

SS Pon American Good Will One For All. & All For One

LOG OF PAN AMERICAN SS GOOD WILL CRUISE, 1952-1953 Mrs. Luther D. Prescott, Director

Passports were issued in October of 1950 to members of the Pan American Round Table of Fort Worth for its first tour on the Pan American liner SS Good Will. On this cruise of fantasy, members have touched the shores of most of our neighboring republics. Countries "visited" during 1952-53 are indicated on the outline map on the cover by stars. Superimposed on the map is the "SS Good Will" and the Tugboat "Norma", christened in honor of Senorita Norma Jaramillo, Panamanian art student who was given a \$300 scholarship to TSCW at Denton. This scholarship, our project this year, is the accomplishment of which we are most proud. Fifty dollars also was sent to Dr. Rebecca Switzer to use to help other deserving Latin American girls enrolled at TSCW. With a lovely reciprocal gesture, thirty Pan American students from TSCW, directed by Dr. Switzer, presented a beautiful dramatization of their native Christmas customs at our "Christmas Cruise" luncheon in December. A telecast of the entire program was made by WBAP-TV which was seen by audiences in Fort Worth, Dallas and Houston, which no doubt helped to promote appreciation and understanding among many Texans for the customs of their neighbors.

A "Get-Acquainted" tea in October honored the Latin American students at TCU, TWC, Arlington State College, the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and TSCW.

Cooperating with the Good Neighbor Commission on its annual Mexican teacher visit, the members of the Fort Worth Pan American Round Table provided housing and entertainment for the teachers from Mexico who visited the Fort Worth schools in January. It co-sponsored with the local Good Neighbor Council a public lecture by Dean Paul Murray of Mexico City College.

For your cooperation on this cruise, to my crew and shipmates I say from mi corazon, "muchisimas gracias", and not goodbye, but "hasta la vista"!

During the summer the director asked the associate director, since the house committee had not been appointed, to obtain prices from Colonial Country Club, Glen Garden Country Club and a hotel to be considered as a meeting place for next year. - Guest coffee to celebrate Pan American Day. Songs and dances April presented by 14 elementary school students, and a brief look at Colombia by Senorita Cecilia Paez of Bogota.

- Talk by Mr. Marino Anderson, formerly of Ecuador and the May formal installation of the new officers.

The Program Committee chairman has contacted the country chairmen before each meeting, arranged for an invocation and worked with the music committee to provide special music. On occasion the committee has arranged for transportation for speakers and for equipment needed in showing films and presenting other special features.





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

THE CONVENTION

The 34th Convention of the Pan American Round Tables of Texas, held at McAllen, April 14-17, 1969, was a triumph of all the qualities that are the salient factors composing and sustaining this organization—co-operation, intelligence, good-will, virtue and beauty. Four of the Valley Tables — Alamo-San Juan-Pharr, Edinburg, McAllen and Rio Grande City —were our hostesses. The welcome and warmth never diminished, and the arrangements for our business meetings, and the entertainment between meetings,

The Business all were faultless. Beyond the usual reports from officers and committee chairmen, resolutions, election of officers, etc., of which all the Round

Tables will receive full account in the Minutes, the principal business was the correction of one section of the By-Laws which defines the duties of the Treasurer. According to this correction, our State Treasurer will no longer collect dues and fees from Texas Tables for the Alliance. This change was made, not from any reluctance to serve the Alliance, but in order to preserve our tax-exempt status. Our officers, especially our Director and Treasurer, were never able to completely satisfy the Internal Revenue Service on this point, so it seems better to relinquish this collection duty to the proper Alliance officers. Round Tables will still need to pay the usual dues and fees to the Alliance—Alliance dues to the Alliance Treasurer, State dues to the State Treasurer.

Monday,
April 14

Following the 4 p.m. Board Meeting, the members were entertained at a pre-dinner reception at the home of the General Chairman of the Convention, Mrs. Orville I. Cox. Afterward the Board Members were given a beautiful dinner by the Co-Chairmen, and Directors of the Hostess Tables: Mrs. Cox, Mrs. G. A. Guerra, Mrs. R. Ruben Guerra, Mrs. Bernard Jackson, Mrs. A. J. Laughlin, Mrs. J. C. Ramirez, Mrs. Walter Schultze, and Mrs. Donald Sherer.

Tuesday, The formal opening of the Convention came at 9:30 a.m. April 15. The April 15 Hon. Jack A. Whetsel, Mayor of Mc-Allen, gave the welcoming address, to which Mrs. Fernandez made response. At the luncheon later, which was attended by the Mayor, the Hon. Esteban Morales, Consul of Mexico to McAllen, and Señora Morales, the Hon. Rafael Sierra de la Garza, Mayor of Reynosa and Señora de la Garza, the speaker was the Hon. Jack Drake, President of the Good Neighbor Council, who spoke eloquently of the successes and opportunities of the Good Neighbor movement. (We feel some pride in knowing that our person-toperson Round Table movement pre-dated all other Good Neighbor enthusiasms by half a generation.)

Our Tuesday evening was a festivity not soon to be forgotten. Our hostesses took us to the Echo Hotel in Edinburg, where we were served a delicious buffet, in a big dining hall impressively decorated. Then followed a fabulous program by the Pan American College Choir, under the direction of Dr. Ray K. Drakeley. A fairly new assembly of about 45 voices, singing in perfect pitch, completely blended, presented a 50-minute program of songs dating from old French and Italian numbers (16th Century) right up to the songs of day before yesterday. It would be difficult to overrate this training success by Dr. Drakeley. Not only did the students sing well, — he had imbued them with the joy and spirit of song.

Dr. Drakeley has a fine background of experience in the theatre and on television, both as a singer and a director. Best of all, he seems delighted to have become a part of the Valley's expanding cultural expression. With his Choir he gave us an insight into the potentially marvelous achievement that is right there in our own Valley.

Adding to our pleasure was the presence of some thirty guests from the Reynosa, Monterrey and Mexico City Round Tables.

Wednesday, A charming luncheon, planned and April 16 presided over by the Alama-San Juan-Pharr members, had as its theme, "By the Sea," with exquisite favors and decorations. The speaker was Mrs. Fred Petch, of Weslaco, who gave us some fascinating high-lights of the early history and folklore of the very tip of Texas—Padre Island, Port Isabel. She kept us spellbound with her tales of Indians, pirates, buried treasure, etc.! We don't recall ever having been so sorry to have time called!

Wednesday evening we were all escorted to Reynosa, where we were met at the bridge by the International Welcoming Committee and the Mariachi Band. Then we were taken to the beautiful Reynosa Lions Club Casino. There we were greeted by the members of the Reynosa Pan American Round Table in their lovely costumes. Delicious aperitifs, with "las más ricas cositas" were served us, to the "musica tipica"—always a delight to hear. Our Mexican friends are masters of entertainment! Their most formal acts have a grace and charm that always seems completely spontaneous. The presentation of the flags was done with such respect and fervor that it must deepen our own patriotism.

We all loved the songs by the great composer, Armando Manzanero, of Yucatan, as sung by Pichardini in his rich and expressive voice. He is said to be

the best interpreter of Manzanero's work along the border. Will he come to the USA to sing for us?

But the magnificent climax came with the allegorical pageant "Una Noche Maya"—a ceremonial procession given by the Reynosa Lions Club, assisted by the Reynosa Round Table and the children. The authentic Mayan costumes, with their fabulous headdresses, robes, etc., are all made by the players themselves. What a remarkable achievement in research, in execution of detail, and what grace displayed throughout the performance—and the children just as exactly perfect as the adults. Truly the Mayans must have been a wonderful people, but not more wonderful than our friends of Reynosa who have shown us something of their ceremonies. Thank you, Reynosa Lions and Pan Americans!

Thursday, Came the last day of our 34th Convention, and it began with the Hour of Memory, conducted with dignity and reverence by Mrs. J. I. Ochoa of the Edinburg Round Table. The count showed that 39 of our members had passed on since our last Convention. The Grim Reaper has been harsh with us; but he cannot erase these dear ones from memory, nor destroy their work. They rest in peace.

Election of officers always brings an hour of excitement. Everyone is interested to know who will be our new officers. Our State has four sections (not divisions) and the Nominating Committee is always under orders to see that all four are represented in the elected officers. At this luncheon, a charming program showing dresses, hats, etc., made of citrus plants and fruits was presented by Mrs. T. L. Duncan, Chairman of the Mission Citrus Style Show. You wouldn't believe what can be done with oranges—not for eating, but for wearing!

All in all, a wonderful Convention!

PAN AMERICAN ROUND TABLE IDEALS

An ideal is defined as a conception of something in its highest perfection. So I would say, definitely, we have ideals.

You will remember from your philosophy classes, there are three basic faculties of the mind: Memory, which retains and recalls; Understanding, which analyzes and evaluates; and Will, which affords a choice of action.

In Panamericanism we also have three basic principles which shape our ideals: Knowledge (we must first know our neighbors); Understanding (which determines and defines our inter-relationship); and these first two beget the third, Friendship (the confirmation of our sincerity). These last three are fundamentally faculties of the heart, dealing with human affinities.

You will note that in each of these categories, whether of mind or heart, Understanding is the middle course, — the key that unlocks the other two and transforms our task into a Labor of Love. Understanding, therefore, is an essence of both the spirit and the heart, which no purely mundane ties can dissipate. When mind and heart act in accord, an ideal situation exists.

We Pan Americans do not bask in the bright midday sun of fleeting glory, honor and recognition. Rather in the soft light of the stars, which set a true course for us to follow in our quiet quest.

With Faith in our mission, Hope in its fulfilment, and an Affection which binds us One for All and All for One, perhaps our ultimate ideal is to make of our Hemisphere a better world in which to live because we passed this way.

Yes, we do have ideals!

BOOK REVIEWS

Juan Vasquez de Coronado y Su Etica en la Conquista de Costa Rica, by Dr. Victora Urbano, with foreword by Don Mario Hernandez Sanchez-Barba.

If your Spanish has reached a post-high school state, this book with its scholarly treatment of an absorbing subject will give you many hours of delight. The author's theme is the power of kindness and justice to set in motion those majestic forces of civilization that can bring peace and happiness.

Juan Vasquez—a nephew of the Coronado who explored large areas of what is now Mexico and Southwestern United States—came to the New World near the middle of the 16th Century. Eventually given the King of Spain's commission to colonize the area now known as Nicaragua and Costa Rica, so humane and just was his treatment of the Indians that they came to trust him, and although the Spanish colonists endured many hardships, they were able to establish many towns, and as time passed, a nation developed which is about as democratic and peaceful as can be found anywhere. Dr. Urbano argues that it was Don Juan Vasquez de Coronado who established the basis, through his Christian methods, for this peaceful modern state which never has revolutions. Her treatment of her documentary material is so orderly and convincing that one comes naturally to agree with her view.

Dr. Urbano is Associate Professor of Modern Languages at Lamar State College of Technology, at Beaumont. Recently she received the Leon Felipe prize of \$6,000 (a prize offered for writers throughout the Hemisphere) for a book of short stories, soon to be published.

Her book about the conquest of Costa Rica is available at the Spanish Book Center, 140 Alabama at Highland, Beaumont 77705.

Mexican Indian Costumes, by Donald and Dorothy Cordry, with foreword by Miguel Covarrubias (University of Texas Press).

This book is so beautiful (it weighs five pounds) that it is worth having even if one couldn't read. With many excellent photographs of actual costumes, authentic as worn by Mexican natives, it also has diagrams showing the actual weaving methods, embroidery designs, and tells of the methods for dyeing, the materials from which the textiles are made. Costs \$15 and worth every penny.



Recognizing that the peoples of the American Continent need a better understanding and knowledge of the varying cultural and historical backgrounds in order to achieve better relations among people and to build a friendship which will endure, and being sure that the Mesas Redondas Panamericanas provide the means by which the women of the Americas may achieve these goals, the Board of the Alliance of Pan American Round Tables meeting in Monterrey, Mexico, February 22 through the 24th, 1961, adopted the following pledge which may be used in the reception of new members or at any other occasion that seems appropriate.

The Pledge

I pledge allegiance to the Pan American movement and shall endeavor to work with all my power and to the best of my ability to fulfill its objectives; Knowledge, Understanding and Friendship until we are "One for All and All for One."

Mrs. Florence Terry Griswold was the founder of the Pan American Round Tables.

Mrs. Griswold, who grew up on the border between the United States and Mexico, and who lived in San Antonio, Texas, was acutely aware of the need for better understanding between the peoples of the Americas. She opened her home to women and chidren refugees during Mexico's turbulent political period, 1910-1916.

Mrs. Griswold was keenly interested in the work of the Pan American Union and was a personal friend of Mr. John Barrett, Director General of the Union from 1907 to 1920. Later she came to know his successor, Dr. Leo S. Rowe well. She endorsed wholeheartedly the goals of the Union:

"Achieving an order of peace and justice Promoting American solidarity Strengthening collaboration among member states Defending the sovereignty, independence and international integrity of the nations of the Americas."

Mrs. Griswold felt the work of the Pan American Union could well be advanced by the women of the Americas. She asked "Who can resist an America united in heart in accordance with human and divine law, following the torch of liberty?"

Through the working together of women in Round Tables throughout the Americas, Mrs. Griswold foresaw an "unbroken chain of friendship reaching the length of the Americas."

Thus the first Pan American Round Table was founded by Mrs. Griswold in San Antonio, October 16, 1916. It was modeled closely after the organization of the Pan American Union.

Because of the great love and affection I bear you, all this I leave unto you, and through you to all the women of the Americas.'

PURPOSE

The Purpose of the Organization is to coordinate the efforts of the Pan American Round Tables in their furthering of knowledge, understanding and friendship between the peoples of the Americas.

1. Local Tables

To direct the organization of new tables the following rules should be observed:

a. Members must be interested in the Pan American move-

ment and willing to work for this cause.

b. A minimum of 22 members each to represent a country of the Western Hemisphere (we include Canada) should be achieved before a Table receives its certificate of affiliation with the Alliance. Nevertheless a smaller group may start working and participate in the Conventions, provided they pay their dues and fees and intend to complete their membership.

c. Tables are charged with the study and execution of resolutions accepted by vote at the Biennial Conventions of the

Alliance.

2. Basic Constitution

In order to insure uniformity in the ideals and purpose of the Alliance, a Basic Constitution is provided for newly organized Tables. Local groups are autonomous and may establish their own By-Laws as long as they do not conflict with the purposes and policies of the Alliance.

3. Certification

The Tables conforming to the requirements of the Alliance receive a certificate of affiliation issued by the Board of the Alliance.

4. Dues and Fees

Each Table pays to the Alliance dues of \$10.00 per year (U. S. currency) which is used to defray current office expenses. Each Table pays 50 cents per member into a special fund which is used for travel expenses incurred in Alliance organizational work. In addition a registration fee for delegates and visitors is paid by those who enroll at the biennial conventions.

6. Geographical Zones

The hemisphere is divided, for administration purposes, into seven zones:

- I. The Eastern Part of the United States.
- II. The Western Part of the United States.
- III. Mexico and the Islands of the Caribbean.
- IV. Nicaragua, El Salvador, Guatemala, Panama, Costa Rica, and Honduras.
 - V. Venezuela, Ecuador, Colombia.
- VI. Bolivia, Peru, and Chile.
- VII. Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay, and Paraguay.

7. Membership

The member Tables of the Alliance are $\frac{160}{100}$ in number. There are 5 awaiting ratification of their Constitutions by the Parliamentarian, for, although each Table is autonomous, the Alliance Parliamentarian must approve new Constitutions to assure that they conform to the basic principles of Pan American Round Tables. There are 7 Tables in the process of organization, or inactive for a period of time. The Tables are organized throughout the countries belonging to the Organization of American States, the Pan American Round Tables having been originally patterned after the Pan American Union which is now the Secretariat of the OAS. There are 33 in the United States of America.

Mexico, Peru, and Nicaragua have the largest number of organized Tables in Latin America with 18 in Mexico, 7 in Peru, and 6 in Nicaragua. El Salvador has the largest number of provisional Tables. The Latin American Tables are largely in the capital cities.

8. Table Relationship

All Tables are directly affiliated with the Pan American Alliance from which they receive their certificate, orientation and recommendations adopted at the Alliance Conventions. If there is more than one table in the same city they should co-operate to strengthen the bonds of friendship and to promote projects of mutual interest. The same is true when there are several Tables in a given State or Nation. Nevertheless, as its name implies, the strength of the movement lies in the Alliance of individual Round Tables.

The duties of the officers are:

Director General: Supervise the work of the Alliance throughout the Continent. Preside over the Conventions and Board Meetings. Serve as ex-officio member of all committees. However, the Director General has NO "dictatorial" powers over the

The Assistant Director General: Serve as Chairman of the Extension Committee, which shall consist of said Assistant Director General and the Zone Directors; receive, maintain and file the correspondence with the Zone Directors; send reports to the Director General every three months; and present the Constitution and other credentials of prospective affiliates at Board Meetings.

Zone Directors: Co-ordinate the work of the Alliance in the zone to which they are assigned; work with the Assistant Director General in furthering the extension work of the Alliance; work with the Director General in public relations work between Tables; appoint National Directors, if necessary, after consulta-

tion with the Tables in the Country.

Recording Secretary: Keep the minutes of the Convention and Board meetings, keep all records of the Alliance, maintain an up-to-date list of Member Tables and their addresses, and ful-

fill any other jobs pertaining to her office.

Corresponding Secretary: Carry on the official correspondence of the Alliance, maintain adequate files and assist the Director General in correspondence with the Tables, in their respective

Treasurer: Keep the Treasurer's books, collect the dues and other monies of the Alliance (travel fund and special funds); pay all bills of the Alliance, authorized by the Board of Directo's or the Director General. Send out periodic statement of standing to all member Tables.

Historian: Shall collect and file all materials of historical value to the Alliance and shall deliver them to the Mexico City Table for filing in the Archieves of the Alliance. She shall be responsible for keeping the HISTORY of the growth and progress of the Alliance up to date and shall so maintain it.

Parliamentarian: See that the proceedings of the meetings of the Alliance are conducted according to the Constitution and By-Laws and that they follow parliamentary rules. Provide each officer and each member Table with a copy of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Alliance. Check the constitution of new Tables to see that they conform to the Alliance purposes and goals.

SECTION AND DESIGNATION OF THE PERSON OF THE

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS of PAN AMERICAN ROUND TABLE I OF FORT WORTH

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be Pan American Round Table I of Fort Worth.

ARTICLE II

Object

This organization shall be non-political, non-sectarian, and non-commercial. The object of the organization shall be:

- (1) To provide mutual knowledge, understanding and friendship among the women of the Western Hemisphere.
- (2) To foster all movements leading to a higher civilization, especially those effecting the women and children of the countries of this hemisphere.

ARTICLE III

Affiliations

Inasmuch as the Pan American Round Table of Fort Worth is a member of the alliance of Pan American Round Tables, and also in accordance with Article 2 of the original constitution of the Pan American Round Tables, it shall:

(1) Take part in only such activities as have a direct bearing upon the stated object of this above named Round Table. (2) Affiliation with organizations of Pan American Round Tables, National or International, is authorized provided local autonomy is maintained.

ARTICLE IV

Membership

Section 1. All women who are in sympathy with the object of the organization and are willing to cooperate in its work may be eligible to membership.

Section 2. The membership shall consist of active, sustaining, non-resident and honorary.

Section 3. There shall be 75 active members; a Director and Associate Director and representatives of each country of the Western Hemisphere. Members shall actively participate on Committees, Programs and Projects of the Table.

Section 4. Non-resident members shall consist of:

(1) Members, who on change of residence and payment of annual dues, wish to retain their membership.

(2) Members from adjacent communities, the number being limited to five from each community.

Section 5. The title of honorary membership may be conferred upon a man or woman for distinguished service, and upon consuls and their wives during their residence in the locality. Honorary members shall be entitled to privileges of the organization. They shall pay luncheon fees. They may not vote.

Section 6. Any active member absent from three consecutive meetings-either business or luncheon-without reason acceptable to the Executive Board, automatically forfeits her membership. Members leaving the city for more than thirty days shall notify the Secretary and provide for programs on their respective committees. Failure thus

to notify within sixty days shall constitute a for-feiture of membership.

Section 7. The name of the applicant for membership shall be submitted in writing to the chairman of the Membership Committee, with signatures of two active members. No member may recommend more than two names a year.

Section 8. The names of approved applicants, when the membership is complete, shall be placed on the waiting list until there is a vacancy. All names are automatically dropped at the end of the fiscal year. Names may be re-submitted.

ARTICLE V

Officers

Section 1. The officers of the Pan American Round Table of Fort Worth shall be a Director, and Associate Director, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, a Custodian, Historian, and a Parliamentarian, a Member-at-Large and the immediate Past Director. These offices shall constitute the Executive Board.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall consist of the elected officers and chairmen of standing committees.

ARTICLE VI

Standing Committees

The standing committees shall be: Program, Membership, Social, Publicity, Yearbook, Telephone and Reservations, Co-ordinating, Executive Committee, Panamerigraph, Finance, Project, Inter-Change Library, Friendship, Protocol, Language, House, Decoration, Costume and Student Entertainment.

ARTICLE VII

Meetings

Regular meetings shall be held on the second Wednesday of each month from September through May, inclusive, the hour and place to be determined by general consent of the members.

ARTICLE VIII

Amendments

This constitution may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the active members present, provided due notice of the amendments has been given at a previous regular meeting.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

Executive Board

Section 1. The elected officers and one active member to be known as the member-at-large and selected by ballot from the active membership together with the immediate Past Director shall constitute an Executive Board. It shall be called by the Director, or Acting Director, in the interim of regular meetings to fill vacancies among officers and active members. It shall also have the authority to transact any new business whose urgency does not permit its postponement until the next regular meeting. Five shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE II

Executive Board

Section 1. Director: The Director shall preside at all meetings; appoint all standing and special committees except the Nominating Committee and the Auditing Committee; be ex-officio member of all committees. She, or her appointee, shall represent the Table on all special occasions.

Section 2. Associate Director: In case of the absence or disability of the Director, the Associate Director shall perform her duties. She shall accept any assignment by the Director, the purpose of said assignment being the extension of the work of this Round Table and the facilities of its functions.

Section 3. Recording Secretary: The Recording Secretary shall keep a record of all meetings, shall keep a roll of all members with full names and addresses of each, classification of membership, and date of admission into the organization.

Section 4. Corresponding Secretary: The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct and have charge of all correspondence including cards to sick or bereaved members and thank you notes to participants on programs. She shall notify members of their election, and in case the candidate fails of election to membership she shall notify the member proposing her. She shall preserve all papers and letters of importance pertaining to affairs of The Pan American Round Table of Fort Worth.

Section 5. Treasurer: The Treasurer shall have in her charge all funds belonging to the organization and shall pay out same only upon authority from the Board. She shall keep a correct account in detail of all monies received and expended, and shall render an account in writing, to be filed with the Recording Secretary in the Meeting in May and given

to the Auditing Committee on this day. She shall collect all dues, and notify members when dues are delinquent.

Section 6. Custodian: The Custodian shall have in her charge all properties belonging to this Round Table and shall be responsible for their preservation. She shall not make loans of any properties without consulting the Director and Associate Director who shall share in responsibility of their return.

Section 7. Historian: The Historian shall keep a record of all major activities, and shall keep in organized form year-books, programs, newspaper clippings, photographs, and all other literature pertaining to the history of Pan American Round Table I of Fort Worth.

Section 8. Parliamentarian: The Parliamentarian shall see that the business procedure of The Round Table is conducted according to the Constitution, the By-Laws and Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE III

Duties of Members

Section 1. Each active member shall be responsible for a program on the country she represents. Active members shall be entitled to vote, and serve as chairman of standing committees.

Section 2. Each member shall be responsible for her luncheon charge unless she notifies the Reservations Committee 24 hours preceding the luncheon or program, that she will be unable to attend. This charge shall be paid to the Treasurer.

Section 3. Failure of any member to pay any class of dues within two months shall cause her name to be dropped, after due notice.

ARTICLE IV

Nomination and Election of Officers

Section 1. Officers of this Round Table shall be elected in this manner: A nominating committee of three shall be elected by ballot at the January meeting from a slate of at least six names nominated from the floor. At the February meeting the Nominating Committee shall present a ticket to be voted upon at the March meeting in a manner to be decided at each annual election. Additional nominations may be made from the floor provided the nominee's consent is obtained before the vote is taken. Member-at-Large to be elected at March meeting.

Section 2. Officers elected in March shall be duly installed in May and shall enter upon their duties June fifteenth.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Standing Committees

Standing committees shall be composed of not less than three members and not more than five, appointed annually by the Director, with the exception of the Program, Telephone and Student Entertainment Committees which may have as many as needed to carry on the work efficiently.

Section 1. Program Committee: The Program Committee shall arrange and direct programs to be presented at each regular meeting. Upon the resignation of an active member, it shall be responsible for the assigning of the country held, said member turning over to the chairman of the Program Committee all materials collected on the country.

The Program Committee shall plan the program for the year in sufficient time to be able to present it to the Yearbook Committee for publication.

Section 2. Membership Committee: The Membership Committee shall keep vacancies filled and shall handle all applications for membership of all classifications. The Committee shall act upon the application of new members and present it at the next regular meeting, at which time the names are voted upon by secret ballot. No acceptance of invitation to membership shall be considered unless accompanied by the first year's dues.

Section 3. Social Committee: The Social Committee shall be responsible for all social affairs and entertainment. It shall represent the membership when this Round Table is asked to assist in the reception and entertainment of outstanding persons from the other countries of the Western Hemisphere. They shall serve as hostesses at the regular meetings.

Section 4. Publicity Committee: The Publicity Committee shall be responsible for announcements in the daily papers of meetings and other activities of the Round Table.

Section 5. Yearbook Committee: The duties of this committee shall be the preparation of a Yearbook for the ensuing year. It shall contain the list of members in good standing, the program for the year and the Constitution and By-Laws. Also, it shall contain the list of officers, and committees, and all standing rules.

Section 6. Telephone Committee: The Telephone Committee shall have as its duties the following:

- a. To take reservations and cancellations for luncheons and other functions where reservations are required.
- b. To inform members regarding matters not publicized through the regular channels.

Section 7. The Coordinating Committee: The Coordinating Committee shall have as its specific

duty the coordinating of community interests and those of Pan American Round Table of Fort Worth. One of its duties shall be the planning of the citywide observance of Pan American Week in conjunction with the Social Committee. All community affairs in which this Round Table might participate shall first be passed upon by this committee before being presented to the membership. The advisability of presenting said matters to the membership will be determined by their coordination with the object of the Pan American Round Tables.

Section 8. The Finance Committee shall consist of three members, one of which shall be the treasurer. The committee shall outline the financial policy of the Table and shall each prepare a budget which shall be reported at the September meeting. All expenditures shall be considered by the finance committee before any action may be taken by the Pan American Round Table of Fort Worth.

Section 9. The Auditing Committee shall be elected by the Executive Board in March.

Section 10. (1) The Project Committee shall consist of three or more members. Its duty shall be to recommend to the Board the project to be sponsored by the Table and shall be voted on. Each recommendation must be carried by a two-thirds majority of the Board.

(2) The permanent project of this Table shall be educational. All unallocated monies in the Service Fund and all receipts aside from dues shall comprise the Educational Fund, which shall finance the project. The purpose of the Educational Fund shall be to assist worthy girls from outside the geographical area of the United States who are attending a College or University in or around the region surrounding Fort Worth and who have attained junior or senior standing. The

young woman so assisted and the amount of money to be expended shall be determined yearly by the Executive Committee of the Fort Worth Table.

Section 11. The Inter-Change Library Committee shall have as its specific duty the coordinating of State Project which is to encourage exchange of books, magazines, and pictures.

Section 12. The House Committee shall be responsible for obtaining a meeting place before the first meeting of the year, and for the menus for the luncheon meetings.

Section 13. The Language Committee shall try to provide Spanish classes, meeting places for such classes, also teachers for the classes.

Section 14. The Decoration Committee shall have charge of the decorations for September meeting, Christmas Party, and for the Pan American festivities on Pan American Day.

Section 15. The Costume Committee shall encourage members to acquire costumes of the Americas, especially of the country each is studying, shall pass on the authenticity of such costume, and have style shows of the costumes at appropriate times.

Section 16. The Student Entertainment Committee shall provide entertainment at appropriate times for the Pan American Students who are attending schools of higher learning in this area.

Section 17. The Friendship Committee shall actively support projects submitted by the State Friendship Committee for furthering Friendship among the members of the Round Tables in the Western Hemisphere.

Section 18. Other committees may be appointed from time to time by the Director for the advancement of the Round Table.

ARTICLE VI

Dues

The annual dues are payable June 15th and are delinquent July 15th. The Treasurer shall send statements in June and follow up statements as required.

Section 1. (a) Dues for all members are \$10.00 per year.

(b) Dues for new members joining after February 1st shall be \$5.00.

Section 2. Allocation of dues: State: \$1.00 per capita; Florence Terry Griswold Fund: 25¢ per capita; Alliance: \$10.00 per Table; Alliance Travel Fund: 50¢ per capita. Monies shall be sent to the State Treasurer, designating the amounts for State and Griswold Fund and to the Alliance Treasurer for Alliance dues and Travel Fund.

Section 3. Any member in good standing wishing to resign must send her written resignation with the amount of dues payable at that time.

ARTICLE VII

Membership

Section 1. Active members shall have all rights and privileges of The Round Table. Active members must be active or forfeit their membership.

Section 2. Non-resident Members and members from adjacent communities shall have the right to attend all regular meetings.

Section 3. Honorary Members shall be entitled to the privileges of the organization outlined in the Constitution.

Section 4. Sustaining members shall be those persons interested in and subscribing to the aims

of the Round Table. Those members shall be subject to the action of the membership committee.

ARTICLE VIII

Insigne

The insigne, originated and adopted by the Chapter Round Table shall be used by The Pan American Round Table of Fort Worth. It shall be placed on all yearbooks and official stationery of this Round Table.

STANDING RULES

- 1. Each Member may invite as many guests as she wishes at her own expense.
- Registration fees for delegates to the Alliance and State Conventions shall be paid by the Table.

NOTE: ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER is the authority for all parliamentary procedure during the regular meetings of this Round Table.

Members may wear costumes at the Christmas Party and Pan American Week celebration.

Sister Pia, who began her needlework project to help the women of Haiti, many with hungry children to feed, set up shop with a group of 14 skilled embroiderers.

Now 85 women turn out newdlework that will be heirlooms of tomorrow.

While they sew, the women of Halti chatter and sing, and

Sister Pia travels thousands of miles each spring to find women who appreciate fine needlework, taking orders for dresses, trousseaus, tablecloths, curtains, napkins, hand towels and other articles, to help the women who embroider to earn the money to help their families in the strange economy of Haiti, outside the mainstream of industrial development.

Directors of the project are the order of Haitian nuns of which Sister Pia is a member, but women of all faiths come to the courtyard in search of work.




ANITA OSUNA CLARK HONORED AT ALBUQUERQUE

The ceremony of the dedication of the Anita Osuna Clark Memorial Library, March 8th at 3 p.m. was attended by the Ladies the Albuquerque Panamerican Round Table and the Bilinqual Institute of the College of Education.

Anita Osuna de Carr, the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Eligio Osuna, that came from Mexico, was born in Albuquerque, New Mexico, and died there at 69 in November 1968. She was a founder and the Director of the Albuquerque Pan-American Round Table.

She was graduated from the University of New Mexico, and at the same University for two tears acted as Head of the Romance Language Department.

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UN MENSAJE DE LA DIRECTORA GENERAL

Queridas compañeras:

Como ustedes ya sabrán, la Alianza se vio en la penosa necesidad de tener que cancelar la Convención que había sido planeada para Cochabamba, Bolivia. Esta medida fue sumamente penosa tanto para mí en lo particular como para la Directiva de la Alianza, porque bien sabemos el gran entusiasmo y espíritu panamericanista con el cual nuestras compañeras de Cochabamba estaban planeando la Convención y el trabajo que tenían adelantado.

¿Por qué se canceló? Porque durante mi gira por los Estados Unidos, una gran mayoría de las socias norteamericanas me expresaron que temían no poder asistir a la XII Convención por el temor que tenían de volar sobre los Andes, y su estancia en Cochabamba, que es 1,000 pies más alto que la ciudad de México. No temían tanto a su estancia en Cochabamba, como el vuelo sobre los Andes, pues como ustedes saben, los aviones-que cubren esa ruta hacen escala en La Paz, que tiene más de 4,000 metros de altura, y aún en caso de fletar avión especial que no hiciera escala en La Paz (para lo cual tendríamos que garantizar cupo completo) los aviones de todas maneras tienen que subir a grandes alturas, y no son altimáticos. También saben que la mayo ría de las socias que están en posibilidad económica de hacer un viaje hasta allá, son personas ya de edad mayor, y sus médicos les aconsejaron no hacer el viaje. Por tanto, ante la posibilidad de NO contar con un quorum para llevar a cabo los negocios de la Alianza, aunado al hecho que mi propio médico me prohibió hacer ese viaje por motivos de mi salud bien conocidos por todas ustedes, aproveché el hecho de que la Convención Nacional de Mesas Redondas de la República de México se reunía en Xalapa, Veracruz, y a ella asistieron varios miembros de la Directiva de la Alianza: Sras. Nelson, Peterson, Guerra, Carolina Cerna, Conchita Sada, Emma de Gutiérrez Suárez y para discutirlo con ellas consultamos por teléfono larga distancia con Wandra Smalley, Dir. Gral. Adjunta, Bárbara McCluer, Tesorera, y Margarita Kelly, Sria. de Actas. Unánimemente fueron de opinión que la Alianza no tenía otra alternativa excepto cancelar la Convención en Cochabamba, a pesar de sus buenos deseos de aceptar la gentil y amable hospitalidad de dicha Mesa.

Así se lo informó a dicha Mesa, y ésta mostrando un gran sentido de panamericanismo, comprensión y amistad, decidió retirar dicha invitación por lo cual merecen un gran voto de confianza y solidaridad puesto que ya habían llevado a cabo mucho trabajo y gastos y así me lo hicieron saber.

Mi próximo problema era encontrar sede para la XII Convención de la Alianza, primero pensé en Panamá, y a mi paso por dicha ciudad lo discutí con las socias de esa Mesa. En principio PARECIA que iban a poder aceptar, pero desgraciadamente acontecimientos de orden político evitaron el poder ofrecernos la tranquilidad y paz necesarias para llevar a cabo dicha reunión, y muy a su pesar, tuvieron que negarse.

Entonces pensé en San José, Costa Rica, pero esta Mesa tampoco pudo aceptarnos en gran parte por la premura, la falta de preparación, y también por motivos similares a los anteriores.

Entonces, sumamente preocupada porque se acercaba la fecha de la Convención y no contábamos con una sede para la misma, llamé larga distancia para ver si ALGUNA de las Mesas de la República de México podría ofrecerse como sede. Yo no solicité la ciudad de México pues bien sabía que ésta se había comprometido como sede de la Convención Nacional para fines de julio de este año. Nuestra compañera Conchita Sada, Directora de la III Zona y Ma. del Refugio Medina Gil, actual Presidenta Nacional de la Asociación de MRP de la República de México, quienes en unión de Adela Vela, Directora de la MRP de México, estudiaron las posibilidades que había. La Mesa de México ofreció ser la sede ya que tenía adelantado mucho del trabajo para la Convención Nacional, el cual podría aprovecharse para la internacional con un poco de buena voluntad y más trabajo, PERO, la Asociación Nacional tenía que consultar a las Mesas del país para ver si estaban dispuestas a que la Cd. de México Retirara su invitación a ser la sede de la Convención Nacional y aceptara ser la sede de la XII Convención de la Alianza.

Para no cansarlas, basta decirles que tanto la Mesa de México, D. F. como las Mesas hermanas de la República de México, todas aceptaron gustosas el cambio, con el afán de mostrar una vez más el espíritu de solidaridad, hermandad y cooperación de nuestras hermanas de México, gesto digno de hermandad y cooperación de nuestras hermanas de México, gesto digno de encomio y de gratitud de parte nuestra. Su espíritu Panamericanista no se quedó allí. Fue ella la que fijó la única fecha que tenía disponible, y la Mesa de México la aceptó gustosa. Por tanto, espero que todas ustedes estén de acuerdo tanto en la fecha como en el lugar, y que la asistencia sea numerosa y cordial.

Nuevamente reitero mi pesar y el de todos los de la Directiva de la Alianza de haber tenido que retirar por ahora la sede de la Alianza a Cochabamba, expresando una vez más nuestra admiración y gratitud por su nobleza y comprensión en este caso; y a la Mesa de México, D. 

Fort Worth's Gilda Cruz-Romo . . . gets raves in New York

New star born as FW woman gets Met raves

NEW YORK, (UPI)—A star was born last night at the Metropolitan Opera auditions when Gilda Cruz-Romo, 30, of Fort Worth, won the coveted first prize—a year's contract with the Met.

The beautiful, raven-haired soprano who started her career with the national symphony and opera in Mexico City, won hands down over eight other semi-finalists in the contest sponsored by the Metropolitan Opera National Council. She was exciting, professional, and ready to take her place among the outstanding soprano voices of the 1970s.

NOT ONLY was Miss Cruz-Romo the choice of Met general manager Rudolf Bing and other judges from his artistic staff, she was the favorite of a standing-room-only audience at the Metropolitan Opera House. The opera singers, teachers, coaches and patrons in attendance showered her with "bravos." Nothing like it had occurred at the Met auditions in recent years.

She sang Madeline's aria, "La Momma Morta," from Giordano's "Andrea Chenier" like a prima donna. Her soaring lyric voice, her control of phrasing and nuance and her professional dramatic abilities were even more evident in a duet from Verdi's "Trovatore"

N ADDITION to a contract, Miss Cruz-Romo won a \$2500 award. Other award winners included—soprana Eugenie Watson, 23, of Natchitoches, La., \$2000.

Miss Cruz-Romo sang most recently with the New York City Opera. Previously she sang with the Dallas and Fort Worth operas and the Cincinnati Summer Opera. She is the first Mexican-American to win the Met anditions, which date back to the 1930s. Member of Par American Round Table I

Gilda Cruz-Romo Wins Met Prize

Soprano Gilda Cruz-Romo, who will be seen as Maddelena in "Andrea Chenier" with the Fort Worth Opera this weekend, won first place in the 1969 Metropolitan Opera National Auditions Sunday night at the New York opera house.

The auditions were originally scheduled to be heard in November, but were postponed because of the Met's labor problems.

One columnist commented that it has been some time since a winner of the auditions caused as much commotion in the invited audience as Miss Cruz-Romo did Sunday. Shouts of "brava" and prolonged applause greeted her singing of "La Mamma Morte," from "Chenier," and the third act duet from "Trovatore," which she sang with a fellow contestant.

Her prize includes a \$2,500 cash award and a Metropolitan Opera contract.

IN A WAY it seems fitting that the Mexican-American singer should be engaged to sing in Fort Worth right now, because it was from here that the road to success began about two years ago.

If someone in their 20s can e said to have retired it can ive retired, it can be said of Miss Cruz-Romo after her marriage to Fort Worth government worker Robert Romo. Determined to be a wife and not a career woman, the soprano accepted no engagements for more than a year.
"But Bob said not to give

up singing if that was what I wanted," she said in an interview Monday," and to give it a year to see what would hap-

HER FIRST tentative step back to singing was a re-cital for the Maderia Manchester Music Club in Scott

Theater during spring 1968.
Then followed Dallas Civic Opera engagements for the Title III children's series there,

the Met regional auditions in San Antonio, and various orchestra appearances, including the Fort Worth Symphony last season.

Someone brought her to the attention of Julius Rudel, general manager of the New York City Opera. He heard her and signed her to a three-year contract last fall.

She received rave notices in the three productions she has appeared in so far for the company, the soprano leads in "Mefistofeles," "Boheme" and "Butterfly."

With the Met contract under her belt now, the young singer appears poised on the threshold of a major career.

- 2. Another Project for 1969 was the making of all 24 flags of the Western Hemisphere, size 4ft. x 6ft. Members sewed and hand-painted the emblems, while others donated the flag-poles and stands. In this way we familiarized ourselves with other flags and they will be used at our State Convention, to be held in Ft. Worth in 1971.
- 3. Table I commemorated its Silver Anniversary in 1969 with a special program honoring the Directors of the past 25 years.
- 4. Independence Day greetings and Christmas Cards were sent by our members to each of the Pan American Round Tables of the Western Hemisphere. Other Correspondence in Spanish was maintained with many Tables.
- 5. Table I members donated their blood to a hospital for a needy Mexican-American during the blood shortage in Fort Worth, Texas.
- 6. Twenty-four natives of the other Americas participated in our interesting programs during the last 2 years. 14 countries were studied.
- 7. Words to the "Hymn of The Pan American Round Tables" by Guillermina B. de Villalobo were translated into English by our Table.
- 8. Free weekly Spanish classes were taught by 2 members of Table I to the membership.

Under heading of "Co-Operation with the Alliance:

- 1. Ft. Worth Table I had as Alliance guests our Director-General, Sra. Carmen de Recalde; Alliance Parliamentarian, Sra. Peggy Petersen; Zone I Director, Srita. Carolina Cerna and our own Sra. Eura Wylie, Comité de Informacion, and Director of the P.A.R.Ts of Texas, Sra. Nita Harmon, etc.
- 2. Table I sent 4 memorials to the Florence Terry Griswold Scholarship Fund.
- 3. Four magazine subscriptions, via Interchange Library, were sent in 1968 from our Table I to Tables in Central and South America.
- 4. From our contingent of 24 to this Convention, 17 are members of Ft. Worth Table I.

Under heading of "Publicity for the P.A.R.T. Movement":

- 1. Table I had floats in the 2 Mexican Independence Day Parades, with members in Mexican Costumes and banners proclaiming us as "Friends of the Americas".
- 2. The Mayor of Ft. Worth was asked to proclaim Apr. 14 as Pan American Day both years. The Governor of Texas and the President of the U.S.A. did likewise.

Fort Worth Gets eruvian Consul

Fort Worth Saturday had its first Peruvian Consulate with the naming of Dr. Carlos Ligorio Vivar as consul.

Dr. Vivar was visiting in Fort Worth Saturday when he received a letter from the president of Peru, Gen. Juan Velasco Alvarado, announcing the appointment.

"It is a great surprise and a great honor," he said. "I have long admired this country and I have come to love Texas and Fort Worth during with my children here." visits with my children here.

His three sons and his only daughter, Mrs. David E. Mitchell, are Fort Worth resi-

"I CAME TO Fort Worth to work for (the late) Jack Dan-ciger in 1956," explained Carmen Mitchell.

After she and Mitchell were married in Lima, Peru, in 1959, her brother Miguel, 22, came to Fort Worth and enrolled at TCU.

Miguel graduated from TCU in May and is head of the international department of Texas Refinery Corp.

The oldest brother, Dr. Carlos Vivar, 30, was the next to adopt Fort Worth. A physi-cian, he works in medical records at St. Joseph Hospital.

Finally Jorge, 19, joined the others and enrolled at Texas Wesleyan College.

The clan gathered in the Mitchell's new home at 4808 Boulder Run Saturday to congratulate the new consul.

DR. VIVAR, who taught English in Peru for 43 years, retired recently as an English professor at Latin Amarica's oldest university, the University of San Marcos which was founded in 1531.

Also an artist of renown in his country, he has been com-missioned by the Peruvian government to paint portraits of its presidents.

"He has completed a portrait of Lady Bird Johnson (from a picture) and plans to take it to the Johnson Ranch and present it to the President and Mrs. Johnson." said dent and Mrs. Johnson," said Mitchell.

Vivar speaks English, Span-ish, French, and Quechua, the native language of Peru.

He is a descendant of the Incas and delights in describing the once-great Inca civilization.

His native city, Huaraz in the state of Ancash was totally erased from the earth in the May 31 earthquake.

"I HAD MANY relatives ... a nephew who was a physician there ... and many friends who died in this earthquake," Vivar said Saturday. He and his wife were at their home in Lima when the earthquake struck

earthquake struck.

"It was the greatest disaster ever to strike our Peru." he said. "We think maybe 200,000 are dead from it."

"We are so thankful for the help President Nixon and America gave us afterward," he added.

Vivar met President Nixon when he visited Peru while he was vice president.

"Our countries are becoming closer and it is this increased friendship and cultural exchange I hope to increase as consul in Fort Worth," said Vivar.

HIS WIFE WILL leave Peru in two weeks to join the family nere. Especially anx-ious for her arrival are their grandchildren, Mike, Richard and David Mitchell and Carlitos Vivar.

His office will operate un-der the general consulate in Houston.

Its headquarters here will be determined later by Gen. Alvarado, Vivar said.

"The only unfriendly thing in Texas is the summer sun," said Vivar as the mercury Saturday passed the 100-degree mark.

"In Lima the temperature never goes above 80 or below 70."

Jan Holmes Ex-Presidenta de la Mesa I de Fort Worth, Texas For 1967-68 Historian's Press Book (not in archives) DELEGATE'S REPORT OF STATE CONVENTION (33rd) March 3-6, 1967, Dallas, Texas First, to help our new members get the scope of the Pan-American Movement, all of the different Tables work through their State P.A.R.T.. Ours consists of 26 Tables here in Texas, with 153 delegates at the State Convention. The Alliance is made up of the individual State and National P.A.R.Ts of the 21 Republics. There are a total of 100 Tables, which are all basically goverened by the Constitution of the Alliance of Pan American Round Tables, altho each Table keeps its own autonomy. The Alliance holds a Convention once every 2 years, the next being in March of 1968, in Nicaragua. I hope many of us can attend. The Slale holds their Conventions on every other odd year.
Our Table works with the State through our 2 committees: The Interchange Library and the Friendship Committee, to help further

better understanding between the countries.

For the past 4 years the Tables of Texas have given 145 Subscriptions to the Reader's Digest through the Interchange Library for Latin American Tables, as our State Project.

The Friendship Committee Chairman, working at the State's suggestion, reminds the individual Chairmen of the Countries to send cards of greeting on the foreign Independence Days, Christmas and Pan American Week. Through personal gestures like this foreign friendships are made.

Here are some ideas we were given from the Reports of other Tables at the State Convention:

- No. 1. Many Texas Tables made a donation to the Florence Terry Griswold Scholarship Fund in monor of one of their deceased members. This year Miss Etta Zarate, of Panama, was the lovely recipient.
- No. 2. Most all Tables responded to the State Interchange Library's Project, the sending of subscriptions. It was believed the subscriptions would be more enjoyable if the English version were sent, to give the Latin-Americans more practice in their Study of English. Many small cities can not buy foreign editions.
- No. 3. Some Tables had Costume Reviews, with donations as admittance, going to a Pan American Student Forum top student.
- No. 4. Some Tables answered their monthly roll call with 3 members each month bringing something from ... or telling something about ... their country.
- No. 5. One Table had members (who could sew) get together for a sewing bee and make Flags of the 21 Republics in large sizes. This would be fun, wouldn't it?
- No. 6. Some Tables had members donate books pertaining to Latin-America to their Public Library for a PanAmerican shelf.

- No. Ø. Most Texas Tables studied Spanish with a Latin American, as we do.
- No. 8. One Table had a Booth at their Livestock Show, manned in Costumes, with information on Latin America for the Public.

 You know, many have never heard of the Pan American Round Table.
- No. 9. Our own P.A.R.T. One is contributing on a Hemispheric basis by editing and Publishing 3 or 4 times a year the Alliance Bulletin. This is sent to all the Directors of the Tables, State and Alliance Board in Mexico, Cent. America and South America. This month a Special 17-page Pan American Week Issue was mailed to **Exmembers as well, coming to 525 copies, which will help in the exchange of news in the two languages.

Mø//10/ There were many more good ideas, among them, individual Tables sponsoring their own Scholarship Student, as we do with Maria Rejas from Mexico.
