



CENSUS 2020 NEED TO KNOWS

- Every ten years, the country conducts a census to count every person in the United States.
- The next count will take place April 1, 2020.
- Census counts used to reapportion the U.S. House of Representatives, determining how many seats each state gets.
- Census counts also used to determine the number of electoral college votes a state gets.
- Census counts used by state officials to redraw congressional and state legislative boundaries to account for population shifts.
- The distribution of more than \$675 billion in federal funds, grants, and support to states, countries, and communities are based on census data. These funds support schools, hospitals, roads, public works, and other vital programs.
- An undercount of the Texas population of just 1% could translate to a loss of \$300 million per year in federal funding for the state.

TARRANT COUNTY CRIMINAL DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE 100TH ANNIVERSARY

This year is the 100th anniversary of the Tarrant County Criminal District Attorney's Office. That first office was created with only 9 employees. Since then Tarrant County has grown into Texas' 3rd largest county, and now has more than 340 attorneys, investigators and support staff serving in the CDA's office

Some of the most forward-thinking advances in Texas criminal justice history took place right here in Tarrant County. Among these milestones was the hiring of Assistant Criminal District Attorney Ollice Malloy, Jr. in 1959. Ollice, a former school teacher who went on to graduate from the University of Texas School of Law, was the first African American assistant criminal district attorney south of St. Louis. Appointed by then-Tarrant County CDA Doug Crouch, Ollice went on become the first black prosecutor to argue a murder case in the history of Texas criminal justice.

Tarrant County has had a total of 14 Criminal District Attorneys, including Tim Curry, who spent 37 years in office, and for whom our County's main criminal courts building is named. Then-CDA Curry first hired Sharen Wilson as a misdemeanor attorney. The first female Criminal District Attorney in Tarrant's history, she is now serving her second term in office. The office continues to seek to reflect and rep-

resent the increasingly diverse county in which we live, and for the first time 2 of the 4 office division chiefs are African American.

"My predecessors could never have imagined the way new legislative initiatives, forensic discoveries and cultural changes have continued to shape the criminal justice landscape in this county we love, and in the world around us," said Sharen Wilson. "As we begin our second century representing this community, I continue to ask of our employees that we meet each new task with the firm knowledge that in this job no day is unimportant, no decision is irrelevant, and no relationship is immaterial. They are all in the mission of providing equal justice for all residents of Tarrant County."

FREE SKILLS TRAINING AND JOB PLACEMENT

I want to introduce to you CLC, Inc.'s grant funded program for young adults. This new grant is a Reentry Employment Opportunities (REO) program funded by the Department of Labor. The REO program is for young adults ages 18 to 24 who have had some involvement in the criminal justice system.

HERE IS THE PROCESS:

FIRST STEP! We can take REO applicants at any time!

Interested young adults, case-workers, school counselors and other community based organizations working with this population can call us to set up an appointment with one of our case managers and get started with their application and registration. Walk-ins are always welcome! Our physical address is 6220 Anglin Drive, Fort Worth, TX 76119. Our phone number is 817-887-9720. If it is convenient, we



also offer group orientation and registration every Wednesday at 9:00am here at our Anglin address.

<u>DOCUMENTS:</u> We ask all of our REO candidates to please try to bring as many of their documents as possible on their first visit. These includes a birth certificate, social security card, a government issued photo ID (line a driver's license), any document that shows their involvement in the criminal justice system, and proof of their High School Diploma or GED (if they are HS graduates).

EDUCATIONAL SERVICE – We realize that a few REO candidates will need assistance to earn their High School Diploma. The REO program offers an educational track that leads to a High School Diploma, or GED. Candidates who choose this option may choose to stay in the program longer and take a skills training course or may seek employment after their academic program.

INDIVIDUAL GUIDANCE! – All REO candidates will be assigned to a case manager right after their enrollment in the program. The case manager will work with the participant to help him/her develop a Career Plan. This plan will enable the participant to attain the necessary job skills needed for a successful career.

<u>SERVICE OPTIONS</u> – CLC, Inc. offers additional services for its REO participants. Case managers will help participants create their resume, learn how to answer interview questions, coach them in learning the basics of money management and how to increase their credit rating, and help them learn what their strengths are. REO students are also eligible for transportation assistance, childcare and other related support services.

SKILLS TRAINING – The REO program also offers skills training classes in Welding, CNC Machining, Logistics, CDL Truck drivers' certification, Medical Front Office Assistance, Phlebotomy, Bookkeeping/QuickBooks, and more. Upon graduation participants will be paired with a job development coach who will work with them to find just the right job in the field in which they were trained.

<u>DIRECT PLACEMENT</u> – Some participants may choose to go directly to job placement. Our staff will work with these participants to get them ready to go to work and find just the right job to fit their existing skills and needs.


