From an old Bible found in the court house in Seymour, Baylor County, Texas. It is not known to whom the Bible belonged. It was rumored to have belonged to a Sams family at one time and was later burned in a house fire.

Notes on the Wade Family Bible:

This family was probably descended from Edward/Edmond Wade of Caswell County, North Carolina (1790) and of Moore County (1800 and 1810). Apparently, they were in Bibb County, Alabama, by ca. 1830-1832 and in the area of Travis and Hays Counties, Texas, after 1850 and before 1855. Edward Bird Wade (after the death of his wife Mary) probably went with his son, Oran, and family on their migration to the northwest and died in Brown County.

In Travis County, Texas, Orion [sic] Wade married Sarah Medlin on 9 August 1855. Their daughter, Harriet, may have married W. F. Driver in Brown County. By 1885 the Drivers lived in Throckmorton County, were in Haskell County in 1887, and in Knox County by ca. 1890.

In 1880 there were Drivers in Young, Shackelford, and Throckmorton Counties. All had Georgia and Alabama backgrounds. The Young County family was from Pike County, Alabama, to Nacogdoches County, Texas, before 1869, and settled in Young County in 1875, after a brief sojourn in Parker County. It seems reasonable to assume that W. F. Driver was related to these families.

Sarah Medlin, born 29 November 1839, was the daughter of Hall Medlin and his first wife, Lucinda Eads, who died ca. 1842. Hall Medlin (son of Lewis and Rachel Smith Medlin) was born in Pendleton District, South Carolina, moved with his parents to Rutherford County, Tennessee ca. 1808, then to Bedford County by 1812, and later to Marion County, Alabama. About 1831 all of the family moved to Cole County, Missouri, where Hall married Lucinda. He took up Platte Purchase land and appears on the 1840 census of Platte County, Missouri. His second wife was Nancy Baker, whom he married in 1842. Having seen broadsides about the Peters Colony, he made a trip to Texas, returned to Missouri and led a wagon train of some sixteen related families to Texas, arriving on White Rock Creek, old Nacogdoches County (present Dallas County) before 1 July 1844.

Hall Medlin settled in Denton County, where he served as Assessor and Collector ca. 1846-1848. He last appears on the 1848 tax roll of the county. He was elected a commissioner but resigned in December 1849 to move to Travis County. Nancy is thought to have died in Denton County ca. 1848. In Travis County, Hall Medlin married Catherine Bradford on 7 January 1850. She was probably the daughter of William Bradford, formerly of Indiana, Missouri, and Denton County, Texas. The Bradfords left Denton County about the same time as Hall Medlin. All are on the 1850 census of Travis County.

In 1859 Hall Medlin removed to San Bernardino County, California, where he was enumerated on the 1860 census. He returned to Texas to buy cattle to sell in California, then led a wagon train from Hays County, Texas, to California in 1868. He later returned to Texas and settled in Burnet County, where he died.

Oran Wade died in Day County, Oklahoma, in 1897, and his wife Sarah Medlin died in Knox County, Texas, in 1912. She was likely living near some of her children at the time. An old oil lease names her as Sarah E. McKean. If she married a second time, it was after she was 58 years old.

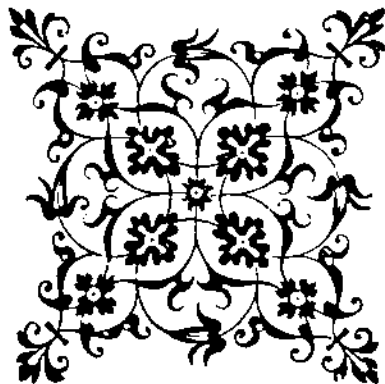

1904 LETTER OF WILLIAM ORVILLE MENEFEE

The following letter was sent (in 1973) to Nancy Timmons Samuels, by Lorena Sparkman, Stephenville, Texas, a descendant of the letter writer.

Cleburne, Johnson Co., Texas
Feb. 24, 1904

At the request of my beloved daughter, Mrs. Mittie Lorena Whitney, I will proceed to give her a short history of my life. I was born in the City of Nashville, Tennessee, January 8, 1828, and was named William Orville--William, after one of my father's brothers, and Orville after one of my mother's brothers.

My first recollections are about Bolivar in Hardeman County, Tennessee. I very distinctly remember going to school there and when less than five years old, at the close of school, I made a little speech. You'd scarce expect one of my age to speak in public on the stage--

And if I should chance to fall below
Demostenes or Cicero
Don't view me with the critic's eye
But my imperfections by
Large streams from little fountains flow
Tall oaks from little acorns grow
And all great learned men like me
Once had to learn their ABC & Ds.

Some time in the winter of 1834 and 1835, my father and family, in company with Uncle Jarrett Menefee, my father's elder brother and family, emigrated to Texas and located on the Angelina River--my father overseeing for a Mr. John Durst. In the spring of 1836, when the small army of Genl. Houston was retreating from the overpowering numbers of the Mexican army under Santa Anna, there took place what was called the Runaway Scrape. The citizens threw what was convenient and most needed with the women and children into wagons and hurried east. Men would not pass their homes and families and leave them exposed to the cruelty of the Mexicans, but would drop out until they succeeded in getting their families on the road to safety and then rejoin the little army of Houston.

The two Marlins, our kinfolks, had preceeded us to Texas and located near the falls of the Brazos River. They found us on the Angelina River. After the Battle of San Jacinto, the defeat of the Mexican army and capture of Santa Anna and treaty of peace, the Marlins returned to their and my father's family. Jarrett Menefee and family and others with them formed a little settlement which for many years was the extreme settlement on the Brazos River. Of course we had to contend with the Indians who were very hostile until after a treaty of peace was had with them by Genl. Houston. The settlement kept increasing until there were a sufficient number of children to form a pretty good school. I went two or three sessions.

In 1842, having a 1280-acre tract of land on the Trinity River, my

father got together several families and went to settle on said land. But several families, the Mayfields and others, when we reached Waxahachie Creek were so pleased that they refused to go any further and located there. A Mr. Shelton and son, my father and elder brother, myself, went on to the Trinity River and there camped for some three months, living mostly on buffalo meat with occasionally some venison and turkey. The prairie between where Dallas and Waxahachie now are was just covered with buffalo. Some days when some of us were out after meat we could get on one of those mounds and see at least ten thousand buffalo at one sight.

The Indians having broken out into hostilities again, and the families that had promised to go with us to form a new settlement, refusing to go, my father and family moved to Houston in the winter of 1843. My father died there a very short time after we reached Houston, leaving our mother, three of us boys and two girls in very embarrassing circumstances. All of us boys and girls joined the Methodist Sunday School. I took great interest in the Sunday School and soon worked my way to the front. Rev. Orceneth Fisher was sent by the Conference to Houston Station. He soon got up quite an interest in church matters. At one of his revival meetings I professed religion and joined the M. E. Church South.

In 1848 I was married to Miss M. J. Armstrong and in the fall of 1848 we moved to Leon County where I lived until the fall of 1853. Came to Towash [Towash] where I spent the winter, moving up to Noland River in the spring of 1854.

In 1861 I joined the 1st Company organized in Johnson County--W. J. Neil our Captain. We joined Parsons 12th Texas Cavalry. Capt. Neil was badly wounded in the 1st battle of any consequence. I was very close to him when he was shot and assisted to bring him off the battlefield. After this, only a short time, Buffords and Carters Regiment and Morgan's Battalion were added to our Regiment and was called a Brigade. We were at Mansfield and Pleasant Hill and also at Gunboat fight in which Genl. Green was killed. I assisted in bringing Genl. Green to the rear after he was killed. We followed the Yanks, fighting more or less every day and sometimes until late at night. In the last fight, Yellow Bayou, Capt. Tom Haley of my company, was severely wounded and shortly afterwards died of said wound.

The war soon after this was closed and we returned to our homes and all went to work in earnest to rebuild our wasted fortunes. For instance, at the commencement of the war in 1861, I had about 400 head of cattle and some 15 head of horses. When I got home in 1865, most of my cattle were gone and some of my horses--used up by the stay-at-homes and thieves.

Soon after getting home I joined the Masons at Grandview. Afterwards I procured the dispensation for a Lodge in Cleburne and in due time a charter, also a dispensation for a Royal Arch Chapter, and repaired to Houston and got a charter and my name appears on said charter as the first Most Excellent High Priest.

About this time I applied to the Quarterly Conference for license to preach, and at the same time for a recommendation to the Conference for a

mission into the traveling connection, but there were at this Annual Conference 14 transfers and 22 applications and the Bishop complaining that he did not know how to dispose of so many--quite a number withdrew their applications. My Presiding Elder requested me my permission to withdraw mine until next Conference, but I refused, telling him of course he could do as he pleased in the matter, that I had thus offered my services to the Conference but if they did not want me I could surrender my credentials, but ere the next Quarterly Conference convened, I was overpersuaded to retain my license as a local preacher, in due time securing Deacons Orders and afterwards that of Local Elder. For years I continued to preach once or twice every Sunday, holding numerous protracted meetings and assisting my pastors in all their protracted meetings. I have been present and assisted in meetings where thousands of men and women were happily converted--the last few years, however, local preachers have been side tracked, finding very little encouragement to continue preaching.

Recently my wife had a very severe spell of sickness and we all became so uneasy about her that we telegraphed to our children to come to see her if possible. They all came--our eldest daughter, Mrs. Emma Jones from Denton, our youngest, Mrs. Bettie M. Bell from Greenwood, Ark., our son, Dr. E. L. Menefee from Granbury, our son, Prof. Eugene A. Menefee from Bosque County, our eldest son, Orville I. Menefee from Oakland, Cal., came later and as my wife was improving very much we decided to try and have a reunion of all the children on the 31st of January, 1904. All came but Bettie. She had a very sick boy and could not come--but the seven boys and two girls were present, Mrs. Mattie Menefee and Mrs. Mittie Whitney preparing the dinner and we certainly had a fine ole time eating turkey, chicken, cakes, pies and fruit in great abundance. My brother, H. F. Menefee, and quite a number of his family being with us--in all there were 45 of us very closely connected were present.

And now to go back and bring up the financial matters connected with my little history. I will just briefly say that acting upon the advice of my physicians, I traded my farm on Nolands River to Mr. Hollingsworth, taking a half interest in his store at Marystown, consisting of general merchandise, dry goods and groceries--and as per agreement, remaining with him 12 months when we divided the goods, leaving him the groceries and taking the drygoods, etc. for my share. I shipped my goods to Floyd City on the Plains and reached there with my family in October 1890 and remained there 5 years--but owing to the continued dry weather, the people became so discouraged that they began leaving the country. I had ordered some new goods from the Martin Brown Co. at Fort Worth and from some other houses to the value of about one thousand dollars, when the house caught fire and burned up, leaving me in debt to the amount of eight hundred or one thousand dollars. The house was rebuilt and I purchased the lower story for \$600.00 and went to Amarillo and secured a stock of groceries and remained there until I paid off every dollar of my indebtedness.

When seeing that the people were nearly all leaving, myself and family together with my son-in-law, Mr. J. A. Whitney and family, moved to Bandera County where we remained about one year but we didn't locate there. Came back to Cleburne, our old stomping ground, where we have continued to reside by the generous assistance of our children. And now we are here--just my

darling wife and I by ourselves, all the children having families of their own, except the youngest boy, Edgar. While we are poor and have no bright prospects so far as this world is concerned, yet we have for lo these many years been serving the Lord as best we could, and feel now that soon, perhaps very soon, with our pilgrimage ended below, home to the land of delight will we go, pilgrims and strangers no more to roam--joyfully, joyfully resting at home. May the good Lord wonderfully bless our children and loved ones and bring them all to us in Heaven above is the prayer of--

Notes by NTS:

The parents of William O. Menefee were Leban and Lucy Amanda (Young) Menefee. The Index to Harris County Probate Records, 1837-1891, indicates the will or estate of Leban Menefee is to be found in Book G, p. 11.

Part of Leban Menefee's 1280-acre, 2nd Class Certificate (640 acres) was patented by his heirs, 12 May 1858. The survey is located on the present Johnson-Ellis County line and is mostly in Johnson County.

"The two Marlins, kinfolks" were John and James Marlin, early Robertson County settlers.

John Durst lived on the east bank of the Angelina River during the Texas Revolution.

The Mayfields, who "refused to go any further," refers to the family of Sutherland Mayfield. They settled at or near what was later Reagor Springs, Ellis County.

W. J. Neal was Captain of Company "C" 12th Texas (Parsons') Cavalry, was wounded 2 July 1862 and died on 28 September. See John Q. Anderson (Ed.) *Campaigning with Parson's Texas Cavalry Brigade, CSA*, The War Journals and Letters of the Four Orr Brothers, pp. 37, 57, 74.

"Bufford's" Regiment was that of Col. Nathaniel N. Burford.

General Thomas Green was killed at Blair's Landing on Red River 12 April 1864.

Thomas Haley, also James Haley, lived in Leon County in 1850 and in Johnson County in 1860. One of the letters of the Orr brothers (see Anderson, p. 138) mentions that Haley was wounded on 5th May 1864. A tombstone in the Smith Cemetery, on Haley's Branch, near Rio Vista, shows Capt. Thos. Haley, b. 3 Jan. 1817, d. 1 Feb 1865.

The heirs of John Marlin and Jarrett Menefee (older brother of Leban Menefee) petitioned the legislature in 1856, for reimbursement for their fathers' lodging and feeding soldiers and horses in 1839.

According to Mrs. Lorena Sparkman, Leban and Jarrett Menefee were sons of William and Elizabeth (Vardeman) Menefee. Leban Menefee was b. 11 May 1796, in Georgia (per information some of his children gave on 1880 census) and died between 3 October and 30 December 1844, in Houston, Texas; m. 1822 in Milledgeville, Georgia, Lucy Amanda Young, who died in Houston. They had children: Thomas Alonzo, William Orville, Henry Franklin, Artemissa A., and Frances Rosetta Menefee.

Fort Worth Star Telegram, Saturday, July 28, 1990,

"Texas Kin" column, by Patricia Jackson and Paul Campbell:

The Menefee family will have its 100th annual reunion the first weekend in August. Meeting on August 4 at the Cleburne Civic Center. The reunion brings together the descendants of Henry Franklin and William Orville Menefee. . . . They came to Texas from Tennessee about 1831 [sic] with their father Leban Menefee and mother, Lucy Amanda Young. H. Frank and W. O. had an older brother, Thomas Alonzo. Their two younger sisters, Artemissa and Frances Rosetta, were born in Texas. Leban's older brother, Jarret, also came to Texas, and they lived near John Marlin (Marlin, Texas), whose wife was a cousin. Of the five Menefee children, only the two brothers settled near one another in Johnson County. PETITION OF JOHN MARLIN HEIRS, 1856

JOHN MARLIN, HIS HEIRS - Asks payment for damages sustained by them while the troops were stationed near. Dated June 24, 1856.

To the members of the Senate and House of Representatives in the Legislature assembled at the City of Austin in and for the State of Texas--

Your memorialists, ASHLEY S. MARLIN, RUFUS A. MARLIN, SAMUEL A. BLAIN and LOUISA A. BLAIN wife of the said SAMUEL A. BLAIN and formerly LOUISA A. MARLIN, all of whom are resident citizens of the County of Falls, State of Texas, and are the children and immediate heirs of JOHN MARLIN, Dcd, late a citizen of the County of Robertson in the late Republic of Texas--and THOMAS S. MENIFEE, WM D. MENIFEE, THOS. J. GOODE and NANCY GOODE his wife who formerly was NANCY MENIFEE, all of whom are resident citizens of the County of Falls, State of Texas, and are the children and immediate heirs of JARRATT MENIFEE, Dcd, who was late a citizen of the old County of Robertson in the late Republic of Texas--

Would Respectfully Represent unto your Honorable Body, that their Parents, the said JOHN MARLIN and JARRATT MENIFEE, emigrated to the Republic of Texas in the year A.D. 1834 and settled in what was then known as Robertson County, near the Great Falls of the river Brazos, where they resided until their death, and when so living there, which at the time of their settlement was the very extreme border of the frontier in that section of the country, they suffered great hardships and privations necessarily attendant upon a frontier life in a savage country, and in addition to the necessary privations they had to undergo, in the year Eighteen hundred and thirty nine, they suffered much from the loss of money and property caused by the action of the then existing government, as shown below, which loss of means they incurred at that time has never been paid back to them by the government of the Republic or the State of Texas--and remuneration and recompense for which, these heirs, your memorialists, consider themselves justly entitled to, and respectfully prays the same of your Honorable body.

Your memorialists would represent that for five months and a half, from the third day of April to the twelvth day of September in the year A.D. 1839, there was a company of Rangers raised at the instance of the then existing government, to protect the frontier from the ravages of the indians--and who were enlisted in the Service of the said government, which said company was commanded by Captain JOHN BIRD and Lieutenant WM G. EVANS, and for the time specified in the forgoing part of this memorial, from the dates there given, Thirty two men with their horses belonging to the said company were quartered upon the said JOHN MARLIN and JARRETT MENIFEE, and for the time specified above, they had to feed and take care of the said number of men and horses, for which they, nor their heirs have ever been paid one cent or remunerated for in any manner whatever, and for the expense and trouble incurred in the manner specified, these memorialists as the heirs of the

The [illeg.] considered your memorialists would pray of your Honorable Body the passage of a Bill or law, giving them the required relief--for which they will ever pray-

Texas, Four Miles from Headquarters
April 10, 1836

Dear Parents:

Since I last wrote you I have been engaged in arranging an expedition against the Indians who have committed many depredations against the frontier. On my return to the settlement I learned that our country was again invaded by a merciless horde of Mexicans who are waging a war of extermination against the inhabitants. A call was made for all friends of humanity to rise in arms and resist the foe. Men were panic-stricken and fled, leaving their all behind them. I could not reconcile it to my feelings to leave Texas without an effort to save it. Accordingly I bent my course for the army and arrived last evening at this place. I shall enter camp this morning as a volunteer.

The army commanded by Gen. Houston is lying on the west side of the Brazos, 20 miles from San Fillippe. The enemy is in that place waiting an attack. It is reported Houston will attack them in the morning. What will be the result or the fate of Texas is held in the bowels of futurity but I think we are engaged in the cause of justice and hope the God of battles will protect us. The enemy's [sic] has been the most bloody that has ever been recorded on the pages of history. Our garrison at San Antonio was taken and massacred; so another detachment of seven hundred commanded by Col. Fanning and posted at La Bahia after surrendering prisoners of war were led out and shot down like bears. Only one escaped to tell their melancholy fate. In this course they show no quarter to age sex or condition - all are massacred without mercy. If such conduct is not sufficient to arouse the patriotic feelings of the sons of liberty I know not what will.

I was born in a land of freedom and taught to lisp the name of liberty with my infant tongue, and rather than be driven out of the country or submit to be a slave, I will leave my bones to bleach on the plains of Texas. If we succeed in subduing the enemy and establishing a free and independent government, we shall have the finest country the sun ever shone upon, and if we fail we shall have the satisfaction of dying fighting for the rights of man. I know not that I shall have an opportunity of writing to you in some time but shall do so as often as it is convenient. Be not alarmed about my safety. I am no better and my life no dearer than those who gained the liberty you enjoy. If I fall you shall have the satisfaction that your son died fighting for the rights of man. Our strength in the field is about 1500. The enemy is reported 4000 strong; a fearful odds you will say but what can mercenary hirelings do against the sons of liberty?

Before this reaches you, the fate of Texas will be known. I will endeavor to acquaint you as soon as possible. I am well and in good spirits and as unconcerned as if going to a raising. The same Being who has hitherto protected my life can with equal ease ward off the balls of the enemy. My company is waiting and I must draw to a close, and bid you farewell, perhaps forever.

More than a year has elapsed since I saw you yet the thoughts of friends and home are fresh in my memory and their remembrance yet lives in my affection and will light a secret joy to my heart till it shall cease to beat.

Long has it been since I have heard from you. How often do I think of home and wish to be there. The thought of that sacred spot haunts my night-watches. How often when sleep has taken possession of my faculties am I transported there and for a short time enjoy all the pleasures of home but the delusion is soon over and the morning returns and I find my situation the same. Dear Friends, if I see you no more remember, Giles still loves you. Give my love to my sisters, brothers, friends and neighbors. I would write more if the time would permit, but its fleeting steps wait for none. You need not write to me, as I do not know where I shall be. With sentiments of sincere respect, I bid you farewell

Dear Dr. Simonds,

As Giles Giddings foresaw in his letter, he was killed in action. He left his unfinished colonization, and an estate of 5000 acres in Texas. You may be astonished that this letter was written by a boy of 24 years, who had become a civil engineer more than a year before.

His brothers came down from the north to look after his affairs. My Grandfather John James Giddings was likewise a civil engineer. He was engaged by the Prince of Nassau to prepare settlements for the German colonists. He had as many as 48 companies of surveyors at work for 4 years. He personally planned the town of Fredericksburg. Certain parts of Texas find his name basic in all abstracts, since he received 10 percent of all his surveys. After colonization, from 1848 to 1861, he was associated with his brothers J. D., Dewitt Clinton and George, in the operation of the Overland Stage, which had a contract with the United States to carry the mail from New Orleans to San Diego, at \$1,000,00.

My grandfather had headquarters for the state route at the Alamo. His house adjoined the Alamo, and here my father, now 87, was born in 1849. Some years ago I came upon an old Texas Gazette, showing the Alamo as the San Antonio office of the state company "George Giddings,

Manager," and I presented it to the Daughters of the Texas Revolution in San Antonio. They have made an exhibit of it and it is credited to me as donor in the permanent exhibit in the Alamo.

The Giddings brothers built the railroad from Houston to Austin. (Houston & Texas Central) and operated it, succeeding their state route. This is a nucleus of the Southern Pacific system, which entire system follows my grandfather's survey for the stage route. One of the engines was named "J. D. Giddings." When it became useless, it was sidetracked at a place on the line. Customers used it as a station, and the place came to be called "Giddings" and is now the town of that name, the junction of H. & T. C. and M. K. & T. lines.

Dewitt Clinton Giddings was a candidate during reconstruction time against the carpet-bagger Geo. Washington Jones. In this election which was conducted under martial law after a campaign in which my uncle was forced to make his speeches before Union bayonets, he was defeated, but he contested the election and showed the frauds in which armies of negroes were marched from Brenham to Navasota to Bryan voting in each place during a 3 day election. He won the contested election and was the first to break the Ironclad rule of Congress, and he held the seat many, many years.

Since 1861 there have been but 3 congressmen from the Brenham district - D. C. Giddings, A. S. Burleson and J. P. Buchanan. Uncle Clint was the political father of the other two, who have become in turn (1) Postmaster General and (2) Chairman of the present Appropriations Committee. Brenham is just a few miles from Washington where the Independence was signed, and Independence is just a few miles from that point. Sam Houston lived at Independence, and he was a well known figure on the streets of Brenham. At Independence was a small college which became Baylor University, and at Chapel Hill was a small college which became Southwestern University.

An old man died some years ago who was a young boy at San Jacinto, and being versed in both languages, he had acted as interpreter for General Santa Anna, and General Houston. His name was Moses Austin Bryan, his family giving two town names to Texas. He used to talk to the boys and girls about early Texas history and he often wrote for the Breham Banner. In 1891 on April 21st there was a great celebration, and many old men were still living who had fought in the revolution, and we children had gathered flowers, and we marched in line and gave our offerings to these great old men, who were sitting along the walk of the court house square. I remember that Santa Anna's saddle was shown here, along with other trophies of the war.

I am just as proud of my middle name as I am of my first name and last name. It is an ancestral name on my mother's side. She was descended from James Harrod, who in 1774 led an expedition from Virginia into Kentucky, and set up Fort Harrod at that time. This was the first outpost west of the 13 colonies. From this nucleus, all of the west was added to the United States, Geo Rogers Clark, having formed his expeditions at Fort Harrod.

Then the Battle of San Jacinto brought a logic of events which added about one quarter of its area to itself by making possible after the annexation of Texas, the Gadsden Purchase. So my name is composed of the death of one martyr, and the life of one martyr, who gave us every thing west of the Alleghenies. The first Giddings was in Massachusetts at the beginning so when I write my name I represent a scope of over 3300 years and every foot of the greatest country on earth.

G. A. Giddings was a private in Co. A., First Regiment, Texian Volunteers, under the command of Col. Edward Burleson. [Source: The Texas Almanac: 1857 - 1873, A Compendium of Texas History, (reprint 1967) which gives a list of all men killed or wounded at the Battle of San Jacinto.]

The Handbook of Texas names three Giddings brothers in Texas - DeWitt Clinton, George H. and Jabez Deming, sons of James Giddings and Lucy Deming of Susquehanna County, Pennsylvania, [to whom we presume Giles Giddings's letter was written.]

Jabez Deming Giddings, born in 1814, settled in Washington County, Texas in 1838, where he lived the remainder of his life. He was prominent in civic affairs in the county, helping to establish the Methodist church, organizing a school, and founding the first bank in Brenham. He was in the practice of law with his brother, DeWitt C. Giddings. He married Ann M. Tarver and died at Brenham in 1896. The town of Giddings was named in his honor.

George H. Giddings, born in 1823, came to Texas in February, 1846. He had a contract to carry mail from San Antonio to San Diego, serving as agent in San Antonio in 1857 and later managing the line between New Orleans and San Diego. He was a colonel in the Confederate Army in John S. Ford's regiment.

DeWitt Clinton Giddings, born in 1827, practiced law in Brenham. Despite his opposition to secession, he joined the Confederate Army in 1861. He was a member of the Constitutional Convention of 1866, and in 1870 accepted the Democratic nomination to the 42nd Congress, where he served three terms. [According to this source, the contested election was between Mr. Giddings and his Republican opponent, William T. Clark. He did win his seat.] He and his wife, Malinda C. Lusk, were the parents of five children.

Mortality Schedules were taken in the years 1850, 1860, 1870 and 1880 along with the population (census) schedule. They contain a listing of those persons who died during the twelve month period prior to the date of the census (June 1.) These Schedules may be of help in finding names which do not appear on the Population Schedules taken every ten years. Often they will show the names of children in a family who were born and died within a ten year period) of which no other record may be in existence. And of course, they will supply death date information.

Mrs. Ann Allcon Shoults, 4134 H. C. Meacham Blvd., Fort Worth, TX 76135, has sent supplemental information on her Moore family. The Moore Bible record was published in FOOTPRINTS, Vol. 32, No. 3 (August 1989). The Bible belonged to S. W. [Sir William] Moore and Amelia Arkansas Brooks, daughter of William Brooks.

William Brooks is buried in Freestone County, Texas, in an area originally known as Nip and Tuck. The grave is now located in the J. I. Rouse pasture two miles east of Shanks Cemetery in Freestone County. It is marked by a large limestone rock, which covers the top of the grave. A marker appears to have been added several years later. It reads: "William Brooks - May 5, 1810 - Mar. 26, 1894 - Forever with The Lord."

Mrs. Shoults does not believe that the burial has ever been recorded. She states that it does not appear in Freestone County cemetery records. S. W. Moore and his wife Amelia Arkansas Brooks are buried in Shanks Cemetery.

LIFE IN RED RIVER COUNTY, TEXAS IN THE 1840s

This letter was found in the papers of the late Billye Gillette, long time local FWGS member. A note at the bottom states that it was "copied from the original hand written letter in Mitchell McCormack's file, Plattin, Jefferson County, Missouri" [date copied not given].

Red River County, Texas
April 20, 1843

Mr. Hardy McCormack:
Sir:

I received a few days since by Mr. Crow a line from Dr. Reed written at Shreveport in which you requested me to write you the latter part of the month. Last Monday I left Lamar [County] on my way to the Lake; when I left the people here all in arms, Church with them, scouring the thicket in search of Indians about there. Just after you left, about 100 of the Caddos came in and stole 27 horses, 6 from Stroll, 2 from Love and 2 from Burnett, 2 from Allen, 1 from Shelton, 1 from Harvey Shelton etc. They were very bold. On the Creek just above Mr. Brighans they had constructed a pound and in the middle of the day they were caught driving Shelton's horses toward it between Mr. Love and Mr. Brighans. They were pursued and one of them shot. A party of spies are out on the frontier attempting; although some Indians went out, some remained. Last Saturday an attempt was made by a party of Indians to shoot two of our men who had been out with some hogs on the Big Sulphur, but having fleet horses, they escaped. Last Saturday evening, 29 were seen some six miles above us on the Big Sulphur. Our men are at this. A party of some 200 or 300 men are starting out this week provisioned for six months to intercept Santa Fe Traders and to rob and take them prisoners if they can. Dr. Herrick and Dr. Kinsey and House are among these numbers; if they do not meet the Traders, they intend to go on and attack Sante Fe. Orders have just arrived from headquarters to raise 3 companies in this section immediately to act as spies on the South. The boundary line between this Republic and the U. S. is settled and we are not compelled to bond? our cotton or pay duty of 3 cents a pound. No cotton will go down this Spring. The merchants of Parksville will not bring us supplies this year. The Wrights will not take down their cotton. The people throughout this section of the County are all apathetic and talk of going to some other part of Texas. There will be a pretty general break for the Lake next Fall. Every man now is ready to sell. I am on my way now to see what changes there is for

me in the Lake Country. Scott and Father Orr, Burnett, Brigham, Love, Allen, George Wright and a host of others will leave Lamar within one year from this time. Such long faces you never saw as meet a fellow whichever way to turn. They are all out of coffee, sugar and have no means to get any more. They can get no credit at Stokesville and they will not take cotton for goods. Indeed they have stopped trading entirely with others of the River. Vegetation is coming forward rapidly. Church has got his corn. He is ahead of most farmers in Lamar. He is in good spirits. He says he is not afraid of the Indians, if he can't shoot them, he knows he can beat them running. He sends his love to all and wishes you to remember him to Thomas Gates. When I was in Clarksville day before yesterday, I found a letter in the office for O. B. Reed and another for Adam Poe. I do not know [where] they are from. I am now at Mr. Poe's four miles below Stokesville. Saturday I operated on his black woman's breast for cancer and [am] attending her for pain. My office is furnished and Monroe Allen is my student for one year. If I find an opening at the Lake, I shall move down as soon as I can. I have plenty of business in Lamar but they cannot pay. The cotton is out of the question. It is a drug [drag?] and I don't want it. Scott is well and family. He wants you to write soon. Please remember me with much love to your family, Mr. Monroe's family and Poston's and O. B. Reed's. I shall be happy to hear from you often.

THE STEWART FAMILY
OF PARKER COUNTY, TEXAS

William Harding Stewart was one of eight children of Zorah Stewart and Nancy Talbot. He was born in Utica, Oneida County, New York, in 1816 and died Feb. 5, 1901, in Parker County, Texas.

From his Journal "I was very deeply religious and devoted as a boy; indeed I do not remember the time when I did not pray regularly and most sincerely. Being raised a Quaker, I felt and acted as a Quaker and thought everything else wrong. They feed and clothe the needy--do not eat up all the sick man has, but bring something to relieve him. As an example, I remember that one Spring my father happened to get one leg crushed from the ankle to the knee. As his older children were away from home, and those at home were not able to plow, but his entire crop was planted and cultivated as well as any in the neighborhood. Wood was hauled and cut into firewood length and one thing especially seemed strange to me - when the sisters came each one brought a good supply of things to feed the family."

His parents moved to Marion Co. Ohio in 1823 and settled near Mt. Gilead. Again quoting his Journal "About May 1835 I was converted and baptized by a man by the name of Carter in Cayuga Co. Ohio. I then passed to the southern part of Ohio and attended Marietta College for a time, but, being poor, I could not pay my way through a full course. I left college for a while and taught school in Kentucky. Then traveled to Arkansas, then Virginia, and into Tennessee, preaching as I went. Arriving in Post Oak Springs, Roane Co. Tenn. I stopped at the house of Bro. Anthony Smith, the Elder of the church at Post Oak Springs. . . ." A year later he married Bro. Smith's daughter, Martha Jane.

"I taught school at different places and preached on Saturdays and Sundays. We lived in Arkansas from 1845 until 1851. From 1851 until the War was over my work was in Louisiana. We stayed in Cheneyville, LA for eight years, then went to Kentucky for two years [Casey County and the Green River country. He was a minister of the Christian Church.]

"From 1869 - 1879 I traveled mostly in Mississippi and after that I labored mostly in Texas."

Family tradition, he was captured by Union soldiers during the War and accused of aiding the Southerners. He gave the Yankee captain the traditional Masonic sign of distress and was spared execution.

Martha Jane was manager of the farm during her husband's absences, saving money so that he could be away to do his ministerial work. In 1879 they left Mississippi for Texas to live with their son and family in Thorp Spring, Texas. Evidently Texas had great attraction to the Rev. Stewart since he had visited him son at least yearly.

According to the 1900 Census for Parker County, they were living with their son, Thomas Marein Stewart, where they spent the last years of their lives.

William Stewart preached his last sermon in Weatherford, Texas on Sunday, March 19, 1893. He died February 5, 1901.

Children of William Harding Stewart and Martha Jane Smith: Virgil, Viola Z., Thomas Marein, Caledonia A., Robert Graham, James Edward Baxter (JEB). The names "Baxter" and "Graham" were names of preachers whom they both knew and greatly admired.

Thomas Marien Stewart was born in 1847, Fayetteville, Ark. and died in 1929 at Thorp Spring, Parker County, Texas. He married Emma Amelia Kelley in 1871. Their children: Callie Viola, Robert Kelley, Martha Bruhn, and Ben Irby Stewart. After his first wife's death he married Rose Ella (Rosa) Reynolds who died in 1949 in Fort Worth, Texas. They had one son, Thomas Reynolds Stewart.

Other known children of Zorah Stewart:

(1) Amasa Stewart was born in 1828 in Ohio and died in 1906 in La Marque, Texas. His wife, Harriet (Ashley) and oldest son, Charles, died in Minnesota. Amasa and his four remaining children moved to Denison, Texas in 1882. There he married a Mrs. Duck, a widow, and moved to La Marque in 1893 where he established "Stewart's Junction." He never recovered from his great loss of property in the 1900 hurricane and died 6 years later. Amasa and Harriet Stewart's children: Charles, William L., Mary, George Lucien and Laura N.

(2) Daniel Stewart also went to Texas and eventually to Washington, where he worked on a newspaper in either Spokane or Walla Walla.

(3) Robert Stewart, also a Texas resident for a time, followed his brother westward to either Washington or Oregon.

Many of the Stewart family are buried in the Smith Family Cemetery, located on the Campbell Walker farm north of Tin Top, in Parker County, Texas.

CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS

BELLE PLAIN COLLEGE

Belle Plain is deserted now..and quiet..windows make sagging spaces in ruins. On the rolling prairies of West Texas, the townsite was a natural sort of thing. Three busy roads met and crossed there. From the South came the famous Chisholm Trail. From the southeast was the Military Road between Fort Gates and Fort Phantom Hill and crossing both was the Bankhead Highway..an immigrant trail from east to west. There was also a government telegraph line to connect Fort Concho with Fort Griffin. The community of Belle Plain grew here - named perhaps for actual topography (a bell-shaped plain), perhaps for a frontier maiden, Belle McGhee. Stout rock buildings housed mercantile establishments of several kinds including a rock home built in 1877 by John Merchant (which stands today.) The town was the county seat from 1877 to 1883 and had some 400 permanent residents, a post office, grist mill, Odd Fellows Lodge and three saloons.

In 1885 Belle Plain College, perhaps the first denominational college in West Texas, was opened by Methodists. In the first year there were 85 students and 125 for the second year. There was a building for female students, who wore uniforms of blue skirts and grey blouses. The boys had uniforms of blue trimmed with grey, worn with silver braid caps befitting their status as members of the "Texas Military Institute." In 1880 after the T & P Railroad bypassed Belle Plain, (followed by a three-year drought,) the townspeople gravitated to the new town of Baird - on the railroad. In 1890 only about 40 people remained. Not only did the population move, but took with them the new \$6,500, two-story jail! [Note: it was never used for a jail in Baird. Only the walls, rock by rock, were moved; the cell was left behind where today its ruins are identifiable.]

But it was harder to kill the College. Belle Plain College possessed an outstanding music department, boasting some 12 or 15 grand pianos; a band and even a symphony orchestra. The instructors were paid handsomely - \$35 a month. Staff was first housed with local families. When a dormitory was built, room and board was \$12 a month. The music department was headed by Professor and Mrs. I. M. Onins. When he died in 1892, the College gave up. Some say the music lingers on in the mesquite jungles thorny branches. There is the tale of a horseman seen on the ghostly streets for several years after the town died, a cowpuncher who met an untimely end there. There is a Belle Plain cemetery and a crumbling ranchhouse belonging to the old Seale family. The editor of the Fort Griffin Echo visited Belle Plain in 1879 and wrote glowingly of the little town.

Ministers who were prominent in the College were: Rev. R. M. Black and Rev. J. T. L. Annis (Jerome Thomas Latimer Annis) who served as Presiding Elder of the Belle Plain District, President of Belle Plain College and pastor of the local Methodist Church.

From 1881 - 1882, President Chatfield served as head. He was succeeded by Rev. Annis who was the most vocal to advocate the founding of the school. It was under his leadership that the school enrollment reached 125 but declined to 115 in 1883-84. Pres. Annis used personal contact to recruit students more than any one else. Then the printed page. Presidents Annis, Virgel [C. M. Virgel] and Onins used the Abilene, Albany, Brownwood and Callahan papers as media.

May 8, 1884

Hayes County. A pistol fight at Long Branch School between Gus Schedicher and Houston Gary resulted in the death of Gary and wounding of a bystander, Wiley Watson. Several women and children were present but none injured. Schedicher is still at large.

Temple Houston of Mobeetie is a candidate for the State Senate.

Local. Capt. T. P. James, formerly of this place, passed through yesterday with 700 head of cattle headed to Dakota Territory where he plans to establish ranches.

Fishing season is upon us. Squire John Timmons reports a 47# catfish.

Bishop Garrett will lay the cornerstone Thursday 15th inst. for the Episcopal Church.

Local. Rev. J. R. Nelson left on Monday's stage for Mineral Wells for his health.

July 3, 1884

Mr. Moore of Hamilton County, lost 97 of 300 sheep Monday night penned in the East Dallas Stockyards.

Cleburne. Fire this morning in the stores of J. A. Willingham, J. F. Jeffries and Murdock and Blackwell on the west side of the square resulted in \$25,000 damages.

Dr. C. W. Barrodall, prominent citizen of Fort Worth, was shot and killed by Charles Herren. [no reason given.]

All nine prisoners in the Erath County jail at Stephenville escaped last Friday 20th inst.

The Brazos County school lands - 17,000 acres in Clay and Archer Counties - were sold yesterday to Wichita Land and Cattle Company for \$4 an acre. This is the best price ever for school lands in this state.

July 10, 1884

Lycurgus McCracken was arrested in San Antonio on the 18th inst. He is considered a tough customer - he had wounded 2 deputy sheriffs in Tarrant County.

Things worth knowing: [?]

Lumps of table salt in kerosene lamps will prevent explosion. Hair switches can be dyed a beautiful black in boiling walnut peelings. When dry brush and oil. Coffee grounds on flower beds will drive ants away.

Col. Harvey Wright leaves Monday to visit his seriously ill father in Eureka Springs, Arkansas.

July 17, 1884

George C. Lewis, Palo Pinto County Treasurer, went to Weatherford last Wednesday to buy goods. When he failed to return as scheduled, his wife went looking for him and learned that instead of going to Weatherford he had been seen on a train. An examination of the vault Monday night showed \$11,500 missing. During the 13 - 14 years he resided here he had never committed a dishonest act. It is supposed that the temptation was too great.

Denison. A shoemaker named Joe Kuntz went to the residence of Father Buford where his divorced wife was housekeeper. He shot her three times and believing her dead, went to his own room and shot himself. It is believed that he had followed her to Denison from Dallas.

Gatesville. Lewis Johnson, agent for Singer Sewing Machine Company, was killed Monday night.

Texas Topics. Clarksville needs a new courthouse. An opium den is among Fort Worth attractions. The Fort Worth Democrat reports the Tarrant County population at 47,000. Boerne is said to be full of invalids and pretty women.

July 24, 1884

A letter has been received from W. R. Moore of Giles County, Tenn., inquiring about William Newton Wilson. Wilson came to Texas several years ago, lived in Ellis County and then near Hubbard - was known as "Newt." Any information appreciated; has been rumored to be dead. Mr. Moore is his brother-in-law.

Fort Worth. George B. Loving left for St. Louis for an important meeting relating to founding a stock journal and farmer's paper - the first issue to appear Sept. 1st.

Local. John F. Brim, District Attorney, died Thursday, 17th inst. near Chapel Hill, Tenn., while on a visit to his old home. He had lived here 6 years, but will be buried there.

October 2, 1884

Texas Topics. Belton is to have a large school. Denton has a new Presbyterian Church. Fort Worth is now lighted with gas. Mrs. Henderson of Marshall has 157 living children and grand-children. J. P. Hutchison, Fort Worth lawyer, was shot at Waco on the 25th. E. D. Tarven was arrested at Houston for bigamy - in his wife's absence, he eloped with a Miss Martin.

Gatesville. A Miss McWilliams drowned yesterday in the river 4 miles from town. She lived in Louisiana and was visiting relatives here. She had been in bad health and her death is considered a suicide.

Local. Mr. J. B. Terrell and Miss Mary Lindsey were married at Belknap on 28th inst.

Mr. C. H. Crawford and Miss Annie White were married at Graham on the 20th inst.

October 9, 1884

Fort Worth is having trouble with dairymen. A gang of counterfeiters has also arrived there. Tarrant County has over 40 divorce suits for hearing at the present District Court session. Paris. 60,000 feet of lumber was destroyed by fire.

Palo Pinto. Be on the lookout for a man named Richardson who is a salesman for sewing machines. He is 42 years old, heavy set and bald, has blue eyes. Ran away from Palo Pinto on Sept. 5 leaving some bills not paid. Claims to have a family in Jefferson, Texas.

October 16, 1884

Texas Topics. Seymour copper mines are booming. Chicken thieves are doing well in Fort Worth. H. S. Haven of that city was declared insane by jury. A man named Harris was badly hurt at a gin at Ennis on 8th. Judge Drake of Granbury is quite ill from a spider bite. Mrs. Farlander of Dallas, aged 70, has sworn an affidavit against her son, aged 30, for beating her. Mr. Lum Kearley, while on a hunting trip in Wise County, was accidentally shot and killed. Mr. Childress, on trial for murder of his father-in-law in Seymour has been acquitted.

Local. D. C. Brooks and Hinson started Tuesday with wagon trains loaded with corn for Mabry, Glasgow and Crawford's ranch in King County.

Dept. Crozier and James Melton came in last night with Lem Chesher, arrested for theft. He posted \$500 bail with Mart Childress and Judge Melvin sureties.

October 23, 1884

F. W. Cohen, a drummer from Richmond, Va., was severely horse whipped in Fort Worth for insulting a lady!

J. W. Haskew, Bowie City marshal, is under arrest for theft of considerable property.

Local. Mr. J. D. Short and Miss Nannie Olivia Price were married at the residence of bride's parents in Graham on 16th inst., Rev. J. R. Nelson officiating.

Mr. S. R. Crawford is at his ranch in King County.

Tom Green County. While driving cattle in a roundup, W. W. Harris was thrown from horse and killed. The funeral at San Angelo was one of the largest the town has ever seen.

October 30, 1884

Col. W. F. Henderson of Corsicana is such a smoker that he orders pipes wholesale. He recently ordered 200 from North Carolina, paying \$1 for entire lot.

G. E. Gilbert of Abilene, wishes the ladies of each county in the 11th district to do a patch for a quilt to be sent to the World's Fair. Graham ladies are expected to do their part.

Rev. J. R. Nelson preached his farewell sermon at the Methodist Church and will leave shortly for the Annual Conference in Waco. We are sorry to see him leave.

The sheriff of Uvalde County has "skipped out" with \$7,000 of public money.

Bill Hays, of Siepe Springs in Comanche County, was called to his window and shot dead.

Texas Topics. Female drummers are working in Texas. The Houston Post has stopped publication. Stockmen in Grayson County are moving cattle because of no water. Fort Worth will shortly have a refrigerating works in operation.

November 6, 1884

Local. Mr. W. R. Drumm and Miss Susie Short were married Thursday 23rd ult. Rev. G. W. Black officiating.

Miss Isabelle Kinsinger of Iowa arrived on the Friday stage to teach school here.

Rev. J. A. Eddleman and wife had a near fatal accident a few days ago. When the straps broke on their wagon, the horses were frightened and ran away, throwing Mrs. Eddleman out and running over her. She has rather serious injuries, but Rev. Eddleman was not hurt.

A Mr. Nelms shot and killed W. E. Carmey near Uvalde for eloping with Nelms wife.

J. L. Matson was sentenced to 5 years in pen for killing the sheriff of Wharton County.

Missing - a Mr. Archer, who left Syracuse, N. Y. for Galveston on the 12th carrying \$21,000 to buy land. His daughter is looking for him.

The residence of Mrs. Mary E. Barns in Marshall burned last week. At the time of the fire, the family was sitting up with the corpse of her son-in-law.

A Preview FORT WORTH AND TARRANT COUNTY, 1880

Some have asked about the status of the 1880 Tarrant County census, which has been in preparation for some years. The maps on the following two pages are two of some twenty-five maps and illustrations created by Nancy Timmons Samuels for that soon-to-be-completed census and are used, herein, with her permission.

The census, itself, was copied (for the most part) in the 1960s by the late Betty Coburn Winchester, FWGS member and Editor of *Footprints*, and completed by Barbara Roach Knox. The late Pearl Foster O'Donnell, FWGS member, was also helpful during those years, lending valuable aid in interpretation of names. Both she and Betty were Tarrant County natives and had done much research pertaining to the area. The books are dedicated to their memory.

The work consists of two volumes: Volume I, the three wards of Fort Worth and all of Justice Precinct 1, outside the city (five Enumeration Districts), 257 pp., plus a full name index. Volume II, the remainder of the county, Justice Precincts 2 through 8 (eight EDs), some 320 pp., plus a full name index. This volume is not yet completed.

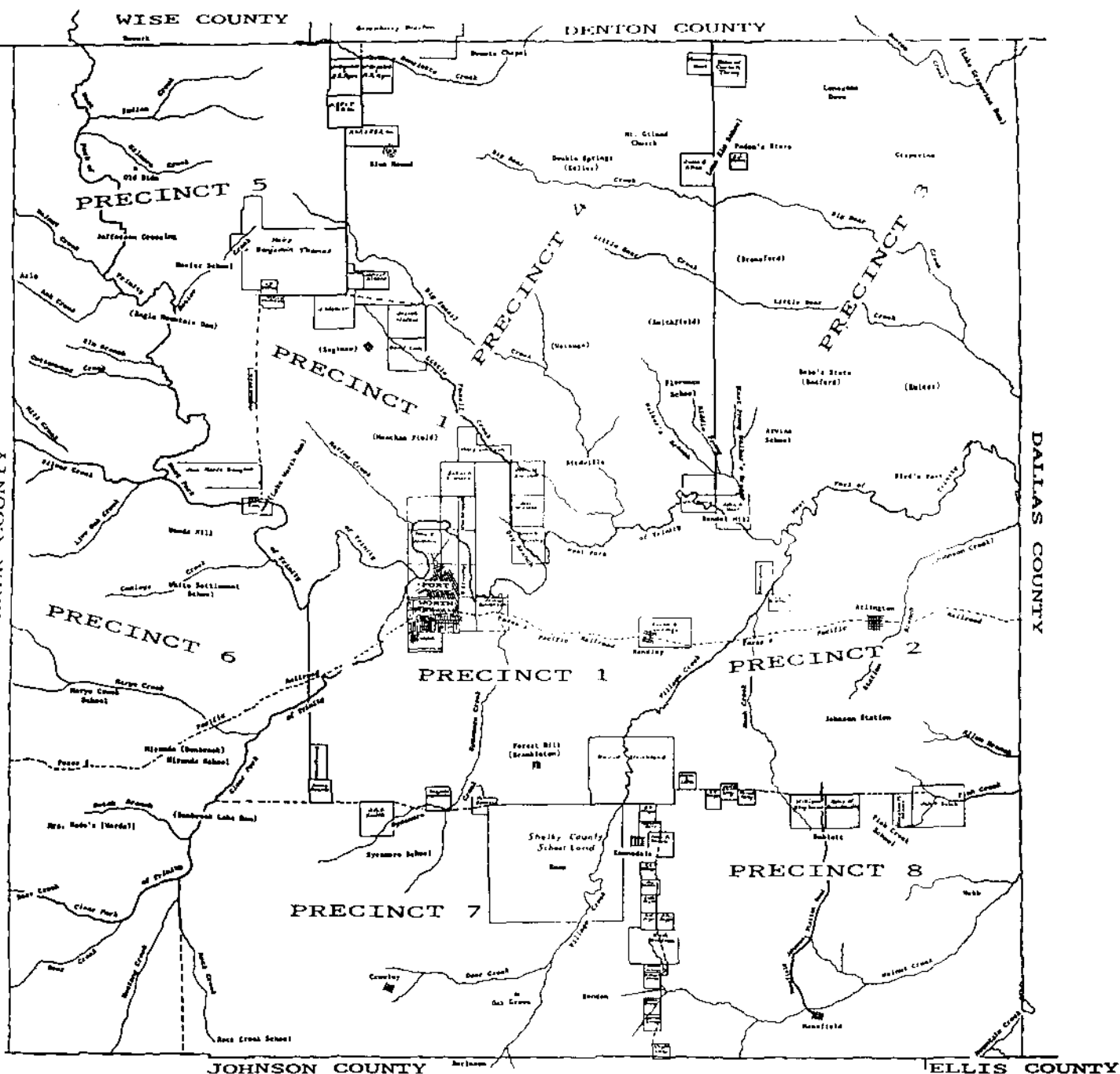
Also included is other research of a most time-consuming nature, most of which has been done by Mrs. Samuels. Some of the highlights include:

- A Re-cap of Federal Censuses, 1790-1880, including an in-depth discussion of the 1870 and 1880 schedules, also the Supervisor Districts and Divisions of Texas in 1880.
- Tarrant County Justice Precincts, 1870-1880; discussion of their creation, boundaries, etc., and maps of each.
- Original surveys within the city limits of 1880 Fort Worth (with map) and a discussion of the development of each.
- Population study of Tarrant County and Fort Worth, 1880-1890 (Are the government's population figures for 1880 really correct or overstated?).
- Occupations: In addition to the regular occupations, there was one Rag Picker, one Scavenger, and one (only one?) Habitual Drunkard!
- Real Estate development of Fort Worth, 1870s (Does the historical marker at Pioneer Rest Cemetery have inaccurate information?).
- Fort Worth Real Estate Additions (a table).
- Explanations pertaining to each of the Enumeration Districts, a general tracing of the route of each census-taker and his idiosyncracies, and helpful clues in reading the handwriting of each enumerator. Also, an explanation of the torn, erroneously-mended, almost unreadable first ten pages on microfilm (Ward 1 of Fort Worth).

Over a long period of time, copious research--in court minutes, tax rolls, city directories, land records, newspapers, Federal Records microfilm and publications, etc.--has been done in the preparation of these volumes.

A copy of the census portion of this work has been loaned to those working on the 1890 Census Reconstruction Project, for checking purposes, to facilitate their work.

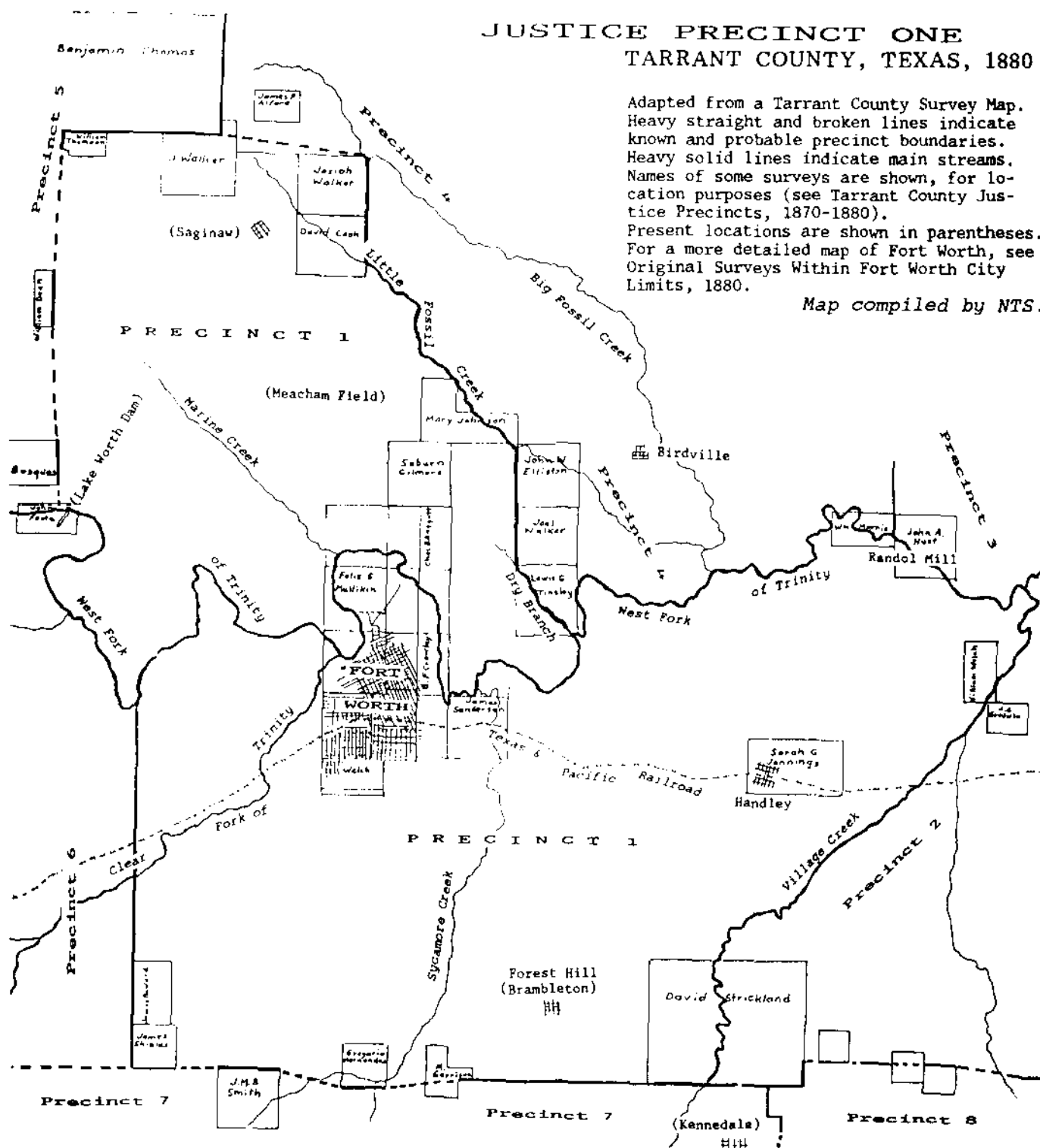
TARRANT COUNTY, TEXAS JUSTICE PRECINCTS, 1880

PRECINCT ONE, shaped like a reclining chair, with Little Fossil Creek as its back and West Fork as its seat, was touched by all but one of the other precincts (Pcts. 2-7). This caused more than the average number of double enumerations on the census. Precinct One, itself, was enumerated in five EDs (3 for Fort Worth), and within the city and precinct there were many double enumerations.

James W. McClain is listed in the 1880 Wise County census with wife Elizabeth, 50 TN; Sarah A. dau, 17 TX; William T. son, 15 TX; George F. son, 13 TX; Vinetta dau 10, born in Kansas. James W. and Elizabeth were married in Johnson County, Texas, 1856. Elizabeth married first husband John Guinn ca 1846 in Tennessee. He died 1850-51 Cherokee County, Texas. Would like to locate James W. and Elizabeth on the 1860 and 1870 censuses.

COMMENT:

J. W. McClain married Elizabeth Thompson 22 May 1856 in Johnson County, Texas. I do not find them on the 1860 or 1870 censuses of any county in this general area. You state that Elizabeth married first John Guinn. Did she marry (2) Thompson and (3) McClain? It appears that the McClains may have been in Kansas in 1870, as a daughter was born there c1870.

4-1-91 BUCHANAN, HAYDEN

My gr-grandfather lived in Sherman, Texas, in the late 1800's and early 1900's. His name was William Minton Buchanan and was married to Dora Hayden. They had eight sons and two daughters: Virgle, Albert, Roy L. (born there June 22, 1897), Walter, born February 4, 1890, Carl, Plez, Chester, Earnest, Ethel, and Lorene. Who were William's and Dora's parents? Were they also from that part of Texas?

5-1-91 PERKINS, HITCHCOCK, GREER, THOMAS, WILSON

Seek information on my great-grandparents: Linton Perkins, son of Stephen Perkins and Ruth Hitchcock, was born 1824 in Grayson County, Va., married Celia Greear, daughter of Shadrack Greear and Celia Thomas. Moved to Tarrant County, TX in 1856. Had children: Stephen A., Almeda Elizabeth, Calvin Lee, Sarah Eveline, Noah, Matilda, Linton T. and Elvira Clementine, who married Isaac Thomas Wilson in Tarrant County in 1890. Need details about their lives and wish to contact any descendants. Will share information and pay for postage, copying, etc.

COMMENT:

We do not find evidence that Linton Perkins was in Tarrant County by 1856. He is not on tax rolls. The 1870 census indicates that his daughter Evaline was born Virginia c1858 and daughter Matilda was born Texas c1860, thus indicating that he came to the area 1858-1860. On the 1867 Tarrant County Voter's Register Linton Perkins is indicated as having been born in Illinois and had arrived in Tarrant County 1858-1859. However, we do not find him on the 1850 tax roll. There is no 1860 census for Tarrant County.

The S. T. and L. Perkinses on the 1860 tax roll were Smith T. and Leander Perkins, of a family originating in Rhode Island and not related to the Linton Perkins family. All of the Perkinses who patented land in this county, prior to 1878, were of the Smith T. Perkins group. You might question whether or not Linton was actually living in Tarrant County in 1860 (the 1867 Voter's register notwithstanding) and look for him in another county in Texas in 1860, or

perhaps even back in Virginia in 1860. I understand that there is tradition that Linton Perkins "returned to Virginia and fought in the Civil War from there, with some of his brothers."

COMMENT:

We do not find the Calvin Jones Wright family in Johnson County in 1880, nor do we find his marriage, ca 1873, in Johnson County. Thank you for your kind remarks about our publication.

COMMENT:

Jasper N. Ogletree was in Rusk County in 1850. Was Cynthia J. Birdwell a young widow when she married Jasper? In 1870, Tarrant County, he and Cynthia has children: George E., Martha E., and Lewis B. Ogletree and Elzora Birdwell, age 11, living with them. In 1880 she and husband George Clifford were in Tarrant County, she age 28, thus born c1858-9, per censuses. In 1880 Jasper N. Ogletree's wife is enumerated as Sarah J., but she appears to be same as wife in 1870. We find no child J. H., which you indicated is shown on Soundex of

1880. Children listed on 1880 census: George E., Martha E., Louis B., and Rutha J. Ogletree. This household appears to have been erroneously enumerated in 1880, when comparing the 1870 and 1880 censuses. See 1870 census, Pct 1, page 135, #980-982, and 1880 census, ED 93 (Pct 7), page 1, #15-17, also page 31 #188-193 (Clifford household). Other Ogletrees of Tarrant County 1880 may be found in the same ED 93, page 32, #210-213, and in ED 97, page 13, #111-111.

AMELIA COUNTY, VIRGINIA, WILL BOOK 3, 1780-1786; WILL BOOK 4, 1786-1792; WILL BOOK 5, 1793-1799, abstracted by Bel Hubbard Wise, Powell Publishing Co., Weatherford TX 76086. These three books are 8 1/2 x 11", paper backed. The contents were copied from microfilm, arranged neatly, and indexed.

THE BORENS PAST AND PRESENT, by Helen Meeks, PO Box 45, Slaton TX 79364. Hard bound, 8 1/2 x 11", indexed, illustrated. The author says that the town of Ennis, Texas, in Ellis County, was named by the Borens who lived there for Ennis, Ireland, where their forefathers lived. In Ireland the name is spelled Boran. During the period of Oliver Cromwell three Boren brothers, John, William, and another name unknown, escaped to America, bringing a bag of gold with them.

Along with the genealogy of the descendants of these immigrants, the author has included many biographical sketches and photographs which make the book interesting reading.

These books have been placed in the Genealogy Department of the Fort Worth Public Library, and the Society thanks the donors for their generosity.

THE TEXAS FRONTIER BATTALION

The Frontier Battalion was created by the Adjutant General's office in the 1870s. It consisted of five or six companies which were stationed at various sites on the Texas frontier. While it may have been a part of the Texas Rangers, no mention of such has yet been found in the papers.

The following information has been taken from the Adjutant General Records, RG 401, Box 401-1158 (Frontier Bn 7.a. 13-15, 16-18, 19-23) at the Texas State Archives.

General Order No. 2. The Frontier Battalion authorized by the law approved April 10 '74 will be organized as follows

John B. Jones	Major Commanding Qm and Paymaster

Captains will proceed at once to organization of their company, calling to their aid the Lieutenants assigned to them.

Lieutenants will at once report to their captain. The period of Service will be twelve months unless sooner discharged.

As it is expected that this force will be kept actively employed during their term of Service only Sound young men without families and with good horses will be received.

Persons under indictment or of known bad character or habitual drunkards will be rejected.

Captains will make temporary arrangements to supply as economically as possible for furnishing the men with bread, beef, coffee and sugar & salt; the receipts for which will be taken up by the battalion Quarter Master.

May 7, 1874 Capt. E. F. Ikard Co "C" frontier Battalion with 7 men, attacked a party of 10 Indians, driving toward Indian nation a herd of some 150 head of cattle. Drove the Indians (fighting) about 15 miles Killed one of their horses & captured one. Killed an Indian who fell from his horse. Captured the herd valued at \$1500 and returned cattle to proper owners.

July 9, 1874 Sgt. W. T. Foucher Co. "C" and 8 men, was charged upon by 50 Indians - Fell back took shelter in brush - firing kept up for 3 or 4 hours when Indians left. One horse slightly wounded.

July 11, 1874 Lt. G. W. Campbell Co. "C" and 20 men found an Indian camp on Big Wichita. After a slight skirmish with 75 or 80 Indians captured 43 horses and mules & some camp equipage. Some of the stock was claimed by and returned to owners, and balance turned over to frontier Battalion Quarter Master.

July 12, 1874 2 horses dropped by Indians taken up by Lt. B. F. Best Co. "E" Sergt. A. Mather Co. "E" runs an Indian 4 miles.

July 12 - Major Jno B. Jones, Capt. G. W. Stevens Co "B" Lieut. J. T. Wilson Co "A" and 34 non-commissioned officers and privates engaged over 125 Indians at Lost Valley. Pvts. D. W. H. Bailey and W. A. Glass Co. "B" killed. Lt. Lee Corn Co. "F" and George Moore Co. "E" wounded; 12 horses killed and permanently disabled; 3 Indians killed and 3 wounded - Seen on prairie; captured 1 horse, blankets, bows, arrows &c

July 25, 1874 - Sergt M. T. Israel Co. "E" and 21 men struck a party of 6 Indians near Head of clear fork of Brazos. Killed 2 Indians and 1 horse. Captured 1 brave who next day died of his wounds. Captured bows, quivers, arrows, 1 spencer rifle 1 pistols &c. 1 horse (Corpl. H. Sacketts') killed in action.
L. R. Davis wounded; 1 horse wounded

August 22, 1874 Capt. Neal Coldwell Co "F" with Scouting party caught sight of 9 Indians gave unsuccessful pursuit. Took up 1 horse dropped by Indians.

Company A. Between May 28 and June 12 '74 Capt. Jno. R. Waller's command made over 22 arrests of cattle thieves and desperadoes. Turned over to Sheriff of DeWitt County 7 prisoners (members of John Harkins gang) and to Sheriffs of other counties, the remainder of the parties arrested. John Hardin was wounded by Capt. Miller, but made good his escape.

---Barckman and ---Anderson, murderers of Col. --- Love of Navarro County were killed whilst resisting arrest by the Sheriff and part of the company. Captured & returned to owners 800 head of cattle. Between June 12 and July 1st the company made several arrests in Comanche, Brown and Coleman Counties.

Company D. - July 29th. Capt. C. R. Perry's command assisted civil authorities in bringing Felix Mann and accomplices to Justice. July 30th, Sergt. N. G. Murray, with civil authorities, arrested Thos. Hopper - desperado -

Company E. - May 10th. Capt. W. J. Maltby and Lt. J. G. Connell captured 2 horses, bridles & saddles from horse thieves - property returned to owners.

June 11th - Lt. J. G. Connell arrested Andrew Crockett, cattle thief - turned over to sheriff of Brown County.

June 17th. Lieut. B. F. Best arrested ----Steith, cattle thief. Turned over to sheriff of Brown County.

July 12. Lt. B. F. Best arrested 2 men at Fort Concho. Turned them over to Sheriff of Comanche County.

Company F. Aug. 31. Capt. Neal Coldwell arrested Wm. Hobbs, burglar & thief from Wood county; turned him over to sheriff of Kerr County.

If he cannot Pay only the first quarter Please have him (Capt Kinsy) give a statement in writing to Mr. Green over his signature the Balance due & then I can dispose of it for something, and go home from the amount you may draw you can hand Mr. John Green \$9.20 amount due J. S. Vedder for his Acct and balance you may have drawn for my account also hand to John Green

Gen. Wm. Steele, Adj't. General, Austin, Texas

Sir - I have the honor to report that I arrived at this place (Capt. Ikard's Camp) yesterday. I find this company too far out to render the most effective service and shall at once move it some twenty miles southeast near S. W. corner of Clay county. I desire also to have it near to Camp Stevens' Camp, Flat Top Mountain, northwest corner of Young County in order that the two may be brought together promptly in case the Indians come in large bodies, which from present indications, I think quite probable.

I am satisfied now that we rendered valuable service to the frontier by the fight in Lost valley on the 12th inst. The Indians we fought were composed of two parties of from fifty to seventy-five each. One party had been in the mountains around the valley for two days having shown themselves only once (when they killed one of Loving's hands).

The other was traveling southeast in the direction of the corners of Young, Jack, Parker and Palo Pinto counties, having left Lost Valley some seven miles to the east when they discovered that we were pursuing them, changed their course N E and joined the party in Lost Valley. The next morning, the 18th, they are supposed, from the signal smokes seen, to have concentrated some fifteen miles N W of the Valley. On the 14th Lt. McGanah found their trail above where the smokes were seen and followed it some distance North West. Several days later Lieut. Beavert with a scouting party from Capt. Ikard's company found where a large party had crossed the Big Wichita going out about the 14th or 15th, which was beyond a doubt the party we found, as they were coming from and travelling in the same direction.

Both Lieutenants give the same description of the trail and think it was made by about 150 Indians and say they had no loose horses with them. No horses were taken and no damage done by this party in the settlements.

On the 11th Lieut. Campbell with a scouting party from Co. C. found an Indian camp on Big Wichita and captured forty-three horses and mules and some camp equipage which doubtless belonged to the Indians we fought on the 12th as they passed out that way on their return. Some of the stock has been claimed by and restored to citizens who say it was stolen from them several years ago. The balance has been turned over to the Quarter Master, some of the mules will be appropriated for pack purposes and the balance sold.

INDIANS IN LOVING VALLEY

Loving's Ranch, Jack Co. Tex.
May 21st 1874

Editor of the Times:
Dear Sir:

I am called upon to inform you that the indians have again visited my ranch and with results more distressing to relate than heretofore. Yesterday morning May 20th I started three men around the valley for the purpose of "rounding in" the scattering cattle from my herd (an every day duty) one of the men going to the East side, and the other two on the North and West of the range.

One of these men was a worthy Mexican and the other a young man by the name of James K. P. Wright, whose people live in the State of Arkansas, except one brother who resides in Palo Pinto county of this State, as I have been informed. When about four miles from the ranch, he and the Mexican separated, Wright going further on where he saw some cows grazing, saying he would drive them back and meet the other men at a designated place. The Mexican went on as directed, and after arriving at the place, waited some considerable time for Wright, but he did not make his appearance, and the Mexican being tired of waiting, went on around the cattle and returned to the ranch shortly after 12 o'clock p.m., and then stated he had left Mr. Wright, as above.

We did not become at all alarmed at his absence until about sundown that evening when it was then too late to think of hunting for him This morning dawned and he had not come in, accordingly I, and five of my men, started in search of him as soon as we could. We went to the spot where the Mexican last saw him, and hunting some hour or more struck his trail and soon discovered that four other horses besides the one he was riding had been running at full speed, the four being all barefooted. After following the trail some half mile or more we came in sight of his body, one arrow was sticking in his right side, his left arm broken and a terrible gunshot wound directly under it, one other wound between his shoulders, on the back and his head scalped.

We picked up portions of an Indian lance and a sack containing what we supposed to be raw buffalo meat. I immediately had his remains removed to the ranch, where they were interred in the best and most decent manner our scanty means would admit of.

Mr. Wright had been in my employ something over three years, and has always given entire satisfaction in every respect, being punctual, truthful, steady and honest in every particular, and I have no doubt, but will be remembered as such by many persons who knew him during the time he lived with me in Weatherford. He has some property and wages

due him in my hands which I hold subject to the proper claimants whom I hope will see this.

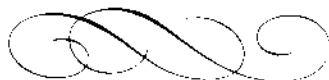
His father's address is unknown to me otherwise I would write to him of this sad affair, which has seated a deep gloom over all the party, a portion of my family being here with me.

How long will this murdering of peaceful citizens, striving to make an honest living, be allowed to go on in the land at the hands of these blood-thirsty pests, of supply contractors and unprincipled traders? Arkansas papers please take notice.

Additional information from Mr. McDaniel:

Neavel Ellison McRee was born in Marion County, S. C. July 21, 1820. He married Jane Margaret Walter March 1, 1838, and their first child, Ellison Hughgie, was born Sept. 29, 1841. The McRees moved to Clarke County, Miss. about 1842. Neavel's parents, John and Martha McRee, were in Mississippi in 1840 and all of their eight children and families eventually located there.

Neavel and Jane McRee had thirteen children. Jane died July 4, 1861, a few days after the birth of her daughter, Lucretia.

Neavel McRee's second wife was Susan Jewel Bartee by whom he had eight children, all born on the McRee Plantation at DeSoto, Mississippi, which is still a farm worked by a McRee. This total of 21 children helped considerably to populate Mississippi as well as Texas.

My grandfather, Brown McRee, came to Texas with three different wagon trains. On the third trip, he rode his horse to Oklahoma Territory and worked on a large cattle ranch in Paul's Valley for seventeen years. Returning to Texas, he eventually settled on the east side of the Trinity River at the Dido Crossing. Brown and Lena McRee reared eight children on this farm - the family known as the Dido McRees. My mother, Oakley McRee McDaniel, was their first daughter. The youngest daughter, Ophelia Ansley, the only child now living, resides in a Fort Worth nursing home.

BIBLE RECORD OF OZIAS JAMES TAYLOR

This huge Bible was published by the American Bible Society, New York in 1851. Apparently it belonged to Ozias James Taylor and Annie May Marks. The first marriage record in the Bible is theirs, and is in his handwriting (as compared to his letter of proposal.) He also recorded the birth dates of his first wife Amanda and his second wife, Annie. Another hand (probably Annie's) recorded the Marks family records, apparently in retrospect. These entries appear to have been done all at one time, such as the birth records of the Marks children, all born prior to 1857, the actual first entry. The writing then changed to that of Hattie Amanda Taylor Phillips, oldest surviving child of O. J. Taylor, as attested to by her grandson, Richard F. Phillips and Dorothy Lyle Phillips Fry, daughter of Hattie [Mrs. McKee's grandmother.]

In 1977 the Bible was in the possession of Richard F. Phillips of Dallas, Texas.

VETERANS' REUNION

Letter from William Gill Cooper, Jr. (then living at Wylie, Texas) to his nephew, Robert Ansel Cooper, Jr., in Florence, Mississippi.

Dallas, Texas June 9th 1902

Dear Bob, I guess you think I am rather slow in writing and I plead guilty to the charge. This leaves me in fine form also all the rest. I am up here in Dallas for a short stay brousing around the city among the big folks.

I attended the reunion in April from start to finish and such a time I never saw before in all my life. I have been here at the State fair when there were fifty thousand people at the gate in one day and I thought that a big crowd, but it was nothing compared to the reunion. They came from every State in the Union. There was a big Army of old gray beards on hand and we had a jolly time for four days.

There was plenty of good things to eat and drink and if an old Soldier did not get it he was too lazy or did not want to go into the dining room to get it. I never saw as long tables in all my travels. I will give you a sketch of what was there to eat. Loaf bread by the ton. Meat beef, pork and fowl, pickles of all kinds, tomatoes, soup, rice, gravy, different kinds of peppers, sauces, coffee and sugar of the best kind and a sight of it. All the articles mentioned were in abundance and the last day we had Buffalo plenty of it good and fat. So if you hear of any complaint of any one not getting anything to eat or a place to sleep, set it down as a falsehood. The old Soldiers was free and Dallas made a good preparation for all. They could get meals from 15 cents to 75 cents to suit their own fancy and appetite. If they wanted a first class hotel and all modern fixtures they could get it from \$1.50 to \$5.00 per day. So they could be suited any way.

On the 20th and 21st of May I attended the Mexican's Veterans reunion in Fort Worth. There was 85 of us on hand - the youngest 72 yrs. and the oldest 87, the average age of all was 77 yrs, and the united age of the whole was over four thousand years.

I met three of my old comrades who were in the same Regiment and fought in the battle of Monterey and Buena Vista. Two of them William E. Estes and George P. Finley was in the Jackson Fencibles Co. E. John L. McManus Capt. L. Newman was from Vicksburg Co. C. Capt. Chrump. Newman is 83 yrs old but a stout old man. Wm. E. Estes is the son of

Dr.---- in the Steen Creek neighborhood. You may bet your bottom dollar we had a good old handshaking time. R. E. Lee camp of Confederate Veterans of Fort Worth, the largest and strongest camp in the State invited us to Fort Worth [at] the Delaware the leading hotel there and paid all the expense of the reunion. We had everything a heart could desire. The ladies took us in hand the last evening and give us a fine lunch of all kinds of edibles - coffee, ice cream and then chartered the street cars together and rode us all over the town. All the old Soldiers whose wives were living had them along. There were several widdows there who were away up in 85 yrs of age. If I could see you it would take hours to tell you all I saw and the glorious time we had. I am up here for a couple of weeks and then I am going home to Wylie.

I have got four acres of as fine corn as you ever looked at and a mare and as fine a colt as you could find.

Is Joe in Newton. Where is Carrie. Love to everybody and above all to your good old Mother. I send Araminda a sheet of paper. Please give it to her and oblige.

Anderson, Sidney Samuels, W. B. Paddock, W. M. Massle?, George W. Clark, W. P. Lane, W. W. Tolhart, John M. Adams, J. M. Ball, S. S. Potts and J. Stockett.

Saturday, April 12, 1902

Many prominent delegates to the national reunion of Confederate Veterans at Dallas will make Fort Worth their headquarters. Judge A. W. Terrell of Austin and Dr. John G. Terrell, (who was surgeon general in General Lee's army,) of Lynchburg, Va. will be guests of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Terrell. Major General K. M. Van Zandt, commanding the Texas Division of Confederate Veterans, will entertain General J. B. Robertson and wife of Waco.

When the roll of Sons of Confederate Veterans is called at Dallas at the national convention, Fort Worth will respond with a membership of 1240 - which leads the entire South. Capt. W. B. Paddock has been chosen as an additional aide de camp on Commander's Houghton's staff.

Mr. W. A. Huffman received word yesterday evening that Ed. F. Warren, his brother-in-law and lately city attorney, had died about 4 o'clock in Memphis. Mrs. Warren had gone to Alabama where her husband was taken so sick and was on her way home with him. Mr. P. A. Huffman, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Warren and Mr. Warren's sister left yesterday morning for Memphis but they will reach there too late. Nothing but sorrow was expressed when the sad news was learned.

Fort Worth Star Telegram, Tuesday May 29, 1923.

Mrs. Alice Warren McKnight, 62, died at the home of her sister, Miss Mattie Warren, 1111 East Belknap Street, at 11:30 am Tuesday.

She is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Douglas Page of the Phillippine Islands; sisters Miss Mattie Warren of Fort Worth, Mrs. Emma Randall of Dallas, Brothers Charles of New York City, Henry of Lawton, Oklahoma and Burt of Leighton, Alabama. Funeral services will be held at the Chapel of the Robertson Mueller Undertaking Company Wed. afternoon. [Her sister's name was Eunice Randall - not Emma. She was the widow of Dr. Jefferson N. McKnight.]

Fort Worth Star Telegram, Sunday, December 26, 1943.

Miss Mattie Warren, 86, beloved by hundreds of students since she came to Fort Worth as a teacher in 1881, died Saturday afternoon at her home 1500 Cooper. She had been in failing health since she retired from teaching in the Fort Worth Public Schools in 1923.

Ready wit and kindness quickly won friends for Miss Warren when she arrived in the Western frontier town of Fort Worth from her birthplace, LaGrange, Georgia. [Her birthplace was Moulton, Lawrence Co. Alabama.]

She and Miss Sue Huffman, who later married Miss Warren's brother Ed, established the Warren Institute, a private school which they operated for several years. The institute occupied the building of Old Texas Wesleyan College, which stood where the city hall annex is now at Jennings and Texas. After a few years as headmistress, Miss Warren closed that school and taught at Grapevine for a brief period, returning to Fort Worth in 1890.

Her first assignment was teaching in the Fort Worth Public School. Then she was transferred successively to the First Ward, Ninth Ward and the Old Fort Worth High School which stood at Daggett and Jennings. She was associated in those early days of Fort Worth education with such teachers as Morgan Jones, N. C. Randol, Miss Lily B. Clayton and R. L. Paschal.

When the number of high school students increased to the point where the building would not accommodate a seventh grade, about 1905, Miss Warren was transferred back to an elementary school to teach.

Ill health caused her to retire in 1923, but she retained her love for her former students corresponding with many of them after she moved away from Fort Worth. She spent most of the last five years of her life living quietly at Mansfield, and came to Fort Worth several weeks ago for medical treatment.

"Miss Warren was a fine teacher in every way," was the recollection of her expressed by another former teacher, Miss Mamie Willing.

Survivors include a sister Miss [Mrs.] Eunice Randall, Dallas, and the following nieces: Mrs. Douglas J. Page, San Antonio; Mrs. Leland T. Dysart, Mrs. Gladys Gyles and Miss Ethel Randall, all of Dallas.

The body is at Robertson-Mueller-Harper Funeral Home. Pallbearers are Irby Dunklin, W. H. Wallerich, J. B. Baker, R. L. Paschal, J. W. Stitt, Rudolph Brown and Glen Putman.

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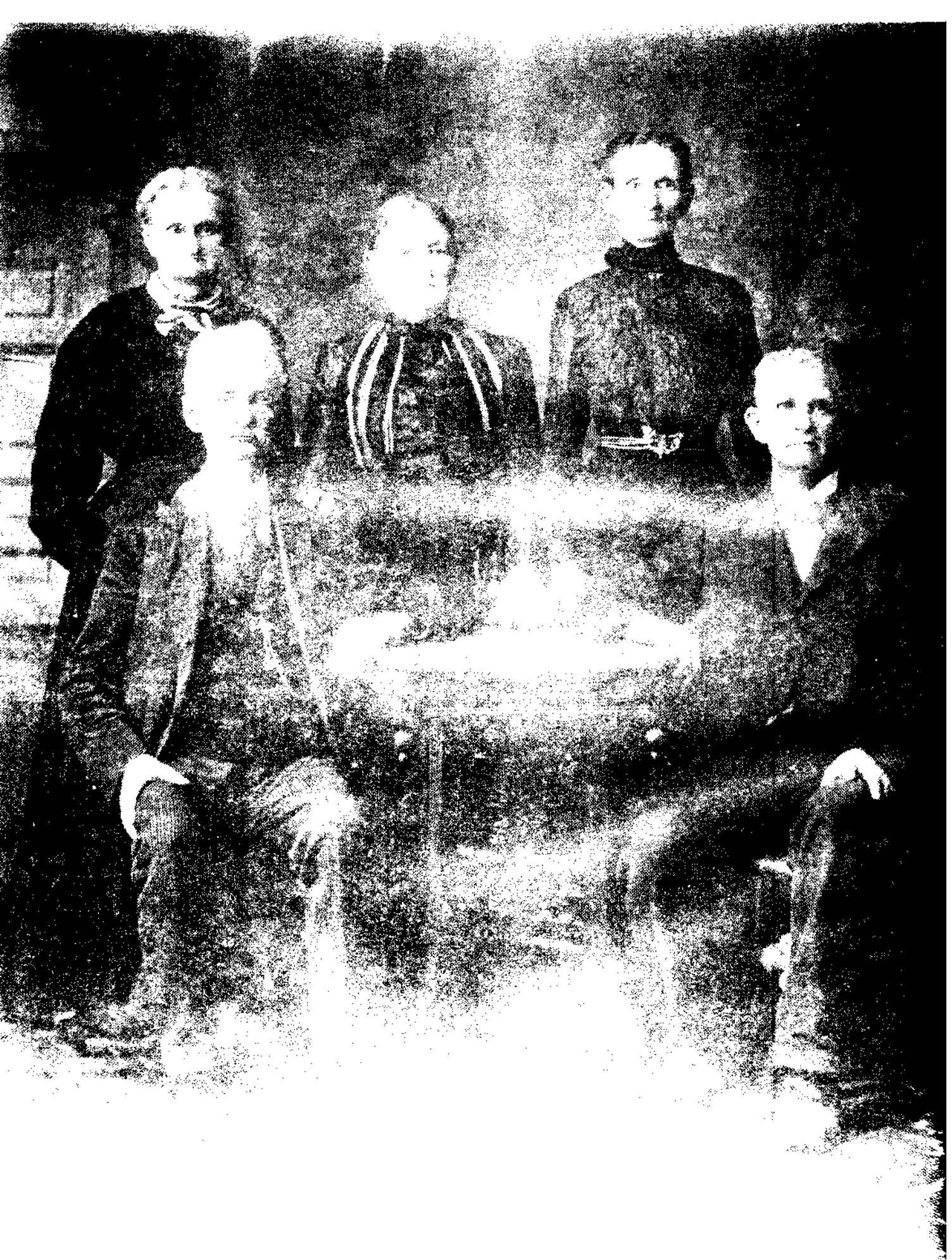

Peter C. Gilmore, Jr. married Bettie E. West November 14, 1829, in Shelby County, Tennessee. He was born in 1805, probably in Tennessee, and she was born in 1813, possibly in North Carolina. Their children, all born in Tennessee, were:

There were two other children - names unknown.

Rebecca Gilmore married William H. Potts in November 1848 in Tennessee. According to the 1850 census, they were living in Jackson County, Arkansas, where they remained until some time around the early 1870s. At that time, they joined the many other adventurers in search for gold in California.

Jane Gilmore married John E. Ferrell in Tennessee in February 1848. Approximately two or three years later the family moved to Texas. It is my belief that the Ferrells lived in Texas for the remainder of their lives.

A Gilmore Family Reunion was held June 16, 1902 in Fort Worth, Texas, at the home of Thomas and Emily Gilmore. The five surviving siblings of Peter and Bettie Gilmore who attended were Rebecca H. A. Potts, Jane E. Ferrell, William H. H. Gilmore, Thomas G. Gilmore and Texana C. Yarbrough.

Rebecca's son-in-law, James A. Jaynes, who lived in California, wrote two poems to commemorate the occasion, which Rebecca brought to the Reunion. They explain that the five surviving Gilmore siblings had not seen each other for many years. What an occasion that must have been and I only wish I could have been there!

According to the poem Rebecca had not seen William in 8 years, Thomas in 32 years, Texana in 40 years and Jane in 54 years. Jane and Texana had never met before June 16, 1902.

EARLY ESTATE RECORDS

Compiled by Barbara Knox

Most of Tarrant County's early records were destroyed when the courthouse burned on March 21, 1976. However, some papers pertaining to early estate settlements were saved. During the 1970s, Mrs. Mildred Bagley Smith edited these records and many were published (in a much more complete form) as an ongoing feature in FOOTPRINTS.

Because we feel this material is important, it is again being published in an abbreviated format. In addition to Mrs. Smith's compilation, Mrs. Leonard L. Ingalls of Fort Worth, has also shared her transcript of the original records.

At the present time, all of Tarrant County's older records are kept in storage. It is the editor's understanding that these probate packets may be seen (if still in existence) by consulting a master index in the County Clerk's office, and, if found, the record may be obtained from storage within a day or so. Please keep in mind that these abstracts do not include all papers originally found in the packets, which range from bonds, inventories, sale bills, vouchers, appraisements, etc. This material is intended to be a finding aid to help identify early Tarrant County families.

Solomon Hayworth, deceased. Kesiah Hayworth, widow, relinquished right of administration; William Norris appointed administrator 25 June 1855; bond \$3000; sureties John W. Elliston and J. B. York. W. C. Trimble "grandfather" appointed guardian of Martha Hayworth 24 Sept. 1855. Property appraised 18 July 1855 by James Hardesty Sr., Isaac D. Parker Sr. and Simco Popplewell. Kesiah Hayworth appointed administratrix of estate 11 Oct 1856; bond \$5200; John W. Elliston, James M. Lucky, Thomas Akers and M. Elliston, sureties. She also guardian of orphans Sarah Anne Hayworth, aged three, and Rebecca Nancy Hayworth, aged one. On 18 Feb 1858, Kisiah Walker relinquished guardianship to husband B. F. Walker. She was then living in Palo Pinto County, Texas.

Francis Throop deceased. Hannah Throop appointed administrator of estate at Alton, Denton County, Texas 25 March 1850. Receipt from A. G. Walker, Deputy Surveyor Robertson Land District for 640 acres of land to be located "on the land on which she lives" dated 28 June 1850.

James Gibson deceased. J. E. Holland testifies that he witnessed Gibson's will and that the other witness, Wm. W. Pile, is no longer living 7 Sept 1850. Nancy Gibson named executrix 30 Sept 1850; A. W. Anderson, Henry Suggs and Jacob Marlow appraisers; complete inventory of estate returned 14 November 1850.

Ambrose Foster deceased. Susan Foster administratrix 15 April 1851. 680 acre tract of land divided among Susan Foster, Lucinda Mahan, J. L. Foster, Mary A. Leonard, heirs of Rachel Mullikin, Owen Foster, Dizana Foster, Seleta Suggs, Jarret Foster, Jackson Foster and heirs of Lewis Foster.

J. P. Lusk deceased. Edward S. Terrell administrator 28 April 1851; bond \$200; John B. York and John P. Montgomery securities. G. L. Farmer and Samuel P. Loving appraisers. Property consisted of one colony headright certificate No. 155 issued to heirs of deceased.

John S. Barnes deceased. Polly Barnes, widow, relinquished right of administration 25 May 1851; Cornelius Connolly appointed administrator 30 June 1851; bond \$300; securities Isaac Thomas and D. E. Norton. Estate valued at \$224.75. Stephen B. McCommas and Mary C. McCommas, his wife, "formerly Mary C. Barnes, widow of John S. Barnes," petitioned court 29 March 1852 for one year's support from proceeds of property sale for "her and her two children." She received \$105.12-1/2 as dower 1 June 1852, and additional "twenty two Dollars and fifty Cents" from note on John Law on 28 June 1852. James Ventioner received "seven dollars in full of funeral expence" 28 March 1853.

Jerome Howerton deceased. Francis M. Howerton administrator 19 Sept 1851; bond \$800; E. S. Terrill, and Hiram Blackwell securities. Mercer Fair and Walter Beal returned inventory 27 Sept 1851. Elizabeth Howerton gave bond as administrator protem 27 Sept 1852; also filed as administratrix with bond \$800; John J. Goodwin, John W. Milsap securities. Property taken by widow as allowance (may 1853) included 2 mares, 5 cows and calves, 16 hogs, 1 lot of castins, 1 trunk and 1 pickle stand. Commissioners divided estate among heirs 31 July 1854: T. J. Howerton (decd) three children; N. E. Howerton and Katharine Howerton, minors (Elizabeth Howerton guardian) and Lucy Ann Howerton, minor of Ellis County [Texas] Samuel Miers guardian; Elizabeth Colbey Red River County [Texas]; F. M. Howerton, A. B. Howerton and D. A. Anderson, all of Tarrant County. Elizabeth Howerton guardian for Nancy Howerton, Catharine Howerton, Josephine Howerton and Elvira R. Howerton. Final report 28 Aug 1854.

Abraham Barnard deceased. Vincent J. Hutton administrator 19 Sept 1851; bond \$1200; William W. Hall and Cornelius Conelly securities. Thalys N. McKinney and R. Petty appraisers. Widow allowed 50 acres of land as dower. Heirs named 9 Oct 1857: Sarah Barnard, widow; Luiza Hutton, George Barnard, M. Elizabeth Barnard and Alax Dobkins (assignee of John Barnard and Jane Tompkins; M. M. Woods appointed guardian of George A. Barnard and Margaret S. Barnard 22 Feb 1858.

Hannah Throop deceased. William W. Hall appointed administrator 29 Sept 1851; bond \$900; sureties V. J. Hutton and Thomas Hood. August

Court Term 1860. Division of real estate (480 acres in Tarrant County on waters of Denton Creek) made to: Elizabeth Harris of Denton County [Texas]; Wm. W. Hall (for his wife, Jane Hall) of Tarrant County; Eliza E. Hood, heir of Mary G. Hood deceased (formerly Mary G. Throop of Tarrant County); W. O. Harris (guardian for Charles W. and J. F. Zeek, heirs of Milly Zeek, formerly Milly Throop deceased) of Denton County; M. W. Deavenport, assignee of Lucinda C. Martin (formerly L. C. Throop); Lucinda Mahan, formerly Lucinda Throop (relic of Charles W. Throop decd); Sarah H. Rogers (heir of Nancy Night deceased, formerly Nancy Throop of Denton County); John Kennady (for wife Angelena, deceased, formerly Angelina Throop of Denton County.) William Norris, Hamilton Bennett and John Milsap appraisers. Widow took dower in livestock and household things 2 March 1853. Final estate settlement filed 24 Sept 1855.

Margarett J. Potts deceased. William A. Walker administrator 1 March 1853; bond \$1350, Daniel Barcroft and Hamilton Bennett securities. Securities ask for release 30 May 1853 "as we are no longer willing to stand any longer as security for him." Margarett Walker appointed administratrix 30 Jan 1854; bond \$1350; Owen Blacker and J. B. Hibbert sureties. She guardian for Wiley W. Potts, minor heir [of Wiley W. Potts and Margarett J. Potts] bond \$1600; Franklin Wilcox and W. H. Boswell sureties.

Would like to exchange genealogical information with any descendants of Joseph S. Lynn and Juliann Randolph who were married in Union County, Kentucky on 11 December 1850, and are both buried in Elmwood Cemetery, Mineral Wells, Texas. Their children and spouses were: Martha, married Sylvester Knight; William L., married Sarah Sherry; Susan C., married Wm. Joseph Shields; Emily Dora, married James Allie Stephens; Fannie Davis, married Shadrack Hugh Morris; Armitta, married a Mr. Perkins; Texella, married a Mr. Webster; Ida Eugene, married C. P. Gilbert; Kate, married a Mr. Dillinder; and Agnes, married Albert W. Stokes. Fannie Davis Lynn and Shadrack Hugh Morris were my grandparents.

Seeking information regarding ancestors of William Lynn, born ca 1794 North Carolina, and his wife Agnes, born ca 1797 Virginia. They were in Union County, Kentucky, at the time of the 1850 census, moved to Palo Pinto County, Texas, around 1860. William died around 1867 and Agnes some time after 1880. Both are presumed buried at an unknown location in Palo Pinto County, Texas. Agnes was living with her son Joseph S. and his wife Juliann Randolph at the time of the 1880 census.

COMMENT: This early Lynn family of Palo Pinto County was of no known relation to that of Isaac Lynn, early settler in Jack County. William and Agnes are probably buried in the old Palo Pinto cemetery, south of town, where there are many unmarked graves. They may have married in Christian County, Kentucky, as that is where John W. Lynn (probably their oldest son) was born 1819. "Johnnie" was one of the first settlers at Golconda (Palo Pinto) and was the father of cattleman M. O. (Mark) Lynn, who married Lizzie Price. Members of this family are buried in the old Palo Pinto Cemetery.

The 1867 Palo Pinto County Voters Register shows William Lynn, Pct. 1, born North Carolina, resided in the state, county and precinct 7 years. His name is marked through and the word "dead" is written. The 1868-1871 tax rolls show: J. W. [John W.], E. S., and M. O. [John's son]. J. S. was Joseph S. Lynn, your ancestor. E. S. was likely Smith Lynn, mentioned in McConnell's West Texas Frontier. He and Joseph were still with their parents in 1850 in Union County, Kentucky. None of these people appear on an 1870 census, for there was none for Palo Pinto County as a whole.

2-2-91 BLACK, BUNT, CARRIGER
Pat Black, 1916 Hawkeye, Turlock CA 95380

Calvin Harley Black, born 15 March 1892, married Dora Elizabeth Bunt, born 18 November 1891 in Tarrant County on 14 February 1918. Dora later remarried, but no divorce from Calvin has been found. Dora had previously married H. J. Carriger on 15 April 1916. The love of Dora's life was a sailor killed in World War I. Was it H. J. Carriger? A Calvin and Louise Black of Limestone County married in April 1914 (county not known), were divorced 25 March 1920. Was this the same Calvin Black as above? If someone can help sort this out, please contact me.

3-2-91 PARKS, GRANT, DANIELS

Seeking information on family of Isiah Park, born 1806 Estill or Madison County, Kentucky. They came to Texas with Peters Colony in 1845-1848 from Columbia, Boone County, Missouri, where he married Catherine Grant 1 February 1827 and had seven children: Susan, Daniel b 1832, Eli 1836, Ann E. 1840, Woodson 1842, Wiley 1844, and Marion 1846. Isiah sold the 640 acres in Dallas 12 November 1850 to Mrs. Francis Daniels and he died December 1850. Left no will and court records referring to land do not give any details of why or where he died. Mrs. C. R. Ballard's book, They Came to Texas states on page 332 that Isiah walked to work to Denton 8 miles each weekend and one day disappeared but no reference where this information was obtained. His land in Dallas to Denton would be farther than 8 miles as his 640 acres was located at Valley View Lane-Preston Road-Forest Lane and other side of the Dallas Tollway. What happened to Isiah Park? Where is he buried?

COMMENT: Isaiah Park(s) came to the Peters Colony area "prior to July 1, 1848," per Connor's The Peters Colony of Texas. He is not on the 1848 tax roll of Dallas County, but was there in 1850. According to the census, his youngest child was born ca 1846 in Missouri. That he "walked to work in Denton 8 miles each week-end" may be tradition. I doubt that he would have been working in Denton that early, since there was no town, just two or three settlers. Denton did not become the county seat of Denton County until 1857.

Seeking names of parents of Eva Elizabeth Moore, born 29 September 1876, Tennessee. Married Albert Thornton Warren in Bosque County, Texas, 2 August 1891, died 15 November 1903, Bosque County. Also,

need information on Louis H. Taylor, CSA, 18th Texas Cavalry, where and when did he die? Had a daughter, Fannie King, who married Richard Howard Dyer.

5-2-91 DEVANEY, WAGNON, SCOTT, ROLAND, POGUE, OLDHAM, LONG

Seeking data on Charles Devaney, born 4 July 1864, Colbert Co., Alabama, died 6 April 1946, Dallas, Texas, buried Hill County, Texas. Married in Tishomingo County, Mississippi, 22 September 1888 to Guillian Jackson Wagon, born 24 March 1872, Colbert County, Alabama, died 2 June 1910, Hillsboro, Texas, daughter of Buck Wagon and Rebecca Roland. Charles Devaney was a son of Charles Devaney, Sr., died 1895 in Cameron, Texas. Charles, Sr. married Elizabeth Scott Long.

John A. Pogue, born 23 January 1858, Alabama or Georgia, died 23 March 1924, Holdenville, Oklahoma. Married 6 November 1879 in Montague County, Texas, to Martha Oldham. She died 4 November 1887 and is buried in Montague County. John remarried ca 1889 in Texas, to Melia?, born ca 1870 Texas. Where did they marry and what was Melia's maiden name? In what cemetery is Martha buried? John appears on the 1910 census of Hughes County, Oklahoma, where his birthplace is listed as Georgia, both parents in Georgia, yet his Bible gives Alabama and his death certificate gives Mississippi. Need names of parents, birthplaces, for both John and Martha.

COMMENT: Could John A. Pogue's middle name have been Alexander? Check the 1870 census Montague County, page 17, Precinct 4, #3-3, family of John Pague/Pogue/Patbe. He was age 42, wife Julia, had 8 children, including a son Alexander, age 13. Whole family born in Georgia. Also see #1-1, one David Payne/Pague, age 24, born Georgia, wife Josephone age 16. You might check with Mrs. Frank G. Hankins, PO Box 795, Bowie TX 76230, to see if she can help by running a query in her genealogy column.

6-2-91 QUICK, STRYKER/STRICKER, WILLEY
Joyce Stryker Ross, PO Box 15556, Fort Worth TX 76119

Peter Quick, James, Jacob W., and Aaron Stryker/Stricker (brothers) moved to Indiana about 1819 from New York, settling in Monroe, Jackson, and Clarke Counties. James married Clarissa Minerva Willey in 1821, Clarke County, Indiana. They are on the 1850 census of Robertson County, Texas. James Stryker died in 1858 in Evansville, Indiana. James and Clarissa had 12 children. This is a family the Civil War split, and it never healed. Wish to correspond with anyone researching either of these names.

7-2-91 WARD, MUIRHEAD, FLINCHEM, SKAGGS, DAWSON, LYNCH, RUSSELL

Need information on James A. Ward, born 1801 South Carolina, married Nancy Muirhead 1832. Came from Macon County, Illinois, to Texas December 24, 1839, settling first in Red River and Titus Counties, went to Arkansas 1845 to 1852, back to Texas, settling in Grayson County, then Cooke County, where he was one of the ones hung at Gainesville 1862. Nancy died between 1853/60. When and where? Children: Catherine, married Jack Flinchem; Mary P., married James Skaggs; Sarah Jane, married Ephraim A. Dawson, Jeremiah J.; Nancy E.; Margaret A.; Lucinda E.; Luticia C., married Warren L. Lynch; William A.; Cynthia C.; Jesse Austin, married Cynthia M. Russell. Will exchange all information.

COMMENT: Jack Flinchem, who married Catherine Ward, and Wash Flinchem, who is said to have been first husband of Mary P. Ward, were likely the same as George W. and Andrew J. Flenchum of Smith County 1850 (#308). Mary Flincham married 23 March 1866 in Cooke County J. M. Skaggs. Ephraim A. Dawson married (2) Lucinda Parsons in 1869.

You are probably familiar with Thomas Barrett's book, The Great Hanging at Gainesville, and also James Lemuel Clark's Civil War Recollections. The latter gives a different and often convincing slant. George Diamond also wrote his version of the affair. Clark names many who were hung, including one Mr. Ward. The affair is mentioned in Cates' History of Wise County, also Stambaugh and Stambaugh's History of Collin County. Barrett states that 40 men were hung and 2 broke loose and were shot. Cates states that 55 were hung in Gainesville and 5 in Wise County. Clark states that 44 men were hung, several shot, and two escaped. These victims were accused of being part of the Peace Party Conspirators.

One William W. Ward was hung in Wise Co. He was born ca 1820 in Illinois, was in Pike County 1850 and came to Texas before 1860; lived in Cooke-Wise County area but is not found on 1860 census. He is said to have lived in the Prairie Point community (now Rhome), also known as "Missouri Community," because settlers there were from Pike County, Illinois, and from Missouri, across the river.

The Burdicks of Prairie Point area were neighbors to the Wards in Pike County. Ira Burdick was also hung in 1862. Nathan Sweet, of Prairie Point, was also of Pike County, Illinois. He and Ira Burdick were born in New York. William W. Ward's wife, Lutitia J. Gibson, had a sister, Amanda M., who married Samuel O. Sweet. After the hanging and before 1870 most of the Ward family returned to Illinois. The Sweets remained in Texas, settled in Tarrant County, where Nathan and wife are buried in the Isham Cemetery. Mrs. Frances Price, who lived in Maryland in 1979, had an APO address in 1981, but gave her permanent address as 1010 Highland Creek, Junction City, Kansas 66441, was working on the William W. Ward family.

8-2-91 BRYANT, COBB, STOKES

John M. Massey, 7700 Belmont Ave., Birmingham AL 35206

Seeking information from descendants of William Monroe Bryant, who married Mary A. E. Cobb in Pontotoc County, Mississippi, on October 25, 1865. Mary, the daughter of Isaac W. and Nancy H. Cobb, was born in South Carolina in 1839. She and her parents were living in Pontotoc County in 1860 (page 521, 235/235). The Isaac Cobb family seems to connect some way to the John and Rebecca Stokes family, also living in Pontotoc County in 1860 and also from South Carolina. Another and older Mary A. Cobb was living with them in 1860 (page 833, 2268/2268). It is possible that William and Mary were living in Yalobusha County, Mississippi, or the surrounding area in 1870. Family tradition states that they moved to Texas or Arkansas by 1880. But, in which county were they living? I welcome correspondence from researchers of the surname Bryant whose origins connect to Mississippi South Carolina, Georgia or North Carolina.

9-2-91 MCCRACKEN, PEARSON, CROUCH, HAZLEWOOD, MCQUERRY, WRIGHT

Anson McCracken married in Jackson County, Missouri, Mahala Ann Pearson. Moved to Dallas County, Texas, after 1840; served as County Coroner. Removed, prior to 1850 to Fort Worth, Texas. Resided on Weatherford Street. Children: James Leonidas, married 1860 Susan Jane Crouch, Palo Pinto, Texas (residence 1869, Sebastian County, Arkansas; Mary Jane, deaf and mute; Sarah Martha, married Calvin Thomas Hazlewood, died 1919, buried Elmwood Cemetery, Mineral Wells, Texas; Louisa Texana, married Alfred A. McQuerry, died 1937 Jacks County, Texas; Amanda Ellen, married Thomas Isbell; and Phebe Ann, married (1) 1857 Rev. Theodore Wright, (2) James C. McQuerry, Palo Pinto County, Texas, died 1899, buried Upper Cemetery, Palo Pinto, Texas.

Mahala Ann died 1869, buried Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Silver Creek, Tarrant County. Where did Anson die? Need his will and probate. Did he remove to home of son, James Leonidas in Arkansas after death of Mahala? Daughters of Republic of Texas records show Anson died 19 or 20 December 1879, Tarrant County.

COMMENT: Anson McCracken is listed on Barksdale's Peters Colony roster as having arrived in Texas between 1 July 1844 and 1 July 1845. He is on 1846 and subsequent Dallas County tax rolls. He came to Tarrant County ca 1855-56 (not before 1850), where he remained. He is on 1860 Tarrant County tax roll; owned some 420 acres and had two slaves. He is on the 1870 Tarrant County census (Pct. 4 page 24, #185-1850) living next to Thomas and A. Ellen Isbell. His wife Mahala, who died October 1869, should be on the 1870 Mortality Schedule for Tarrant County. Their children probably all married in Tarrant County, and the early marriage records are lost. Anson probably died in Fort Worth at the home of his son James Leonidas, who

lived on Weatherford Street in 1880, having returned to Texas from Sebastian County, Arkansas, after 1874. Since Anson died in December 1879, he should appear on the 1880 Mortality Schedule of Tarrant County, which would offer proof of his death date.

James L. McCracken, Phoebe Wright, and Sarah Martha Hazlewood were on the frontier by 1860. All three probably married in Tarrant County. Although the records are lost, there is much collateral evidence that Phoebe's first husband was Theodore Wright and that they married ca 1860:

1. She and Wright husband are on 1860 census of Palo Pinto County, living in the town of Palo Pinto, no children; he was county clerk.
2. Palo Pinto County marriages show Mrs. P. A. Wright married J. C. McQuerry 17 March 1871.
3. In 1880, town of Palo Pinto, were James C. McQuerry and wife Phebe A., with 3 young McQuerry children and 4 older Wright children who were born ca 1862-1866. (ED 155, page 33, #239-244).
4. Phebe Ann is buried by both husbands in the old Palo Pinto Cemetery, about one mile south of town: Theodore Wright (1832-1867) and J. C. McQuerry (1838-1912). Her tombstone indicates she married J. C. McQuerry on 16 November 1871 (per Palo Pinto Cemetery Records, which is known to have a number of typo errors).

These evidences should offer indisputable proof that Phoebe Ann McCracken married first Theodore Wright ca 1860 and should be accepted by any of the patriotic organizations.

Wish to correspond with any descendants of Alexander Bray Clark and his wife Sarah Gaines. This family moved from Virginia to Tarrant County prior to the Civil War. They had nine children: Mary Jane,

married Washington Mason; William John, married Martha Heneretta Mofield; George Washington; Alexander B., Jr.; Thomas S.; Susan Ann; Andrew Moses; Arthur Samuel; and Alonzo Theodore. George Washington was the grandfather of Mrs. Brian (Eve) Montague. My great-grandmother, Martha Heneretta Mofield, married William John Clark, who was her first cousin. He died in the battle of Nashville in 1864. In October, 1865, she married Richard Day Brandon in Tarrant County.

I have recently received copies of several letters written to Alexander B. Clark by his mother, Martha. The earliest was written in 1847, and a later one was written just after he arrived in Texas in January, 1861. I will share these letters with other family descendants and would very much like to know more about this family.

COMMENT: Your Clarks could have been in Texas, possibly Grayson County, in 1860, but none are mentioned on the 1860 tax roll of Tarrant County. On the 1870 Tarrant County census Mary Jane Mason was a 57-year-old widow, born Tennessee, with three children, all born Tennessee: William L., 28, Martha E., 20, and Mary M., 18, living in Precinct 4.

The late Mrs. J. J. Rady, of Fort Worth, stated that her ancestor was Alexander Broy Clark. She went into DAR on the Gaines line. She descended from Alex B. Clark, Jr., and wife Abigail Elizabeth Hust, through their son, John Hamilton Clark, born 10 May 1869, Tarrant County, died 3 August 1936, Clarendon, Texas; married 25 January 1891 Mary Addie Turner, born 22 September 1871 Tarrant County, died 18 November 1954, Wichita Falls, Texas. I do not know whether the dates she gave appear on her DAR record or not. If you are interested in pursuing this further, contact me directly.

In 1976 Miss Dorothy P. Beach, 326 Hazel Avenue, Signal Hill, Belleville IL 62223, was interested in Elmore and Barringer families. Also, would appreciate information concerning the children of Minerva Kerr Walton. In the 1900 Texas census they were: Lena 19, Joseph 16, Mary 12, Jennie 2 1/2. David S. Kerr was their guardian. David Kerr was my g-grandfather. Minerva was my g-aunt.

Would like to know the names of parents of Julius C. Lightfoot and his wife Elizabeth Frazier. Julius was born about 1802 in North Carolina according to the 1840 census of Attala County, Mississippi. In the same census Elizabeth is listed as between 20 and 30 years of age, born in South Carolina, with father born in Ireland and mother in Kentucky. Other censuses list Elizabeth's birth place as Tennessee and Kentucky. Julius and Elizabeth were married in Lowndes County, Mississippi, 21 February 1836. Julius was previously married to Lewhanna Stephens, 10 February 1835, Green County, Alabama. Children of Elizabeth and Julius are: Joseph D., Amanda V., Thomas J., William H., and Mary E., all born in Mississippi. Another child, Sarah, who also appears in all these censuses is evidently the child of a previous marriage. She is listed as 5 to 10 years old in the 1840 census. The couple are listed in the 1840, 1850, and 1860 censuses in Attala County. Julius served in Capt. Stanford's Company, L. Artillery, Mississippi Volunteers, CSA, from 6 November 1861 until he received a medical discharge in Columbus, Kentucky, in 1862. Elizabeth appears in the 1870 and 1880 censuses of Cherokee County, Texas, living with her son, William H. The time and date of the death of Julius and Elizabeth is not known.

Would like to correspond with descendants of William Wilkinson, Sr., who was born in Wales prior to 1715, and died after 1783 in Virginia or North Carolina. I believe that some of these Wilkinsons settled in Tarrant County. Son James, born 1763, Dinwiddie County, Virginia, married in 1818, Lincoln County, North Carolina, to Nancy Stiles, and died in 1846 in Catawba County, North Carolina, was my gr-gr-gr-grandfather. My gr-gr-gr-grandfather was Franklin Wilkinson, who died in Johnson County, Texas. His wife, Maria Cecilia Wilson, is buried in the Buel Cemetery near Cleburne, but there is no stone for Franklin, who would have died prior to Marie, according to a joint will found in Johnson County.

It would have been Franklin and Marie's children who may have resided in Tarrant County. At least one brother known only as "Major", of my great-grandmother Sarah Jane "Jennie" Wilkinson Marchbanks is said to have lived in or near Fort Worth. I have not found Major on the census records. There is a Monroe born 1842, Joseph Pinkney 1845, Mary E. 1847 who married J. P. Gaskins, Nancy Victoria ca 1852 who married John C. Turner, James H. ca 1855 who married N. E. Howeth, Margaret E. 1857 who married Hugh Shaw, Francis Ann 1859 who married J. H. Lewis, John E. 1862, and Mirah (or Mariah) J. 1864. Does anyone have any information on any of these Wilkinsons?

COMMENT: Did your James Wilkinson not marry until he was age 55? If so, then Franklin must have been his first child. Franklin was age 50 in 1870 and 60 in 1880, so he must have been born ca 1820. I think you may safely assume that he died in Johnson County and is buried in the same cemetery as his wife, his grave either lost or not marked.

None of this family was in Tarrant County in 1880. "Major" was probably a nickname for one of the sons, all of whom were still in Johnson County 1880. Monroe was age 38, still unwed, and by early 1900s would have been in his 60s. No marriage record found in Johnson or Tarrant Counties. The son Joseph P. died in 1888, buried Buel Cemetery. James H. and Emma Howeth Wilkinson had no children in 1880, but had been married only three years. John F. was still at home and was probably the J. F. who married Mattie West 19 October 1884. He or James H. would have been the "Major" who lived in Fort Worth and had a son Tony (according to your tradition). Have you checked the 1900 and 1910 Soundexes?

Mary E. Wilkinson Gaskins died 1870, buried Buel Cemetery. Her husband, John P. Gaskins, remarried 23 January 1873 Mary E. Cummings. Frances Ann Lewis was living with her parents in 1880, listed as a widow, no children. She was first enumerated as "dau" in the relationship column, then the word "niece" was overwritten. See: ED 84, page 61, #521-532. Maria J. was still single in 1880. She was probably the Jennie Wilkinson who married 28 December 1880 J. F. Eastus/Estus. John H. Evans appears to have been enumerated in 1880 as Louis, not Evans, evidently an error of the census taker. With him was wife Jane (Jennie Wilkinson Marchbanks) and her Marchbanks children. She and John had married 10 July 1879.

Kistner, shown on 1850 census of Stoddard County, Missouri, with wife Lucinda Tankersley and children William, Lointanna, Fedora, Delecinia and Charles. Rufus Burnett and wife Elizabeth who sold property in Dallas County, Texas, in 1853. Had daughters Elizabeth and Beatrice and a son called "Dink". Beatrice married J. Thomas Pittillo in Parker County, Texas, died there 1945. Names of parents of Martha Long, born ca 1828 Tennessee, died ca 1861 Polk or Greene County, Missouri, first wife of Erasmus Tracy, born ca 1825 Barren County, Kentucky, died 6 July 1894 Greene County, Missouri. Velma King, born 6 August 1894, Wirt County, West Virginia, died 11 February 1959 Palo Pinto County, Texas. Was she the Grace King listed on the 1910 census of Wood County, West Virginia, as daughter of W. H. and Maggie King? COMMENT: John and Lucretia Burnett, both born in Indiana, in Cass County, Texas, 1850, were parents of Rufus H. Burnett. Rufus married in Dallas County 2 September 1851, Elizabeth Serena McCommas, daughter of Stephen B. McCommas. They with the McCommas family settled in Palo Pinto County ca 1858 and are on the 1860 census there. The 1867 Palo Pinto County Voters Register shows R. H. Burnett, born Indiana, resided in Texas 25 years and in the county 9 years. The family is on the 1870 and 1880 census of Parker County. Their children shown as: R. H. (son), Joseph, D. J. (daughter), Beatrice F. and Elizabeth S. Burnett. S. B. McCommas was also in Parker County in 1870 and may have died there 1870-80. The McCommas families were from Tennessee to Ohio and Illinois; in Texas they lived in Dallas, Denton, Young, Palo Pinto, Parker, and probably other counties. They came to Dallas County 1844-45 as Peters Colonists.

Need helping finding information on my husband's father, Preston "Boze" Collins. He was killed when he fell from a truck on the Meridian highway near Alvord, Texas, in September 1924. His mother and sister lived in Greenville, Texas, but no one claimed the body, and we cannot find his parents. Preston's sister was Verdine Brigham. His sons were James Preston, born Greenville, Texas, 1920, and Walter Edwin, born Fort Worth 1923. Preston married Loma E. Talley in Hunt County May 1919. His stepfather may have been Culbertson.

COMMENT: Meridian in Bosque County, Texas, and Alvord in Wise County, are not near each other. Have you checked for death records for Preston Bose Collins, his mother and his sister?

Marion Blanche Gilman Rusher (1865-1907) was descended from Samuel Gilman, born 1787, New Hampshire. He married Betsy Thing in Gilmanton, Strafford/Belknap County, New Hampshire, on 16 March 1809. Betsy was born 26 April 1787, also in Strafford/Belknap County. It is believed that they removed from New Hampshire between 1819 and 1821. A family Bible indicates that Betsy died in Cooke County, Texas on 5 October 1848, which I am trying to verify. We have no clue as to when or where Samuel Gilman died.

Is there a cemetery listing for Cooke County? Will appreciate correspondence with anyone researching Gilman or Thing families.

COMMENT: Samuel Gilman was age 63, born New Hampshire, widower, living in Grayson County, Texas in 1850. Could he have been the Samuel Gilman who married Susan Day in Cooke County 16 June 1851? He was evidently father of Charles, Henry and A. Gilman, all three sons born New York, according to censuses. Samuel, Charles and Henry were Peters colonists. Charles lived in Collin County in 1850. This is where he patented his colony land. Samuel and Henry were in Grayson County in 1850. Samuel patented his colony land in that county, and Henry patented his land in Cooke County.

Samuel was not in Cooke County in 1860. If still living, he may have been in Grayson County. His son Henry married in Cooke County 6 December 1849 Eliza Jane Boggs and they lived in Cooke County in 1860.

It may be a "long shot," but Betsy Gilman, and perhaps Samuel, could be buried in the Hill Cemetery in Cooke County. One Harvey Boggs, born 1801, is buried there. He died 1850-1853, and was the father of Eliza Jane Boggs.

COMMENT: A number of Bedford County, Tennessee, families came to Tarrant County in the 1870s. Several came prior to 1870, including Elisha Adam Euleess, Wilson C. Shofner, and the Triggs. All are on the 1870 census of Tarrant County. I find no Euleess or Shofner families in Ellis County prior to 1880. The paternal grandmother of Elisha Adam Euleess was Dorothea Shofner. These Euleess and Shofner families were in Orange County, North Carolina, prior to Bedford County, Tennessee. Mrs. Louis William Kleasner, Jr., wrote a Euliss Genealogy ca 1970. Her address then was 2021 South Parton Street, Santa Ana, CA 92707. Euliss family reunions were still being held each year in North Carolina, the one in 1970 at Graham, North Carolina. Mrs. Klesner was the historian and John Euliss, Alabama Battleground Road, Burlington, North Carolina 17215, was the president.

The Hosfords are said to have come to Ellis County in 1861, but none are on the 1870 census, although they are on the 1880 census of Ellis County.

In 1974 Marie Killebrew, 201 Williams St., Waxahachie Texas 75165, was working on the Ely family of Halifax County, North Carolina, to Howard County, Missouri, to Ellis County, Texas ca 1876. Allied with the Childers family.

Zachary Taylor French and Rachel Evelyn Duckworth were born in Indiana, married in Iowa, and lived in Iowa, Kansas and Nebraska. Their marriage united the French family whose ancestors came to New England in 1630 and the Duckworth family who came early to Virginia and North Carolina.

The author of this book, Gene Jackson, is a descendant of this couple, and has had a remarkable career himself. In 1955 Gene held a farm sale in Nebraska, and took his family to Chicago where he attended an electronics school. After graduation the family traveled to Fort Worth where he was employed by General Dynamics. By attending night school he earned both a BA degree in Mathematics and a Master's degree in Electrical Engineering. He has devoted his retirement years to this fascinating account of his ancestors, and in so doing, has made an important contribution to the history of the development of the West.

Early Estate Settlements

(Continued from Volume 34 Number 2)

NOTE: A fire in 1876 destroyed most of Tarrant County's early records. It is our understanding that these estate settlements are the only records which were saved. They have now been preserved on microfiche which are kept in the office of the Probate Clerk. The original records can no longer be seen because the papers are very fragile.

Mary Irvin (Ivins) deceased.

18 October 1850 - Archibald Robinson applies for letters of guardianship of estate and person of Lenea Ivens minor; bond \$525; securities E. S. Terrill and John B. York. 21 Dec 1850. Robinson guardian of Linna Ivins, reports that he has been to Grayson County "in search of property taken from Lemuel J. Edwards of Tarrant County as property of Mary Ivins dec'd;" that property has been administered in Grayson County as belonging to estate of Abraham Evens "reputed father of said Mary." Since E. S. Harris (administrator) cannot be located, Robinson advises bringing suit against Harris and Felix G. Beasley. 29 March 1852 - Robinson petitions for discharge from guardianship stating that he has received no property nor begun any suit for same.

William M. Egnew deceased.

31 January 1853 - Henry Suggs appointed administrator pro tem; bond \$600; sureties: William W. Hall and William Anderson. James P. Halford, A. B. Danks? and Jarret Foster returned appraisal 28 March 1853 valued at \$359.69-1/2. Sale bill filed 30 May 1853. Buyers at sale: J. E. Hollen, James Morehead, F. Ford, A. F. Leonard, Nancy Gibson, H. Decker, J. Joice, James Cats [Cates], Susanah Foster, John Halford, A. B. Danks, Thomas Hollen, A. H. Chivers, Seletto Suggs, Sarah Ann Leonard, C. T. Harnes. Named in estate settlement: Thomas Mayhan, Leonard & Giddens, E. M. King; Nancy V. Cranston and Dr. R. H. Elliott (of Denton County.)

25 Sept 1854 - Administrator's affidavit for final settlement "as no legal representative has appeared." 29 Jan 1855 - Affidavit given by George R. Egnew stating he is brother of Wm. M. Egnew and only surviving heir of estate. 9 Oct 1856 - All estate transferred to G. R. Egnew.

John L. Stong, deceased.

Will dated 7 February 1853. "I Jno L. Stong of the State of Texas and county of Tarrant....give and bequeath unto David Stong of the State of Texas Eighty Acres of landlying in the County of Dallas to sell or trade or dispose of in any way for the benefit of Michael S. W. Stong and Julia M. Stong also to settle any unsettled business also all my personal property all of which is to [be] kept sold or used....for benefit of sd. M. S. W. and Julia M. Stong and I do hereby make David Stong my executor without bond or security...." S/ John (X) Stong Witnesses: Jno. A. Freeman & Michal S. W. Stong

19 Feb 1853 - Application of D. Stong for letters of administration. Bond \$500 for guardianship of Michael W. S. [sic] and Julia M. Stong, minor heirs of Solloman Stong deceased. Sureties: V. J. Hutton and Green W. Minter.

Walling A. Rogers deceased. 14 Feb 1853 - Sarah (X) Rogers relinquishes right to administer estate to son, Thomas Rogers. Thomas Rogers petitions for letters of administration same date reporting that ..."Walling A. Rogers late of County of Tarrant departed this life on the [blank] day of February 1853 leaving will disposing of property but without naming Executor in will."

Will leaves all personal and real property to "beloved wife Sarah Rogers" during her lifetime at her death to be divided equally among "heirs of her boddy." Signed Walling (X) Rogers. Witnesses: Charles T. Harnes and Jesse (X) Doss. Proved by Doss 28 Feb 1853 who stated Rogers died at his own home in Tarrant County, Texas.

CLIPPINGS FROM AN OLD SCRAPBOOK

Editor's Note: We wish to thank Darla McFarland, of Joshua, for bringing this scrapbook to our attention. It belongs to Mrs. Mary Scott Brucks of Mansfield, Texas, and we appreciate having the opportunity to use some of the material. Most of the material is related to families in Denton, Collin, and Grayson Counties.

Pilot Point [Denton County] Texas Jan. 16, 1905
Editor, *Lantern*, Dallas, Texas.

In compliance with your request I send a few reminiscences of early newspapers of Texas.

The first paper published in north Texas was the *Northern Standard*, established in 1842 at Clarksville by Chas. DeMorse. W. J. F. Morgan started the *Western Star* at Clarksville in 1846 and moved it to Paris in the early 1850s where he sold it.

Col. T. J. Crooks started the *Carrier's Own* at Clarksville sometime in the early 50s which did not last long. C. L. Sutton printed a paper in Paris called *Crockett's Own* in the 50s. DeMorse & Hunt established the *Bonham Advertiser* in 1849 or '50. Colvin & Darnall started the *Clarksville Messenger* in 1854, which was later purchased by J. W. Thomas and J. T. Darnall. In Jan. 1859, they moved it to McKinney contrary to the advice of Col. DeMorse who had recommended Fort Belknap. In 1849 or '50 J. W. Latimer started the *Dallas Herald*. He and J. W. Swindells later formed a partnership.

Col. DeMorse brought the first power press to North Texas in 1851. Junius Foster, who was assassinated during the war, started the *Sherman Patriot*. After the war closed several of the Republicans of Sherman bought a printing outfit and re-established the *Patriot*, employing A. L. Darnall as editor and manager. They finally sold it and it later burned during a fire.

Just before the war (I think) Capt. J. R. Baylor and Capt. Hammer started a paper in Jacksboro called *The Whiteman*.

In 1875 or '76 T. E. Bomas started the *Black Waxy* in McKinney. He sold his plant and moved to Sherman. At the close of the war, Col. T. H. Murray, W. A. West and Capt. W. L. Boyd started the *McKinney Enquirer*. That was finally sold to Capt. John H. Bingham.

Gen. A. B. Norton started a paper called *Norton's Union Intelligence* at Austin and Marshall & Oldham started the *Gazette* at Austin. [no date given]

In 1856 while Houston and Runnels were running for governor, there were about 120 counties in the State and 60 newspapers; 14 supported Houston and the rest supported Runnels. As well as I recollect, Runnels beat Houston a little over 8,500 votes; and in 1860 Houston beat Runnels about the same number.

/s/ John T. Darnell

John T. Darnall, aged 76, died yesterday morning [December 20, 1906] at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Elba Elmore [in Pilot Point, Denton County, Texas.] He was born in Jackson, Tennessee, June 25, 1831. and came to Texas at the age of ten. He worked with an older brother on a farm in Red River County for three years before moving to Clarksville, [county seat] where brother established the fourth store in that town. He began to learn the printer's trade in 1849 in the office of the old *Standard*, then edited by Col. Chas. DeMorse, and served a three year apprenticeship. After several months' visit with relatives and friends in Tennessee and Mississippi, he returned to help establish the *Clarksville Messenger*. This paper was later moved to McKinney and its name changed to the *McKinney Messenger* - the first paper ever published in Collin County. The firm later became Thomas & Darnall. Mr. Darnall farmed at Vineland in Collin County, where he married Lucy Scott, a daughter of the late John Scott, early settler. In 1885 he moved to Rector's Crossing on Little Elm in Denton County, and seven years later to Pilot Point. There were four children: J. S. Darnall of Gunter; J. P. Darnall, deceased, Mrs. J. M. Wattenbarger of Clarendon and Mrs. Elba Elmore. Funeral services were conducted yesterday afternoon by Elder L. N. Clark of Gunter.

R. M. Scott died Monday at his home at Blue Ridge. "Uncle Bobby" was sixty-nine and was a native of Nashville, Tenn, coming to this county with his family in 1872. About six years ago he moved to Blue Ridge. He is survived by his wife and children: W. W. and C. R. Scott of this city, Mrs. Maggie Hockett of Merit, Hunt County; Dee Scott of Haskell, John Scott of Pilot Point, Mrs. Jim Rutledge of Durant, I.T., and Miss Fannie Scott who lived with her parents. Another son, T. M. Scott, died about four years ago. Burial was at Melissa cemetery.

John Scott died near McKinney, Texas, March 4th, 1883, aged 62 years. He leaves an aged wife, and large family with many friends to mourn his loss.

Baird Darnall, six year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Darnall, died early Sunday morning of scarlet fever at Pilot Point. He had been sick only two or three days. He was born Jan. 12, 1894 and died on Nov. 11, 1900.

Enos Scott died 26 Jan, 1905, [Hood Co. Texas.] Born Wilson Co. Tenn. Sept. 7, 1823; moved to Rusk County, Texas mid 1840s; and subsequently to Collin County, Texas; in 1879 moved to Hood County where had large farm three miles north of Granbury. Family of 3 sons and 2 daughters. Buried at Thorpe Springs Cemetery.

W. W. (Bud) Scott has received word of death of uncle, Nelse Scott, at Manchester, Tenn. He was a brother of R. M. Scott who lives at Blue Ridge and Enos Scott, one of the old settlers of Collin County who died last spring in Hood County. Nelse Scott visited about three years when the brothers were together for the first time in forty years. He has one son living in Fort Worth.

Clarksville Standard. [Red River County, Texas] Mrs. Susan B. Dickson died Friday, Aug. 14, 1863 after a long illness. She was born in York District S. C. in 1818, moved to Tennessee in 1831, married William P. Dickson 1834 and came to Clarksville 1841. She was 45.

[August 24 dateline] Mrs. T. J. Taylor, one of McKinney's oldest citizens, died at her home last evening where she had lived for forty years. She was born in Wilson Co. Tennessee but had lived here since 1852. She is survived by children: Miss Jennie Taylor, who lived with her mother; John A. and George W. Taylor of this city [McKinney], Henry W. Taylor of Corsicana and Mrs. Annie Mullens of Aubrey, Denton County.

Z. E. Ranney of Middletown, Conn. was in Dallas yesterday and called on the News. Mr. Ranney is a Texas pioneer, first coming in 1850 to Dallas where he lived for four years before moving to Lebanon, Collin County. For the last 15 years he has spent most of his time in Conn., but visits Texas every year to see to his business interests at Sherman.

[In telling of old times] "On April 4, 1857 a freeze killed all vegetation and on April 11 there was a snowfall of from 3 - 5 inches. There was not a mile of railroad in the state at that time. We used to haul goods from Houston to Dallas with ox teams. One of our men went after goods in Houston, starting in the fall and did not get back until the next spring. When he reached Chambers Creek in Navarro County, he found there had been great floods and was unable to go further. The year 1851 I spent in Old Warren in Grayson Co. and traded with the Indians on the other side of the river. I was near the fight between the soldiers and the Indian Chief, Iron Jacket, which took place in what is now know as Palo Pinto County (as near as I am able to locate it.) I was counted in the first census taken in Texas by the U. S. when the population was 212,592; in 1900 it was 3,843,710.

Houston and Rusk were our Senators when I came. Mr. Ranney built the old Union Flour Mills at McKinney, one of the first in the state."

Sherman, Texas, April 13. [1907] One of the most awful tragedies in the history of Grayson County occurred when the residence of John T. Price, two miles east of Gunter, was destroyed by fire during the night. The dead are:

John T. Price, aged 48; Miss Bell Price, aged 18; Miss Annie Price, aged 18; Homer Price, aged 16; Elmer Price, aged 14; Foy Price, aged 6; Miss Dottie Bowers, aged 17 and Miss Aline Upchurch, aged 14.

A neighbor had visited Mr. Price until about 10:30 the evening before. Price had told him that he intended to take a friend to visit a sister in Collin County the next day. The neighbor said that he saw smoke about 4 o'clock in the morning and when he arrived on the scene he found that none of the family had survived.

John Price moved to Grayson County from Hill County about 25 years ago. He first lived in the southern part of the county during which time his first wife died. He subsequently married Mrs. Burke by whom he had two children. His second wife had one daughter by her first marriage, Miss Dottie Burke, one of the victims of the tragedy. Mrs. Price died last Christmas Day.

Mr. Price was a very active member of the Christian Church and was a founder of the Gunter Bible College. He was an outstanding citizen whose loss is a severe one to his community. The sheriff stated that his body was found in the kitchen near a broken jug which was the one he always used for kerosene. His watch had stopped at 3:10, which was probably the time he tried to start a fire in the stove causing the ensuing explosion.

Sister Elizabeth Emberson, pioneer resident of Pilot Point, Texas, died Feb. 4, 1920, from the effects of burns received a few days previously when her clothing caught fire from an open fireplace. She was born in 1832 in Tennessee and came to Texas in 1849. In 1867, she was left a widow with three small children, only one of whom survives her. Services were conducted by Brother F. L. Young and Brother Cochran at Pilot Point on Feb. 6, 1920.

S. P. Poindexter, Connersville, OK, writes: "I am 79 years old, was born in Monroe Co. Ky. I came to Texas in 1867 just after the Civil War. Was married in 1888 to Miss Martha Masters. She was from Hilham, Tenn. We lived on the old home place near Howe, Texas, until father and mother died. We then moved to Cheyenne, OK, where my wife died in March 1905. We had five children living then, three boys and two girls."

"I became dissatisfied there and moved to Connersville, Ok where I now live. My brothers and sisters are all dead. If any of my old friends or relatives see this please write to me. I live with my son and his wife near Blue River."

Breckenridge, Texas. July 16. Charles E. Andrews was found dead in his room here Sunday afternoon his throat cut and a razor clutched in one hand. A coroner's investigation said the man took his life. He had been ill and was in bed at the time. He was a blacksmith by trade and well known here. Two grown daughters in Iowa survive him.

Terrell, Texas. July 16. J. F. Sallee, old citizen of this city, died at his home here Monday morning of heart trouble in his 73rd year. He attended church Sunday and while not in good health, was about his usual home duties Sunday night and Monday morning.

Lott, Texas. July 16. E. J. Daffin, City Marshal, was shot and killed on the main street here Sunday night while attempting to arrest Raymond Bailey. Daffin, 56 years old, is survived by his wife, two boys and a girl. Bailey is 27 years old and is a son of Eugene Bailey, a farmer near Lott. He surrendered to the Falls County sheriff and is in the Marlin jail.

Sherman, Texas. July 16. A. A. Graham, 51 years old, master mechanic for the Frisco here, died suddenly Monday night at the supper table. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Tressie Graham and one son, Edwin Graham.

Wichita Falls, Texas. July 16. Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Denny of Iowa Park have received word of the death of their son, Hugh R. Denny, in an airplane accident at Los Angeles Saturday night. He was a lieutenant

in the reserve officers corps on a practice flight with another officer. He was 28 years old, and was a former cashier at an Iowa Park bank.

Denison, Texas. July 16. Mystery surrounds the finding of the a body of a well dressed woman about 65 years old, at a rooming house on Main Street here Tuesday. W. R. Wallace, District Attorney for the 28th District, died in San Antonio on the 12th. He was one of "the brightest legal lights in Texas."

December 4, 1884.

A fire at Vernon on the 28th ult. (thought to be arson) destroyed the livery stable and 14 horses.

All prisoners in the Montague County jail were released on the 24th ult. by a band of 50 masked men. The citizens in that county ought to put them [the men] in jail!

Local. H. C. Seaman and Miss Jennie Rutherford were married last Thursday.

December 18, 1884.

Local. Mrs. Belle Beckham died on Nov. 27, 1884, aged 23 years and 7 months. She was born in 1861 in Louisville, Ky., married J. B. Beckham March 21, 1880, and joined the M. E. Church S. in 1877. She leaves one child, a husband and many friends and relatives.

Married: Charles S. Richards and Miss Mattie E. LeGrand on the 10th inst; William Henderson and Miss S. E. Thomas on the 11th inst., and J. A. McDaniel and Miss Sallie E. McDonald on the 16th inst. - all of this county.

The notorious Jim McIntyre, wanted for murder in New Mexico, escaped from the Decatur jail on the 12th inst.

December 25, 1884. Local. Miss Jessie Akin and Baron S. Doty were married at the home of the bride's mother on the 18th inst. Mr. Doty has purchased the home of Ben Beckman where the couple will live.

The many friends of E. D. Glover were grieved to learn of his death on the 7th inst. near Bentonville, Ark. He had been a resident of this county for many years.

He was her devoted husband until her death last November. Stricken "in the prime of manhood" he leaves an orphan and many friends.

Mr. J. S. Fore and Mrs. Blackwood were married last Tuesday morning at her residence six miles west of Graham. John is to be congratulated on winning the hand of such a charming young widow.

January 8, 1885. Col. O. E. Finley and Miss Blanche Roan were married in Galveston and arrived in Graham on Tuesday's stage.

Mr. Sam Criswell and Miss Dixie Lauderdale were married at Belknap on the 1st inst. The bride has lived in Graham nearly all her life.

January 15, 1885. Comanche. A few nights ago, Mr. Harrell, who lives near DeLeon, was taken from his home by a mob, tied to a tree and horse whipped. He managed to unmask one or two men who are now in jail.

January 22, 1885. Local. Charles W. Irwin and Miss Laura Thomas were married last Thursday night at the residence of George N. Heifrin. The bridegroom works in the News office and the bride is "one of Graham's purest daughters."

Notice. J. J. Watson, formerly editor and business manager of the News left on Dec. 31, 1884 to visit Fort Worth on business, intending to return in a few days. Nothing has been heard from him and anyone knowing his whereabouts is asked to notify the News.

Judge R. F. Arnold has been notified of the death of the youngest child of M. T. Conner, former county attorney, now living in Dallas.

J. B. Shumaker and Miss Frankie Barrett were married at the residence of J. N. Adare in Graham on the 5th inst. Rev. J. G. Black officiated.

Breckenridge. Pink Watts eloped with Tobe Delaney's daughter, and his irate father-in-law shot the new bridegroom. The incident occurred on Feb. 2 five miles north of Crystal Falls. Watts is expected to recover.

February 26, 1885.

Austin. A party of men will go to New Braunsfel in search of Yeager and Pitts, the murderers of Marshal Gosling and Deputy Manning. The prisoners were being transported by train and two female members of their families were allowed to sit by them. The women managed to pass guns to the prisoners. Later news: Pitts was found dead where he had jumped from the train and was buried in New Braunsfel this evening. Mrs. Brown, his mother-in-law, shot in the fray, died this morning. Rosa Yeager, 18 year old sister of one prisoner, was also shot and is reported to be bleeding to death.

March 5, 1885.

Galveston. The 2nd of March is the anniversary of Texas Independence Day. Of the delegates who signed, only three survive: William C. Crawford, of Alvarado (Johnson County); Dr. B. C. Steward of Montgomery and S. W. Blount of San Augustine.

Local. The "lost editor" has been found. His father has received a letter from London saying that he would be leaving the next day for Australia. It is thought that a woman was the reason for his absence, but he left some of his friends in financial trouble, and too often it is easy to blame a woman!

April 30, 1885. Bonham. Hon. J. Q. Chenowith received notice last Friday night of his appointment as 4th auditor of the U. S. Treasury. He left today for Washington to assume his duties.

Rev. Samuel Wright of Waco has become a raving maniac and has to be watched constantly for fear he will kill his wife and children.

Fort Worth, April 26. A fire was discovered last night at the Missouri Pacific railway hospital. Dr. C. Vopler, surgeon in charge, was notified and a general alarm given. No water was available, so 39 patients were evacuated to the Union Depot which was set up as a temporary hospital. Nearly all furniture, bedding, etc. was saved. The sick and injured were sent to Sedelia by special train. M. H. Walker, foreman of E. M. Daggett Company, had his left foot badly crushed. Eugene Magee, M. T. Kerr and Stephen Mulkey were prostrated by heat and P. J. Boudery was badly blistered. Building loss is estimated to be \$30,000.

Reward. T. S. Ross of Leonard, Fannin County, Texas, wants information on the whereabouts of A. J. Davis and Ben Bridges, with regard to an estate settlement.

Waco. Edward Sorley, local tinner, died from opium poisoning and is considered a suicide. He was 32 years old and leaves a wife and one child.

G. C. Herron, well known civil engineer, died near Ottawa, Canada. He worked with the narrow gauge railroad when it was built to Corsicana and made a contour map of the city - the first in the state.

Corsicana. Great religious excitement continues with about 400 converts already announced.

Fort Worth. Officers are camping on the trail of a gang of counterfeiters.

Texas has more railroads under construction than any other state.

The Land Board at Austin has agreed to lease school lands for 6 cents an acre dry and 10 cents watered.

Note from the editor states that the *Leader* is now being presented in a new format with more news - equal to any in the state. After being called *Young County News* for a few months, the name has reverted to *The Graham Leader*.

Local. Mrs. M. L. Roane, mother of Mrs. O. E. Finley, died at New Orleans April 22, 1885.

May 14, 1885

Hamilton County. Fence cutters have been at work again on the farms of A. A. and H. B. Smith, J. C. Noah, Dr. Culbertson and Mr. Neece.

Fort Worth. County Attorney Bowlin is waging war against the gamblers in an effort to rid the Fort from a stumbling block which has been in the way of the city's prosperity. His zeal and legal ability are highly commended. Occupants of all closed houses have pled guilty.

Decatur. A university is to be located here. Funds have been raised by citizens and John Collier of Mansfield has been elected chancellor.

Cleburne. John White, charged with murder, has been found innocent by the jury.

Buffalo. Great excitement in the town with the news of the suit of Peter Weller and his wife against their sons. The parents claim they signed documents without knowing the contents and have been defrauded out of their estate of \$175,000, which is now mortgaged for 1/2 its value. The Weller family are prominent residents.

Jefferson. One night recently the large chimney in the parlor of the Excelsior House fell in, scaring the occupants and filling two rooms with brick. Mrs. Wood, proprietress, had just left her bed to light a lamp, and would have been killed otherwise.

Corsicana. Walter Burgiss, practicing riding a bicycle, was thrown and his head caught so as to cut his throat from ear to ear. His wound is serious but not fatal.

Fort Worth. Mr. Wilderman lost 54 head of angora goats at his Wise County ranch when they were struck by lightning during a storm.

May 21, 1885

Dallas. A meeting of prohibitionists was held on May 11th at Shady View Park. Among delegates attending were: J. M. Thomson, M. G. Carter, J. A. Lott, W. M. Giddings and J. S. Davenport of Tarrant County; J. B. Cranfill, Gatesville; Dr. L. B. Robuck, R. M. White, F. M. Sallers and R. M. Love, Ellis County; E. O. Harral, Limestone County; J. L. Street and J. M. Corman, Red Oak; E. C. Newton, Ovilla; Ed Rogers, Pilot Point; Mrs. S. E. Buchanan and Mrs. E. A. Dannelly, Waxahatchie and Rev. E. B. Christman, Corsicana.

Fort Worth. The very best people crowd to hear evangelist Pearson. B. B. Paddock was quoted as criticizing Pearson but has denied it.

An effort is being made to move Baylor from Independence, Washington County, to Kyle, Texas. Better move it to Austin and tack it on to the state university!

Taylor. A cyclone struck about 7:20 yesterday destroying the City Hall and lifting the depot from its foundation. It was a miracle that no one was killed since Main Street was crowded with people. Damage has not been estimated.

Denison. J. M. Starman, who married Miss Matilda Harris a few days ago, was arrested and jailed today on the complaint of his former wife of Dallas, who claims him as her lawful husband and the father of their seven children.

May 28, 1885.

Paris. S. P. Holmes attempted to murder his wife, her sister and Prof. J. R. Youmans last night. The latter two are dead. Mrs. Holmes stated that the couple had an agreement to divorce in a friendly manner if either desired and divide the property. She feels this was the cause of the tragedy since she had told him yesterday that she wanted a divorce. Holmes tried to commit suicide with morphine, but the bottle was knocked from his mouth by a deputy. He has said that he does not remember killing anyone. Prof. Youmans leads the music class and was boarding with Mrs. Holmes.

Arlington. The cornerstone for the new M. E. Church was laid on the 17th with full Masonic honors. Col. J. A. McCay of Dallas officiated.

El Paso. Information is wanted on William Miller, a resident of Cotulla. His wife and five children are in a destitute state.

Fort Worth. Gen. N. H. Darnell, for many years a prominent political figure in Texas, died near here. He was a member of Congress, member of the Constitutional Conventions of 1845 and 1875; fathered the homestead law and was a general in the late war.

Local. W. E. Kaye's little daughter died in Fort Worth last Saturday. Mrs. Kaye, who has been quite ill, is improving.

June 4, 1885

Gainesville. Mrs. Sam Myers has been arrested for setting fire to her house with M. Weitzman, her son-in-law, indicted as her accomplice. The defendant is 72 years old - and supposed to have wanted the insurance. The trial has attracted large crowds who are in sympathy with the defendant, and since the evidence is not very damaging, she probably will be acquitted.

Fort Worth. A charter has been adopted by the Commercial Club with a capital of \$100,000, and plans are being made for a palatial exchange building.

Plans for Wesleyan Methodist College have been completed. Ground was donated and a temporary college building will be erected immediately under the jurisdiction of the Methodist Church North.

June 11, 1885

Fort Worth. Miss Annie Elmore and her brother drowned in Big Bear Creek 7 miles west of the city night before last. The Elmores had moved here a year ago from Vincennes, Ind. The brother and sister, with Henry Windham, her fiancée, had started for town, she to get her trousseau and he the marriage license. A heavy rain began when they were about 10 miles from the city. The creek was very high and Windham, who was on horseback, advised them not to try to cross it, but Elmore drove his buggy in the creek. He was thrown out and not seen since. Windham tried to get Miss Elmore to shore, but could not.

Waco. Tom Varnell escaped June 6th in Bosque County. A deputy sheriff riding in a posse from Hill County in pursuit was killed. Varnell was wounded but escaped.

Local. Walter James, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Voules, died last Sunday. A marriage license was issued last Monday to W. C. Reed and Miss Annie Keller.

Breckenridge. Deputy Sheriff Ad Sloan and Miss Annie Love were married Thursday evening, May 28th.

June 18, 1885

Fort Worth. Capt. M. B. Loyd, President of the First National Bank, was attacked by footpads and badly beaten.

The case of J. T. Stevens, charged with the murder of Dr. Wallace at Mansfield, has gone to trial.

According to an article in the *Fort Worth Record*, the date of his death was July 10, 1884, but did not state where they lived or where he was buried.

COMMENT: In 1880 JOSEPH MURRY, wife, and 5 children, Mary Tina, Sada, Nettie and Henry, lived in Pct. 2 of Parker Co. This would have been the NE part of the county, Springtown area, etc., so one might suspect that he was buried in the area. Also in 1880, in Pct. 4 (NW of Weatherford) was one SARAH MURRY, age 53, b. Ala., and single sons Henry and Frank. They lived around the Fondren-Authon community. Since JOSEPH MURRY was b. in Ala and his parents b. in Ala (per 1880 census,) and SARAH was also b. in Ala., one might suspect that she was his mother. You might check with the Weatherford Library, re cemetery listings for these areas of Parker County.

Also I find no COBURN family, with wife MARIAH and son WILLIAM B. or D., on any 1860, 1870, or 1880 censuses of any counties of the area--Tarrant, Denton, Cooke, Johnson, Hill and counties to the west of these. It is doubtful that WILLIAM COBURN was b. in Young Co., You do not state where he married, or where he may have lived at given times, so it would be difficult to know where to check for his parents, without more clues from which to work.

WHERE DID THOMAS MILLER DIE?

The search began with the memorial book of my paternal grandmother, Mary Green Miller Hill. The book gave the names of her parents and between the pages was the printed funeral announcement for Thomas E. Miller and a lock of hair. The announcement stated:

"The friends and acquaintances of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Almon are invited to attend the funeral of their father, Thomas E. Miller at the First Methodist Church, Decatur, Monday morning at 10 o'clock. Interment, City Cemetery. Masonic Fraternity and United Confederate Veterans assisting."

Census returns from 1910 indicated that my grandmother, Mary Miller Hill, was born in Mississippi, but a wedding announcement in the local newspaper in 1904 stated that my grandparents were married in Boyd in Wise County [Texas.] The 1900 census returns confirmed that my grandmother did live in Wise County at that time. Since my great grandfather was living in Wise County in 1900 and was buried in Decatur, I naturally thought that he died in Wise County, since Decatur was the county seat. Unfortunately, I was not able to find any record of him in the Index to Texas Death Records. A trip to the funeral home at Decatur yielded no information. I decided to look in the Confederate Veteran Magazine, where I found the following death announcement:

"Tom E. Miller--W. B. Plemons Camp, of Amarillo, Tex., passed resolutions deploring the death of a worthy comrade, Tom E. Miller, who passed away January 27, 1906, while on a visit to his son-in-law, Hon. Dave Almon, at New Decatur, Ala., in his seventy-third year. He was a valiant soldier, and as a member of Company C, 26th Mississippi, did his whole duty during the war, part of which was spent in prison."

A man asked a professional genealogist how much it would cost to trace his family tree. "That depends on how far back you go and how tough it is to search the records. It might be several hundred dollars or several thousand." "That seems like a lot," the man said. "Is there a cheaper way to trace my past?" "Well," was the reply, "the cheapest way is to run for public office."

SOME WATKINS FAMILIES OF VIRGINIA AND THEIR KIN: ABBOTT, ANDERSON, BASS, CLAY, COX, FARRAR, HANCOCK, HUNDLEY, MONTAGUE, MOSELEY, RANDOLPH, WALTHALL and WOOLDRIDGE. John Hale Stutesman. 588 pp. cloth, index, genealogical charts. Direct inquiries to Mr. Stutesman, 305 Spruce St., San Francisco, CA 94118. In his introduction the compiler states: "I have tried to pave with facts a broad road through the tangled thickets of Virginia genealogy, tracing a Watkins lineage across four centuries." Beginning with Henry Watkins of Henrico County VA, born about 1638 and his wife, Katherine, this lineage continues through succeeding generations (Edward, John, Edward, Henry Walthall, Henry Walthall, Claiborne and Kate.) The format is easy to follow and the evaluation of material used is impressive. This is an outstanding family history.

SUMMERVILLE CEMETERY, AUGUSTA, GEORGIA. The Augusta Genealogical Society, Inc. 99 pp. soft cover, indexed. Direct inquiries to the Augusta Genealogical Society, Inc., PO Box 3743, Augusta, GA 30914-3743. The Summerville Cemetery, a private cemetery, is a city block square of ground on the sand hills above Augusta. Part I gives the reader a review of the city's history beginning with the Revolutionary period. Part II, "The Stones Speak," contains complete information from each stone in the cemetery. Part III contains additional genealogical data, including information on unmarked interments, incorrect dates, and graves which have been moved to other cemeteries. Even if you have no ties to Augusta, the book will be of interest because of the unique way the material is presented along with very good illustrations.

ARKADELPHIA & ENVIRONS A JOURNAL BY JAMES A. FORTSON RECORDED 1875-1897. CLARK COUNTY, ARKANSAS. Transcribed and edited by Linda Shaddock Rogers. Soft cover, 68 pp. Every name index. \$7.50 plus 55 cents tax for Texas residents and \$2.00 postage and handling. Order from Shaddock Publishers, 401 Kimberly Dr., Mesquite TX 75149-2524. All of us would welcome a voice from the past to help solve some of our genealogical problems. For those interested in the communities around Arkadelphia, Clark County, Arkansas, such a voice now speaks. James Fortson kept a journal record of many births, marriages, deaths as well as other important news items during this period. His second great-granddaughter has transcribed it and added a glossary of medical terms and a map showing many of the places named.

WHY ARE THERE NO TALL GRANDMA'S? A Guide to Assist You in Researching Your Family History. Scott B. Chase, 1990, Heart of the Lakes Publishing, PO Box 299, Interlaken, NY 14847-0299. Soft cover, 128

pp. 128 pp. indexed. Price - \$14.95 (includes shipping charges.) The author states, "It is true when you get older that your bones shrink, and it is also true when your grandmothers were 20 years old and at their physical maturity, the average height of American men and women was one to two inches less than what it is today. People are just growing bigger today than they were 50 years ago." This volume is intended for newcomers to the field of genealogy or perhaps for those intrepid souls who may be searching for a different approach to research. Material is discussed in specific time periods - 1620 to 1700, 1700 to 1790, 1790 to 1910 and 1910 to the present. The author takes the reader through a step-by-step approach to genealogy and shares tips and techniques learned while researching his own family. Practical examples are given, along with suggestions for organizing records and information from various charts and forms. The book was selected as a text for the course, "Introduction to Family History," at Brigham Young University.

IMMIGRANTS IN MADISON COUNTY, NEW YORK, 1815-1860. Isabel Bracy. Heart of the Lakes Publishing. \$10.00. This is a companion volume to RECORDS OF REVOLUTIONARY WAR VETERANS WHO LIVED IN MADISON COUNTY which listed all men with Revolutionary service who lived in Madison County at any time during their life. It included not only service records but also additional family data. When Miss Bracy learned of the two immigration offices which existed in the county in the early 1800s, who sent agents abroad to promote the idea of leaving Europe and coming to Madison County, she compiled IMMIGRANTS. Madison County, mid-state on the Erie Canal, was a stopping place for many families as they migrated to the upper midwest.

CRITTENDEN COUNTY, KENTUCKY MARRIAGE RECORDS, VOL. 1, 1842 - 1865 and ABSTRACTS OF WILLS, BOOK 1 - 1842 - 1924. Every name index. Brenda Joyce Jerome, 300 W. Water Street, Newburgh, Indiana 47630. It is always good to see more records from western Kentucky courthouses in print. This is an outstanding transcription of the bonds, licenses and returns from ministers or justices of the peace taken from the originals which are stored in the basement of the Crittenden County courthouse. The abstracts of wills are especially helpful to anyone interested in this area of Kentucky.

LIVINGSTON COUNTY, KENTUCKY DEED BOOKS D - E, VOL. II, WITH MISCELLANEOUS LOOSE PAPERS 1799-1804. Brenda Joyce Jerome. Soft cover; 148 pp. every name index plus place index. Livingston County was created in 1798 by the Kentucky Legislature and until 1809 the county included all of present day Caldwell, Crittenden, Lyon and part of Trigg Counties. In 1842, with the formation of Crittenden County, Livingston County became the size it is today. Mrs. Jerome has provided the researcher with excellent abstracts from the original records. Not too much source material has been published covering this area. We certainly hope that she will continue. [Reviews by editor]

FALLS COUNTY, TEXAS

CAROLINA CEMETERY

On a fall day in 1982 while driving in western Falls County, I caught sight of a small sign proclaiming "Carolina Cemetery." Having heard my mother speak of it, I persuaded my husband to turn around so that we could find it. Entering through a small gate, past a shingled-roof arbor with benches, we discovered many graves with familiar names - Isaac Dudley Wright, some of his children, and many Jackson and Currie relatives. This was enough to whet the appetite of a budding genealogist! And so began the process of fitting together pieces of the family puzzle.

According to Pearl Wright, (daughter of Isaac Wright,) her father, his brothers, William Murdock (twin,) John Thomas (later called John Beck, Jr.) and James Monroe, came by horseback from North Carolina to Falls County in 1850. They were the first to call the area "Carolina" because of the resemblance of the heavily wooded area to their home in the Carolina hills.

Only one of the brothers was then married - John Beck, Jr. had married Eliza Shepherd in 1845. Eliza and her mother-in-law, Agatha Dudley McMurphy Wright, came to Texas by boat, landing at Anahuac in 1850. The father, Dr. John Beck Wright, had died in 1831, at the age of 33. Agatha Wright died in 1851 at the home of her son Isaac on Deer Creek.

James Monroe Wright married Mary R. Murchison, daughter of Duncan and Frances Murchison, on Jan. 7, 1852. He was killed by one W. Gassaway on April 22, 1862. I have been unable to discover the circumstances.

Isaac Dudley Wright (my great-grandfather) married Mary Ann Lea in 1854. Mary Ann was a daughter of A. V. Lea and Sarah Black Currie. She died in 1871 in childbirth. There were eight children, of whom only three daughters survived: Annie Dudley Wright, Sallie Lea Wright (my grandmother) and Laura Lutitia Wright. Isaac Wright's second marriage was in 1883 to Mrs. Emma Hailey, a widow with four children. There was one daughter, Pearl. As a Justice of the Peace, Isaac performed the marriage of his daughter, Sallie, to Charles Stewart Jackson. He signed the marriage certificate in pencil (it is in my possession.) Isaac died in 1882.

Sarah Black Currie Lea's will, dated May 13, 1878, contained a request to "enclose with a neat and substantial fence the graves of all my children and my husband now buried in the Carolina Church Yard" as well as provisions for her own burial. I do not believe that any of the family graves are marked.

According to Rev. Levi Tenney's History of the Presbytery of Central Texas, the Carolina Presbyterian Church was the first organized in West Falls County. Under the guidance of Elders A. V. Lea and J. Hobbs, it was established Oct. 12, 1853, in the Lea home on Elm Creek, with eleven members, and was first called Elm Creek Church. The name was changed when most of the members moved to Deer Creek, prior to being reported to the Presbytery, and again changed to Carolina in October, 1854.

In May 1855, W. M. Wright deeded 5 acres of land to the Trustees of the Carolina Old School Presbyterians of Falls County: A. V. Lea (my great-great-grandfather), Levi Tenny, J. J. Long, I. D. Wright, and J. M. Wright. The sons of Aaron Vanhook Lea built a two-story wooden church that same year. The second floor was used by the Masons Carolina Lodge No. 330, which today is in Lott, Texas. Dr. R. Morris Key, the first Worshipful Master, is buried in Carolina Cemetery. Both Isaac Wright and his twin, William, were listed as charter members as of April 25, 1854.

The second meeting of the Central Texas Presbytery was held at String Prairie Church in October 1854. A. V. Lea was among the ministers present although he did not occupy the pulpit at the Carolina Church. In 1866, at the 25th Presbytery meeting in Georgetown, a resolution was presented: "That this Presbytery now take steps to return to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America." When brought to a vote, only those signing the resolution were in favor and it took more than one hundred years for the Southern Presbyterians to reunite with the U. S. A. Church.

On December 6, 1987, a marker was unveiled designating Carolina Cemetery as the American Presbyterian and Reformed Site No. 266, and registered by the Presbyterian Historical Society in Philadelphia. A plaque was also revealed designating the site as the location of the first Presbyterian Church in West Falls County, private school and Masonic Lodge No. 330. I was privileged to be there.

According to Dwight Mears of Fort Worth, Texas (who grew up in the Carolina area) the first person buried in the cemetery was killed by Indians. However, his sister, Mrs. Frank Walters, of Lott, Texas, recalls hearing her father say many times that the first grave was that of a man who was killed while on a deer hunting expedition.

BOOK REVIEW

CEMETERIES OF SOMERVELL COUNTY TEXAS: 1836-1991. 1991. Surveyed by Dorthy Ketter, Mary Ann Million, and Angela Sanders. Green Dog Press, 1311 Candlelight Ave., Duncanville, TX 75137-3318. Soft cover; iv + 179 pp, maps, illustrations, index. \$18.00 postpaid.

This book is the result of a six-year project undertaken to celebrate the 150th anniversary of Texas statehood. Since Glen Rose, the largest city in Somervell County, was a major stop for pioneer wagons heading further west, lost ancestors from a southern or midwestern state may possibly be found in the material presented.

Included are 5,036 inscriptions from 27 burial sites. One-third of the sites might be classified as "lost" or forgotten cemeteries, since several have not been used for 60 or more years. Many of the grave markers contain information such as maiden names, place of birth, occupation, military service, names of children, fraternal organizations, and relationship to other families.

The method of indexing used greatly diminishes the usability of this compilation. Each cemetery has a number, and surnames are indexed by that number, rather than by the actual page number. However, persons interested in this area will certainly want to see this volume. (BRK)

Notes:

This Brumley family originated in North Carolina in the late 1700s with one William J. Brumley. The family moved to Tennessee and

had five known children, one of whom was James C. Brumley, born ca 1811. One of his seven known children was William E. Brumley, born in Tennessee ca 1833. They were in Hunt County, Texas, near Kingston, by 1855. William Brumley married Anne Eliza Stout. They lived in Erath County, near Dublin where their fifth son, John Henderson Brumley Sr. (my grandfather) was born in 1871. William's first wife died shortly afterward, and he then married Mrs. Mary Ann Coats in 1872 and became the father of two more children.

Mary Ann Hixie Crew was the daughter of George Washington Crew (born 1851 in Alabama) and Sarah Ann Reno (born 1851 in Arkansas.) Their first child was born in Georgia in 1877, (according to an obituary) Mary Ann (their second child and my grandmother) was born in Coryell County, Texas in 1879.

Hixie and Henderson Brumley had eight children: Sarah Virginia, William George, Milton Boyd, Thelma Beatrice, Nevada Elsie, Annie Eliza, John Henderson, Jr. and Lowell Russell Brumley. Both John and Lowell served in World War II - John with the Texas 36th Division and Lowell as co-pilot on a bomber which exploded over England on D Day killing him.

This family lived at Riesel, near Weatherford, where Henderson farmed. The Crew and Reno families and this branch of the Brumley family are buried at Union Hill Cemetery, about three miles east of Joshua, Johnson County, Texas on F.M. 917. Most of their descendants still live in the metroplex area.

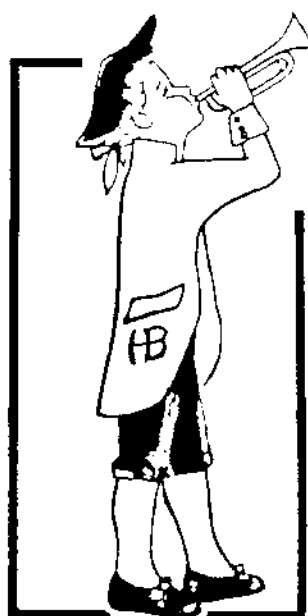

DEATHS

DR. FERDINARD EUGENE DANIEL Austin, May 14, 1914. Born Va. July 18, 1839; grad. New Orleans School of Medicine 1862; surgeon CSA (rank of major). Previously studied law and served for a time as Judge Advocate General of the Army of Tennessee. President of TSA 1904-05. *TMA Journal* established during his administration. Moved Galveston 1866; one of founders and teachers in first medical college in Texas, the Texas Medical College. Author many papers.

Dr. O. I. HALBERT, Waco, April 22, 1914. Born Louisville, Ky. 1849; came to Texas age 12 with widowed mother settling in what is now Coryell County. Graduated Baylor Univ. 1873 and Medical School, Univ. Louisville 1876; practiced Waco 38 years. Married Miss Lela Risher of Waco 1879. Eight children. Wife died 1907. Baylor University closed on day of funeral as tribute of respect.

Dr. W. F. McMULLEN, Rockport; Born Tenn. 59 years ago and died suddenly in Beeville April 14, 1914; Thirty seven doctors in family. Grad. Univ. Tenn. Nashville 1880; practiced Ark, 2 years before moving Wise Co. Texas 1882 where in practice 11 years; then moved Aransas County where lived at time of death. Buried Masonic honors. Survived by wife and four children, one of whom is Dr. Oscar S. McMullen of Victoria.

Dr. C. T. RACE, El Paso, May 8, 1914. Born Covington, Ky. Aug. 7, 1851; received M. D. from Univ. of La. 1882. Moved to Uvalde, Texas same year, where married Miss Carrie Henning. Moved El Paso 1883. Survived by widow, daughter, son and brother.

Dr. D. C. DARNELL, Vernon, April 4, 1914. Born Fayette Co. Ga. Oct. 29, 1860; moved with parents to Texas 1869, and settled Grand Saline. Grad. Med. Univ. Louisville; began practice at Grand Saline but moved to Vernon ca 1908. Survivors: widow, two sons and three daughters. Funeral procession longest ever seen in Vernon.

Mrs. J. A. KING of Pandora, June 15, 1914; mother of Dr. W. A. King of San Antonio.

Dr. E. L. DAY, formerly of Brenham, in Dallas, May 24, 1914, of diabetes. Born Chappel Hill, Texas April 22, 1851; grad. Tulane Univ. 1872; lived in Waller and Austin Counties, later moved Brenham, and subsequently to Dallas. Survived by three sons, daughter and brother. Buried Brenham.

Dr. A. L. TRIGG, Lockhart, June 15, 1914. Born Louisville, Ky. Feb. 11, 1835; moved with parents Saline Co. Mo. where lived with half brother H. M. Rector (former governor of Arkansas). Grad. Tulane Univ. 1857. Served CSA as surgeon A. T. Hawthorne's Ark. Regt. Married Miss Belle Brown July 1865 near present Texarkana. Moved Caldwell Co. 1867; also practiced Thompsonville and Lockhart. Wife died several years ago; survived by four sons and 2 daughters.

DR. J. W. GALLAHER, Fort Worth, late of Graham, June 20, 1914; born Warrensburg, Johnson Co. Mo., Jan. 28, 1852; left orphan at early age. M.D. Washington Univ Med School, St. Louis 1878. Began practice in native county, then moved to Young County, Texas. Married Miss Belle Blakey of Farmer; 7 children; lived in Graham many years.

Dr. WILLIAM MADISON WOODSON, Temple, June 14, 1914. Born Jan. 18, 1840, Wilcox Co. Alabama; Only son in family of six; Served CSA participating in battles at Chickamauga, Corinth, Lookout Mountain, Missionary Ridge, Shiloh, Vicksburg. Married Miss Martha Jane Hawthorn Oct. 14, 1865, Wilcox Co. M. D. Bellevue Hospital, New York; came Texas 1879 first to Milam County and to Temple 1888. Survived by wife and four children, one of whom Dr. J. M. Woodson of Temple.

Dr. ERNEST A. HENDRICKS, Tuscola, July 2, 1914, after a long illness of tuberculosis. Born 1884; M. D. Birmingham Med. College 1908.

Dr. ARCHIBALD S. WATKINS, Tehuacana, July 21, 1914. Son John M. Watkins and Malvina Kemp, b. May 26, 1852, Nacogdoches. Taught school Kaufman Co. six years; married Miss Mattie Cox Sept. 29, 1879; ten children; ordained minister of Cumberland Presbyterian Church. Health required change of vocation; studied at Tulane and grad. Vanderbilt Univ 1893. Lived Limestone County for 20 years. Leaves wife, 5 daughters and 2 sons.

Mrs. M. DAYTON CHASE, mother of Dr. I. C. Chase, at her home, Oct. 8, 1914. Resident of Fort Worth for 21 years and was widely known for her good works and personal attainments.

Dr. JOHN MORRIS McCUTCHAN, Waco, Oct. 9, 1914. Born Aug. 6, 1872, Burton, Washington Co. Texas; grad. Louisville Med College 1896; began practice Temple 1896. First married Miss Nancy Blanchard who died in 1908; married Mrs. Dorothy Rylander 1912, who survives.

Dr. A. L. MONTGOMERY, late of Tyler, at home Dallas, August 20, 1914. Born 1860. Grad. 1887 Tulane; survived by wife and one son.

Dr. THOMAS J. TEAGUE, recently at home in Galveston. Native Miami Co. Ohio; retired from active practice 20 years ago and had lived St. Louis before coming Galveston. Survived by brother and two daughters.

Dr. M. M. WOODWARD, San Angelo. Born July 25, 1849, near Linden, Cass Co. Married Miss Rosa Elizabeth Oliver, dau. Dr. A. J. Oliver of Linden, Dec. 1871. Retired ca 10 years ago. Widely known citizen of west Texas. Survived by mother, two daughters, four sons, one of whom Dr. S. A. Woodward of Fort Worth, three sisters and three brothers.

Dr. ROBERT B. GRAMMER, Fort Worth, March 1, 1914, pneumonia, after long illness. Born Rennard, Va. 1861; moved 1877 Gilmer, Texas; grad Louisville Med 1883. Came to Fort Worth a few months later where was in practice until death. Founder of Medical College in Fort Worth. Married Miss Leila Rogers of Mount Vernon 1886 who, with one son, survives. Charter member Tarrant County Medical Society.

Dr. EDGAR DOAK CAPPS, Fort Worth, suddenly, Dec. 19, 1913. Born near Livingston, Tenn 1866; came with parents to Tarrant County ca 1878; graduated Medical College of Physicians and Surgeons New York 1891. Married Miss Lulie Beall, daughter Dr. E. J. Beall, in 1893, who with one daughter, survives. One of founders Medical College of Ft. Worth.

DR. LEMUEL V. WHITE, Marathon, Sept. 29, 1913. Born near Columbus, Ga. Aug. 18, 1859; graduated Southern Medical College, Atlanta, Ga. 1886. Married Miss Sarah Minhinnett of Atlanta 1883. Practiced in Alpine, Marathon. Leaves widow and eight children.

DR. THOMAS HENRY FREY, Beaumont, Sept. 7, 1913, of Bright's disease. Born Vermilion Co. Ill. May 5, 1865; graduated 1899 Memphis Hospital Medical College. Married Miss Sarah K. Hackney of Coryell Co. Texas 1894, who, with a daughter, survives. Practiced in Beaumont.

DR. SYLVESTER R. WEAVER, Sherman, Sept. 24, 1914. Born Brownsville, Tenn. Feb. 5, 1872. Grad. Vanderbilt University; married in Tennessee. Survived by widow, two children, brother and three sisters.

DR. R. J. CROSS, Ridgeway, August 23, 1913, from Bright's disease. Born Brooksville, Ala. 1853. Graduated 1889 Northwestern Medical College and moved to Texas 1870. Practiced Ridgway 23 years. Wife died several years ago. Leaves seven children, all grown and married.

DR. J. DAVIS GOBER, Beaumont, January 2, 1914, of Bright's disease, Born Calhoun Co. Miss. Aug. 18, 1861, son Louis and Sallie Mitchell Gober. Graduated Louisville Medical College 1887. DR. J. G. PASCHAL, Dallas, in Reagan Wells, Jan. 19, 1914. Born Hamburg, Ark. April 12, 1880; graduated Medical Dept. Baylor University 1907. Practiced in Dallas until 1913 until retired because of health. Buried in Dallas.

DR. FRANK RAINEY, Austin, recently. Born Green Co. Ala. 78 years ago; family came to Palestine, Texas where grew up. Graduated Tulane University 1869. Appointed superintendent of State Institution for Bline in 1874. Served as superintendent of Home for Orphans and Widows of Deceased Masons at Fort Worth for about 10 years.

DR. ERNEST A. HENDRICKS, Tuscola, July 2, 1914, of tuberculosis. Born 1884 and graduated Birmingham Medical College 1909.

DR. ARCHIBALD S. WATKINS, Tehuacana, July 21, 1914. Born May 26, 1852, Nacogdoches, Texas, son of John M. Watkins and Malvina Kemp. Married Miss Mattie Cox Sept. 29, 1879; ten children. Leaves wife, five daughters and two sons.

DR. ELIAS J. BEALL, Fort Worth, Oct. 20, 1914, at home of son, Dr. Frank Beall. Born Macon, Ga. Feb. 15, 1834; graduated Tulane University 1857; surgeon in chief General Walker's Division, CSA. Began practice Marshall, Texas 1859 and moved to Fort Worth 1870. Retired some ten years ago. One of founders of the Fort Worth Medical College. Married Miss Fannie Van Zandt, daughter Isaac Van Zandt, 1860. Dr. I. L. Van Zandt, Fort Worth is a son of Isaac Van Zandt. Survived by wife, five sons and two daughters. Two sons, Drs. K. H. and Frank C. Beall prominent physicians of Fort Worth.

DR. J. W. CARHART, San Antonio, Dec. 21, 1914. Born Albany Co. NY June 26, 1834; married Miss Theresa Mumford of Richmondville, New York 1855. Graduated Chicago College of Physicians and Surgeons 1883. Lived Lampasas, La Grange, Austin, San Antonio. Widely known for medical writings and other literary works. While living Racine, Wisconsin, Dr. Carhart built and operated the first light self-propelled road vehicle. Work recognized by State of Wisconsin and was beginning of the automobile development.

DR. C. W. TRUEHEART, San Antonio, late of Galveston, Dec. 14, 1914. Born Louisa Co. Virginia Feb. 27, 1837, son of John Overton Trueheart and Ann Tompkins Minor. Served CSA as gunner for two years Stonewall Jackson's command. Invented valuable improvements in surgical instruments; influential in obtaining Galveston for location of medical branch of State University. First married Miss Mary Bryan 1866, (daughter Colonel Joel Bryan of Brazoria County) who died a year later. In 1872 married Miss Ella Street of Tuscaloosa, Ala. who died in 1896.

DR. ZACHARY FORD LILLARD, born Martinsville, Ky. Nov. 1, 1860; graduated Missouri School of Medicine 1891. Practiced Houston since 1899. Married Miss Caroline M. Holland of Tyler at Mineola, Feb. 3, 1897. Survived by wife and two children.

DR. I. H. HERRING, Mexia, Jan. 13, 1915, Mexia. Parents moved from Mississippi to Freestone County 1881. Practiced for 14 years.

DR. SAMSON EAGON, Dallas, Jan. 30, 1915. Born Staunton, Va., May 2, 1835, son of Dr. John Eagon and Mildred Yancey. Graduated University of Virginia 1856. Married Miss Elizabeth Smith, daughter of Dr. Robert E. Smith of Grand Coteau, La. Lived Marshall, Jefferson, Sherman and Dallas. Retired from active practice about four years ago.

Mrs. E. W. Link, wife of Dr. E. W. Link of Palestine, died Jan. 1, 1915.

Dr. J. J. Richardson and Miss Margaret L. Tidwell, both of Fort Worth, were married Dec. 26, 1914.

The Texas State Medical Association held its annual meeting in Fort Worth in May, 1915.

Pre-meeting publicity: Fort Worth has about 50 hotels, most either recently built or remodeled. Several have state-wide reputations such as the Westbrook, Terminal, Metropolitan, Worth and the Seibold. Others are the Court, Grand, Majestic, Melba and Richelieu. The Medical College and the ten hospitals are worthy of attention and visit, as is the greatest electric generating plant this side of St. Louis at the foot of the great Paddock or Main Street Viaduct. Lake Worth, located six miles from the city is the greatest artificial body of water in Texas.

Thomas Mahan, decd.

30 Oct 1854. Lucinda Mahan, widow, relinquishes right to administer estate in favor of Wm. Giddens. Giddens applies for administration same date; bond \$400; sureties: J. B. Foster and John W. Elliston.

27 Aug 1855. Henry Suggs, guardian Lucinda and Susan Mullikin, heirs of F. G. and Rachel Mullikin, petitions that administrator of Mahan's estate deed 160 acres of land to heirs in compliance with bond given by Mahan to Mullikin.

TARRANT COUNTY, TEXAS

LAWRENCE STEEL - EARLY SETTLER

Submitted by Mrs. Eudora Hodges

Lawrence Gibbon Alexander Steel, early citizen of Fort Worth, was a son of Reverend William Steel and Mary Catherine James. He was born in Prince William County, Va. in 1820 when the family was enroute from Pennsylvania to the southern area of the United States.¹ They settled in Mecklenburg County, Va. in the 1830s so the older children could attend the fine Mecklenburg Academy. They spent a short time in Tennessee before moving on to Texas.

By 1834, the family had settled in Harrison County, Texas. Father Steel was an Episcopal minister, whose first contribution to his chosen home county and state was the founding of an Episcopal Mission Church in a community near today's Jonesville. As long as the Steels were in Harrison County, this little mission was a focal point in the community and services were attended by members of other denominations as well. Father Steel conducted many wedding ceremonies and funeral services there.²

Mary James Steel died in 1840 and is buried in the cemetery adjoining the church. The area became a Negro community some years ago, and today, her marked grave is the only known grave of a white person in "Old Border Cemetery." The mission church closed about 1850 when Father Steel moved to Shreveport, La. He died 17 October 1857 at the home of a daughter, Mrs. John B. Webster, and is buried in the Webster Cemetery at Mimosa Hall, Leigh, Texas.

It is not known exactly when Lawrence Steel, ("Uncle Lolly" to his nieces and nephews) left Harrison County, but it was before the 1850 census enumeration.³ When Fort Worth ceased to be a fort, he immediately saw the possibilities of a town, and purchased (from E. M. Daggett) one of the stables built by Ripley Arnold's command. He added cement blocks and built a second floor to make a hotel which later became one of the connecting points for the famous Butterfield Stage Line.⁴ Other property included the lot on which the city library was originally located.

In 1854 Steel was in the merchandising business with Capt. Julian Feild. They built the first storehouse in Fort Worth, located on the southwest corner of the public square. It was later occupied by Lake and Nast, a hardware store. In 1856, Steel sold his interest and built the Transcontinental Hotel on the northwest corner of the square. This was a very popular stopping place for travellers.⁵ Steel enlisted in the service of the Confederary in 1861, Co. K., Col. Steel's Regt., Sibley's Brigade. He was elected a first lieutenant

but became ill, was sent home to recuperate, and did not regain his health soon enough to re-enlist. He was elected a Commissioner after the end of the War.⁶

Steel installed a bell at his tavern which was used to signal the arrival of the stage coach, call to church, call for fire fighting volunteers and call for town meetings. The number of bell tolls must have indicated the nature of the signal. The bell was cast in London, and is now in the Grand Room of the Masonic Temple, No. 148, in Fort Worth. A sign on the bell rack acknowledges the original owner, Lawrence Steel, who was a Senior Deacon in Masonic Lodge No. 148, the first Lodge in Tarrant County.⁷

Steel sold his tavern to A. T. Andrews,⁸ and purchased a large herd of cattle, which he kept in Palo Pinto County. He then moved his family to a farm about 10 miles west of Fort Worth, and was a successful farmer and stock-raiser. (Note: The Steels were living in "down town Fort Worth" and "10 miles west" was easily within the boundaries of Tarrant County, so it seems that Steel only moved nearer Palo Pinto County, and did not actually live there.)⁹

Sometime about 1869-70, Steel sold the farm and stock and returned to merchandising, in partnership with P. A. Smallwood. This successful business ended about 1873-4, and Steel, his wife, and a 14-year-old son led a quiet life in Fort Worth, honored and highly respected. He is listed in the 1877 Fort Worth City Directory.¹⁰

During the 1870s, when Steel was a well known business man in Fort Worth, he invited his nephew, William Edwin Webster, to bring his family to Fort Worth, and stay with him until he was able to establish his own business and a place of residence. At that time, Steel apparently operated a boarding house or hotel, in which his family also lived.¹¹

Lawrence Steel's first marriage was to Elizabeth D. Beattie in 1843. (She is shown on the 1850 census of Panola Co. Texas, as 30 years old, b. Va.) His second wife was a widow, Ellen Gholson Milliken of Kentucky, whom he married in 1862.¹²

His description of his family (taken from letters in the Emma Perry Webster Letter Collection) is somewhat difficult to follow. His children, his wife's children by her first marriage, and the grandchildren sometimes become merged into one big close family unit. I show the relationships here as I understand them. I think I have most of them worked out correctly, but my comments are subject to scrutiny by anyone seriously researching this Steel line.

Alexander Steel was a son of Steel's first marriage, He was 18 years old, living in the family home, in the 1870s. Daughter Kate, "eldest daughter." was also of the first marriage. (Probably daughter Catherine M., age 6, on 1850 census.) She was twice married, first to a Petty who died in the War, and later to a Hagood. They lived near the Steels, and Kate was dead by 1879, Hagood being mentioned as a widower with children in April of that year.¹³

The next eldest daughter was Emory, who was still living in 1872. Her first husband was an Allen, by whom she had one child, Nanny. She married secondly a McCall who died in November 1876. Emory and her third husband, Albert Prince, with his two sons by an earlier marriage and Emory's little girl, Nanny Allen, were living in Fort Worth in 1879, but were planning to move to Fort Griffin, "where Mr. Prince has been living."¹⁴

Another daughter, not named, married a Mr. Dunlap or Dunlop. She died in childbirth, leaving a son. (Could have been daughter, Agnes A., age 1, on 1850 census.) "My fourth daughter" also not named, married a Cole in 1872 and lived in Dallas. There was also a younger son in the home named Alec, apparently Ellen's by her first marriage to Milliken, but this relationship is not clear, nor is it clear whether Alexander and Alec were the same. I do not believe that they were. A son, Tommy, (apparently by Steel's first marriage) married Sarah Jane ? who helped Mrs. Steel in the boarding house. By 1879 Thomas and his wife had one child, a daughter. Fannie was another older daughter. (Another daughter, Frances B., age 4, is shown on 1850 census.)¹⁵

In 1879 "Dick, Martin and Maggie - Martin 4 years old" - were living in Lewisville, Denton Co., Texas.¹⁶

About 1874, Steel moved to Parker County, Texas, where he had a farm about ten miles from Weatherford. His home is said to have been in the area where the Jacksboro Highway crosses Lake Worth.¹⁷ The notes I have clearly indicate that his wife, Ellen, was still living at the time of this move, but evidently she predeceased him, since she was not mentioned in his death notice in 1894.

Steel's death was accidental, caused when a large mass of hay fell on him as he was forking it out of storage for the cows. He was carried to Fort Worth by his son, Alexander, but little could be done for the bruised and broken body except ease the pain. Lawrence Steel died at Dr. Ray's residence in the Riverside section of Fort Worth.¹⁸ The body was prepared for burial by Gause's Funeral Home and interment was in the Weatherford City Cemetery. His wife, Ellen, and son, Alexander, are also buried there.

Editor's Note: The material submitted by Mrs. Hodges has been edited to fit available space. She states that there is much information on the Steel family in the Webster letter collection in the Harrison Co. Historical Society Archives, Marshall, Texas, citing certain letters by number. However, she also states that the collection is now being enlarged and edited, which will result in a change of these numbers. Other data given is from the files of Douglass Blocker, Marshall, Texas, great-great-grandson of Father William Steel and his wife, Mary Catherine James.

Lawrence Steel - Early Settler. Notes by Nancy Timmons Samuels.

1. The 1880 census indicates Lawrence Steel's father was b. in Pa. and his mother was b. in Va. One might suppose that William Steel married in Virginia.
2. The Steel family was not in Texas by 1834. They came on 28 December 1839, per William Steel's 3rd Class Land Cert. William Steel could not have "founded" a Protestant church in Roman Catholic, Mexican, Texas before the Texas Revolution.
3. In 1850 Lawrence Steel was enumerated in Panola County, which was created in 1846 from Shelby and Harrison Counties. He was in Fort Worth by early 1854, is on the 1854 School Census, District 4 (the fort area, Twp 1S, R6W), with 1 school-age child, C.E.M., a female.
4. The Butterfield Stage Line, of only a few years duration, never came through Fort Worth, some historical articles notwithstanding. It's route across Texas is well-documented.
5. The 1855 Tarrant County Tax Roll indicates the business of Field & Steel, merchandise valued at \$4000. Julian Field (he spelled the name Feild) was taxed for 14 slaves, no land. Steel owned no land but was taxed for 10 slaves owned by his wife, E. D. Steel. In 1856 Julian Field was taxed for merchandise valued at \$8500. Steel was no longer connected with the business. In 1860 Steel owned the 160-acre George W. Hazlewood survey (White Settlement area) and again paid taxes on his wife's 10 slaves; he had no Fort Worth property.
6. Company K, 7th Texas Cav., Col. William Steel, General H. H. Sibley's Brigade, which served in present New Mexico. Steel was a county commissioner in 1866.
7. Fort Worth Lodge No. 148. First meeting on 14 April 1854; officers installed included Julian T. Feild (W.M.) and Lawrence Steel (Senior Deacon). First meeting held at "the store of Julian Feild" and subsequent meetings "over the store of Lawrence Steel," per Roy H. McDonald's history of the lodge. The bell was purchased from Steel in 1871, by Oscar and Mary Lawrence (brother and sister teachers at the Masonic Institute) and their students.
8. In 1860 A. T. Andrews owned 1 lot in Fort Worth, valued at \$3000, and 11 slaves. He came from Ky. 1858-59, per 1867 Voter's Register.
9. Many men ran cattle on the frontier but never moved there.
10. In 1870 Lorenzo [sic] Steel and Porter B. Smallwood lived next to each other. Steel was enumerated as a merchant and Smallwood as a dry goods merchant. In 1874 (per tax roll) they were still in business, owned a lot in Block 5 of Fort Worth. Steel also owned a lot in Block 46. The 1877 city directory shows L. Steel, a merchant, residence at corner of 4th and Burnett Streets. By 1880 he was enumerated as a retired merchant, on Throckmorton Street.
11. It is interesting that tax rolls, censuses, and city directories, always indicate Lawrence Steel as a merchant, but never any reference to a boarding house or a hotel.
12. His first wife was the E. D. Steel, for whom (as agent for) he paid taxes on slaves. She evidently d. 1860-1862. Steel's second wife was Ellen Angeline (Gholson) Milliken, widow, who (with her two sons William D. and Martin H. Milliken) lived in Parker County, Newburg PO, in 1860, with her parents. All b. in Kentucky, and all evidently arrived in Texas in late 1850s.
13. Alexander was Steel's only child by the second wife, Ellen Angeline. He was b. ca. 1863, was enumerated as Alexandria (male) age 7 in 1870 and as L.G.A., Jr., age 17 in 1880, his full name apparently Lawrence Gibbon Alexander Steel, Jr. Kate Steel, b. ca. 1844, eldest child, enumerated as Catherine M. in 1850 and as C.E.M. on the 1854 School Census. The Allens, Pettys, and Hagoods, from Kentucky, lived in the White Settlement area.
14. Emory was the same as Frances E., daughter, b. ca. 1846, on the 1850 census; she lived with her parents in 1870, still unwed. She m. Prince on 8 January 1879. In 1880 they (she and daughter Nannie, he and sons Henry and Newton) were enumerated next to her father, on Throckmorton Street, all enumerated as Prince, and Albert was listed as a merchant. If Nannie, b. ca. 1876 per census, was an Allen, she was b. same year Emory's "second husband" McCall died. Something is amiss! Albert A. Prince m/1 in Johnson County, Texas, 8 March 1866, Adelia C. Manley, mother of his sons, lived in Hill County 1870, Tarrant County 1880. Emory's McCall husband was probably M. D. McCall, who was also a member of Fort Worth Lodge No. 148, and in 1874 also owned a lot in Block 5 of Fort Worth. Was Nannie a McCall, not an Allen?
15. Lawrence Steel's children seem to have been: (1) Kate, b. ca. 1844, (2) Frances Emory, b. ca. 1846, (3) Agnes A., b. ca. 1849, not found 1870, perhaps m. Dunlap, (4) A "fourth daughter," possibly b. ca. 1851 and perhaps m. Mr. Cole by 1870, (5) W. Thomas, b. ca. 1854, listed in 1877 Fort Worth Directory as a Deputy Sheriff, residence corner 3rd and Burnett Sts., was also member of Lodge 148, not found in 1880, and (6) L.G.A., Jr., only child by Steel's second marriage.
16. William D. Milliken ("Dick"), b. 1848 Paducah, Ky., m. in Tarrant Co. Margaret ("Maggie") C. Young, lived Lewisville, Denton Co. He also member of Lodge 148. His brother Martin H. Milliken m. Nancy Bowen Young (sister of Maggie). Information (1968) from Miss Lina Milliken, of Lewisville, daughter of William D. Milliken.
17. Lawrence Steel still in Tarrant County 1880. "Where the Jacksboro Highway crosses Lake Worth" is in Tarrant County, not Parker County.
18. In 1880 Dr. John D. Ray lived on First St., in Fort Worth.

EFFIE L. SPRINGFIELD MORRIS

FWGS has lost a long-time member, Effie Springfield Morris, who regularly attended our meetings in the 1960s and 1970s. She died September 3, 1991, at the age of 92, having devoted her life to the teaching profession.

This writer first knew Effie as a member of Mary Isham Keith Chapter, DAR, then later as a member of FWGS. We were interested in the lines of Bennett, Stiles, Langston and Springfield. She put me in touch with her relative, Joyce Ellis, who at that time was State Regent of the South Carolina DAR. For several years we had a "Bennett Round Robin" circulating among a group of twenty persons, all over the country, trying to sort out the numerous Bennett families of the South.

Effie was born at Reno, in northeast Parker County, daughter of James Marion and Amanda (DeMerville) Springfield. She received her B.A. and M.A. degrees from North Texas State Teachers College, Denton, Texas. Her teaching career spanned fifty-three years, of which forty-five were at Lake Worth, Tarrant County, where she was principal from 1928-1940 and fourth grade teacher until her retirement in 1972. The new Effie L. Morris Elementary School was named for her in 1969. In 1986 she funded the Effie L. Morris Scholarship to be awarded annually. She was a charter member of Epsilon Alpha Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma.

In 1938 Effie married Sterling W. Morris, who died in 1985. In 1990 she moved to the Azle Manor Nursing Home. She and her husband are buried in the Jaybird Cemetery, Parker County.

To quote one of her many students, "Miss Effie was a legend in her own time. . . . She had a way of making time stand still." She will be missed. She was my friend.

ABSTRACTS FROM THE GRAHAM LEADER

June 25, 1885

Weatherford. Fred Desmitt, brother-in-law of J. H. Milliken, was arrested and jailed this evening charged with conspiring with Milliken to kill James Lee last Monday.

Fort Worth. The case of Dr. J. T. Stevens, charged with the murder of Dr. Wallace at Mansfield, has just gone to trial. Councils became involved in a fight and Judge Beckham, in trying to stop it, was slightly hurt. Sheriff Maddox finally separated the fighters who were fined \$50 each.

San Antonio. Col. Lee, of this post, has been notified from Washington that \$75,000 will be given for the construction of 12 company barracks and an additional \$20,000 for a hospital for invalid soldiers.

July 2, 1885

Fort Worth. In the trial of Dr. J. T. Stevens, the jury took nine minutes to bring in a verdict of not guilty, which was generally perceived as a just one.

Fort Worth. On June 23rd, a former negro servant of Capt. Burk Burnett, prominent cattleman, attempted to burn the house and stab inmates. Sam Houston's son, who was visiting, was attacked; officers were called and the woman was arrested.

Jacksboro. A heavy rain just before daylight Tuesday, put Lost Creek higher than years. Mr. Bowman was driving home and almost lost his team and his life; his hack was completely wrecked.

Cleburne. The Santa Fe freight train ran into a herd of cattle Saturday and struck 103, killing 24 and injuring the rest. The heavy rain prevented the engineer from seeing the cattle.

July 9, 1885

Dallas. Gen. W. L. Cabel has been appointed U. S. Marshall of the Northern District of Texas.

Local. Susie, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Benton Kramer, died last Wednesday.

Fort Worth. New postage rates go into effect today. Letters will cost 2 cents for the first ounce and 2 cents additional. A ten-cent stamp will insure immediate delivery of a letter between 7 am and 12 pm for all cities and towns with 4,000 population. [How times have changed!]

July 23, 1885

Texas Topics: Two gentleman representing a colony of 100 families in Ohio are in Bowie County looking for a place to settle the colony. About 3/4 of the men are mechanics and the rest farmers. This is the kind of emigration Texas needs and should be very much encouraged!

Decatur. Citizens held a mass meeting concerning Decatur University and the Dallas and Northwestern Railroad. It was decided to begin building the university this fall, to open in September 1886. J. J. Long, J. W. Booth and D. A. Holman were appointed to visit Dallas in regard to the railroad.

Weatherford. On July 18th, Floyd Parrot shot and killed William King, ex-sheriff of Jacksboro. It seems that Parrot had made comments on King's failure to arrest the man who killed Parrot's son 18 months ago.

Comanche. About a week ago, Billy Mathews eloped with the wife of one Mr. Secrist. When Mathews returned for her belongings, he was shot and killed by Secrist. The first shot killed him and two more were deliberately fired into his body. Secrist has fled the country.

Hillsboro. W. A. Jackson, wealthy cattleman, who recently left owning \$400,000, is now in Cuba. His creditors have not yet taken action regarding extradition proceedings.

August 6, 1885

Dallas. Robert W. Laws has sued to recover several hundred thousand dollars worth of property in Dallas, Mesquite and adjoining counties. It is alleged to be the community property of his parents. After his mother's death, one half was not put aside for her children, but was sold by his father.

Palestine. A fishing party ended in disaster when a Mr. Sinclair drowned when the boat overturned. He leaves a wife and two children.

Gainesville. A Miss Medley, aged 16. has disappeared from home; she went to the garden for vegetables and has not been seen since.

Fort Worth. W. L. Malone, one of the best editors in the state, is retiring from the *Fort Worth Gazette* to take a more lucrative position as deputy revenue collector.

A Mr. Richert has purchased 50,000 acres of land in the Stakes Plains; a colony of 150-200 families will move there in October.

Fort Worth. At the coming reunion, veterans will have an opportunity to contribute to a fund for the establishment of a home for "Disabled Confederate Veterans." Mrs. Val B. Giles of Austin will head the committee.

August 13, 1885

Ranger. A recent calamity occurred on the Texas and Pacific railroad one mile west of town. Wesley Rugh and J. D. Smith were killed and George Estes badly bruised. A verdict of accidental killing was brought in - they were said to have been drinking at the time.

Fort Worth. Suit has been filed against the City of Fort Worth, Fort Worth Water Works et al for \$3,000 by a Mr. Ginsley who claims to have been injured while employed by the Water Works.

Austin. Aug. 6. Five prisoners escaped from the county jail causing great excitement in the town. They were Yeager, notorious highwayman, Dick Brannon, equally noted stage robber, Tom Pearson, awaiting trial for the murder of Dr. Stovall, Valdez, another murderer and Jeff Cain, Austin rough. The escape was done when the jailor brought a bucket of water to the prisoners. All have been recaptured except Pearson and over 100 men are looking for him.

Ennis. Aug. 8. Mr. N. B. Rankin, in feeble health, asked his daughters, ages 19 and 17, to go upstairs and get a small amount of spirits from a barrel just before supper. They did so, using a candle, which was held close to the faucet [sic] causing an explosion which set the house on fire, instantly killing one daughter. The other died this morning. Mr. Rankin's house was large and costly and the entire contents was lost. He and Mrs. Rankin are barely alive.

Local. At a recent meeting of the high school trustees in Graham, Mr. Brooks was elected principal and Misses Mollie Hensley and Rebecca Kisinger assistant teachers. Mr. Brooks comes highly recommended from Missouri, where he has taught several years.

August 27, 1885

Fort Worth. There is now very little doubt that John Nichols, late vice president and teller at the City National Bank, died by his own hand. One half hour before his death he had bought a vial of strychnine at the drug store owned by Dr. T. W. Powell. Dr. Burts pronounced the symptoms seen as those caused by the poison.

Thorp Springs. This little village has two schools with about 500 pupils. No alcoholic beverage is allowed within three miles and no teacher is employed who uses any form of alcohol. It is no surprise that parents from all over the state send their children here where they can be sure of a safe environment with the right kind of people.

Sept. 3, 1885

Fort Worth. A suit has been entered by the City National Bank against

the widow of John Nichols for \$46,000 on plea of embezzlement and transfer of money to his wife.

Fort Worth. Frank H. Reynolds filed suit in District Court against the Texas and Pacific railroad for \$20,000 damages; suit states that he injured his back and spine 20 March 1884, which prevents him from working.

Texarkana. A fire which started in the Arlington Hotel spread to adjoining buildings and destroyed many business houses. Mr. Dixon, the proprietor, was badly hurt while trying to rouse the guests and get them to safety.

Fort Worth. The Gazette Publishing Company has been organized, with J. C. Loving of Jack County, as president. Other officers are George B. Loving, Vice President, J. O. Ford, treasurer, George Speller, secretary. G. B. Loving will serve as general manager and editor; C. E. Lee as editorial writer, Theo. Holt, telegraph editor, J. E. Pratt, city editor, J. B. Roberts and J. T. Ginnochio, reporters, and M. W. Carrico, city solicitor and commercial editor. It is understood that the *Democrat* will be laid on the shelf and the *Gazette* have the support of business men.

Local. Virginia Lee, youngest child of G. Thompson Brown and Emily Brown, died August 23rd, aged 7 years, 8 months and 5 days.

J. H. Proctor of Hopkins County and Miss Josie Lemon were married at the home of the bride's father, W. H. Lemon in Farmer on August 19th.

Dallas. Mrs. Frank Trigg, who lives in the northwest part of Dallas County gave birth to triplets, all of whom have a good chance of becoming president!

Fort Worth. L. V. Hudson, Bosque Co. cattleman, was arrested for obtaining money unde false pretenses. He was paid \$30,000 to ship cattle, who was not done, according to L. V. T. Randolph of New Jersey.

Sept. 10, 1885

Fort Worth. A woman named Lulu Andrews attempted suicide by morphine, but was saved by prompt medical attention. She is said to have come from a good family in Tennessee, but had no money or friends.

Waco. Henry Wayne was arrested on suspicion of having stolen the horse he was riding. The Navarro County deputy sheriff identified the animal as having been stolen from Henry Dunn in Corsicana. Wayne will be held for trial in McLennan County.

Longview. Yesterday a large hole was noted in the lumberyard of W. S. Richardson. It appears that someone dug up an unidentified object the night before after removing a pile of lumber. All that remained was a rotted box and one \$5 gold piece. No one has any clue to the mystery.

Sept. 24, 1885

Fort Worth. Work has begun on the surveyed route of the Fort Worth and New Orleans railroad at three points: Sycamore Creek, 3-1/2 miles from town; Village Creek, 8 miles from town and Walnut Creek, 18 miles away, near Mansfield. This giant enterprise will be worth millions to this city.

Local. Hon. A. P. McCormick and family returned home last Thursday accompanied by their daughter, Miss Sallie, who has finished her education at Oxford College, Ohio.

State. The governor has appointed a commission to settle the boundary line between Texas and the United States to determine the status of Greer County.

Temple. G. B. Pennington, charged with the murder of J. W. Tyson in Wise County in 1872, surrendered a few days ago.

Wichita Falls. A bonus of \$50,000 is being offered by this city to the first railroad giving it an outlet through Indian Territory.

October 1, 1885

Local. Walter Burns and Miss Annie Douglas, both of this county, were married on the 1st, inst.

Fort Worth. A new paper named the Texas Artisan has begun publication using the platform of the Knights of Labor.

Corsicana. This city has been selected by the Odd Fellows as a site for building a home for orphans and widows.

October 8, 1885

Mrs. C. R. Marklee, sister-in-law of John Nichols, has brought suit against the estate for over \$200,000 which is alleged due from him to the estate of her husband Jeremiah Marklee, Nichols' half-brother who died in 1882.

Fort Worth. The Gazette Printing Company today (Sept. 26) conveyed all assets including the Evening Mail to J. C. Loving who in turn conveyed them to his brother G. B. Loving.

Henderson. N. G. Bagley, prominent member of the Rusk Co. bar died in Georgetown. Burial was in Henderson.

Granbury. The jury could not agree on a verdict in the Milliken-Lee case and was discharged. Seven were for acquittal and five for the penitentiary, although could not agree on the time to be served. Milliken is out on bond of \$10,000.

1-4-91 EUBANKS, SKAINES, WELCH, BRUNER/BREWER

Who were parents of Alfred Eubanks, born c1820 Alabama, died after 1870 supposedly "on the way to California?" He married Jane Skaines, born c1823, South Carolina, died 1892, Whitesboro, Texas. They were in Cooke County, Texas, in 1850, where their son, John P. Eubanks (my grandfather) was born in 1847. John P. Eubanks married Melissa Elizabeth Welch (1852-1923), daughter of J. P. and Charlotte (Bruner/Brewer?) Welch. My grandparents moved to near Temple, Cotton County, Oklahoma. Would like to correspond with descendants.

COMMENT: Seymour Connor's Peters Colony of Texas (page 247) states that Alfred Eubanks, family man, arrived in the Colony prior to July 1848, was issued a certificate for 640 acres, which he sold unlocated; it was later located and patented in Cooke County. Strong's Reminiscences, published in the Gainesville Register in 1914, mentions that when he (Strong) built his 14-foot square log cabin, ca 1848, the Chadwells, Dicksons, Eubanks and old man Billy Brown helped raise it.

3-4-91 MURPHY, PETTY, TOLLE, TAYLOR, HALL, EVANS

Martha Petty, daughter of John G. Petty and Martha Hall, was born in Hopkins County 20 August 1852, married 29 April 1870 in Denton County, Texas, Joseph Edward Murphy, son of Samuel Murphy and Martha Taylor. Her sister, Sarah Elizabeth, born 12 December 1850, married Nimrod Beverly Tolle. John G. and Martha also had three sons: James S., Joseph and John G., Jr. After his first wife's death John G. Sr. married Mary Redden Hartgroves, and they had two children: Joanna, married J. W. Evans 1887, Denton County; Redden C. John G. Petty was the son of James V. Petty who may have been the son of Joel Petty. If you would like to exchange information, please contact me.

COMMENT: Jonathan Petty, born c1818, and Joel W. Petty, born c1830, were in Collin County in 1850, and were in Denton County by 1855 (tax roll), taxed for their own pre-emptions. One Charles Petty was also there 1855. In 1860 Jonathan had a much younger second wife (Rachel Pritchett.) See #377-378 on census. In Joel Petty's household 1860 was one Mary Redden, born c1842, Tennessee. Your John G. and Martha Petty lived in the next household; see 196-197 and 197-198. Hubbard, son of Jonathan Petty, was enumerated next, 198-199. One wonders if these Pettys were related to Joel Walker and son Hubbard Walker, of Dallas County 1850, given names being suggestive, and in Joel Walker's household was one Nancy Petty, born c1782, North Carolina.

Henderson Murphy, early land speculator and wealthy merchant of Denton County, was there by 1846. His brother Lewellyn Murphy, of Titus County 1850, later lived in Denton, Wise and Parker counties, and was early surveyor; he lived in old Elizabethtown area of Denton County in 1870. Both were born in Virginia. By 1860 your Samuel Murphy, born c1795 Virginia, was in Denton County. One wonders if these men were related.

5-4-91 BARNES, WAITS

June Rayfield Welch, 5535 Willow Lane, Dallas TX 75230

Need information on Rebecca A. Waits, born 23 January 1817, Tennessee, married in Yalobusha County, Mississippi, 6 October 1839, William Barnes; Rebecca and, perhaps William, were killed by a Comanche war party on 4 December 1854 in the part of Cooke County, Texas, that is now Wise County. Children: (some of whom were carried into captivity) William Jefferson, John Bennet, Marian Cyempka, Jasper Lafayette, Virginia, Marion Carroll, and my great-grandmother, Tennessee Gift Barnes, born 3 September 1849, Hopkins County, Texas.

COMMENT: William and Rebecca Barnes were in Hopkins County 1850, also Bennet C. Barnes, who was in Wise County 1860. Your Tennessee Barnes was living with Bennet C. in 1860. Also in Wise County 1860 were Mary Barnes, 15, Marion Barnes, male, 8, and Lucy Scarbrough, 3, living in the household of John W. Hale. In 1870 Wise County two of these children, Marion, male, 18, and Lucy, 13, were enumerated as Hale in the same household. Did William and Rebecca have two children named Marian/Marion? Only one, male Marion C., is indicated in 1850 and was of age to have been the same as Mary, female, of Wise County 1860. The male, Marion of Wise County 1860 was born c1852 and was age 18 in 1870; thus, he would not have been indicated in 1850. I am personally curious about Bennet C. Barnes of Wise County; he named a son "Joel."

Was this family perhaps descended from Joel and Elizabeth (Norman) Bennett, of Pendleton District, South Carolina, and Hall County, Georgia, from whom Mr. Welch and I both descend?

[Note: Mr. Welch, a history professor at the University of Dallas, was speaker at the Ellis County Genealogical Society's Workshop in September.]

COMMENT: Since George M. Bryant died not long after Texas began keeping death records, his death may not be of record, as doctors were remiss in complying with the law. Nancy Ann, daughter of George, married J. W. Welch in Tarrant County on 2 January 1887. According to Mr. V. W. Weaver, Box 397, Elkhart, Kansas 67950 (in 1973), they married at Grapevine, Texas, and were his great-grandparents. His grandfather was John William Benjamin Frank Welch. They were supposed to have moved to Sapulpa, Oklahoma, in the early 1900s. Mr. Weaver told a story about one Dave Welch who, with his brothers and father, determined to avenge the murder of their mother and younger brother (by Southern Rebels). Dave and John were the only survivors of the revenge plot. Dave fled to Texas during the latter part of the Civil War and was never heard from again, according to Mr. Weaver, who was interested in locating descendants of Dave.

Wish to locate descendants of these families: James A. and Elmira (Garrett) Ogden, and Joseph J. and Mary E. (Ogden) McCarty, who lived on Duffau Creek, Erath County and Hico, Hamilton County during 1870-1900 period. Allied families: Garrett, Duncan, McClinton, Gollihar and Blackburn.

James A. Ogden acquired land on Duffau Creek in May 1870, lived there until his death 1870-1880. His widow Elmira sold land and moved to Santa Barbara, California c1900. Their daughter Mary E. Ogden married Joseph J. McCarty c1868, raised a family of six children in Erath County: Alvin, James, Willis, Gipsy, Felix and Hugh McCarty. We believe they moved to the Hico area c1898, per an old family photograph.

COMMENT: James A. Ogden settled in the Duffau area c1859. His is the only marked Ogden grave in the Duffau cemetery, James A. Ogden (no dates); he evidently died 1870-1880. You might contact Mr. W. Henry Ogden, 1801 Ardath, Wichita Falls TX 76301, who has spent many years researching the Ogden family.

The Rucidlo Papers (three rolls of microfilm, available from FWGS) contain the research of the late Evalyn Rucidlo, which include much data on the McCartys of Erath County. A description of the papers is also available.

Mrs. Paul B. Murff, Rt 2, Floydada TX 79235, in the 1970s, had done much research on these McCartys. According to her, Joseph Jackson McCarty and wife Mary Elizabeth ("Nell") Ogden had 10 or 11 children. The family moved c1890 to Afton, Pattons Springs community, Dickens County, Texas. Of their children: James Henry McCarty's wife is buried at Duffau, and they had a daughter, Mrs. Ora Ragsdale, who lived at Plainview, Texas c1959. Hugh G. McCarty died at Muleshoe, Texas; his wife was Nora and they had 12 children. Sarah Rosey

McCarty, born 1885, was age 15 when the family moved west; she married John F. Young, and their +51st wedding anniversary was written up in the 28 July 1955 Amarillo Daily, at which time they had a son, N. H. Young, and a daughter, Mrs. Mattie Speights who lived at Dell City, Texas. Daisy McCarty married Mr. Harvey and lived at McAdoo, Texas.

Wylie Felix McCarty (1876-1967) lived at Clairette, Erath County, and is buried in that cemetery. Other children mentioned were Annie and Carl Jefferson McCarty, the latter born and died 1889, buried at Duffau.

Christian and Sarah Shearer, Sr., of Randolph and Wilkes Counties, North Carolina, had a son, Christian, Jr., who married and had children, four of whom came to Texas: Mary, married Powers, moved to Ellis County; Elizabeth, married Jacob Huffaker, Jr., settled in Cooke and Grayson Counties; Solomon settled in Collin and Denton Counties; and Eliza Jane, married John Peck Ferguson, settled in Grayson County. Would like to exchange information on these families.

COMMENT: Mary Powers and six or seven of her children, from Missouri, were in Ellis County by 1848. A widow, she and sons Jordan and Shadrach Powers were issued Peters Colony land certificates. Her children married into families of Smith, Plummer, Newton, Brooks and Berry. Ambrose Powers, another Peters Colonist, who lived in Ellis County, 1850, was related; his mother, evidently Hannah, born c1795 Virginia.

Solomon Shearer and wife Mary came to Denton County from Kentucky, probably in early 1860s. Bates' History of Denton County (1918) mentions Solomon and sons George C., William, Walter, and Rev. Worth Shearer as early settlers in the Hawkins Settlement of Denton County. Son George C. married Martha G. Hawkins, lived in Denton County 1870 and in the Farmer community of Young County 1880. A daughter of Solomon married Mr. Harris, probably in Kentucky, and had a son and daughter who lived with Solomon in 1880, Denton County. The son, Rev. Worth Shearer married Kate Baker and lived at Waxahachie, Ellis County, in 1886, when a daughter Bettie was born. This Bettie married 1905 in Young County (at the home of her uncle George C.) to Ross Harmonson and lived at Lakeview, Lynn County.
