

STEPHEN F. AUSTIN'S MASONIC EXPERIENCES IN MISSOURI

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NOTE: The term "Austin Papers" will be used in this article when referring to the American Historical Association Annual Report for 1919 and 1922. Research on all lodge formations in the Territories of Louisiana and Missouri was found to be necessary in proving or disproving assumptions that have been made about Austin.

In 1982, while searching the Masonic records in Kentucky, I found two names listed in a lodge in Missouri that I thought should be researched in the future. In 1988 I was in Texas and able to check the names with records found there.

Records for the Grand Lodge of Kentucky, August 1816, show that a dispensation was issued to several Masons to form a lodge in the town of Potosi, Washington County, Missouri Territory. Shortly thereafter it was granted a charter as Potosi Lodge No. 39. This charter was returned to the Grand Lodge in 1818, with that year's annual return.¹ No reason was given for surrendering it.

The 1816 annual return listed Stephen F. Austin as a Junior Deacon. There was no return for 1817, but in 1818, he was listed as a Master Mason, as was his brother, James. Also listed in 1818 was Josiah H. Bell. Bell represented the business interests of Austin in Louisiana from 1819 to 1821, and Austin granted him permission to settle in the Austin Colony on October 6, 1821.² Bell's contributions to Texas Masonry are discussed in *Masonry In Texas and Education and Masonry in Texas to 1846*.

Worth S. Ray states that Austin and Bell met in the Arkansas Territory.³ Although Bell is listed as a member of Potosi Lodge along with Stephen and James, Ray seems to have had no knowledge of this Lodge.

There was also an And. Miller in Lodge No. 39 in 1818.¹ An Andrew Miller was on the tax roll of Washington County, Texas, in 1837.⁴ Since this is a common name, there is only a possibility that the references cited pertain to the same man. A check of other Potosi Lodge members with the original 300 families of the Austin Colony show no more similar names.³

A search of the Austin Papers showed no mention of any specific lodge membership, but on May 14, 1817, a letter to Joshua Pilcher states, "...actuated by a since of my duty toward you as a Mason..." indicating that Austin felt strongly toward the ideals of Masonry.⁵

Strangely, the papers include only a few references to the Masonic Lodge in Missouri, and concern another Mason, Joshua Pilcher, (mentioned above) who felt that he had been improperly treated by Austin.⁶ Austin was insulted by the tone of his letters and challenged him to a duel. The St. Louis Lodge was able to settle the situation peacefully and Pilcher apologized.⁵ The involvement of the St. Louis lodge occurred because Pilcher was a member.⁷ Dr. Carter seems to have thought that Austin was also a member.⁸ He probably was not. I am not able to prove that Austin was not a member in St. Louis, but I can prove he was a member, and Junior Deacon, in his home county lodge. The Grand Lodge of Missouri has no record of Austin ever being a member there.⁹

The Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania issued a warrant to St. Genevieve, Louisiana Territory, as Louisiana Lodge #109, on 17 July 1807.¹⁰ Stephen F. Austin was initiated into Louisiana Lodge No. 109, at St. Genevieve, Missouri Territory, on May 1, passed and raised June 23, 1815.¹¹ A receipt from the Lodge, dated June 26, 1815, issued to Austin, is in the archives of the Brenham Lodge, Washington County, Texas.¹²

In 1813 Washington County was created from St. Genevieve, with Potosi as its county seat.¹³ In 1815 Austin did not live in St. Genevieve County, but in Washington where he had lead mines.⁵ The nearest Masonic Lodge was in St. Genevieve and so he went about 40 miles to join there. He was just in time to be listed in the last return No. 109 sent in to the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania. Apparently they ceased to work shortly thereafter. The last date in the Register was June 23, 1815, the date Austin was made a Master Mason. In 1824, the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania vacated the charter for delinquency.¹⁴ As this was after nine years of no returns, they seem most tolerant.

Carter states that Stephen F. Austin was made a Mason at the Louisiana Lodge No. 109 in St. Genevieve, Louisiana, a lodge chartered by Pennsylvania.⁸ I do not think that Carter researched the geographical development of the area. The Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania did issue the warrant to the Lodge in Louisiana Territory, but this became the Missouri Territory in 1812.¹³ It was not until 1815 that Austin joined this lodge.¹⁰

Dr. Carter further states, "Austin had been made a Mason in Louisiana Lodge No. 109, St. Genevieve, Louisiana, receiving the first three degrees on May 1 and June 23, 1815." When Louisiana Lodge No. 109 ceased to exist about 1815, Austin became a member of St. Louis No. 3 and was a member there at the time of his decision to undertake the planting of a colony in Texas.¹⁵

The Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania issued a warrant No. 111 to St. Louis Lodge but it was vacated for delinquency on April 4, 1814 and the warrant arrested.^{16 17} The trials of settling the concerns of this lodge went on for many years and are discussed by Densmore in *Territorial Masonry*. Since this lodge's charter was vacated, it could not be the St. Louis Lodge mentioned by Barker, Carter and others. That lodge was the Tennessee Lodge No. 12 which was issued a

dispensation on Oct. 3, 1815 by the Grand Lodge of Tennessee.⁷ This was only three months after the last return was sent in by No. 109.

Without knowledge of Potosi Lodge No. 39, I think that Carter was confused by two lodges existing in St. Louis in so short a time. He refers to "No. 111" on p. 171, but on p. 217, calls it "No. 3," giving his reference as "Texas Grand Lodge Magazine VI, Aug. 1935, pp. 14.16." Some years later Peter Norman copied Carter's assumption, but did add that Austin transferred his membership to St. Louis Lodge No. 111.¹⁹

In 1816, after St. Genevieve Lodge No. 109 ceased, the Masons in Potosi evidently decided not to go to the new lodge in St. Genevieve since they applied to the Grand Lodge of Kentucky for a dispensation. It was received and shortly thereafter chartered as Potosi Lodge No. 39.¹ In Kentucky a charter is not issued to lodges Under Dispensation, nor is a number assigned. Other states have different procedures. The Grand Lodge of Missouri has no record of Austin's having been a member there.⁹ It was organized in 1821 after Austin had left two years earlier.

Dr. S. W. Geiser of Southern Methodist University, must have used the Austin Papers in writing his article about Austin and early Masonry in Texas in 1933. He, too, did not know of Austin's membership in Potosi Lodge and felt that after No. 109 ceased to exist, Austin had no connection with Masonry until 1828 when the Masons at San Felipe de Austin tried to apply for a charter to the Grand York Lodge of Mexico.¹¹

The Grand Lodge of Tennessee chartered three lodges in the Missouri Territory which became the foundation lodges of the Grand Lodge of Missouri. A dispensation was issued on Oct. 3, 1815 to Joshua Noevelle, Joshua Pilcher and Thomas Brady to form a lodge at St. Louis. This was chartered Oct. 8, 1816, as St. Louis Lodge No. 12 (after the Potosi Lodge was chartered in August 1816.) On Oct. 5, 1819, a charter was issued to Joachim Lodge at Herculaneum, St. Genevieve County, as Tennessee No. 25, and another to St. Charles Lodge, at St. Charles, St. Charles County, as Tennessee No. 28.^{8 20}

The Grand Lodge of Tennessee issued a charter to Elkton Lodge No. 24, Territory of Missouri.⁸ Their records show that No. 24 was issued to Arkmore Lodge in Giles County, Tennessee in 1819, which is still an active lodge.²¹ The Grand Lodge of Missouri has no record of a charter for a lodge at Elkton, Missouri.²²

The Grand Lodge of Indiana issued a dispensation in 1820 to the Unity Lodge at Jackson, Cape Girardeau County, which was later rechartered by the Grand Lodge of Missouri as Unity Lodge No. 6.²⁰ I have found no other record of a lodge being granted a dispensation or charter within the territory that was to become Missouri. The Grand Lodge of Louisiana was also contacted.

It seems strange that Austin's biographer, Dr. Eugene C. Barker, makes no mention of Austin's Masonic affiliation. Barker included the

extensive correspondence between Austin and Masons in Missouri in 1817 and in Mexico in 1828 in Vols. I and II of the Austin Papers, but omitted any reference to them when he compiled Austin's biographies.²³ Barker did not list the terms, "Masonic Lodge," "Masonry" or "Freemasonry" in the index for Vol. I. Although he knew that Austin was a Mason, he chose to ignore the fact. Austin was elected Master of the lodge at San Felipe de Austin when they applied to the Grand York Lodge of Mexico for a charter in 1828. Since the petition was lost, no charter was ever issued.^{24 25}

Austin went to the Arkansas Territory in 1819 and was a prominent person at Arkansas Post, then the capital. On July 10, 1820, he was appointed a Judge in the First Judicial Circuit by James Miller, Governor of the Territory.²⁵

In 1819, a group of Masons at Arkansas Post applied for a dispensation to the Grand Lodge of Kentucky which was granted as Arkansas Lodge No. 59. A return was submitted in 1820 as Arkansas Lodge, Under Dispensation. In the 1820 list of lodges subordinate to the Grand Lodge of Kentucky, they are listed as Arkansas Lodge No. 59, showing they had been issued a charter. Andrew Scott, Master of Potosi Lodge in 1816 and 1818, was Senior Warden. A comparison of membership lists of both lodges shows no other name on both lists. The charter of No. 59 was returned in 1822 to the Grand Lodge of Kentucky by Robert Crittenden, Secretary. No reason was given for its return.^{26 27}

In doing this research, one thing has puzzled me. Although Austin was an active Mason in Missouri, he is not recorded as having joined the group at Arkansas Post.²⁶

Since Stephen Fuller Austin was such a prominent historical figure it would be nice to be able to claim him as a member of your lodge. I have photocopies of the original records showing his Missouri memberships.

"The only reference even found in our Proceedings about Missouri Lodge No. 12 was that on Tuesday, October 3rd, 1815, the Grand Lodge ordered that a dispensation be issued to Brothers Joshua Noevelle, Joshua Pilcher and Thomas Brady to open a Lodge in the town of St. Louis, in the Missouri Territory by the name of Missouri Lodge No. 12." (Reports were received through 1821, but the Grand Lodge does not have them now. In 1821, Missouri Lodge No. 12 came under the jurisdiction of the new Grand Lodge of Missouri and had no further contact with Tennessee.)

Additional information furnished by Mrs. Grote:

Thomas Jefferson O'Neal was the tenth child of William and Lucinda O'Banion O'Neal, born in Alto, Cherokee County, Texas, on January 17, 1854. It is believed that his mother was the oldest child born to Green Hamilton and Hulda Teer O'Banion in South Carolina about 1816. William O'Neal, whose parentage is not known, was born about 1806 in Georgia. William and Lucinda were married December 26, 1835, in Talledga County, Alabama. Their other children were Caroline (b. ca 1837,) James R. (b. ca 1839; m. Margaret ?,) Mary Ann (b. ca 1841 m. James W. Chandler,) Sarah Ann (b. ca 1843; m. James K. Polk,) William N. (b. ca 1845; m. Jiney A. Polk,) Benjamin (b. ca 1847,) George W. (b. ca 1848; m. Sarah T. Williamson,) John (b. ca 1850; m. Mary Frances Reeves,) Green Hill (b. ca 1853; m. Tennessee ?,) and Robert J. O'Neal (b. ca. 1858.)

Family tradition has said that Thomas Jefferson (along with his siblings) were orphaned between 1860 and 1866. However, records indicate that this is not totally correct. Evidently Lucinda died prior to 1870, necessitating a split-up of her children. William, along with his youngest son, Robert, was (according to the census) in 1870 living in Walker County, Texas, with his daughter, Mary Ann, and her husband, James Chandler. Thomas Jefferson must have gone to Montgomery County, Texas, to live after his mother's death, for it was there he met Susan Arminta Roberts, a daughter of James Monroe and Lucinda Henrietta Thames Roberts.

Thomas Jefferson and Susan Arminta were married in Mexia, Limestone County, Texas, on October 6, 1875, and their first three children were born there: Lucinda Henrietta (1876-1964; m. Peter Ernest Lindsey,) James William (1878-1954; m. Leonora Eleanor Saunders,) and Sarah Emma (1881-1939, m. James Monroe Cunningham.)

In the fall of 1883, the T. J. O'Neal family moved from East Texas to Devine, Medina County, Texas. It is said that they settled in Devine only because their wagon broke down there. The other children were born there: Ruth (born and died fall 1883,) Elsie Beatrice (1885-1972), m. Jason Obed Blackwell,) Mary Anna (1888-1977; m. Philip Young Fullerton,) Susan Arminta (1890-1925, m. Lee Wm. Lonnie Sledge,) Clyde Thomas (1895-?; m. Winnice Miller,) and Nora (1897-1989; m. DeWitt Talmadge McFarland.)

Thomas was a successful farmer and carpenter. Many of the buildings built in Devine at the turn of the century were his work. At that time, he also built many of the windmills that graced the horizon in and around the town and kept them in good repair as well. He was regarded with much respect by the community, as he was honest and upright in his dealings with his fellow man. He was a member of the "old" Baptist church in Devine, which he also helped to build.

It is obvious from antidotes about Thomas Jefferson that he had quite a sense of humor. He wrote several letters to his daughter, Elsie, after she married and moved to another town. Evidently

there had been some sort of mix-up with the postoffice, and a couple of letters were returned, stating that no such town existed. So he wrote AGAIN, advising Elsie and her husband that, "If you do not receive this letter, please let me know."

Another amusing story was told to me by one of his granddaughters, Iva Blackwell. She was about three or four years old when her parents went home to Devine to visit Grandpa and Grandma O'Neal. In his spare time, Thomas enjoyed fishing at a nearby creek, and Iva, knowing this, wanted her Grandpa to taking her fishing on a Sabbath day. Being of the "hardshell" Baptist faith, such frivolities were frowned upon on Sunday. Although Thomas was temp[ted to oblige his young granddaughter, he knew there "would be heck to pay" when Armintha found out. So he said, "No, we can't go fishing today, sweetheart, 'cause if we do, we're liable to catch the devil!" Iva still laughed at this since she really did picture putting the pole in the water and reeling in the Devil himself!

Thomas and Armintha were married for almost fifty years. His death in 1924 was a result of gastric carcinoma. Armintha died three years later. Both are buried in the Evergreen Cemetery in Devine.

HOW DO I START?

By Frances Malcolm

Genealogy is one of the most interesting of all hobbies. It is never finished, it is always new and most of all, it is about your family. It can be as expensive or as inexpensive as you desire, as long as you visit libraries, send for documents by mail, and make use of the Federal Archives. The Archives in this area is located at Felix and Hemphill Streets in Fort Worth.

Genealogy is a science. I have been working on genealogy for 30 years. Some of my families are back to the 1500s and 1600s, one family in the 1400s, and one fellow is lost in Texas. It is work, but believe me, it certainly can keep one's nose out of married children's business.

Geography, religion and history are subjects you learn a lot about. Religion helps us find written records of our ancestors. Geography made a difference in the migration patterns. History gives us an insight into our ancestors' daily lives. There will be some five-month babies, sometimes you won't find a marriage license. There are many reasons for not finding one - but other records can provide proof needed.

The first step to beginning your family history is to fill in your pedigree chart. The following is a guide I compiled to help my Senior Citizens' Class.

A Pedigree or Ancestor chart is the first page you should fill in. To do this, keep the following rules in mind:

- Number 1 - Yourself
- Number 2 - List the name of your father
- Number 3 - List the name of your mother
- Number 4 - List the name of your father's father
- Number 5 - List the name of your father's mother
- Number 6 - List the name of your mother's father
- Number 7 - List the name of your mother's mother

How do you list this information?

- 1) Full name of person - nickname in parentheses
- 2) Full date of birth - day, month, year
- 3) Place of birth - city or town, county, state
- 4) Date of marriage
- 5) Place of marriage
- 6) Full name of spouse (include nickname)

Remember:

- 1) Persons listed as #1 on chart may be male or female.
- 2) Beyond #1 all males are listed on even-numbered lines and all females on odd-numbered lines.
- 3) The number of the wife is always numerically one number higher than her husband.
- 4) Last or surname is usually capitalized or underlined.
- 5) If person has no middle name write NMN in parenthesis, as John (NMN) Jones.
- 6) If person has no middle initial, write NMI in parenthesis.
- 7) If person has initials only for his name, write the initials, then in parenthesis, put "Initials only," i.e., J I (initials only) Jones.
- 8) A woman's maiden name is always used in genealogy. This means the name given her at birth.
- 9) You may use standard abbreviations for months, but always write the name of the year in full - as 1918.
- 10) Places in records are written smallest division first: city, county, state, country.
- 11) Do not abbreviate names of towns or cities. Use only standard abbreviations for states and countries.
- 12) Only direct ancestors are recorded on a pedigree chart.

Since your Pedigree Chart is a skeleton of your family history, you will add to your history by filling in your family sheet.

- 1) List yourself with your spouse and children.
- 2) Record the source for any information recorded on your family sheet. If you have two death dates, check the original source (tombstone, funeral director or Bible record.)
- 3) A family sheet is made for #1 on your pedigree chart, then a group sheet for each family.
- 4) Family sheets are made for your father's family, grandfather's family, etc.
- 5) All children born to a couple are listed on the family sheet, even if stillborn, etc.
- 6) Family sheets can be arranged in alphabetical order by surname, then given name.
- 7) When a person has more than one marriage and there are children, a group sheet is made for each marriage. If there are no children by one marriage, this note is put on the sheet where it says other wives/husbands.
Remember, a woman's maiden name is always used.

Editor's Note: Mrs. Malcolm is well-known for her beginner workshops done under the auspices of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society. She also teaches classes in a local college. This informative article will be continued in the next issue.

LETTER FROM ROBERT ISAAC NICKELL

This letter is one of a large collection, saved by Andrew Jackson Hawkins and his wife, Permelia Nickell, the great grandparents of Olyve Hallmark Abbott. The Hawkins came to Somervell County, Texas, from Rowan County, Kentucky in 1880.

Morehead, Rowan Co, Ky.
Nov 13 - 1893

Dear Sister Permelia and Jack,

It is with pleasure that I write to you these lines, with the hope that you are all well.

My concern is, how is Ella Page? Her mother was fine a woman as ever way, and would have wanted to see her content. Edmund W. Cassity said that Ella married William McRenolds Vanzant. Ed said she wrote to him that Mac was a good man, and I hope it is certain. She was a quiet girl but nonetheless helpful around the house, and was good with Thomas Clark and Anna. I did not see to much of them around here. Clark was turning out to be a good carpenter the same as Edmund. Edmund is working on his pension, and hopes to have his attorney get it finished up without too much delay.

Anna wrote to Ed from California that she took a notion not to go to school anymore so was not - definitely not. He did not take to reading that. She said Uncle James did good with his land. It was a long way to go to find good land, with or without gold, but he sounds prosperous. Uncle and I may never again meet on this earth and for that I am sorry. Newt said he would come in the spring.

Tell Jim and Sally that they did well to go to Texas. Rowan County is trying to pick up the pieces. I must write them myself but dont hear from Jim as often as I do you and Jack. All I heard about Melia Gilkison was that she was planning to find herself a good Texas man and move back to Somervell County and live out the rest of her life there. Is that going all right? She needed a good father for her three boys, as they are good boys and seemed no trouble.

Della is wanting a baby brother. We will see. Belle feels a bit better and we have a girl stay with her. It is not easy finding a trustworthy enough girl to depend on a regular basis, but Belle is not up to her best health. If it is a boy we will name him Johny E. Tell Anna, Liz, Cora, Lu, and my nephews hello for me. Tell them to write. You do the same. Papa is well.

ABSTRACTS FROM *THE GRAHAM LEADER*

(Continued from Volume 32, No. 4)

August 18, 1883

Local. W. R. J. Camp of Hunt County and Miss Dora Hifle of Ky. were married at the Graham Hotel on August 14. Rev. R. S. Burwell officiated.

The infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Moseley died last Monday evening.

Brennan. Washington County spends \$250,000 a year for bacon. By using refrigerating machines pork can be packed at home year round and a pork packery would pay.

August 25, 1883

The new postal law goes into effect October 1. Letters will be two cents for every half ounce for all points in the United States.

Comanche has a new railroad named the Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. It runs from Aransas Pass on the Rio Grande via Brownwood, Cisco and Graham and through Indian Territory to Kansas City, with a branch from Brownwood via Comanche, Stephenville and Granbury into Fort Worth.

Local. U. S. District Judge A. P. McCormick left this morning for Ohio accompanied by his daughters, Sallie and Mollie, who will enter a female college there.

Bonham. Charles Sharpe of Cooke County is in jail for whipping his ten-year-old daughter until blood ran. A whipping post ought to be erected and used frequently for people like him.

September 1, 1883

Lampasas. Ex-governor Pease has died. He was "in the bloom of health" until Tuesday, Aug. 14th, when he was stricken with apoplexy. Funeral services will be conducted in Austin tomorrow evening.

Waco. Rev. J. K. Street, who was suspended at the last quarterly conference of the Methodist Church, South, will formally retire tomorrow evening. "He has long been considered beyond the pale."

September 8, 1883

Sweetwater. W. C. Johnson, county clerk of Nolan County, was accidentally killed. He was taking a buggy ride with another

gentleman when the horses began to run. The driver jumped out to safety, but Mr. Johnson was thrown out and suffered fatal injuries.

Local. George Wright and Mrs. Margaret McCombs were united in marriage last Tuesday by Rev. Zinn.

Major J. G. Vance, formerly of Graham, died at his home in Seymour.

September 15, 1883

Dallas. Mr. Joe Hawkins, known as "Texas Joe," died a few days ago of consumption. He was only 43. He has two brothers, J. W. and J. S. Hawkins of Greenville and was the son-in-law of ex-governor Throckmorton.

September 22, 1883

The Board of Regents at the Texas university has resolved to admit students from any state without tuition charge. Grand, magnanimous, benevolent, charitable Texas!

Coleman. A shooting occurred at Treck around 9:30 last night between saloon keeper A. Pendleton and cattle king Tom Hayes. Hayes is said to be mortally wounded and Pendleton has not been heard from.

Local. G. W. Parker, father of Harry Parker, has submitted an affidavit to the *Leader* in order "to correct falsehoods which have been circulating throughout the community" regarding his son. Dated Sept. 14, 1883, one William Keese testified that he had known Harry Parker from about April 1880 to September 1881; that Parker had been employed as a blacksmith in Las Vegas and was a boarder in his home; that Parker was not married and did not live with any woman and conducted himself as an upright and law-abiding citizen.

Little Delany, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Holman, died Tuesday after a long illness.

Henrietta. News was received by telephone from Post Oak concerning the killing and wounding of three wire cutters last night. The ringleader, named Butler, was shot about 20 times and his body found about a mile from where Mr. Sherwood's fence had been cut. "The city is wild with excitement."

September 29, 1883

Fort Worth. William Farmer, section boss on the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad, shot at Tom O'Connell, the bullets going into a Negro church where 200 people were attending services. Farmer claimed O'Connell had insulted his wife - he is now in jail.

Dallas. A fire last Saturday resulted in an estimated loss of \$350,000. An old compress with 2500 bales of cotton and a large amount of grain burned. Worst fire in city's history.

Local. Professor Y. B. Dowell of Mineola has arrived to open the Graham High School. He will be assisted by Miss M. B. Roane of Mississippi and Miss M. L. Delaney will be in charge of the music department.

October 27, 1883

Greenville. A storm last night 20 miles east of town blew 5 flat cars and a caboose on the East Line freight train off the track. There was also considerable damage to farm houses in the area.

Big Springs. Joseph Anderson, postmaster, county clerk and express agent for over a year, absconded with \$2,000 last Thursday. He is addicted to drink and was last heard of in Mexico.

McKinney. Col. W. M. Fitzhugh, old and respected citizen of Collin County, was killed by a runaway team Oct. 23. He was born in 1818 in Kentucky and had lived in this state for 40 years, serving in the Mexican War. At the time of his death, he was doorkeeper to the state senate.

November 10, 1883

Marshall. Thieves broke into the front door of the Catholic Church and stole several sacred vessels as well as robbed the poor box.

Greenville. Another wire cutting reported near Black Jack in Hopkins County on property belonging to Mr. Jones of Sherman.

November 17, 1883

The case of George Walker, partner of Tom P. Varnell, was called in District Court at Hillsboro, but the judge ruled for a change of venue to McClennan County.

Fort Worth. Mrs. Jessie Allen of St. Louis, has employed a lawyer to attempt to break her father's will. Col. W. R. Ganse left all his property, valued at some \$40,000, to his son, George L. Ganse. The will was made only hours before his death and did not mention his daughter.

Local. Rev. J. A. Nelson, recent graduate of Vanderbilt University, is the new pastor the Methodist Church.

November 24, 1883

State papers please copy: Want to know the whereabouts of Martha Finley, a woman fortune teller, who absconded with my four-year-old daughter, Laura. The child is slim, fair complexion, with blue eyes and white hair. Contact Mrs. Edna Smith, Terrell, Texas.

Local. Judge McCormick and wife have a 12-pound baby girl!

THE BALCH FAMILY

A monument has recently been placed at the grave site of Captain Hezekiah B. Balch, a veteran of the Texas Revolution. Thanks to the encouragement and interest of the Daughters of the Battle of San Jacinto and the W. H. Stevens Lodge #121 of Vicksburg, Mississippi, the brass medallion of the Veterans' of the Texas Revolution and emblem of the Masonic Order appear on the upright marble marker. Captain Balch was buried in the City of Vicksburg Cemetery in the Masonic plot on May 10, 1855. Some twenty-five descendants from various parts of the country attended the dedication. Most of them are descended from Captain Balch's son, Alfred Wiley Balch, and from two of his brothers, Samuel and John Balch. John also fought in the Texas War for Independence. He lived and died in Nacogdoches County, Texas, on land received for his military service.

Rev. Hezekiah Benjamin Balch was born March 1741 in Deer Creek, Harford, Md., and died April 1810 in Greenville, Tennessee. The family moved to North Carolina in 1763. He entered Princeton University when he was only 17, and was licensed to preach by the Presbytry of New Castle in 1769. In 1769, he married Miss Hannah Lewis (ca 1750-1808.) In 1783 they moved to what is now Tennessee and bought land three miles south of present Greenville, Green County. His second wife was Anne Luckey (1763-1835.)

Rev. Balch traveled extensively in the East, raising funds to further the cause of the Presbyterian Church in the new territory. He was a headstrong, strong-minded preacher and was called up many times before the ecclesiastical bodies of the church. Nevertheless, he had the zeal to make a fine name for himself in the organization of many churches. In 1794, Dr. Balch received a charter for the Greenville College which he had organized years before on a section of his plantation. It was the first college which was chartered west of the Allegheny Mountains - a four year accredited institution called Tusculum College. Dr. Balch served as president until his death in 1810. In 1808, he received the Doctor of Divinity from Williams College in Massachusetts. (Note: Tusculum College is Tennessee's oldest college as well as the 28th oldest in the United States. It is located near the Smokey Mountains in upper east Tennessee.)

A. W. Balch's parents died when he was very young. He and his brothers went to live with their half-sister, Mary Ellen Christian and her husband, Sam Edwards, in Vicksburg, Miss. After a skirmish at Edwards' Landing, Sam Edwards took his family to Alabama and from there to Rio de Janerio, Brazil, where he expected to stay for the duration. In a few months, being unable to find work (he was a lawyer) they returned to New York. When it was safe to travel, they went back to Vicksburg, and soon made their way to Texas.

A. W. Balch and a friend, John Glen, headed for Texas on their own where they obtained employment on the Holland Ranch. There he met and fell in love with Mary Elizabeth Roberts. In 1876, the couple left the ranch for Dallas. Their first child was born in a wagon at Valley View and the other children were born in Mansfield, Tarrant County, Texas.

"THE PALO PINTO PROBLEM"

Editor's Note: Mrs. H. H. Rugeley, editor of the Austin Genealogical Society's Quarterly, has kindly given permission to publish the following article which appeared in AGS Quarterly, Vol. XXX, No. 1, March 1989. Research was done by David L. Kent, C.G.R.S. #179 and David A. Baskin, Researcher, TSL.

The federal census of 1870 for Palo Pinto County, Texas, has been destroyed several times by various genealogical guides. The National Archives, *Federal Population Censuses 1840-80* (Washington, D.C., 1955) omitted it. Then the Mary Isham Keith Chapter, DAR, *Miscellaneous Records Pertaining to the Northwest Texas Frontier, circa 1855-1875* (Fort Worth, Texas: 1975) claimed (p. 2) "The 1870 census of Palo Pinto has been lost." Next, a doubtful National Archives Trust Fund Board, *Federal Population Censuses 1790-1890* (Washington, D.C.: 1979, reprinted 1985) queried (p. 55) whether Palo Pinto 1870 schedules exist. Doubt was reinforced by William Thorndale and William Dollarhide, *Map Guide to the Texas Censuses, 1820-1920* (Blaine, Washington: 1985,) who commented (plate 6) "Federal census (of 1870) extant for all counties except Palo Pinto (which) was not enumerated separately and perhaps not at all." The matter was settled when Accelerated Indexing Systems International Inc., *Texas 1870* (Salt Lake City, Utah: 1987) appeared, containing no listings for Palo Pinto County. The accepted opinion was noted in the Texas State Library shelf list for its microfilm census collection: "In spite of some opinion to the contrary, there are apparently no censuses in existence for Clay and Palo Pinto counties in 1870. Shortly before that date, Indian depredations had virtually depopulated these two counties. This explains why there are 1860 censuses for these two counties, but no 1870 census." Question settled.

Enter Assistant Marshal for the United States, L. M. Barkley. His enumeration of the federal census of 1870 for Palo Pinto County in its entirety created the following records: Schedule 1 (Population) is to be found under the heading 'Palo Pinto County' from line 31 of p. 383B through line 26 of p. 384B, of Texas volume 15 of the Ninth Federal Census of Population located in the National Archives. These 75 persons comprise 132 households. The Bureau of Census had crossed through Barkley's headings and penciled in "Parker County" then subsequently erased the correction and restored Barkley's version, as can be verified by comparing the temporary, or "double page" microfilming (T-403) with the later microfilming in 1965 of volume 15 (National Archives microcopy 593, rolls 1600 and 1601.) The second filming shows this note added to p. 1: "Palo Pinto County - p. 384." Barkley also completed Schedule 2 (Mortality), Schedule 3 (Agricultural Productions) and Schedule 4 (Products of Industry,) so far as these applied to Palo Pinto County, incorporating his data with that for Parker County; he completed Schedule 5 (Social Statistics) for

Palo Pinto County separately from Parker County. Schedules 2, 3, 4, and 5 are deposited in the Texas State Library, referenced IX-1870-36,34,38 and 37 respectively. At p. 269 of Schedule 2 appears the following letter (quoted in full):

Frt Worth Tarrant Co Tex

July 20th 1871 Sir

Yours of July 1st 1871 was received by me in Palo Pinto Co., but few persons live in the County and more of them are Cattle or ranch men the County once populous have been driven from their homes by the Indians and reside in adjacent Counties and the deaths if any were reported in the Counties in which they resided at the time of taking the Census. their is but three small Settlements in the County and the County was not organized at the time of taking the Census and was attached to Parker Co for judicial and other purposes.

So let us hope that future guides will take note of Marshal Barkley's work. For those bold enough to look, the 1870 Palo Pinto County census can be found, and should be associated with Palo Pinto's other surprisingly complete records, and especially those of Parker, Young, Jack and Erath counties for this period, so far as genealogical research in this area is concerned. The AISI 1870 Texas census index has badly confused the Palo Pinto County listings, throwing the inhabitants at one and the same time into Parker County and into the vicinity of Woods, located in Panola County, 10 miles from the Louisiana border. Cavet investigator!

This is the fifteenth in the series compiled by Dr. McLean on the papers concerning Robertson's Colony in Texas. Historians will welcome this volume which covers the organization of the Texas Rangers and the activities of the First Senate of the Republic of Texas, both as seen through the eyes of Empresario Sterling C. Robertson, the Gentleman from Milam. Sixteen awards have been won by this series, a complete list of which may be obtained by writing to the UTA address.

In his second book about his home county of Sabine, Texas, the author tells the history of the school when land was purchased for it in 1911, up to 76 years later when the school graduated 67 students in 1989. Rosters of classes and many photographs make this a record to be cherished by anyone interested in that school.

One of our newer members has written this family history which covers the McRees from Ireland to North Carolina, South Carolina, Mississippi, and ultimately to Texas. Brown McRee married Lena

Miller, and they set up housekeeping on land near Bearcreek, Texas, southwest of Benbrook, Tarrant County. Lena's father was William Edward Miller, born 1894 near Baden-Baden, Prussia, and was in Weatherford in 1868. The rest of the story makes interesting reading and is an important contribution to the history of the pioneer families of Texas.

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MARRIAGES DALLAS COUNTY, TEXAS VOL. II, Books F, G, H, 1877-1885, soft cover, 8 1/2 x 11", 121 pp., 1989, indexed, Dallas Genealogical Society, P. O. Box 12648, Dallas TX 75225.

The Dallas Genealogical Society has published another volume of the marriage records of Dallas County from Books F, G and H, covering the years 1877 and part of 1885. The marriages are in chronological order with an index to brides, grooms, and ministers. This is a valuable reference for Dallas County researchers.

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TOM GREEN COUNTY TEXAS MARRIAGES BOOK A THRU J, 1875-1938, soft cover, spiral binding, 8 1/2 x 11", indexed, compiled by Mr. and Mrs. Jim Ames, 702 West 44th, San Angelo, Texas 76903. Presented by Mildred Allen, Paris, Texas.

In this collection of marriages the groom is listed in alphabetical order to the letter only, in chronological order, for each book. At the end of each book the brides' surnames are indexed. A great convenience to Tom Green researchers to have all these records in a single book.

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SPRINGHILL CEMETERY 1853-1989, Lamar County, Texas, soft cover 8 1/2 x 11", 62 pp., illustrated, indexed. Springhill Cemetery Committee, Mildred Allen, Coordinating Chairman, 1989. Presented by Robby England, Fort Worth, Texas.

The Springhill Cemetery is located one mile west of Novice on FM 2648 in Lamar County, Texas. Mildred Allen was the coordinating chairman of the committee that cleaned up the cemetery, wrote the history, and published the book. There is a map of the cemetery, a listing of the graves in alphabetical order, as well as a listing by location. Many photographs add to the attractiveness and interest of the book.

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PINHOOK CEMETERY OF TIPPECANOE COUNTY, INDIANA 1828-1901, An Illustrated Garden of Stones. Soft cover, 32 pp. 8 1/2 x 11", 1989, indexed, illustrated, \$10.00, David R. Cheesman, 1805 Shoshone Dr. #24, Lafayette IN 47905.

Like many early farm cemeteries, Pinhook is isolated in a field. The old access road has been plowed over by a farmer, and persons attempting to enter the area are told that they are trespassing on private property. Descendants of those buried there have tried to interest authorities in restoring the roadway, but no action has been taken. Those buried in the cemetery include

the first pioneer settlers in Jackson Township in 1824, Samuel O. Clark, his first wife Rachel and second wife Mary Miller. Other families are Cheesman, Peterson, Passmore, Bennett. The author has included sketches of some of the stones and maps of the cemetery, which add to the interest of the book. There is also a list of marriages, a list of veterans of wars, some death records, and wills, as well as a list of those without stones who are thought to be buried there.

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WILLIAM ANDREWS OF HARTFORD, CONN., 70 pp., prepared by Frank M. Andrews, Youngstown, Ohio, 1938; POSTMARKED HUDSON, The letters of Sarah A. Andrews to her brother, James A. Andrews, 1864-65, compiled and edited by Willis Harry Miller, Hudson, Wisconsin, August 1955, both books reprints by Higginson Books, Derby Square, Salem MA 01970.

William Andrews, the schoolmaster, was among the colonists led by Rev. Dr. Thomas Hooker in 1636 from Boston into the wilderness to settle at a place they called Hartford. They were two weeks making the journey, arriving about July 14, 1636. This genealogy of William Andrews and some of his descendants was compiled by Frank H. Andrews in 1938, who used early records compiled by Mrs. Lucy A. Shaw and Mrs. Mary A. Meacham.

The second book also concerns the Williams Andrews family and contains a genealogy. Sarah E. Andrews had come to Hudson, Wisconsin, with her parents from Michigan in 1853 at the age of eighteen, and was one of Hudson's first school teachers. The letters she wrote to her brother during the Civil War are about family and village happenings and must have been welcome reading to this young man far from home.

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These books have been placed in the Fort Worth Public Library, and the Society thanks the donors for their generosity.

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RESEARCH TIP: The next time you go to the postoffice, check out the "Plant a Family Tree" campaign, sponsored by AARP, the U. S. Postal Service and the National Genealogical Society. In today's highly mobile society, families often separate and children grow up lacking full knowledge of their background. Free family tree charts are available in postoffices and many AARP offices.

Researching the following Clarks: Eugene, born and died Texas; Stanton S., born Tennessee, died Texas; William, born probably Kentucky, died Tennessee; Jesse B., born probably Kentucky, died Tennessee; Isaac, born Virginia, died Tennessee. Need names of Isaac's parents, brothers and sisters.

2-1-90 BIRDWELL, CLIFFORD, STOCKMAN

Jim McMillen, 1300 Park Lane, Arlington TX 76012

Samuel L.? Birdwell, born about 1850 Illinois or Tennessee, married before 1873. His wife, born in Iowa, was possibly named Clifford; she left the family after the birth of two girls (Mary and ?) and two boys (Edward C. and Joe). The boys, at least, were born in Texas. What is the identity of Samuel Birdwell and ? Clifford?

Christopher Columbus Fredrick (Lum) Stockman, born 1845 in Shelby County, Texas, married in McLennan County, Texas, in 1865, Laura N. Stockman. Laura died in childbirth in 1879, leaving three daughters: Laura 4, Ella Susan 2, and the baby, Jane. Lum was last recorded in 1881 in Hill County. Would like to hear from descendants of Lum, Laura, Ella, or Jane Stockman.

COMMENT: The Birdwell families of Hopkins, Rusk, Lamar, Bowie and Walker Counties, Texas, in 1850, were likely related. Members of the families for the first three listed counties are known to have been in Wise, Tarrant, Young and/or other western counties by 1860 or later. Those of Rusk County were allied with a Clifford family.

One Nasy/Nacey M. Clifford married Eliza J. Birdwell in Rusk County 16 December 1848, lived in Rusk County 1850, was in Tarrant County by 1860, when (on the tax roll) he was agent for "Mrs. Birdwell." He is said to have served CSA; his widow Eliza J. and large family on 1870 census, also 1880 census. They lived in present Crowley area. Three Clifford sons went to Callahan County by ca 1885; one of them was George Clifford who had married in Tarrant County 14 December 1879 Elzora B. Birdwell. In 1870 Elzora was age 11, living in the household of Jasper N. Ogletree and wife Cynthia. Jasper had married Cynthia Birdwell in Rusk County 22 October 1857.

In 1855 one A. Birdwell was on the Tarrant County tax roll. In 1860 R.[Robert] Birdwell was taxed for 160 acres of the A. W. Reynolds survey, as was N. M. Clifford (see Tarrant County Survey Map, Crowley area). Robert Birdwell lived in Tarrant County 1870, next to the Ogletree family and the widow Clifford family. In Rusk County 1850, Robert and Cynthia appear to be children of widow Elizabeth Birdwell, born ca 1798 Tennessee.

Mrs. Lawrence N. Hamilton, 3585 Arbutus Avenue, Palo Alto CA 94303 (in 1971) was interested in the Texas Clifford-Birdwell connections. Also, the late Mrs. F. E. (Eula) Harrison, of Fort Worth, DRT and DAR, was a granddaughter of Benj. F. Birdwell, of the Crowley area, who (with two young daughters) was living in the household of George and Elzora (Birdwell) Clifford in 1880.

3-1-90 WARD, FOSHALL, FORSHALL, FAHLHABER, FORSTER, COLEMAN
Kay Ward Davis, 316 Chuck Wagon Trail, Willow Park TX 76087

Seeking information on the following families who arrived in Tarrant County as noted: William Eugene Ward, born 1869, Arkansas, arrived ca 1888, buried Oakwood Cemetery, Fort Worth; Frederick Ernest "Henry" Foshall/Forshall, born 1838, Germany, arrived ca 1876 and wife Susan Marguerite Berringer Forshall (Fahlhaber, Forster), born 1848, Germany, and both buried Pioneer Rest Cemetery, Fort Worth; Asa Marvin Coleman, Sr., born 1886, arrived ca 1903, buried Greenwood Cemetery, Fort Worth.

COMMENT: In 1880 Henry Foshall, an artesian well borer, wife Susan, and three children, Charlie, Christine and Susan, lived in Ward 3 of Fort Worth in (then) south Fort Worth, north of the railroad. [ED 90, p. 20, #167-176]

Faye Condray Dunham, 301 So. Pickwick, Springfield MO 65802

Need information on the following: J. Condra, living Tarrant County, Texas 1870-80; Stephen Condray married Mary Cearmal 15 September 1848 Anderson County, Texas; John L. and Lurring Condra, living Dallas County, 1850; M. L. Condrety married 4 August 1885 Gonzales County, Texas, R. E. Polly. Researching this name nationwide. Will exchange.

Neill McNeill, born 1793 North Carolina, married (1) Sarah McIver, (2) in Texas, Delilah Fry, lived San Augustine Co., Texas

1853. Daughter Jane married Anthony Webb; daughter Nancy married David Webb.

Chumley family, all born Claiborne County, Tennessee: Alexander, born 1838, died 1895, Hunt County, Texas, married 1859 Kentucky Serilda Rainwater. James Franklin, born 1856, died 1916 Plano, Texas, married 1880 Tennessee, Sarah B. Cline. Henry Houston, born 1873, died 1953, Plano, Texas, married 1893 Rhoda Kathleen Hopper; Daniel G., born 1876, married 1899 Polly Anna Cheek, lived Denison, Texas. Will exchange.

COMMENT: We find no persons of the surname Condra or Condray on the 1870 or 1880 census of Tarrant County.

6-1-90 WHEELER, LATHAM, HORVATH

Dorothy Wheeler Horvath, 116 Lirette St., Houma LA 70360

Need information on parents of Samuel Nathan Wheeler, born 10 October 1880, Weatherford, Texas, married Ollie Maybelle Latham, 8 November 1899, Williams County, Texas, died 4 December 1946, Lawton, Comanche County, Oklahoma. Brothers: Alford, Claude; sisters: Martha, Maggie and Jennie; children: Virgie, Jack, Martha and Florence.

COMMENT: In Parker County 1880 (ED 139, p 7, #57-58) was widow Elcy Wheeler, who had 7 children, all born Texas, including a son Alfred and daughters Martha and Jennie. Could she have been mother of Samuel Nathan, who was perhaps born after the death of his father? In April 1875, Parker County, one N. W. Wheeler and wife E. J. sold 160 acres to D. P. Criswell. There is no Williams County, Texas, but there is a Williamson County.

7-1-90 GOODLETT

The city of Nashville, Tennessee, is researching the lives of its mayors, one of whom was John Adam Goodlett. In the 1850 census of Nashville, he was 27, occupation, lawyer. In the 1860 census of Young County, Texas, there is a John A. Goodlet, age 35, merchant; and in the 1870 census of Parker County, Texas, there is a J. A. Goodlet, age 46, merchant. A J. A. Goodlet was also Mayor of Weatherford. Is this Texas Goodlet the former mayor of Nashville?

8-1-90 HALLMARK, CULLEN, CRADDOCK, BECHTOL, PECHOL, MONEY, JENKINS

Mrs. Marilyn Mills, 900 Glen Rose Rd., Stephenville TX 76401

Barbara Susan Hallmark was born April 1836 in South Carolina, possibly Laurens Co. Her widow's pension application states she came to Texas 1853, was married March 1855 in Houston County, Texas, to Elisha Cummins Hallmark, who died February 1880 and is thought to be buried Coon Creek-Smith Bend Cemetery in Bosque County beside their son A. E.

My deceased mother's records ca 1960 list her as Barbara Susan Cullen. Later researchers say her maiden name was Craddock, was married previously and had a child. However, all known children, Laura Ann (Bechtol) born 1856, Andrew Leroy Pechol born 1857, Imma Viola (Money, my grandmother) born 1858, Artie Lovella (Jenkins) born 1859, A. E. born 1861, Eddie Walton born 1866, Eugene Clayton and Clara Eugenia born 1870, and Arthur Cullen born 1873, were clearly Hallmarks. Her family Bible, date published unknown, lists only marriage of Barbara Susan Hallmark and E. C. Hallmark, no previous names.

Who were her parents and siblings? Did she come to Texas with them and/or a husband? Would like to exchange information with other researchers and family members.

COMMENT: If your mother's records gave Barbara Susan's maiden name as Cullen, what documentation did she give to support the statement? I assume you have searched for the marriage record in Houston County, also in Anderson County, if available. I also assume you have checked the fairly recent history of Bosque County, done by Curtis Media, of Dallas, Texas, I believe, to see if you can find any clues re the Hallmark families. You might also check the tax rolls for Houston County (1853 period and later) to see what Cullens and Craddocks are mentioned; a name might give a clue as to possible father of Barbara Susan, presuming she came to Texas with her parents and not as a bride of a Cullen or Craddock husband. What documentation did "later researchers" give to support claim that Barbara Susan was nee Craddock? If she was married previously to Hallmark, it would seem that a child by a former marriage would show up on a census.

In 1850 there were eleven Hallmark households enumerated in Houston County, most of an age to have been sons or grandsons of old George Hallmark, age 72, born Virginia (#648 on census). Could Elisha Cummins Hallmark have been one and the same as the Elisha H. Hallmark, age 21, born Alabama ca 1829, son of George W. Hallmark (#572)? He is of an age to have married Barbara Susan, and no other Elisha is listed on the census. I assume you have already checked this census. If not, see Numbers 553, 554, 555, 560, 572, 573, 588, 642, 644, 645, 648. In Milam County 1850 was Daniel Cullen (37 born South Carolina #538), and Alfred Cullen (21 born Alabama, #539). Also in Travis County was Sarah Cullen (41 born South Carolina #388) and five or six children, but no Barbara Susan.

9-1-90 DUNAGAN, MITCHELL, KNIGHT

Karen Dunagan Smith, Rt 1 Box 330, Kankakee IL 60901

Looking for my ancestor Sarah Frances Knight Dunagan. She was born in Alabama to William and Sarah Mitchell Knight, and was married during the 1870's to Joseph Daniel Dunagan. He was from Hall County, Georgia. They lived for a while in Arkansas, then moved to Grayson County, Texas. I have later history such as siblings, marriages, deaths, etc. but would like to have more information on her parents and siblings.

10-1-90 JUDGE, MILLER, BROOKS, BROWN

Edward H. Brown, No. 3 Meadowbrook Drive, Palestine TX 75801

The Judge family in Sams Cemetery northwest of Justin, Texas, located in the Drop Community, on a ranch was copied by Mrs. A. B. Harmonson of Keller, Texas. See Footprints page 89, Vol. 29 No. 2, May 1986. Michael Judge, died 5 May 1908, age 76 years. He was Irish, arrived in USA 1852. Where? Naturalized Denton County? Louisa D. Judge, wife of M. Judge, died 17 September 1878, age 38 years. What was her maiden name? Boslet Judge, born 1848, died 1 February 1910, brother of Michael. Would like any information on family of Thomas M. Judge, only son of Michael and Louisa. He married Myrtle Miller of Wise County. Had Brooks M. born 1895, Theo born 1900, Tommy born 1904 and Mike born 1910.

Need information on Brooks family of Denton County. Mother Frances Palmyra (Myra) Hackney Brooks, second husband William B. Brown. Known children of Myra and Thomas W. Brooks: Oscar Wheeler, Leslie James, Mattie, Thomas Ray, Ewell, Herschel, Clanton Parks, and Samuel Eugene. Would appreciate any information.

COMMENT: If Michael Judge married in Denton County, it would have been during the period for which marriage records are lost, pre 1875. The 1880 census (ED 106, p 48, Pct 4, #345-345) indicates that his son, Thomas M., was born ca 1875, also indicates that the son's mother was born in Kentucky. Thus, she was born ca 1840 in Kentucky (died 1878, age 38 years, per tombstone). Assuming that Judge came to the area as a single man and married in Denton County, he may have married a neighbor lady. He lived in the Justin area and is buried in the Sams Cemetery.

Pleas C. Sams was living in the area in 1870, at which time the post office for Precinct 4 was Elizabethtown, the center of trade for all, until the advent of the railroad, when most of the town moved to the new railroad town, Roanoke.

It would be a "long shot," but if all else fails in determining the maiden name of Louisa D. Judge, I would suggest the following: View the 1870 census of Denton County and turn to Precinct 4, census-taker's page 15 which is the first page headed "Elizabethtown Post Office." Search pages 15 through 28 looking for a family who may have had a daughter, Louisa or Louisa D. or D----, born ca 1840 in Kentucky. These families all lived in the area of present Roanoke, Elizabeth (only a cemetery there now), and Justin.

11-1-90 SMITH, GRIGGS, MCNIEL

Jonnie Woolf, Box 284, Fort Cobb OK 73038

Need names of parents of Alfred F. Smith who married Betsey Ann Griggs McNiell on December 2, 1852, probably in Denton County, as all of the information I have of him is in Denton County. Where was he born? Betsey Ann was born December 25, 1835 and died January 4, 1905 in Denton County. Their children were: Marcus

W., Mary Ellen, John Jackson, Dora, Alfred F. Jr., Eugene, George and Sherman. John Jackson Smith was my grandfather.

COMMENT: According to three censuses Alfred F. Smith was born in Virginia, ca 1829-31, and the 1880 census indicates that both his parents were born in Virginia. He first appears on the Denton County tax rolls in 1854, taxed for 286 acres of the Wm. McNeil survey, Little Elm area; and in 1855 taxed for that, as well as his own pre-emption of 160 acres.

He probably married the widow McNeil in either Denton or Tarrant County (both counties' early marriage records are lost). In 1860 (p 51, #343-344) he is mis-enumerated as J. F. Smith; in 1870 (Pct 3, p 23, #16-16) he is enumerated as Alfred Smith; and in 1880 (ED208, Pct 6, p 28, #147-147) he is also enumerated as Alfred Smith.

In 1860 his step-son, William McNeil, age 11, was with the family, also in 1870 but enumerated as Smith. In 1870 one Cynthia Griggs, age 39, was with the family and may have been the same as Tedisa? [not clear] Griggs, age 40, with the family in 1880, enumerated as sister-in-law, single. While there were many Smiths in Denton County, I find none in 1860 and 1880 who had Virginia backgrounds; however, in 1870 there were two households, Anderson Smith, age 68, born Virginia, wife Elizabeth, age 64, born Tennessee (Pct 1, p 24, #169-269), and Samuel E. Smith, age 28, born Virginia, wife Annie, age 24, born Missouri (Pct 2, p 21, #127-127).

Ruth Witt Harris writings re Little Elm Community gives McNeil data, re the family of Lewis McNeil (1826-1887) and mentions, "There was a George McNeil who married Betsey Ann Griggs, who had a son, William S. Griggs, born 27 June 1849. The father, George McNeil, was killed by lightning when the baby was less than a year old, and Mrs. McNeil then married Alfred Smith."

In Collin County 1850, family #1 of census, is George McNeal, age 31, born Georgia, wife Elizabeth A., age 16, born Missouri ("Betsey Ann"), but no infant enumerated, which could have been error of enumerator. Seymour V. Connor's Peters Colony of Texas (p 328) mentions George McNeil who came as a single man prior to 1 July 2848, was issued a land certificate for 320 acres, which was patented in Collin County by his heirs. Other McNeils (John M., Lewis H., Benj. F., and William) are also listed, most of whom are on the 1850 census of Collin County and were later in Denton County living in the Little Elm area. William McNeil first appeared on the Denton County tax rolls in 1852, Lewis H. in 1854, and F. F., Wm. J., and John M. in 1855. William was likely the father of the others, and he was issued a Peters Colony certificate for 640 acres, which he sold unlocated. Half of it was later patented in Collin County, and the other half in Denton County. Since, in 1854 Alfred F. Smith was taxed for a part of this Wm. McNeil survey in Denton County, the deed records might show how he acquired it.

Smith Griggs appears first on the Denton County tax rolls in 1855, taxed for 320 acres of his own pre-emption. He was not a Peters Colonist but arrived in Texas from Missouri ca 1852-54 (per 1860 census, p 38, #248-249, Little Elm PO). In 1969, Mrs. Roy Boles, 1004 Smythe, Plainview TX 79072, sent data on the family of his son, Ambrose Hill Griggs. Mrs. C. B. Taylor, 901 Morton, Dumas TX 79029, was granddaughter of the latter.

12-1-90 SCRIBNER, RIGGS

John E. Riggs, 6087 Mason Ct., Magalia CA 95954

Maude Scribner, who was my father's "aunt", probably raised him from about 1885 to 1895 somewhere in Texas. His name was John Calvin Riggs and may have been born in Bosque or Erath counties. Maude lived in Grapevine in the 1920's and died in the early 1930's, location unknown. Need her maiden name, birth date, death date, marriage (to Ed Scribner?). Can anyone help?

13-1-90 GOODE, GILL, HAWKINS

Billie J. Gelhar, 14050 S.W. 22nd St., Beaverton OR 97005

Margaret Goode, born circa 1790 in Rutherford County, North Carolina, daughter of John and Martha Gill Goode, married Joseph Goode, son of Thomas and Sarah Hawkins Goode, on 29 February 1813 in Christian County, Kentucky. They were in Jefferson County, Alabama, in 1820, in Tipton County, Tennessee in 1830, parents of four sons and three daughters. Joseph died circa 1831, probably in Tipton County, Tennessee. Margaret was in Marshall County, Mississippi, 1850, in Independence County, Arkansas in 1860. Where was Margaret in 1840? Living with eldest daughter? If so, what was daughter's name, and the name of her husband?

14-1-90 DOLAN, FITZPATRICK, PRESLEY, RENFRO, RENTFROW

Mary Ann Creason Rohde, 5797 Sycamore, Rialto CA 92376

Seeking information on Harry George Dolan, born 1888 Colorado, and parents Michael Dolan, born ca 1854, Massachusetts, and Anna Fitzpatrick, born ca 1857, Massachusetts. Also wife of Harry, Erma Lena Presley, born 1896 Texas; parents Alonjo Presley, born ca 1851 Georgia, and Eliza Renfro (Rentfrow) born 1859, Georgia.

15-1-90 WARD, MUIRHEAD, FLINCHEM, SKAGGS, DAWSON, LYNCH, RUSSELL

Need information on James A. Ward, born 1801, South Carolina, married Nancy Muirhead, born 1810, Virginia. They entered Texas in 1839 with family, settled in Red River-Titus counties 1840. Moved to Arkansas 1845, back to Grayson-Cooke counties by 1852. James was hanged in 1862 in the Great Hangings of Gainesville. Where is he buried? Nancy died between 1853-60. When and where? Their children were: Catherine married Jack Flinchem; Mary P. married 2nd James M. Skaggs; Sarah Jane married Ephriam A. Dawson;

Jeremiah J.; Jancy E.; Margaret A.; Lucinda E.; Luticia C. married Warren L. Lynch; William A.; Cynthia C.; and Jesse Austin married Cinthia M. Russell. Any information on any of these family names will be appreciated. Will exchange.

May Cordillia Robbins, who was born and lived in Fond du Lac, Wisconsin, was the mother of my grandmother, Elouise Jane Shimins, who was probably married there to John W. Shimins, an immigrant from the Isle of Man. Elouise and John had children: Thomas Waite, Maude Ester, Celeste, Elaine Grace, Eva, May, Mabel, and Elouise Jane, not in that order. The Shimins family moved to Galveston where they operated a nursery farm. An early hurricane salted the land and it was sold. John was hired by the University of Texas as a nurseryman. He died in that capacity.

Elouise married second John Wesley Newbrough, who was in Cleburne, Texas, in 1905. She was born circa 1880 in Leavenworth, Kansas. Another source says she was born in Topeka. She graduated cum laude from Baylor University in 1901, and did graduate work later at Hardin-Simmons. Would like any information available on Elouise.

COMMENT: In 1977 Darlene Newbrough Wicks, Minburn, Iowa 50167, furnished information on this family. She had data from the family Bible. Almira Coffey was born 3 July 1826, Wayne County, Kentucky, died 7 May 1905, Chihuahua, Mexico, buried Cleburne, Johnson County, Texas, beside her husband, Joseph Newbrough, born 3 December 1819, Ohio; died 28 July 1899, Cleburne, Texas. He was son of James and Polly Newbrough. Almira was daughter of Charles Oliver Coffey and wife Sarah, both born Kentucky, per 1880 census.

Children of Joseph and Almira; Mary, born 9 August 1846, died 1 January 1849, age 3 years; James Riley, born 17 November 1847, died 1848, age 7 months; Sarah Jane, born 2 May 1849, Madison County, Iowa, died ca 1929 Texas, married (1) Henry Williams, (2) Calvert; William Edward, born 8 September 1854, Henderson County, Texas, married Laura Alice Price, lived Johnson County, then Palo Pinto County; John Wesley, born 19 May 1859, Parker County, Texas, married 1884 Emma Fredonia Roberson.

It was thought that Sarah Jane was wife of Henry Williams, of Palo Pinto County (1880 census), but this was not so. She married (2) J. C. Calvert on 14 January 1877 in Johnson County, and is on 1880 census with him. William Edward Newbrough married Laura A. Green in Erath County 26 December 1875; not found on 1880 census of the area. Laura A. is buried in Dobbs Valley Cemetery, Palo Pinto County, no marker. John W. Newbrough married Emma F. Robinson in Johnson County 28 October 1885. He and his parents are on 1880 census Johnson County.

Looking for information on William W. Knight's parents. William W. was born in Tennessee 1832, his parents on census show both born South Carolina. He married (1) Lucy Ann Pistole on 28 February 1855, Leon County, Texas. Married (2) Arimathea Thorn, a widow. On 1860 census of Lone County, William W. was the only Knight listed. Can anyone help me in finding his parents and other family, if any?

18-1-90 MORRIS, SIMMONS, DAGLEY, MEYNIG, PETERSON

Seeking exact northeast Texas birthplace for John Thomas Morris, born 27 February 1844, died 31 January 1908, Hunt County, Texas. Parents: Joseph Morris (1824 Georgia - c 1875 Texas), and Martha Jane Simmons (1826, Georgia - c 1875, Texas). Married Mary Ann Dagley, 13 October 1865, Hunt County, Texas. Issue: Oliver Wendell; Elizabeth Jane; Huldah Mary; Thomas A.; Bertha Ada; John Anne; James Boyd; Charlie; Ira; Mable May; Bonnie Agnes; Aaron A.

Confirmation certificate dated 7 August 1868, Galveston, Texas, shows Heinrich Mortiz Meynig and Katharine W. Peterson (both from Germany) as parents of Emil August Anton Meynig. Were there other children? Was August Henry Meynig, born ca 12 August 1865, Galveston County, Texas, also their son?

19-1-90 HUKILL, DAVIS, BUSH, MARSH, HARPER, KUGLE, FRANKLIN, BOND, TUCKER

Would like to contact descendants of the following: John S. Hukill, born ca 1842 Arkansas; married in Johnson County, Arkansas, 25 June 1866, Mrs. Adelia Anneliza Davis (nee Bush), widow of John Davis who died during the Civil War. She had a small son, Palemon Cage Davis, born 10 August 1861 in Arkansas. She and John S. Hukill had sons: William, born ca 1868; Wallace, ca 1870; Mark ca 1873; Stewart ca 1875; and Oscar A. ca 1878, all born in Arkansas, perhaps Sebastian County. Adelia Anneliza evidently died ca 1878-1880.

By 1880 John S. Hukill and sons were living in Johnson County, Texas, in several different households: John S. and son Stewart in a Marsh household; son Mark in a Harper household; son William in a Kugle household; son Oscar A. in a Franklin household; and son Wallace in a Bond household. John had no wife in 1880, and the census indicates that his father was born in Ohio. No birthplace is given for his mother.

Also in Johnson County, Texas, in 1880 was John A. Bush (brother of Adelia Anneliza), who later lived and died in Denton, Texas. Another Bush brother lived at Elizabethtown in Denton County, and his daughter remembered "Cousin Mark Hukill visiting the family"

when she was a girl (late 1880's or early 1890's). Did John S. Hukill return to Arkansas? Or did he remain in Texas? Was he the same as the J. S. Hukill who married widow Eliza Tucker in Tarrant County on 9 October 1880? Mrs. Tucker was born ca 1844, Mississippi, and had a daughter, Sarah L. Tucker, born ca 1870 in Texas.

20-1-90 MCDANIEL, RUSSELL, ROBERTSON, HALL, MCREE

Unable to locate parents of William H. McDaniel, born 1792 in Pittsylvania County, Virginia, and died 13 July 1868, Laclede County, Missouri. Married 6 November 1816 Sally Russell, born 1792, Virginia. Her father, John Russell, agreed to the marriage in Mecklenburg County, Virginia, by Milton Robertson, Minister. I have most information on their four children: James W., born 1818, Nancy 1823-1901, William Henry 1826-1805, Eliza Ann who married William Hall.

Need help in locating parents of William McRee, Sr., born ca 1675 County Down, Ireland. He came to America in 1739 or 1740 landing at Cape Fear, North Carolina. He settled in Goshen Settlement, Duplin County, North Carolina, with eight children. I do not have wife's name which indicates she died in Ireland. William McRee, Sr., died in 1751 or 1753 (?) in Duplin County. Children: John 1692-1741, James B., born 1694, William, Jr., 1696-1789, Robert 1697-1775, Samuel died May 5 1798, Sarah 1716-1774, Alice, and Su-sannah. A descendant, Milton Brown McRee, married Lena Magdalene Miller and they settled near Bearcreek, Texas, southwest of Benbrook in Tarrant County.

COMMENT: I find no William Edward Miller or any McRees "who reached Weatherford by 1868." M. B. [Brown?] McRee married Lena Miller in Tarrant County 15 November 1891; also one R. A. McRee married Rebecca E. Fletcher 8 April 1888. I assume that the "Bear Creek, Texas" mentioned was Big or Little Bear Creek in northeast Tarrant County, not the one in Southwest Tarrant which runs into Parker County. I do not find Wm Edward Miller or any McRees on the 1880 census of Tarrant County.

In 1974, Mrs. R. L. Sanders, 6794 S. Atlanta, Tulsa OK 74136, sent data re the Robert Marion Black family, whose daughter Margaret Elizabeth, born 1872 Grapevine, Texas, married at Grapevine 24 December 1893 to Wm Frederick McRee. She also sent data re the James Sion Magee family, whose eldest daughter, Harriet Elizabeth, married 1870 possibly in Tupelo, Mississippi, to James F. McRee; families came to Johnson-Tarrant Counties, to the Burleson area.

In 1877, Antonio married Nora Hart in Bowie County, Texas, and then they moved to Jefferson, Texas, and lived for several years before moving to Texarkana in 1871. Antonio (Ben) Grilliet owned a meat market and also was a commercial fisherman. Antonio and Nora (born December 25, 1856) moved near Broken Bow, Oklahoma, and both are buried in Holley Creek Cemetery. Any information concerning this family will be appreciated.

Also seeking information on Andrew Johnston, who was born ca 1878-79 in Germany and died in 1936. He came to the United States when he was 17 years old. He married Emmer Shipp, born in 1881. Would also like to contact descendants of Ollie's half-brothers, both born Red Oak, Tennessee: Will Park who married Marie Meriwether and lived in Dallas, Texas, and Jim Park who married Moss Swofford and lived in Rice, Texas.

Would like to contact descendants of Dr. Thomas W. Jeter, Eye-Ear-Nose-Throat specialist, who practiced in Fort Worth from ca 1904 until 1939-40. Was born February 1871, probably son of Allen W. Jeter who came to Jasper County, Texas, 1859, evidently from Florida. Fort Worth city directories indicate that Dr. Jeter and wife Mary (May) lived at 2608 South Jennings from as early as 1920 until 1945. His office was in the Fort Worth National Bank Building. Census data suggests that they had two children through 1910: Daughters Lois (or perhaps Lovie) and

Jewell. Am not related to the Jeter family but do have information about our families' common trip to Texas.

COMMENT: Dr. Thomas W. Jeter is listed in "The Jeter Mosaic" compiled by Grata Jeter Clark, 3612 Park Hill Drive, Fort Worth, TX 76109. About 28 pages are devoted to his family.

25-1-90 HUNT, BRADBERRY

Mrs. Opal Hunt Immell, P. O. Box 785, Holtville CA 92250

Searching for Garrett W. Hunt who married Susan E. M. Bradberry, 16 February 1854 in Barbour County, Alabama. Garrett was born 18 October 1807 in Georgia and died 28 September 1887, buried in Tye-Oak Grove Cemetery in Tarrant County. So far, I haven't found any records to confirm his death and burial.

Prenuptial agreements are not new, but in 1782 Connecticut law and custom dictated that a widow was entitled to one-third of her husband's real estate for use of her lifetime as long as she was his widow and to one-third of his personal possessions to use and dispose of as she wished. A prenuptial agreement in 1781 between Israel Kellog and Lucretia Allin said if Israel died, Lucretia, as long as she didn't remarry, was entitled to use of the "northwest lower room" in Israel's house, and of the kitchen, the garret, the well, one quarter of the cellar and one quarter of the buttery. She was also to have space for a garden, "one good cow," the use of a horse, and was to receive specified amounts annually of various staples, and "sufficient quantity of wood on his land to maintain one fire." If she remarried she lost everything but the cow.

ALL MUST BE REGISTERED

"At that time a proclamation was made by Caesar Augustus that all the inhabited world should be registered. This was the first census, undertaken while Cyrenius was governor of Syria; and everybody went to the town of his birth to be registered.

Luke 2:1

J. B. Phillips translation
of the New Testament

One of the most important and commonly used resources for genealogical data is the census. However, census information is not always reliable, since at times the person who gave the information made assumptions that were incorrect. "She" thought Grandpa was born in North Carolina for he always talked about living there, but he had been born in Maryland and had come to N.C. when a small lad. And a neighbor kindly gave the census taker information about the family that lived across the rain-swollen creek that was impossible for him to cross, and, anyway, she was "sure she knew all about the family."

Among other problems are handwriting and spelling. In the early years, many letters were formed differently from the way we make them today, so it is a must to become acquainted with early penmanship. Also there were undotted "i's" and uncrossed "t's," as well as a similarity in the written capital letters "I," "J," "F," and "T." Another confusing problem was the use of an "f" when a word contained a double "s," i.e., the name Jefsie for Jessie.

Spelling was frequently a problem because the census taker would spell the name phonetically. The name of Gullede was spelled Gulage, Gollige, and Gulleridge, with the name Ussery being spelled Usry, Ussory, Usrey and, the most unusual, Orsery.

Then there was the census taker who was in a hurry and did not bother to write out the full names. He would write out the name of the head of the house and maybe the wife's name, but used only initials for the children.

Nearly all states counted their population in some manner from the very earliest of time. In Connecticut, the Royal Charter of 1662 states that a freeman must "have 20 pounds of property besides their person." The 1670 Census of Connecticut is a reconstructed list made from freeman, estate, tax and church lists between the years of 1660 and 1673. The colony then had 23 existing towns, 1,544 heads of households and 824 freeman.

From "Documentary History of New York State," one of their earliest censuses states, "Of ye towne of Southampton old and young Christians and Hethen Freemen and Servants White and Black shall be counted. Anno 1698."

In the year 1705, Virginia law directed that there should be a "processioning of all land in order to obviate lawsuits over boundary lines." The orders for processioning were to go out between June 1 and September 1 of every fourth year, beginning with the year 1708.

In "The Vestry Book of the Upper Parish, Nansemond County, Virginia, 1743-1793," the method is described by which the parish had been processioned, saying, "A very important duty of the vestry of each parish is the processioning of the bounds of every person's land which determines the record of land titles. Every fourth year, upon order of the county court, the vestry, having divided its parish into precincts of convenient size, will appoint two freeholders of each precinct to conduct the processioning, and report same in writing to the vestry." These reports, or returns, were required to be registered in particular books for that purpose by the clerk of the vestry.

The Vestry Book of Stratton Major Parish reports a meeting at which Francis Gaines was appointed "Clerk of this Vestry" to be in charge of the processioning. The order reads:

"Pursuant to an order of King & Queen County Court, dated the 12th day of July 1743, requiring the Several vestries in each respective Parish of this County to divide their Parishes into precincts for procefsion of the Lands as followeth Viz,

"Ordered that Geo. Pigg, Will Livingston, and John Shackelford or any two of them do meet on the first Monday in Decemb. next & go in Procefsion of & see all & every Persons Land between Portopotank Creek and Mattafip Swamp, plainly marked; continuing their proceedings in all suitable weather, till the whole precinct be finished and all inhabitants thereof are required to Attend ye Said Procefsioners according to Law & the said Procefsioners are farther ordered to make and return to this Vestry at their next sitting after the last of March next a true Account of every Persons Land they have Procefsioned, & of the persons present at the same, and of what Lands they have not procefsioned & the Particular Reason of such failure...."

In 1746, an act was passed by the General Assembly of Rhode Island requiring that all freemen would take an oath, or affirmation against bribery or corruption. This was the first time such an oath was called for and it, in effect, created a "Census of Freeman" in Rhode Island.

In 1767, in Virginia, William Gillespie was named as a processioner from the mouth of Cowpasture River to the mouth of Craig's Creek. His report states, "As it has pleased your Worships to send an order to nominate four persons in the Cowpasture to mark the lines of the several plantations there, we the subscribers, hereof, have gone from the forks of the James River upwards to the waters, There is many places that there is no livers in and others that doth not know their lines. The names of such as we found their lines are as follows: James Scott, William Gillespy, John Handley, James Beard, Thomas Gillespy, James Hamilton....." and others.

In Lunenburg County, Va. one report began, "A list of taxable Property and Souls taken by Charles Hamlin, Gent. for Lunenburg County for the Year 1783." One item read:

John Lemay 1 tithe age 21 and over, 3 white souls, 2 blacks

The country was growing, and following the Revolutionary War, as the states were becoming more unified, a need was felt for a census to give a basis for apportionment of representatives among the states to serve in Congress. The number for each state was determined by the state's population. The first House of Representatives, in 1789, had 65 members, as provided by the Constitution. As the population grew, the number of representatives increased according to the enumeration of each district, following each Census. However, since the 1910 Census, the total membership of the House of Representatives has been fixed at 435 members.

The Federal Government planned the First Census of 1790. It was to be taken by counties following geographical lines. In March, 1790, the Union consisted of twelve states. Rhode Island, the last of the original thirteen to enter the Union, was admitted on May 29 of that year. Vermont, the first addition, was admitted the following year, before the results of the first census were announced. Maine was a part of Massachusetts, Kentucky was a part of Virginia, Tennessee was a part of North Carolina and the present states of Alabama and Mississippi were parts of Georgia. The present states of Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin, with parts of Minnesota, were known as the Northwest Territory.

Philadelphia was the capital of the United States. Washington was a mere Government project, not even named, but known as the Federal City. Indeed, by 1793, only one wall of the White House had been constructed, and the site for the Capitol had been merely surveyed.

The settled area of that time seems very small when compared with the present United States, but the difficulties that confronted the census taker were great. Transportation was by horseback or coach. Roads, in many localities, were poor, frequently almost impassable, and bridges were almost unknown. Another problem was the reluctance of some citizens to give information. They imagined it was some scheme for raising taxes and didn't want to reveal too much of their affairs, or were inclined to be cautious due to religious convictions.

The President signed the First Census act on March 1, 1790, and nine months were allowed in which to complete the enumeration. There is a record of correspondence with the governors of the states, working with the marshals of the several judicial districts, who employed assistant marshals to act as enumerators.

The marshals were not furnished uniform blanks but each supplied his enumerators with whatever paper he happened to have, ruling it, writing in the headings, and binding the sheets together. The volumes containing the schedules varied in size from about 7 inches long by 3 inches wide and 1/2 inch thick, to 21 inches long by 14 inches with and 6 inches thick.

The schedules first listed the name of the head of the household, followed by five columns where numbers were to be written in:

- Free white males 16 and upward, including head of family
- Free white males under 16 years
- Free white females, including head of family
- All other free persons
- Slaves

A summary of the results of the First Census, not including the returns for South Carolina, was sent to President Washington in October 1791. The legal period for the enumeration was extended for that state, which did not report for eighteen months.

In 1907, the Director of the Census was authorized to publish in a permanent form the 1790 Census. Unfortunately, the censuses for the states of Delaware, Georgia, Kentucky, New Jersey, Tennessee (Southwest Territory) and Virginia were missing. In the introductory remarks of the printed schedules is a statement that the originals of the missing schedules were "destroyed when the British burned the Capitol at Washington during the War of 1812."

The 1830-1840 enumerations show a new division of age groupings, 12 in all, with 5-year groupings to the age of 20 years and 10 year groupings thereafter. Also added in 1830 was a special census form with questions regarding slaves, free colored persons and black and white persons who were deaf or blind.

Beginning in 1850, much more information was given, including the name and age of each individual in the household. Also given was the profession, occupation or trade, of each male over 15 years of age, the value of real estate owned and place of birth of each individual. The enumerator was required by law to personally visit each dwelling and interview the head of the house or some family member.

In 1870, an important column added related to the parents of a person who was of foreign birth and persons of color were enumerated by name. In 1880, more questions were asked, including the relationship of the individual to the head of the household, birthplace of individual's parents, a section on health (currently ill, blind, dead, idiotic or disabled) and marital status.

The 1890 census was almost totally destroyed by fire in 1921, when the warehouse where it was stored in Washington, D. C. burned. A related census of Union veterans and widows was partially salvaged and is on microfilm.

The census for 1900 asked number of children of the mother and how many were living, if the farm or house was owned or rented and if the individual was a naturalized citizen and spoke English.

In this census year of 1990, forms were mailed to every household in the country to be properly filled out and returned by mail. Some 250 million people will be interviewed, in more than 106 million housing units. The census officials will employ 480,000 people, 300,000 of whom will work during the peak period which lasts until the end of the year. When residents have not returned their census forms, it will be necessary for enumerators to track them down. An all-out effort is being made to account for every individual, especially the homeless and aliens who have been undercounted in the past.

Complete counts, by states, will be delivered to the President by December 1, and states are scheduled to receive tallies for redistricting by April 1 of next year. Detailed reports on population characteristics will be published between late 1991 to 1993.

OUR GILLIAM FAMILY, 175 pp., loose-leaf, illustrated, indexed, privately printed by David N. Strickland, 1022 Terrace Trail, Carrollton TX 75006, \$15.00 postpaid.

The earliest ancestor recorded in this book is Harris Gilliam on the tax rolls of Granville, North Carolina in 1790, and on the census of Wake County 1800. Other locations are Perry County, Illinois, Hopkins, Smith, and Van Zandt Counties, Texas. The computer-produced charts and family group sheets have a numbering system that is easy to follow, and Xeroxed photographs add to the interest of the book.

This book will be placed in the Fort Worth Public Library, and the Society thanks the author for making it available.

TEXAS 1890 CENSUS RECORDS

Transcribed by Barbara Knox

This transcription was made from microfilm. Only a few pages for Texas have been preserved. It is obvious by the burned edges shown on the film that the original records were in a fire. The microfilm shows: a portion of two precincts in Ellis County, two families (two pages) in Rusk County, and only one family in Hood County. There are several pages for Trinity County. It is impossible to read page numbers. Astericks (added by transcriber) indicate service as a Confederate soldier or widow of same.

FROM PARKER COUNTY, TEXAS TO TULAROSA, NEW MEXICO

Excerpts from the diary of Mary Cooper
circa 1893/94

Contributed by Lesbia Word Roberts
Fort Worth, Texas

Mary Cooper was a daughter of Albert Gallatin Cooper. The diary was written when she and her sister, Dorcas, brothers, John Alexander and Samuel Henry moved from Buckner, Parker County, to New Mexico to join another brother, James Wm. Cooper.

Albert Gallatin Cooper is buried at Springhill Cemetery, Weatherford, Parker County, Texas. He has a Texas marker and served as a colonel in the war with Mexico from Mount Pleasant, Tennessee.

Buckner, Wednesday, October 28 - Left home at 10 o'clock with three wagons and a hack and took the route from Rayville to Carterville. Passed Lipan at 4:15 and stopped and told brother Agre and family goodbye. We passed 11 covered wagons today.

Thursday, October 29 - Rained all night. Passed through Hood Co. - Morgan's Mill, Erath County rough and roads muddy. We passed 6 covered wagons today. Passed Stephenville at 5:30 and saw Oscar Chastein. Struck camp 1-1/2 mi. from town. Mr. Petty, two sons and a daughter called on us. We had music on harp, guitar and accordion.

Friday, October 30 - Passed through Dublin and camped on the Leon River at 5 o'clock.

Saturday, October 31 - Four of the crowd are complaining this morning. The roads are bad and the crops are not good. We got stalled on a creek bank and broke a hame (J. A. stole one.) We passed Comanche, a pretty place at 3 o'clock and travelled over better roads camping 7 miles from town.

Sunday, November 1 - Whit Plummer, E. P. Cooper, Sam Cooper, Edd Kinksford and Harry Derrough went hunting, and we call this camp "Sabbath Breakers" - beats any Sabbath I have spent in a long time. Mr. Betts is tacking shoes on a mule and roaching its mane. My chickens think they are having a picnic. We met no movers yesterday. Passed thru Blanket where there were a few farms, but mostly pastures. Passed thru Slap-Out. Five of the Cox girls and one Cox boy, a Mrs. Gray and a man from Tarrant County came and stayed until bedtime. They were daisies.

Monday, November 2 - When we got to Brownwood, they were having a Democratic rally. The country is thickly settled, there is plenty of wood and water, but the crops are not very good. We passed through Bangs at 4:45 and camped 1/2 mile out.

Tuesday, November 3 - Dora is sick with a cold. Coleman County is rough, and we saw our first prairie dogs. Santa Anna is at the foot of a big mountain. As it was election day, there was a big crowd in the town. This is beautiful country. Will stay with Mollie Beall tonight in Coleman City. Rutha went back home. Two of the Misses Price called.

Wednesday, November 4 - Mollie wanted us to stay until tomorrow as we didn't get half through talking about Parker County. Now there are few farms - mostly pastures. Passed Talpa Station at 3 o'clock and camped in Runnels County.

Thursday, November 5 - Whit went ahead to see his aunt. We are still in prairie and the roads are sandy, we crossed the Colorado River at 9 o'clock and came to the pretty town of Ballinger. There was not a house in sight when E. P. [Elisha Pollock Cooper, son of Albert James Cooper, the third son of Paris Cooper] stole a potato pumpkin.

Friday, November 6 - We are in Runnels County.... thinly settled but there is plenty of water, we got to San Angelo at noon which is a good sized place. The country is rough, thinly settled but has plenty of pastures.

Saturday, November 7 - We are in a valley with mountains nearly all around us. We saw the first house since we left San Angelo at Arden, Irion Co., and traveled in pastures or lanes all the time with no farms on the road and no houses in sight. The grass is fine and my chickens are standing the trip well.

Sunday, November 8 - We are nearly 300 miles from Parker County. The men are shoeing the horses, fixing the harness and wagons, and some have gone hunting and fishing. They have brought in 6 fish, the largest weighed 7 pounds; 19 squirrels, a possum, and a coon.

Monday, November 9 - We are going up a river and today we saw no farms and only one ranch house. The roads are rough and we traveled in pastures all the time. There is plenty of game. The ranch house we passed gave us all the milk we wanted.

Tuesday, November 10 - The roads are rough and we saw no house or anyone today. Sis is sick and J. A. and Sam are complaining.

Wednesday, November 11 - We named our camp today Kiote [coyote] for they are all around us. The roads are better....met two wagons today. We struck our first badger - dug one out and it had a fight with the dog. There was no house in sight all day as we passed through Tom Green County and we are in Upton County now. On the way we stopped and looked at one lone grave which had the name Alice Foreman, Age 18, written above it. We passed an old fort with several graves.

Thursday, November 12 - We had to drive 12 miles this morning before we found any water and could get our breakfast; water and wood are scarce. We passed through a canyon, called Cable Gap, between two mountains. It is the prettiest place I ever saw with every kind of cactus - some as large as a tub.

Friday, November 13 - We have been going up the Pecos River all day, and the roads are boggy, and we have not seen a house all day.

Saturday, November 14 - We are still going up the Pecos River and have passed seven graves and found a dirk. This is the loneliest place I ever saw. We went through Crane County yesterday and are in Ward today. We crossed the Pecos River on a pontoon bridge into Pecos. We have passed 7 Mexican houses which are made of dirt - roof and all, and the roof is nearly flat. The Mexicans would stand and look at us as if they never saw anyone before. They irrigate their land here.

Sunday, November 15 - We will have to ride on and travel until we can get to some good grass, for they say the grass on the river will kill the stock. It is noon and we are on the prairie where the grass is good but there is no water, and the boys had to ride the horses 3 miles for water.

Monday, November 16 - We could find no wood and had to cook with brush today. We are now in Reeves County, and got to Pecos at noon. This is pretty country. We saw our first train in a week. There are as many Mexicans here as any other kind of people. I saw two bears chained together in a pen. We did not hear from A. B. [Albert Bruce, her brother] and feel disappointed and fear some of them sick. Mr. Betts bought some turpentine for snake bites. Our dog Shep is missing.

Tuesday, November 17 - Sam and Edd went back to Pecos for Shep. They think someone tied him up. Old Nell is sick. Sam got his dog, some boys had him. We have traveled all day without water. We have seen only one house today and nobody lived in it. We did not find any water until almost sundown and the wood is scarce. There is one lone grave close to camp, but it has no name on it.

Wednesday, November 18 - We are still in Reeves County. There is no land in cultivation and no pastures. Now and then we see a bunch of cattle or horses. The wolves are plentiful and we saw some deer. There are no woods, just brush and roots; we have seen no large trees since we left the Concho River. I don't believe anyone lives on this road for we have seen no one since we left Pecos City except about 7 or 8 miles out of town where there were some Mexicans hauling grubs for wood. We still have to cook with brush and grubs. We are now in El Paso County.

Thursday, November 19 - We met a Mexican this morning and were in [New] Mexico by noon. There is a white man and his family and some Mexicans camped close to us. The road is rough and we are 45 miles from Eddy. We traveled all day through the mountains and camped on

Delaware Creek. My chickens are getting large and are no trouble now.

Friday, November 20

We have plenty of water, but we have not seen anyone in a house since Monday. The roads are still rough. After we passed Red Bank, we had to drink jip water which is salty and bitter. We can now see the Guadalupe mountains and they look as if they are covered with snow. A house at last - close to the Black River!

Saturday, November 21 - Jinks, one of our horses, got in the river this morning and was so chilled when they got him out that our trip was delayed. We are now only 15 miles from Eddy, and it is pretty country and looks like Kaufman County. We are passing lots of houses off to the right. We went through a Mexican town called Phenix where they had a little war last Sunday and killed one white man and three Mexicans. Eddy is beautiful and would like to live here. They are making sugar out of sugar beets, which they raise here by irrigation and the ditches run all through the town.

Sunday, November 22 - Saw the first soto this morning, which makes a beautiful plant for the year. We camped on the prong of Sever River, a little way off was a house and a schoolhouse. Sis is sick today.

Monday, November 23 - There are not many houses on the road today and we met only one wagon and one buggy, and saw a herd of horses and a herd of cattle. We have traveled all day on the prairie where there is good grass, but the wood is scarce. There seems to be more land outside here than I was ever in.

Tuesday, November 24 - The country is getting prettier. There are nice young orchards and the houses are close together. It is all prairie and not a tree close, but more pretty things - I cannot describe them - wild century plants, the soto, and five or six kinds of cactus. Sis is still sick and Dora took ill today. We are traveling in the mountains and got to Penasca at noon - just one house in sight of another in the valleys between the mountains.

Wednesday, November 25 - We are next to a graveyard and there are five houses in sight of us. We have named our camp Bluster for the wind is blowing hard like the March wind in Parker County. We are now surrounded by mountains.

Thursday, November 26 - We are three miles of Elk's store where they have a good schoolhouse. You cannot see any distance for the foothills [Texans would call them mountains] which are covered in cedar and pine. We were in the canyon at noon and three miles from an Indian Reservation.

Friday, November 27 - We are among Indians. They have a saw mill here and sell lumber at \$10 per thousand.... Their houses are just like the pictures, but a few live in log huts, but most live in wigwams. They seem to be friendly - one woman tried to sell me a pair of moccasins. We camped at Elk Canyon, 3 miles from the summit.

Saturday, November 28 - It is still cold, and we have passed over the summit and have been going downgrade all morning. We passed Agency where they have a large Indian School. We then passed Fort Stanton but are still among the Indians. Sam, E. P. and Mr. Betts left us and went ahead to get the mail. The country is very rough; there are mountains on both sides. The Indians have huts on the side of the road and they have little truck patches where the canyon is wide enough. We are now only two miles from Tularosa. Sam got back and Walter Pickard came back with them. We got a letter from Bruce and heard from Jimmie.

Sunday, November 29 - We went to Tularosa and met some of Jimmie's friends who say he struck free gold. I ate some fine apples that are raised here. Sis, Dora and Doppie got a fall; the team went on with the front wheels of the hack and left them lying in the road, but no one was hurt. Three men stopped to warm at our fire. One has every kind of fruit on his ranch and will give me some to can next year.

Monday, November 30 - We took the hack and went ahead of the wagons, and came to the Malipies - rocks of every shape and size and very black. Went from there to Salt Lake - it is a strange sight - you go to the edge and rake up salt by the handfuls. We got to the old Nowlin ranch and Sam started a fire and went to find Jimmie. Just as we thought we were going to enjoy the house and fire, the house caught on fire, but we got out. The house is in a canyon and has a good spring close by. Sam failed to find Jimmie.

Tuesday, December 1 - Sam has gone again to hunt for Jimmie. E. P. has gone to meet the wagons and pilot them here. Jimmie has come and says we will live in the house. I am very pleased with the country.

NOTE; On July 4, 1908, Mary Elizabeth Cooper married Charles H. Green of Aztec, San Juan County, New Mexico, and they lived there until the spring of 1913 when they and the Cooper family decided to seek greener pastures and moved to Arkansas.

MORE TOMBSTONES FOUND IN ERATH COUNTY

Jarvis STOCKTON Born 4 Jan 1849 - Died 13 March 1912

Marker found on land once belonging to Charlie and Ella Stockton Miller, in Millerville Community in southern Erath County, Texas.

These graves are located seven miles from Stephenville. Go south on Hwy. 281 and turn left at the Seldon road. Go two miles. The graves are located about three miles southeast of Seldon on the Stanley Haedge property. The cemetery is not fenced and is badly eroded. Cattle have grazed in it and many stones are destroyed. Copied Feb. 7, 1990 by Marilyn Giesecke Mills and Dorothy Scrimsher Suitt of Stephenville.

The only remaining stones are:

Mary, wife of J. BUSHONG	Oct. 27, 1803 - Jan. 24, 1879
M. E. BUSHONG	July 29, 1840 - March 30, 1879
[These graves were once enclosed within a cable fence which has now fallen.]	
Rev. Dr. F. M. MONTGOMERY	Died July 11, 1872, aged
[Masonic emblem]	42 years, 1 month, 2 days

Six adult graves marked with fieldstones and covered with flat rocks are south of the Montgomery grave. There are at least two more graves north of it.

A concrete foundation type enclosure appears to contain three infant graves marked with fieldstones. North of these graves rocks which were probably the foundation of a building have fallen together, possibly concealing more graves. People who viewed this burying site earlier believe there could be a total of twenty-eight graves.

NOTES OF THE BUSHONG AND MONTGOMERY FAMILIES

There once was a school called the Bushong Academy in this area; the year of organization is not known but it was possibly still in existence in the early 1900s. It is not known if this was the site of the academy. [According to D. D. Tidwell's *History of Erath County Baptists*, Chapter 18, Bushong school house was near Duffau. Here Little Duffau Baptist Church was organized 4 Sept 1883 with 6 members It was dissolved in 1892.]

MORE TIPS FOR BEGINNER GENEALOGISTS

Contributed by Frances Malcolm
Fort Worth, Texas

We have discussed pedigree charts, so you know how important they are. Always take your chart with you when doing research so that librarians and others will find it easier to make helpful suggestions. Check your information on pedigree charts and family group sheets carefully for possible errors. Use a black pen or typewriter and always capitalize the surname.

Don't overlook checking at home for:

Family Bibles, diaries, journals, scrapbooks, baby books, old letters, certificates of birth, death, marriage, diplomas, christening or baptism.

Old newspaper clippings - obituaries, marriages, divorces, births.

Miscellaneous - deeds, mortgages, leases, wills, tax receipts, military records (enlistment and induction notices, orders, discharges,) receipts, purchase agreements to cemetery plots, insurance policies, citizenship and naturalization papers, old photographs.

Family history accounts - these may be in a book, where grandaa wrote her favorite recipes or in grandpa's "journal."

If birth and death certificates are not found at home, it will be helpful to get copies. Each state has a Bureau of Vital Statistics which furnishes forms for births, deaths, and, in some cases, marriages. A new book, *Vital Records Handbook*, by Thomas J. Kemp, available from the Genealogical Publishing Company, will save you time. It lists procedures to follow in obtaining these records, the cost and the time periods for which such records are available. There is a form for each of the 50 states, Canada, the United Kingdom and Ireland. You will probably be able to find the book at your local library.

Birth and death records are filed in individual counties and the Bureau of Vital Statistics of each state. Records were kept rather haphazardly until after 1900. Each state's records will differ.

A delayed birth certificate is also known as a probated birth certificate. In Texas these records are filed in the courthouse of the county where the birth took place, the county in which the person

lived when obtaining the certificate and the Bureau of Vital Statistics in Austin. If you fail to find the birth/death record, it will be wise to evaluate your existing information again.

Name - the name the person was known by. That may sound a little ridiculous, but not always. My grandfather was known by four names - and sometimes used only "Jim."

Time - try to approximate the date.

Place - at least the state if not the county.

Relationship - who were his brothers and sisters? Who did they marry? Who did he marry?

There are also alternative records. Check indices for different spelling of names. Hinkle - Pearson - Westphal are only three of many names which can be spelled at least four ways. Newspapers have many records besides the obituaries. For example, if he died intestate there may be notice of an estate sale. Church records have been very helpful to me. When you have located the approximate time and place of death, you will want to search for a mortuary record. (My luck is, "We bought that funeral home, but we burned all those old records.") Try to locate the cemetery where the person is buried. If the family lived in a city, and a person is buried in a city cemetery, a city office would issue a burial permit. Many times these permits give cause of death as well as other information. Your next step might be to check land records, since there would be a record of disposal of such property.

Many times, you may find that your ancestor may have been married more than once. Sometimes the "little darling" had two wives at the same time, so that after his death, the fight over his money and other property will be recorded in the District Court records.

Last, but by no means least, is contact with all older relatives. Write a letter, enclose a self-addressed stamped envelope (SASE) and ask for help in collecting information to hand down to your children.

The editor would like to pass on a comment (from their editor) which appeared in a recent issue of the Austin Genealogical Society's quarterly.

Re-read what you have written! While it is imperative to identify hearsay and family tradition as such, we should try to use a little variety in doing so. On one page of a family newsletter, (double column, small print) I counted "is said to have been" 26 times, "probably" 5 times, but "possibly" only once. In no case was the source given - it would be helpful to know just *who* said it and *where* he got the clue.

Her parents were William and Permelia Hedge, who came from New York and were among the first settlers in Indiana. Irene Hedges married Henry Shew July 3, 1838, and died April 8, 1907.

DO YOU USE BRACKETS AND PARENTHESES CORRECTLY?

Genealogists worth their salt are very particular about accuracy in copying and quoting source material. We want to know *exactly* what was stated, including factual errors within the material and errors made by copiers and/or typists. We *never* alter an original document, whether it be handwritten or typed. If editorial comments are used within quoted material, rather than footnotes or end notes, brackets should be used, *never* parentheses. Words enclosed in parentheses are often found in original records--old wills, court minutes, old letters, Bible records, etc.--and should be copied exactly so. But, if we *also add* our own editorial comments in parentheses, the reader is often perplexed as to what is a part of the quoted material and what is editorial comment.

The University of Chicago's *A Manual of Style*, Sec. 10.41, states:

An author may make his own insertions in quoted material (1) to clarify an ambiguity, (2) to provide a missing word or letters, . . . Any such interpolations are enclosed in brackets, not parentheses.

The Hottel-Hay-Flanagan Bible and Notes, in this issue of *Footprints*, illustrates the questionable usage of parentheses by the copier. Some of the comments, in parentheses, are obviously those of the copier. Some of the comments, not in parentheses, appear to be those of the copier. Some of the words enclosed in parentheses, such as the Anglicization of German names, may have been part of the original record. Thus, the reader is left to wonder, "What, exactly, did the original record say?"

When you copy a tombstone, do you copy exactly what is inscribed, or do you "correct" the inscription?

When you copy a census, do you copy exactly what is written, or do you "correct" the census taker?

When you copy an old letter, do you copy exactly what is written, or do you "correct" the letter writer?

All such "corrections" should be made, either by footnotes or end notes or by words enclosed in brackets, so that there can be absolutely no doubt as to what the original record stated.

OBSELETE TERMINOLOGY. INMATE may refer to a person living in a home of another person - not an institution. FREEMAN used to mean an unmarried young man. DOMESTIC once meant a housewife - not necessarily a servant. HOUSEKEEPER once meant a property owner - male or female. MRS. or MISTRESS (with a woman's name) usually meant that she was a wealthy woman and indicated the proper form of address. MR. or MISTER was used to refer only to a man of wealth or one who was educated. A retired man might be shown as a GENTLEMAN.

John Robert Crouch, born Lincoln County, Missouri, 1844, married Annie Y. Hutt, Lincoln County, Missouri. Resided in Grandview, Texas, owned and operated a store in the 1880's-1900's. Am not sure when he arrived in Texas. Children, all born Lincoln County, Missouri: Thomas 1866; Anna Bell 1869, married McDougal; John Robert 1877.

COMMENT: I do not find John Robert Crouch on the 1880 census of Johnson County; however, of the nine enumeration districts of the census, only six have been copied (EDs 79 through 84). You might search EDs 85, 86, and 87, to see if Crouch was there by 1880. You mention that John Robert Crouch married Annie Y. HUTT. I am familiar with an early Crouch family, much allied with a HULL family. Both families were in Johnson County, Texas, prior to 1860, and lived in the area of present Acton, Hood County, which came of Johnson County in 1865. Hulltown, 3 miles east of Acton, was a community named for the HULL family. These families show Kentucky and Illinois residence prior to Texas.

2-2-90 KNIGHT, SAYLES, RODE

Building 2 of the Buffalo Gap Historic Village near Abilene, Texas, is called the "Knight-Sayles Cabin." Which Knight family lived there? We visited the Village last summer, and there was supposed to be a picture of the large Knight family in the cabin. We found out the owner, Dr. Rode, took down the picture for safekeeping, and occasionally made copies for people who asked about it. Had a brother named Mark Neil Tally who appears on the 1880 Bell County, Texas, census. Joseph T. Talley (10-23-1808 - 4-24-1880) was a Methodist circuit rider in Alabama and Texas. Also need names of parents of Robert Hodges, born ca 1780, South Carolina(?), died about 1844, Sumter, Alabama.

8-2-90 HENDERSON, GIBSON, REECE, VAN HOOSER

Marguerite Baggett Van Etten, PO Box 16326, Plantation FL 33318

Desire information about Rebecca Henderson, born 4 November 1829 near Shreveport, Louisiana. Married 9 December 1858 James M. Gibson, born near Troy, Madison County, Illinois, about 1833, son of Garrett Gibson and Polly Reece, who resided in what is now Tarrant County near Mansfield, Texas. Rebecca received a widow's pension in Oklahoma. She resided and is buried at Roff, Pontotoc County, Oklahoma. After the death of James Gibson (a Lieutenant in the Civil War) 1880 Nocona, Montague County, Texas. Parents of James are buried near Mansfield in the Gibson Cemetery. Any information about Rebecca's mother or about James' burial and birth dates will be appreciated. The Reece lineage indicates Mary Reece's parents were Mary "Polly" Van Hooser and Daniel Reece. The Van Hooser lineage stretches into 1600's.

COMMENT: Mansfield is in Tarrant County near the Johnson County line, but prior to 1871 a large northeastern triangle of Johnson County was still a part of Ellis County. Thus, we find your Gibson clan on the 1860 census of Ellis County and the 1860 tax roll of Tarrant County (the latter census is missing), and on the 1870 censuses of Ellis and Tarrant Counties. They arrived in the area after 1855 and before 1860. The Gibsons on the Tarrant County tax rolls, prior to 1856 were of another group who lived in northeast Tarrant County and were from Missouri.

In 1963, Irene M. Strieby, Apt. 101, 2550 Cold Springs Road, Indianapolis, IN 46222, was interested in the McNary Gibson family of Madison County, IL who came to Tarrant County after 1850. His wife was a daughter of Daniel Reece, was enumerated as Rachel in 1850, listed as Mahala on a deed 1850, and on her tombstone is Sarah. Both buried in Gibson Cemetery, near Mansfield. McNary Gibson 1812-1866 and Sarah Reece Gibson 1815-1869. In 1863 he patented 160 acres of Scrip land, west-northwest of Mansfield.

In 1970, Miss Lillie Mae Campbell, 845 E. Sorenson, Mesa AZ 85201, asked for proof of parents of Gibson brothers, Garrett, McNary, James, who lived in Madison County, Illinois 1850, and Aaron and Arthur who lived in Greene County, Illinois. All married in the same area and moved to Tarrant County, Texas. She asked if they were grandsons of James Gibson, Sr., of Stokes County 1790.

Of the above, Garrett patented his own 3rd class, 160-acre, survey in 1859, west-northwest of Mansfield, and James patented 160 acres of Scrip land in 1863. Both their surveys near that of McNary. In 1860 on the Tarrant County tax roll are Mac, James, J.W., J.J., and Garrett Gibson (the latter taxed for 160 acres of his G. Gibson survey). On the 1860 census of Ellis County, J. M. and R. Gibson [James M. and Rebecca] and A. and S. J. Gibson [Arthur and Sarah Janel]. In 1870 Tarrant County G. and Mary Gibson [Garrett and Mary], J. and Ellen Gibson [James and Ellen], among others. In Ellis County 1870 were: Arthur and Sarah Gibson, also John (sic) M. and Rebecca Gibson [James M. and Rebecca].

James M. Gibson, son of Garrett, married in Ellis County 9 December 1858 Rebecca Henderson. In 1860 they and infant daughter Susan were living in the household of Susan Kemble [Kimmel] in Ellis County. She was widow of Phillip Kimmel (see 1850 census, Dallas County, #156) and was nee Henderson. According to a biography of their son, John C. Kimmel, the Kimmels were from Illinois to Dallas County, Texas, and the Hendersons were from Louisiana. Susan's father was James Henderson, native of Louisiana, died in Tarrant County, married 1819 Elizabeth Lawrence and had five children: John married Melvina Kimmel; Susan married Phillip Kimmel; Nancy; Juda (all deceased by ca 1892); and Rebecca, widow of James Gibson of Montague County. Reference: Memorial and Biographical History of Ellis County, Lewis Publishing Co., Chicago 1892, pp. 244-5. Also see pp. 374-5, same source, re George W. Henderson, son of John and Melvina (Kimmel) Henderson, which states that John was born 1821 Claiborne Parish, Louisiana, and moved to Red River County, Texas, 1836, then to Dallas County 10 years later. States that James Henderson, father of John, died in Tarrant County 1863.

Also working on Gibsons in 1960s-70s was Mrs. Dorothy G. Tuttle, 344 Saunders St., Murray UT 84107, interested in the Arthur and Sarah Jane (Smith) Gibson family. They were grandparents of retired Tarrant County Tax Assessor, Reed Stewart.

Simmons (female), age 5, born Texas, parents born Georgia, both living in the household of I. N. Stephenson. I do not find a Willie Simmons, age 12, living in the household of Jack Stephenson. Nor do I find Lidda Ann (Lizzie) Simmons or Minnie Simmons on the 1880 census. One Tom J. Box, age 24, born Texas, was living in the household of A. Jack Stephenson in 1880; perhaps Willie Stephenson was also enumerated and our copier missed him. If you wish to recheck the census, see ED 98, page 9, Pct 7, #73-78 and #73-79. These families, enumerated in Pct. 1 in 1870 and in Pct. 7 in 1880. In 1870 they lived in an area which, by 1876, fell into Pct. 7 (south central Tarrant County). Although she had no children of her own, she was the Senior President of the Captain William Scott Society, Children of The American Revolution for many years, and the State President during the Centennial of Texas, endearing herself to many. She was an active member of the Scottish Clans of North Texas, and she dearly loved shortbread! She will be missed by many.

AMERICA'S FAMILY TREES' ROOTS SUPPORT WIDE BRANCHES

Come summer America goes home.

It's family reunion time, and all over the nation, Americans travel to be with people with whom we often share only a name.

We do it because families are strange and wonderful things. They are the first people we love, and often, the first people we hate. It is our families on whom we practice living. Among them, we learn how to love, how to hate, how to be angry, to fight, to help, to heal.

At its best, the family is those people who will always love us, no matter what. At its worst, the family gives us something to reject. For some of us, at various times in our lives, the family has been both things. And often, we count on them to love us even while we are noisily rejecting them. But for better or worse, families have a hold on us. They have left an indelible mark on each one of us.

This was brought home to me recently when a friend invited me to his family gathering in Kansas City. I walked into a room filled with people I didn't know but who all looked vaguely familiar. Some of them, I was startled to see, had Rick's face. Here was a man with a chin just like his, and over there, his nose was residing on someone else's face.

It was oddly jarring--and oddly comforting.

This was the National Gann Family Gathering, but it could have been any family. It's just that the Ganns are a bit more organized than most. I mean, these folks even have Gann T-shirts.

This is a family tree so old and intertwined that it's almost impossible to figure out how some of these people are related. So everyone calls everyone else "cousin" and hugs a lot. After all, they are all kith and kin.

There are Ganns in Texas, Indiana, Missouri, California, Georgia, Oklahoma, North Carolina, Louisiana, Alabama, Idaho, Mississippi, Tennessee, Oregon, Florida, Arkansas, Virginia, Washington and Illinois. There are probably more in other states. They just haven't found them yet.

But they will.

These people are into genealogy in a big way, so if there is a Gann lurking in your family tree, rest assured they will eventually find him or her. Somewhere out there, for instance, are records of a man named Anderson Gann, and when my friend finds them, he will have proof of his connection to the man most think is responsible for all these organized, stubborn people being here in the first place.

See, a man named Adam Gann married a woman named Jane in either 1757 or 1758. Jane and Adam had a whole passel of children, at least four of whom were sons. These people took the biblical injunction to be fruitful and multiply seriously, so each of their children had lots of children. What's more, the Ganns liked to name children after their forebears, so there are lots of Adams, Samuels, Nicholases and Thomases popping up all over the place generation after generation. That's why, by 1990, it takes a lot of effort to unravel various connecting family lines.

But I have no doubt these modern-day Ganns are up to the challenge. The amount of energy and vitality a group of Ganns (A gaggle of Ganns? A galaxy of Ganns? A glamour of Ganns? A gambol of Ganns?) can generate is almost overwhelming.

They also are good storytellers. There may be nothing like genealogical research for uncovering interesting, funny and sometimes poignant family stories. For instance, they have discovered that at least two Gann brothers fought on opposite sides in the Civil War. Most of the other Ganns appear to have fought for the Union. Some Ganns were bushwhackers in Missouri during that dreadful, divisive war.

One very youthful looking woman in her 80s was brought to Texas in a covered wagon when she was a baby. She doesn't remember the covered wagon, but she told of crossing the Red River on a barge when she was a small child. She remembers it vividly because the horses panicked and they were frightened for her father's safety. Her older sister was supposed to be keeping an eye on her, but in the uproar, the sister was distracted and an excited dog nearly knocked the little girl off the boat into the river.

The Ganns are a lot like the rest of us. Some have been heroes, some have been knaves. But most have been the hard-working, salt-of-the-earth types who built America. They were the mothers who bore us, the farmers who fed us, the merchants who clothed us, the nurses who cared for us, the soldiers who died for us. They are among our nation's teachers, carpenters, blacksmiths, engineers and bricklayers, the workers who built much of what we have today.

Some died much too young, and some lived to be very old. Old photos show patriarchs with burning eyes peering out at us, their long flowing beards adding a biblical touch to the image; they show calm women and stoic men standing side by side in tobacco fields, holding the fruit of their labors in their hands while gazing steadily into the camera; they show nervous fathers and proud mamas holding pretty, round-headed babies on their laps as they pose for their first offi-

cial family portrait; they show elegant women and handsome men standing with dignity and quiet pride in neat parlors or on sun-lit porches.

These photos show an America in process. They make it clear that the Gann family history is tied to the history of us all. For while they were farming in Tennessee, members of my family were working as furniture upholsterers in New York and in the oil fields in Pennsylvania. Your family was perhaps keeping a shop in West Virginia, sharecropping in Alabama, prospecting in California or maybe cowboying in far West Texas.

Whatever our families were doing, their efforts brought us here to this time, this place. When we sing of America, the Beautiful, it is to them we owe our thanks.

Just think. One day in the future, our children may come together and start passing around old photos.

And I wonder - what will they say of us?

EDITOR'S NOTE: If you haven't thought about a family reunion, or at least taping some recollections of members of the older generation, then you should! There will come a day when you will regret not having done it - and I speak from experience.

Our genealogical research is important to us not only because of a feeling of pride and accomplishment, but also because the records we compile are for our children and their children and all the generations to come. What happened in your family in the 1900s? (And before!) If we don't put down on paper as much information about our family as we can, how will our descendants be able to know about us? And as Ms. Sherrod wrote, maybe someday a group will gather and look at old pictures (that belonged to grandma) and perhaps say, in the vocabulary of the 1990s - "Wow, she must have been a real neat lady!" Or, "He's really cool! - I wish I'd known him!"

NEW KENTUCKY BOOK! Congratulations to the Livingston County Historical and Genealogical Society on their recent publication, *The History and Families of Livingston County*. It contains a wealth of information including histories of churches, schools, businesses, clubs and organizations, as well as much family biographical information and photographs. If you have ancestors in western Kentucky, you will be interested in this book - truly a "labor of love."

JOHN S. MENEFEE DIARY EXCERPTS

John Sutherland Menefee Papers, University of Texas Archives. Excerpts from the diary sent to Nancy Timmons Samuels in 1968 by Treacle Ebersole, Tujunga, California.

Diary

In 1829 General Jessie White, Major George Sutherland and Colonel Anthony Winston came to look at Texas and make selections for themselves and friends. This section of the country had recently been opened for settlement, and they made their selections on the Navidad, Mustang and Sandy, Colonel Winston taking Mustang.

They returned and made arrangements to move in the fall of 1830, some by land, others by water. Those who came by land were Thomas and William Menefee and families, George Sutherland and family, W. J. E. Heard and family and mother, and Thomas J. Read and wife.

We started out October 30th and came through the Choctaw Nation, on by Natchez, to the Mississippi at the mouth of Red River, where we found the boat out of repair and the ferryman not well. Consequently we had to repair the boat and set ourselves over, except that the ferryman steered the boat and collected for ferriage. We crossed the Sabine at Gaines Ferry and came by Nacogdoches and crossed the Trinity at Robbins' Ferry and the Brazos at San Felipe.

Between Nacogdoches and the Trinity there were but few houses and none on the road, that I recollect, from the Trinity to the Brazos. Leaving San Felipe we crossed the Colorado at Beason's Ferry, a little below where Columbus is, and followed the old Atascosito road, crossing the Navidad at Hardy's, thence to Major James Kerr's on the Lavaca, from which we followed the wagon tracks made by F. C. Keller, moving on to Keller's Creek and arrived at our destination on the Navidad, seven miles above where Texana is, on the 9th of December 1830.

There were but few families in this section previous to our arrival and I will mention all I can recollect: James Kerr on the Lavaca and probably two or three others in that neighborhood, old man York, father of John and Allison York, several miles below, Sylvanus Hatch still lower, Patrick Scott, on the west side of Navidad, John Andrews, Senior and Junior, on the Navidad, opposite Kerr's, Youngs, Coleman, W. New, Hinkson and A. M. Clare, on the Carancahua. I am not certain whether Peter White, E. Beatty and John Williams were here or not. If not, they came soon after, and William and A. S. White and sons came soon after. Also General Elijah Stapp. William Menefee, with some hands, came the winter before and made corn on Varner's place

near where Columbia is, on the Brazos, from where we hauled our corn for bread the first season. Our meat was principally venison, there being a great many deer in the country.

Our relations who came by water started in December and came on flat boats down the Tennessee, Ohio and Mississippi Rivers to New Orleans, where they chartered the steamer *Emblem*, Captain Carson, and after experiencing a severe storm and sounding for the channel in the bay, arrived at Cox's Point February 12, 1831, the day on which there was an unusual eclipse of the sun.

The following families came at that time: Jesse and Benjamin J. White, J. M. Heard, Mrs. Elizabeth Devers, John Davis, Mrs. Jemimah Heard's family, Royster, T. J. Winston, and J. J. Linn and his father. And there were some men who had no families, viz: Samuel Davis, Warren, Hart, and I think Willoughby. We built a flat boat at father's place and boated up several of the families and their goods, making several trips. J. J. Linn went to Victoria. The *Emblem* returned to New Orleans and brought others of our relatives and acquaintances.

I neglected to state that Mr. S. C. A. Rogers and family came on the *Emblem* the first trip. The following, with their families, came on the second trip: T. H. P. Heard, J. D. Newell, Morgan Rector, F. R. Royal, Robert Moore and probably others whom I do not recollect. Joseph Rector was killed by lightning a month or two after his arrival.

Many members of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas are/were descendants of the Menefee and Sutherland families.

BOOK REVIEWS

The Raglands: The History of a British-American Family. Volume II, 1987, hardbound, 405 pages, illustrated, indexed, by Charles James Ragland, Jr., Winston-Salem, N. C.

In this second volume of the history of the Raglands, the author has put into an orderly narrative the vast amount of new and detailed information on the British origins of the Ragland family which he has discovered since the publication of the first volume.

The book begins with a history of the Manor of Perthyre, created in the thirteenth century in Wales. A photograph shows the manor tower still standing. It is thought to have predated the original manor-house, and have been built earlier to serve as part of some defensive line. Other buildings still standing are identified with approximate dates.

The earliest ancestor to assume the surname of Raglan(d) was Robert ap Jevan, alias Robert Raglan, esq., second son of Jevan ap Thomas (____-1416). Born at Perthyre manor around the year 1408 he was orphaned at the age of eight. Moved to Raglan castle, the family seat of his uncle, Sir William ap Thomas, knt. At Raglan he received, as a member of Sir William's family, an education befitting his station and grew to manhood. In deference to his English upbringing at Raglan, he dropped the Welsh name form at the time of his removal to Glamorgan and assumed the surname of Raglan(d), denoting the place from whence he came, but at the same time distinguishing his family from those of Sir William's sons who had adopted the Herbert surname.

The immigrant ancestor is Evan Ragland (1656-1717) who was born Somerset, England, and was of St. Peter's parish, New Kent County, Virginia. From him eight generations are traced. The individuals are clearly identified numerically, and are easy to follow through the various branches. A book any Ragland descendant can be proud of.

The James Price Webb Family, 1990, 201 pages, soft cover, indexed, compiled by Woodrow James Walter, 5205 Stacey Avenue, Fort Worth, Texas 76132.

The earliest known ancestor of this family is Burrell Webb, born circa 1800 in Old Kentucky, of whom very little has been found except he is supposed to have had nine children who lived to maturity. James Price

Webb was of the third generation who moved with his parents near Hickman, Kentucky, where they remained until 1878. Much of the history of the Webbs takes place in Shannan County, Missouri, but fourth generation Maude Allen Webb married Luther Patterson Walter and they eventually migrated to Texas, living for many years in Abilene, where they both died and are buried.

Descendants are separated by generation and numbered in an easy to follow pattern. Many biographical sketches and narratives are included, making the genealogy interesting reading. As a result of the work on this book, a reunion of the Webb family was held for the first time in 1989 in Birch Tree, Missouri, and another reunion is scheduled for this year.

Granbury Cemetery Records, Granbury, Hood County, Texas, 1989, soft cover, 112 pages, compiled by Mary Kate Durham, presented through the Elizabeth Crockett Chapter of DAR.

This enumeration of the Granbury, Texas, Cemetery was made by members of the Elizabeth Crockett Chapter of the DAR, the Hood County Historical Society and others. Veterans from the War of 1812 to Vietnam are included. General Hiram B. Granberry and Jesse Woodrow James are buried here. Although names are arranged alphabetically, lot numbers are given to make easy location possible.

New York County, NY Field Trip Guide, 2nd ed. May 1990, Donna K. Clark, Ancestor Publishers, 6166 Janice Way, Arvada CO 80004, soft cover, 31 pages. New York County encompasses all of Manhattan Island and is the center of New York City. This book will be of great help to researchers in this area - either in person or at home.

Listed are depositories such as libraries, societies, government offices, church archives school libraries, archives etc., with addresses, telephone numbers, and in most cases, a summary of their respective holdings for New York County. Also included are hours of operation for various libraries and other offices.

There are 27 Field Trip Guides for the State of New York and one for New London County, CT. The publisher encourages readers to send corrections and updates by offering a 20% discount on their next order. Information is computerized so that new data can be added to make the next book as up-to-date as possible.

Readers can learn what counties have been done by sending either two first class stamps for a microfiche copy or \$3.00 for a paper copy of the catalogue. We would hope that the publishers will eventually consider other states since the material is presented in such a distinctive format. [reviewed by editor]

TRADED FARM FOR A SACK OF COFFEE!

This article, by W. S. Adair, appeared in *Frontier Times*, Vol. 9, No. 6, March 1932, and was originally published in the *Dallas Morning News*, December 20, 1931.

"My father, J. C. Caton, decided to move to Texas in 1852," said L. T. Caton, 1590 Worth Street. "I was a year and a half old, too young to remember much about the migration, but father rehearsed it all to me so many times that my grasp of the incidents is almost that of experience. Missouri was a good state to leave about that time, and settlers were slipping off to Texas in long trains. There were so many wagons ahead and behind us that when we came to Denison, we had to wait three weeks for our turn on the ferry - a mere barge, which was guided across by means of a rope stretched from bank to bank. It was owned and operated by a rich Indian named Colbert. But crude as it was, it was the only ferry on Red River along the Texas border. According to my father, the people very agreeably whiled away the three weeks by fiddling and dancing and playing seven up or old sledge.

"On reaching the Texas side of the river, father bought some corn from an Indian farmer and headed for Denton County, where he built a cabin on 160 acres on the east side of Denton Creek. He said that at that time there was just one cabin between ours and Mexico! Old man Chrystol, he said had located a survey one mile west of the creek and settled there.

"Once John Beal and I went to deliver some horses father had sold to soldiers at the military post at Jacksboro. On the way we spent the night with M. Ball, who lived eight miles north of Decatur. Shortly after we retired, Mr. Ball called our attention to the hooting of owls, and told us we could see the birds by looking through the cracks of the house. A full moon made it almost as light as day, and we watched fifteen or twenty Comanches pass on their ponies, single file, within forty yards. They did not start any trouble with us, but went on into Denton County where they killed some settlers and stole a lot of horses. That was in 1861, just before the federal soldiers were withdrawn from Jacksboro's Fort Belknap and other army posts on the Texas frontier. It was then up to Texas, as a seceding state, to keep the Indians back as best it could. The Indians soon discovered what had happened and became very bold. Still we fought them off and also prevented the Yankees from making an invasion of the state.

"Father was one of the earliest freighters from Houston to North Texas points. Before the War he hauled merchandise for Dallas, McKinney and Sherman merchants. The upper part of the trail to Houston was blazed

by heaps of white buffalo bones. Their phosphorescent glow in the dark guided many freighters, who usually travelled together for protection. They used six and eight yoke of oxen to the wagon, and it often required twenty to thirty yoke to pull a wagon through a particularly boggy place. When the freighters left home, there was no telling when they would be back - certainly not in less than 6 - 8 weeks.

"After a few years, father sold that survey for another near Pilot Point. By that time, planters in the southern states, fearing the outcome of the slavery agitation, were bringing their negroes to Texas. Among them was one John Anderson. Father traded his survey to him for a negro man and a jack and then traded them for a farm on the edge of Sherman. The war worked hardships on everyone, but it is doubtful if in the whole of Dixieland, any other individual was hit harder than father. He was a coffee addict and the blockade of the South cut off his supply. He tried parched grain and acorns, and got something that looked like coffee but never tasted like it. Toward the end of the War, Mexican smugglers slipped some coffee across the Rio Grande, and a few sacks got as far as Sherman. Father traded his farm for a sack of coffee!

"In 1868 we moved to Ellis County, settling three miles from Possum Trot (now Red Oak) and eight miles below Lancaster in Dallas County. We farmed, getting 25 cents a pound for our cotton at Waxahachie and 10 cents a bushel for our corn. What little money around then was gold and silver - nobody would accept bills or paper money.

"During the War there was no outlet for Texas cattle and the range was covered with them. But by the time we settled in Ellis County they were passing over the trails to Kansas by the thousands. I watched them go by, one great herd right behind another, for days and days. The cattlemen and even some of the cowboys brought money home and that made times in Texas better. News of our prosperity had a lot to do with starting a stream of immigration from the old south this way."

Mr. E. J. Tyler and Miss Lee Majors were married at the residence of the bride's father on Thursday evening, Judge C. C. Cummings, officiating.

Sept. 9, 1879

Dr. M. N. B. Williams, one of Fort Worth's oldest citizens, died yesterday. Funeral will be held with full Masonic honors.

Col. E. M. Morton and Miss Maggie Redish were married Sunday evening, 6th inst.

Sept. 10, 1879

Mr. G. F. Bell and Miss M. C. Flanagan, both of this county, were married at the Trans Continental [Hotel] last Monday at 12:30 p.m. by Rev. W. W. Brimm. A sumptuous dinner was served in the dining room following the ceremony.

Sept. 11, 1879

E. C. Shugart and Miss Ella Daugherty were married at the Presbyterian Church last evening, Rev. W. W. Brimm officiating. The bride is an orphan, but one of the Fort's most favored daughters. Mr. Shugart is a salesman in the hardware house of Henry and Underwood. After the ceremony, a private reception was held at the "handsome residence" of Mr. R. F. Tackaberry.

John Hood of Tupelo, Miss. and Miss Sallie H. Daniels of this county were married Aug. 17th at the residence of J. R. Daniel by Elder H. C. Renfro. On August 19th, Mr. Hood was taken ill with spinal meningitis, and died some 15 days later. [Item is from Johnson's Station.]

Mrs. Mary, wife of Rev. A. Fitzgerald, died Sunday, Sept. 7th at Red Sulphur Springs. She will be buried in Fort Worth city cemetery Monday morning.

Sept. 12, 1879

The Grand Military Ball, the social event of the season, was given at Evan's Hall by the Tarrant Guards on the 15th, with 400 in attendance.

Excellent music, with Want catering. The Executive Committee in charge of the event was Surgeon A. D. Ansell, Dr. J. P. Booth and Lt. T. H. McMahon.

Sept. 13, 1879

Mr. C. C. Slaughter, "one of the largest cattlemen in the state," of Dallas, gave a wine and oyster supper at the National Hotel for some of his many friends. He will leave today for his ranch in the "far west" - to be gone two months.

Sept. 17, 1879

H. J. Stockett and Miss Emma Berry were married at the Southern Methodist Church last night in the presence of a large number of friends. The bride was attired in a beautiful steel colored silk dress. After the ceremony, a sumptuous repast was served at the home of the groom's sister, Mrs. J. T. Melton. The bride is the adopted daughter of Rev. M. H. Wells and the groom has been a resident of this city for several years.

Sept. 30, 1879

J. Cull Walton died last Sunday morning, Sept. 28th, of consumption.

Oct. 3, 1879

John R. Leonard, proprietor of a store on Granbury Road, 6 miles out of town, died of "phthises pulmonalls" - leaves a wife and 4 children.

E. B. Test, partner in the lumber firm of Williams and Test was married last evening to Miss Alice Badger at St. Andrews Church, Ft. Scott, Kansas. After a brief trip the couple will live in Fort Worth.

October 9, 1879

B. L. Samuels, old citizen of Tarrant County, died at 10 o'clock yesterday, on his farm 1 mile northeast of the city. He was nearly 76 years of age. Born in Todd County, Ky. in 1803, Mr. Samuels migrated to Tarrant County in 1856. His first wife died soon afterward and he married the daughter [name not given] of Dr. J. P. Woods and sister of our county clerk, Jim Woods. He is survived by his second wife and two married daughters [names not given] by his first wife. He had one sister and three brothers, deceased, none of whom married. The funeral will be this morning at 10 o'clock at his residence on Samuels Avenue.

October 10, 1879

Miss Malinda Bishop and A. G. Brooks were married last evening at the Baptist Church, the Rev. Mr. Gillespie officiating. Following the ceremony, a reception was held at the home of the bride.

Oct. 25, 1879

Miss Nettie E. Harrell and Edgar W. Hope were married at the home of the bride's brother, C. L. Harris, on the evening of the 23rd.

Oct. 30, 1879

Miss Fannie Darnell and Henry W. Tucker were married on the 29th inst. at the residence of Thomas Whitten, Rev. Mr. Burnett officiating.

Nov. 4, 1879

Royal Reunion - after 25 years of separation the eight brothers and sisters of Steven Mulkey were reunited at his residence on Saturday, Nov. 1st. Rev. Dr. McKenzie, his wife and daughter, close friends of the Mulkeys' parents, were also present. The oldest family member present was Dr. Mulkey of Kaufman, and the youngest, Mrs. Orgain, wife of our postoffice clerk.

Miss E. Buford and C. D. King, both of this county, were married Oct. 30, at the residence of Dr. Buford by Rev. Robert Logan.

Nov. 8, 1879

George Spiller and wife, nee Miss Belle Loring, of Graham [Texas] are registered at the El Paso. They will go east on their bridal tour.

William Preston and Miss Mary Castele were married at St. Andrews Rectory on Friday evening, 7th inst. by Rev. W. W. Patrick.

Nov. 12, 1879

Our county commissioner, Tobe Johnson, yesterday received the news of the sudden death of his sister, Mrs. M. L. Lee, of Wise County. She will be buried on her farm about 15 miles from Fort Worth.

Nov. 13, 1879

One of the "most noted marriages that ever occurred in Fort Worth" took place at 5:30 Tuesday evening, when Mr. Hendrick Henderson, aged 34, was married to Mrs. Caroline D. Witwa, aged 66. The ceremony was performed by Judge McClung.

Nov. 14, 1879

Miss S. E. Pugh and G. H. Herrell, both of Arlington, were married yesterday at the Trans-Continental Hotel. During the "sumptuous repast" following the ceremony, Dep. Sheriff Isbell summoned the groom for jury duty.

Nov. 26, 2879

T. A. Howeth and Mrs. S. J. Seasell, both of Alvarado, were married by Rev. M. D. Fly.

Nov. 27, 1879

Early yesterday another Alvarado couple, G. T. Brewer and Miss A. E. Renfro, were married at the European Hotel, by Rev. J. W. Stone.

Dec. 2, 1879

E. M. Wells of Fort Worth was married on Thursday, 27th ult. to Miss Willie A. Pollard at the residence of the bride's uncle in Lee's Summitt, Mo.

Dec. 9, 1879

Thomas R. Sandidge, well known hardware man, was married to Miss Nannie A. Thornton, "one of the Fort's finest," at 3 o'clock, Tuesday, Dec. 6th, at the residence of the bride's father, J. A. Thornton.

Dec. 11, 1879

Miss Rosa Wenor, well known in society here, will be married next Sunday to Aaron Goldstein, formerly of Fort Worth, now at resident of Gainesville. [A lengthy account of the wedding appeared in the Dec. 16th issue.]

Dec. 12, 1879

W. C. Fly and Miss Fannie Waggoman were married last evening at 7 o'clock at the First Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Rev. M. D. Fly officiating. Attendants were Mr. John Lewis, Miss Jennie Alford, Mr. Richard Wilkes and Miss Nellie Buchanan. Capt. Lyles, brother-in-law of the bride, entertained at a reception in his home following the ceremony.

Dec. 14, 1879

Mansfield. William H. Stahl and Mrs. Ann Genkins were married on the 9th. On the same date Dennie Mahoney and Mary A. Wallace and John B. Graves and Octavia Wallace were married in a double ceremony.

Dec. 17, 1879

S. M. Fry and Miss Annie S. Brooks were married last evening at the Presbyterian Church by Rev. W. W. Brimm.

Dec. 21, 1879

William P. Brazelton, "promising young lumberman," will be married on Christmas Eve to Miss Hannah Jones of Cincinnati, Ohio. Miss Jones spent last winter here with her brother, Major David Jones.

Dec. 26, 1879

James S. Davis, prominent young lawyer, and Miss Susie C. Kennedy were married last evening at the residence of Capt. O. S. Kennedy, Rev. Allen officiating.

Dec. 27, 1879

Frank Leslie Fox, stepson of Col. J. P. Smith, died yesterday morning at the Smith residence. He was born in Carroll Co. Miss. July 7, 1862. Six uniformed cadets were present at the large funeral service, and a resolution of respect was passed by A & M College.

Dec. 30, 1879

Prof. F. P. Prewitt of Fort Worth and Miss Effie Emery were married at the residence of the bride's father (Elder V. I. Stirman) near Kaufman, Texas.

END OF NEWSPAPER ABSTRACTS

The terms "Inst" and "Ult" are very often seen in old newspaper articles. "Inst" means that the event occurred in the present month, while "Ult" implies that the date referred to was in the previous month.

JOEL SNIDER - TARRANT COUNTY PIONEER

Joel Snider and Belinda Samford [Sanford] were my maternal great-great grandparents. According to census records, Joel was born in 1804 in South Carolina. He died Feb. 5, 1887 in Tarrant County, Texas, and is buried in the Snider Cemetery. He married Belinda Sanford Feb. 8, 1827, in Tuscaloosa County, Alabama.¹ She was born in South Carolina February 13, 1813 and died 23 July 1844, presumably in Shelby County, Texas. It is interesting to note that Belinda's mother's maiden name was also Snider - possibly Joel was a relative.

The 1830 census of Tuscaloosa County, Alabama lists Joel Snider as head of household with one female under 20 and two females under five. It is believed that seven children were born before Belinda died in 1844.²

Rebecca Snider Webb (2nd child) and her husband were in Shelby County, Texas in 1860 and 1870, but not 1880. Several of his children by his first wife were living with them in 1850 and 1860. Children of Rebecca and Meridith Webb: Joel, Mary, Amanda, Elkaney, Alford, Eugenia and Jeanette. Rebecca Webb died in August 1870 and is buried in Center Methodist Cemetery, Shelby County, Texas.

William Jasper Snider, (3rd child) was born November 25, 1831 and died October 1849.³ It is believed that there was a daughter, Epsy, born in 1835, although there is no mention of her in the Samford Bible.⁴

Matilda Snider (5th child) was born in Alabama in 1838 and may at some time have married a Turner.⁵ Matilda probably came to Tarrant County with her father's family. I have no record that she lived elsewhere. Apparently her only child was an illegitimate daughter, Malinda Jeanette Morris, born in 1867. No doubt there is an interesting story here - one we will never know!⁶

Margaret Elizabeth Snider (6th child) was born February 1, 1840 in Alabama (or on the way to Texas.) She was my great-grandmother. She m/1 Allen V. Smith in Shelby County and they moved to Tarrant County about 1861. Smith did not return from the Civil War and about 1867, Margaret m/2 James T. Wilson. I am descended from Hiram Smith, her second son by her first marriage. Margaret lived near Kennedale [Tarrant County] until her death in January 1888.

Pernicia Mary Ann Snider (7th child) was born in Shelby County, Texas in 1842. She came to Tarrant County with her father and step-mother. About 1860 she married Rufus Wade Hardin, (also from Shelby County,) and had one son, William Henry Hardin.⁷ Rufus died, or was killed,

in the Civil War and his widow married a Price. One of their children was S. L. (Bud) Price, of Kennedale, Texas. Pernecia's third husband was a Carpenter. She died in 1912 and is buried in the Hudson Cemetery.⁸

Joel Snider is shown on the 1850 Shelby County, Texas census, with his second wife, Jenette,⁹ Elcancy [son Elkanah;] Epsy, Matildy, Margaret E. and Pernicie M. Also listed in the household were Wm. R. Hutson [W. K. Hudson], J. D. Hutson and Susan J. Hutson.

I believe that the Snider family lived in Shelby County until ca 1855-56. There is record that he attended an organizational meeting of the Masonic Lodge at Truitt's Store March 18, 1854. He demitted from the Sam Samford Lodge #149 on Oct. 29, 1855, and affiliated with the Fort Worth Lodge #148 in 1858.

Records show that Joel was living in Tarrant County by August, 1856. He received two land grants on Sept. 12, 1859 (#1448 and #1468.) His son Elkanah Snider,¹⁰ his stepson, W. K. Hudson and Daniel McVean (husband of his stepdaughter, Mary) also received grants at that time. The Snider grant is located about two miles south of Kennedale on the New Hope Road. Joel received other Texas land grants, (per papers on file in the General Land Office in Austin), one in Harrison County, but I have no record that he ever lived there.

The first Blue Lodge in Fort Worth, #148, is said to have been organized in Julian Feild's store in April 1854. Feild was First Officer and other charter members were Col. M. T. Johnson and "Joe" Snider. The Lodge was chartered Jan. 18, 1855.

"The bell that pealed out a welcome to the year 1855 for 300 inhabitants of Fort Worth will repeat its welcome tonight at 10 o'clock over WBAP, the Star Telegram radio station. Clear toned and sturdy, the Fort Worth liberty bell is preserved in the Masonic Lodge No. 148, to which it was presented in 1871.

"In earlier years the bell rang with more dramatic effect. Hanging on the northwest corner of the public square, the bell often went in the air to call out the Fire Department, to announce a wedding, to call people to church or to toll dirges for their dead. Its daily routine was to announce breakfast, dinner and supper at Lawrence Steele's Hotel.

"School children of 1871 or thereabouts will remember its early morning peal from the Masonic school on East Belknap Street. The Masons had the first school in Fort Worth, and the bell was used to call the children to school.

"Its solemn chimes will recall memories for some of Fort Worth's citizens - memories of men who pioneered in Fort Worth in those days of hardship and privation - Julian Feild, W. P. Burts, George Newman, the three Daggetts, Sam Seely, Joel Snider, W. H. Overton, Lawrence Steel, John L. Purvis, W. T. Ferguson, R. C. Johnson, John Peter Smith, M. T. Johnson...."¹¹

The 1870 Tarrant County Census (p. 25, #192) shows Joel Snider (64) Jenetta (70), Matilda (30) Jenetta (3) M. E. Price [Pernicia Mary Ann Snider] (28) Wm. H. [son of Pernecia Hardin] (10) Stephen [probably S. L. Price] (5) and Thomas Jefferson (?) (21, b. Arkansas.) In 1880 Joel was living with his daughter, M. T. [Matilda] and granddaughter, Jeanetta Morris.

Although James Thomas Wilson is not my ancestor, I will include what information I have on him since he was the second husband of my great-grandmother, Margaret Snider. There were seven children and some descendants still live in Tarrant County. (Elam Gray, of Granbury, Texas, is a grandson of Margaret Malinda Wilson, and Carrie Wilson is a descendent of Joe E. Wilson.)

James Wilson was a Mason in the Burleson, Texas lodge. According to Mrs. Carrie Wilson of Crowley, Texas, he was a charter member of the Masonic Lodge of Oak Grove, an early Tarrant County community.

The Tarrant County 1867 Voters' Registration List shows that he had lived in state, county and precinct for seven years. It is believed that he came to Texas from St. Louis, Missouri, and had at least one son by an earlier marriage. In 1880, he was living in Pct. 7, (HH 183/187) with wife Margarete, children Nancy, Joseph, James W., Margaret Malinda (Linnie), Missouri (Dora), Mary A. and Elizabeth.

SNIDER CEMETERY

The cemetery is located some two miles south of Kennedale, about 1/2 mile north and 1/4 mile west of the intersection of New Hope and Hudson-Village Creek roads. There is no gate, path or road leading to it, nor any evidence that any care has been given for years. The 45-acre pasture (a part of the original Snider grant) belongs to Mrs. J. H. Hudson of Fort Worth. No doubt it was an open space at one time, but the entire area is now covered with trees, brush and brambles. There are a few upright monuments and several broken slabs and fragments. It appears that someone has dug up one of the graves. It has been said that there were one hundred burials here, but there is certainly no indication of that at the present time.

In June 1983, a Texas historical marker, commemorating the cemetery, was erected near Joel Snider's stone, but no clean-up nor restoration work was done. In the fall of 1984, the Tarrant County Historical Commission erected a chain link fence around the cemetery.

1. Samford Family Bible record received from Mrs. Lucille Jasper, Nacogdoches, Texas.
2. Letter from Dana Garrison, Lakewood, Col., Oct. 1986. "We think we have found the names of Joel and Belinda Snider's two older daughters. The oldest was Ruth, born ca 1828, married James McCain Hughes ca 1844. She must have died within a year, since her son, Ennis, aged 5 years, was living with his Grandmother Hughes in 1850 (Shelby County, Texas 1850 census.) In 1848 James Hughes m/2 Elizabeth Samford, youngest child of William Jasper Samford.

The second girl was Rebecca, born ca 1830, married Meridith Webb, ca 1847. He was 28 years older, and already had a large family.

He lived in Tennessee in 1820 and 1830, but was in the Republic of Texas by 1840.

3. A Shelby County, Texas cemetery list names "Wm. Snider, died October 1849 of a fever age 18." He is probably buried in the Wimberly-Rayburn Cemetery.

4. An Epsy Snider is shown in the Joel Snider household in 1850, born in 1835 in Alabama.

5. Robert Turner is also shown on the 1850 Shelby County, Texas census.

6. Dana Garrison writes, "It is amazing to me that my great grandmother gave her child the [apparent] father's name - a James Morris family, in 1870 lived two doors from the Sniders. Jenny Morris married Dr. J. C. Hudson, a descendent of Howell and Jeanette Hudson and lived a long and prosperous life. She died in 1947 and the tallest stone in the Hudson Cemetery, Kennedale, Texas, is for Dr. J. C. Hudson and wife "M. Jeanetta." On one side is the name Matilda Turner, who died in 1927.

7. The *Personal Memoirs* of William Henry Hardin give much information about this family. His father, Rufus, was a son of John Dickson Hardin, early-day citizen of Shelby County. John D. Hardin was a brother to Jeanette Hardin Hudson, Joel Snider's second wife.

8. Her tombstone bears the inscription "Grandma Carpenter."

9. Jeannette (her name had various spellings) was the widow of Howell Hudson who was killed in the Moderator-Regulator War in Shelby County in 1842. She had six children by her first husband, and, as noted, three of them were living in the Snider household in 1850.

10. Elkanah Snider married Cynthia Scott, daughter of Martin Phillip Scott. He did not stay long in Tarrant County, since the family was living in Lavaca County, Texas in 1870.

11. Article published in *Fort Worth Star Telegram* December 31, 1925.

Dear Brother and Sister.

I seat myself to write you a few lines to let you know where I am and how I am getting along. We live in Tarrant County now but our home is in Parker County. We went back to Arkansas last July a year ago. We stayed till last February. When we got back our farm was rented out and we rented land in Tarrant County and made a crop. We are hurrying to gather our crop so we can go home. We haven't got much family only three.

Mr. (Mrs.?) Hardgrave, myself and one child

Bally (?) Willis is married. I left him in Arkansas. That was a great trial on me, but I get along best I can. We can't have things as we want them all the time. Well Andy I will be glad to see you all. I want you to come and see us. We would be glad to see you. I got a letter from Sister Lucy today. She wrote that She got a letter from her Father. She said She sent him some money. I guess he is in bad circumstances. By that he wrote he had a boy ten years old. He wrote he wanted to see all his children before he died. I also got a letter from Brother John Smith and Lucky today. They wrote they was all well but Mother and the baby. Mother was getting better. She had got so she could walk up to Brother De. The baby had the same complaint she said he was bad off. De's wife has another boy at their house. Sister Nancy has twins, a boy and a girl. She is getting better in her old age. Tell Jack and Lizia (?) I don't know what I would do if I could see them and the children. Tell them to write to them and let me know how they are getting along. Andy, I have seen a good many ups and downs since I saw you. Sister Lu wrote to me about your misfortune. I can simpithise with you in your trouble. Write and let me know how your are getting along and tell me how many children you have and their names. Send me your pciture and your childrens.

Andy we live is about one mile from Birdville and five miles from Fort Worth. Direct your letters to Birdville Tarrant County Texas. Well I have wrote all I can think of to write now, so I will close. So good by for this time, write and let me know how David is getting along.

Who were parents of her husband Abram (James Abraham?) Lee, born 1796, Pennsylvania, died after 1860, Indiana. Was he son of John Lee?

Need names of parents of William George Garrison, born 1835 Georgia, married Mary Elizabeth Wilson 1865, Upshur County, Texas, CSA soldier, died 1910, Texas. Who were parents of Mary Elizabeth's parents, Martha L. Pruitt, born 1825 Georgia, and George W. Wilson, born 1826 Georgia, married 1844, Georgia? Both died Montague County, Texas.

Need name of wife and names of parents of Preacher Hugh G. Hodges, born ca 1790 South Carolina, married 1820 Marion County, South Carolina died ca 1843 Sumter County, Alabama.

2-3-90 LEWIS, O'HAIR

Need to find family history written and published by Byron Anderson Lewis in Dallas in the 1930's. It concerns the Lewis family from Marion County, Tennessee, who came to Ellis County, Texas, about 1890. Does anyone have anything on O'Hair families?

COMMENT: The Lewis book may be in the Sims Library in Waxahachie. We believe that Mrs. M. S. Carruth's Genealogical Research Library has been defunct for a number of years, as she is deceased. There were O'Hair/O'Hares in Rusk County, Texas by 1850. They had lived in Illinois ca 1836-1839 and were in Texas by 1840.

3-3-90 MASON, LYNN, ATWELL, ROGERS, RILEY
 Mrs. William Mason, 805 W. Murphy, Colleyville, TX 76034

Need names of parents and siblings of Thompson/Thos. Mason, who married ca 1853 (where?) Mary Ann Lynn, born ca 1832 Missouri. He was not in Texas in 1850; where did he come from? She was daughter of Isaac Lynn of Hunt County, Texas, in 1850. By 1855 the Thompson Masons, the Lynns, Rileys, and others came to Parker County, then to Jack County soon after. In 1858 Thompson and Mary Ann were killed by Indians in Jack County. Their two small sons survived: Alexander Tobe Mason, born ca 1855, and Oliver Cleaver Mason, born ca 1857 (according to the 1860 census of Jack County). They were living with their Lynn grandparents. Where were these two boys in 1870? Alexander married (1) Hattie E. Atwell (divorced); married (2) Matilda Rogers. Milton married Rachel Riley, daughter of Henry and Sarah Riley.

4-3-90 BRANDON, HUDDLESTON, CLARK

Wish to correspond with anyone working on Brandon-Huddleston surnames. I have much information and will share. Richard Day Brandon, born 18 December 1844, Lawrence County, Arkansas, married 22 October 1865 near Birdville, Texas, Martha H. Clark, born 20 September 1844. Who were her parents?

COMMENT: The 1880 Tarrant County census (ED 99, p. 9, #71-72) indicates that your Martha M. (Clark) Brandon was born in Illinois and her parents born in Virginia. The 1870 census indicates she was born in Illinois (Pct 1, p. 130, #947-949). There were a number of Clarks on the 1860 tax roll of Tarrant County, including one Presley H. Clark who owned lots in the town of Birdville, but his daughter Martha "Mattie" was age 11 in 1870 and could not have been your Martha. Presley's father was James Clark, born South Carolina, went from there to Kentucky, to Illinois, then to Texas by ca 1856. One Clark family, of the Birdville area, was that of Alexander Broy Clark, Sr., whose known children were born in Patrick Co., Virginia, in the 1840s, but we find no indication they were ever in Illinois. They were in Grayson Co. Texas, by 1862, when A. B. Sr., died, and by 1870 his widow, three sons and a daughter were in Tarrant County. Son A. B. Jr. had married Abigail E. Hust, daughter of John A. Hust, of the Birdville general area. The widow, Sarah (nee Gaines), and some of her family are buried in the Birdville Cemetery. Some of the other Clarks are buried at Smithfield, not far from Birdville.

5-3-90 HERNDON, DEGRAFFENREID, HIGHTOWER

Joseph William Herndon, son of Joseph and Mary "Polly" J. (DeGaffenreid) Herndon, was born in Missouri ca 1844. Joseph and Mary left

Jasper County, Missouri, after 1856, were enumerated in Carolina community, Falls County, Texas, 1860 with children James William 16, Vincent 15, Henry H. 11, Massie A. (F) 10, Cynthia A. 7, Sarah J. 4. Two older children, Mary and Martha, married prior to 1860.

Joseph William enlisted 15 January 1862 at Waco, McLennan County, for service with the Confederacy, Pvt. Co. I 1st Regt Heavy Artillery. He was transferred September 1864 to Co. F "detailed by Labor Bureau as a Wagon Maker." In November 1865 he married Louisa Hightower in Falls County, Texas. The 1870 census places them in Bosque County. He is 27, she is 19, sons Joseph 3 and twins John and Henry born April 1870. In the fall of 1870 they moved to pre-empted land in Comanche County, Texas, Hazeldell Community. What became of them after that? Help appreciated.

6-3-90 HARVEY, MALONE, MOORE
B. F. Harvey, 1540 N. Vista Ave., Rialto CA 92376

Seeking information on George Harvey, married to Miriah Malone, both born in Tennessee 1830 and 1833, respectively. George's mother's first name may have been Nancy. George and family lived in Kaufman County, Texas, in 1860 and in Collin County, Texas 1870-80. Where were the Harveys located at the time of their death and where buried? Who were George and Mariah's parents?

William H. Moore, born in Virginia September 4, 1816, died October 12, 1881, buried with wife Mary A. at Mt. Pleasant Cemetery near Tolar, Hood County, Texas. Only records I have are a picture of their tombstones and his family as listed on the 1880 census of Hood County.

COMMENT: Hood County marriages show Savannah Moore and Robert N. Hobson took license to marry 19 October 1880, but no return is given. He was Robert Nutt Hobson, son of Nat H. and Eliza (May) Hobson who had lived in Mississippi and Arkansas prior to Texas. Some buried in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery. In 1974 Hazel Tarkington, Rt 1, Box 125, Greenwood, Arkansas 72936, was interested in the Nat H. Hobson family; they lived in Columbia County, Arkansas, in 1860 (Clay Twp.). If she has worked on any allied families, she may know something of the Moores. In Hood County George Ann Moore married J. E. Sargeant on 3 April 1888. She was likely his second wife, as his wife in 1880 was Cordelia.

8-3-90 RHODES, GREEN, STONE, HILL

Betty Rhodes Gerth, 119 W. Josephine St., Weatherford TX 76086

Searching for descendants of Nancy Ann Rhodes who married Frank F. Green ca 1870, most probably Erath County, Texas. No proof. Courthouse fire. She was born in Hunt County, Texas 1853, the daughter of Matilda Stone and Johnathon Willis Rhodes. Martin R. Rhodes, her brother and my grandfather, was born in 1855, Hunt County also. In 1860 mother and children are found in Erath County near her family. She lists her name as Hill, but no spouse is in the household, is never on a census with her. In 1870 mother and three sons are listed, Martin, Jim and John Hill. Nancy isn't in the household. In 1880 Nancy and her family are next door to her mother and brothers in Comanche County. She and Frank have three children. After that we cannot find Nancy and her family. When and where did Nancy and Frank Green die? Where buried? Our little Stone family cemetery at Proctor, Texas, has a great many fieldstones with no information on them. Are they there?

Josiah and his wife Betsy Rhodes are found along with Silas Rhodes on the 1850 census for Hunt County. Are Silas and Josiah brothers? They were both born in Indiana and are three years apart in age. Betsy reports her birthplace as Indiana, she and Josiah were married in Hopkins County, Texas, in 1847. My great-grandfather Johnathon Willis Rhodes, is also in Hunt County in 1850 although not in the same household. Is he also a brother? He lists his birthplace as Arkansas. Need names of Willis Rhodes parents and siblings. Any help will be appreciated, and will exchange.

COMMENT: In 1972 Mrs. Rex Millhollon, 200 Winfield, Houma, LA 70360, was working on the Stone line of Rusk, Erath and Comanche Counties, Texas. She was interested in Martin and Nancy Stone, relatives of your Matilda, whose daughter, Malinda Ann married Thomas Blount Stark and went west to Runnells and/or Tom Green Counties ca 1880s. However, the Starks are buried in the Stone Cemetery, Comanche Co. Matilda Stone Rhodes must have married second ca 1859-60 H. T. Hill, as her tombstone in the Stone Cemetery indicates she was his wife. I find no H. T. Hill on any 1860 census of our research area. Her Hill sons were born ca 1861 and 1863. Perhaps her husband died CSA?

In 1850 Willis Rhodes was living in the household of William and Malinda Stone, who were later in Comanche County. Could Malinda have been nee Rhodes? Both she and Willis were born in Arkansas according to the census.

Mississippi; Margaret 15 born Mississippi; Sarah A. 14 born Mississippi; Mary E. 10 born Texas; Samuel 6 born Texas; Ida 1 born Texas. There were two other children in household, Frances Vanderpool, 8 born Texas, Martha Vanderpool 6 born Texas. According to a letter Wilson wrote to his mother in 1872 in McNairy County, Tennessee, he had another son named Joseph Asbury born 1871. I do not find any of this family on the 1880 Texas census, but I do find a Joseph Whitaker on the 1900 census in Bandera County, Texas, with mother Sarah M. Their ages and birth places match. Also I find them on the 1910 census there.

Wesley Whitaker, brother to Wilson, was born 1848 in Mississippi. He married Sarah S. E. Chambers in 1865 McNairy County, Tennessee. He is listed as Wm. Whitaker on the 1880 Denton County census, age 33, wife Sarah age 33, children: John 13, Eliz 10, Dona 8, all born Tennessee. I have not been able to locate any of this family after this census. Please, can anyone out there help me? Will exchange information.

Wish to contact descendants of following: Jonas Harrison, born 1777, Woodbridge Twp, New Jersey; died Shelby County, Texas, 1836, married Ellenor Shannon in Georgia 1820. Ellenor died in Tarrant County, near Arlington, August 17, 1877. Children were Margaret, born ca 1822; Jonas c 1823; Jacob ca 1825; John ca 1826; Dewitt Clinton 1827; Thomas ca 1829-31; William Henry 1833; Almira 1836. Margaret Harrison married William Thomas in Shelby County ca 1820. They moved to Tarrant County, near Arlington, in 1850. Children included Ellen, born 1842; Hampton ca 1845; W. T. ca 1848; and Almira 1850. Margaret died in Tarrant County in 1857, and William Thomas remarried. I am seeking names of parents of William Thomas; born ca 1818 - in South Carolina? William arrived in East Texas in 1834, and received a Republic of Texas land grant. Will exchange information.

COMMENT: Margaret and William must have married ca 1840. From the Tarrant County tax rolls, it appears that John Harrison was in the county by 1851. The following persons appear on the rolls, for the first time in 1853: Eliner, Jonas, T. J. and Jacob Harrison, and William Thomas, the latter taxed for 320 acres of the Solomon Davis Survey (Arlington area). D. C. appears in 1855 and William Harrison in 1856. None of the Harrisons were taxed for any land 1851-1856. William Thomas was still taxed for the 320 acres of the Solomon Davis Survey in 1855, but by 1860 he owned only 170 acres of that survey and also owned 320 acres of the Mahulda Harris Survey and 36 acres of the Joel Blackwell Survey; these three surveys neighbored, in a line (see survey map, Arlington area.)

In 1860 Jonas Harrison was taxed for 160 acres of the Jno [sic] Daniel Survey, on Village Creek; this survey is shown as the James M. Daniel Survey on the map. D. C. Harrison patented his own 160-acre survey

in 1859, and John Harrison patented the 320-acre John Smith Survey; both surveys west of Village Creek, near West Fork. The mother, Eleanor Harrison, is on the 1853 and 1854 tax rolls but not thereafter. These families were still in Shelby County in 1850 and apparently arrived in Tarrant County ca 1853, where John was already located since ca 1851. Jonas Harrison, with one school-age child, was listed in District 8 of the 1854 Tarrant County School census; also William Harrison with two school-age children.

Known children: James L., born 1850, Izard County, Arkansas, married Missouri E. and lived in Hamilton County, Texas, may have married twice; known children: William C., Rosalie, Lyda and James Allen. Martha J., born 1863 Texas. Dora A., born 1870 Texas, married Andrew J. Hamm circa 1893, children: Arvil? born April 1887, and Leonard, born Nov 1898. A. B.'s widow, Amanda A., was living with Andrew J. Hamm (1900 census.) Will exchange information. All on 3 1/2 disks.

Coleman); Catherine, (m. William P. Whitaker;) Rebecca Wilcox, (m. Robert B. Evans); Margaret Hester, (m. Ashley H. Denton;) and Robert Wilson. The Murchison family lived in Tennessee, moved to Lafayette County, Miss. about 1835, and about 1848 moved to Rusk County, Texas. COMMENT: Some years ago Mr. Tom Jarvis of Dallas was interested in the Denton family. He mentioned that John Bunyan Denton (for whom Denton County is named) had a son, Ashley N. Denton, who lived in Weatherford in 1895, and that a letter he wrote is in a collection in the Detroit Public Library. *Parker County Frontier Days*, Centennial Celebration, 1856-1956, Official Souvenir Program (68 pp.) has the story of Ashley N. Denton, a medical student, who killed Weatherford Mayor John W. Curtis in 1858, was tried and acquitted in the spring of 1859. We do not find Denton on a Parker County census 1860-80. In 1880 Dr. Ashley N. Denton and wife Margaret H. lived in Hays Co.

Precinct 6, #122. Possibly, Mr. Jarvis may know something of their descendants.

To Shelby County, Illinois 1832/33 where second son, Phenias (Finnis) (Phias) E., born. First wife died and he married Nancy Ellen Nichols 6 September 1841. Son, James Robert P. born to them in 1847. Moved to Ellis County, Texas 1855/56. James Robert P. married Charity Margaret Johnson, daughter of Simon Johnson, about 1868. Their children: Emily J. born 1872, Nancy Ellen 1875, Charity Margaret 1877, and James Robert April 1878. James F. Smith was in the 1880 Tarrant County, Texas census. Last known information. Believe Nancy Ellen Nichols had brother, Sebert (Liebert) who served in the Civil War from Ellis/Johnson County, Texas.

COMMENT: Ellis County marriages show James F. Smith married Charity Johnson 6 March 1866. S. Nichols (34, Ind.) and wife Mary E. are on 1870 census Johnson County. She is probably the same as Martha E. Nichols who died 1870, buried Moss Cemetery, Johnson Co. Sebert Nichols married (2) in Johnson County, F. A. Turman 4 September 1872. Fannie A., wife of Sebert Nichols, born 11 October 1840, died 5 June 1907, is buried in Bethesda Cemetery. William W. Nichols married 11 January 1864, Sara I. or J. Johnson (Ellis County Marriages); she was probably daughter of Simon Johnson. Simon Johnson's 160-acre survey, which he patented in 1859, is on the Johnson-Tarrant County line, below Rendon, next to the William Nichols 160-acre survey, which Nichols patented in 1859. William Nichols and J. F. Smith appear on the 1860 tax roll of Tarrant County. James F. Smith and Nancy E. may have lived in this area, near the Tarrant-Johnson line; in 1880 they were in Precinct 8 which included the area. In 1860 and 1870 they would have had Red Oak Post Office (Ellis County), since during that time the county line was Tarrant-Ellis. A large northeastern triangle of present Johnson County was part of Ellis County until 1871.

M., Josephine, G.A., Dora, John B., Edward C., Lina, Littleton, Unity, Messer, Lucinda, Jordenia, Ely. Came from Kentucky, Tennessee and Alabama.

Campbell families came to Anderson and maybe other counties in Texas from Washington County, Arkansas, and Bedford, Marshall, and Lincoln Counties, Tennessee. Children: Josephine, married William Thomas Helm; John Lee born 1864; Maggie (Margaret), married Charles McKinzie; Tennessee, married Marcus Avant; Claudia; L.W.; Maud, married Mr. Lincoln; C. H. Campbell; Greenberry; Solomon; Jarret; Arthur.

John Findley married as the first of his three wives, on 25 December 1831, possibly Texas, Mahala Finley (his first cousin), a daughter of Samuel and Martha Downing Finley. John and Mahala were the parents of nine children whose names we do not know. We would like to add these children to the family book.

COMMENT: The size of Texas makes it difficult to research without some idea as to a possible locale, a time period, family name or other clue from which to work. Even the names of the other two wives might be a clue. If John Finley married in Texas in 1831, it is doubtful that you can find a marriage record, as Texas was then part of Mexico.

Joseph Holcomb (1833-1903?) and wife Angelina Hollingshead had children: Edana, Lavada, John Thomas, Mary, George Andrew, Matilda, Stanland (Bud) and Lillian. William Mindst Holcomb and wife Mary Ann Godwin had children: Janie, Julia, Hettie, Truman Alvin and Callie Belle. Mary Ann celebrated her 100th birthday in Fort Worth on 26 December 1942. All of these families at one time resided in Texas. Will appreciate hearing from anyone who has information on them.

COMMENT: As stated above, the size of Texas makes it difficult to research without a locality or a time frame. Do you know from what other states these people came? Any such clue might help to associate them with other Holcomb families in Texas.

Would like to locate James Francis Marion "Frank" Smith on 1870 and 1880 census. His oldest brother John Holcum Smith and John's wife, Rosanna, took Frank and the young children to Texas from Columbia County, Arkansas, after their parents' death during the Civil War. The parents were Gilbert and Catherine Hambrick Smith, and the other siblings were Martha J., William "Bud", and Sarah Catherine Smith. Mattie and Sallie were on 1880 Johnson Co., Texas census, and John and Frank on 1900 Johnson County census. By 1863, Frank married Mary Jane Flippin in Comanche County, Texas. Will reimburse for postage and copies.

Seeking names of parents of Alfred William A. Lemons who was born ca 1859 in Missouri. First record on him is his marriage license dated 1879 in Montgomery County, Arkansas, where he married Amanda Florence Carder. They lived in Polk County, Arkansas; Louisiana; Texas; Indian Territory (Oklahoma); and perhaps Missouri when Will was a young boy? His other wives were: Clara Hillsberry, Ada White, and Mattie Redding, widow of Mr. Chambers. Will also went by an alias "Burrell Odenwood" while living in Indian Territory. He died in 1920's, place unknown. Need names of parents, place and date of death.

COMMENT: The only one of these Smiths we find on the 1870 census is Sallie, age 13, born Arkansas, living in the household of Jesse Gray (Beat #1, Cleburne PO, hh #167-268); they lived next door to W. H. Gray, age 60, from Arkansas. Martha J. Smith married in Johnson County 10 June 1872 T. A. Flippin; apparently his wife, Mary L., had died 1870-71. Sallie C. Smith married in Johnson County 8 August 1878 Jasper Hestand/Hestland. Both the Flippins and Hestands are on the 1880 census of Johnson County. In 1971 Mrs. E. E. Fenn, Rt 1, Blum TX 76627, was interested in Thomas A. Flippin and wife Martha Smith, whose children were James Thomas, William F., and John Boone Flippin. Perhaps she did work on the Smith connections also. She stated that Martha died in Johnson County in 1883.

Would like to exchange information on Nathaniel French, born 1794 in South Carolina and wife Nancy Jane. They lived in Denton County, Texas (Lake Dallas area) from 1844 and after 1850. Children: Oliver M., James P., Nancy Jane, Mary, Michael A., Rosanna and others.

COMMENT: It is doubtful that Nathaniel French arrived in the area before 1847. Seymour Connor's *Peters Colony of Texas* indicates their arrival prior to 1 July 1848. Ralph H. Barksdale's lists of Peters Colonists for those arrivals prior to 1 July 1844 and those between 1 July 1844 and 1 July 1845, found in the *Colonization Papers* (Folder 8, 25 pp.) in the Archives Division, Texas State Library, Call No. 2-9/25, do not show any of this French family. 1847 is the earliest any of them appear on the tax rolls for Denton County.

One Lefford French is on Barksdale's list of arrivals prior to 1 July 1844. He was married, had one cabin, no children with him, lived at Head of Elm Fork of Trinity and Mineral in the Cross Timbers, Fanning [sic] County. According to Connor, Lefford's claim to colony land was disallowed in 1857. This man was likely descended from the Frenches of New Jersey who went to Spartanburg District, SC, and Rutherford Co. NC. One Lafford French, born 1753, died 1834 in North Carolina. The Frenches of Navarro County, Texas, were descendants of one Lafford French. Mrs. Wilna Powell Sawyer, Rt 1, Box 194, Itasca TX 76055, was working on this family some 15 or 20 years ago.

Would like to exchange information on Joseph P. Sutton, born 1831 in Green County, Illinois, and wife Nancy Jane French lived in Denton County, Lake Dallas area, from 1847 to 1891. Children: Sarah C., Ambers L., Nancy Evaline, Louisa Ellen, Andrew, Lydia Jane, Mary L., John D., Emma Etta, and Laura Bell. Also Edmond Sutton, born 1785 South Carolina and wife Sarah. They lived in Denton County, Lewisville area, from 1847 to December 1850. Children: Vinson R., Jessee, James, Jerutha, John D., Joseph P. and more.

COMMENT: Edmund Sutton is on the Denton County tax rolls 1847 through 1849. One L. T. Higgins appears on subsequent rolls as "Agent for Edmond Sutton, Dec'd." Joseph P. Sutton apparently arrived prior to the others, as he appears on Ralph H. Barksdale's Peters Colony list as having arrived, with family, in 1845. The others came in 1847. Joseph P. Sutton sold his Peters Colony certificate and apparently went to Arkansas by 1850, or 1853 at the latest, then to Illinois by ca 1857, not returning to Denton County, Texas, until ca 1865 (see 1870 census, Denton County, p. 37, #271-281, child-ladder of his family).

ACROSS THE EDITOR'S DESK



LETTER FOUND IN AN OLD TRUNK

Contributed by Sophia Childs Kelley

Thomas (Tom) Norris Oxsheer (1861-1935) was the grandson of John and Sarah Stockman Norris (1811-1856); the son of W. E. and Mary Jane Norris Oxsheer (1839-1885).

Tom Oxsheer drove cattle from Nacogdoches County [Texas] to an area near Stacy, Texas, in the summer of 1900. His wife, Sophia Weatherly, and their four children, Jennie, Ada, Cora and Lela, followed by train. Because no house was available, the family camped on the San Saba River (evidently near Stacy, Texas) where one of Tom's cousins, Bill Brown, lived. (William Albert Brown was a son of Julia Ann Norris and James Walker Brown. He married Sarah Emma Bond in 1896.) At the end of summer, Sophia and the children returned home, and after trading cattle for horses, Tom returned in December. This letter was written by Emma Bond Brown.

Stacy, Texas Dec. 6, 1900
Mrs. Sophia Oxsheer

Dear friend and cousin

I will ans your most welcome letter - I was glad to hear from you and that you got home safely - this leaves all well - hope it finds you the same. I know you are anxious to hear from Tom - Well he traded his cattle to Bill for horses - gave one head for one of horses so he nearly cleaned us out - he started for home on the 4 - two days ago - he is going to drive - got Lewis Trott to go with him - he thinks to get home by Christmas 0 he has a very nice bunch of horses but I like the cows best - we are milking chessie (?) - they all look very well 0 the neighbors are all well - Asora White is married - she got a Whetstone so I guess she will be sharp when she roosts on a Whetstone.

Well I will have to close as it is getting late and l have to go to the store - John came Just now - I told him I was writing to you - he said me love cuddin Sophie - I have never had the pictures taken - will send you one when l do - Write soon - tell the children to write to me.

THE RICHARD SANSOM FAMILY
OF WILLIAMSON COUNTY, TEXAS

Mary Agnes Cooper, wife of Richard Sansom, was the daughter of Matthew Delamere Cooper of Columbia, Tennessee, and the granddaughter of Capt. Robert Cooper, a Revolutionary soldier of Fishing Creek, South Carolina. Her father was a wealthy cotton merchant who had commission houses in Memphis and New Orleans and had served as a first lieutenant under his personal friend, General Andrew Jackson, in the Battle of New Orleans. Cooper loaned Jackson money to pay his troops. Two of these notes of \$1000 each, which Jackson never paid, are extant. Matthew Cooper set up a commission house in Waco, and Mary's brothers, Duncan and Flavel Frierson Cooper, were to manage it. However, it was sold because Flavel died of yellow fever in New Orleans. During the Civil War, Matthew Cooper watched as a Confederate officer in New Orleans gave orders to set fire to his warehouse (housing over a million dollars worth of cotton) so that the Yankees could not take it. It was a trauma that Cooper never overcame. His home, Mulberry Hill, in Columbia, Tennessee, today is listed on the National Trust.

Mary and Richard Sansom settled in Georgetown, Texas about 1851. Her father was greatly concerned about her health and happiness "in the wild West," and insisted that his son, Henry (then U. S. Senator from Tennessee) visit her. The following letter reports on the trip. (The Mr. Swenson mentioned therein, was the second husband of Jeanette Sansom, a half-sister of Richard Sansom.)

Shelbyville, Tennessee
March 31, 1855

My dear Father,

I returned from my late visit to Texas about two weeks since. I left home the seventh day of February last for Texas to see Dick and Molly in their far off Western home. I was detained about three days in New Orleans waiting for the Texas Steamer.

After leaving New Orleans, I crossed the Gulf on board of a steamship to Galveston - in the appearance I was greatly disappointed as in fact I was in the appearances of all the towns and cities through which I passed while in Texas.

We spent a day in Galveston and then proceeded by steamer to Houston, where I remained a day and then took the stage for Austin, a distance of two hundred miles where we arrived after three days travel. Austin is the Capitol - considered by Texans the prettiest city in Texas - but wherein its beauty consisted I did not observe or was unable to comprehend. Here I met with Mr. Swenson who kindly furnished me with a conveyance by which I reached Dick's that night a distance of eighteen miles.

I found Molly and the family all well - seem to be happy and content. Dick was a little low spirited from having spit blood several times. He is fully impressed with the belief that he is suffering under confirmed consumption - consequently will not live long, however he looked pretty well when I was there.

He is a devoted temperance man, and has been for sometime. He is also a regularly ordained Elder in the Presbyterian Church, and is a good man. I believe he is a changed man from what he was while he remained here.

They live as nearly like all Texans I saw - rough and without many of the comforts of life, yet they seem quite happy and contented. They, in fact, live in better style than any of their neighbors. Dick owns a fine rich farm of something over five hundred acres of land, two hundred and fifty of it woodland, and remainder prairie. He owns, he told me, about forty-five head of Jacks and Jennies and also about twenty head of fine mules. He makes, he says, about sixteen hundred bushels of corn to the acre.

He has sold all of his own Negroes, but still has those which you gave to Molly, at least he has all that are now living. Judy died a month or two before I reached there in childbed, leaving one child which is still living. Doph lost the youngest child which I was there - teething. I had a copy of the [slave] deeds, which I procured when I was in Maury [County] last and had them registered.

Molly has three living children, all boys. Her youngest she calls Richard Henry, and is, I think, the finest looking of all her children.

I could not induce either of them to visit Tennessee this summer, but they say they will in the next year if they live and nothing happens.

I returned by way of Matagorda Bay and reached home ten days after leaving Dick's.

Your affectionate son
/s/ Henry Cooper

On October 16, 1856, Judge William Frierson Cooper, eldest son of Matthew D. Cooper, wrote to his father:

"I learned from Henry, as he returned through Nashville, that our hopeful brother-in-law had determined to return to Texas. I felt pretty well satisfied from my last conversation with him that such was his determination. The *dolce far niente*, in plain English 'do-nothing' life, of that land where people do live without money and can live without much real labor, was too attractive to be given up, for even the certainty of competence here, attended as it would be by the restraints of civilization, and friendly supervision. I presume the whole object of his trip was to 'raise the wind.' I regret this second flight into the wilderness. Howbeit, we cannot see into the future, and "God Tempers the wind to the shorn lamb."

NOTE:

Regardless of the opinions of Mary Cooper Sansom's father and brothers, Dick Sansom did not lead a "do-nothing life." He continued his law practice and farmed; entered into a mercantile business under the name of Anderson, Clamp and Sansom, later withdrawing from the partnership and going into business for himself. In 1868 he was elected Treasurer of Williamson County and in 1875 was a delegate from his district to the Constitutional Convention. He helped in establishing the schools of Williamson County and gave financial assistance to the county's first newspaper.

* Eugene Cooper, orphaned at twelve, was educated by Col. Duncan Cooper (Mary Sansom's brother) a newspaperman of Columbia and Nashville, Tennessee. Eugene came to Georgetown in 1876 and founded and edited the *Williamson County Sun*, a weekly newspaper, the first in the county.

INDIANS ON RAMPAGE IN DALLAS AREA

Editor's Note: This is an abstract of W. S. Adair's article published in *The Semi-Weekly Farm News* (Dallas, Texas) Friday, July 17, 1925.

"There were a few settlers in this part of the country when my grandfather, William Coombes, arrived at the Three Forks in March 1843," said Judge W. N. Coombes, former judge of the county court. "He left Kentucky, the old home of the family, in 1841, but stopped on Red River until December 1842, when he resumed his journey. Ordinarily ox teams could negotiate the distance from Red River to Dallas in less time than four months, but at the particular time of which I speak East Fork seems to have been on a spectacular rampage. For three months after the waters had subsided the bottoms were so muddy that they could not be crossed by wagons. All old timers, especially those who attempted to traverse Arkansas, knew what it was to be water bound.

"Arriving here two years after [John] Neely Bryan, the first settler, Grandfather's family was the next to settle west of the river. Another two [families] were those of George Leonard and Mr. Gilbert. The present Eagle Ford Road roughly marks the northern line of the section of land patented to Grandfather. It included all of Flanders Heights. Mr. Gilbert was leaving, and Grandfather bought his cabin. About the same time, Mr. Graham took a section farther out toward Mountain Creek, and thus kept the number of settlers west of the river up to three. The Comanches ran Grandfather's stock off three times. The three settlers with a friend or two from east of the river, followed the Indians on two occasions. The first time the fugitives got clean away. The next time the pursuers found Indian signs so thick north of Birdville that they deemed it better to double back. At least that was the account Grandfather handed down to us, with the explanation that the experienced frontiersman, no matter to what extent he might be spoiling for a fight, thought twice before he rushed into the Cross Timbers in pursuit of the Comanches. After that Grandfather enclosed with a bois d'arc hedge a corral for his stock, with his cabin in the middle of it. But the Indians came back no more, and it was never demonstrated whether the Comanches could break through bois d'arc entanglement. At that time the Indians had their village four miles this side of Handley, on a small tributary of West Fork, which, taking its name from its Indian associations is to this day known as Village Creek. Birdville, the original Army post west of the river, and the first county seat of Tarrant County, was and is six miles north east of Fort Worth. The army post was moved at an early day to Fort Worth and from there to Jacksboro. There were several stores at Birdville when it was there in 1868. The Indians at Village Creek were defeated in a battle of which the news has

already given a full account, and that put an end to Indian depredations this side of Fort Worth.

"Father bought Mr. Lanotte's dwelling in Reunion and we moved into it in 1864. Mr. Lanotte left the colony at that time and went to New Orleans. Reunion was the official designation of the settlement of the French who had taken lands under a grant from Peter's Colony, but it was known locally as Frenchtown. Father taught school at Reunion following the close of the Civil War and I was one of his pupils.

"We were living in Frenchtown at the time of the Great Flood in the Trinity in 1866. The waters completely covered the bottoms between Dallas and Frenchtown. Father and my uncle, Green Coombes, made a boat by nailing green, raw hides to a wooden frame, shaped like a skiff, and launched it in the backwater under the hill below Frenchtown near the present town of Cement City. They paddled the boat across to Dallas, but while they were uptown, somebody with a sharp knife cut holes in the bottom and sides of their boat rendering it unseaworthy. They recrossed the river the next day in the ferry boat which landed them on Beckley Road. Just after the flood Ezra Newton built a dwelling above high water mark on the Eagle Ford Road down the hill from Frenchtown. During the flood of 1908 the water stood four feet deep in his house.

"The first people who came to Texas settled in the timber along the streams. They did not cultivate much land, and they found it easier to make a clearing in the woods and to fence it than to fence and break the prairie for which they had neither timber or plows. In fact, but for barbed wire, I cannot conceive how the prairie of Texas could ever have been put in cultivation. John Neely Bryan took a survey on the east side of the river with the river for the western boundary and the John Grigsby league for the eastern. The western line of the Grigsby survey ran through the E. M. Kahn block. The following surveys are wholly or in part within the present corporate limits of Oak Cliff:[City of Dallas] Elizabeth Robertson, George L. Leonard, W. P. Overton, G. S. C. Leonard, Jim Robinson, E. C. Thomas, William Myers, W. M. Conover, J. P. Cole, W. M. Leonard, J. W. Wright, W. H. Hord, Narboe and two McDowell surveys. Some of these surveys were sections while others embraced only 160 acres.

"I well remember my first visit to Dallas. Father was home from the war on a furlough, and he brought me with him. We went to Clark and Bryant's store and after that to a photographer who took my picture. We moved to Dallas in 1867 and lived in a house near the Union Passenger Station. From the close of the War until the Houston and Texas Central Railroad came in 1872, and the Texas and Pacific the following year, the people demanded two dollars in greenback for one dollar of silver or gold. They could not become reconciled to greenbacks which had taken the place of Confederate money which in their estimation ought to be good enough for anybody.

"I put in part of my early life in running cattle. I went with the first herd that was driven into Knox County starting from Jack

County. The range in the Wichita Valley was still virgin. The mesquite grass was knee high, and our cattle and horses got fat in next to no time. The country was covered with deer and antelope, and the turkeys which roosted in chinaberry trees just out of reach of coyotes, were so thick that our cook knocked them off the roost with a stick in such numbers that we got tired of eating them. My last experience as a cowboy was in 1885, when I assisted in moving two herds from Uvalde County to the Big Bend region.

CIVIL WAR VETERAN IS ALSO WEST TEXAS PIONEER

I am sending a picture of my grandfather, R. D. (Uncle Dick) Brandon, taken at the age of 80 years, 5 months and 8 days. He was born in Arkansas Dec. 18, 1844, and moved to Tarrant County, Texas, in 1855.

He enlisted in the Confederate army at Fort Worth in March 1862, at the age of 17 years. He was in Gen. Thomas C. Hindman's Brigade, Company F, Seventh Regiment, under Capt. Dick Kennedy. He was in one battle at Parrakeet Bluff on Black River in Arkansas. He was discharged in August and went on the frontier in Palo Pinto County and served there twelve months, then joined Gen. Geno's Brigade, Company I, Col. Martin's Regiment, Fifth Texas Partisan Rangers and served under Capt. Archie Heart. He was in several skirmishes in Oklahoma in the summer of 1864, was with the Hay Party who captured 200 negroes, 100 white men near Cabin Creek, also in the skirmish which took place on Cabin Creek north of Fort Gibson, when the Confederates captured 1,800 mules, 200 wagons and a supply of provisions. Grandfather's horse was killed in this last skirmish. Only one man in the company, George Lewis, was killed. On Feb. 20, 1855, Grandfather, while in camp on Red River about where Texarkana now stands, took the smallpox and did not return to the army after his recovery.

He was married to Martha H. Clark, near Birdville, Texas, Oct. 22, 1865. To them were born fourteen children - seven boys and seven girls - nine of whom are still living. Two boys and two girls died in infancy, one other boy at the age of 40.

In 1887 Grandfather moved with his family to Brown County and from there to Nolan County in 1888 and settled the place where he now lives. Grandmother died Jan. 12, 1917, and on Aug. 16, 1918, he was married to Mrs. Martha Jane Martin. In the winter of the same year he lost his eyesight. His wife died May 12, 1924. A. A. Nicholson, well known beef buyer, was arrested in McKinney last week by the Deputy Sheriff of Tarrant County, charged with theft of some 45 cattle.

December 7, 1883

Washington authorities have changed the name of San Angela postoffice to San Angelo. Hopkins County farmers are making and marketing thousands of gallons of ribbon cane syrup. The Montague and Somerville stage was robbed yesterday about 4:30 in Black Hollow.

Local. Lost - about 10 days ago between Graham and Flint Creek - lady's new corset. Finder please return this office.

December 28, 1883

State Treasurer Lubbock was married on December 19th to Mrs. E. S. Porter of Austin.

Mr. F. D. Whitlock was killed last week near Jacksboro when a tree he cut fell on him.

Mr. Clay Rawkins, staying at the St. Johns Hotel in Fort Worth, was robbed of a gold watch and about \$175 in cash. He plans to sue the hotel's proprietor.

Prof. A. N. Edwards of Sulphur Springs will be in charge of our school beginning in January.

Holiday celebration--Large crowds attended the Christmas trees at the Methodist and Presbyterian churches. All the boys enjoyed fire crackers, Roman candles and sky rockets. R. E. Mabrey had a party at his house. The bazaar to raise money for an organ at the Episcopal Church netted \$130.00.

January 1, 1884

Mr. Wilson Copeland and Miss Susan Wadley, both of this county, were married on Thursday, 3rd inst.

Mrs. McLaren, mother of Mrs. W. S. McJemsey, died in Palo Pinto County on Friday, 4th inst.

January 18, 1884

Invitations have been issued for the marriage of Lt. Elias Chandler and Miss Carrie Vincenheller at Albany on the 16th.

February 1, 1884

Judge J. P. Simpson, who came to Texas in 1837, died recently near Bonham.

Charles Campbell of Jefferson has been appointed postoffice inspector for Texas.

February 8, 1884

Texas topics. The Denton pottery business is a success. Fort Worth is to have woolen mills. A fire at Gatesville burned 9 businesses. Cold weather at Galveston has severely injured the oleanders. The State Live Stock Association will meet in Austin next year. Attorney General John D. Templeton was married to Miss Lula Pope in Austin on January 30th.

Local. A. M. Johnson of Brown County was in Stephenville recently and gave a dark picture of the situation in that part of the state brought about by the wire cutters. Rich and poor suffer alike.

Mr. W. J. Peevler and Miss Dora Devasher were married on Thursday, Jan. 31st at the Methodist church, Rev. J. R. Nelson officiating. After the ceremony, an elegant supper was served at the residence of Mr. F. L. Voules followed by a dance given by Mr. W. A. Byrd.

February 15, 1884

Granbury College has 293 students enrolled - the largest ever. Add-Rann has about 400 and Thorp over 100 - all speaks well for Hood County.

Mr. W. V. Bigham and Miss Cora Woods were married in a quiet but happy ceremony at the residence of Mr. W. R. Bigham Tuesday afternoon. The bride, daughter of Judge Woods, is one of Graham's most popular young ladies, and the groom is a well known cattleman.

Dr. W. W. James and Miss Loula McCormick were married last Thursday evening at the Presbyterian Church. The decorations were under the supervision of Mrs. Robert Holman and the ceremony performed by Rev. R. S. Burwell. A splendid supper was served at Judge McCormick's

residence following the ceremony. The bride is the beautiful and accomplished daughter of Honorable A. P. McCormick.

March 14, 1884

Mrs. Mattie Glasgow, wife of Judge J. H. Glasgow, died on Wednesday, the 12th inst. after a brief illness. Services were conducted by Rev. J. R. Nelson with burial at Oak Grove Cemetery.

March 28, 1884

Mr. J. L. Alford of Finis died last Friday of typhoid fever and was buried with full Masonic honors.

April 10, 1884

Zack Rhea of Lost Valley died Monday 7th ult; leaves widow and two children as well as numerous friends.

George Miller, young lawyer, has moved to Graham from Baldwin, Mississippi.

Jimmy Gathins died yesterday at home of Mr. James Ligon.

April 17, 1884

They met and married in Ingham County, Michigan, April 6, 1856. Moved to Tarrant County, Texas ca 1882 and farmed in an area that later was a part of Fort Worth. They brought eight children with them to Texas, and lived out their lives in the Fort Worth area. Isaac's date of death is unknown. Adah died February 27, 1923 at 1011 Samuels Ave., Fort Worth. Their children were: Isaac Thomas, born 1857, married Elvira Clementine Perkins; Anna Edith, 1858, married Hardesty; Emma Gertrude 1862, married Cook; Hellena Marie, 1864, married Entwistle; Ethelda Gulnare 1868, married Drew; Constance Victoria, 1870, married Strohl; Ada Anabel, 1872, married Chapman; Frances Frederick 1875, married Eva? Any help you can provide will be greatly appreciated.

COMMENT: You probably know that "Clemmie" Perkins was daughter of Linton Perkins, who lived in Tarrant County 1860 and 1870, and was enumerated twice on 1880 census. Her older brother, Calvin Perkins, lived in Eastland County, and died in Abilene ca 1920. Anna Edith Wilson married John Hardisty, born 22 June 1840; she was his second

wife. Annie died 9 February 1910; both are buried in Birdville Cemetery. See Evelyn Cushman's *Cemeteries of Northeast Tarrant County*. Also see B. B. Paddock's *Northwest Texas* (1906 edition, 2 volumes) vol. 1, pp 137-138, biography of John Hardisty, which states that he married second on 1 November 1891 "Annie Wilson, born Ingham Co., Mich., daughter of Isaac Wilson who came to Texas in 1885." This is the date of their marriage shown in Tarrant County marriages.

Ethelda Wilson married W. H. Drew 24 October 1889, per Tarrant County marriages. I suspect he was of the early Smith Drew family who lived in north Tarrant County and in Denton County, are on 1860 and 1870 census of Denton County and 1880 census of Wise County. I. T. Wilson and Clemie Perkins married 23 July 1890, per Tarrant County marriages.

Alex Taylor, born in Texas, had a brother Calvin M., who lived in Bonham. Both served in the Confederacy. Calvin served in Stephens Regiment Company C, Alex served in Col. Sim's Regiment Company A, Cavalry of Texas. Family tradition says that Alex's great uncle was Zachary Taylor, the President. Alex married Martha Lavinia McGuire, and they had five children: Zachary M., lived at 1305 Texas Street, Fort Worth, when he died October 28, 1927; Emma; Will, married Lucy, one son; Miranda, died young; and my grandmother, Cathleen Mavornene, married Walter Lee Sessions from Azle, Texas, had five children, two of whom died in 1912. Tom Sessions married Joy Tatum, two sons, lived Dallas; Josephine married Arlington Shoemaker, 6 children; my mother, Pearl, born in Cisco 1910, married Dr. W. S. Dandridge. Would like to link up with my long lost relatives.

COMMENT: Since you know the units in which Alex and Calvin M. Taylor served during the Civil War, if you do not have their pension applications, do order them from Austin, for these applications give a lot of information. Apparently, Alex was in Eastland County, perhaps living with his daughter Callie Sessions, when he applied, and Calvin M. was in Fannin County.

Buried in Oakwood Cemetery, Cisco, is one Elizabeth, wife of Z. M. Taylor, born 11 November 1871, died 6 April 1922. Perhaps Zachary was then living in Eastland County and was in Fort Worth by 1927, when his father Alex was with him.

I would certainly check the 1880 Soundex to locate Alex in that year, as he is bound to have had children under the age of 10. Also check the 1900 and 1910 Soundexes to find him on those censuses. And if he was born in Texas, you might check Mrs. Carpenter's four volumes on 1850 census of Texas, searching for a Taylor family who had sons Alex and Calvin. Taylor is a very common name, and Texas is a very large state, so your first priority is to learn where to search for a given time period.

The 1910 census indicates that the John W. and Mary Robertson family were living in Elsinore City, California. John, 77, born New York; Mary, 65, born Rhode Island; five children living, three listed: Edd J., John, and Caroline, all three born in State of Washington. What were the names of the other two children?

Daniel Vaughn, born 1846 Arkansas, wife Annie born 1849, Texas, were parents of Robert, Nettie and William H., living in Voting Precinct No. 8 on the 1900 census of Parker County, Texas. What was the name of their fourth child? William's wife was named Mary, and their children were: Bernie, Alvie, May, Annie, and William. Where did these families move?

 COMMENT: I would think that three successive censuses of Parker County, 1860, 1870 and 1880, should make it safe to assume that Ruth (Stratton) Robertson was the daughter of L. A. and Tennessee Jane Stratton. In 1860 the Stratton's daughter R. was age 2, born Arkansas; in 1870 their daughter Rutha was age 13, born Arkansas. In 1880 she was not with the family, but Ruthy, wife of Joseph Robertson, was age 21, born Arkansas. Wasn't Joseph Robertson related to A. E. Robertson who was in Parker County by 1870, and to Missouri Robertson, step-daughter of James R. Pritchard of Parker County 1880?

9-4-90 RABORN, RAYBURN, FLEMING, FANNIN, THOMPSON, LONG, GREEN

Lilla P. Lewis, 3302 - 31st, Lubbock TX 79410

My early ancestors to Texas were the Raborns, Rayburns, Flemings, Fannins, and Thompsons. They had land in the Roanoke area. Several are buried in the Sweets Chapel Cemetery in Tarrant County. This line, from my maternal line. Tarrant from my paternal line. If anyone needs information on Tarrant, I will be pleased to help.

One Green Long is buried in a cemetery in Lewisville, Texas. I need the inscription from the marker. I believe that this is my maternal grandfather. If so, he was with the Sharpshooters from Mississippi during the War between the States.

COMMENT: Many of us who are FWGS members of long standing remember Lilla, who has been a member of our society for many years and has done much research on the Tarrant line, as well as other area families. She has also helped many people. Perhaps some of our North-

east Tarrant County or Lewisville area members will be able to locate and copy the tombstone for her. Incidentally, there were two other Longs in Denton County 1870, one in the Elizabethtown (Roanoke) area, the other in the Lewisville area. See 1870 census, pp. 5 and 15 of Precinct 4, Nos. 26-26 and 102-105, households of William and Edward Long.

10-4-90 HARRELL, JONES, MATHEWS
Frances A. Harrell, PO Box 824, Park Valley Ut 84329

My husband's grandparents were William A. Harrell and Mattie Harrell (her maiden name), but believed not to be related. The 1900 census for Palo Pinto County, page 224, states: William born February 1872, Georgia, age 28, married 9 years; mother born Georgia, father, Georgia. Mattie, born March 1876, Texas, age 24, mother Kentucky, Indian, father, unknown. Father is supposed to have been a preacher. Children: Belle October 1896; George Wesley December 12, 1894, Strawn, Texas; Alice October 1896; Margarita August 1899. Zettie wasn't born yet but died in infancy same place. About 1908 William and Mattie were divorced. Mattie married a man by the name of Jones from Weatherford, Texas and is believed to have had children by him: Sam, Jim, Maudie, maybe two more sons.

William's parents may have been James Harrell and Lucy. Any help you can give me will be very welcome.

Seeking information on Dora Elsie Mabel Shelton. She reportedly married about 1925 near Big Sandy, Texas. All contact was lost at that time. Desire to reunite the remaining brother and sisters.

Searching for date and burial place for: Abraham and Phoebe Hart Richardson circa 1855, possibly McLennon County. Are these several cemetery records compiled in one book?

Tracing my grandfather Haven Elmer Acord, born December 19, 1878, in Missouri. I have all of the birth dates of his brothers and sisters who were also born in Missouri. He came to Texas around 1900, was in Harris County 1910, San Antonio 1926. Where did he come from in Missouri, and who were his parents?

14-4-90 DICKINSON, WHITLEY, MCCLAIN, WALKER

LaDarla Walker Keith, PO Box 550673, Dallas TX 75355-0673

Richard B. Dickinson was born about 1827, probably in Alabama. He married Mary Whitley, daughter of Jonas and Rebecca Whitley on June 18, 1850, Fayette County, Alabama. Children, all born Fayette County: Temperance 1851, Harvey G. 1853, Marmia E., Rebecca, Jonas H., Burr Frank March 23, 1861, Helen B., John G. Mary is buried south of Fulton, Mississippi, in the Gilmore Cemetery. Family tradition says Richard is buried beside her in an unmarked grave. The family had moved to Itawamba County, Mississippi, before the 1880 census. Who were Richard's parents? When did he die? Are other family members still in Mississippi?

Burr Frank Dickinson, son of Richard B. and Mary, eloped with Roxie E. McClain, and they were married March 26, 1882, in Itawamba County, Mississippi. They had five daughters: Martha, Docia, Minnie, Carrie, and Floria. Floria died May 27, 1893 and Roxie died June 10, 1893. Who were Roxie's parents? Did they live in Alabama, Mississippi or Texas? Family tradition says she is buried in Johnson County, Texas, near Grandview. Was Floria born in Mississippi or Texas? Were the McClains living in Texas?

Samuel H. Walker, born 1815 in Georgia or South Carolina, married E.(?) in Mississippi about 1835. Children: (First son may have died); Martha Matilda, born 1-11-1840 Chickasaw County, Mississippi, died Wise County, Texas, 11-28-1915; R. M., son ca 1841, Chickasaw County, Mississippi; George W. 12-14-1842, Mississippi, died Wise County, Texas, 2-10-1918; M. 1845, Mississippi; S. E. 1849, Upshur County, Texas; R. ca 1851, Texas; Angela ca 1853, Texas; Ella 1860, probably Parker County, Texas. When and where did Samuel die? What was his wife's name? Who were his parents? Will gladly refund copy costs and postage.

COMMENT: Three Walker men, probably brothers, C.P., R.M., and S. H. Walker of Upshur County 1850, lived in Parker County 1860, in neighboring households. In 1850, G. Walker, born ca 1772 South Carolina, was living in the household of C. P. Walker. One might assume that his name was George and that he was the father of the other three. Judging from the child-ladder of the censuses, the family was in Georgia by ca 1813-15, in Alabama by ca 1820, and in Mississippi by the 1830s; then to Texas by 1847. So, you might check census indexes for Georgia and Alabama for the time periods indicated. These were the only Walkers in Parker County 1860.

Possibly, Sam H. Walker and wife both died 1860-1870, for in 1870 three of their daughters, Matilda, Angeline, and Ella, were living with their married brother, George W. Walker and his wife Mary. Mary was probably nee Mary Hefley, born ca 1851 Mississippi, daughter of John M. Hefley and wife (1) Atlanta Caraway, per a Hefley biography we have. According to the biography, George W. Walker was living in Wise County by 1905. I do not find any of these Walkers in Parker County in 1870, except George W. and siblings, and John M. C. Walker, son of C. P. Walker.

15-4-90 TURNER, EASON, MURDOCK
Jimmy E. Eason, 2811 Rio Grande Pass, Mesquite TX 75150

Searching for descendants of Rev. Archie Carlton Turner and Mary (Polly) Parrott Eason. They used to live in Fort Worth, and Mary was quite an avid genealogist. She had been doing research on Thomas C. Eason and Cynthia A. Murdock. If you can help me, I would very much appreciate it.

16-4-90 POTEET, HUGHES, TANSE, ULMER, MILLS
Ann Poteet Radde, 100 SE Harris, Burleson TX 76028

Need to prove parents of Isaac Jackson Poteet, born 4 June 1834, Overton County, Tennessee. Believe them to be William Poteet, born Virginia, and Elizabeth Hughes, born 5 April 1816, Tennessee, died 4 October 1885, Wise County, Texas. Cannot find marriage record or record of death of William Poteet. Believe he died between 1840-1850 in Tennessee. Believe Elizabeth Hughes married Rubin Tanse. She and four of her children are shown in his household: Isaac, William, Richard, Pasader, on 1850 Overton County, Tennessee, census. Believe William Poteet's parents to be William Poteet, died 6 August 1821, Franklin County, Virginia, and Kaziah.

Need place of death of William Adam Ulmer, born 30 August 1830, Perry County, Mississippi. Supposed to have died 4 June 1866, McLennan County, Texas. Can find no proof. He was in Athens, Henderson County, Texas, 1860 census. Married to Eliza J. Mills. Served in Civil War from Henderson County.

17-4-90 COCKRELL, HOY
Mrs. Jack Hatley, HC 32, Box 82C, Mountain View AR 72560

Tracing my ancestor, Isaac Cockrell, who is listed on the 1880 San Saba County, Texas, census with his wife Sarah Hoy. Soon after this they removed to Oklahoma, and Isaac disappeared, leaving Sarah with a daughter Maude who survived, and a daughter Lillie and son, both of whom died. Sarah and Maude were returned to Texas by her family ca

1885. The 1880 census is the only record I have on Isaac. I have located the following: Benton County, Arkansas, William Cockrell 21 W M Laborer, b KY; Eve 24 WF b IN; Mary E. 2 W F b AR. Tarrant Co. TX 1870: W. Cockrell 42 WM farmer 300/200 b KY; W. 19 W M farmer b AR; I 13 W M b TX. San Saba Co., TX 1880: Cockrell, Isaac 24 W M laborer b TX MO MO, Sara 24 W F b TX, TN SC. Since the 1860 Tarrant County records are not extant and I am unable to find this family in any other location, does anyone know if this William is the correct family for Isaac? Will appreciate any help and gladly pay for copies, etc.

COMMENT: W. Cockrell appears on the 1856 Tax Roll of Tarrant County; he is not on any rolls prior to that, and in 1856 he did not own any land. By 1860 he was taxed for the 160-acre P. M. Truitt survey, which is now within Fort Worth, in the general area just east of present Texas Christian University, about where Eighth Avenue crosses West Berry Street. There is a Cockrell Avenue nearer to TCU. In 1860 his name appears on the tax roll as Wm. Cockrell, and on the 1870 census he appears as W. Cockrell, so one could assume they were one and the same man, as he was the only one of that surname in the county at that time.

By 1864 and 1865 the Truitt survey was owned by Jacob Samuels, so Cockrell may not have owned it for long. However, he evidently lived there long enough to lend his name to a road, or later, a street. He is enumerated on the 1870 census as living in Justice Precinct 3, which is in the northeast part of the county. I do not find any Cockrell marriages in Tarrant County, prior to 1880, and I do not find Wm. Cockrell on the 1880 census.

18-4-90 RIDDLE, MCCLURE, MCCOWN, HOUZE, GRIFFIN, MANNING, SEISLE, GREEN(E)

Would like to contact descendants of Green J. Riddle, 21, and Missouri McClure, 19, in the 1850 Claiborne, Mississippi, census, parents of Mary Riddle, 23, in the 1880 Freestone County, Texas, census, wife of James McCown. (Later wife of Sampson, James' brother, after his death), mother of Joe G., 3, and Riddle, 1.

J. T. Houze, born 1852, Georgia, living in Navarro County, Texas, in 1900 with daughter, Mrs. James Griffin. He was married to "Sallie" Sarah Manning Houze, daughter of Richard Green Manning and Penelope Seisle. Also, a relative named Missouri Green(e) mid 1800's-1900's, lived in Corsicana. Any help appreciated.

19-4-90 STOKES, JOHNSTON, MCGINNIS

Mrs. R. G. Ferrell, 1209 Carter Grove Rd, Hazel Green AL 35750

Seeking descendants of Robert Paul Stokes, Sr. and Mary Jane Johnston. R. P. died in 1915 in Fort Worth where he had operated a saddle-

harness shop and a shoe shop with his sons: Cecil, Lervis, Stephen, and Jessup. Other children were Julia, R.P., Jr., Ethel, Bernice and Mary. Family tradition says R.P.'s mother was American Indian. In 1860 census he was 17 years old and living with a McGinnis family in Forsyth County, Georgia.

20-4-90 PIGG, SAYLOR, BROCK

James A. Morris, 389 North Edison St., Arlington VA 22203

Clement P. Pigg, born Virginia 1827, died 1910, Texas. Piggs lived in Crafton, Wise County, Texas, arriving before 1880. After 1900 he moved to Jack County where he died after 1910. Wife, Virginia Jane listed in 1910 census and presumed to have died after 1910. Have not found any will or probate papers nor where buried for either spouse. Any leads welcomed.

Leonard Saylor, born 1827, Kentucky, and Hester Ann Brock, born 1836, Kentucky. Descendants moved to Wise County, Texas, circa 1880, e.g., John B. Saylor (born 1861 Kentucky, died 1942, California). Did Leonard and/or Hester Ann ever arrive in Texas? Where deceased? Where buried? Leads on any records would be very helpful.

COMMENT: Catherine Gonzalez, Box 66, Rhome TX 76078, writes a genealogical column for the *Wise County Messenger*, and knows a great deal about Wise County. You might send a query to her. Also, Fairy Hankins has a column in the Bowie, Texas, paper. When I checked the Crafton portion of the 1880 census, I did not find Piggs there, but they could have been in another area then.

21-4-90 SMITHHART, SMITHHEART, WILLIAMS, LEWIS

Seeking information on Smithharts anywhere. Probably South Carolina and Tennessee, late 1700 early 1800. Were in Mississippi by 1840, Texas 1860. My great-grandmother, Miriah A. Smithhart, born in Mississippi, October 1828, married first a Williams. In the Warren County, Mississippi, census of 1850, Mariah Williams was living in the household of Evan and Elizabeth Smithhart, possibly her brother. 10 February 1863, Burnet County, Texas, Mariah married Henry Lewis, and had children George (my grandfather), Frances and Susan. Henry died 1869 Burnet County, Texas, buried Smithwick Cemetery; no marker. 1870 Burnet County census shows Mariah and children living next door to her brother Miles Smithhart. 1850 census for Warren County, Mississippi, Miles Armstrong Smithhart living in the household of Silas Smithhart. I know Miles and Mariah were brother and sister. Were they also brother and sister of Silas and Evan Smithhart, or niece and nephew, or even children of Silas Smithhart?

22-4-90 ELKINS, SWOFFORD, FARRIS, HARRELL, HOLLIS, GILBERT,
HODGES

Geraldine Elkins Cook, 992 Viejo Dr. DCBE, Granbury TX 76048

Inventory filed 22 March 1878, Johnson County, Texas, for W. J. V. Elkins, deceased. J. L. and Emma Elkins named as minors; Jonas Swofford, Guardian. 21 November 1881, Montague County, Texas, petition to remove guardianship was filed by Minerva Harris. These records were found in the probate records of Erath County, place of residence of my g-grandfather, Joel Marion Elkins, who appears to have been an administrator. Who was W.J.V. Elkins? Who was this Elkins family?

Eliza Ann Harrell, born 1844 Perry County, Arkansas. On 1850 census for that county, but missing from 1860 census. She is found on the 1870 Erath County, Texas, census, married to H. B. Hollis ca 1868; however, she has daughter named Martha Gilbert, born 1862, Texas. With whom did she come to Texas? What happened to the unknown Gilbert? Were the other Harrell families found in Erath County after 1870 related to Eliza Ann?

I am looking for the book *Lunenburg County Descendants to Texas* by Gifford L. Hodges, published Stephenville, Texas, 1982. Unable to locate the book in any local or national library, nor Mr. Hodges. Can anyone help?

COMMENT: If your great-grandfather, Joel Marion Elkins was administrator of this estate, I would think that the administration papers would give you clues from which to work. Have you followed through with these? This Elkins family appears to have been from Tennessee to Arkansas, then to Texas in late 1860s. Check Cawyer and Hudson's 3-volume *Erath County Cemeteries* (Vol. 3, p 208), Sims Valley Cemetery, where you will find Sleany Elkins, died 12 June 1881, age 55 years; Joseph L. Elkins, died 18 May 1878, age 7 years; also a daughter of J. and L. J. Swofford.

Also see 1870 census of Johnson County, Beat 5, Grandview PO, Nos. 551-599 and 551-600, two couples: William Elkins (60, Tennessee) and wife Silina (55, Tennessee - note age discrepancies); and W. J. Elkins (21, Arkansas) and wife Nancy J. (20, Arkansas), probably son and daughter-in-law of the older William. Then see 1880 census of Erath County, ED 154, p 23, Pct 7, Nos. 192-195, the Jonas Swofford family. Living with them was Saline Elkins (60, Tennessee), widow, enumerated as "mother," and M. E. Elkins (female, age 7, born Texas, father born Arkansas, mother born Texas) enumerated as "niece." This Saline Elkins has to be the Sleany buried in Sims Valley Cemetery; her name was probably Selena.

I would guess that the W. J. V. Elkins, whose inventory you mention, was the same as W. J. of Johnson County 1870. The minors were likely his children, J. L. being the child Joseph L. who died 1878, and Emma the same as M.E., child in the Swofford household in 1880. The older William Elkins was also deceased by 1880, so the estate could have been his. If so, the minor children would have been his grandchildren

indicating that their parents were likely deceased. These Elkins were probably related to John Elkins of Hill County 1870 (Pct 1, p 35, Nos. 243-243); he was age 41, born Arkansas.

Harvey Bluford Hollis and first wife, Mary Ann McCarty, were in Anderson County in 1850, in Erath County by 1860; she died 1866. He married (2) ca 1867 Eliza Ann, born 13 December 1843, died 23 July 1908. In 1972 Mrs. Paul B. Murff, Route 2, Floydada TX 79235, in data re the McCarty and Hollis families, stated that the second wife was "Eliza C. Gilbert, who had married either a Mr. Herrell or was possibly a Herrell who married first a Gilbert." Mrs. Murff listed eight children by each wife, but not all children survived.

In 1972, Mrs. H. P. Hollis, 628 Banner St., Camden, Arkansas, was also interested in the Erath County family. Perhaps one of these ladies may have Gilbert or Harrell information by now. The Hollis and McCarty families are buried in Duffau Cemetery, Erath County, including both wives of H. B. Hollis. See Cawyer and Hudson's *Erath County Cemeteries* (Eliza's tombstone has "E. A. Hollis" on it). I find little or no mention of Harrell families in Erath County prior to 1880. The only early Gilberts in the area were in Parker and Eastland Counties by 1860.

Re: Gifford L. Hodges' book *Lunenburg County Descendants to Texas*, ask Shirley Cawyer, PO Box 164, Stephenville TX 76401, about Mr. Hodges. She may have known him.

Near them on several censuses is a W. C. Glenn, born 1824. Is he a son? Their children in their actual household are: Amanda born 1832, KY; Mary 1834, MO; Jacob 1836, MO; William G. 1838, MO; and Missouri, 1840, MO. In 1850 this family is found in Nacogdoches County, Texas, and next door is W. C. Glenn with his family. In 1860 Elizabeth, William G., and his new wife Mary Ann, are in Freestone County, Texas. We believe William Sr., has died, probably Nacogdoches County. Can anyone confirm? When and where did Elizabeth die? Would like to correspond with researching descendants. Will exchange information. I am descendant of youngest daughter, Missouri Anne Glenn Lee.

Need names of parents and siblings for Elizabeth Frances or Frances Elizabeth Bradford. She married Hiram Winkle, who was born in Alabama. "Fannie" lists her birth place as North Carolina. They had six children: Elizabeth, Martha Jane, Louisiana, Walter, John R., and Thomas. Liz married Will Sneed, Martha Jane married Tom Young, Lou married Oliver H. Key. In 1900 she is with Lou and Oliver in Lincoln County, Tennessee, and says she is widowed. Thomas is living

in this household also. He is single. About 1905 they move to Ranger, Eastland County, Texas, and join the Sneeds and Youngs who are there already. In 1910 they are all near each other and Thomas is married and has a daughter. We do not know what happened to John or Walter Winkle. After the 1910 census Thomas is also lost to us. Would appreciate correspondence with anyone with information on Fannie's family, also helpful would be information on the three Winkle sons.

Wish to correspond with descendants of Isaac and Martha Lee. They are found in Bell County, Texas, in the 1860 Federal Census with their children: Delilah, Elizabeth, Hannah and their son John. In their household are three children, Sarah 16, John 15, and Ferraby (Pherba-Phoebe) Lee 8, listed as boarders. Were Sarah, John and Pherba brother and sister? If so, who were their parents and siblings? Would appreciate hearing from Isaac and Martha Lee's children as well.

My records show his first two children, the others come from the census of 1900: Ida, Charles Millican, William A., John R., Earnest C., Robert L., Clodessa P., Reid B., Thomas Howell (married 1927 Lois Elwood, moved to Atlanta, Georgia, where he practiced law). Do not know names of other children.

Felix died 1853 Cass County, Texas, on his way to Williamson County, Texas, to join his family, already there. Known and probable children: Jeptha or Josiah b. ca 1811 South Carolina; Warren R. D. of Cherokee County, Georgia, 1870; Elizabeth G. born ca 1826 South Carolina, died ca 1861 Lampasas County, Texas; m. 1st John Franklin Brooke and came to Cherokee County, Texas; returned to Georgia and m. 2nd Alexander Abbott in Cherokee County, Ga. and returned to Texas. He is said to have died Marlow, Oklahoma. Brooke and Abbott descendants lived at one time or another in Lampasas, Bosque and Young Counties, Texas.

Malinda, born ca 1831; Caroline, born ca 1834; Andrew F. Pickens, born ca 1835, still a minor in 1854. Possible allied families: Criswell, Hill, Holcomb. Aunt Mollie (Moss) Jones and husband John Jones, who lived near LaGrange, Texas, was not of this family but is said to have been related. How?

BOOK REVIEWS

THE REASONER STORY, 8 1/2 x 11, indexed, hardbound, 480 pp., \$45.00, by Marie C. Anderson, 944 East 5014 South, Salt Lake City UT 84117. Garrett Reasoner, the earliest known ancestor of this family, was born about 1665 in France. According to family tradition, he was a teacher and Huguenot who fled France about 1685 when the Edict of Nantes was revoked. He settled in Germany along the Rhine River, probably in the Strassburg, Alsace area where, it is said, he married a French lady "with some little means" named Marie. It is believed that Garrett and Marie remained in Germany, but early in the 1700's, three and perhaps more of their grown sons came to America.

Christopher died in Dutchess County, New York. Some of his descendants migrated to Montgomery County, New York, then gradually across the state of New York, Ohio, Michigan. Stephen went West, and it is thought some of the unidentified Reasoners in Pennsylvania and Virginia were his descendants. Nicholas married Mary Froman, and died Pattersons Creek, Virginia. Was in Ulster and Dutchess Counties, New York, in Pennsylvania, and New Jersey.

This book covers the descendants of Nicholas Reasoner. There is a 24-page photograph album with 195 photos. The numbering system is easy to follow, making it possible to trace each descendant to the original ancestor. Narratives, maps and other illustrations contribute to the interest of the text.

THE AMERICAN DESCENDANTS OF JAMES MCCOURT, JOHN MCKENNEY, MATTHEW YOUNG AND ALLIED FAMILIES, 1988, 369 pp., soft cover, indexed, illustrated, \$30.00, by Martha F. McCourt, 9501 S. E. 13th St., Vancouver WA 98664.

Another important family history from Martha McCourt who compiled the four-volume Luce history. James McCourt (1814-1893) was born in the north of Ireland, and died in Sand Lake, Polk County, Wisconsin. He married Margaret Young in 1837/9 possibly in a Presbyterian Church in Canada, or New York. The couple had ten children, residing at Mooers, New York, Osceola, Sand Lake, and Garfield in Polk County, Wisconsin. He farmed most of his life in Polk County.

John McKenney was from the Isle of Skye, County Inverness, Scotland. In 1673 John purchased a tract of land on the Nonsuch River in Maine. By 1690 many families moved to Massachusetts and Connecticut, and it is not known where John moved his family. Most of the descendants listed appear to be those of John's son Robert.

family moved to Wisconsin about 1854 and received land patents in Sand Lake, Wisconsin. They had five children.

The numbering system is easy to follow and makes it possible to trace each individual back to the immigrant ancestor. Photographs, newspaper clippings, and copies of legal documents are used to tell the story.

OUT OF THE PAST; CEMETERIES OF WEST TEXAS, Coke County, 248 pp., spiral binding, indexed, illustrated, by Jim C. Ames, 702 West 44th St., San Angelo TX 76903. A map shows the location of these Coke County cemeteries, and there is a brief history of each. Inscriptions on the tombstones are given, and names of persons are arranged alphabetically. 1890 Tax Record Abstract, Panola County, Texas, 110 pp. soft cover \$12 or hard cover \$20. East Texas Genealogical Society, P. O. Box 6967, Tyler, TX 75711. Postage and handling \$1.50 per volume.

Material was abstracted from microfilm and includes the Resident Rendition Roll, Supplemental Resident Rendition Roll, Non-Resident Rendition Roll, Railroads Roll and Unrendered Assessment Roll. Each division is alphabetized separately, by first letter of the surname but a composite taxpayer surname index has been included. Of particular interest are the names of original grantees with number of acres owned.

Another helpful feature included is the plat map of Panola County (published by the General Land Office in June 1897). It is interesting to note that in 1890, in Panola County, a poll tax was paid by 2,379 men.

Because the 1890 Federal Census was destroyed, this is an important finding aid for anyone having ancestors in this county. [reviewed by editor]
