well illustrated, with many photos of family members and places associated with the family, and facsimiles of public documents and family letters and other records.

Mr. Massegee is to be commended for including an every-name index in his work, one which has been carefully done. Names prominent in the index include Beam, Boatright, Buckner, Cameron, Cloer, Dellinger, Edwards, Hare, Johnson, Jones, Large, Parmer, Robbins, Sanders, Smith, Stockton, and Tharp.

Mr. Massegee has also included some lovely poetry by George Massegee, his father, much of which is inspirational in nature.

All in all, a solid, well-done book.

Materials included in this issue are Civil War Tales, Cemetery Records, Court Records, Extracts from newspapers, Census Records, Church Records, Today's Raineys, War Records, Vital Statistics, Obituaries, Family Histories, and Pedigree Charts and Family Group Sheets, as well as queries.

We have seen other issues of this publication, and continue to be impressed. Persons with Rainey ancestry will want to acquire the whole set.

### ANDREWS, ALLEY, BAKER, STARNATER, VENDLE, SUTHERLAND

John Andrews, along with John Alley, Andrew Baker and Francis Starnater applied for Spanish land grants in the Louisiana Territory in 1794. John Andrews, Sr., John Andrews, Jr., and William H. Andrews appear on the 1823 tax list for St. Francois County, Missouri. Nancy Andrews, who married John Baker, son of Andrew Baker and Nancy Vendle, is believed to be the daughter of John, Sr. John Andrews and Margaret his wife sold their Missouri land in 1825.

The names of John (Sr./Jr.?) and William Andrews appear on a list of "Austin's 300 Colonists," but apparently William returned to Missouri as he married in 1826 and appears on the 1830 census. William died in October of 1852, and among his effects was a promissory note for \$300 signed by John Andrews of the State of Texas. In February 1838, Jackson County, Texas, John Sr., died and his estate was administered by John Jr. The will proven by William Alley stated that \$1,000 was to be paid to William Andrews and \$1,000 to Lydia A. Baker among others from the sale of Texas land to George Sutherland. John, Jr., said that John, Sr., had heirs then living in the United States of the North.

### BOOK REVIEW

McLean, Malcolm D. Papers Concerning Robertson's Colony in Texas: Introductory Volume. Arlington, Texas: The University of Texas at Arlington, 1986.

At long last we have the introductory volume of this fine series, Robert Leftwich's Mexico Diary and Letterbook, 1822-1824. Most of the groundwork for Leftwich's story was established in a biography which was contained in Volume I of the series, which was published eleven years ago; however, in this volume, Dr. McLean reprises the details of Leftwich's life, quoting from the material contained in the diaries and letters (a letterbook was, in the 1820's what a file of carbon copies or a floppy disk are today; that is, a way to keep a record of letters one has sent to others) to demonstrate Leftwich's character, which was not a conventional one.

The body of the book is made up of facsimiles of the diary and pages of the letterbook, accompanied by a typed transcription of the pages, which is well-annotated. The notes appear at the end of the text, and include comprehensive biographical sketches of those persons mentioned in the text whose background is not likely to be known to the casual reader. Two appendices make this one outlines the three Mexican book particularly valuable: list of Texas Colonization colonization laws: the other i 5 a Contracts formed under the Mexican government. There is an extensive bibliography and a comprehensive, every-name index. Capital P is made the same as T; I and J look alike; Capital B, R and P are not closed. House numbers of many families are omitted. Several households had men who worked on the railroad and were given family numbers although they lived with other families.

#### ORDER BOOK 1

### Abstracted by Barbara Knox

### Page 1

Monday, August 19, 1850. County Court held in Waxahachie at house of E. W. Rogers, no courthouse or place having been designated by law for holding court. Present: Hon. William Hawkins, Chief Justice, Larkin Newton, Henry Trimble and James L. Berry, commissioners, Benj. F. Hawkins, Court Clerk and William H. H. Bradford, Sheriff.

Richard Donaldson employed to survey and lay off 60 acres of land for the county seat into a public square, lots, streets and alleys, he to be paid \$100 in town lots and report to Court on the fourth Monday of October 1850.

S. C. Cross, Chief Justice of Navarro County, to be paid \$10 for his services in organizing Ellis County, money to be taken from first money that comes into county treasury.

Court adjourned until tomorrow morning 9 o'clock.

### Page 2

Court continued on Tuesday morning, August 20, 1850, with same officers and commissioners present as on yesterday.

Commissioners appointed by State Legislature to locate a county seat for Ellis County submitted report which was approved and ordered filed.

Ordered that Ellis County be divided into the following precincts:

- No. 1: To commence at south corner of county running on line between Navarro and Ellis until it strikes Waxahachie Creek, up the Creek to the mouth of Mustang and north across Grove Creek two miles below Phillips' to Red Oak, then south to Trinity River and down River to beginning. Elections to be held at Widow McNeil's house.
- No. 2: To commence where line of Pct. 1 crosses Grove Creek, up Creek to crossing of the old road going by Mitchell's and with road to line between Dallas and Ellis Counties; then east on the line to Trinity River, down River to mouth of Red Oak, thence up

creek to intersection of line with Pct. 1, and with that line to the beginning. Elections to be held at John Bell's house.

- No. 3: To commence on Grove Creek where Dallas road crosses to north corner of William Donace's? section of land, west to the main north prong of Waxahachie, up the creek to the Dallas line, east on line to northwest corner of Pct. 2, and with west line of the precinct to the beginning. Elections to be held at the meeting house on Red Oak.

- No. 5: To commence where the east line of Pct. 4 crosses the divide between the south prong of Waxahachie and Onion, down divide to mouth of Onion Creek, then down Waxahachie to county line, with the line to the southwest corner of the county, thence on the west line of the county to Chamber's Creek, down the creek to a point due south of the Baker house, thence north on the line of Pct. 4 to the beginning. Elections to be held at Tarrant's Mill.
- No. 6: To commence at mouth of Onion creek up Waxahachie to the mouth of Mustang thence with west line of Pct. 1 to Grove Creek, thence on line of Pct. 2 to the old Dallas road, then with line of Pct. 3 to where it strikes the north prong of Waxahachie Creek, down the creek to the mouth, thence on the east line of Pct. 4 to the divide between Waxahachie and Onion Creek, thence east on the north line of Pct. 5 to the beginning. Elections to be held at Waxahachie.

Court adjourned until Wednesday morning 9:30 a.m.

#### Page 4

Wednesday morning, August 21, 1850. Court continued with same officers and commissioners present.

Court appoints presiding officers of elections in respective precincts: No. 1 - Malcolm Johnson; No. 2 - John Bell; No. 3-James Billingsley; No. 4 - Benj. Garvin; No. 5 - Napoleon B. Brooks; No. 6 - Joseph Whittenburg.

Court approved bonds of sheriff, assessor and collector and District Clerk.

Court adjourned until Thursday morning 9 o'clock.

Thursday, August 22, 1850. Court continued with same officers and commissioners present.

Court ordered taxes levied and collected for the county annually (on all subjects of taxation of which tax is levied by state) as follows:

Seven and one half cents on each \$100 value of real estate and personal property; special tax of 10 cents on all money loaned at interest, goods, wares, merchandise, wines and spiritous liquors when sold in quantities of a quart or more; \$50 from each person involved in theatrical amusements, such as museum, menagerie, wax works, or any such diversion; \$12.50 for retail sale of wines and liquors; \$5 peddler; \$25 for keeping billard table; \$10 for keeping bowling alley; \$7.50 for keeping cook shop, restaurant or eating house for pay; \$12.50 race track owner; \$10 real estate such type broker, ship broker, any cotton broker, or commissioner; \$12.50 auctioneer.

Court adjourned until Friday morning 9 o'clock.

### Page 6

Friday morning, August 23, 1850. Court continued with same commissioners and officers present.

Elbert C. Newton appointed to superintend advertising and selling County's town lots in Waxahachie, he to receive deed from Emory W. Rogers for the land donated by him.

Joseph N. Whittenberg hired to build a courthouse according to following specifications: a log house 16 x 18 ft, 9 ft. high, rough hewed inside and out; cracks lined on outside with clabbord; one window in end of house 2 x 4 ft. faced with clabbord shutter; door in each side 3 x 6 ft., faced, with clabbord shutters hung on wooden hinges. Whittenberg to be paid \$59 and house to be completed by third Monday in October.

Larkin Newton, William Hawkins and James S. Berry allowed \$7.50 each for five days' service as County Commissioners; Benj. F. Hawkins allowed \$7.50 for service as County Clerk at August Term.


December 1894.

## "A Horrible Tragedy"

# [From The <u>Dallas Times Herald</u>] August 29, 1857

It becomes our duty to record one of the most desperate and heart-rending tragedies that has ever been enacted in this region JOHN ROBINSON living some four or five miles of the country. from Birdville in Tarrant County, on Friday morning of last week, without previous provocation as we are informed, almost without an intimation of his fiendish intentions, shot and killed dead, two brothers, GEORGE and JAMES ANDERSON, brothers of his wife, then attempted the life of his wife, and failing in that, proceeded deliberately to his neighbor, old man SUBLETT, a distance of nearly two miles, and while the old man was begging for mercy shot him dead. Returning to within a short distance of his home, Robinson finished this horrid and un-natural tragedy by placing the muzzle of his gun against his own forehead, and pushing the trigger with the ramrod put an end to his own life instantly. The whole affair occurred in less than one hour. While the spirits of his victims were arraigning him before the Judge, his own guilty soul was precipitated by his bloodstained hand within the awful Presence, with all his horrid crimes crowding after him as witnesses. Charity would prompt us to hope that insanity or some fatal derangement of reason had prompted these actions.

We give here the version of the affair as furnished by a correspondent. We hope never to be called on to record such another.

# [From the <u>Clarksville</u> <u>Northern</u> <u>Standard</u>] [September 19, 1857]

Never before has it fallen to our lot to herald such a demoniacal occurrence. It seems that Satan swayed at his will one of the subjects of this unfortunate affair. We here give the proceedings of the Coroner's inquest.

An inquisition taken on the 21st day of August, A. D. 1857 at the houses of M. G. Anderson, William S. Sublett, and Shelton Robinson, in the County of Tarrant before James Harrison, Justice of the Peace, in and for said county, Precinct No. 8, upon the very dead bodies of James Anderson, George William Anderson, William S. Sublett and John Robinson.

By the oaths of W. E. Parker, John Harrison, William Cockrell, William L. Boyd, Anderson Barnes, R. C. Ford, Thomas J. Dalton, J. H. Kelly, D. C. Harrison, J. B. Marshbanks, good and lawful jurors of said County, who being duly sworn say: that the said Anderson to all appearances came to his death by a musket, or the discharge of a musket, discharged by John Robinson

and taking effect in the right corner of his mouth thereby causing his death immediately.

SECONDLY, we the jurors of inquest say, upon close examination that the said G. W. Anderson to all appearances and from the testimony given us, came to his death by a rifle ball, taking effect in about the left shoulder, fired by the hands of John Robinson thereby causing his death immediately.

THIRDLY, we the jurors of inquest report from the evidence before us that W. S. Sublett, to all appearances, came to his death by a rifle ball, taking effect in the centre of his breast, thereby causing his immediate death, said wound was inflicted by the hands of John Robinson.

FOURTHLY, we the jury report that John Robinson the executioner of the above named nurders, from the evidence of Horace Robinson his brother, and strong corresponding evidences, came to his death by a rifle ball, taking effect in the forehead and lodging in the back part of his head, thereby causing his death by his own hands, decided by us an act of suicide, by evidence here as found.

It seems that it has long since been the intention of Robinson to take the life of his uncle, (Sublett) for an injustice he thought done him some few years ago, by being instrumental to sending him to the state prison.

Whether he bore malice toward the two young Andersons, previous to the morning of their murder, we know not. But a few days before the fratricide his wife, a sister of the young men, left him and on the morning of the 21st they repaired to his house for their sister's clothing - she having gone the night before and remaining with her husband during the night. On the arrival of her brothers, Robinson commanded them not to advanceupon this his wife ran out; bearing a gun to her brother - but was, it seems, intercepted and quietude restored; until they had loaded the wagon. Then Robinson, in quick succession felled to the ground both of her brothers; he then loaded his musket and rifle - went in pursuit of his uncle, and on finding him shot him through with the rifle and as he fell fired his musket but without effect; however the work had been done with his rifle. He then loaded his rifle and winded his way homeward whistling; and seemed to be merry indeed but he had not proceeded far before he placed the rifle to his forehead and blew out his own brains; thus closing the scene of the tragedy.

#### EARLY CHURCH BUILT WITH LUMBER FROM SALOON

The first church established in Mansfield, Texas, according to a story written by Katie Casstevens in her weekly column in "The Mansfield News", published November 7, 1952, was the Walnut Creek Church, of the Cumberland Presbyterian faith, and believed to be the first Presbyterian congregation in Tarrant County.

The church was organized August 25, 1854 and two documents recording the affairs of the church in its early beginning were in the possession of Mrs. Norma Man Prichard, daughter of R. S. Man, one of the founders of the church and Clerk of the Session from 1872 until 1881. After the death of Mrs. Prichard, the records were lost but later located by a nephew, Alphonso Man of Decatur, Texas, and given to Mrs. Casstevens who placed them, for permanent record, in the Archives of the Fort Worth Public Library as a gift from the Man family.

Mrs. Casstevens recalled that in the first census, in the early 1850's, there were only 664 residents in all the 877 square mile area of Tarrant County, and in places, miles and miles stretched out without a habitation in sight.

Eight charter members signed the historic document which led to the establishment of the church. It read, "We whose names are hereunto subscribed, wishing to have the ordinances of God's house administered among us, and being willing to support the gospel as God may prosper us, agree to associate ourselves together as a worshipping congregation bearing the name of Walnut Creek Congregation, and being in the bounds of Tiwicana Presbytery, we pray to be taken under her care and we will look to her for such supplies of the means of grace as she may be able to afford us."

The names of those who signed the document were: William Howard, Elisabeth Howard, Tracy V. H. Renfro, Abraham Howard, Frances Bratton, Elizabeth Howard, Lucinda S. Howard and L. C. H. Howard.

For the first ten years the church grew slowly. According to the minutes, new members in 1855: the five children of the Richard Bratton's were baptized (Ann, John, Martha, Andrew and Hannah). In 1856, members added were: Richard Bratton, Sarah Howard, George A. and Amanda H. Southerland, Elizabeth J. Gibson, and Mary C. Smith. In 1858, Jessie Russel and Tennessee and Sarah Tummins; in 1861, Mary Bratton; in 1862 Julian and Henrietta B. Field, Margaret Moody, William and Margaret Ramsey, I. C. and T. P. Spencer. From then on the church grew more rapidly, some years having as many as 15 to 30 additions. By the end of 1868, 118 names were on the church roll.

For a number of years the congregation met in homes of the members and at the Howard's School House. In 1868, the first

church building was erected. Lumber was extremely scarce and usually had to be hauled long distances. An old saloon building was secured from Fort Belknap in Young County, torn down, hauled by ox-wagon to Mansfield, and rebuilt as a church. On August 4, 1868, this first church building was dedicated.

It is reported that in the early church the men sat on one side of the church house and the women sat on the other. There was no mingling!

The Church Session kept a close watch over the morals of its membership. When there was a report of someone's using profane language, gambling, dancing, selling goods on the Sabbath, being intoxicated, or having indulged in any unchristian conduct, a committee was speedily dispatched to confer with the offending member. Usually the transgressor saw the error of his or her ways, repented and promised to refrain from such action in the future, whereupon, he or she was allowed to continue in church fellowship.

The church building was soon outgrown, and in 1879 a Sessions committee met with Dr. John Collier, president of the Mansfield College Institute (more commonly known as the Mansfield Male and Female College), and agreed to defer the building of a new church, and instead to purchase or rent the college chapel. A still larger and more modern building was erected in 1892, and this building, which was torn down in 1949, is the one that most older Mansfield residents will remember.

Some of the better known citizens who later joined the church were: 1864, Mrs. Hannah A. Hodges (mother of Mrs. Sallie McKnight); 1865, L. H. Stephens; 1865, R. S. Man, Calvin and Phebe Wyatt; 1868, Calvin Guest, P. M. House, and P. G. Davis; and in 1869, Bro. John Collier and family.

The first pastor of the Walnut Creek Church was a Rev. William Kelly who served in 1855-56; followed by several visiting pastors who served for brief periods, and then, Rev. R. M. White, who served from Feb. 1864 through July, 1869. It was July 30, 1869, that the church formally changed its name to the Mansfield Congregation.

Rev. C. B. Hodges was pastor in 1870, Rev. W. D. Wear in 1871-72, at which time Rev. R. M. White was called again and served through Dec. 1876. Rev. A. J. Haynes served in 1878 and part of 1879, when Rev. A. S. Hayter (the founder of Arlington, Texas) came to the church and was still pastoring the congregation when the records closed in 1881.

Old timers report, said Mrs. Casstevens, that the first congregation of Methodist in Mansfield had their church meetings in the home of Johnnie Wyatt, north of town. Later, they shared the meeting house of the Cumberland Presbyterians, since for many years, it was the only church house in town, each using the building for two Sundays each month.

4 Jun 1880. Sherman, May 29: "A cyclone struck Savoy last night. Eight to twelve persons are killed and many wounded .... Up to this hour, 6 p.m., sixteen dead have been found.... About sixty or sixty-five people are wounded....Nineteen stores and twenty-five houses are in ruins.... The following is a list of killed and wounded as far as learned: Killed--Sam Giel, Dr. Kearns, E.L. Andrews and child, Mattie Best, Alfred Horn, Mrs. Gallager and child, William Suddeth, and others whose names were Wounded--R.R. Roberts, Colonel Smith, J.T. Cox, not learned. William Chambers, Dr. McKee and five members of his family, G.A. Thomason and wife, Mrs. Watt Taylor, Mrs. James Montgomery and child, R.T. Best, wife and two children, Mrs. E.W. 18 Jun 1880. DIED: "STEWART--At the residence of W.M. Pride, in Colbert County, Alabama, on the 22nd day of May 1880, Helen Key, infant daughter of Malcolm G. and Bettie Key Stewart, aged 4 years, 10 months and 6 days." Seymour, Texas, June 10, 1880: "...Judge E.R. Morris has been killed. While holding Commissioner's Court, W.A. Taylor deliberately walked into the Court House and took a seat a few feet from the Judge....Taylor drew his pistol and shot the Judge through the brain, killing him instantly....Taylor jumped out of the door and ran....Mrs. Morris, widow of the desceased, offers a reward of \$500 for Taylor."

- 25 Jun 1880. "Mr. L.T. Morris of Quincy, Illinois, brother of the late Judge Morris of Seymour, passed through Graham last week en route to the latter named place. He returned here on Sunday accompanied by Mrs. Morris, widow of his deceased brother, with the remains which they are taking to Illinois for final interment." "Judge E.T. Hilliard and Miss Ima G. Graham, of this place, were united in marriage in Louisville, Ky., on the 16th inst."
- 2 Jul 1880. "The son of S.J. Forsgard, of Waco, was drowned in the Brazos on the 19th."
- 9 Jul 1880. "William Bullard was killed by Jno. A. Shepard, near Courtney, on the 19th." "Mr. J.C. Calhoun, living a mile or two west of town, departed this life on last Sunday morning. He was buried at the old cemetery on the following day."
- 30 Jul 1880. "At an early hour on last Monday morning...the holy writs of matrimony were solemnized between Mr. J.B. Norris and Miss Alice Johnston, at the residence of the bride's father on Oak street. The ceremony was performed by Rev. P. Tackett...." "Judge E.T. Hilliard and bride, nee Miss Ina Graham, returned last Sunday from the East. The charming bride left Graham fifteen months ago to attend Science Hill Academy, at Shelbyville, Ky., and completing her studies some six weeks since, she was married in the city of Louisville to our townsman, Judge Hilliard, since which time they have been visiting relatives and friends in other states...." "Mr. John Bryan and Miss Baldwin were united in marriage by Squire Lafferty last Tuesday."
- 6 Aug 1880. "Bobbie, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. R.E. Mabry, died on last Friday morning was was buried in the new cemetery on the following day...."
- 13 Aug 1880. "Sidney Hugh, infant son of R.R. Cornish, died in this place on Tuesday morning, August 10th, and was interred in the new cemetery at 5 o'clock p.m. the same day." "With this issue, the LEADER completes its fourth volume. Four years ago when Graham was a small village of less than one hundred inhabitants, the LEADER commenced its weekly pilgrimage, and has kept its head up during the hard times of the past two years...."
- 20 Aug 1880. THE MONUMENT: "On last Sunday we visited one of the most hoted historical spots in Young county, viz: the monument 8 miles North east of Graham, on the old Belknap and Jacksboro road, where seven teamsters in the employ of Capt. Henry Warren, of Weatherford, were killed by a band of 100 Kiowa Indians, commanded by the noted chief, Satanta, on the 18th of May 1871. There were nine teamsters with the wagon train, six of whom were butchered, one chained between the wheels of a wagon and burned to a crisp, one wounded, and two made their escape. The names of these unfortunate men who were so cruelly massacred by the red devil, Satanta (who signed the treaty of peace between his tribe and the United States a year or two

- previous, under which he and they were being fed and protected by the government on the reservation at Fort Sill,) are N.S. Long, John Mullins, James S. Elliott, Samuel Elliott, M.J. Baxter, Jesse Bowman, and James Williams. The mutilated remains of these men were buried where they fell, and a pyramid of planks was there erected by Capt. Warren, to mark the spot, which since has been known as "The Monument." We regret to see the monument going to rack—the planks have been torn off by cattle and the structure has tumbled down. Some substantial mark, however rude, should be placed there to the memory of the ill-fated teamsters and as epoch in the history of the county."
- 27 Aug 1880. "Mr. George Bellows, living at Eliasville, died on last Friday from an affection of the brain." "The infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A.L. Hook, died last Monday...."
- 3 Sep 1880. SUICIDE: "On Monday evening about six o'clock our citizens were startled by the report that Miss Ella Price, daughter of our townsman Dr. R.N. Price, had committed suicide by taking arsenic (long story follows.) The remains were followed to the cemetery on Wednesday morning by a large procession of the friends of the family."
- 10 Sep 1880. "Birdie C., youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis, died Wednesday morning." "The LEADER sympathizes with Mr. and Mrs. Augburg in the loss of their infant, who died last Saturday night."

- 1 Oct 1880. "...the Court was occupied with the case of Nelson Post, one of the parties implicated in the murder of G.B. McDermot, on Fish Creek in October last...a verdict of guilty, with punishment at confinement in the penitentiary for 99 years....The case of Jack Post, charged with the same crime was next called...a verdict of guilty with punishment at death...."
- 26 Nov 1880. "Graham has 800 inhabitants, all of whom are the most moral, energetic, sober, and industrious people of any town in Northwest Texas."
- 10 Dec 1880. "Mr. Fayette Wilson and Miss Hensley were married on the 2nd inst., at the residence of the bride's father, five miles east of Jacksboro." "Our county clerk has not issued a marriage license since Nov. 11th, he however anticipates an increase in this particular line of business." "County court met on Monday last....No drunkenness, no elopements, no larceny, no six shooter cases, but peace and quiet reign in Young county."
- 17 Dec 1880. "And still our county clerk has still not sold a marriage license since last report...."

7 Jan 1881. Marriage licenses issued by our county clerk during the month of December are as follows: R.J. Austin to Miss D.T. Smith; Henry Twilleger to Miss Mary M. Dallas, January 6: "John Cantly, a wealthy stockman, had a misunderstanding with his brother Charles at Eastland yesterday which eventuated in the former being thrust through the body, from the effects of which he died today .... Before death he made peace with his brother by assuming all blame, and willing him considerable town property and \$1000 cash.... "Henrietta, January 5: "Last night at about 8:30, one of those misfortunes that startle a community occurred at Cambridge, three miles from here. Jas. Curtis, a prominent cattleman, was shot and killed by Van Rice in Vanslick's saloon. ... Van Rice received three shots, and was badly wounded. He was arrested and carried to the doctor's office. Just as he was placed in a chair, in the doctor's room, a ball was fired through the window into his breast, by some unknown person, inflicting a mortal wound ... . He cannot live through the night....James Curtis was of the firm of Curtis Bros., ranchmen, who own a herd of not less then 25,000 cattle, situated in the Panhandle.... He leaves a wife and one child.... Van Rice was an unmarried man of dissolute habits, and leaves friends in Kansas..." LOCAL MATTERS: "David M. Mills, East Liverpool,

Ohio, who was left a motherless infant desires to communicate with his father, David O. Mills, who left Colorado four years ago for Texas. Where is he? Who knows?" MARRIED: "At the residence of the bride's father near Belknap on Sunday the 9th inst., by Rev. S.E. Burkhead, Mr. A.B. McLoud to Miss Dora Terrell...." "On the night of Dec. 22, 1880, at the residence of the bride's father, Mr. F.M. McGlothlin, by W.P. Jones, Esqr., Mr. Henry Twillager to Miss M.M. McGlothlin, all of Young county...." "At the residence of the bride's mother, on Conner Creek, Dec. 30, 1880, Mr. Ben F. Gibbs to Miss Lallie Harris, all of Young county. Rev. Wm. Goode officiating."

21 Jan 1881. "---Are our correspondents all dead or are they sleeping? Wake up, Brushy, Belknap, Clear Fork, Tonk Valley, Goose Neck, Briar Bend, etc...."

28 Jan 1881. "---Quite a number of persons from Seymour, Baylor county were attending court this week, among whom were Messrs. J.R. McLain, E. Rieman, J.T. Ingram, John Propps, Chesley Tackitt and D.H. Jones." "---The following is a list of Grand Jurors empannelled (sic) at the present term of the district court: G.A. Graham, foreman; Wm. Donnell, Ward Rice, W.H. Lemmons, M.A. Fuller, Robt. Alcorn, D.C. Brooks, W. King, B. McCarty, E.S. Cusenberry, W.J. Hughes, F.J. Agnew." "The LEADER is called upon this week to chronicle the death of Arthur C. Girand, which took place on last Tuesday night at his father's residence in this city...."

(This issue had the name "Dan'l. Messenger" 4 Feb 1881. scribbled across the top of the front page.) DISTRICT COURT PROCEEDINGS: "Sarah P. Maupin vs. J.G. Maupin, divorce granted." "On last Friday night everybody was in a hurry and bustle preparing for the War Dance by the Tonkawa Indians, in our park. About dark the trees were hung with lanterns, and numerous fires burned bright lighting up the scene beautifully. When the music began, (which was made by several of the Tonks, with tin pans) the quaintly dressed figures commenced moving around the fire in a fashion which was entirely new to some and quite amusing to all. After some time "captives" were called for, and Messrs. Randolph and Clay Glasgow offered themselves as such. Pete was first, and kept his position on the ground, making a very good "dead man," till the scalping knife was raised above his head--this was too much and up he jumped and ran like a deer, much to the amusement of the Tonks. Clay acted "dead man" to perfection, was danced over and scalped in the approved style. As to the number present, be it sufficient to say everybody, everybody's baby and mother-in-law were in attendance." "Mr. George W. Terrell was in town this week and is the happiest man in the county. The darling little dimple (much to the sorrow of George) can't say papa yet...."

11 Feb 1881. "---Charley Auberg is so nervous that he can't thread a harness needle. It is a girl and weighs nine pounds."

18 1881. MARRIED: "On the 15th inst., at the residence of the bride's father, Miss Belle M. Blakely, of Flat Top, Young

- county, Texas, to Dr. J.W. Gallaher of Johnson county, Missouri, by Rev. W.H. Farmer..." "Feb. 10, 1881, by Rev. W.M. Goode, Mr. Robt. B. Hendricks, to Miss Mettie Gardner, all of Young county." "Near Graham, by Rev. W.M. Goode, Mr. Sylvester McDonnell and Mrs. S.A. Wilkerson, Feb. 6, 1881, all of Young county." COMMISSIONERS' COURT PROCEEDINGS: "E.W. Chism allowed \$10 for support of pauper, Ed. Smith." "Mrs. Kate Mercer allowed \$30 for three months board of pauper, Mrs. M. J. Hayes." "J.W. Glasgow allowed \$25 to send Mrs. Blain, pauper, to her friends in St. Louis."
- 25 Feb 1881. "---Mr. Ed. Smith, an old resident of our county, died at his home near South Bend on the 15th inst. Mr. Smith leaves a wife and six children, the eldest being only nine years old..." "---It is with much sadness that we chronicle the death of Mrs. E.B. Green, which took place last Tuesday night about 12 o'clock. Her remains were taken to Belknap for burial."
- 11 Mar 1881. "---The remains of Arthur Crozier Girand, who died and was buried here some weeks ago, were taken up and sent to Austin on Sunday last, to be placed beside other relatives of the family in that cemetery." MURRAY ITEMS: "Mr. John Walsh and Miss Tackitt were married a short time since." STATE ITEMS: "Dick Fields, colored, fell dead of heart disease." "Mrs John Sadler, near Stephenville, fell in the fire in an epileptic fit and was fatally burned." "G. Raimez, the overseer on McDonald's ranch near San Antonio, was brutally murdered by some unknown person last week."
- 25 Mar 1881. COMMISSIONERS' COURT: "Mrs. R.C. Boyd allowed \$25 for keeping pauper, child of Mrs. Wilson, lunatic; to be paid out of pauper fund."
- 1 Apr 1881. OBITUARY: Minnie Belle Letchworth, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A.A. Letchworth, was born May 17, 1875, and died March 28, 1881, aged 5 years, 10 months, and 11 days...."
- 15 Apr 1881. "---A little daughter has made her appearance at the residence of Sheriff Melton, and the happy father is almost beside himself with joy...." "Mr. James Wadley is now unusally happy and wears a grin extending behind his ears, apropos to the appearance of two wee daughters at his residence on Monday night...."
- 22 Apr 1881. "---The infant child of Mr. Geo. McCormas, on Salt Creek, died last Monday." "---We learn that an old gentleman named Kelly living a few miles west of town, died Wednesday."
- 29 Apr 1881. "---Mrs. Hogue, living on Dillingham prairie, died on Wednesday evening, of measles followed by pneumonia." "---We regret to chronicle the death of Miss Laura Looney, which occurred at the residence of her father, Mr. A. Looney, near Farmer, on Wednesday night, 20th inst." "---Mr. Geo. Close, a former citizen of this place, died of inflammatory rheumatism at Baird, Callahan county, on last Monday...."

#### FIRST ANNIVERSARY OF SAN JACINTO

The first anniversary of the battle of San Jacinto is recorded as being a gala affair. Citizens gathered at noon at Roberts'Hotel, adjourned to a new building owned by a Mr. Gray where the Declaration of Independence was read. The assembly sat down to an elegant dinner followed that evening by a magnificant ball.

The following toasts were given:

"Col. W. B. Travis - he lives in the memories of his countrymen. He taught a tyrant how free men will live and how free men can die."

"Uncle Sam's big corn field and his son Sam's cotton patch - may they soon be united in one great plantation."

"The lamented Milam - one of the first to fall in the cause of Texas struggle for liberty. His memory is embalmed in the heart of every Texian - a monument more lasting than marble."

"Sam Houston - the man who is contented to be called Sam and who has proved a Sam'son to the enemies of Texas."

"Texas - the house of the brave, the asylum of the oppressed."

"Texas on the 2nd of March 1836 and Texas now."

- 3. Mail your cards and envelope to the Fort Worth Genealogical Society, Box 9767, Fort Worth, Texas 76107.

When your cards are received, the files are checked for cards with the same name, living in the same general area about the same time. If this information indicates two lines may be connected, both researchers will be notified. In that case, we will need another SASE from you to keep in case we find another connection.

#### TEXAS AND HER LAND

## By Weldon Hudson

Ed. Note: Mr. Hudson was the first speaker for the Society's Sesquicentennial Year.

Researchers in Texas will benefit greatly from a working knowledge of the land grants of Texas. Early records will refer to a league and a labor. A "league" was 4428.4 acres (or 5,000 square varas; a labor was 177.2 acres (1,000 square varas.) A vara was equal to 33½ inches. Texas did not adopt the rectangular system of land measurement as instituted by the United States at the end of the Revolutionary War, but instead used township and range base lines and meridians.

Texas land laws might be considered a combination of Spanish civil and English common law, but the system was basically Spanish. We can consider four time periods:

- 1. Spanish grants: 1758 1821. Granted by the King of Spain, usually for a league and a labor, they were mainly located in the Rio Grande River area.
- 2. Mexican grants: 1821 November 1835. Usually for one league. Several empresarios contracted with the Mexican government to bring in certain numbers of families to live in a designated area. Some names are familiar Haden Edwards, Stephen F. Austin, David G. Burnet, Benjamin Milan, Green DeWitt and Martin DeLeon. Only Austin and DeLeon actually filled their quotes. The Mexican government was agreeable to selling land outright on their terms. Mexican citizenship was required and the Catholic religion must be adopted. Consequently some Americans became Mexican citizens in order to qualify as recipients of the land. By November, 1835, relations with Mexico were badly strained. Subsequent events led to the Declaration of Independence, winning that independence, and the adoption of the Texas Constitition.
- 3. The Republic of Texas: A general land office was established in 1837, using American land laws probably as a convenience. The President of Texas authorized land script to be issued for not less than 55¢ an acre. The grantee was not required to live in Texas and the land could be assigned to another person. Four classes of certificates were issued:
- lst Class for a league and a labor to the head of a family with 1/3 league to a single man. Person must have been in Texas by March 2, 1836 and received no grant from the Mexican government.
- 2nd Class 1,280 acres of land to the head of a family; 640 acres to a single man. Persons must have settled in Texas during the period March 2, 1836 to October 1, 1837, and stay at least three years, plus pay survey costs.
- 3rd Class 640 acres to head of family; 320 acres to single man. Persons must have settled in Texas during period from October 1, 1837 to January 1, 1840; remain at least three years and pay costs.

4th Class - 640 acres to head of household; and 320 acres to a single man.

Must have settled in Texas during period October 1, 1837 to

January 1, 1840. At least ten acres of land to be under cultivation. Other requirements the same.

Bounty land grants were given for service in the War for Independence. A man received 1,280 acres for one year's service and 320 acres for three months service. From 1835 through 1888 almost 7500 grants were issued for a total of 5-1/3 million acres of land. Special grants were provided widows and heirs of those who died at Goliad and at the Alamo. In July 1876, approval was given for a \$150 annual pension to suvviving indigent veterans and signers of the Declaration of Independence. When money was no longer available, land was substituted for a total of 1,300,000 acres. Again, it is important to remember that all grants of any kind were not necessarily used immediately and most of the certificates were transferable.

When Texas was annexed to the United States in 1845 she kept her land system. The first Homestead (pre-emption) Act was passed by the Legislature the same year. It allowed a settler to live of 320 acres of vacant land for three years, improve it, and obtain title - payment of 50¢ per acre. In 1853 a true Homestead Act was passed which allowed 160 acres and a three year time of occupancy. This Act was repealed in 1856, resumed in 1866, and continued until about 1898 when the Texas Supreme Court declared the public lands to be exhausted. All of these later grants were free with the exception of survey costs and some paper work.

By 1881 a 1,280 acre confederate script certificate was approved for all disabled surviving Civil War veterans or widows whose husbands were killed in action. An applicant appeared before his or her county judge to establish eligibility and the certificate was issued by the commissioner of the General Land Office. By that time the public domain existed only in far west Texas. Land was cheap but many times a person was forced to have half the land in order to get it surveyed. A good reference for this period is Thomas Lloyd Miller's "Texas Confederate Scrip Grantees, CSA."

Over the years many other laws were passed pertaining to Texas and her land. No one article or book can fully cover the subject adequately. The best single source of information is another book by the same author, "The Public Lands of Texas, 1519 - 1970."

Most of the land records as discussed are on file in the General Land Office in Austin. Their address: Room 811, 1700 N. Congress Avenue, Austin 78701. County survey maps may be obtained from the Land Office for \$12 each plus \$1 mailing charge. These surveys show the name of the original grantee and are designated bounty, pre-emption, donation, script, etc. Sometimes numbers will also indicate headrights.

Texas was generous with her land because she wanted to encourage colonization as rapidly as possible. Money was also needed to pay taxes. Things haven't changed too much today in the latter respect!

#### TEXAS AND PATRIOTISM

Editor's Note: Marty Minton was guest speaker for the Society's June meeting.

As a goal during this Sesquicentennial year, carve another notch in your ancestral tree. "Native" Texans are particularly interested in a very special organization — the San Jacinto Descendants. If you're not a member, see if you can document your roots between the cactus and the sagebrush, circa 1836, and prove your eligibility.

Founded in Fort Worth, Texas, by the Reverend Albert Clinton Walling, the San Jacinto Descendants was organized on March 2, 1965. Its objective: "To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the heroes who fought at the battle of San Jacinto under General Sam Houston on April 21, 1836, or were on the baggage train at Harrisburg handing out supplies and tending the wounded."

Should your ancestor have taken up residence in Texas during the ten years following independence, another prize organization might be added - The Sons of the Republic of Texas - committed to encourage, foster, promote, observe, commemorate and perpetuate anything relating to those gallant souls who achieved and maintained independence for Texas and chartered its course from Republic to State. General Sam Houston's sword is used to honor an active or honorary member for outstanding service, sacrifice or contribution for, to, and/or on behalf of Texas.

Equally important is the sister organization — The Daughters of the Republic of Texas — which allows the recognition and participation of the female descendants of that memorable period of Texas history.

The underlying purpose of these three "Texas Connections" is to encourage a sense of appreciation for the labors, motives and contributions made by the men and women who fought and worked to fulfill a dream in what was to become the Lone Star State.

Having struggled through reruns of "Gone With The Wind," "Shenandoah,"
"The Blue and the Grey" and "North and South" (Parts I and II) I have come
to realize the importance of producing a Confederate veteran. This can be
especially frustrating if your spouse just happens to have one (or more)
while yours is still illusive since an overwhelming number of Union forces
happened to live in your home state! Even worse is the fact that the state
in question happens to be north of the Mason-Dixon line! Three organizations
come to mind for this time period: Sons of the Confederate Veterans, United
Daughters of the Confederacy and the Military Order of Stars and Bars. The
latter requires proof of lineal or collateral descent from a commissioned
officer or an elected/appointed official of the Confederate government. Of
course, in my own case, if the grey uniform is not to be found, there does
remain the Sons and Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War!

The Statue of Liberty celebration in July coupled with the upcoming Bicentennial of the Constitution in 1897 causes one to want to march to the drummer of a

Revolutionary period. Two societies stand head and shoulder above all others if only by number of members — the Daughters of the American Revolution and their male counterpart — the Sons of the American Revolution. Others more restricted by limited numbers involved, one location or one incident, etc., include the Descendants of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence, Society of the Descendants of Washington at Valley Forge and the Society of the Cincinnati.

The latter is particularly interesting not only because it includes those descended from the officers of the Continental Army but also representation is restricted to only one living descendant for each officer. So unless you can wait until someone resigns or dies, perhaps you had better look elsewhere. There is, however, no greater pride for an American than membership in the Society of the Cincinnati. The Diamond Eagle ring given to General George Washington by the French Navy is worn by every President General (the national head) on formal occasions as his badge of office. It is interesting to note the provision of consideration for an officer of the Continental Army: Served to the end of the war (October 19, 1781); resigned with honor after three years service; rendered supernumerary service; killed in battle or died in service.

Colonial organizations prior to the Revolution number, among others, are Founders and Patriots, Colonial Dames of the Seventeenth Century, and the Society of Mayflower Descendants. One that stands out primarily because it represents the oldest military organization in the New World is the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts organized on March 13, 1638. It was established along the lines of its London namesake to encourage the advancement of military art and exercise of arms and training of officers in tactics and drill. Its membership is most difficult to prove as documents containing the members are not easy to come by.

Call it patriotism, love of country, or whatever you like - tangible proof of lineage to any period in the history of the United States of America causes one's heart to swell with pride knowing that you have had a part, through such lineage, in the history of our country.

The word "patriotism" has a special meaning to all Texans this year -both native and adopted. I am proud to be a Texan and proud to have a part in this celebration of one hundred and fifty years of independence.



#### TEXAS, FORT WORTH AND AN ENGLISHMAN

In 1925, Governor Pat M. Neff made a dramatic and impassioned speech to the Texas Legislature concerning the need for a state song. "... Texas is a great state. Our history is inspirational — it reads like an epic. Our vast empire is filled with blood bought spots and sacred shrines ... we should have a state song. Too long has this matter been delayed. It is universally known that the loyalty, fidelity and patriotism of a people find the highest expression in song. Just as the people of other nations such as England and France are inspired by their own anthem, so do the liberty loving citizens of the United States thrill to the music of "The Star Spangled Banner . . . "

The Governor then proposed a contest to determine the winner of the best TEXAS ANTHEM that would "properly symbolize our matchless history and the state's growth and glory." A group of interested friends collected prize money of \$1,000.00.

Of the 286 songs and poems submitted, all but six were eliminated. First place went to "Texas, Our Texas" by William J. Marsh and Mrs. Gladys Yoakum Wright of Fort Worth. However, rather than award the prize outright, the Legislature decided to "give the public a chance "to get to know the songs and sing them" before a winner was actually chosen.

Time passed. Administrations changed. The next two governors were not interested in a cause initiated by their predecessor.

Four years later Senator Margie Neal of Carthage was appointed to head a committee to choose a state song. Plans were again made for a state wide contest with the final competition to be held during the State Fair of Texas. In order to be completely fair, it was decided to include the original six songs in this second competition. Judges deliberated for three days before choosing "Texas, Our Texas" from over 1,000 songs.

In May, 1929, both House and Senate unanimously passed a Resolution adopting "Texas, Our Texas" as the official song. The following year a victory celebration was held during a joint session of the Legislature at which time the winners were presented. Mrs. Pearl Calhoun Davis, of Fort Worth, sang the song and Governor Neff was the main speaker.

During the next several years not too much was done to acquaint the general public with the song. It was printed in school textbooks and almost every child then attending elementary school learned to sing it, but it was still relatively unknown to most Texans.

In 1953, Mrs. Charles Stephens, then president of the Fort Worth Music Study Club, initiated a state wide campaign to publicize the song. The Mayor of Fort Worth wrote to other Texas mayors. The President of Texas Christian University contacted college presidents asking that the song be used on all official occasions.

A resolution was adopted by the Legislature in 1954 concerning use of the song: "At the inauguration of governors of Texas; at openings of sessions of the Legislature; at all official appearances of the governor; on all

occasions when Texas is to be officially recognized; on all holidays commemorating events of historical significance (such as March 2 and April 21) and on other appropriate occasions."

And what does this have to do with an Englishman?

William John Marsh, composer of "Texas, Our Texas," was born near Liverpool, England. He came to Fort Worth in the early 1900s, and on New Year's Day, 1920, became Choirmaster-organist of St. Patrick's Cathedral - a position he held for nearly fifty years, as well as a number of others. Known to his friends as "Bill" and to a host of Texas Christian University students as "Uncle Billy," he was also recognized nation wide for his musical compositions. His works included cantatas, over 20 masses, dozens of anthems, and even an opera. He was chosen to write the Centennial Mass which was performed by a choir of 3,000 in Dallas in 1936. Long-time chairman of the Texas Composer's Guild and a member of the music faculty of T.C.U. and Our Lady of Victory Academy, his name appeared for many years in "Who's Who in America" and "Who's Who in the Southwestern International Music Association." The 1950 T.C.U. annual was dedicated "To the popular all-time favorite of students and alumni alike . . . " He was honored as Fort Worth's "Senior Citizen of the Year" in 1959. Although forced to retire because of ill health, he continued his musical work until his death at the age of 90.

This, then, is the "English connection." William John Marsh's long life spanned two continents and the music he gave Texas spanned three religions. But most important this Sesquicentennial Year, he created our state song, "Texas, Our Texas." These are the words which won first place in two contests.

Texas, our Texas! all hail the mighty State!
Texas, our Texas!
So wonderful so great!
Boldest and grandest, Withstanding ev'ry test
O Empire wide and glorious. You stand supremely blest.

Texas, O Texas! Your freeborn Single Star Sends out its radiance To nations near and far. Emblem of Freedom! It sets our hearts aglow With thoughts of San Jacinto And glorious Alamo.

Texas, dear Texas! From tyrant grip now free, Shines forth in Splendor Your Star of Destiny! Mother of Heroes! We come your children true Proclaiming our allegiance Our Faith Our Love for you.

God bless you Texas! And keep you brave and strong

#### TEXAS AND HER GENERAL

After Texas declared independence on March 2, 1836, her armies, for the next several months, continued to meet with disaster and defeat. Ultimately, the responsibility for saving Texas from destruction by the invading army (not to mention threat of Indian attack) rested upon the shoulders of General Sam Houston. Three things need to be remembered. First, the Texas forces were always outnumbered by the Mexicans. After the massacre of Fannin and his men, the only army in Texas was the one commanded by Houston. Made up of volunteers who came and went as they pleased, untrained and poorly equipped, it is difficult to think of it as a real army. Second, the Texas government, newly formed, did not have enough time to get help in either men or money. And perhaps the most important factor was that Houston was left to see that women and children were moved to safety in front of the advancing enemy, no small task in addition to controlling, equipping and feeding his men.

Taking all this into consideration, it is no surprise that Houston's actions were cautious and controlled. He did not plan to be forced into battle until he was ready. However, once a decision was reached, action was swift. April 19th, he had moved to Buffalo Bayou. He then knew that General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, in command of the Mexican army, was moving ahead of him down the Bayou. His men were eager to attack, seeing a golden opportunity to capture the person responsible for the massacre of their friends and fellow Texans. Still cautious, Houston did not give the order to attack until the afternoon of April 21st. With all units in proper place, Houston, riding his white stallion, Saracen, beside the flag of the Republic, raised his sword. As the famous "Twin Sisters" began fire, Colonel Sidney Sherman ordered his regiment to move and they took the first burst of fire from the thoroughly surprised enemy force. Sherman has been credited by some as the originator of the cry, "Remember the Alamo - Remember Goliad!" Regardless of its beginning, it was taken up on every side by the lines of men as they moved steadily forward across the plain. And in this action, the Texan army was truly united at last. Many Mexicans, seeing escape impossible, shouted back, "Me no Alamo!" "Me no Goliad!" There was no time to check service records and no quarter was given. And above the yells and the noise of the battle could be heard the strains of "Will You Come To the Bower I Have Shaded For You?"

From Houston's report to President Burnet: "...the conflict lasted about 18 minutes...until we were in possession of the enemy's encampment...pursuit of the main army continued until twilight...in the battle our loss was two killed and 23 wounded, six of them mortally. The enemy's loss was 630 killed.... 208 wounded." The Texans also took 720 prisoners, among them the self-styled "Napoleon of the West" - General Santa Anna.

The Battle of San Jacinto ranks as one of the most important in the world. The freedom attained by Texas resulted in the acquisition by the United States of the present states of Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Nevada, California, Utah and parts of Colorado, Wyoming, Kansas and Oklahoma — nearly a million square miles of territory and almost one third of the present area of this country.

The original of the following letter is in the possession of the Editor. Written some ten years after San Jacinto, it reflects the concern of a husband and father as written to Sam Houston's friend, Joseph Ellis.

#### BEGINNER'S CORNER

Editor's Note: This is a new feature. Your comments and suggestions are welcome. Our first article offers suggestions for reading and copying census records.

In genealogy we begin with the present and work backward, generation by generation, linking each together with proofs and documentation. For those beginning research, the 1850 census schedules (as well as later ones) are usually most helpful. Each time you find your family on a census record, you have additional facts — not to be taken at face value — but to be checked and verified with your other documentation.

Sometimes you may feel as if you've encountered a foreign language when faced with some handwriting in census records. For the most part census enumerators were not their best with cursive writing which makes reading (and reading correctly) at times very frustrating.

It will be helpful to scan an entire census before beginning to copy any information. That will give you an opportunity to become familiar with the enumerator's handwriting. When you find your family, be sure to copy the information exactly as it appears on the census record. Even though you know that Grandpa's name was "Edwin" and his name is shown as "Edward" on the census, don't correct it. By noting "m" and "f" in the sex category, you won't have to depend on your memory as to just who Willie, Jessie and Frances were — son or daughter. If you see the word "do" used under a surname, it is another form of a ditto mark. Don't second guess on birth places. Indiana, and not Iowa, appears as "IA" on some 1850 and 1860 records. What looks like "Tenn" may turn out to be "Texas" after a closer look — or vice versa. Don't let "Unk" stump you. It only means that the birthplace was "Unknown." If a name, or a part of a name, is not clear to you, make a dash for each letter that is in doubt, i.e., "Mary El----." Or you might try "drawing" the word and ask someone experienced in reading oldstyle handwriting to help you.

Remember the saying, "Birds of a feather flock together." If your ancestor moved from North Carolina to Kentucky, it is very likely that he brought along some of his kinfolks. Therefore, it is important to take particular note of the neighbors. Copy the names of the heads of household and if time will permit, copy the entire household. You may find out that some of them belong in your family. It was not unusual for sons (and daughters) to marry and live next door, or in the same neighborhood, to their parents.

The following are some very good examples of the way many letters were written which can easily be misread.

Mrs. Parker adds these notes about the family:

James Madison Springfield was the son of James L. and Nancy (Styles) Springfield and grandson of Thomas and Laodicea (Langston) Springfield. His grandmother, "Dicey" was a heroine of the Revolutionary War. Descendants are eligible for membership in DAR/SAR.

James M. Springfield was born in Traveler's Rest, South Carolina and came to Texas sometime between March 2, 1836 and October 1, 1837. He received a 2nd class headright of 640 acres which is now located in a position cut by the county lines of Leon and Freestone counties. Although he always listed his occupation as a farmer, family tradition says that he owned a store or trading post in the Kosse-Eutaw area. He is buried in the Eutaw Cemetery, his tombstone indicating that he was a Mason. He died November 14, 1870 (the Mortality Schedule gives cause of death as typhoid fever.)

James Springfield first married Susan F. Gentry October 18, 1848. They had two daughters, Nancy Emaline (Mrs. Parker's ancestor) and Sarah Jane. Susan Gentry Springfield died when only 19 years old and her daughter, Sarah Jane, died less than a year later.

James Springfield married Crecidus McKinley in 1855 and they had 7 children. It is not known just how many children lived to adulthood. The Bible record refers to a "Eula Reese Springfield, a daughter, who died in 1894.

After her husband's death, his widow, Crecidus, married J. P. Brown. The hand-writing in the Bible changed. Mr. Brown's birth date was added along with dates of his three marriages and the death dates of his first two wives. Mrs. Parker thinks that all of the Brown information was added at one time. The only marriage date for any of the children is that of Nancy Emaline Springfield to John L. Perry. This was fortunate since it seems to have taken place in Falls County, Texas, where the records have been destroyed by fire.

Ed. Note: Mrs. Parker first received a copy of this Bible record from a Dallas fellow researcher. Another copy came later from a cousin, Tom Perry, Jr., of Tyler, Texas. In 1984 Mr. Perry visited Mrs. B. G. (Lula) Harlan (owner of the Bible) in San Antonio, Texas and carefully compared the copy with the Bible.

Ellis County was organized on December 20, 1849. Prior to that time it was a part of Milam County (1836,) Robertson County (1837) and Navarro County (1846.) It was named for Richard E. Ellis who presided at the signing of the Declaration of Independence on March 2, 1836. The early court orders pertain to the organization and settlement of the county and record many names of the first settlers.

### DENTON COUNTY, TEXAS TAX ROLLS

#### 1846 - 1848

Transcribed from microfilm, Archives Division, Texas State Library, Austin, Texas

### By Nancy Timmons Samuels

Denton County was created in 1846 from Fannin County. It, Cooke and Tarrant Counties were the most northwestern Texas counties to have an 1850 census.

Of the northwestern counties (prior to 1850) Denton and Dallas Counties were created by 1846, thus some records pertaining to people in their neighboring counties can be found in these counties. A few of the people who appear on the earliest tax rolls of Denton County will also be found on Dallas County tax rolls. Likewise, a few of the Denton County people will be found on the earliest tax rolls of Tarrant County (early 1850s.)

The tax rolls of Denton County, herein, do not give the land owned. At this early time, few of the Peters Colonists had obtained rights or titles to their lands. Generally, it was around 1852 that most of the colonists' titles were cleared.

(Continued from Vol. 29, No. 3)

- 6 May 1881. "a ten-pound masculine infant made his appearance at the residence of Mr. T. E. Chedister on Monday night." "The Leader regrets to note the death of Lester, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. I. N. Johnson, which occurred on Monday last." "... Mrs. Lydia Craig died last Thursday of measles. She was one of the pioneer citizens of Graham having lived here since the commencement of the town. She leaves one child a daughter who will have to be cared for by the county." TRIBUTE OF RESPECT: "... the death of Sister Laura A. Looney ... was born in Illinois, August 17th, 1865, and died April 20th, 1881, at the home of her parents in Young county ..."
- 13 May 1881. "--Infant child of Mr. Golden living two miles east of Graham, died on last Monday night . . . " "---The daughter of Mr. Lamar was bitten by a rattle snake last Sunday about 3 p.m., and died the next day. The child was about 9 years old . . . . June 10, 1881. "Young County is still receiving immigrants at a very rapid rate, if 'Uncle Bart's' example may be taken as a criterion. Mr. Bartlett and Miss Bellomy of Tonk were married on February 22nd, last, and are already blessed with twins." "Mr. G. H. Parsons and wife, accompanied by J. E. Parsons, J. A. Foster and wife, all of Stephens county were in town last Saturday on their return from Red Station, where Mr. Foster and Miss Jessie T. Echols had been to get married, as her family objected. Martin had been married two years earlier to a Miss Johnson of Denison.) "John B. Tharp was tried for lunacy in the County Court on Wednesday and was declared a lunatic. C. Kirby allowed \$30 out of Pauper Fund for board of pauper, M. H. Hays, for three months." TO THE EX-CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS FROM MISSOURI LIVING IN TEXAS: Comrades--It is desired that a reunion of Ex-Confederate soldiers from Missouri, now living in Texas, be held in Texas.... correspond with D. A. Williams, E. G. Bower, and Jas. E. Barkley at Dallas .... The anniversary of the battle of Oak Hills, August 10th, 1861, is suggested....Please let us hear from you. Col. D. A. Williams, Col. W. R. Gause, Jas. E. Barkley, John T. Williams, R. E. Williams, Capt. J. N. Leeper, Capt. W. H. Lemmons, Jesse Strong, Geo. W. Neeley, J. P. Bowdry, Capt. I. W. Palmer, Lt. J. S. Chapman, H. A. He also learned that the old man McDonald, father of Dee and Nick, two of the boys, lived in Coleman county, six miles from Coleman City.... The prisoners were taken to Coleman City, from whence Mr. Melton telegraphed to this place for men....The prisoners, Pete, Nick and Dee McDonald are all young men...."

Brians, who married Miss Luvenia Baldwin, in this county about a year ago left his wife about three months ago, in Grayson county, for the purpose of looking out for a location, since which time nothing has been heard of him. His wife is now in this county and is anxious to hear of his whereabouts fearing some misfortune has befallen him. Texas papers please copy."
- 28 Oct 1881. Waxahachie, October 22. "N. J. Nash, county attorney, died last night about 12 o'clock and was buried this evening by the Odd Fellows, Knights of Honor, and Knights of Pythias . . . ."
- 4 Nov 1881. "Mr. A. B. Oldham, of Anderson county, died at the residence of his son south of town, on Wednesday night, 28 ult., and was buried in Graham with Masonic honors on Friday morning following." (A complete story of the life and hanging of Jack Post given in this issue.)
- 11 Nov 1881. "Miss Sophronia Jones, well known in Graham, was married to Mr. J. Q. Cablir, at Fort Worth, the other day."
- 25 Nov. 1881. "Mr. J. E. Wamble, a former resident of Graham, was married to Miss Carrie L. Smith, at Fort Worth, the other day." Belknap Column: "Bud Knight is the happy father of a daughter. He was sorely disappointed as to the sex of the newcomer."

- 20 Jan 1882. "The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Drechsel died on Tuesday aged three days." "We are indebted to Mr. J. L. James....for the news of the killing of Lester Upham by Pat Wolffarth at Jacksboro on Tuesday afternoon..." "Charles Morris, who was county attorney of Collin county...has left McKinney for parts unknown....This morning Sheriff Jones received a telegram from his bondsman telling him to watch for him. He leaves a wife and two children who have gone back to her father's house."
- 27 Jan 1882. "District Court convened on Monday last Judge B. F. Williams on the bench and J. F. Brim, District Attorney. The grand jury consisting of the following named gentlemen: G. B. Jewell, foreman; T. H. Conner, Robt. Alcorn, B. B. Garrett, L. McJilton, Oak Gohlson, O. G. Denson, W. H. Boyle, Geo. Farmer, Ed. Ribble, Alex Timmons and J. M. Rice." "We are pained to announce the death of J. Will Loving which occurred at the residence of his uncle, Geo. B. Loving, in Fort Worth on Monday morning. The remains were interred at Weatherford on Tuesday evening."

Smith in Rutherford County, Tennessee (lic.) 26 January 1836, lived in present Lonoke County, Arkansas, in 1850, and were in Cooke County, Texas by 1860, living next to the Nathan Beer family. # MOSS, BROOKE, ABBOTT, BOGER, HILL

Would like to know names of the children of Felix and Edna/Eddy Moss, both born ca 1800, South Carolina. Married ca 1822 and lived in Cherokee County, Georgia, by 1833. There were at least ten children. Some of the older ones may have remained in Georgia, but the family moved to Texas ca 1850-53, lived in Williamson County. Felix either remained in or returned to Georgia to attend to business, then started to Texas to join his family "in late fall of 1853." He died in Cass County, Texas. Did his widow "Eddy" remain in Texas or return to Georgia?

Several of their children remained in Texas: Elizabeth G., born ca 1826 South Carolina, died 1861, Lampasas County, Texas; married (1) John Franklin Brooke; married (2) Alexander Abbott. Seek information on her Abbott descendants. Frances Theresa, born ca 1829, South Carolina, died Clay County, Texas, is said to have been buried at Big Sandy or Charlie, near Henrietta; married 1846 Daniel Cicero Boger. Martha, born ca 1830 South Carolina, died probably Bosque County, Texas; married 1846 Harrison D. Hill, lived in Bosque County 1860, and in their household were the two Brooke orphans of her sister Elizabeth G.

According to censuses, Felix and Eddy Moss had at least two other sons, William "Billy," who died as a young man, and Andrew F. Pickens, born ca 1835 Georgia. There were two daughters, born 1830-35, and two other daughters born 1835-40, who were perhaps Malinda and Caroline. The oldest sons are believed to have been W. R. D. (Warren Rayford David), born ca 1826 and Jeptha, born ca 1822. W. R. D. remained in Georgia, at least until after 1870. Where did Jeptha live? Information on any of these families would be appreciated.

### BAKER, BULL, JONES, SWISHER

Seeking information on Jasper C. Baker, born in 1826, Tennessee, and his descendants. He came to Peters Colony from Missouri in 1844 with his parents, Larkin and Rosannah Baker.
