under the Mexican flag of 1824.

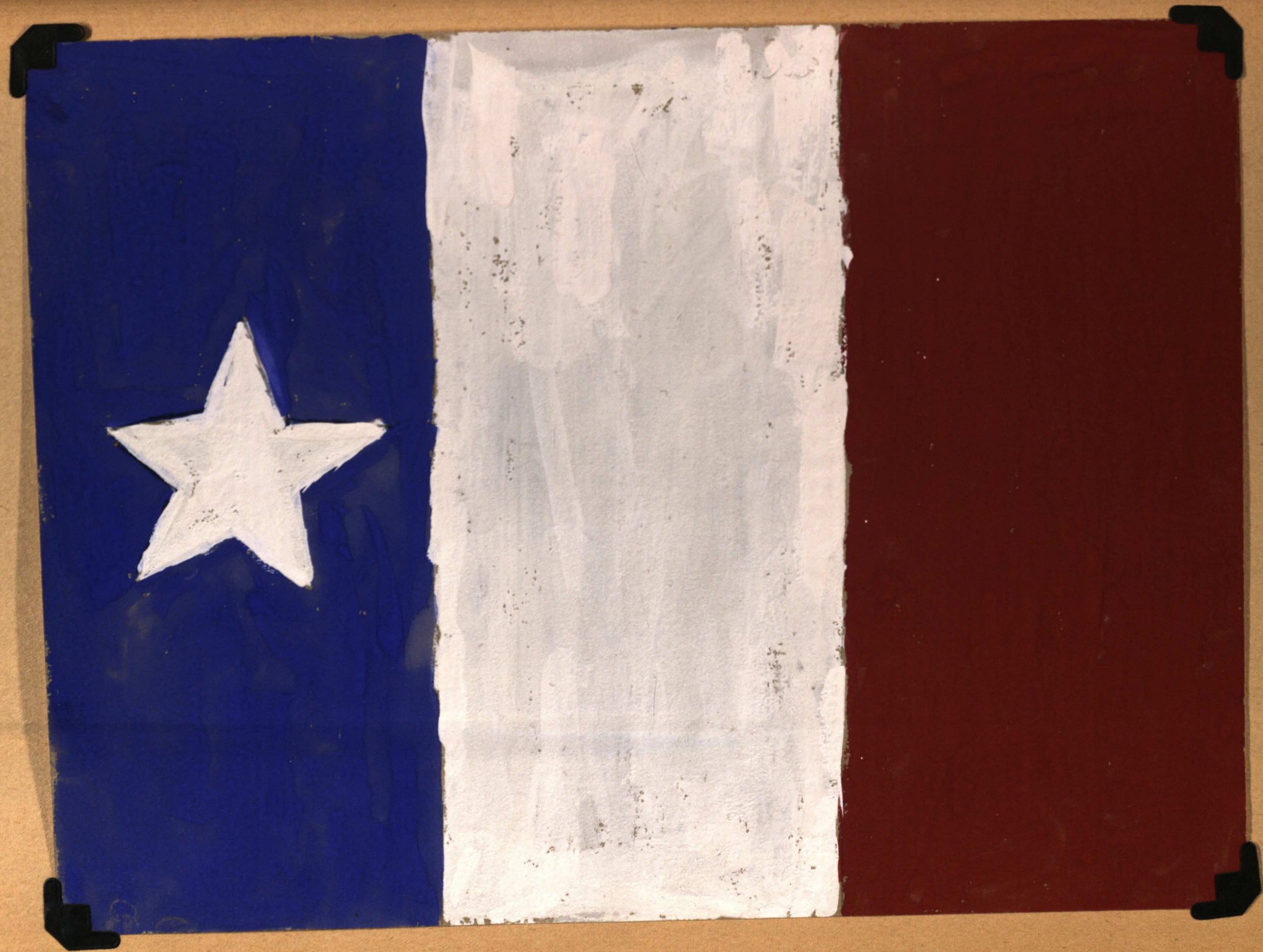

as Brown's flag.)





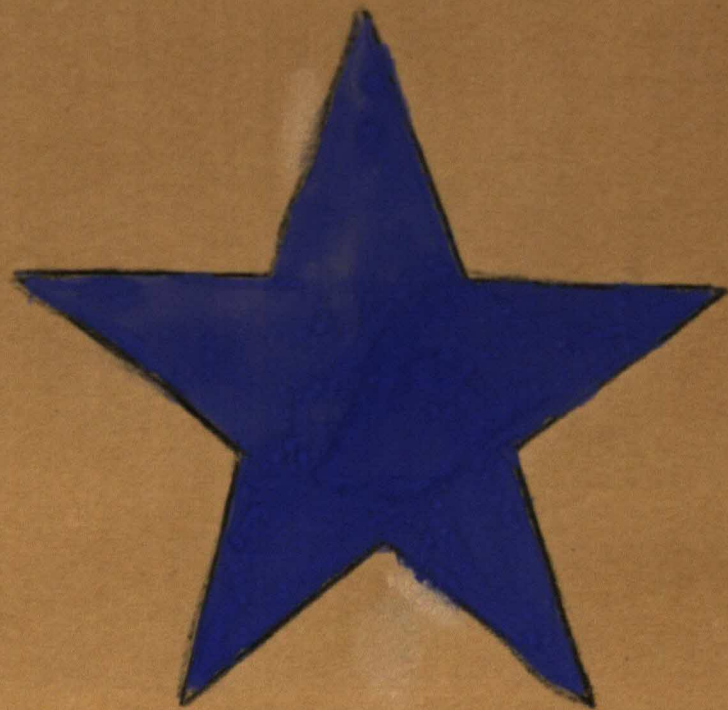

The flag of Ward's Georgia Battalion.



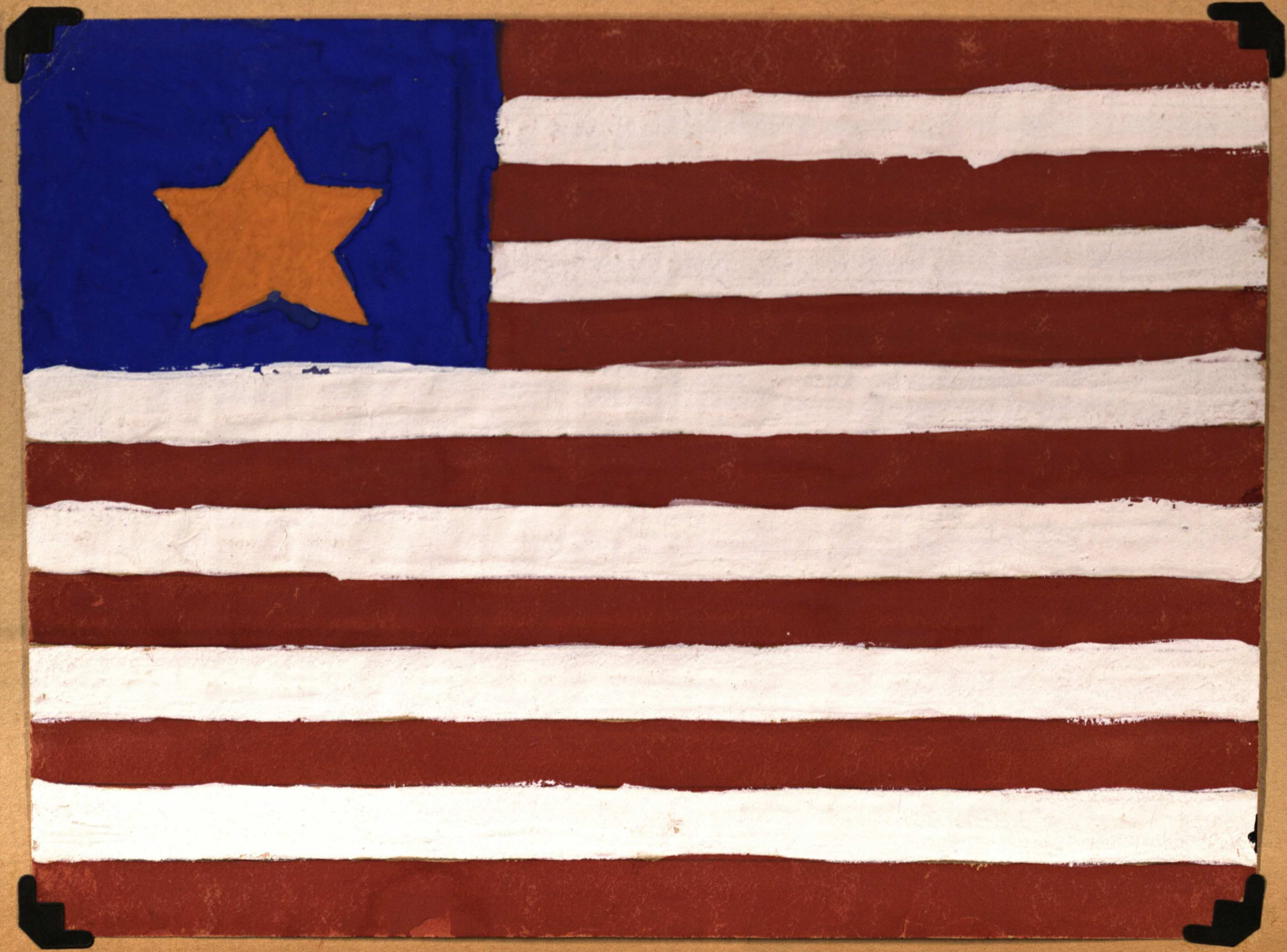
LIBERTY OR DEATH

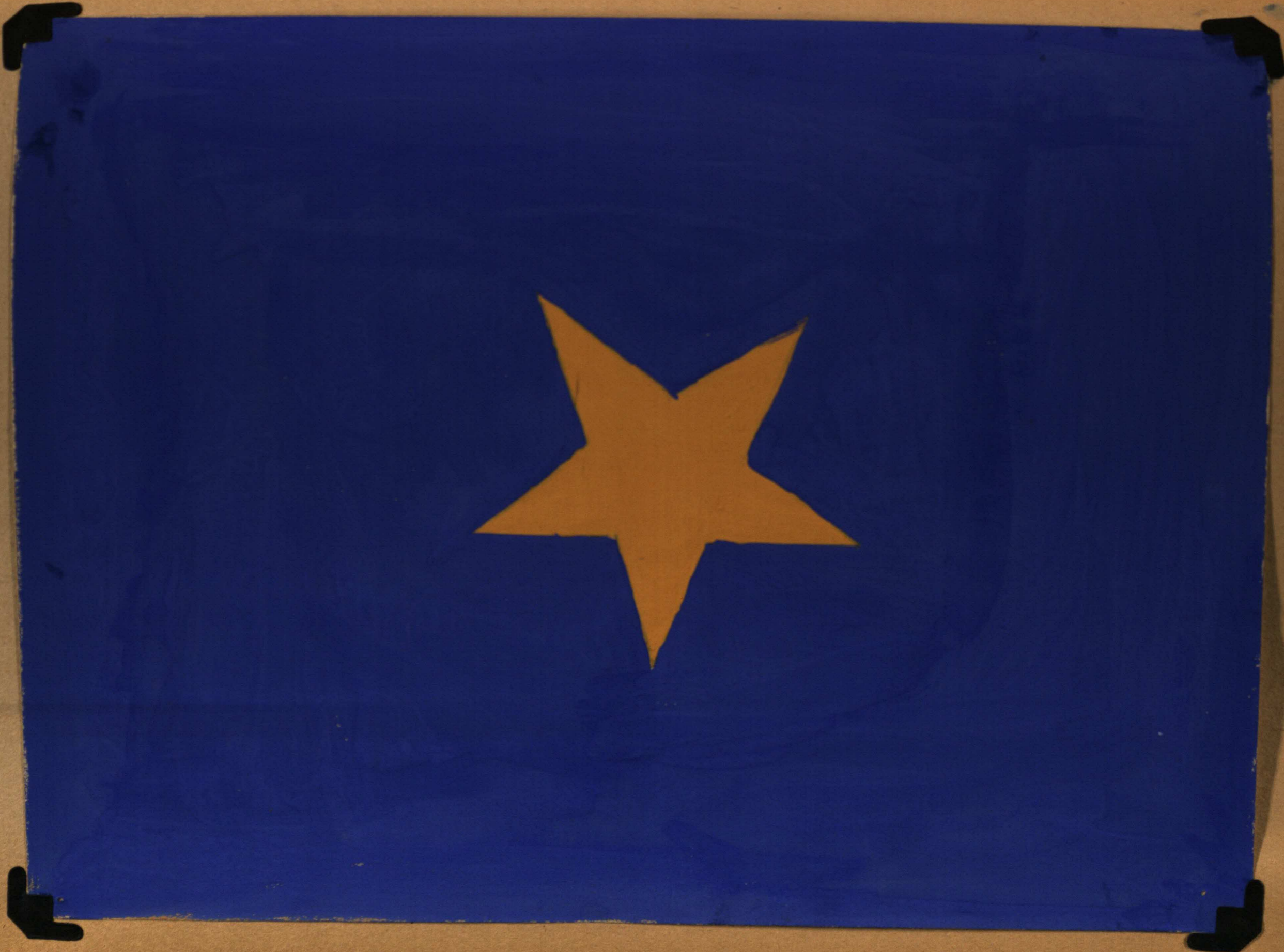

The National Standard flag. \_\_\_ Adopted April 17, 1837.

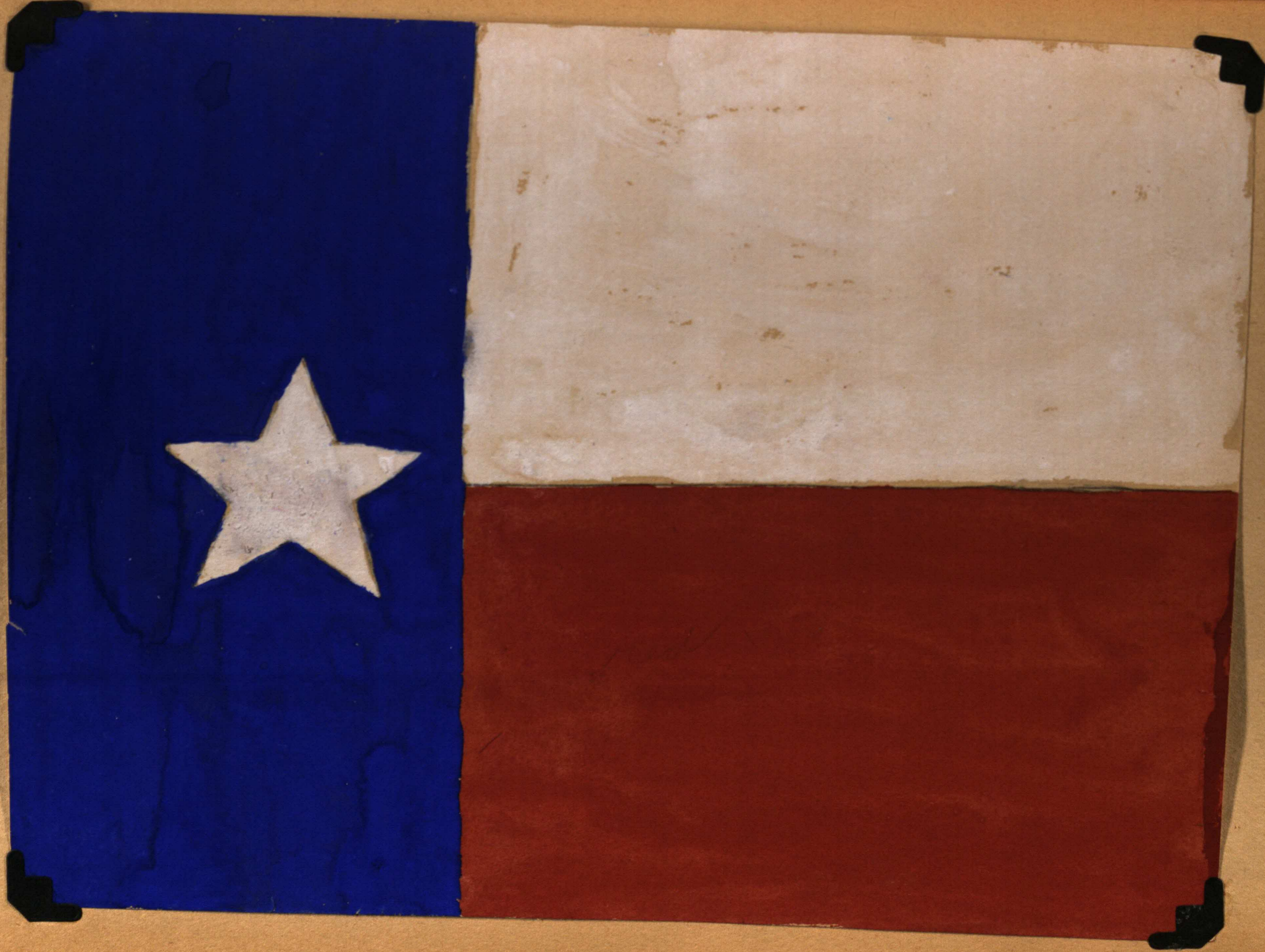






The present state flag of Texas. \_\_\_ Adopted

January 24, 1839.



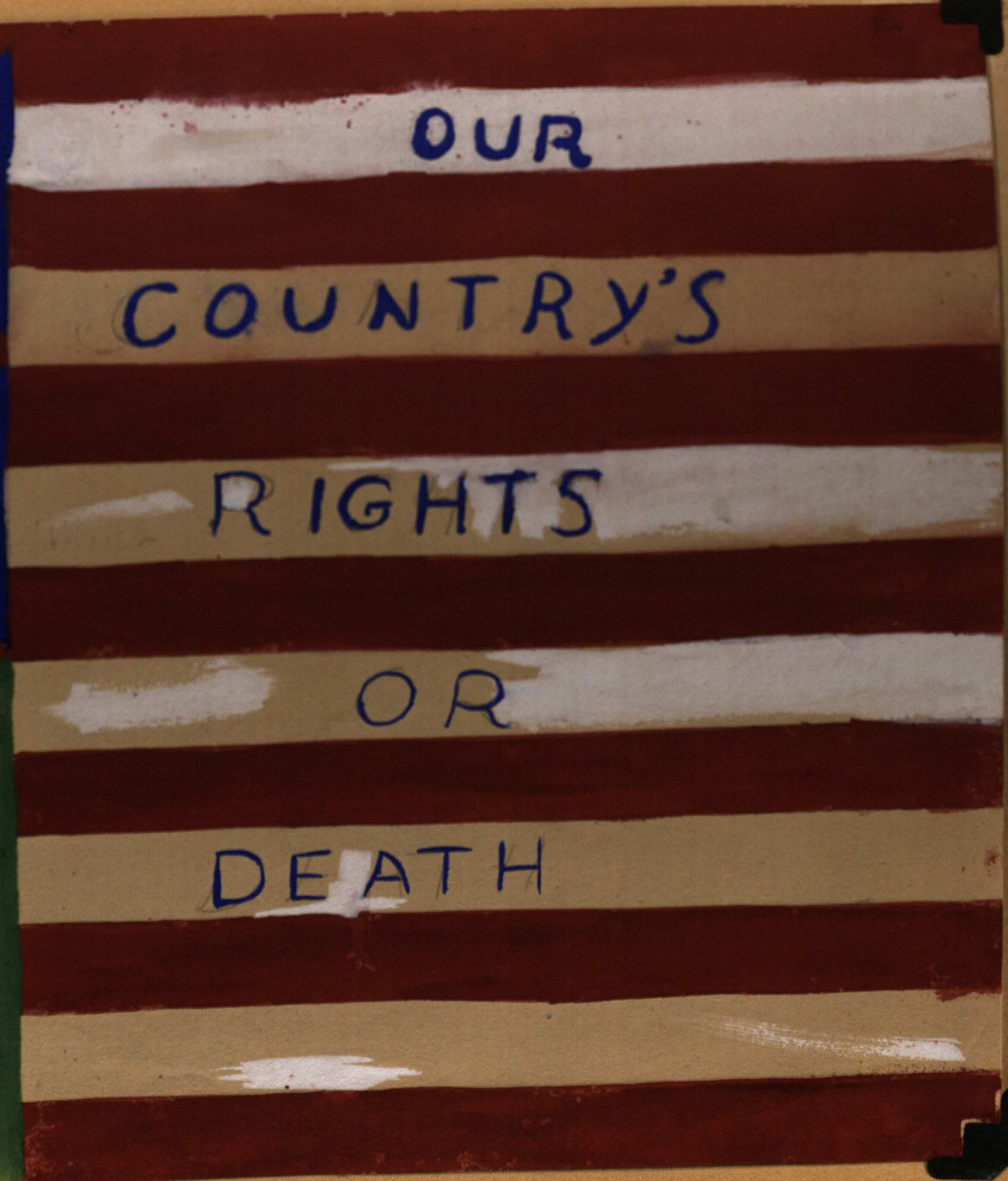
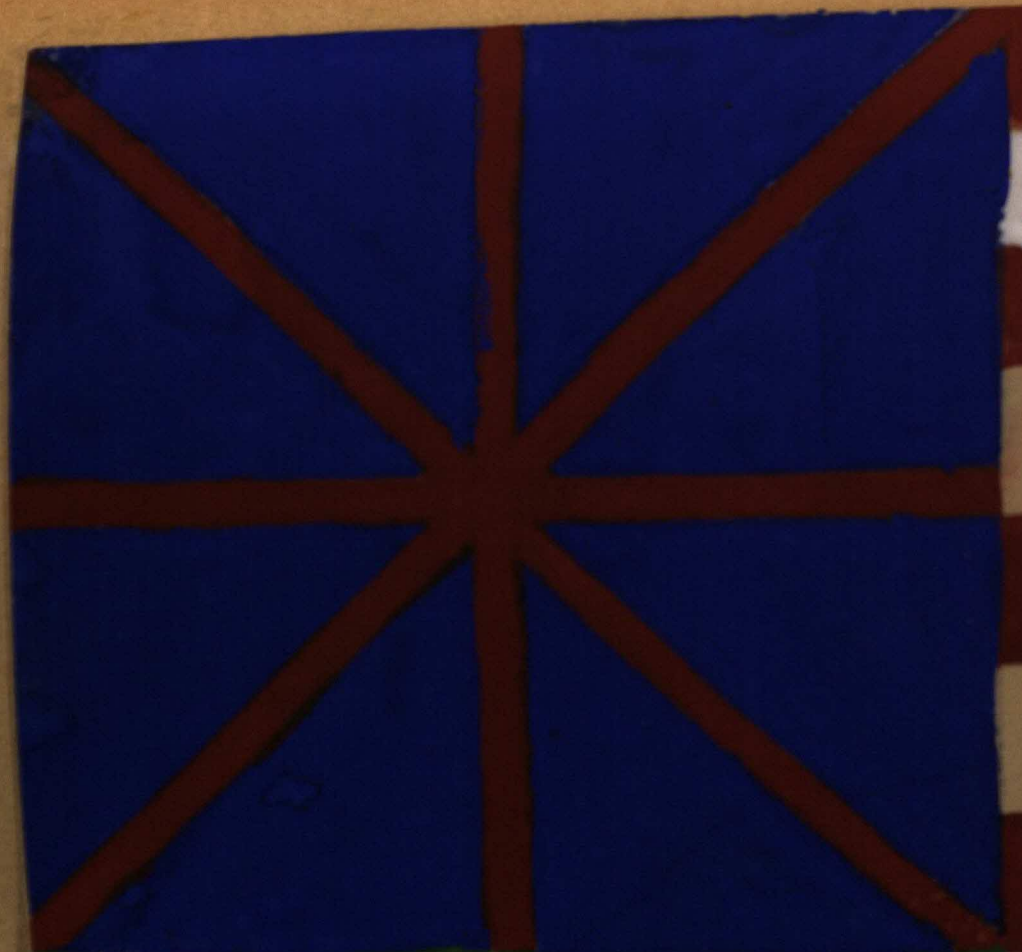

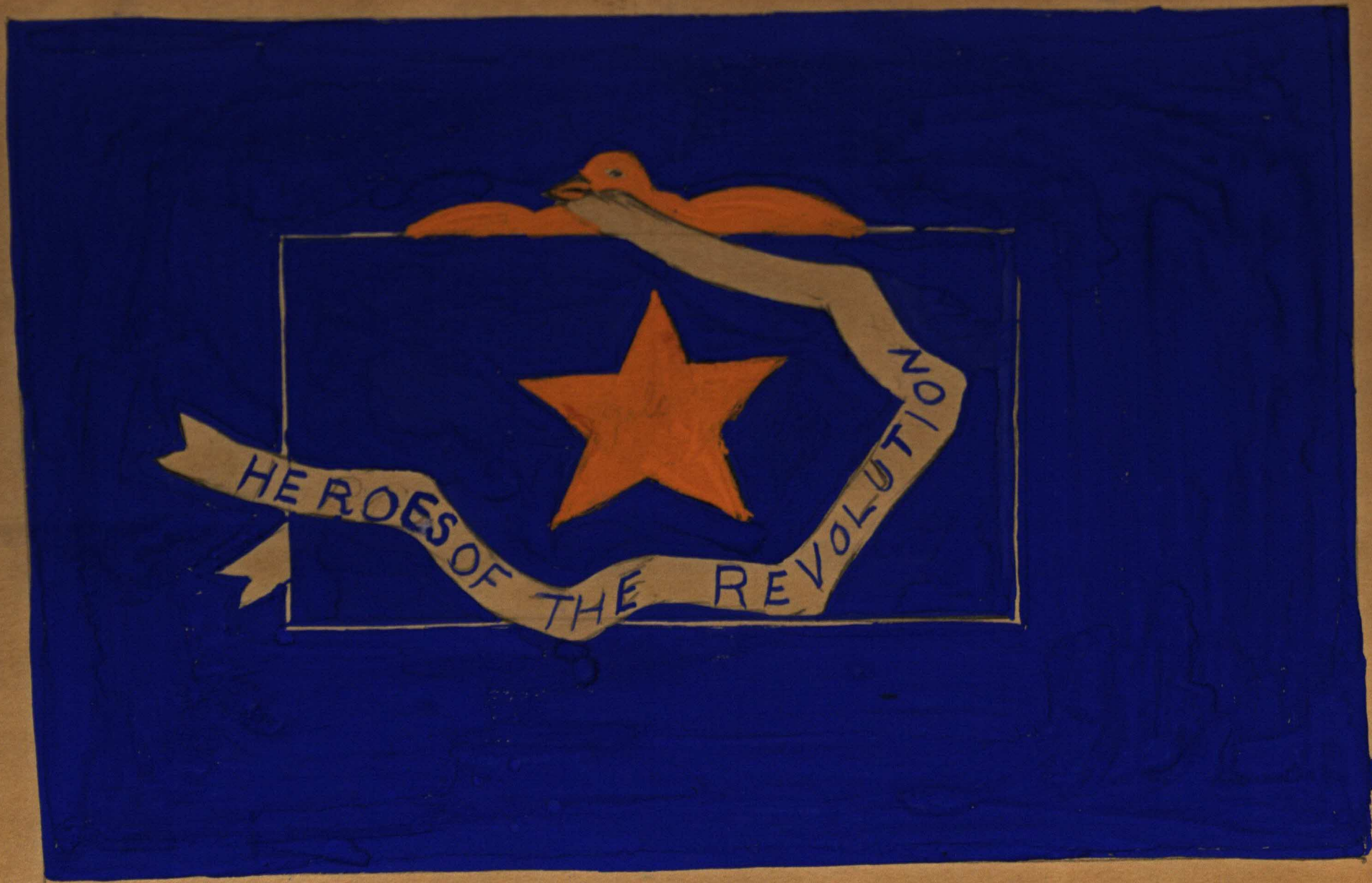
