A. is Christian in foundation, nonsectarian in program, is equipped with physical education department, and facilities to furnish social life to its members and to open through its library and various study clubs the road for mental progress."

# MICALLANER FLAYS HITLEK

Conditions in four foreign countries out of the 10 he has visited were discussed by Francis S. Harmon, general secretary of the international committee of the Y. M. C. A. at a luncheon given in his honor at the Y. M. C. A. yesterday. Harmon spent the day in Fort Worth conferring with directors and friends.

"The situation in Germany today is due to the Treaty of Versailles," Harmon said. "A crop of German youths who were too young to fight in the World War had expected to be forced by the treaty into virtual slavery. An interesting figure in the person of Adolph Hitler appeared on the scene and they rallied about him, for he promised Germany a way out."

The five evils of Hitlerism, Harmon pointed out, were nationalism, militarism, removal of women from the factory to the home, un-Christian treatment of Jews and lack of free speech and free press.

"One rabbi told me that one-third of the funerals he preached were of suicides," the Y. M. C. A. official told the group. "The situation in Germany today is

suicides," the Y. M. C. A. official told the group.

The word best typifying Russia is "lines," the guest said. He mentioned lines of people, lines of hay wagons waiting to give 25 per cent of their goods to the party, lines of people

goods to the party, lines of people waiting at government stores to purchase supplies,
"But the longest line of all is the line in front of Lenin's tomb. Every two hours 2,000 people pass there to see this great man. The line has been there since 1926."

The speaker said that people in Russia who are not members of the Communist party are permitted to attend church, but that religion is considered as superstition and is not ensidered as superstition and is not en-couraged.

He said the only place one can study for the Russian priesthood is in a Y. M. C. A. camp at Paris.

Harmon said that mothers received 56 days' pay before a child was born and 56 days' pay afterwards. All hospital bills are paid by the state.

He spoke briefly on Czecho-Slovakia and Poland, praising conditions in these countries.

Harmon arrived in this country

Harmon arrived in this country from Europe about two weeks ago. He will sail for the Orient about Jan. 1. Meanwhile, he is making a speaking tour.
