## Clews Sought in Four Burglaries

CORSICANA, Aug. 26.—Officers today were seeking clews to the identity of burglars who last night entered four Corsicana business establishments and escaped with approximately \$2,500 in cash.

The burglars, believed to be professionals, obtained \$500 from a Montgomery Ward Company, \$250 from the office of the Texas National Insurance Union, \$1,499 from the Palace Theater and \$200 from the Gateway Filling Station.

Little trouble was encountered in procuring the loot from the medicine store and the filling station; the other establishments were used after the knobs had been knocked from the safes. The loot taken from the Montgomery Ward store was found in a cash drawer while that stolen from the filling station was found behind a clock; the operator hid it.

## UNDERPASS APPROACH TO BE REDUCED

### Charges Suggested In Main Grade Separation Pass; Engineer for T. & P. Says.

Bids for the construction of an underpass at Tennessee Avenue beneath the Texas & Pacific Railway will be asked in about 10 days or two weeks. This was announced by E. F. Mitchell, chief engineer of the railway, over the telephone from Dallas yesterday after a conference with city officials of Fort Worth.

Changes suggested in plans for both the Tennessee Avenue grade separation and the underpass to be built at Main Street by L. W. Hoelscher, engineer to the City Plan Commission, were adopted, according to Mitchell.

#### Changes Suggested.

These grade separations are to be built with others at Jennings Avenue, Henderson Street, Daggett Street and Summit Avenue as a part of the \$8,000,000 program of the railway for the extension of passenger and freight facilities and the \$2,000,000 program of the city for street improvements.

The changes suggested by Hoelscher, who attended the conference with Mitchell and City Manager Carr and City Engineer Lewis, will reduce the proposed 7 per cent grade of the south approach to the Tennessee Avenue underpass and the proposed north approach of nearly 6 per cent to 5 1/2 per cent on both sides.

#### Larger Openings Provided

Another change in this grade separation suggested by Hoelscher was adopted, providing for a widening of the approach from 20 feet to 25 feet, where possible.
