

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




MEET YOUR NEW NACO PRESIDENT!

NEW VETERANS GRANT IN FORT WORTH

On September 8, 2017, the Texas Veterans Commissioner made a special visit to Fort Worth to award several non-profit organizations and foundations with grants to fund veteran services. The City of Fort Worth's Community Action Partners (CAP), a community action agency, was one of those awardees. Other awardees included United Way of Tarrant County and the Presbyterian Night Shelter. CAP was awarded \$300,000 to fund the Forward Home Veteran Assistance Program. This program will assist income-eligible veterans and families with rent, mortgage and utility bills. In addition to financial assistance, the program will connect



clients with other resources that included legal aid, training, employment and home modifications for those who are disabled.

WHAT ARE OPIOIDS AND WHY IS THERE AN EPIDEMIC?

What are opioids? Simply put, opioids are a type of narcotic pain medication. They are usually prescribed to patients to treat moderate-to-severe pain following surgery, injury, or health conditions such as cancer. Opioids work by binding to receptors in your brain, spinal cord, and other areas throughout your body.

More than 40 PEOPLE die every day from overdoses involving prescription opioids.

Examples include:

- · Codeine · Hydrocodone
- · Morphine · Oxycodone

Side effects include:

- · Tolerance · Physical dependence · Increased sensitivity to pain
- · Confusion · Depression · Nausea, vomiting, and dry mouth

Despite the risk and lack of evidence about long-term effectiveness, there has been an increase in the acceptance and use of prescription opioids for pain-management.

This epidemic is affecting people from all races and economic statuses. Anyone can become dependent on these drugs. Today, opioids kill more people than any other drug and car accidents.³ And it does not matter where you live, this epidemic is in urban and rural areas across the United States. Some states have more opioid prescriptions than people!³

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention tells us that the best way to prevent opioid overdose deaths is to:

- 1. Improve opioid prescribing
- 2. Reduce exposure to opioids
- 3. Prevent misuse
- 4. Treat opioid use disorder

Having mental illness or a history of alcohol or other substance abuse.

Risk Factors for Prescription Opioid Pain Reliever Abuse and Overdose

Living in rural areas and having low income.
