Rare Vaudeville by Home Talent Benefits Fort Worth Charity

Headliners Show Stage Presence With True Professional Make-Up: Dennis McCarthy, Record Cartoonist, Draws Applause as Well as Pictures; Howard Peak Jr., Charles French and Miss Willard Whitcomb Among Individual Stars

A rare vaudeville entertainment was afforded hundreds of Fort Worth citizens at the Majestic Monday night,

afforded hundreds of Fort Worth citizens at the Majestic Monday night, when a "Vaudeville Festival" under the direction of Miss Grace Franc Ferris, and which in the variety of entertainment offered was a reminder of a good processional bill.

While those who appeared on the programme were amateurs, practically all showed professional skill, as was evinced by the unstinted applause and numerous encores responded to.

Among the headliners was Dennis McCarthy, Record cartoomist, who in a breay chalk-talk, got off some clever jokes and drew crayon pictures that made a hit, especially in his political subjects.

One of the features of the performance was the presentation of "Did You Ever?" an original farce with music, by Howard W. Peak Jr., and company. The farce was with music by Carl Randall and Howard Peak and dancing features by Charles C. French Jr.

The act was well staged and excellently acted by Howard Weak Jr., as Algernon Whiffles; Charles C. Mr. Peak occupied a dual role, that of an English gentleman of means who was a "good angel" for a "show" and in a female impersonation, that made an instantaneous hit. Many a stage star failed to present a better appearance on the stage than did Mr. Peak in his feminine impersonation. The costuming was correct and in face, figure and voice he acted the part ideally.

The "Little Players," as they were called, presenting dancing, impersonations, singing and instrumental music by the "little ones," was exceedingly clever, every number calling forth hearty applause and encores. Some of the latest steps in dancing were done by Sophia and William Wolfson, young children. Miss Willard Whitcomb. in negro impersonations, showed excellent skill and made a decided hit. Master Carroll Faucet, 4 years old, a "cute little fellow," sang several songs and was rewarded by several huge bouquets. Katherine Thatcher, another young miss, showed remarkable talent on the piano, even while blindfolded. As she played "The Star Spangled Banner," a large American flag was low-

ered from the top of the stage, causing a patriotic outburst.

Another headline attraction, a gentine cabaret show, entitled "This Is the Life," showing the interior of a cabaret, with the usual attractions, singing, dancing and clever comedy work, was staged and carried out with vim and dash and correctness as to detail. There was some excellent dancing and singing and many elaborate costumes were displayed.

The solo work by John Ducker, with choruses by the company of twenty-five, proved one of the hits of the evening. The songs were bright, catchy and up-to-the-minute.

A feature of the scene was a series of dances, called an "Evolution of American Ballroom Dancing," beginning with the Virginia reel, an old-fashioned waltz, old-fashioned two step, and embracing the turkey trot, Boston dip. MEXICAN GENERAL DENIES PLAN TO MOVE ON VERA CRUZ

(COTINUED FROM PAGE ONE.)

days and perhaps weeks, but there is a growing feeling of unrest among the residents of a few high officers in the army now stationed at the City of Mexico who are said to have been manifesting signs of unwillingness to con-tinue supporting a man whom they regard as already defeated, and in whose policy they do not fully agree. Stories that General Hu

Huerta Stories strengthening the city against attack continue to arrive and some are that he is fortifying certain positions and erecting wire entaglements. He has withdrawn to the capital more men of his army, taking troops it is said, even from the districts between the capital and Vera Cruz.

General Maas has established headquarters at Cordoba and many of his field pieces, which a year ago he had as far south as Racho del Macho, where

Gen. Rubio Navarette is still located, have been moved north to Cordoba.

More Refugees Arrive.

No more troops, so far as can be ascertained here, have been moved in the direction of the American posi-

The Mexican outposts, while mostly of a detached character, are almost in sight of the American lines, but it is reasonably certain that the total number of Mexican troops within striking distance is less than 3,000 men.

In view of the undefinable fear that developments at the capital may be of a character to endanger Americans there the American consul here has renewed his efforts to get out as soon as possible as many as he can. A train due here today is reported to have a considerable number of Americans aboard.

The postal authorities are consider-ing bringing back to Vera Cruz the big pile of mail which is now being soaked in daily rains at the gap in the railroad. The bags of mail intended for the City of Mexico and other in-terior points, delivered to the Mexicans some days ago, are as yet unmoved and Vera Cruz postal authorities may re-open them and distribute the con tents so far as possible among the Mexicans and the representatives of City of Mexico houses who have come

Three Zombies of Swing

It looks like a combination of cheerleading and jive stepping. It sounds like a group of banshees wailing in the closest possible harmony. It all adds up to the Andrews Sisters, the girl trio which has been swinging solid and sweet for twelve years and is now one of the most successful sister acts in show business.

Last week the singing sisters were set to launch a more serious career: On Oct. 4 they are going out on a concert tour. Setting aside jump and jive—but only temporarily—they will stick to a semi-classical repertoire designed for those not hep to the swing that made the sisters famous.

Luckily, La Verne, Maxene, and Patty Andrews didn't have to start out by selling the public the idea of a girl trio. The first big threesome, the Boswell Sisters (Connie, Martha, and Vet), had already proved that, tastefully grouped around a microphone, three heads could do better than one. Next came the Pickenses (Helen, Jane, and Patti). Eventually both acts broke up when two of each trio married.


Shook the Tutor: Although Maxene is married and the other two sisters are engaged, the Andrewses swear that come matrimony, motherhood, or anything short of sororicide, they'll stick together. They've done so ever since they won their first singing—contest when Patty, the youngest, was 11. That was in their home town, Minneapolis, where their father, a Greek, owned a restaurant—which may account for their fabulous appetites.

When Larry Rich wanted the small Andrewses to go on tour with his band, their Norwegian mother was a little worried about their youth, but \$225 a week was a good persuader. So she shipped them off with a tutor—whom they shook at the first chance. They haven't bothered with education since. Maxene, the middle sister, admits: "We're ignorant, but we never forget what Mom told us. She said what you don't know, you won't miss."

The girls knocked around in vaudeville and with bands for several years and ended up stranded in New York. They ran across a youngster named Lou Levy, who thought them so terrific he lent them \$500 and appointed himself their manager. Levy taught the girls Jewish songs by rote, as only La Verne can read music. They experimented and made up as they went along—which is the way they still work out a new song. For \$40-a-week dates at Hebrew wom-

For \$40-a-week dates at Hebrew women's clubs, the girls sang two numbers, "Joseph! Joseph!" and "Bei Mir Bist Du Schön." In 1937 Levy persuaded Decca to make a trial record of "Bei Mir" in Yiddish, and the front-office boys were sold. An English version was quickly waxed, and 350,000 records of the song netted the girls 2 cents on each dime.

Hot Wax: Since then, the Andrewses have made more than a hundred platters, including such bobby-socks fare as "Well, All Right," "Strip Polka," "Beer Barrel Polka," and "Mister Five by Five." Biggest seller to date is their "Pistol-Packin' Mama," although the newest release—"Is You Is, or Is You Ain't Ma' Baby," made

with Bing Crosby—is expected to top that (in its first ten days, it sold half a million records). Their most popular sweet numbers are "I'll Be With You in Apple-Blossom Time" and "Down in the Valley." Altogether, the Andrews have sold some 30,000,000 Decca records in about seven years.

The girls still spend six months of the year on the road making personal appearances. On Sept. 6 they opened their eleventh date at the Paramount Theater in New York, where they have had more return engagements than any other act. These tours, combined with a movie carreer which keeps them in Hollywood the rest of the year, bring them about \$20,000 a week. To be sure to meet taxes, the sisters have put themselves on an allowance.

The girls are deadly serious about their singing, but they don't kid themselves about their looks. The first time they saw themselves on the screen, the horrified sisters discovered they looked "like three zombies." La Verne, now 27, has fiery red hair, as has Maxene, 25, although they're "natural brunettes"; Patty, 23, is a bright blonde. They like to retell a story about the time someone told Groucho Marx that the Andrews Sisters were traveling on the same train with him, and he cracked: "I thought they made all their trips by broom."

RADIO

Razors to Cauliflowers

Boxing last week turned up as just another radio program. Resigning its status as a radio special event, the sport copped a regular time (Friday, 10 p.m., EWT), a full network (Mutual), and a sport-loving sponsor (Gillette Safety Razor Co.). It was the first time a major network had scheduled a sponsored blow-by-blow program for 52 weeks a year.

By the nature of things, boxing is a setup for radio's Midas touch. To get into the big time, fighters must appear in Madison Square Carden. The tough, shrewd, chain-smoking Mike Jacobs promotes all Garden fights, and thus exercises practically exclusive control over

professional fighting.

It was a simple matter, tnen, for Gillette to cross Jacobs's eager palm with gold and walk off with sole rights to air the fantastically popular bouts. (With the single exception of President Roosevelt's speech the day after Pearl Harbor, the Joe Louis-Billy Conn championship fight June 18, 1941, lured the biggest radio audience in history.) At the mike will be the able sportscasters Don Dunphy and Bill Corum.

The Deal: It was Gillette's president, J. P. Spang Jr., who decided in 1939 that sports broadcasts were the easiest means of influencing the shaving man. As a re-

MUSIC IS FIRST AT MAJESTIC; 'REVUE' SONGS APPEALING

The Majestic bill this week runs largely to music, some of novel character and exceptionally good. There also is a good bit of clever dancing and one or two other acts which provide a fairly good quota of fun.

The most pretentious act is Frederick Bowers' annual song revue. 
AT THE MAJESTIC.

As Engineer Lies Near Death **Audience Encores Picture Show**

While Rube Marquard, the famous New York pitcher, was exhibiting his different curves on the canvas at the Odeon theater yesterday morning about 11 o'clock, just on the other side of the canvas and through an intervening wall in the engine room of the theater, Ed Edmondson, a young stationary engineer, was struck by a piece of the flywheel of a thirty-horsepower gasoline engine and badly, if not fatally wounded.

While the audience encored Marquard's famous curves, little dreaming of the terrible accident so close by, Edmondson lay on the floor of the engine room profusely bleeding and suffering agony.

Dr. V. H. Edmondson, who attended Edmondson at the theater and at the hospital, and Dr. J. J. O'Reilley, who assisted in the operation, said after the operation that there was little chance for Edmondson's recovery, but later they seemed to think that there was hope. According to their statement Edmondson received a compound fracture of the skull and such a deep cut on the forehead that his brain was exposed. His left arm also was fractured and other portions of his body showed bad bruises.

The flywheel that broke was a part of the gasoline engine used to pull the 20-kilowatt, 125-volt dynamo which supplies the Odeon and the Blue Mouse theaters. No one knows what caused the flywheel to go to pieces. Pieces of the wheel, which was six feet in diameter and weighed about 300 pounds, were found scattered all over the engine room. Some of the flying pieces tore great rents in the ceiling while others plowed the plaster off the walls. No very serious damage resulted in the building, however, and the theaters proceeded with their shows. The engine room being apart to the theater buildings proper.

And when he sallied forth on his political career he carried his fiddle—and Jack McGreevy along.

Who is Jack McGreevy?

Just now he's playing a violin for a living on the Majestic circuit and this week is at the local playhouse of the Interstate Amusement Company.

It seems to be impossible to get away from that bubbling store of funny stories that the two performers—Mr. and Mrs. McGreevey—are always telling about their work and about themselves. But it would never do to leave out Mr. McGreevey's prize job in Fort Worth as a restaurant handy man.




