Incidentally, I do make consulting reports on such structures, for a fee of \$200. For that sum, I prepare a written, documented evaluation. Should you desire such a report, let me know.


Dear Mr. Gage:


Please excuse our tardiness in forwarding the photographs of your log buildings which you requested. Commitments with the Grapevine Historical Society on an earlier project have taken my free time for several weeks. Please do not interpret our lengthy delay in replying to your letter as a sign that we are any less interested in preserving your cabins.

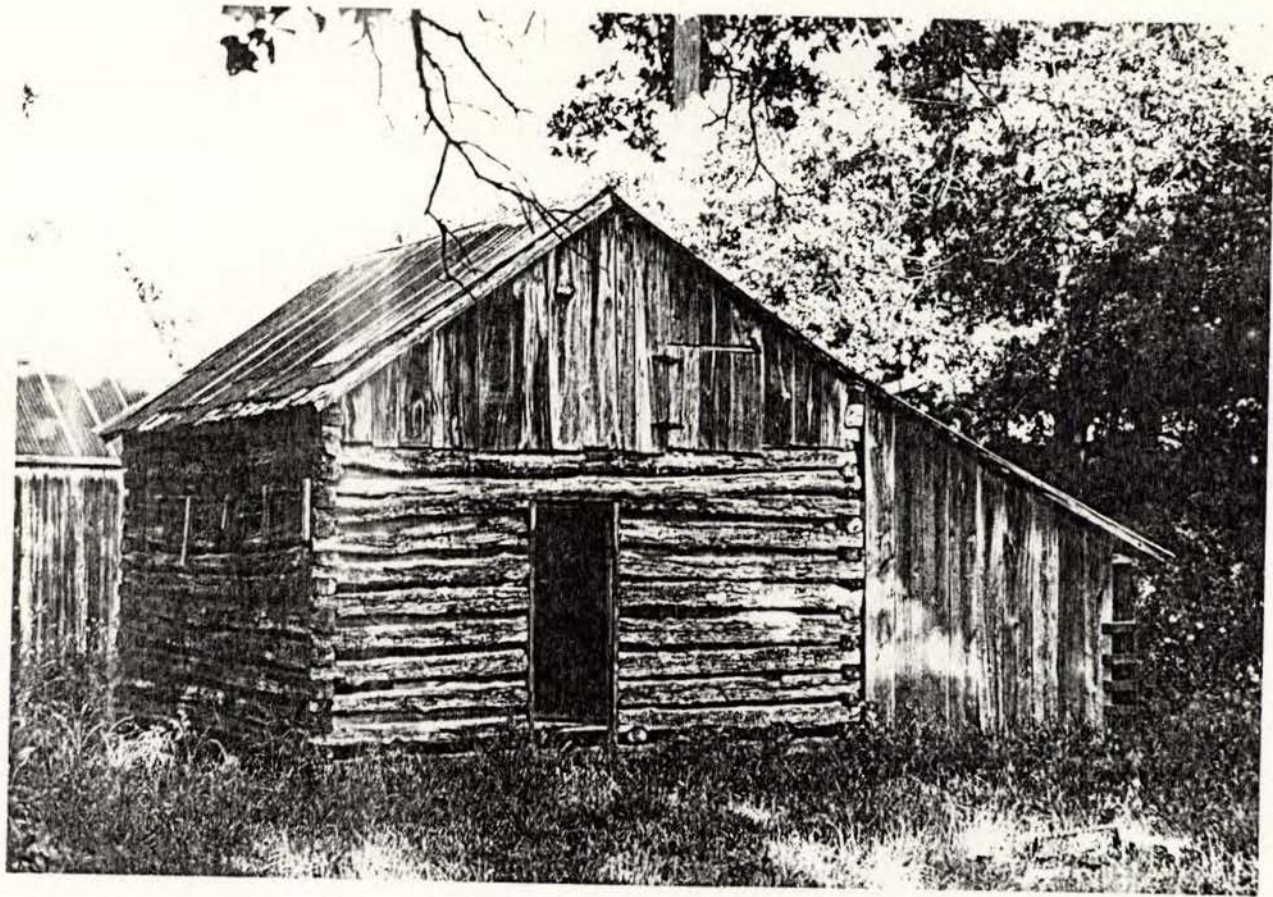
The smaller of the two structures measures approximately 11' x 13' and is in reasonably sound condition. The larger building measures 16' x 16' and is quite deteriorated on the north and east walls. Earlier questioning of descendants of the buildings' original owners led us to believe that the smaller building was once the dwelling and that the larger building was a utility structure. We have since learned that the opposite is true.

After consultation with local historians and historical societies who have been involved in log building restorations, it is our opinion that a value of \$500.00 is reasonable for each building, for a total of \$1000.00 for the two.

We have been in contact with some of the local city governments to see if they are interested in taking over the restorations. The City of Grapevine has expressed an interest in placing one or both in a city park. The smaller building should present no problems in moving and rebuilding. If, when the larger building is dismantled, it is determined it could not be restored, we may retain all the materials which are savable from it for use in other restorations within the county.

Thank you for your interest and valuable contribution to the preservation of Tarrant County history. We will wait until we have received the transfer documents signed by you to take further steps to dismantle the buildings.

A new home for an old home

Saturday was moving day for the old log cabin. It wasn't the first time the cabin had been moved. The first time was in 1918, and as everything enjoys a change of scenery now and then, perhaps it was ready for this second trip.

This move was especially important since it was made to insure that the cabin would be around for a long time to come reminding area residents of the early settlers who made those first tenuous steps into what was then a wilderness.

And, as those first settlers were followed by others, they set a trend which continues today in the growing area of Colleyville. It was one of these recent steps toward progress that brought the old cabin to seek yet another new location.

According to Dee Barker, a member of the Tarrant County Historical Commission available information indicates the cabin was originally located on the east side of Highway 26 on property belonging to William F. Wilkson.

Then, in 1918, the cabin made its first move when it was dismantled and transferred to the farm of Harvy

Forbes. There the cabin was attached to another log structure and the two served as a cattle shed and hay barn. Later the cabin housed a forge and was utilized as a work shop for the care and repair of farm tools.

Of course, like most things, the old cabin did not survive its move across the highway unscathed.

In fact, according to Ms. Barker, some of its historical significance deminished along the way, but she is quick to add that it is still an important representation of the few log structures remaining in our area.

"It's not what I would call original," Ms. Barker said as she tagged each piece of the cabin with round metal discs labeled with directions and numbers to insure proper placement when the cabin is reconstructed. But she quickly pointed out, "It is still significant because it shows the

people gathered together and used what they had at hand."

Moving almost anything with an historical background is a complicated undertaking. In fact, it should usually only be done under the watchful eyes of a member or representative of the Historical Commission.

Saturday, the Colleyville Area Chamber of Commerce helped provide the muscle with Ms. Barker contributing some firm swings of her hammer and her expertise.

The cabin was donated to the Historical Commission by a Dallas physician who recently sold the property in the McCain Road area to developers. The Commission in turn donated the cabin to the Chamber to be restored and hopefully placed on display at a location yet to be

determined.

For Ms. Barker, it is not the first time she has been involved in moving a log cabin. She has expanded what she describes as a natural interest in history to becoming a self trained consultant on the old homes.

She was also involved in the move of Grapevine's Torian Log Cabin, but that only marked the beginning for her.

"I started asking questions and found out I knew about as much as anyone else," Ms. Barker recalls. "I got busy and learned. There weren't any books that really told how to restore a cabin, so I went back to books on how they were built."

Then, to complete the process, she took a trip spending several days looking for and studying the log structures still existing in the area.

She has participated in the removal and subsequent restoration of several cabins since then, but as she noted, there just aren't too many of them left.

As for the Colleyville cabin, its final destination remains uncertain. For the moment, it is stored on city property waiting for a new home.

Of course this may take a while, but the cabin probably won't mind the wait. It has been around long enough to learn patience.
