THE BOTANICAL GARDENS

The Botanical Gardens, containing approximately 50,000 plants, represent over thirty-five years of development. In the collections are rare and unusual evergreens and deciduous shrubs and trees from every continent. Fifty of the 200 acres comprising the estate are open to visitors; the remainder is used for experimental purposes. Studding the broad lawns are many fine specimens of California native oaks. The large mesa oak between the Art Gallery and the Library is about 200 years old and has a spread of 100 feet.

Oriental Garden. A small canyon transformed into an oriental garden with traditional ornaments. The moon bridge with its weeping elm provides the center of interest. In the bellhouse is an eighteenth-century bronze bell. Floral features are wisteria vines, rhododendrons, flowering peach, plum, and cherry. AZALEAS and CAMELLIAS are each present in 100 varieties, here as well as north of the Art Gallery.

Desert Plant Garden. Fifteen acres contain the largest collection of mature specimens of cacti and other succulents, growing out-of-doors, in the world. Begun in 1907 as a half-acre garden, the collection now numbers over 25,000 plants, representing 2,500 species and varieties. The most numerous and spectacular group is that of the cacti, native to the Western Hemisphere; they bloom in the spring and summer. Hundreds of succulents other than cacti, notably the South African aloes, provide color in the winter months.

CYCAD COLLECTION. About 50 specimens of these aged varieties from Asia, Australia, Japan, Mexico, and South Africa grow near the Art Gallery. Some resemble tree ferns; others, palms.

PALM COLLECTION. Two hundred specimens, collected from both hemispheres, occupy two acres between the Art Gallery and the Desert Plant Garden.

THE LIBRARY

The Library building was completed in 1920. In addition to the exhibit rooms, there are rooms for staff and research workers, and two air-conditioned vaults for irreplaceable material. The rare-book vault contains approximately 150,000 items; the manuscript stack houses about one million letters and documents. The great majority of the books and manuscripts were collected by Mr. Huntington between 1907 and 1927.

The collections center on English and American history and literature. A selection of manuscripts and printed books of general interest is on permanent display; among the principal items are:

The Ellesmere manuscript of Chaucer's Canterbury Tales, made about 1410

The Gutenberg Bible (Mainz, about 1450-55), the first printed Bible and the earliest large book produced, in Europe, with movable types

The first book printed in the English language, The Recuyell of the Historyes of Troye; printed at Bruges, by Caxton and Mansion, in 1475

The first collected edition of Shakespeare's plays, printed in 1623, known as the "First Folio"

The "Richard King Portolano," made about 1502; one of the earliest manuscript maps showing a portion of the American continent

Benjamin Franklin's Autobiography in his own handwriting, 1771-78

There are also frequent special exhibitions of literary and historical interest.

THE ARABELLA D. HUNTINGTON MEMORIAL ART COL-LECTION is in the west wing of the Library building. It was established by Mr. Huntington as a memorial to his wife. In the **Renaissance Room** is a small collection of Italian and Flemish paintings of the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries. In the **French Sculpture Gallery** are seventeen pieces of eighteenth-century sculpture. In other rooms are collections of French furniture, tapestries, and porcelains of the same period.

THE ART GALLERY


Completed in 1910 as a residence for the Founder, the building has been only slightly altered and extended. It is of modified Georgian architecture. The rooms of the house are interesting as reproductions of eighteenth-century French and English models.

There are seven principal galleries and fifteen smaller galleries and halls, in which are shown approximately 400 objects of art, including about 65 paintings, and tapestries, furniture, rugs, clocks, porcelains, and miniatures produced in England and France in the eighteenth century. Virtually all of these were acquired by Mr. Huntington between 1910 and 1927.

The principal collection is a representative group of eighteenth-century British paintings, including characteristic works in portraiture and landscape. Among the canvases exhibited are ten paintings by Gainsborough, nine by Reynolds, eleven by Romney, and three by Lawrence. Constable, Hogarth, Hoppner, Kneller, Raeburn, Ramsay, Stuart, and Turner, among others, are represented.

The most popular paintings include "Sarah Siddons as The Tragic Muse" by Sir Joshua Reynolds, "Pinkie" by Sir Thomas Lawrence, and "The Blue Boy" by Thomas Gainsborough.

The principal rooms are the New Gallery; the Dining Room, with its original marble fireplace of about 1755, and set of Georgian chairs; the Small Drawing Room, containing miniature portraits by English painters; the Drawing Room, with a collection of French snuff and sweetmeat boxes; and the Library Room, with Beauvais tapestries and French tapestry-covered chairs and settees. In the Main Hall are cases containing Chelsea porcelains. On the upper floor are an original Georgian Drawing Room and additional examples of English furniture.



The Library, Art Gallery, and Botanical Gardens, together with an endowment for their maintenance, were the ift of Henry Edwards Huntington (1850-1927), who accumulated a fortune largely through development of eal estate in Southern California. In an indenture dated August 30, 1919, Mr. Huntington deeded the institution as a free research library, art gallery, and botanical garden to a self-perpetuating board of trustees, for he use and benefit of all qualified persons. In January, 1928, the exhibitions were opened to the public. Since then over two million visitors have been received; during the same period about 5,000 accredited esearch workers have used the Library. Nearly seventy volumes of studies have been published by the Library.
