

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

Dear Mr. Worthen:

Thank you for your answers to the questions in my letter of August 22 concerning the historical marker application for the Walker Drugstore. In order to evaluate the structure for possible Recorded Texas Historic Landmark (RTHL) designation, we will need a photograph showing the building's appearance from at least 50 years ago. (We need an actual photograph, not a photocopy.) Also, please send clear current photographs of all sides of the building's exterior.

It seems evident from the one photograph that we do have that the building has undergone some alterations. It would be extremely helpful if you could send us some information as to when the various alterations were made (such as the bricking on the front, changes in window and door openings, any changes to the front porch and/or awning, etc. Any information you can provide concerning the building's original construction history would also be helpful, such as the name the architect or contractor. The building has interesting detail work, and we would like to find out if features such as the front window moldings and the roofline/eaves/brackets were the result of an architect's design for this specific building or if perhaps they came from an architectural pattern book. Also of interest would be any information on historic signage on the building.

As I mentioned in my last letter, we cannot mention any person in a marker inscription who has not been deceased for at least 20 years. For that reason, we will need to title this marker "Walker Drugstore" rather than "Walker-Stribling Drugstore" due to the Striblings' death dates.

Please let me know if you have any questions. Thank you.

Dear Applicant/County Chair:

Our staff has made a preliminary review of the above-referenced marker application. Before we can complete our evaluation, however, we need the following information. We will place the application on hold until all requested material has been received.

- Do you have any information concerning the construction of the building? Was it already on the property when Dr. Steward sold it in 1884?

- Who first operated the drugstore? Was it L. T. W. Reynolds? Did Reynolds operate the drugstore while Steward owned the property? Please see page 2 of the narrative history re. Dr. Steward's selling of the property in 1884 and Reynolds "in the drug business in Azle since 1882".

- Was this the only drugstore in Azle until 1963? doubter

- Please provide the death dates of James H. and Byra Wood Stribling. Because we cannot mention people in historical markers who have been deceased for less than 20 years, we may not be able to use the Walker-Stribling name in the title.

- Do you want a subject marker for the drugstore as a business, or a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark marker for the building? Although the building seems to have undergone some alterations, the architectural historians feel that in the Azle context it may have merit for the RTHL designation. If you would like to pursue this possibility, please submit at least one historic photo of the structure. [Also, if the owner were to undertake restoration with the advice of THC architects, the building might qualify for preservation tax credits -- see the enclosed literature.] - Sent to Paul Worthum

- Should we send copies of correspondence to the owner, Paul Worthen? (Neither "yes" nor "no" was checked for that question on the application form.) Walker-Stribling Drugstore/Tarrant County request for additional information page 2

This letter is to notify you that we have received the above referenced marker application. Your application will be reviewed and evaluated by the Texas Historical Commission staff in the order in which it has been received. Currently, there is a 5-6 month wait between the time subject marker applications are received and evaluated. Because applications for Recorded Texas Historic Landmark designations (RTHLs) require an architectural review in addition to an historical evaluation, RTHL applications may take slightly longer. Should additional information be needed for the review, we will contact you at that time. After any deficiencies have been corrected, we will send copies of your application to the members of the State Marker Committee, who will make the final determination of the topic's acceptability for marking.

We will notify you as soon as the marker committee makes its decision. If the topic is approved for marking, payment will be requested at that time. If not approved, the application will be returned along with a letter of explanation.

Because of the variables involved in the marker process, and because we must coordinate our orders with the schedule of the contracting foundry, we suggest that you do not set the date of your marker dedication until you are notified that the completed marker has been shipped from the foundry.





### WALKER-STRIBLING DRUG STORE

The old drug store, hub of Azle community activities, is located at 117 W. Main Street (Loop 344), Azle, TX, approximately .2 mile west of State Highway 199, in Tarrant County, Texas.

The land on which the building is located is part of the Benjamin F. Curtis 160-acre survey (which spans the Tarrant-Parker County line), patented by John Henry Rumpsfeldt on August 9, 1859.<sup>1</sup>

Due to the 1876 Tarrant County Court House fire, no land transfer records are found on this property until March 5, 1875 when Dr. James Azle Steward, Tennessee native and pioneer doctor, and Mary E. Steward, his wife, donated a 5-acre site for the Ash Creek Baptist Church and school.<sup>2</sup>

In 1883, Dr. James Azle Steward offered to donate land and assist with establishing a town if the post office name were changed to "Azle" (his middle name) rather than "O'Bar" which it had been called since September 5, 1881. The U. S. Postal Service officially approved the post office name change to "Azle" on November 6, 1883.<sup>3</sup>

Surveying and platting of the 13-1/2-acre town site for the Village of Azle were completed and filed at the Tarrant County Court House on February 8, 1894, five years after Dr. Steward's death on April 29, 1889.<sup>4</sup>

The property on which the old drug store was located

(originally a 50' x 100' lot known as Lot 2, Block 2) was sold by Dr. Steward and his wife to J. H. Wayland of Parker County for \$10 on January 24,  $1884.^5$ 

The next transfer of record on this property occurred July 27, 1888 when Lewis Thomas Wigfall "Wig" Reynolds, who had been in the drug business in Azle since 1882, moved to Weatherford and sold to J. R. Walker "One house and lot in the Village of Azle and known as Lot No. 2 in Block No. 2. Also all the drugs in stock..." for the sum of \$1178.<sup>6</sup>

J. R. Walker became the operator of the drug store. In 1900, the Woodmen of the World Azle Camp No. 596 furnished the material and paid for erecting a second story room over the store house of J. R. Walker located on Lot No. 2 of Block No. 2. They owned the second story and had a free and accessible outside entrance separate from that of the store.<sup>7</sup>

On July 22, 1930, J. R. Walker sold to J. L. Pierce the west side of Lot 2, Block 2 (which became Lot 2B, Block 2). Mr. Walker retained the portion on which the drug store was located, which became Lot 2A, Block 2.<sup>§</sup>

In 1931, the Texas Highway Department widened and asphalted the gravel Main Street as Highway 199, taking 40' from the front of each lot along Main Street. An office for the village doctor was added to the back of the drug store prior to the time that Tarrant County moved the drug store to the back part of the lot.<sup>9</sup>

Mr. Walker died on April 5, 1931, leaving a widow, Ida Walker, and nine children. Mrs. Walker and her children operated the drug

store for the next four years.<sup>10</sup>

On April 11, 1935, Mrs. Ida Walker sold the lot and lower floor of the building to James H. and Byra Woody Stribling, a young couple from Fort Worth. Mr. Stribling bought equipment and stock for the store from a drug store in Greenwood (Wise County) that was being sold. Mrs. Stribling worked for the phone company in Azle for the first two years in order to help her husband start the new drug store.<sup>11</sup>

The Striblings realized that their customers, primarily farmers and ranchers, needed the drug store to be open during the evening. Mrs. Stribling quit her job with the phone company to help run the drug store and keep it open from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m.<sup>12</sup>

Mr. Stribling put in a Delco system of electricity and had the first electric lights in Azle.<sup>13</sup> Other changes to the building occurred when an out-of-control car crashed into the drug store, resulting in removal of the guard rail and replacement of the plank porch and four-pane windows with a concrete porch and full-pane store windows.<sup>14</sup>

An old bench on the front porch served as a gathering place where men sat to chew tobacco, spin yarns, and exchange news about friends and neighbors.<sup>15</sup>

During the depression years of the 1930's, Stribling Drug Store was a commodities distribution center for the needy.<sup>16</sup>

In the 1940's and 1950's, the drug store served as a Continental Trailways agency station and transfer point on bus routes from Fort Worth to Wichita Falls to points north as well as

routes from Fort Worth to Seymour to points west.<sup>17</sup>

Downstairs, there was a doctor's office in the rear of the building and a small library in the corner of the drug store where Byra Stribling served as Azle's second librarian.<sup>18</sup>

The upstairs was used for community meetings and activities which included the Azle Civic League, town hall, Precinct 4 court room, and polling place for elections.<sup>19</sup>

Clubs which met upstairs included the garden club, Rebekah Lodge and Eastern Star. The Rebekah Lodge met there twice-a-month from its organization in 1950 until 1976 when the stairs became too difficult for some of its members.<sup>20</sup>

A 1950 property plat revision of Lot 2, Block 2 indicated a 2.5' encroachment of the sidewalk used by the lodge on the west side of the drug store and a 1.2 foot encroachment of a concrete entry porch on the east side.<sup>21</sup>

In 1957, the Texas Highway Department rerouted State Highway 199 and designated Main Street as Spur 344.<sup>22</sup> Thereafter, the bulk of the busy highway traffic no longer passed in front of the Stribling Drug Store.

In 1963, the Striblings sold their drug stock and equipment to Milton Tompkins, who went into business elsewhere, ending the many years of existence of a drug store at that location.<sup>23</sup>

On April 13, 1963, the Striblings rented their old drug store building to Paul L. Worthen, who, along with Franklin C. Couch, opened C & W Electronics. Mr. Worthen, who bought out his partner in 1967, rented the building until September 25, 1978 when he purchased the old Stribling drug store building from Jay Woody Stribling, son of James H. and Byra Stribling.<sup>24</sup>

When Mr. Worthen bought the building, the Woodmen of the World's rights and interest in the upper story of the building had been preserved in deed conveyences from the Walkers and the Striblings. In 1983, Paul Worthen received a quit claim deed for the second floor of the building from the Gipson Rebekah Lodge #460, who had not used it since 1976. However, no record exists of the Rebekah Lodge's acquisition of ownership in the second floor.<sup>25</sup>

The old drug store, oldest remaining commercial building on Main Street in Azle, Texas, was a hub of community activities during the many years of its existence.<sup>26</sup>

In 1900, the Azle Camp furnished material and paid for erecting a second story over the J. R. Walker drug store for use as a meeting place.

In the 1930's the upstairs room was used as a meeting place by many other civic, community and fraternal groups -- including the Eastern Star and Rebekah Lodge.

In 1983, the Gipson Rebekah Lodge gave a quit claim deed for the upstairs to Paul Worthen who owned the rest of the building and land. This group was organized November 13, 1950 and met in the upstairs room until 1976.

I'm trying to trace the ownership of the upstairs. When did the Azle Camp transfer ownership of the upstairs? Was it sold or given directly to the Rebekah Lodge or did another group own the upstairs for a time?

This is not a detailed critique as the problems are too numerous. This is just to give you some idea of the problems.

She needs detailed help with the form of the narrative. Heading, style etc.

There is much in the narrative which does not belong there. She should exclude the history of Azle, and people who are not concerned with this subject. Azle history which puts the store within a context is the only history that should be included.

I made notes on the narrative which will probably be confusing, so maybe this will help a little.

Eliminate the first paragraph. It really has nothing to do with the marker subject.

The second paragraph might read "The Stribling Drug Store is located on the Benjamin F. Curtis 160 acre survey patented by John Henry Rumpsfeldt on August 9, 1859". We don't know that Steward lived on a Rumpsfeldt farm, only that he owned land that Rumpsfeldt once owned. The statement about Reynolds is out of place as there has been no previous mention of him. He returned? Had he been there earlier? Who was he and why was he mentioned?

Page 2 para 1 - Part of this is redundant, part is necessary. How does the school tie in to the story? The deed quoted reads the Rumpsfeldt Survey, not the Curtis Survey. Does this deed have any meaning to the narrative?

Page 3 Land donated was in the Curtis Survey, not the Rumpsfeldt Survey.

Eliminate or reword the post office statement.

Two men are referred to as brothers, yet there is 35 years difference in their ages according to her narrative. Eliminate the buffalo trail and other undocumented language. He received his Board of Pharmacy Certificate in 1890 after leaving town. Put sentences in right order.

Eliminate last paragraph as it has nothing to do with the drug store.

Page 4 Eliminate first two paragraphs.

Paragraph 3 - Says he tore down the drug store in 1900. Then goes on to tell about the building in 1906. Needs to make a statement about building a new building, when, who built etc.

From documentation this seems to have been Lot 2 Block 2. Give

further location. Street etc. The sentence beginning "On February" should give more complete information. "On February 5, 1906. Walker sold the upstairs of the building to the Azle Camp of the Woodmen of the World, free and clear, with an outside entrance " Check and see if they did not also have a right to a sidewalk.

Eliminate childrens games.

If the last sentence about nearby building is pertinent, reword.

Page 5 para 1 - Walker sold a part of lot 2. Give details. 21' x 160 ' out of the west side of lot 2. Look at the documents and see it was not lot 2A rather than 2b.

Is Tarrant County Highway Department the correct terminology?

Explain that the highway was widened and the building moved. Was building moved back on the same lot?

Ida Walker sold the first floor of the building and the lot. Why was it then empty?

Put the fact the following material was by Stribling in the footnote.

Page 6 See notes on page

Page 7 Eliminate last paragraph down to courtroom. Was the courtroom in the drugstore? If not eliminate. How and why was Judge Bowman famous?

Page 8. Eliminate sentence marked.

Encroachment complaint. Explain.

Eliminate last paragraph.

Page 9 - Reword first sentence and give incorporation date here. Give date he left.

Reword sentence beginning "In 1963". It could read "In 1963 James H. and Byra Stribling sold their stock and equipment to Milton Thompkins, who sent into business elsewhere, ending the many years of the drugs stores existence." - or something similar.

Para 2. Eliminate if not a building landmark marker application. as the story of the drug store is finished. If she want a building marker, Landmark status, then she needs to continue to take the history of the building to the present. If a Landmark marker is wanted then they will need detailed photographs of all sides of the building, and some drawing of the building dimension etc. Look at your marker application for what that entails.

Last page. Eliminate the last part that is marked. Dee Barker

August 9, 1959.

In 1906, Woodmen of the WORLD asked if they could BUILD a TOP FLOOR to Walker's LARGE DRUG STORE, He gave them Permission by Deed. (1)

Ida Walker sold the lower EMPTY BUILDING on: Lot 2 Block 2 to James H. and Byra Stribling, a young couple from Ft Worth, Texas on April 11, 1935. (2) Byra Stribling heard through her Aunt that a private owned Company was bringing a SWITCHBOARD to Azle area that provided a house, a small garden spot, plus a \$60 monthly Salary for the Operator.

She applied and got the Job and worked TWO YEARS to help her Husband get started. (3)

Since the Striblimgs had bought an EMPTY BUILDING at 117 W Main, they had to Re-Stock, EQUIPMENT and DRUGS, to have a Drug Store. (4)

Bill Stribling said: "Dad, heard of a Drug Store in Greenwood for sale, near present day Slidell, Texas in Wise County. He DASHED over there, BOUGHT IT, loaded and brought the stock and equipment to his Azle store. He never knew what happened to his Building, that he left at Greenwood, Texas." (5)

After Byra Stribling worked two years at the Private phone Company. She and her husband decided that the Cattlemen and Farmers needed morning and evening hours, so they decided to work in shifts at the Drug Store at 117 W Main Street. (6)

BYRA was HEARD to say, "Moving out here: to a House with no CONVENIENCES with a small baby to care for, it is just awful." (7)

Jay Woody was lacking one day, being FOUR YEARS OLD when the DEED was signed. (8)

Mr Stribling put in, a Delco system of electricity, so they had the FIRST ELECTRIC LIGHTS in Village of Azle. (9)

Other changes to the Building, occurred when an OUT-OF-CONTROL-CAR CRASHED into the Drug Store, resulting in the removal of Guard-Rail, replacement of the plank porch and four-paned windows, plus, they had to put in a Concrete porch. They put in LARGE-PANED STORE WINDOWS at this time to plan for his STORE for the FUTURE. (10)

Bill Stribling shared the Memory of the: BENCH on the front PORCH, that served as a gathering place for men to sit chew tobacco, spin yarns, and exchange news about their Friends and Neighbors. It was here that Bill heard OLDTIMERS tell NEWCOMERS, how Mr Walker tore down the TINY Drug Store and built the LARGE STREET-FLOOR DRUG STORE. Then the MEN spoke of Mr Walker allowing the WOODMEN OF THE WORLD by DEED, to build a meeting Room up-stairs with an East ENTRANCE and SIDEWALK to Street so that they would have a PRIVATE ENTRANCE. (11)

During the DEPRESSION YEARS of 1930's, the Drug store served as a Commodities-Center for the NEEDY. (12)

Mr. Faris Ross, Newspaper Editor, of "AZLE BOOSTER", and President, of Civic League, and one of Azle's most ardent Boosters' in 1936 asked famous Speakers to Come to their

з

Community to speak. Then, he put amother article in his paper expressing THANKS. (13)

In the 'Azle Booster' dated April 3, 1936, there was an article about the extension of ELECTRIC SERVICE to Azle. Mr Faris Ross, as Civic League President, had invited James V. Aldred, Govenor of Texas, to speak to their great progress as a Community. (14)

Faris Ross worked to get a LARGE Crowd for the CELEBRATION. He drew 1,500 to the small auditorium of the High School. There was STANDING room only, in a Community of 250 residents. In this Edition, the Governor said, "I enjoyed the Azle Community. You have a Wonderful Community." in the Newspaper. (15)

During the 1940's and the 1950's the Drug Store served as the Contental Trail Ways Agency Station and Transfer point on Bus routes: from Ft Worth to Wichita Falls to the north, as well as, from Fort Worth to Seymour then to the West. (16)

Downstairs, Walker had built in a Doctor's Office, a Restroom, and an area for a library where Byra served as the second Librarian. (17)

During the Stribling years, the UPSTAIRS was an active place, where it was used for Committee Meetings, which

included Azle Civic League, Town Hall, Precinct 4 Meeting Room, and polling place for Elections. (18)

Clubs that met up there: the Garden Club, Rebekah Lodge and Eastern Star until the stairs became too difficult for some of the Members, then they moved over to the Christian Church on July 12, 1976. Some of the Members had passed away. (19)

Byra Stribling was a Lifetime Member of both the Eastern Star and the Rebekah Lodge. (20)

Byra Stribling was a Charter Member of the AZLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY and the DEMOCRATIC PRECINCT CHAIRMAN for 20 or MORE YEARS in the EARLIER years. (21)

In 1950, an ENCROACHMENT COMPLAINT came against the stairs and sidewalk of the Drug Store, which also, gave the death of J. R. Walker, in the AFFIDAVIT. Archie Forrester, Walker's son-in-law, in a property-plat-Revision of: Lot 2, Block 2 indicated 2.5' encroachment of the sidewalk on the east side and 1.2' foot encroachment of the concrete entry porch, so Archie took care of the problems. (22)

In 1957, the Texas Highway Department re-routed State Highway 199 and designated Main Street as Spur 344. Thereafter, the bulk of TRAFFIC, no longer passed in front of the Stribling Drug Store. (23)

On April 13, 1957, a RUMOR CAME, that Ft Worth was planning to ANNEX the Village of Azle. The Azle leadership went to the Ft Worth Council and they LEARNED HOW to INCORPORATE their Community. (24)

They organized and held an ELECTION with 152 FOR INCORPORATION, and 127 AGAINST, thus, they became the City of Azle, Texas." in 1957 to elect their OFFICERS: (25)

In 1957, the City was ruled as a: General Law City in the: State of Texas with a Mayor and City Council so

The Striblings sold their DRUGS and EQUIPMENT to Milton Thompson, who moved away, thus ENDING 36 years of LARGE DRUG STORE (or the LOWER FLOOR of the Present building)

plus the 18 years as a TINY DRUG STORE on the same spot of Lot 2, Block 2 in the OUTPOST that became the AZLE, TEXAS of 1992. (39)

The TOP FLOOR was built in 1906 by: WOODMEN OF THE WORLD as their MEETING PLACE (40)

April 13, 1969, The Striblings rented the EMPTY

building to Paul Worthen and his friend, Franklin Couch to

open as:

C & W ELECTONICS

Two years later, Paul Worthen bought the ELECTRICAL matrials from his Partner, Mr Couch, when he moved to Commanche, Texas to set up his own shop. (41)

During the late 1960's and early 1970's, the STRIBLINGS travel. (42)

Thus, Paul Worthen was still a RENTER for a TOTAL of 15 years and 10 days. (43)

Mr Stribling passed away on November 12, 1974, thus, Byra Stribling deeded the store to Jay Woody Stribling, the oldest son, at the time he was in town. She also deeded their Home to Bill Stribling. (44)

Jay Woody Stribling kept the store FOUR YEARS after their Mother died. (45)

On September 25, 1978, Jay Woody Stribling sold the store to Paul Worthen. (46)

When Paul Worthen bought the building, the Woodmen of the World's rights and interest in the upper story of the building had been preserved in Deed conveyances from the Walkers and the Striblings. (47)

In 1983, Paul Worthen received a Quit Claim for the Second floor from the Gipson Rebekah Lodge #460, who had not used it since 1976. (48)

Woodmen of the World, Azle Camp No 596 had furnished Materials, and Paid for erection by Deed to Mr Walker, the Owner at that time, thus, No record exists of Rebekah Lodge ownership because they were NOT in on the Building of it in 1906. (49)

This LOWER Floor was the Drug Store that was BUILT in 1908 by J. R. Walker and it is 92 years old this year. (50)

The TOP Floor was added by Woodmen of the World and it was built in 1906, so it is 86 years old this year. (51)

So, this lower floor is this OLDEST remaining COMMERCIAL building in Azle on the SAME spot where Wig Reynolds built his TINY DRUG STORE on Lot 2, Block 2 in 1882. (52)

J. R. Walker had used the TINY DRUG STORE for 12 years before he tore it down, to build his STREET floor: or LARGE ONE in 1900. (53)

community done store The old Stribling Drug Store, hub of Azle community activities from 1935 until 1963, is located at 117 W. Main Street (Loop 344), Azle, TX, approximately .2 mile west of State Highway 199, in Tarrant County, Texas.

The land on which the building is located is part of the Benjamin F. Curtis 160-acre survey (which spans the Tarrant-Parker County line), patented by John Henry Rumpsfeldt on August 9, 1859.1

Early Tarrant County property records were destroyed in 1878 when the Tarrant County Court House burned; therefore, land records Rue to the 1876 wist only for those transfers which were re-filed after the fire. No records and some of land transfers with march 5, 1875 when

The sale of the Benjamin F. Curtis 160-acre survey by John Henry Rumpsfeldt to Dr. James A. Steward, Tennessee native and have pioneer doctor, and Mary E. However, the Stewards were owners of the land on March 5, 1875, when they donated a 5acre site for the Ash Creek Missionary Baptist Church and school.<sup>2</sup>

> In 1883, Dr. James Azle Steward offered to donate land for a town site if the post office name were changed to "Azle" (his Calles middle name) rather than "O'Bar" which it had been called since September 5, 1881, The U. S. Postal Service officially approved the name change to "Azle" on November 6, 1883, 3 in honor of

Dr Steerad.

Recopying and refiling of deeds and surveying and platting of the 13-1/2-acre town site for the Village of Azle were completed and filed at the Tarrant County Court House on February 8, 1894, five years after Dr. Steward's death on April 29, 1889.<sup>4</sup>

The property on which the old Stribling Drug Store is located (originally a 50' x 100' lot known as Lot 2, Block 2) was sold by Dr. Steward and his wife to J. H. Wayland of Parker County for \$10 on January 24, 1884.<sup>5</sup>

In 1888, Lewis Thomas Wigfall "Wig" Reynolds, who had been in the drug business in Azle since 1882, sold the drug store on Lot 2, Function Roter to Block 2 and moved to Weatherford.<sup>6</sup> A warranty deed dated July 27, 1888 shows Wig Reynolds selling to J. R. Walker, "One house and lot in the Village of Azle and known as Lot No. 2 in Block No. 2. Also all the drugs in stock..." for the sum of \$1178.<sup>7</sup>

J. R. Walker became the operator of the drug store. In 1900, the building either burned or was torn down and a new two-story structure built. The Woodmen of the World Azle Camp No. 596 furnished the material and paid for erecting a second story room over store house of J. R. Walker located on Lot No. 2 of Block No. 2. They also had a free and accessible outside entrance from the back.

On July 22, 1930, J. R. Walker sold to J. L. Pierce the west side of Lot 2, Block 2 (which became Lot 2B, Block 2). Mr. Walker retained the portion on which the drug store was located, which became Lot 2A, Block 2.<sup>9</sup>

In 1931, the Texas Highway Department widened and asphalted

the gravel Main Street as Highway 199, taking 40' from the front of Locut the lots along Main Street. A<sup>N</sup>small office for the village doctor had been added to the back of the drug store prior to the time that Tarrant County moved the drug store to the back part of the lot.<sup>10</sup>

Mr. Walker died on April 5, 1931, leaving a widow, Ida Walker, and nine children. Mrs. Walker and her children operated the drug store for the next four years.<sup>11</sup>

On April 11, 1935, Mrs. Ida Walker sold the empty drug store building to James H. and Byra Woody Stribling, a young couple from Fort Worth. Mr. Stribling bought equipment and stock for the store from a drug store in Greenwood (Wise County) that was being sold.<sup>12</sup> Mrs. Stribling worked for the phone company in Azle for the first two years in order to help her husband start the new drug store.<sup>13</sup>

The Striblings realized that their customers, primarily farmers and ranchers, needed the drug store to be open during the evening. Mrs. Stribling quit her job with the phone company to help run the drug store and keep it open from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m.<sup>14</sup>

Mr. Stribling put in a Delco system of electricity and had the first electric lights in Azle.<sup>15</sup> Other changes to the building occurred when an out-of-control car crashed into the drug store, resulting in removal of the guard rail and replacement of the plank porch and four-pane windows with a concrete porch and full-pane store windows.<sup>16</sup>

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An old bench on the front porch served as a gathering place where men sat to chew tobacco, spin yarns, and exchange news about friends and neighbors.<sup>17</sup>

During the depression years of the 1930's, Stribling Drug Store was a commodities distribution center for the needy.<sup>18</sup>

In the 1940's and 1950's, the drug store served as a Continental Trailways agency station and transfer point on bus routes from Fort Worth to Wichita Falls to points north as well as routes from Fort Worth to Seymour to points west.<sup>19</sup>

Downstairs, there was a doctor's office and a small library in the corner of the drug store where Byra Stribling served as Azle's second librarian.<sup>20</sup>

The upstairs was used for community meetings and activities which included the Azle Civic League, town hall, chamber of commerce, Precinct 4 court room, and polling place for elections.<sup>21</sup>

Clubs which met upstairs included the garden club, Rebekah Lodge and Eastern Star. The Rebekah Lodge met there twice-a-month from its organization in 1950 until 1976 when the stairs became too difficult for some of its members.<sup>22</sup> Dir thuy buy and year

A 1950 property plat revision of Lot 2, Block 2 indicated a 2.5' encroachment of the sidewalk used by the lodge on the east side of the drug store and a 1.2 foot encroachment of a concrete entry porch on the west side.<sup>23</sup>

When

In 1957, the Texas Highway Department rerouted State Highway 199 and designated Main Street as Spur 344.<sup>24</sup> Thereafter, the bulk of the busy highway traffic no longer passed in front of the Stribling Drug Store.

In 1963, the Striblings sold their drug stock and equipment to Milton Tompkins, who went into business elsewhere, ending the many

years of existence of a drug store at that location.<sup>25</sup>

On April 13, 1963, the Striblings rented their old drug store building to Paul L. Worthen, who, along with Franklin C. Couch, opened C & W Electronics. Mr. Worthen, who bought out his partner in 1967, rented the building until September 25, 1978 when he purchased the old Stribling drug store building from Jay Woody Stribling, son of James H. and Byra Stribling.<sup>26</sup>

When Mr. Worthen bought the building, the Woodmen of the World's rights and interest in the upper story of the building had been preserved in deed conveyences from the Walkers and the Striblings. In 1983, Paul Worthen received a quit claim deed for the top floor of the building from the Gipson Rebekah Lodge #460, who had not used it since 1976.<sup>27</sup> The old Stribling drug store, owned by Paul L. Worthen, is the

The old Stribling drug store, owned by Paul L. Worthen, is the oldest remaining commercial building on Main Street in Azle, Texas. Stribling Drug Store was a hub of community activities during the almost 30 years it was owned and operated by James L. and Byra Woody Stribling.<sup>28</sup> Many years of its existance,

This is not a detailed critique as the problems are too numerous. This is just to give you some idea of the problems.

She needs detailed help with the form of the narrative. Heading, style etc.

There is much in the narrative which does not belong there. She should exclude the history of Azle, and people who are not concerned with this subject. Azle history which puts the store within a context is the only history that should be included.

I made notes on the narrative which will probably be confusing, so maybe this will help a little.

Eliminate the first paragraph. It really has nothing to do with the marker subject.

The second paragraph might read "The Stribling Drug Store is located on the Benjamin F. Curtis 160 acre survey patented by John Henry Rumpsfeldt on August 9, 1859". We don't know that Steward lived on a Rumpsfeldt farm, only that he owned land that Rumpsfeldt once owned. The statement about Reynolds is out of place as there has been no previous mention of him. He returned? Had he been there earlier? Who was he and why was he mentioned?

Page 2 para 1 - Part of this is redundant, part is necessary. How does the school tie in to the story? The deed quoted reads the Rumpsfeldt Survey, not the Curtis Survey. Does this deed have any meaning to the narrative?

Page 3 Land donated was in the Curtis Survey, not the Rumpsfeldt Survey.

Eliminate or reword the post office statement.

Two men are referred to as brothers, yet there is 35 years difference in their ages according to her narrative. Eliminate the buffalo trail and other undocumented language. He received his Board of Pharmacy Certificate in 1890 after leaving town. Put sentences in right order.

Eliminate last paragraph as it has nothing to do with the drug store.

Page 4 Eliminate first two paragraphs.

Paragraph 3 - Says he tore down the drug store in 1900. Then goes on to tell about the building in 1906. Needs to make a statement about building a new building, when, who built etc.

From documentation this seems to have been Lot 2 Block 2. Give

further location. Street etc. The sentence beginning "On February" should give more complete information. "On February 5, 1906, Walker sold the upstairs of the building to the Azle Camp of the Woodmen of the World, free and clear, with an outside entrance." Check and see if they did not also have a right to a sidewalk.

Eliminate childrens games.

If the last sentence about nearby building is pertinent, reword.

Page 5 para 1 - Walker sold a part of lot 2. Give details. 21' x 160 ' out of the west side of lot 2. Look at the documents and see it was not lot 2A rather than 2b.

Is Tarrant County Highway Department the correct terminology?

Explain that the highway was widened and the building moved. Was building moved back on the same lot?

Ida Walker sold the first floor of the building and the lot. Why was it then empty?

Put the fact the following material was by Stribling in the footnote.

Page 6 See notes on page

Page 7 Eliminate last paragraph down to courtroom. Was the courtroom in the drugstore? If not eliminate. How and why was Judge Bowman famous?

Page 8. Eliminate sentence marked.

Encroachment complaint. Explain.

Eliminate last paragraph.

Page 9 - Reword first sentence and give incorporation date here. Give date he left.

Reword sentence beginning "In 1963". It could read "In 1963 James H. and Byra Stribling sold their stock and equipment to Milton Thompkins, who sent into business elsewhere, ending the many years of the drugs stores existence." - or something similar.

Para 2. Eliminate if not a building landmark marker application, as the story of the drug store is finished. If she want a building marker, Landmark status, then she needs to continue to take the history of the building to the present. If a Landmark marker is wanted then they will need detailed photographs of all sides of the building, and some drawing of the building dimension etc. Look at your marker application for what that entails.

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Byra Stribling heard through her aunt, that a privately owned Phone Company was bringing a SWITCHBOARD to Azle area, which provided a home, a small garden spot, plus a salary of \$60 per month for the Operator. She applied for the job and worked for two years to help her husband get started. Since they had bought an empty building at 117 W Main, they had to re-stock it with EQUIPMENT and STOCK. Bill Stribling told this story: " Dad, James H. Stribling, heard of a drug store at Greenwood that was for sale in Wise County, near Slidell, He DASHED over there, BOUGHT it, loaded up the EQUIPMENT and STOCK, BROUGHT it to his AZLE STORE. He never knew what happened to his Greenwood building. (29)

Mr Ross in his AZLE BOOSTER inserted Governor Aldred's quote: "I enjoyed my visit to Azle TREMENDOUSLY !! You have a WONDEBFUL COMMUNITY! #### BACKGROUND

#### OUT-POST, A BUSY PLACE

This TWO-BLOCK little OUT-POST on the NORTH side of Ash Creek Tributary is part of Benjamine F. Curtis 160-acre farm, patented by John Henry Rumpsfeldt on:

### August 9, 1859

to span the Tarrant-Parker County lines. (1)

Our Pioneer Doctor, 'James' Azle Steward came riding a MULE from Tennessee at the age of 21, to this OUTPOST in 1852 and found an EMPTY CABIN, took possession as a Home Base, then later BOUGHT it, from John Henry Rumpsfeldt. Dr 'James' Azle Stewart began to build up his Physcian's practice in TARANT-the new Parker County-and as far in Wise County, to the present Decatur at age 21. Dr 'James' Azle Steward was a well-like NATURAL LEADER in this little OUT-POST of 10 YOUNG FAMILIES. (2)

This little OUT-Post had changed NAMES, this FIFTH TIME when Mr William O'Bar had worked for a Post-Office and received the news back, that Washington D. C. had filed the

name of 'O-Bar' Post Office on: September 5, 1881. Thus, they used his name: 'O-Bar' since HE had worked. It lasted TWO YEARS as the FIFTH name. (3)

1882, the 21 year old, Lewis Thomas Wigfield (Wig) Reynolds had already bought his land. Neither Court House has his deed.

Lewis Thomas Wigfield (Wig) Reynolds, asked Dad, 'John' Giles Reynolds; his CARPENTER-FATHER to help him build A TINY DRUG STORE on his Lot 2, Block 2, to serve his neighbor FAMILY members in time of sickness in 1882.

He built his TINY DRUG STORE on the East side of his HUGH LOT 2, BLOCK 2, that later became TWO LOTS:.

The TINY DRUG STORE had its back on the ASH CREEK Tributary, and faced out, on the BUFFALD TRAIL through the little OUT-Post of D'BAR.

Then, SIX YEARS later, Wig sold his TINY DRUG STORE to James R. Walker on July 27, 1888 for \$1,178.00. (4)

J. R. Walker ran the TINY DRUG STORE for 12 years (1900), then, he tore it down and built the LARGE DRUG STORE on the the same spot of that large lot. (5)

Dr 'James' Azle Steward had an idea while riding home from his patients, that he wanted to share with his friends, so he called them together.

"What do you think? We have a Post Office named O'BAR It has become the FIFTH NAME for our Community."

Then, Dr Steward threw out a challenge: "What do you think about taking an UNUSAL PERMAMENT NAME, for us to Build our IDENTITY and HISTORY on? If you would like to use my middle name, AZLE, I will donate the 13 1\2 acres of land under your homes as a TOWN SITE. We will have it re-Surveyed by the County to be sure of your Boundary Lines.!" The people LIKED the idea. (6)

Then, he reminded them of the 1874 Parker COUNTY Court House fire that burnt all your Deeds in PARKER COUNTY and then the 1878 TARRANT COUNTY COURT HOUSE FIRE BURNT all of your DEEDS, too. Thus, I will need to borrow your DEEDS, to INSERT the words VILLAGE OF AZLE in the proper space. He warned them, it would take MANY MONTHS or YEARS to

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get ALL the deeds copied, while he had to see after his patients too.

To keep Record-Keeping down, he would keep the FINISHED ONES in another room. (7)

Together, they worked on the APPLICATION to go to WASHINGTON D. C. asking the Postal Service to change the TWO-YEAR old name "O'BAR' to the PERMANENT NAME of AZLE, TEXAS. (8)


When Dr 'James' Azle Steward had worked some of TOWN SITE; he talked with his three HEIRS: wife, 'Mary' Elizabeth (Fowler) Steward, His brother, C.A. and Sister-in-Law of Oklahoma City, on his project----that-----if he became..... incapacitated.....

He had seen that the Surveying, platting, deed copying, as well as, going in all kinds of weather to his patients was too much.

After, working steadly, all the first 5 years without rest, he died on April 29, 1889 and was buried with Masonic Honors in his chosen front row next to his ASH CREEK BAPTIST CHURCH where he was one of the CHARTER MEMBERS back on September 9, 1871 at its ORGANIZATIONAL Time. He donated 5 acres for the CHURCH at one time, then at another time he



Down on Ash Creek, a mile or two in a southwesterly direction from Azle and to the north of one of those hills. surrounded by trees, ravines, and the like, where the creek flowed down among the foothills and got lost in the tangled underbrush - there stood the log "Meeting House" that was the original "Ash Creek Missionary Baptist Church." It was also used as a schoolhouse.

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Donated another 10 acres for the Ash Creek Baptist Church.

The FIRST ACRE of Ash Creek Cemetery, that joins the FENCE of the Ash Creek Baptist church was donated by Dr 'James' A. Steward.

The SECOND ACRE west of the road was donated by another Baptist CHARTER-MEMBER, OLD-TIMER 'John' Giles Reynolds. Two men were buried in one of the Ash Creek Cementery in 1871. (10)

Dr James work some of the Town Site; then he talked with his three HEIRS: Wife, 'Mary' Elizabeth (Fowler) Steward, his Brother, C. A. Steward and Sister-in-Law of Oklahoma City, about his PROJECTT---if he became ----INCAPACITATED.... He had seen that the Surveying, platting, Deed Copying, as well, as going in ALL KINDS of weather to see his Patients, was too much.

After working, steadily 5 years without rest, he died on April 29, 1889 and was buried in his CHOSEN LOT, CENTERED immediately, behind his Ash Creek Baptist Church with Masonic Honors. He had donated this Cementery acre in 1871. There were 2 men planted in 1871, eariler, just after his Donation. (11)

The road separates Steward' lot from `John' GILES Reynolds; another ASH CREEK BAPTIST MEMBER who donated, the WEST ACRE about the same time. (12)

January 15, 1894, James Steward's HEIRS began, TWO by TWO, copying the DEEDS that Steward was unable to get done.

They finished them and the other vast holdings that James held, in the next FIVE years. They filed IN the TARRANT COUNTY DEEDS of RECORDs in the DEED INDEX, or if the PERSON lived in PARKER COUNTY, his Deed was file in the WEATHERFORD, Texas COURT HOUSE in their DEEDS of RECORDs, DEED INDEX: likewise other city/s property would need to have gone to DEEDS of RECORDS in their COUNTY COURT HOUSE , DEEDS DF RECORDS. (13)

In the AZLE MUSEUM Top floor, on the EAST WALL, A Frame POSTER Board showing the DRIGINAL AZLE with PIONEERS NAMES listed, (14)

In 1906, the Woodmen of the World, Azle Camp No 596 asked J. R. Walker, that if they furnished the materials and paid the erection, could they put a Meeting Room up over his DRUG STORE with outside door, stairway and a concrete sidewalk, out to the street, on the EAST side of his large drug store. They were given permission with a Deed. (15)

J. R. Walker on July 22, 1930, sold his EXTRA land, on the west side of the Drug Store to J. L. Pierce. (16)

In 1931, the Texas Highway Department widened and asphalted, the graveled Main Street as Highway 199, taking FORTY FEET off of each lot along Main street, while MOVING the STORES further back OFF Main Street. (17)

Ida Walker was left on April 5, 1931, with 9 children when J. R. Walker died leaving Ida with NINE children. They all worked in the store for 4 years. (18)

On April 11, 1935, Ida Walker sold the EMPTY building on Lot 2, Block 2 to James and Byra Stribling, a young couple from Ft Worth. (19)

Jim Nation erected this two-story stone-veneer building on Main Street in 1935-36. A service station and general merchandise store were operated on the ground level and the family lived upstairs. The building was sold to Mr. & Mrs. Ray Morton, who operated a barber shop and a beauty shop. They in turn sold the building to the Azle Woman's Club, who subsequently gave it to the City of Azle for a public library. When the Azle Public Library moved to its new building on Southeast Parkway, the Azle Historical Society organized a museum on the premises in 1976.

11. 165 W. Main Street NR McDonald House

c. 1905

An older house was enlarged and remodeled into this gabled L-plan residence by William McDonald, proprietor of a mercantile business which opened on Main Street in 1906. The post office and First State Bank of Azle operated out of his store. McDonald also owned a cotton gin. He moved his business to Fort Worth in 1914. The McDonald House appears to be eligible for the National Register, based on its association with one of Azle's leading businessmen in the early 1900's and as a representative example of residential building traditions of the time.

12. 168 W. Main Street

Seldon House

1938

W.E. and Johnnie Seldon designed this small stone-veneer house in conjuction with local builder Will Tannahill, and had it built in 1938. They owned a service station and cafe next door on Main Street. The jerkin-headed shallow-sloped gable roofs are unusual for stone houses of the period.

Mrs. Carter was born in Azle and was a lifelong resident. She retired from the Azle post office in 1966 after 26 years.

Mrs. Carter was a former board member of Ash Creek Cemetery Association and was one of the organizers of the Azle Historical Museum Society. She was author of *My Home Town*, a history of Azle. Mrs. Carter was instrumental in obtaining markers for Azle. She was former chairman of Cancer Society and had worked in the United Fund in Azle. She was a charter member of the Rebekah Gipson Lodge in Azle.

Her husband, Atlas Carter, died in 1958.

Survivors: Two sons, W.A. Carter of Azle and Jimmie Carter of Lake Worth; brother, Bill Gipson of Azle; four grandchildren; 10 great-grandchildren; and several great-great-grandchildren.

#### LOBOBLK4

The STRIBLING OLD DRUG STORE became the HUB of the Community Activities from 1935 through 1963, and is the subject of this HISTORICAL SITE.

Mrs Blanche Dameron Schrimshire described Pioneer Life where you saw wild buffalo, turkeys, bobcats, panthers and Indians roaming the valleys and hills in the small outpost about 20 miles northwest of Ft. Worth. In the spring time, the hillsides were covered with wild flowers: red Indian Blankets, yellow wild flowers (Coroposis), large fields of Bluebonnets with a sprinkle of orange butterfly weeds (Penstamons) for contrast, stretched as far as the eyes could see. The creeks and branches named by the early pioneers remain the same today. (1) The rich bottom lands of Clear Fork, the good water, pleasant willows, the cottonwoods along the streams and the vast stretches of sage grass and the prairie hay made this land a golden promise. (2)

The Stribling Two-Story-Drug Store sat in the Benjamin F. Curtis Survey on 160 acre farm patented by 'John' Henry RUMPSFELDT on August 9, 1859. (3) Official Documents now authenticate, that Dr 'James' Azle Steward, the Pioneer Doctor lived on the Rumpsfeldt farm at the time 'John' Giles Reynolds returned from Tennessee with wife and three children in 1854. (4) Dr 'James' Azle Steward was born in 1831 in Tennessee and came to this area, between the ages of 21 and 23 years old to live in the Rumpsfeldt cabin. (5) Settlers came, named the streams, branches and creeks as they built their log cabins on the former farm of 'John; Henry Rumpsfeldt which he had patented on August 9, 1859. He had moved away and was not known in the area. (6)

In 1878, the TARRANT COUNTY COURT HOUSE fire burnt all the Deeds of the filed records. None of the people had refiled their deeds. Dr Steward never Re-Filed even before his death. His Deed of Ownership of the Rumpsfeldt 160 acre farm gave proof that he owned it on March 5, 1875 when he donated FIVE ACRES for building the First little PICKET Church-School for the newly organized (September 9, 1871) ASH CREEK MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH a mile west of 'John' Giles Reynolds' little picket-school-community meeting-house as seen by this EXCERPT: identifying land and the STEWARDS' OWNERSHIP on March 5, 1875: "... being part of the 'John' Henry Rumpsfeldt one-hundred-and sixty-acre Survey or the Carter one-hundred-and sixty-acre Survey to Post ... place of beginning, containing ... FIVE ACRES .... IF NOT SO USED for this purpose ... it is to revert to owners

Coho Smith, GRANDFATHER of Gertie Ansley, taught reading, writing and drawing in the ASH CREEK MISSIONARY Picket-Church-School located on the Hoggard land, back southeast from the present day "Hoggard-Reynolds Cemetery" on S Stewart across Ash Creek out on the ridge beyond and through the tangled bushes that can be seen in distant. It was built

there, a mile west of the 'John' Giles Reynolds' 1850's first picket School-Community building. (8)

NOTE: the most PREVALENT spelling FOUND of 'John' Henry RUMPSFELDT is used. (9)

September 5, 1881, William O'Bar worked and brought a Post Office to the outpost which was re-named for the FIFTH time to O'Bar. (10)

In 1882, 21-year-old, Lewis Thomas Wigfall Reynolds, with the help of his 56-year-old-CARPENTER-Brother, 'John' Giles Reynolds, built the first little drug store on the north side of the winding Ash Creek facing out on the Buffalo Trail through the outpost of O'Bar. Wig Reynolds as his friends called him, moved to Weatherford in 1887. He earned his Pharmacy Certificate later. (11) On July 27, 1888, Wig Reynolds sold his little Drug Store to J. R. Walker. (12)

In 1883, Dr James A. Steward, a highly respected Community Leader, came in, riding on his mule from visiting patients in three counties: Tarrant, Parker, and Wise as far as Decatur. (13) He called his friends together and suggested, since we have a Post Office, what do you think of selecting a permanent, unusual name to build our IDENTITY and HISTORY on?" The people listened. Then, he threw out a challenge. "If you would like to use my middle name AZLE as UNUSUAL, I will donate enough land for our TOWN SITE". They liked the idea, so started the paper work preparation to the Washington D.C. Postal Service to change the name from O'Bar

to AZLE. The official paper came back November 6, 1883 thus, they could use Azle on their mail. (14)

Dr Steward reminded the people that the 1878 court house fire destroyed everyone's deeds therefore, he would need to borrow their deed, as he came to their property to re-copy and re-file their deed. He reminded them that it would be TIME CONSUMING because each deed would have to be re-written in DETAIL to insert the phrase "VILLAGE OF AZLE into each one But first, he would get the TARRANT COUNTY SURVEYOR TEAM to come and start the details of their Survey plus other details needed, then his effort would include keeping up with his patients, too. He worked for FIVE YEARS, before he died on April 29, 1889 at the age of 58. (15) He had set up his HEIRS, in case of his INCAPACITY. (16) therefore, they took over his work. They worked by teams of two, thus, working FIVE MORE years to complete the surveyed THIRTEEN and ONE-HALF acre TOWN SITE. The HEIRS failed to correct the Mis-Spelling of their names on the peoples' ORIGINAL DEED, THEREFORE, a Family member said that the "final t" and the spelling of "Stuard" was wrong, in many deeds. (17)

The MASTER CARD of the TARRANT COUNTY TAX OFFICE, plus the 10 property Owners' names as listed on the ENLARGED Deed Plat to 24" x 36" was finished on January 15, 1894; FIVE YEARS after Dr Steward's Death. This DEED-PLAT was recorded on February 8, 1894. A framed copy of VOL 63, p 141 hangs in the AZLE MUSEUM upstairs over the table where the AZLE

HISTORICAL SOCIETY has its monthly meeting. (18)

J.R. Walker ran his LITTLE DRUG STORE for 12 years before he tore it down in 1900. (19) On February 5, 1906, Mr Walker sold the top floor to WOODMEN OF THE world. (20) In that year, Main Street ran from the Business Section of about two blocks: on pass homes of the Grigby's, Smith's, Cosby's, then McDonald's, Walker's, Ross', and the Winter's Gin. (21) The children made up their games as they played in the street until their mothers called them in to supper. (22) In 1920, if you came into the VILLAGE OF AZLE from Ft Worth, you noted the latest of the Two-Story buildings: on the right in completion stage, was the McDonald General Store; with a planned corner for the Post Office and one for the Bank. The building on the left was the Walker Drug Store built in 1900. (23) On July 22, 1930, J. R. Walker sold the land on his large block to J.L. Pierce, making it Lot 2B, in Block 2. (24)

In 1931, TARRANT COUNTY HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT widened and asphalted the gravel Main street as Highway 199. It is now identified as Main street and Highway 344 through Azle to Highway 730. The GRAPHIC RIGHT-OF-WAY Map shows how the Walker Drug Store was affected. (25A) While moving his Drug Store, Mr Walker decided he needed to make office space for the Village Doctor with a smaller room at the back with bathroom facilities in 1931. (25B) Mr Walker died shortly after on April 5, 1931, (27) Leaving Ida Walker with NINE children, thus the Drug store provided jobs for the children as they grew up, in the next four years. (27) Ida Walker sold the EMPTY BUILDING to James H. and Byra Stribling, a young couple from Ft Worth on April 11, 1935. (28)

# STRIBLING ACTIVITIES & TWO-STORY DRUG STORE

# CONTRIBUTIONS: by Bill Stribling

Byra Stribling heard through an aunt, that a privately owned Phone Company was bringing a SWITCHBOARD to Azle, which provided a home, a small garden spot, plus a salary of \$60 per month for the operator. She applied for the job and worked two years to help her husband get started. Since they had bought an EMPTY BUILDING at 117 W Main, they had to restock it with EQUIPMENT and STOCK. Bill Stribling told this story: "Dad, James H. Stribling, heard of a Drug Store at Greenwood in Wise County, near Slidell for sale. He DASHED over there, BOUGHT it, loaded up the EQUIPMENT and STOCK; EROUGHT it back to his Azle Store. He never knew what happened to his Greenwood building. (29)

Byra Stribling was heard to say: "Moving out here with a small baby to care for, in a house with no bathroom and no conveniences, it is just awful". Jay Woody Stribling was born on April 10, 1935 and lack one day being FOUR-YEARS OLD. (30) Shortly, after moving out here, James H. Stribling put in a DELCO SYSTEM of ELECTRICITY and had the FIRST

ELECTRIC LIGHTS in Azle. (31) Bill Stribling told the story of an "OUT-OF-CONTROL" car CRASHING through the Guard Rail, the Plank Porch and on into the Four-Pane Windows. "Dad, James Stribling, planned for the FUTURE of his store in the NECESSARY REPAIRS. He put in FULL-PANE STORE WINDOWS, poured a CONCRETE porch, and left off the guard rails. (32) James and Byra Stribling saw in their first two years, that needs of the farmers and ranchers were different and planned to meet their needs. James Stribling built their home at 108 S Stewart and Byra resigned the SWITCHBOARD to go on SHIFT WORK to keep the Drug Store open from 8 A.M. to P.M. (33)

The old BENCH on the front porch was a GATHERING PLACE, where the men sat to chat, chew tobacco, spin yarns, and take home the news of their friends. It was here that young Bill Stribling heard the OLD TIMERS tell the NEWCOMERS how James Walker (J.R.) tore down the LITTLE DRUG STORE after working in it for 12 years. Walker built this Two-Story Drug store in 1900 on same site. (34)

During the DEPRESSION YEARS of the 1930's, the Stribling Drug store served as a Distribution Center for the Needy-clothing and food etc. (35) It served as a Bowen Bus Stop in the 1940's and 1950's from Ft Worth, Azle, Wichita Falls, to transfer to Amarillo or Oklahoma City and points north. (36) Downstairs, was a Doctor's office with a small library in one corner where Byra Stribling served as SECOND LIBRARIAN. (37) The upstairs had a busy schedules

of meetings of the active AZLE'S Civic League functions, with Faris Ross. President and Newspaper Editor of AZLE BOOSTER He was an ardent booster. He published that ELECTRIC SERVICE was being EXTENDED to the VILLAGE OF AZLE and that Governor James V. Aldred was coming to help CELEBRATE. Mr Ross worked on the Publicity and drew 1500 people on that April 3, 1936 to hear the Texas Governor in the Village of 250 residents. Mr Ross in his AZLE BOOSTER inserted Governor Aldred quote: "I enjoyed my visit to Azle TREMENDOUSLY!! You have a WONDERFUL COMMUNITY !! (38) The active and exciting Court Room of Judge Bowman became famous. The Lake Officer and Constable were comfortable in their visits up there; when not on duty. Other meetings were Town Hall and Chamber of Commerce. (39) All clubs met up there including: Garden Club, Rebekah Lodge and Eastern Star. The Rebekah Lodge was organized November 13, 1950 and met twice-a-month up there until the stairs became too difficult for some of the members, thus they moved to the Christian Church on July 12, 1976. They chartered with 23 members and grew to 46 in 1990 with several deceased over the years. Byra Stribling was a lifetime member of Eastern Star and Rebekah Lodge. (40) ELECTIONS were held up there, where Byra Stribling served 20 years or more, as the Democratic Precinct Chairman. (41)

In 1950, an ENCROACHMENT COMPLAINT came against the stairs and sidewalk of the Drug Store, which also gave the death of J. R. Walker in the AFFIDAVIT. Archie Forrester;

Walker's son-in-law, took care of the ENCROACHMENT problem. (42) In 1957, a rumor came to the VILLAGE OF AZLE that Ft Worth was planning to ANNEX it. The people banded together, went to the Ft Worth Council. They learned how to INCORPORATE their Village into a City. They organized, held an ELECTION with 152 voting FOR INCORPORATION and 127 AGAINST. Majority ruled and they became CITY OF AZLE on April 13, 1957. (43) They elected Dan Jarvis as FIRST MAYOR to serve with other officers. (44) Warren Pugh served as SECOND MAYOR. (45) Jay Woody Stribling was the City's THIRD MAYOR. He started in April 1960, then on January 7, 1961, he SNIPPED the ribbon of \$20.00 BILLS to open the AZLE STATE BANK. (46) Then his JOB OFFER came through as: DIRECTOR OF ARIZONA INDIAN HOUSING. He still lives in Phoenix, Arizona. Bill Stribling gave his address. (47)

In 1963, James H. and Byra Stribling sold their Drug Stock and Equipment to Milton Thompson, who set up a Pharmacy over on the new Industrial Street at the Mitchell store site. (48) April 13, 1963, the Striblings rented their building to Paul Worthen. Paul asked Franklin C. Couch at Scooter's Radio Supply in Ft Worth, to become his partner to open an Electronics and Service Store in the CITY OF AZLE. They chose the FIRST letter of their SURNAMES, thus named it C & W ELECTRONICS. The wives worked the day shift. If a wife needed time off, Paul Worthen called James Stribling to help,

if he felt like it. In 1965, Paul Worthen quit his job Ft Worth to work full time in his store. In 1967, Mr Couch sold his partnership to Paul Worthen and moved to Comanche, Texas where he opened a shop of his own. (49) Striblings travelled some in the late 1960's and early 1970's. (50) They planned their ESTATE before either passed away, so when Mr Stribling did pass away in November 1974, Eyra Stribling was able to deed the store to Jay Woody Stribling when he was in town. (51) Jay Woody continued to rent the store for four more years, making Paul Worthen a RENTER for FIFTEEN YEARS and TEN DAYS. On September 25, 1978 Jay Woody Stribling sold the building to Paul Worthen. (52)

In 1983, The Gipson Rebekah lodge gave Paul Worthen a QUIT CLAIM DEED for the TOP FLOOR, because they had not used it since 1976. (53)

In September 1988, Paul Worthen made his LAST PAYMENT on his store. (54)

This 90 year old unrecognized building will be an appropriate gift for Beatrice Gipson Carter as her TENTH site MARKER goal. BEA had her 90th birthday in November 1989 She is in a Nursing Home, but we hope she can be HONORED and accept her gift from Steve Britt, now an EAGLE SCOUT: with Mr Clark's faster project: Grandmother completed as site RESEARCHER, composer, typist beginning July 1988 to April 1900.





My special debt of gratitude goes to Mrs. Blanche Dameron Scrimshire, who wrote the history of the early days and who also wrote the history of Ash Creek Baptist Church and the schools of long ago.

street with a general store, drug store, three blacksmith shops, a barbersop, two gins, and a mill. The buildings were not painted and there was nothing beautiful about it; but it had a sort of ruggedness that bespoke of the character of the pioneers.

These Pioneers had come from many different States to settle here. Some came in covered wagons drawn by oxen (and with) all their earthly possessions in the wagon. Others rode horseback or walked long distances. They had to endure many hardships and always there was the constant watching for the Indians who came plundering and burning as they went. No one was safe day or night. The settlers carried their trusted rifles with them wherever they went — even to church. Bro. Powers always preached with a gun on each side of the Bible — he believed in preparedness both here and in the hereafter.

As the country became more settled, the Indians retreated farther West and life became more peaceful and the men began to clear the land and plant crops, at first it was mostly vegetables and corn and things that they could eat, but gradually they began to plant corn, cotton, and sorghum, so that they might have what was called a "money crop."

The corn was ground into meal and every man carried his corn to the mill on Saturday so he would have enough to last his family for a week.

I think this must have been the origin of men going to town on Saturday afternoon — it was where they met and exchanged ideas and heard the news from nearby settlers.

## THE EARLY HISTORY OF AZLE, TEXAS By Mrs. Blanche Dameron Scrimshire

Back in pioneer days when buffalo, wild turkeys, bobcats, wolves, panthers, and Indians roamed the hills and valleys in the vicinity of the now progressive and growing town of Azle which is only a twenty minute drive from Fort Worth, Dr. Stewart came to live in this outpost of civilization. The date must have been around 1846 because my grandfather, John Giles Reynolds, was born in Tennessee in 1826 and came to Texas when he was twenty years old to pre-empt land on the creek named for him, and Dr. Stewart was living in Azle in a log house built by a Dutchman whose name was Rumfelts.

As more settlers came and more log homes were built, there grew a need for a name for the little settlement. Some wanted to call the group of log houses O-Bar, but this did not meet the approval of Dr. Stewart who seemed to be a leader in the community. Next the name Marysville was suggested because Mary was the given name of the Doctor's wife. This still did not suit the Doctor. His given name was Azle, so he told the people if they would name the town for him he would deed them enough land for a townsite. This he did and that is how Azle got its name.

Dr. Stewart also gave the land just behind the Ash Creek Baptist Church for the cemetery, it extends to the road that runs through the center of the old part of the cemetery. The land just West of the road was donated by John G. Reynolds.

Dave Morrison was the first person to be buried in this cemetery, and Mr. Gregg was the second.

Mr. John G. Reynolds played a very important role in the settlement of Azle. He was the first to build a grist mill where people came to have their corn ground into meal and he also built the first cotton gin in Azle. The mill was very interesting, it was operated on an inclined treadwheel, the power was furnished by patient oxen that walked all day on the wheel to keep it turning.

Now for a few pioneer families: Bagoon lived first on the old Joe Fowler place that we think of now as the Frank

# THE AZLE POST OFFICE

#### 1881 - 1966

Many years ago before a Post office was established in Azle, the settlers had to go to Birdville after the mail. Once a week a man rose horseback to pick up all the mail for this area. And as the slogan goes, "Neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds." Often it was cold or rainy but how wonderful was the welcome awaiting this lone rider when he arrived with the mail. A letter from back home was very important in those days of such slow communications.

There was nothing but a Fort on the Trinity river where the city of Fort Worth is now located. From 1866 until 1878 the mail was brought from Birdville, Texas. Later it was sent to Dido and the people had to go there to get their mail. It was very inconvenient for they had to cross the river and there was no bridge. Sometimes it was several days before the river was low enough for them to ford it to get to Dido, so when the river was full they were cut off from the rest of the world.

These pioneers had come from Tennessee, Arkansas, Missouri, Kentucky and other Eastern States. The settlement was first called Elizabeth Town, later Mr. Moore built a store and it was called Mooresville. Several years later Mr. Joe Fowler bought the store from Mr. Moore and it became known as "Joe Fowler's Store".

At that time there still was no post office, so the people went to work to get a post office and finally succeeded in 1881. It was named O'Bar after the man who was responsible for getting the office established. Mr. Joe Fowler was appointed as the first Postmaster.

Sometime between August, 1883 and August 1884, the name of the Post office was changed from O'Bar to Azle. It was named after Dr. Azle Stewart, the first country Doctor to settle in this area. Dr. Stewart told the people that if they would name the town for him he would donate enough land for a townsite, and this he did.

Dr. Stewart was truly an old fashioned country Doctor. He rode a mule over the rough country roads and trails where there were no roads. Today there stands a historical marker at the East gate of the Azle cemetery as a memorial to this man who gave the land for the first section of the cemetery. This marker was erected by the Azle Garden Club.

The Azle Post Office was located in one corner of Mr. Joe Fowler's General Store. It remained in his store until 1906, at which time Mr. W. N. McDonald was appointed Azle's second Postmaster. He built a new store just across the street from Mr. Fowler's store and moved the Post Office to the rear of his store. Mr. McDonald also owned the "First State Bank of Azle". It was in the rear of the store next to the Post Office. Painted across the top of the store in huge black letters were the words "McDonalds, The Store in the Lead". The store had a mezzanine floor where ladies hats, coats, and piece goods could be purchased.

Later, when Mr. McDonald moved his grocery store to North Fort Worth he moved the Post Office into what is now "The Red Top Cafe". At that time it was simply known as "The Restaurant". Mr. Jim J. Nation had charge of the office, however, he was never appointed postmaster. In 1914, Mrs. Cora Lovell was appointed as the third Postmaster of Azle, and the office was moved into the small

Parker, until he married. He was married to Irene Gilley on December 28, 1935. Hubert and Irene have one daughter, Hurene, who was married in 1955 to James Edward Morrow. Hurene and Eddie had one son, James Farley Morrow, who was killed in auto accident May 23, 1963, just before his second birthday. Hurene is employed at the Azle Community hospital and Eddie is Assistant to the Postmaster. Hubert Page was Dispatcher at the Azle City Hall until he passed away with heart attack February 5, 1967.

Andy Parker married Ida Dent and they had two daughters, Martha and Maggie. Martha married Lewis Mc-Mahan, they had one daughter and five sons. Maggie married R. A. Gilley, they have two sons, Barry and Tommy. Roy Miller Parker married Elsie Gipson, December 19, 1923. Roy was a farmer and carpenter. Elsie was Postmaster for 38 years, retiring in 1958. They have no children. They have lived all their lives in Azle. Roy was

named after Dr. Miller of Reno, Texas.

Mr. and Mrs. T. D. Lester moved to Azle in January of 1954. Mrs. Lester was the former Miss Iola Biles. The Lesters were married in 1921 at Roanoke, Texas. It was here in Roanoke he opened his first drug store. They lived there 16 years and then moved to Bridgeport where he opened another drug store in 1935. From there they came to Azle and opened another drug store which is operated by H. B. Standefer who married Imogene, a daughter of the Lesters.

They had one other daughter, Mrs. Fay Lester-Burt of Bridgeport.

## EARLY CITY OF AZLE

This is the earliest piece of History that I could find about Azle. In 1856, there was an article in the Telegram that to me was very interesting. I had heard the name Rumfeldt, but never knew how he fitted in with Azle History. This is the story.

In 1856, a German by the name of Rumfeldt purchased from the State the land on which Azle, formerly known as O-Bar now stands. Meredith Fowler, father of Mrs. W.H. Rowland whose address was at that time 1920 Henderson Street, Fort Worth, Texas bought a farm adjoining the Remfeldt place in an early day. Dr. James Azle Steward, for whom Azle was named married one of Mr. Fowler's daughters and purchased the Rumfledt farm.

The Doctor rode horseback, or rather mule back – for it was a mule he rode instead of a horse – and he did all the practice of the country Doctor, as far as Decatur. He gave the land for different places of business, schools, and Churches and was a great benefactor of that town.

The first store, 12 by 14 feet in size was built on land donated by Dr. Steward and stocked with goods of a mercantile mind who in a short time sold out to Henry Miller and Dan Woods. Later Fowler bought the store and ran it for more than thirty years.

Near the Parker County line stands one of the oldest houses in this part of the country. It was built by John Reynolds in 1845. The lumber was hauled overland by ox teams from Houston. It was built old style with a native hand hewn rock chimney at each end and a wide central hall.

Exerpt from R.M. Rowland's letter concerning Dr. Azle Steward: Dr. James Azle Steward married Mary Fowler at Prairie Point (Near where Rhome is today) on May 17, 1860. He had come to the Azle community

about two years before. I believe he was born in Tenn, but I cannot give the date or place of his birth. He was about ten years older than his wife.

Dr. Steward is said to be the first Mason who came to that neighborhood and we are sure that he was a Charter member of the Masonic Lodge of Azle.

## JOHN GILES REYNOLD HOUSE

The family of John Giles Reynolds moved to Texas from Tennessee in the 1840's. He preempted railroad land along a creek that is only 3 miles long, is fed by springs, and never has been known to be dry. It is known as Reynolds Branch. His first home was built on the creek to have water.

After he had proven this land he preempted an additional grant. In order to prove this part he had to make improvements. He did not want to live in a log house – he wanted a plank house. Since there were no railroads near, he had to haul the lumber. Several others in this general area also wanted lumber, one of which was Mr. Moody. They organized an oxen caravan to go to a lumber mill near Galveston. There was no records but it would be interesting to know how long it took for this trip. What a lot to go through for a plank house.

The house was completed the early 1860's. An abstract I did have gave the date of the grant after the land had been proven as 1864, if my memory is good. The house was built with two rooms and a hall downstairs and the same upstairs with fireplaces at either end of the house. There were porches both upstairs and down actoss the front of the house. At the back there was a large kitchen with a porch the length of the room.

In 1930 the top story of the house was removed and remodeled to be under one roof. The original lumber was used in this construction. The only part of the house that has not been changed is one bedroom. This room is sealed with random width boards and the fireplace is still in use. The nails used in the original construction were square nails made in his own blacksmith shop. The square nails are clearly visible in the bedroom as well as the front porch.

About 5 years ago I did some remodeling and moved a partition. I found I had moved a wall of the original house. The boards were almost impossible to saw and the nails were the square nails.

In this house my grandmother came as a bride after the death of her first husband and the death of my grandfathers first wife. Both she and my grandfather died in the house. They had 6 children that were born there. My mother and father, R M (Short) and Josie Reynolds, spent their honeymoon in my living room. So far 6 generations have lived here. One article of furniture that was in the house and is almost as old, is the rocker that is now in the museum.





## AZLE POST OFFICE

When the first settlers came to this outpost of civilization, their primary concern was for a place to live and food for the family. After building their log cabins up and down the creeks to be near the water, they soon realized that they had broken all contact with the folks back home – so far away now.

They made inquiry and learned that there was a Settlement at Birdville that received mail from the outside world and that they could send mail back to their loved ones that they had left behind. Birdville was the County Seat of Tarrant County at that time. Fort Worth became the County Seat in 1860. For about three years the people of Azle got their mail from Dido, but this was not very satisfactory as there was no bridge over the river and when it rained the river got up and they had to wait days for the water to go down sometimes before they could get across the river to get their mail.

The people decided they needed a Post Office and went to work to see what could be done. They were successful and September 5, 1881 the first Post Office was established for this area. It was named O-Bar. The name was changed to Azle after Dr. Azle Stewart, the first pioneer Doctor in this area. He told the people if they would name the Post Office after him he would deed them enough land for a townsite, this he did and it became Azle. The only Post Office by that name in the USA. The first Postmaster was Mr. Joe Fowler, who owned the only store in Azle. It was located in one corner of his store. It remained there until 1910. A man rode horseback to Fort Worth to pick up the mail until 1904, then the mail route was contracted. Mr. Huffmaster was the first Star route carrier. He made the trip to Fort Worth and back in one day, giving the people day service. He drove a team of horses to the mail hack (as it was called), it was a two seated vehicle and he carried passengers, fifty cents for a round trip to Fort Worth. Mr. W.B. Crawford was the next carrier, he carried the mail for the next four years. Mr. R.W. Hewett was the next carrier and he was the first to carry the mail in a car. This was a great day for passengers, they could ride to town and spend three hours shopping and return home the same day. Mr. Tom Nations carried the mail last year of Mr. Hewett's yearly contract. The next man was J.W. (Bill) Smith, a nephew of John Peter Smith, for whom the hospital by that name in Fort Worth was named. Mr. Will carried the mail for 20 years.

Rural Free delivery was begun in 1904. Mr. J.A. Ross was the Rural Carrier. Mr. R.W. Hiett succeeded Mr. Ross, and Byrne C. Moody followed Mr. Hiett as rural carrier.

Mr. W.N. McDonald was Azle's second Postmaster. Mrs. Cora Lovell was the third Postmaster, followed by Miss Mamie Gipson, who was Azle's fourth Postmaster. She resigned in 1920 to get married. She married Carl McCurdy and moved to Idalou in West Texas. Her sister, Elsie Gipson was appoint-

ed Postmaster April 30, 1920. She received the letter dated May 1 advising her that she had been appointed as Azle's fifth postmaster. She married Roy M. Parker Dec. 19, 1923. Miss Elsie served for 38 years, serving under seven Presidents, these were: Woodrow Wilson, Warren G. Harding, Calvin Coolidge, Herbert Hoover, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Harry S. Truman, and Dwight D. Eisenhower.

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Miss Elsie had the first Library in Azle. Not long after she became Postmaster, Miss Minnie Peace, Mrs. Tombes and Mrs. Schuber from the Fort Worth Library asked her to put the library in the Post Office and they would supply the books from the Fort Worth Library. She kept the Library for about 20 years but had to give it up when the Post office advanced to a Third Class office, 1941.

Since Miss Elsie became Postmaster in 1920, many changes made in the world. The Stock Market crash in 1929, many people in Azle lost their life savings. When Mr. Roosevelt became President, in 1933 he closed the banks, and had the cattle killed and took drastic measures to restore the prosperity of the nation.

The Azle Post Office advanced to Third Class July 1, 1941. Miss Elsie was allowed one clerk. Her sister, Beatrice Carter was hired. This was a year that will never be forgotten – The shock of the attack on Pearl Harbor, and all the boys marching off to war. In 1945, our beloved President, Franklin D. Roosevelt died with a heart attack.

The Post Office was selling Savings Bonds, Saving Stamps and War Bonds. The Department must have realized that things had to change, for they removed that scratchy old post office pen and replaced it with the ball point pen. This took place in 1950. In 1952, the old American tradition of a penny post card vanished.

On July 1, 1953, the Azle Post Office advanced to a Second Class office. Three more clerks were added, Lucille Young, Laura Holmes, and Gene Yauger. More space was needed so in 1953 the little white building that had housed the Office since 1916, was moved and a new building built by Mr. Roy Parker, had much more room and the Government put in new post office boxes and furnished new desks.

Margie Looper became substitute carrier March 18,1954, in 1957 she became temporary distribution clerk. On May 9, 1962, Margie went career, and May 7, 1966, she was promoted to a regular clerk, she now has worked about 30 years and still greets everyone with a smile.

When Mrs. Parker decided to retire in 1958, she had seen the town grow from 250 people to about 8000 population.

Mr. C.W. Sanford was appointed acting Post Master to succeed Mrs. Parker. He was succeeded by Mr. Steve Ellis. In November 1958, seventeen people signed to take the examination for the Azle Post Office. The examination was given January 10, 1959.

Mrs. Anna Cutshall was commissioned as Post Master in 1961. She was Azle's sixth Postmaster. The office advanced to First Class July 1, 1970. A new Postoffice was built and they moved into it February 1, 1971. The new Postoffice was dedicated July 1, 1971. Mr. Elden Ary from the Regional office in Dallas greeted the guests. Special guests were two former Postmasters, Mamie Gipson McCurdy and Elsie Gipson Parker. Also

This grocery store operated in Azle from 1954 until 1962. Clyde and Marguerite

Rochelle bought the land and built the white frame grocery in 1954 before moving to Azle from Glen Garden that same year.

They took down a barbed wire fence and cleared off the corn stalks to build the building. At that time the orly other procery store in Azle were Trammell's Pak-A-Bag and another small store on Main Street. The official address of the Clyde Rochelle Grocery was on Highway 199 East.

The building was 70 feet wide and 30 feet deep. They handled a complete supply of vegetables, meat, feed, etc. The population of Azle was well under 5,000 at that time.

The store was open seven days a week for two years and then six days a week after that. They employed about five full time persons besides themselves.

One problem that surfaced was a burglary that occurred a week after they opened up. That was one reason why they decided to move to Azle and built an apartment behind the store.

The Rochelles enjoyed a busy business and made a lot of wonderful friends. They knew most of the people in Azle.

A desire to get back into the real estate business and leave such a confining grocery business led to sell the grocery in 1962.



## STRIBLING DRUG STORE

Unless you have lived in Azle for the past 50 years, you may be unaware of the history behind some of the buildings still standing on Main Street. As in many small towns across the nation, the drugstore served as a gathering place for friends and the unofficial news source of the community.

In Azle, this landmark was the old Stribling

Drug Store. Looking to your left traveling west on Main, one can still see the building, now occupied by C&W Electronics.

Azle's first drug store was operated by Wig Reynolds. It opened in 1879. J.W. Walker constructed the building in 1900 which Stribling Drug was later to occupy. The Walker family operated the drug store for 40 years. In 1906, however, Walker sold the upper story of his new building to Woodmen of the World Lodge for \$100.

J.H. Stribling and his wife, Byra Woody Stribling came to Azle on September 1, 1932 and purchased the drugstore from Walker. Stribling had been working for Renfro Drug in Fort Worth when he heard of the Azle store being up for sale.

The Striblings embarked on this new career when Azle was a small family town. They both worked in the drug store and kept it open from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. to take care of customers coming in later. Just about every-one in the community farmed or ran a dairy and could not come to town until late.

Getting started in a new place of business was quite an undertaking, and so to help out financially Mrs. Striking tota the job of running the telephone switchboard. The job paid \$60 per month. The telephone company furnished a house for them to live in which had a garden spot behind it.

Two years later Mrs. Stribling left the telephone job and went to work full time at the drug store. Lila Rowden took over the switchboard operation. The little white house where the telephone switchboard was housed still stands on Stewart Street.

In the 30 years that Stribling ran the drug store, it definitely was the hub of Azle. Counting the earlier owners, it was the focal point of Azle for 82 years.

After Stribling bought the store, they installed a Delco system of electricity and had the first lights in Azle. Byra Stribling recalled their first years in Azle when they were living in the house on Main Street now housing the Chamber of Commerce. "Moving way out from Fort Worth, living in a house with no bathroom or modern conveniences at all, and with a small baby to care for, I thought it was just awful," she once said.

During the years when the town drug store was at its busiest, it housed a doctor's office, a branch of the library, and the Bowen Bus branch station. The Azle Civic League met there; it was used as a town hall, and a garden club and lodge also met there.

The store also was used to hold elections. A courtroom for Precinct 4 was housed in the room upstairs. Tip Couch served as constable, and Arthur Carter was lake officer.

Mrs. Stribling remembered some heated cases held in Judge Bowman's court. "At a political discussion upstairs one time there was a man stabbed to death, so the story goes," she said.

During the depression the store was used for a welfare station where commodities were distributed to people on welfare. The old bench out front served as a meeting place for old timers to chew tobacco and spin yarns.

"Stories they would tell would almost compare to the present day soap operas," Mrs. Stribling remembered.

The Stribling's stock and store fixtures were sold to Milton Tompkins in 1963. The Tompkins operated a drug store in the building on Main for some time before moving to the shopping center where Mitchell's is presently located. Revco later bought out Tompkins.

J.H. Stribling died after a long illness in 1974, and the building on Main Street was sold to Paul Worthen and Frank Couch where C&W Electronics has been ever since. The Rebekah Lodge meets upstairs now.

The Bryant Art Foundry has cast several <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> scale models one of which can be seen at Oak Lawn Downs in Arkansas, also 2 life size bronzes, one being the famous bucking horse "Midnight" sculpted by Jack Bryant and is standing in front of the Amon G. Carter Jr. exhibit building in Fort Worth, Texas.

The Bryant Art Foundry has cast bronzes for a number of great Artists such as, Jack Bryant of Weatherford, Lisa Perry of Springtown, Anita Burgtorf Pawels of Africa, Donna Dobberfuhl of San Antonio, Texas as well as many more. They have done repairs on a number of bronzes for individuals, one in particular a famous Remington. 
The Bryant Art Foundry has surely made a name for itself and Azle in the Art world and is a highly respected business that the whole Bryant family can be proud of.

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
#### History of Gipson Rebekah Lodge # 460

This little paper was edited by Mr. Faris Ross, who was the first president of the Azle Civic League and a real Azle Booster. It was through his untiring efforts that a crowd of 1500 people were present at this meeting to hear Governor Allred speak at the Azle Civic League. The population of Azle at this time was only about 250 people, but with 1500 people in one small auditorium, there was scarcely standing room.


In a later edition of "The Azle Booster" dated May 1, 1936, is an announcement that Bill McCraw would speak at the Azle Civic League meeting May 4, 1936 at 8 P.M. at the schoolhouse auditorium. Mr. McCraw was the Attorney General of Texas at that time and was considered one of Texas' most able speakers. The N.T.A.C. Band — 75 strong — entertained with their music. Mr. L. H. Barber, the new school superintendent, appeared on the program also.

Mr. Ross deserves the credit for bringing to our town such notable speakers. To him they were not only speakers, they were his friends, and he shared them with Azle folks. His life was truly a life of sharing and giving as he lived his life for others. He has passed to his reward.

During the next seven or eight years, there is no record of the Azle Civic League, but in the 1940's it was reorganized and Mr. J. Frank Young was elected president.

In 1948 shares of stock were sold by the Azle Civic League for the Azle Civic League Fire Department. The money raised by selling shares and through various community projects was used for building the Town Hall and to purchase Azle's first fire truck. The fire truck cost \$4,800.00.

Since then, many things have been accomplished for the City of Azle. The meetings were always open to the public


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



10); state law prohibited the operation of a drinking establishment near a church. The original sanctuary, built by members in 1893-94, was a wood frame L-plan gabled structure. It is now incorporated into a larger complex which includes a 1950 sanctuary with Gothic windows and a squared entry bell tower, a 1956 educational wing built by Roy Parker and Carl McCurdy and a large brick sanctuary designed by Robert L. Wright and Associates in 1974. Azle Christian Church received an Official Texas Historical Marker in 1980.

#### 6

**216 Church Street, House, c. 1900.** This Gabled T-plan house with symmetrical side porches is a good example of a common historical house type in Tarrant County. It was probably built around 1900.

#### 7

301 Church Street [NR\*], Azle School/Azle Elementary School, 1914; 1935-39; c. 1950. The first school on this 13-acre site was a two-story red brick English-style building constructed in 1914. The consolidation of many small schools in the area (including Parker County) into the Azle Common School District resulted in the construction of a new \$40,000 stone veneer concrete building as a project of the Works Progress Administration (W.F.A.). Local sources indicate that the structure was designed by Withern Brothers, architects. The building opened in 1939. The old English-style school, sited to the north of the 1939 school, was enlarged and substantially altered during the 1950s. The second story was removed, and the building was rock veneered. Azle School originally housed eleven grades, but is now used for elementary classes only. The 1939 structure may be eligible for the National Register based on its architectural quality and its important role in education for the region. The Azle school system received an Official Texas Historical Marker in 1982.

#### 8

825 Dunaway Lane, Orman L. Kimbrough, Jr. House, 1936-37. Orman L. Kimbrough, Jr. built this multi-gabled stone house in 1936-37 on farm land which had been in the family since 1879. The Kimbroughs operated a dairy business. The one-story house has a generally rectangular plan with an arched porch on the southeast corner beneath the transverse gable roof. According to family sources, B. Elam was the carpenter, and Roy Irby and Sons did the rock work on the house.

#### 9

117 W. Main Street [NR], Walker Drug Store/Woodmen of the World Hall, 1900; c. 1931. This large wood frame building with bracketed cornice and pointed parapet was built in 1900 by James Walker. Previously Walker had operated his store out of a smaller building on the same site constructed by Wig Reynolds. Reynolds sold the land and store to Walker in 1888 and, according to local sources, Walker had the older structure demolished and the current building constructed in 1900. The Woodmen of the World, Azle Camp No. 596 paid for the materials and construction of the second story of Walker's building. In 1906 Walker guaranteed rights to a separate entrance to the W.O.W. Camp and deeded the second story to them in recognition of the fact that they "did heretofore in the year 1900 furnish material and pay for the building and erecting of the second story room over the store house of J.R. Walker." Walker constructed a small doctor's office for the local physician behind the main building in 1931. At that time, the building was also moved back from Main Street to provide needed right-of-way for road expansion. James H. and Byra Stribling purchased the property from Ida Walker in 1935 and operated a drug store here until 1963. The building is largely intact except for a remodeled storefront. As the oldest commercial structure on Main Street and as the oldest fraternal lodge hall in the area, the building appears to be eligible for the National Register.

#### 10

124 W. Main Street, Jim Nation Building/Azle Historical Museum, c. 1937. Jim Nation purchased the land on which this building stands in 1937 and probably erected the two-story stone veneer structure shortly thereafter. A service station and general merchandise store were operated on the ground level, and the family lived upstairs. The building was sold in 1938 to Dan Orr and in 1945 to Mr. and Mrs. Ray Morton who operated a barber shop and a beauty shop here. The family in turn sold the building to the Azle Woman's Club, which subsequently gave it to the City of Azle for a public library. When the Azle Public Library moved to its new building on Southeast Parkway, the Azle Historical Museum organized a museum on the premises in 1976.

#### 11

165 W. Main Street [NR], William N. McDonald House, c. 1905. An older house was enlarged and remodeled into this gabled L-plan residence by William N. McDonald, proprietor of a mercantile business which opened on Main Street in 1906. The post office and First State Bank of Azle operated out of his store. McDonald, who also owned a cotton gin, moved to Fort Worth in 1914. Short Reynolds then managed McDonald's store. The one-story house is clad in narrow horizontal wood siding and has a porch in the angle of the L. Turned posts support the porch roof. The McDonald house appears to be eligible for the National Register based on its association with one of Azle's leading businessmen during the early 1900s and as a representative example of residential building traditions of the time.


#### 12

168 W. Main Street, W.E. Seldon House, 1938. Constructed in 1938 for W.E. and Johnnie Seldon, this small stone veneer house was designed by Mrs. Seldon and constructed by Will Tannahill. Mr. Beaty of Springtown was responsible for the rock work. The Seldons owned a service station and cafe next door on Main Street. The jerkin-headed shallow-sloped gable roofs are unusual for stone houses of the period.






