## Noren Comes to Rescue Of Springtime Prophets

The whirlwind finish of young Irving Noren, besides being a good thing for himself, the Cats and their supporters, also is providing needed bolstering for morale of spring training camp hangers-on.

At the Cats' Pensacola, Fla., base last spring, Noren appeared to be the best all-around outfielder on the roster, and with enthusiasm typical of that time of year, we predicted great things for the Californian who in his first and only professional baseball season blasted out a .363 average in a class C league.

Unfortunately, we also predicted great things for one or two others who not only failed to prove themselves great, but also failed to stick with the club.

### SPIRIT SAVES HIS JOB.

For weeks, this season, Noren himself appeared on the verge of being sent to lower company. Opposing moundsmen found him tunable to "get around" on pitches in certain areas and they welcomed him like a brother when he came to bat in threatening situations.

He fouled out or flied out to the left side of the diamond with monotonous regularity.

We're satisfied that just one thing saved Noren's place on the ball club: His spirit.

Though he couldn't "buy a basehit" for days a time, the rookie never once let it influence his play in other departments of the game. He kept fielding, throwing, running bases and using his thinking cap as any good ball player should.

At no time did he give up on himself and resort to radical batting stances. Noren just kept sawing wood.

Finally, late in June in the Fort Worth-Dallas series here, he began to show signs of finding himself. He gave the Rebels trouble each night in the series swept by Fort Worth. It was then that Flem Hall remarked:

"You know, that kid reacts pretty well to a challenge."

From that point on, Irving Noren played his best ball in the tightest, and most important games. In the big Buff-Cat series which started at Houston three weeks ago, he caught fire and has been spectacular since.

In his last 21 games, or 82 times at bat, (up to Wednesday) he's collected 35 base hits for a .451 average. He's hit to all fields and blasted homers down both foul lines. Noren also found time to make two of the finest throws ever seen at La Grave Field.

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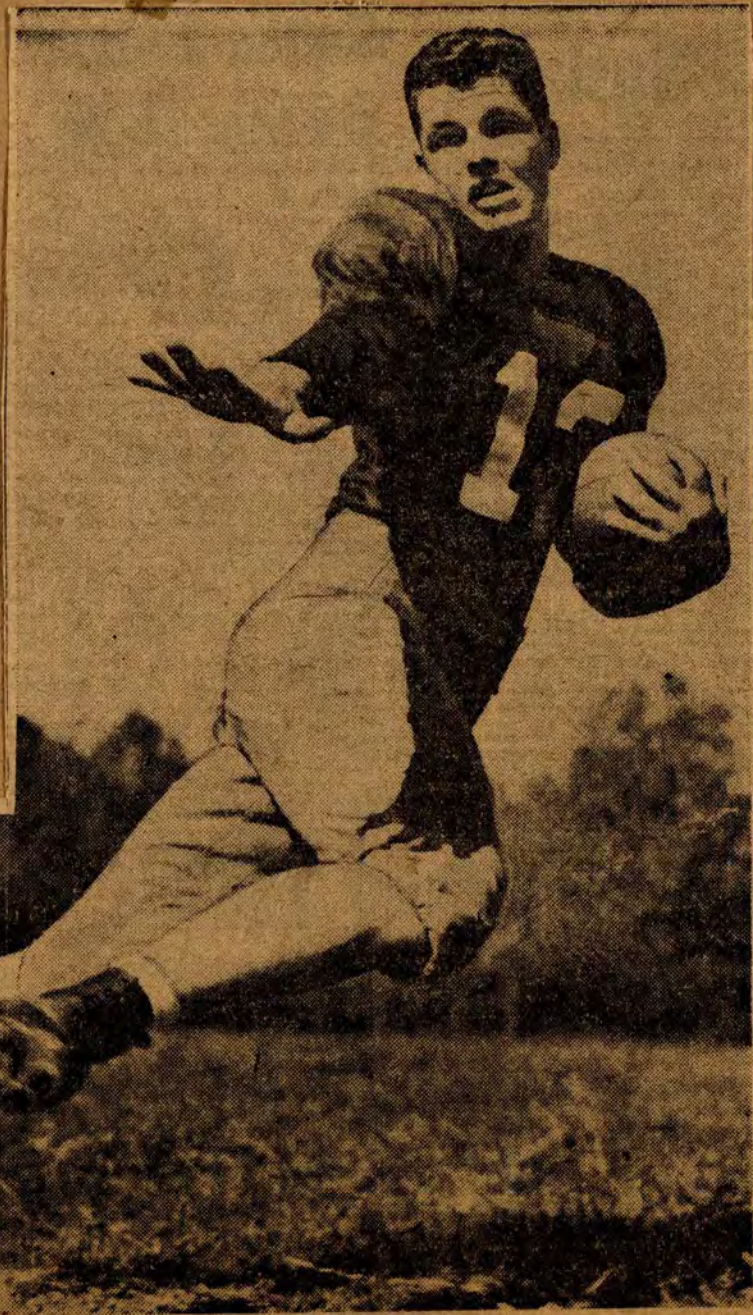

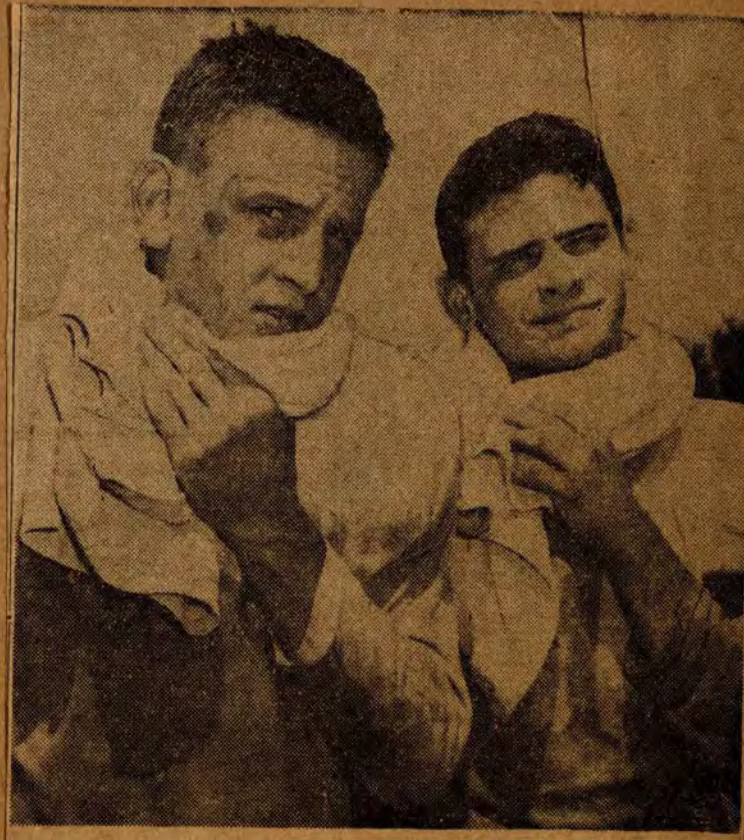

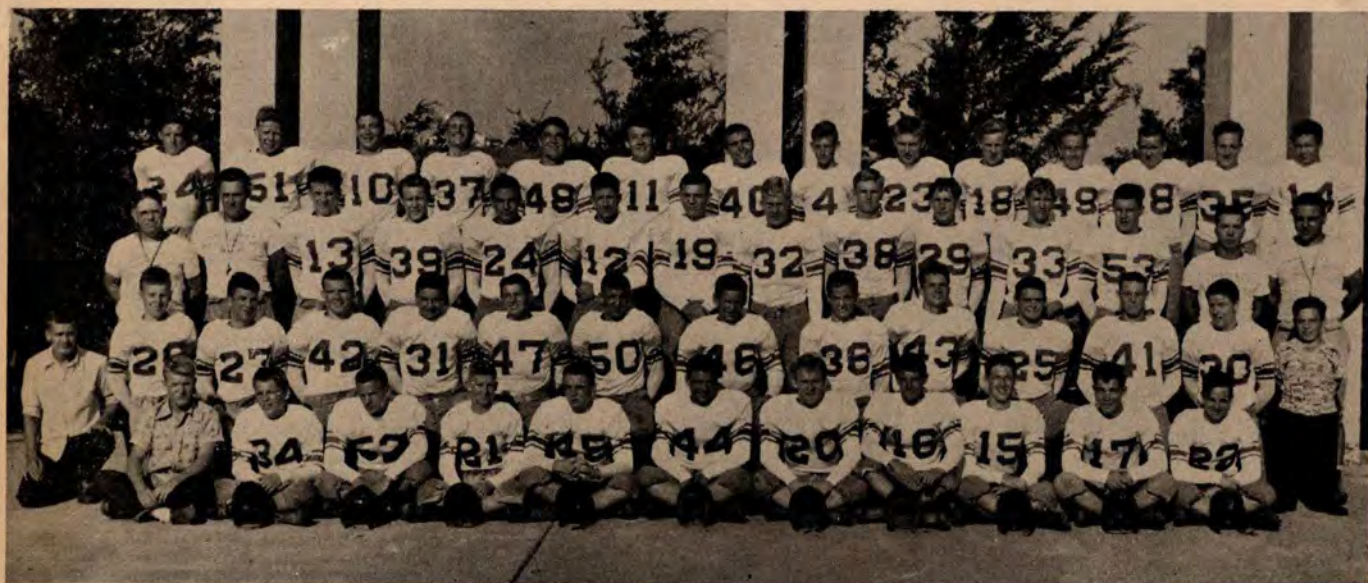

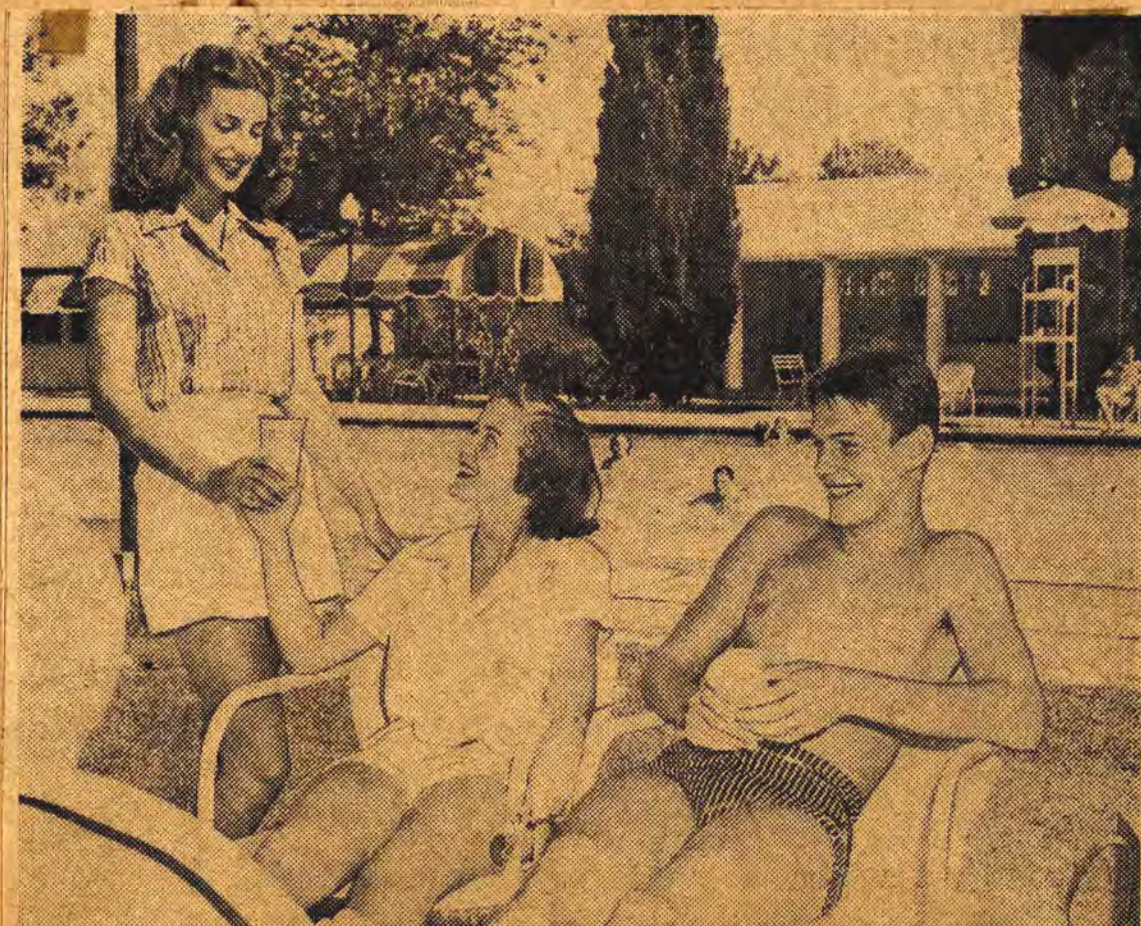

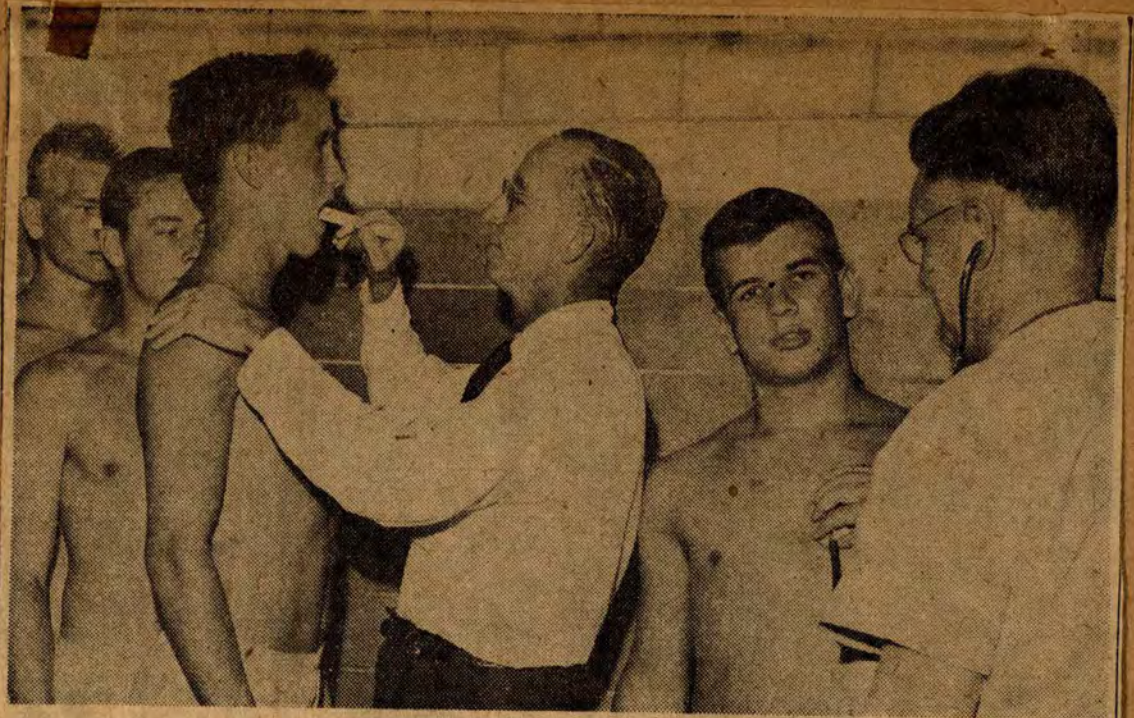

# Jackets Picked to Win Second City Grid Title

Arlington Heights High School should win its second consecutive city football championship this year and make a stout showing in the four-city scramble for the first City Conference title.

The Yellow Jackets have an able coaching staff in Head Man Truett Owen and his assistants, N. J. Hogan, Homer Pegram and Nick Ruggieri. They have an adequate quantity of the finest talent in town. After more than 20 years without a grid title, the Jackets are in no mood to relinquish the crown won last season.

Arlington Heights' student body and booster club, after years of faithfully backing a loser, have learned to love a winning team just as well.

Against the Jackets is the fact that they are the defending champions. Every game they play in the conference chase will be against an opponent who has been pointing for that contest.

The Jackets have only eight boys returning from last year's A squad, and only 15 or 20 youngsters up from last year's B team. On paper, that doesn't add up to a championship team.

But on the field it's a different story—and that's where the games are played.

## Only Three Lettermen.

There are three lettermen returning to Arlington Heights' backfield. Gene Doss, 153, Robert Snow, 156, and Pat Egan, rugged 175 pounder. Doss is a hard-blocking, cool young veteran who will add steadiness to the attack.

Snow, a triple-threater, is one of the most promising backs in the city. He's a fine passer, dangerous runner and a good punter.

Egan is a power runner with sufficient speed to be classed as dangerous once he has crashed through the line of scrimmage.

The fourth backfield position will be filled by Robert Carson. Carson will be remembered for a 9.7 100-yard dash he ran last spring in track. Up from the B team, the 15-year-old Carson lacks the poise, savvy and fast start required of a scat back, but once he picks up speed there isn't a lad in town that can catch him.

Charles Sitton is another excellent backfield prospect and his brother, Billy, is a youngster of no mean ability. Other backs that probably will play a lot are Teddy Keller, and Ernest Newman.

# Three City Elevens Open This Week

The first game at Farrington Field will be played Thursday, Sept. 16, with Paschal opposing Breckenridge.

All games at Farrington will begin at 8 p. m. Tickets for the first home games will go on sale Monday, Sept. 13, at the Central Ticket Office, Hotel Texas.

The team that wins Fort Worth's first title as a member of the City Conference will be the school that had the best B team last year.

On that basis, and with returning lettermen a secondary consideration in most cases because of the scarcity of veterans, the finish will probably be like this:

### (1) ARLINGTON HEIGHTS

—The Yellow Jackets have 20 of the top B team prospects in the city, led by speedy Robert Carson, a 9.7 dashman, Tackle Robert Darney, 175; End Tommy May, 155; Guards Gene Mays, 155, and Joe Baldrige, 155. Add to this Lettermen Backs Robert Snow, Gene Doss and Pat Egan—and all-state prospects Tackle Bill Georges and End Bob Thomas—and you can see the Jackets will be hard to stop. A T-shift-to-a-box formation team.

### (2) POLY—The Parrots probably have the most experienced team in town with six lettermen and nine squadmen. The ends, however, will be Buster Smiley and Aubrey Tucker, up from last year's B team. Alvin Langford, Randell Smith, Ronald Thomason and a B teamer, Ray Hill, give Poly the strongest tackle play in the city. Poly easily could win its first city grid title. Use box formation.

### (3) PASCHAL — The Panthers have an outside chance to score an upset and win the crown, its first since 1944. With

Kenneth Cochran up-under on the T formation and Wallace (Buck) McLean for speed Paschal will be tough. Coach Bill Allen has two lettermen and 13 squadmen around which to build.

### (4) NORTHSIDE — The Steers will field one of their heaviest, slowest and most inexperienced teams in years. Darrow Hooper, Charles Davis, Kenneth Wilson and Joe Leavell are the only returning members of last year's team. Among the ex-B team youngsters after a starting berth are Wayne Cunningham, a guard; Billy Roberts and Henry Womack, tackles; Richard Byers, center; Roy Crowe, Don Kerlee and Jim-

my Collier, backs. The Steers may be tough by November.

(5) TECH—With Dick Miller, Joe Bill Fox, Bill Eskew and David Deleon in the backfield, and a good line in the making, the Bulldogs should snap a two-and-a-half year losing streak and climb out of the cellar.

(6) AMON CARTER RIVERSIDE—Not a cellar team, by any means, but will have to show a better line before it can be classed otherwise. With such backs as Carley Sides, Jack Huston, Roy Moore, Fleming Jones and Bill Strieff around, the Eagles always will be dangerous to a team looking for a breather.

### Bill Georges Back.

In the line Owen has three returning lettermen and two squadmen. Bill Georges, 183-pound all-state performer, will be at one tackle slot and Squadman Marlin Ribble, 175, probably will man the other post. They'll be backed up by Robert Darney, 175 and Richard Duke, 170. The guard positions will be well manned by Letterman Bill Bourland, 150, and Gene Mays, 155, or Joe Baldrige, 150. Another leading candidate for the job is Phil Hart, 155.

Ollie Summerall, 150, and a squadman, is the leading contender at center. David Mays, 165, and Kenneth Meier, 165, both up from last year's B team, will play quite a lot.

At one end position Owen will have Bob Thomas, a 185-pound letterman of all-state caliber. Tommy May, 155, Weldon Kirby, 140, and Jeremiah Collier, 160, are scrapping for the other terminal.

Man-to-man, this year's club will be heavier and faster than the 1947 team.

The Jackets' schedule is a natural. They don't open their season until Sept. 17, and then it's against El Paso High at Farrington Field.

The following week-end they go to Dallas for a game with Sunset. Oct. 2 the Jackets draw another weak sister, Houston Jeff Davis, at Farrington Field.

But on Oct. 8, at San Angelo, Arlington Heights will receive a real test. The Jackets should enter

that game undefeated. How come out will cast a lot of on the chances of Paschal, and North Side in the Fort title race.

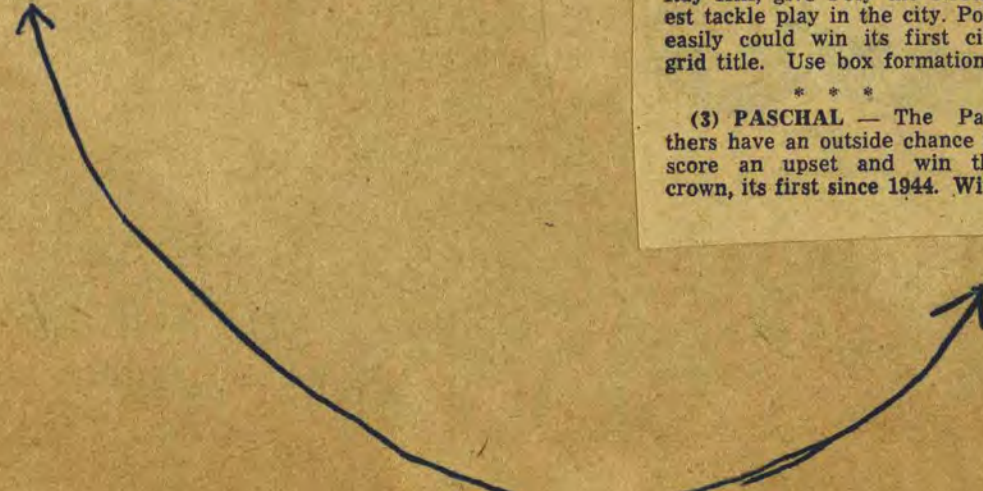

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# Jackets Lone Victors As 3 City Clubs Lose

**Weatherford Blanks Eagles, 13-0; San Jacinto Surprises Parrots, 20-6; Odessa Quiets Steers, 20-6, in Big Night.**

Arlington Heights' 31-2 victory over El Paso Friday night at Farrington Field took an added luster Saturday when Poly, North Side and Amon Carter Riverside elevens returned home from sound shellackings on foreign soil. As a matter of fact, the Jackets' first outing of the campaign was the only bright spot for Fort Worth's City Conference members.

While the defending city champions were making an awesome display of power before 5,737 spectators at Farrington Field, San Jacinto of Houston surprised Poly, 20-6, Odessa crushed North Side, 20-7, and Weatherford humbled Carter Riverside, 13-0.

Only a customary opening night outbreak of fumbles and timing mishaps kept Coach Truett Owen's pupils from making the game a runaway. As it was, they scored after 10 minutes on Halfback Bob Snow's 89-yard return and his plunge from the El Paso three. They made the Tigers a gift of two points when Snow was tackled behind the goal on a harum-scarum punt return but came back for one touchdown on Gene Doss' 58-yard payoff pass to End Bob Thomas and another on Fullback Pat Egan's three-yard thrust off tackle. It was Arlington Heights 19, El Paso 2, at the half.

On the second play of the third quarter, Snow burst off tackle and sped 72 yards for the fourth tally. The fifth and final one came on a 70-yard drive in the fourth, with Egan rambling the final nine paces.

The Steers were completely outplayed for three quarters; then Quarterback Darrow Hooper took to the air for the Fort Worth eleven's only score. He threw one into the left flat to Kenneth Wilson, who sprinted 17 yards to the goal. Hooper converted from placement.

The Parrots' loss at Houston was the night's biggest surprise. Sam Jackson, a 135-pound scat back, led on gallops of 40 and 45 yards in the second and third quarters, respectively, and Jimmy Va. plunged two yards for the Houston team's last counter. Va. didn't threaten after its touchdown six plays late in the opening period. Recovery of a Golden Bear fumble on the home team's 11-yard line followed by Alvin Langford's sally from the nine gave the Fort Worth eleven its lone marker.

Two Carter Riverside fumbles led to both Weatherford scores. The first occurred on the Eagle 38. O. T. Cox and Monte Sirmon of the Kangaroos alternated lugging the leather to the 16, where Cox passed to Glenn on the one. Gene Gilley punched across on the next play and Cox converted.

In the same quarter, the third, Cox tossed a short pass over the line to J. Bedford on the Weatherford 40. He raced 60 yards through the heart of the Eagle defense for the tally.

# Oil Man, 2 Teachers Die In Ft. Worth-Bound Plane

A trip to the Arlington Heights-San Angelo High School football game Friday night had a tragic ending for three persons Saturday when the plane in which they were returning crashed and burned 30 miles southeast of Abilene, killing all three.

Killed in the crash were:

Don Wood, 46, 3500 Lenox, oil company owner.

Miss Mary Virginia Harmon, 23, Arlington Heights physical education teacher. Her home was in Dallas.

Mrs. Jo Evelyn Clarkson, 24, also an Arlington Heights physical education teacher, from Texarkana.

The monoplane, its motor missing, crashed in an open field three miles south of Goldsboro in northwest Coleman County. A heavy rainstorm was in progress at the time of the crash, about 11:30 a. m., according to Haskell Clevinger, farmer, who saw the plane circle several times as though attempting to land. "The plane burst into flames as soon as it hit the ground," Clevinger said.

The bodies were not removed from the wreckage until late Saturday afternoon. They were taken to Coleman funeral homes.

Mrs. Happy Shelton Wood, former county clerk and wife of

Don Wood, had seen the plane overhead as she drove through Coleman en route home with several high school girls. "Everything seemed all right then," Mrs. Wood related Saturday night.

Wood, Miss Harmon, Mrs. Clarkson and Mrs. Janie Brewster, an art teacher at AHHS, flew to San Angelo Friday afternoon. Mrs. Wood and the girls went by auto. They all sat together at the game Friday night, deciding to remain overnight.

Mr. and Mrs. Wood and the teachers and students had breakfast together Saturday morning. Wood, because of threatening skies, debated over leaving the plane there and coming home by auto, but when the Weather Bureau gave him clearance, Wood decided to come by plane.

Mrs. Brewster had become airsick on the trip Friday so decided to come home by auto. Wood attempted to get one of the other teachers also to come by auto, but both insisted on the plane trip, according to Mrs. Wood.

The party split when Wood and the teachers took a taxi to the air field and Mrs. Wood and the others started toward Fort Worth by car.

Mrs. Wood said she called the San Angelo airport about weather conditions as she left the city limits and was told "everything" was all right.

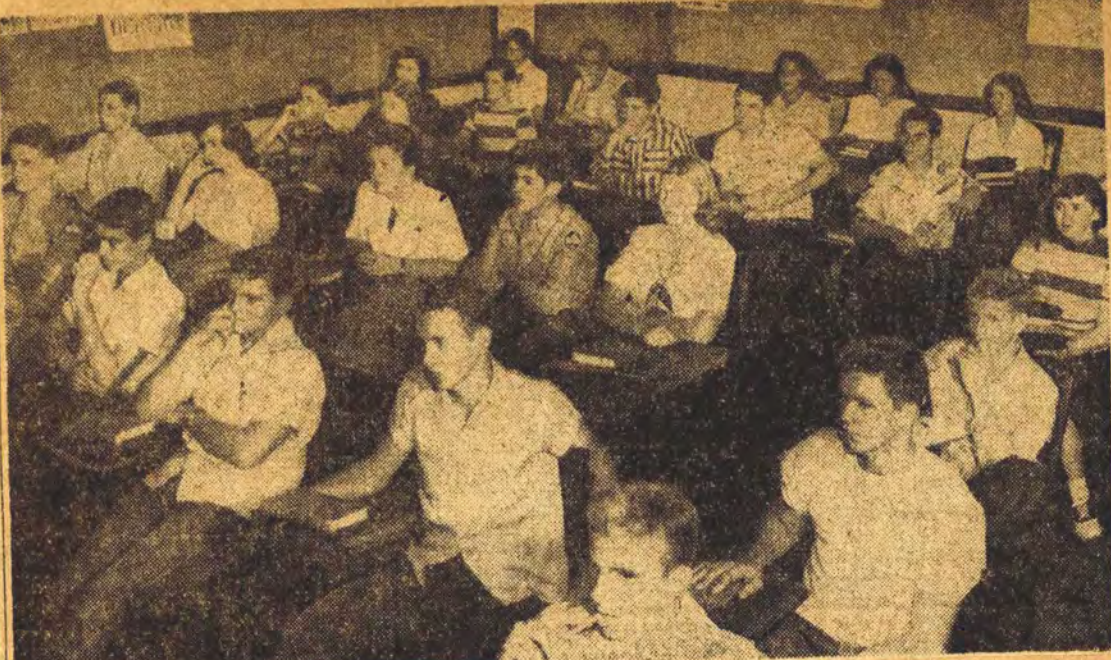

**Arlington Heights School Honors Memory of Three Killed in Crash**

It seemed like final exam time in Room 115. No scraping of chairs, no muffled whispering, only an intense sort of concentration on the loud speaker above the front blackboard.

"Our hearts are sad as we assemble to pay respects to two members of our faculty and a friend and patron of Arlington Heights High School who lost their lives Saturday."

The voice of Principal Roy M. Stone sounded a bit tinny over the public address system. A girl in a pink sweater fidgeted.

The deeper voice of Rev. Harold Wolfe of West Side Baptist Church, Bible teacher at the high school, intoned . . . "Let not your hearts be troubled; ye believe in God; believe also in Me . . ." and then melted into the 23rd Psalm, "The Lord is my shepherd . . ."

**Killed in Crash.**

In the home room of Miss Mary Virginia Harmon, 23, killed in Saturday's plane crash with Mrs. Jo Evelyn Clarkson, 24, and Don Wood Sr., 46, the girl in the pink sweater twisted a dainty lace-trimmed handkerchief.

Now the voice coming in over the loudspeaker was that of a teen-aged girl, trembling slightly, "When the game of life has reached its goal and the player has played it well, when he reaches home base and hears the toll of the distant, final bell . . ."

Judy Ball, 4208 Lone Oak, finished her original poem, "And they take their place on the court of Him, where every player's a star," and was followed by Kathryn Mortensen's specially-composed prayer, "Let us not think of death in terms of fear . . . give us strength and power to endure the loneliness that is now ours."

Kathryn, another AHHS student, lives at 4801 Harley.

**Struggle Against Tears.**

The boys in Room 115, one looking like a football player, with a patch of adhesive over the bridge of his nose, twisted self-consciously. Some of the girls struggled against tears.

An adult's voice was next, that of Miss Kathryn Haden, dean of women, "who knew these two teachers better than all of us."

"We pause to pay tribute to three people," she said solemnly. "In the passing of Mr. Wood we have lost a good patron, a good friend and an ardent booster for our school."

"Three years ago there came into our school two attractive young teachers, Mrs. Clarkson and Miss Harmon, who then were strangers to all of us. But they soon made for themselves a place in our hearts and we have learned to love and appreciate them."

Miss Haden read a resolution

of sympathy to the families of the dead.

**'Set High Standards.'**

Superintendent Moore's remarks still remained. "We thank Thee for the inspiration we have received from their buoyant spirits, their boundless enthusiasm and their loyalty to us and our school. . . . Help us, always, to live up to all of the high standards which they have set for us. Our lives are richer, brighter and happier because of their helpful hands and pleasant guidance."

From the flag pole, with the colors at half staff, came the deep-throated call of Taps, played and echoed by Edmund Fahrenkamp, 204 Virginia, and Tommy Gholson, 116 N. Bailey. The melancholy notes filled Room 115.

"We will now file silently out," came the voice of the principal. It was all over. The girl in the sweater daubed at her eyes.

Services were held for Miss Harmon at Ray Crowder Chapel Monday afternoon, with burial in Dallas. Services for Mrs. Clarkson were conducted in Texarkana and burial also was held there. Weldon Lucas, vice principal at Arlington Heights, accompanied Mrs. Clarkson's body to Texarkana.

Services for Wood will be held at 2 p. m. Tuesday in Ray Crowder Chapel. Burial will take place in Greenwood Cemetery.

Arlington Heights' unbeaten Yellowjackets and the inspired Paschal Panthers, leaders in the city high school grid race, battled to a 6-6 standstill Friday night before 11,358 persons, the second largest crowd of the season, at Farrington Field.

The Jackets scored in the second period when their lightning-fast junior halfback, Robert Carson, fled 41 yards. Paschal knocked across its touchdown in the third quarter, going into the air-planes for a 68-yard march that produced the surprising tie.

Otherwise, it was a tight defensive struggle punctuated by savage line play, 19 punts and innumerable fumbles.

For the records, Arlington Heights led in penetrations, 1-0, in first downs, 7-6, and in total yardage from scrimmage, 199 to 120.

Should the teams continue unbeaten in the city race and tie for the championship, Arlington Heights, in all probability, would be certified to enter the state City conference playoffs because of its statistical superiority over the Panthers in this game.

Paschal, without doubt, exhibited its best form of the season in tying a Jacket eleven that earlier had averaged 300 yards and 25 points per game while mauling each of its six foes.

The teams battled at long range throughout the opening stanza, with neither threatening seriously. Arlington Heights lost one scoring chance from the Paschal 23 early in the second chapter, then exploded for its score the next time it had possession.

From the Paschal 44, Left Halfback Bill Sitton swept wide to the right for three yards, placing the ball near the east sidelines and leaving plenty of room to his left for the next play.

Shifting from the T into a box formation, Fullback Pat Egan took the ball, spun, and handed off to Carson, who was racing to his left from the wingback post. Carson thrust inside left end, eluded one Panther halfback, then turned on all speed that made him one of the city's best sprinters last spring.

He sped across the goal near the flag in the northwest corner. Bill Sitton then attempted the all-important conversion, but the ball struck the goal posts, bounced back, and Paschal made the failure sure by declining an offside penalty on the play.

Daring quarterbacking by Kenneth Cochran figured prominently in the Panthers' drive for the tying score.

The move started on their own 32 and would have petered out on the Arlington Heights 48 if Cochran hadn't gambled on fourth down with two yards needed.

On a sneaker from punt formation, he plunged four yards to set up a first on the 44. He then hit Halfback Wallace (Buck) McLean, who had to leave the game twice to have his shoulder put back in place, with a 12-yard pass in the left flat.

From the Jacket 32, Cochran picked up another 12 yards and a first by sweeping left end after spreading the defense by faking a throw. His next pass was hauled in on the nine by Left End Guy Guyette, who spun away from the Arlington Heights' safety and went over standing up.

Reserve Back Griff Hughes attempted the extra point, but his kick was low.

Arlington Heights earned its edge in penetrations late in the third quarter when Glen Jones, the Paschal safety, fumbled on a punt return and Left End Tommy May covered the ball on the Panther 36.

The Jackets barely made a first down on the 26, when Sitton passed over the middle to May for a first down on the 10. An offside penalty and four plays set

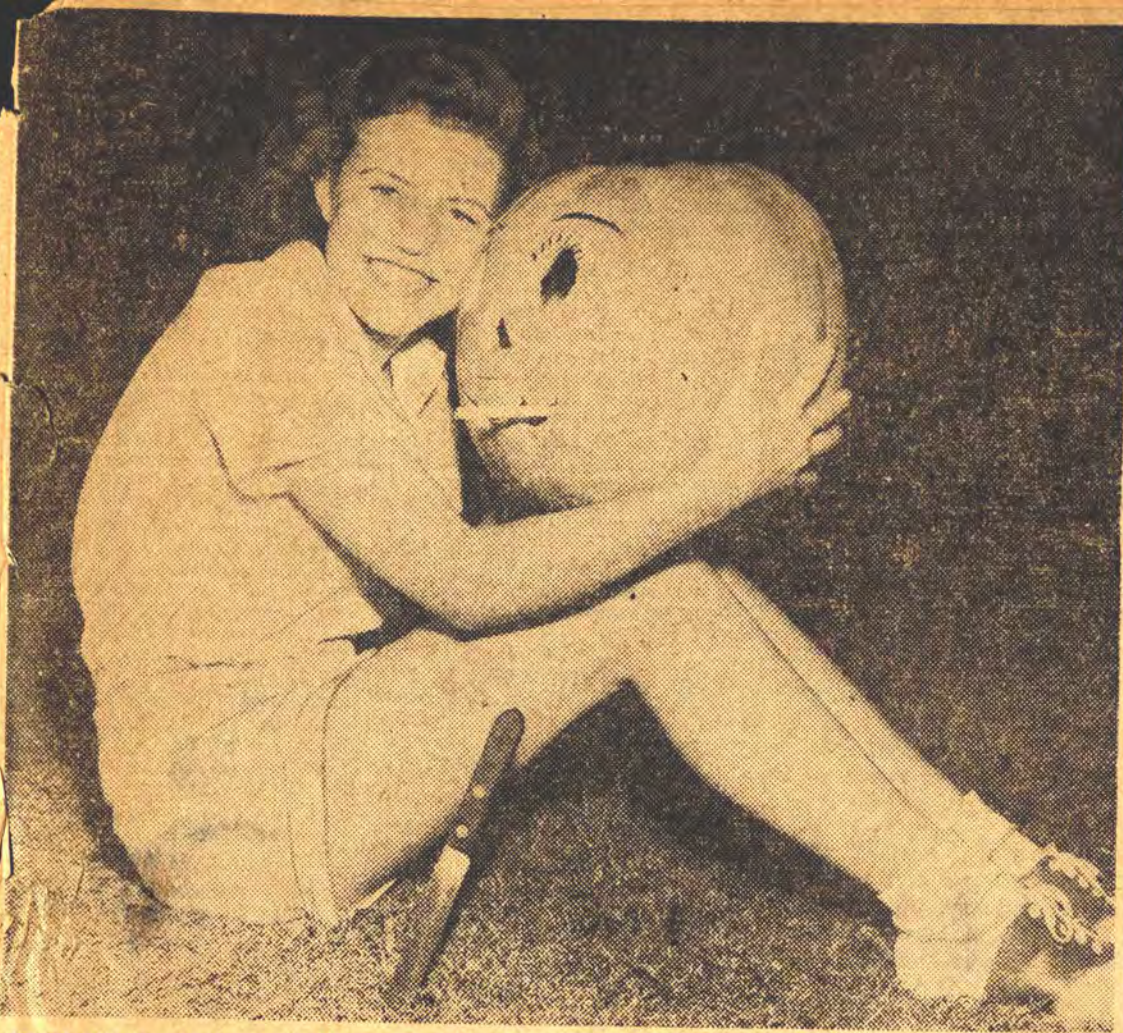

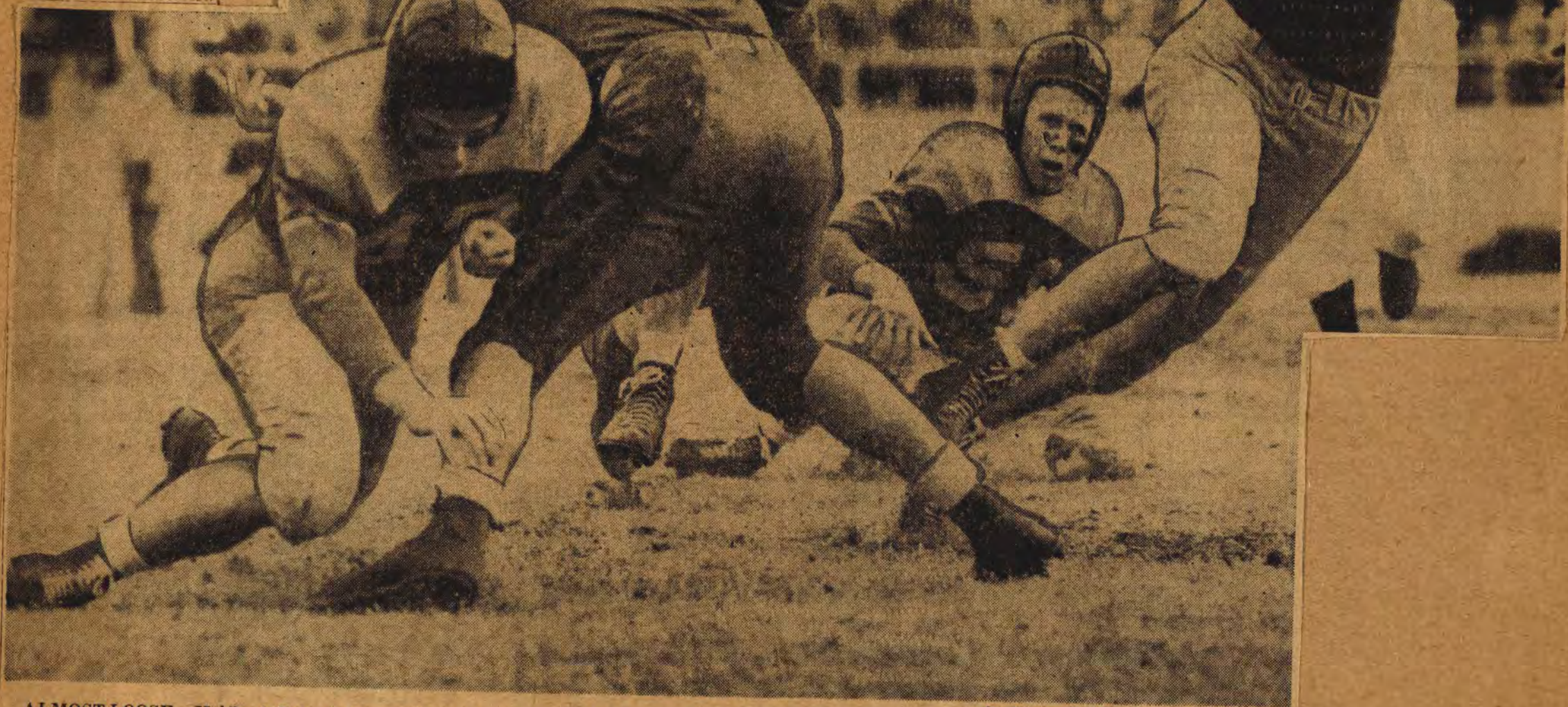

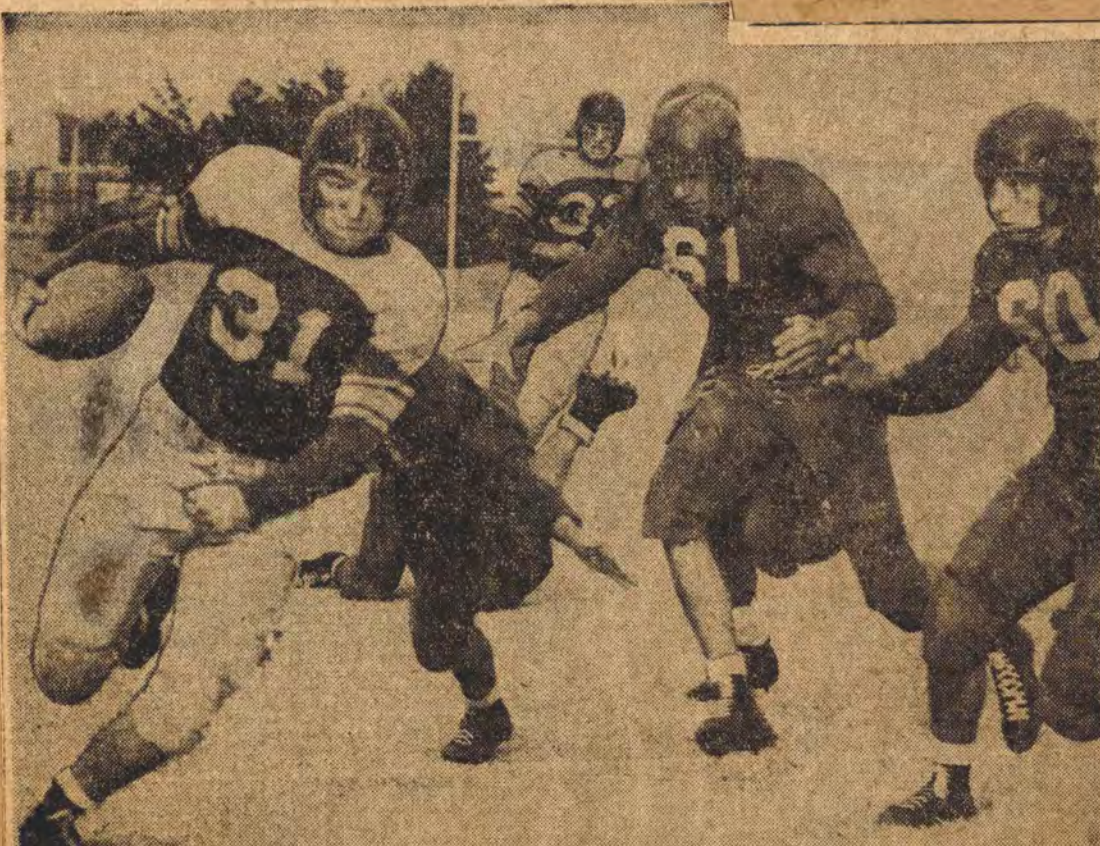

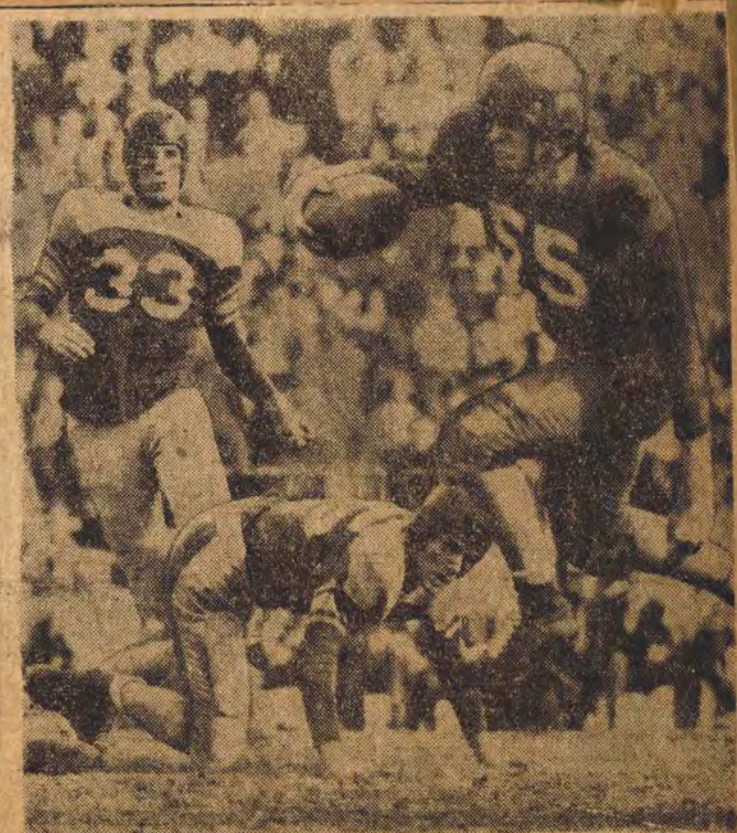

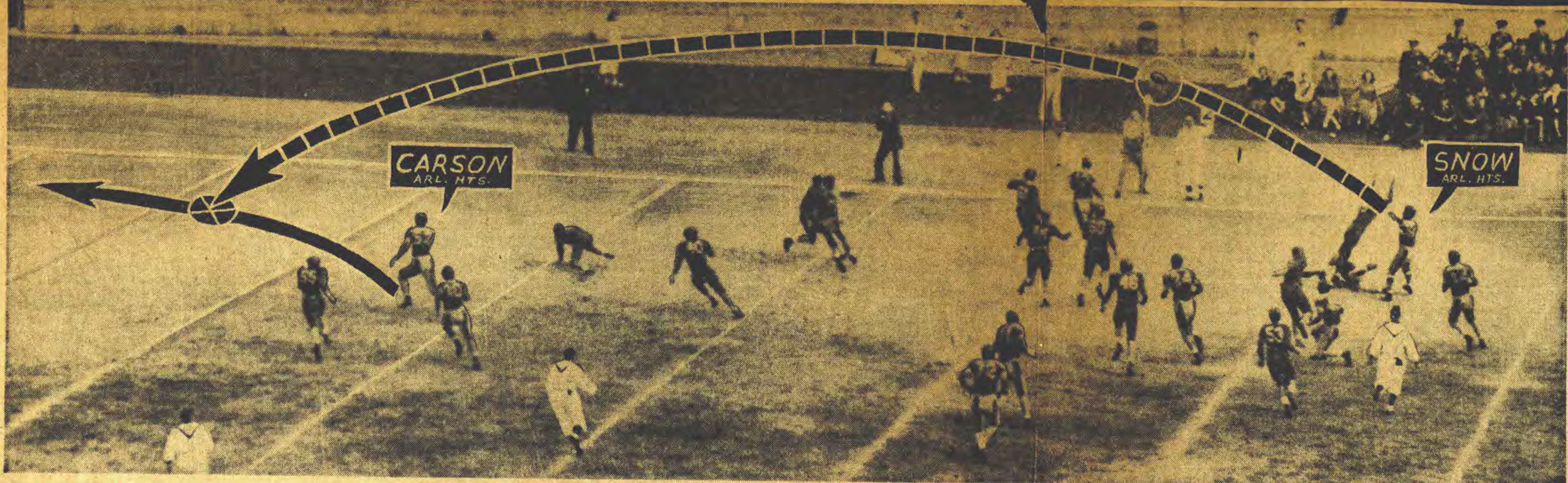

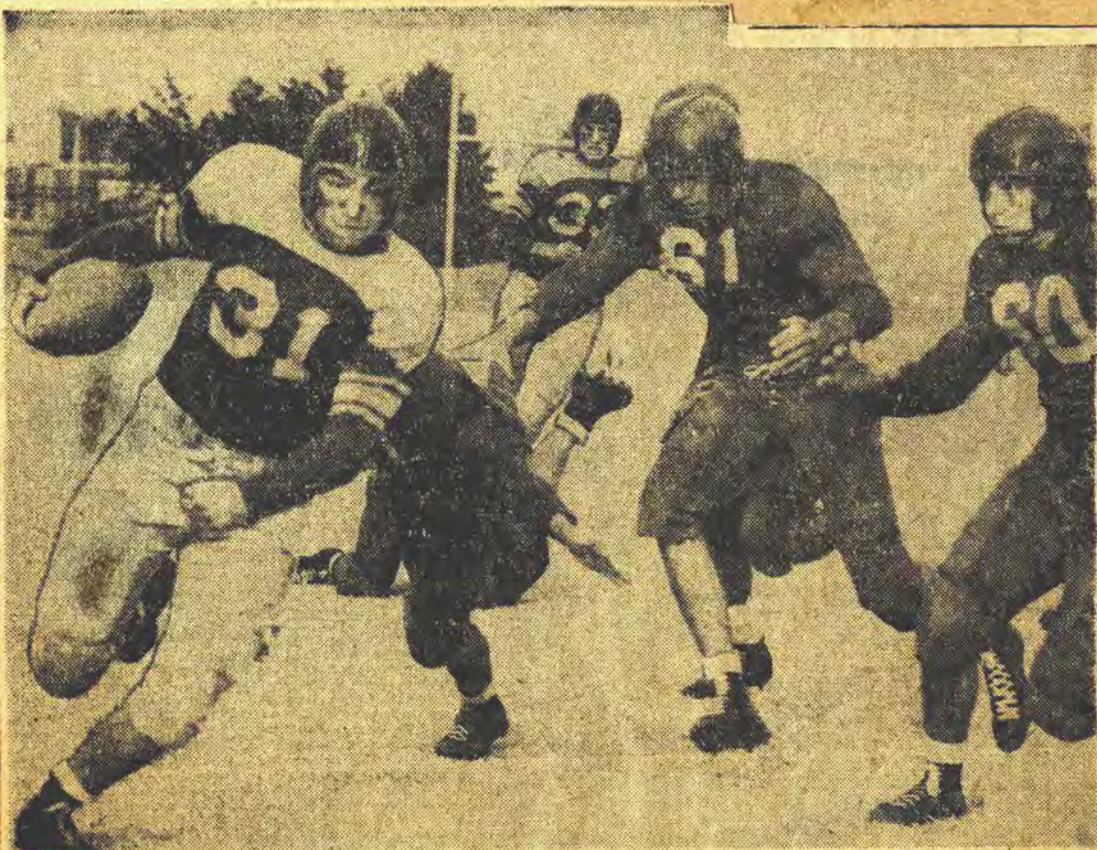

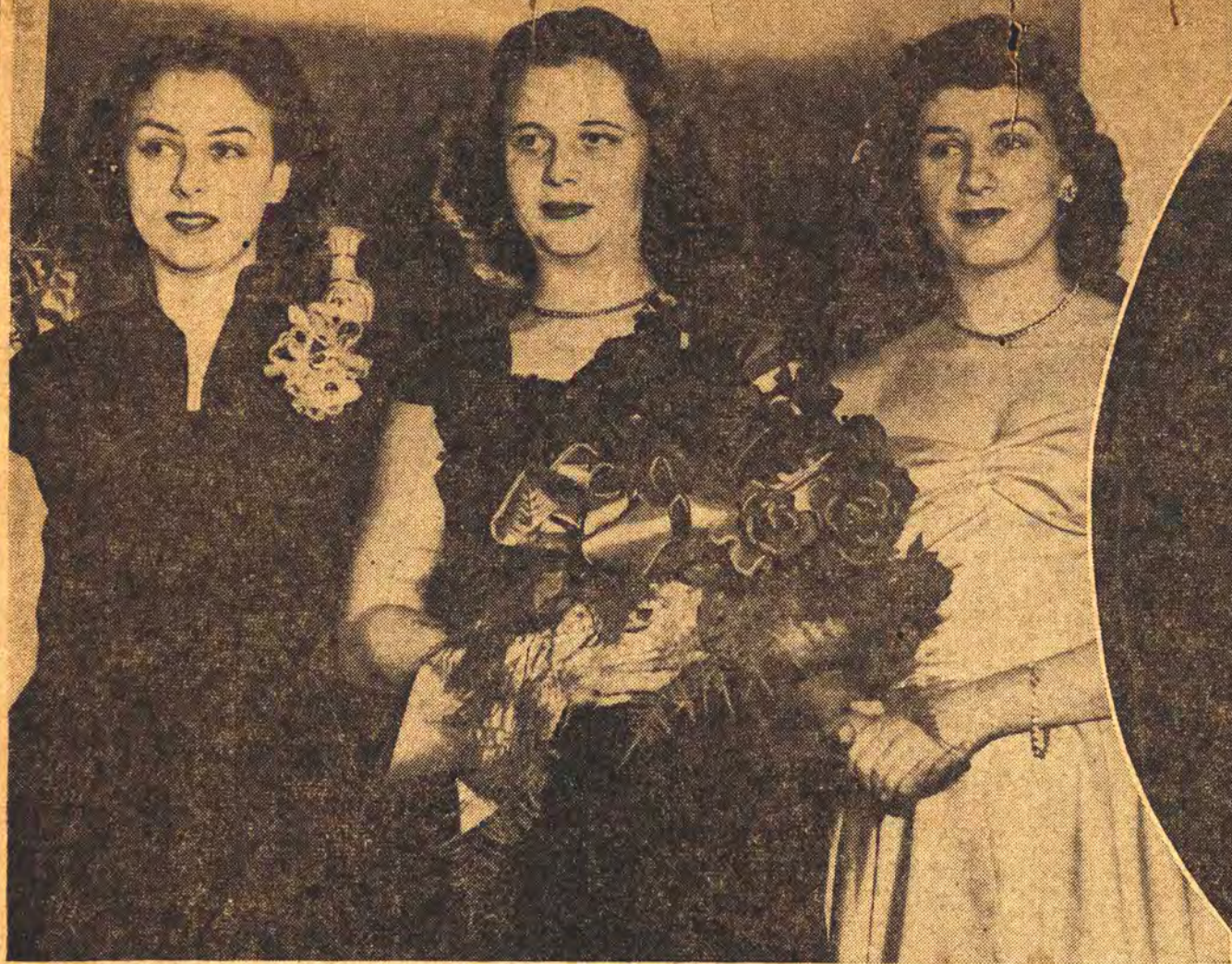

## Heights Amid Maze of Blasting, Digging East-West Highway Under Construction; Stone Urges Following of Safety Code

By Judy Whitson

Chugging bulldozers are plowing the earth in front of Arlington Heights High School for what in the future will be one of Texas' busiest highways.

For the east-west expressway, designed to expedite city traffic in four directions, has come out of the talked-about stage, and is now a blasting reality.

Connecting U. S. Highways 377 and 81 with U. S. 80, the four-lane "super road," when completed, will bustle with 35 per cent more traffic than the Dallas Pike, most traveled highway in the state today.

The strip from Camp Bowie, or Highway 80, to Summit, will call for seven overpasses, one underpass, three traffic interchanges, and one pedestrian overpass. It will be constructed at an estimated cost of \$2,400,000. A similar north-south route is being built, and the two intersect at Lancaster and Boaz streets.

An overpass more than four blocks long will serve AHHS and South Hi-Mount Elementary school-goers. From Kenley to Hulen, the highway will be depressed in order for the pass to remain on street level.

Heavy-jowled steam-shovelers are hewing a titanic rock barrier, more than 24 feet deep. Over 4,000 tons of shale and dirt are lifted from one huge pit each day by puffing Diesel operated trucks. Thundering dynamite blasts which crumble the stubborn rock are frequent.


In presenting safety rules for Heights' students to follow, Principal Roy M. Stone warned that everyone must understand the extreme danger of disregarding these regulations.

Because heavy tractors and other equipment will be working on the highway for some time, West Rosedale will be closed, according to Bob Buckman, city traffic engineer. Automobiles may park in the lot east of the building; on Ashland, south of the parking lot; and Locke, to the east. Motor scooters and bicycles must be placed in the drill field.

Those who drive to school and live north of Rosedale, will cross Rosedale at Tremont, Thomas Place, or Clover Lane, and proceed to school via Locke.

Students, living north of Rosedale, who walk may use the walkway leading from Western to the school grounds. The pass lies directly in front of the school, and stretches across the highway "cut."

Buses and cars must load and unload on Ashland; therefore the area north of the parking lot will be restricted.

# Oil Man, 2 Teachers Die In Ft. Worth-Bound Plane

A trip to the Arlington Heights-San Angelo High School football game Friday night had a tragic ending for three persons Saturday when the plane in which they were returning crashed and burned 30 miles southeast of Abilene, killing all three.

Killed in the crash were:

Don Wood, 46, 3500 Lenox, oil company owner.

Miss Mary Virginia Harmon, 23, Arlington Heights physical education teacher. Her home was in Dallas.

Mrs. Jo Evelyn Clarkson, 24, also an Arlington Heights physical education teacher, from Texarkana.

The monoplane, its motor missing, crashed in an open field three miles south of Goldsboro in northwest Coleman County. A heavy rainstorm was in progress at the time of the crash, about 11:30 a. m., according to Haskell Clevinger, farmer, who saw the plane circle several times as though attempting to land. "The plane burst into flames as soon as it hit the ground," Clevinger said.

The bodies were not removed from the wreckage until late Saturday afternoon. They were taken to Coleman funeral homes.

Mrs. Happy Shelton Wood, former county clerk and wife of

Don Wood, had seen the plane overhead as she drove through Coleman en route home with several high school girls. "Everything seemed all right then," Mrs. Wood related Saturday night.

Students at Arlington Heights High School were hushed and sorrowful Monday as funeral arrangements were completed for two of their teachers who died Saturday in an airplane crash 30 miles southeast of Abilene that also killed a Fort Worth oil man.

Miss Mary Virginia Harmon, 23, and Mrs. Jo Evelyn Clarkson, 24, both of 4333 Curzon, were killed in the crash with Don Wood, 46, of 3500 Lenox, oil company executive. The trio were returning from the Arlington Heights-San Angelo football game at San Angelo.

Services for Wood, father of Jackie Wood, Arlington Heights senior, will be held at 2 p. m. Tuesday in Ray Crowder Chapel, with burial in Greenwood Cemetery.

Burial for Miss Harmon was to take place in Restland Cemetery at Dallas after services at 2 p. m. Monday at Ray Crowder Chapel.

Services were to be held at the same time for Mrs. Clarkson at the Hardy Memorial Church in Texarkana.

The flag at the school flew at half-staff Monday.

Mmes. Margaret Harrington and Alice Holtzslaw, substitute physical education teachers, were designated to take the places temporarily of Mrs. Clarkson and Miss Harmon.

Principal Roy Stone spoke of the tragedy Monday morning to the students in their classes. A memorial service was held at noon Monday over the school's public address system. Bible Instructor Rev. B. N. Wolff read services. Dedicatory poems by students Judy Ball and Kathryn Mortensen were read.

Taps was sounded as school was dismissed early in respect to the two teachers.

Home rooms poured money for

flowers into the principal's office all morning, and one student, Donna Harrison, expressed a wish for purchase of a plaque commemorating the teachers.

Miss Gussie Burnett, school journalism teacher, said next week's Jacket Journal will have a special page dedicated to the two. Both were active in school affairs.

Football Co-Capt. Bill Georges summed up the team's attitude when he said:

"We're not forgetting that they had traveled to see us play when they were killed."

Before the Jackets scored, for instance, the invaders connected three quick passes that found Orange and Black operating on the 6 yard line—The Heightsters swarmed to the occasion, and held fast for four downs—never to be in trouble again.

The roof fell in on the El Paso crew just a moment after they muffed their own opportunity at scoring.

**PLAYING** safety, Garcia booted to Snow deep in his own territory—near the Jacket 8. Snow sacked in the catch, and proceeded to pick his way 89 yards just inside the east sideline a la Doak Walker all the way to the three when Art Medrano overhauled him from the rear.

Not to be discouraged, Snow bulldozed his way over on first try for the tally.

Snow's second run, although 16 yards shorter, was just as helpful to the cause. On the second play after the half, he went smack through the center from his own 28, emerged in the open, and raced 72 yards for his second touchdown.

**ONE OF THE** evening's prettiest plays was a pass completion, Gene Doss to End Bob Thomas late in the second period. Thomas made a beautiful catch; hurdled a Tiger defender in track season form, and outdistanced defenders for a 42-yard tally.

Pat Egan, husky fullback, didn't have a bad evening himself, scoring the other two touchdowns on drives through the line.

The Heights' pass defense, causing some worry the first half, seemed to be the only weak spot at all. The Tigers were stymied against the line nearly altogether.

# Impressive Jackets Rumble Past El Paso Eleven, 31-2

With four of its seven returning lettermen sharing offensive honors, Arlington Heights made an impressive season's debut Friday night at Farrington Field by rumbling past El Paso, 31-2, before 5,737 onlookers.

The Jacket offensive leaders were Backs Pat Egan and Bob Snow, each of who scored twice; End Bob Thomas, who tallied once and kicked the only successful conversion, and Quarterback Gene Doss, whose needle-sharp aerial allowed Thomas to score.

The Jackets' initial 1948 conquest was an awesome thing, one which turned back the El Pasoans for the second time in as many years.

The plucky Tigers, however, were pesky, especially in the opening period. The first quarter was more than 10 minutes old before the Jackets scored.

It was then that Halfback Armando Garcia, El Paso's finest all-around performer, punted to Snow on the Arlington Heights eight-yard line.

The fleet Jacket letterman raced quickly to the east sideline, gathered a cordon of defenders on his left flank, and sped to the El Paso three before being pushed out of bounds. On the next play, he slanted off right tackle and scored.

Midway in the second quarter, the Jackets unnecessarily gave the Tigers their only points.

The safety occurred when Snow took Garcia's punt on his own one-yard line and was downed while seeking running room in the end zone.

The Jackets soon moved out of danger, however, when Guard Bill Bourland, another letterman, intercepted Garcia's pass on the Arlington Heights 31 and sprinted to the visitors' 14. Egan picked up nine at left tackle, Snow got another two at right tackle, then Egan hit tackle at the three and plunged across.

An El Paso offside gave Thomas two tries at the conversion. His second attempt was good, making it 13-6 Arlington Heights.

Three plays short of intermission with the Jackets on their own 42, Doss passed one just over the line to Thomas and the big veteran end ran 58 yards to pay dirt. He missed goal, however, and it remained 19-2 at the half.

After Egan opened the third quarter with a six-yard plunge to his own 28, Snow burst through right tackle, outsped the entire Tiger secondary and ambled 72 yards untouched. Egan missed this conversion and it was Arlington Heights 25, El Paso 2.

The Jackets wound up their scoring one minute and 20 seconds deep in the final stanza, with Egan climaxing a 70-yard drive by exploding off left tackle from the nine.

# Jackets Picked to Win Second City Grid Title

Arlington Heights High School should win its second consecutive city football championship this year and make a stout showing in the four-city scramble for the first City Conference title.

The Yellow Jackets have an able coaching staff in Head Man Truett Owen and his assistants, N. J. Hogan, Homer Pegram and Nick Ruggieri. They have an adequate quantity of the finest talent in town. After more than 20 years without a grid title, the Jackets are in no mood to relinquish the crown won last season.

Arlington Heights' student body and booster club, after years of faithfully backing a loser, have learned to love a winning team just as well.

Against the Jackets is the fact that they are the defending champions. Every game they play in the conference chase will be against an opponent who has been pointing for that contest.

The Jackets have only eight boys returning from last year's A squad, and only 15 or 20 youngsters up from last year's B team. On paper, that doesn't add up to a championship team.

But on the field it's a different story—and that's where the games are played.

## Only Three Lettermen.

There are three lettermen returning to Arlington Heights' backfield. Gene Doss, 153, Robert Snow, 156, and Pat Egan, rugged 175 pounder. Doss is a hard-blocking, cool young veteran who will add steadiness to the attack.

Snow, a triple-threatener, is one of the most promising backs in the city. He's a fine passer, dangerous runner and a good punter.

Egan is a power runner with sufficient speed to be classed as dangerous once he has crashed through the line of scrimmage.

The fourth backfield position will be filled by Robert Carson. Carson will be remembered for a 9.7 100-yard dash he ran last spring in track. Up from the B team, the 15-year-old Carson lacks the poise, savvy and fast start required of a scat back, but once he picks up speed there isn't a lad in town that can catch him.

Charles Sitton is another excellent backfield prospect and his brother, Billy, is a youngster of no mean ability. Other backs that probably will play a lot are Teddy Keller and Ernest Newman.

**Bill Georges Back.**  
In the line Owen has three returning lettermen and two squadmen. Bill Georges, 183-pound all-state performer, will be at one tackle slot and Squadman Marlin Ribble, 175, probably will man the other post. They'll be backed up by Robert Darney, 175 and Richard Duke, 170. The guard positions will be well manned by Letterman Bill Bourland, 150, and Gene Mays, 155, or Joe Baldrige, 150. Another leading candidate for the job is Phil Hart, 155.

Ollie Summerall, 150, and a squadman, is the leading contender at center. David Mays, 165, and Kenneth Meier, 165, both up from last year's B team, will play quite a lot.

At one end position Owen will have Bob Thomas, a 185-pound letterman of all-state caliber. Tommy May, 155, Weldon Kirby, 140, and Jeremiah Collier, 160, are scrapping for the other terminal.

Man-to-man, this year's club will be heavier and faster than the 1947 team.

The Jackets' schedule is a natural. They don't open their season until Sept. 17, and then it's against El Paso High at Farrington Field.

The following week-end they go to Dallas for a game with Sunset. Oct. 2 the Jackets draw another weak sister, Houston Jeff Davis, at Farrington Field.

But on Oct. 8, at San Angelo, Arlington Heights will receive a real test. The Jackets should enter

that game undefeated. How they come out will cast a lot of light on the chances of Paschal, Poly and North Side in the Fort Worth title race.

Co-Captain Gene Doss is set at quarterback, and triple-threat Robert Snow at left half. Pat Egan and Bill Sitton are vying for the full-back slot, and Robert Carson and Chuck Sitton compete for the right half position.

Although it is hard to compare the Blue and Gold with other teams in the city at this date, most opposition should come from Poly, district co-favorite, Paschal, and dark-horse North Side.

Poly will have big Alvin Langford back at tackle, Ed Thomas at center, plus a speedy backfield and a good passing attack.

The Panthers will once again field a fine passer in Kenneth Cochran, and the team is boosted by the graduates of one of the city's better "B" squads.

North Side will depend almost entirely on '47's B's, with the exception of Darrow Hooper and Charles Davis, two giant linemen turned into dependable backs.

Tech and Carter will once again be the weaker members of the conference, although the Bulldogs might surprise everyone.

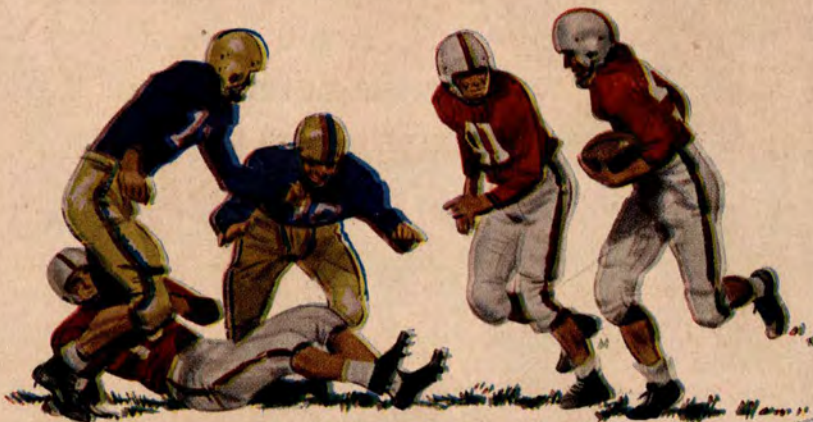

# Chipped Ankle Sidelines Snow for Next Six Weeks

Placing of a cast on Left Halfback Robert Snow's chipped ankle Sunday robbed Arlington Heights, the state's leading City Conference football team, of 55 per cent of its offense for at least six weeks.

The 160-pounder, who was a strong candidate for all-state honors, was injured on the sixth play of the game Friday night at San Angelo as he raced 19 yards for Arlington Heights' first touchdown and his 55th point in four games.

Doctors Informed Coach Truett Owen that Snow will not be able to remove the cast for at least four weeks.

Unless the Jackets win the city championship and qualify for the state's first City Conference playoff in December, Snow may not see action again this year.

When he hobbled off the field Friday night after picking up 41

yards on his only two carries, the Jacket firebrand had perhaps the best individual record in state schoolboy grid circles.

In just three games, plus his brief stint at San Angelo, Snow had gained 353 yards on 37 carries, completed six of 13 passes for 119 yards, returned 10 punts for 241 yards and kicked nine times for a 35.77 average.

Bill Sitton, a 177-pounder, has been named by Owen to plug the gap.

Fort Worth Arlington Heights' 20-0 victory over San Angelo Friday night boosted Coach Truett Owen's Yellow Jackets to the top of the City Conference heap and Port Arthur retains its position as the No. 1 team in Class AA in the Star-Telegram's ratings this week.

Mighty Baytown jumped from fourth to third by virtue of its 48-0 victory over Houston Jeff Davis and Waco, by thumping Highland Park, 27-7, moved from fifth to fourth.

Henderson leaped from 17th to sixth, which probably is too high a ranking, after defeating Bryan, 26-0.

Stephenville jumped from 10th to seventh, Denison from 16th to ninth after its 19-12 victory over Bonham in an important District 5-AA game, and El Paso Austin from nowhere to 10th. The El Paso club proved its strength with a 26-6 triumph over tough Borger.

Climaxing an uphill battle that had 7,137 fans in a frenzy, Arlington Heights earned a surprising 20-20 tie with Odessa Friday night at Farrington Field by storming 42 yards for a touchdown with just 49 seconds remaining.

Quarterback Ernest Neuman of the Jackets capped the drive by racing wide around right end from the one-yard line and lancing across just inside the red flag in the northeast corner of the field.

Fullback Bill Sitton, whose second of two previous successful conversions had put Arlington Heights ahead, 14-13, late in the third quarter, missed the placement on which the game hinged.

Arlington Heights, the defending State City Conference champion, spotted the Broncs a 13-0 advantage in the first 18 minutes and 42 seconds of play, narrowed the gap to 13-7 with a 63-yard drive deep in the second period, forged ahead, 14-13, after a pass interception and 20-yard surge late in the third period, then fell behind again, 20-13, as Odessa marched 43 yards for its last touchdown early in the fourth quarter.

It was a brilliant offensive duel by two of the state's most rapidly improving schoolboy elevens.

The Jackets of Coach Truett Owen showed little of the erratic play that characterized their 12-27 loss to Abilene a week ago. Behind crisp blocking, their backs outgained the Broncs, 234-165. They also completed half of the eight passes they needed to spread the Odessa defenders.

But for lapses that enabled Odessa to score twice on passes, Arlington Heights showed signs of developing into another state title contender.

Odessa fumbled away its first scoring chance on the Arlington Heights five-yard line early in the first period but Sitton's kick into a brisk north breeze sailed out of bounds on the 30 and from there the Broncs tallied in two plays.

Howard Dye, Odessa's fine fullback, lost three yards, then Halfback Mac Tyler tossed a quick pass over the middle to End Paul Erwin, who was wide open. Erwin crossed the goal line standing up.

### Placement Wide.

Bobby Jackson's placement went awry and it was 6-0 Odessa after five minutes and four seconds of play.

Early in the second quarter the Broncs marched 71 yards for their second touchdown. The surge required nine plays, the last of which was a pitchout from Quarterback Charles Clover to Jackson, who streaked around left end and went the distance, 24 yards. Dawton Hughes kicked goal, making it 13-0.

Infuriated, the Jackets took the ensuing kickoff and struck 62 yards for a score in seven plays. Halfback Robert Carson gained 21 at left end, Neuman picked up 15 at right end and five more at left tackle. Sitton gained four at the middle. Neuman added three, then Sitton catapulted over from the one.

He then added the extra point. That made it 13-7 a minute and a half before the intermission.

Neuman put the Jackets in position to go ahead for the first time by intercepting Tyler's pass at midfield and returning to the Odessa 20 late in the third quarter. It was a dazzling run.

### Carson Races Across.

Three plays gained only five yards but here Neuman hit End Kenneth Harlow for a first down the seven.

On a double handoff, Carson raced wide around left end and crossed the goal line standing up, hermetically sealed away from prying hands.

Sitton converted, putting the Jackets in front, 14-13, with three minutes and 30 seconds of the quarter remaining.

Neuman intercepted another pass on his own seven-yard line to thwart an Odessa threat early in the final period but Sitton, again facing the wind, kicked dead to the Arlington Heights 29 and the Broncs headed goalward after a 15-yard penalty for clipping.

They covered the distance, 43 yards, in five plays. The payoff was a pass from Clover to Erwin, who worked his way behind Neuman. Erwin ran to the three before Neuman hauled him down. Three plays later, from the two, Dye took a pitchout and skirted right end for the touchdown.

Hughes kicked goal, making it Odessa 20, Arlington Heights 14, eight minutes and 10 seconds before the end.

After the kickoff the teams exchanged punts. Clover of the Broncs kicked to Neuman on the Arlington Heights 32 and the 154-pound senior letterman raced back to the Odessa 42 behind superb blocking.

In the four minutes that remained the Jackets drove for the tying touchdown in 12 plays. Carson failed to gain, Sitton passed to Carson for seven. Neuman plunged for two, Sitton blasted for six and a first down.

Carson gained 13 around left end on a later from Sitton. Neuman lost two, Neuman passed incomplete, then Carson skirted end for 12 yards before being knocked out of bounds on the Odessa three.

Sitton clawed at the middle for one yard and a first down. He got nothing on the next lunge but on the second Odessa was penalized to the one for unnecessary roughness. Here Neuman fled around right end and went over.

That the wind played a major role is evidenced by the fact that both teams scored twice with it in their favor.

Though it would be comparable to hitting the daily double at Hialeah, there's a hunch going round and about that Fort Worth may be the winner in both the Paschal-Highland Park and Arlington Heights-Odessa high school football games Thursday and Friday nights at Farrington Field.

Fort Worth's representatives will be the underdogs in both games but there are present some rare circumstances which could easily throw the form charts for a loss.

There is every indication that Paschal, potentially the state's finest City Conference eleven, will bounce back this week from its 6-27 setback at the hands of a strong Breckenridge club.

Paschal's line, which seems more than adequate, was further strengthened Monday by the transfer of Jimmy Patts, a powerful newcomer, from tackle to right guard behind Emmit Tay-

lor. Patts has performed exceptionally well and could wind up with a starting job.

Highland Park operates from double wingback and spread formations and can be depended upon to fill the air with passes here Thursday night.

Paschal will be out to avenge a 7-6 setback at the hands of the Scotties a year ago. A crowd of approximately 10,000 is expected.

IN SPITE of its 12-27 loss to Abilene last week, Arlington Heights has an excellent chance of tripping Joe Coleman's Odessans.

The Jackets started to work Monday mapping defensive plans for Friday night's game and Coach Truett Owen, who is a peerless tactician, undoubtedly has come up with the right maneuvers. If Arlington Heights improves in its execution of assignments, Odessa is in for an interesting 48 minutes of football.

Owen also is concentrating on the development of an effective aerial arm to augment the Jackets' competent running game. Bill Sitton, Van Williams and Charles Spencer probably will pass often against the Broncs.

This encounter is expected to attract between 10,000 and 15,000 fans.

Why sure, she pips, why didn't ya say so. Breck won 27-6.

### Only Good News

Guests on the 15th floor jerked in their sleep. Rapturous, deafening screams of glee rocked the lobby, puncturing old ear drums right and left.

That phone call set off the biggest celebration since VJ Day.

It was a good thing. Because that and that alone was the only good news to Arlington Heights High here last night.

Consolation that their cross-town rivals were in the same sinking—or was it stinking—boat was all that kept a score or two of supporters from throwing themselves off the roof.

Abilene beat Arlington Heights 27-12. That was the long and short of it.

There wasn't a whole lot you could say about what happened to the Jackets. What might pop into your mind wouldn't look good in print.

### Abilene High

Abilene, still sore about being tied by Breckenridge in its opener, was ready and willing and toyed with its prey as if they were their own scrubs. Apparently unawed that they were in combat with the defending City Conference champions, the Eagles soared to a 20-point lead the first half and hung on to give the Heights its first defeat since early 1948 season.

ABILENE, Sept. 16 (Spl).—Abilene's high school Eagles turned on the steam from the start and humbled the Big City Conference champions from Fort Worth, Arlington Heights' Yellow Jackets, 27-12, before 4,700 fans here Friday night.

Scoring in every period except the third, the Eagles looked more like "dope" has indicated than at any time in two years. Sparked by Bill Galusha, Hub Ingraham and Prentice Martin, they moved almost at will for the entire first half, while the heavy Eagle line held the Jackets to a minimum gain.

Ingraham broke the scoring ice with a 67-yard journey for a touchdown midway in the first period. The Eagles made two more in the second after backing the Jackets up to their goal line. A punt by Bill Sitton out to the 33 was returned five yards, and five plays later Abilene had a touchdown.

Sitton and Ernest Newman were sparkplugs for the Jackets, who rallied sharply in the fourth to put over two touchdowns. Newman took a punt late in the game and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown, after Sitton had scored the first one to climax a 64-yard drive.

### Abilene Scores Early.

Center David Mays and Tackle Robert Darney were effective in the Jacket defense, and Phil Hart, guard, came in for his share of tackles in the second half.

Abilene moved to a 20-0 advantage in the first half, scoring halfway in the first period when Hub Ingram tore through right tackle, got in the open and raced 66 yards for touchdown. Bill Galusha kicked the extra point.

A fumble recovery on the Fort Worth 21-yard line gave Abilene its start for a second touchdown early in the second period. Ingraham ultimately going over from the two-yard line for touchdown.
