It's that time of year where we look forward with great anticipation to the Tarrant Transportation Summit (TTS). Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, we have decided to forgo this year's Summit. TTS has become one of the most significant transportation events in Texas. It provides an excellent resource for business owners, community leaders, and citizens across the region to learn more about how the transportation landscape will look in the future.

Tarrant County Public Health (TCPH) and our community partners continue to navigate the almost year-long COVID-19 pandemic. Texas currently prioritizes those that fall into Phase 1A and 1B of the state's vaccination plan, including Texans 65 years of age and older and those over 16 years of age with certain medical conditions. Supplies of the vaccine continue to be limited, but Tarrant County will receive regular shipments. To check your qualifications and preregister for the vaccine through Tarrant County Public Health, visit <u>www.tarrantcounty.com/</u> covidshot. Due to the high volume of registrations through TCPH and limited vaccine availability, you will receive confirmation of registration, and be placed in the queue to



be assigned an appointment. TCPH will notify you of the date, time, and location of your appointment. Please note, this may take several weeks.

Once vaccine volume increases from continued shipments and community collaborations, more and more daily appointments will be available. You may also check with other area providers, pharmacies, and clinics for possible vaccine availability. *We urge a little patience as the vaccine effort continues!* 

I invite you to read on in this edition of the *Northeast Newsletter* for information about the City of Bedford's new mayor, City Point in North Richland Hills, the COVID-19 vaccine, Tarrant County Human Services, the City of Haslet, Empowering Seniors, senior tax preparation assistance and more!

Michael Boyter Mayor, City of Bedford BEDFORD

Although Mayor Michael Boyter has only served as Bedford's Mayor since November 2019, he has been a staple in the community dating back to serving on the Historical Commission and Beautification Commission prior to first being elected to the City Council in 2012.

Michael is proud to have been born and raised in HEB and often refers to having attended Donna Park Elementary, Hurst Junior High School, and LD Bell High School. His mother, Takako Boyter, immigrated to the U.S. from Japan and ultimately settled in Hurst in the late 1960s. As a single mother and one of only a few Asians in the area, she endured many hardships because of the cultural division of the time. Despite the challenges, the support of her friends and neighbors left a lasting impression on both her and Michael's lives.

Takako passed away early last year after a long struggle with dementia and Alzheimer's disease. Because of the kindness and support of the community during those "difficult times," Michael has devoted his service in an effort to "give back" and to also honor his mother.

### COVID-19 Vaccine: Helps protect you from getting COVID-19

As directed by the Texas Department of State Health Services, Tarrant County Public Health, along with other Texas-based health entities, provides vaccinations in phases. Vaccine appointments will first go to those most at risk of catching, spreading, or having severe complications from COVID-19. The initial groups are called Phase 1A and 1B. If you are eligible, please sign up and you will be assigned an appointment as vaccine becomes available.

If you are not eligible at this time, you can still sign up and TCPH will assign you a group as the State announces other phases. If you show up without an appointment, you will be turned away.

Because vaccine supply is currently limited and we're trying to provide a COVID-19 safe environment for all, there may be some lines outside to aid social distancing and further assure client safety. Please dress appropriately. If standing in line for an extended time is medically difficult, please speak to medical screeners on-site to make other arrangements.

Japanese-American Mayor in the State of Texas. Having been born and raised in HEB, this gives Mayor Boyter a unique perspective on the history of Bedford. With this in mind, he is always challenging the City to move things forward with innovation and efficiency in mind.

Despite the challenges of 2020, he has been working with the City Council in creating an aggressive agenda to take on a number of pressing issues in the City. Tantamount to these issues is his desire to create an "Organization of Excellence" at City Hall focused on the singular objective of improved attention to residents' needs. An example of this lies in hiring Jimmy Stathatos as Bedford's new City Manager this past August.

Mayor Boyter is focused on creating a new approach to Economic Development in the City. One example is in the newlyenvisioned Bedford Commons, which shifts from conventional apartments to a balanced development with single family residents, green space, and unique retail and restaurant opportunities. This new approach is already seeing widespread interest from developers and restauranteurs. After slow progress, the voter-approved Generations Park at the Boys Ranch is now moving forward with concrete pouring this week. Boyter is working with the City Manager to identify money savings opportunities in current and future budgets. This includes coordinating

with the 4B Board to create a new plan to jump-start work on the major streets that are in dire need of attention. Moving Bedford forward means making hard decisions after years of little to no progress. It also means responding to the concerns of residents and staff.

**NRH** ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT **Developer Breaks Ground on Former North Hills Mall, Called City Point** 



New homes and businesses will soon be built on the land along City Point Drive surrounding North Richland Hills City Hall. Centurion American Development Group is developing the 52 acres, which were once home to North Hills Mall. Located out of Farmers Branch, Centurion is a developer of master-planned communities, including The Riverwalk in Flower Mound, Entrada in Westlake, Mercer Crossing in Farmers Branch, and Founders Parc in Euless.

The new City Point development will have a mix of uses, including 70,000 square feet of restaurant and retail space along City Point Drive and a hotel on the corner of Boulevard 26 and Rodger Line Drive. Additionally, there will be 370 singlefamily homes and approximately 400 multi-family residences. Construction will be done in phases and is expected to take 5 to 7 years to reach build-out.

Originally part of the Calloway Family's farm, the property became North Hills Mall in the late 1970s. The mall thrived as a regional shopping center for several decades; however, with competition and changes in shopping patterns, customers and tenants moved elsewhere, and the mall eventually closed its doors in 2004. The mall owner was unsuccessful in revitalizing the property, so the building was demolished in 2007.

A key catalyst for the project was establishing a tax increment reinvestment zone (TIRZ) called Reinvestment Zone #3. Both the city and county agreed to allocate 25% of incremental property tax revenues within City Point toward the cost of public improvements.

In Spring 2020, construction broke ground on the infrastructure needed to support the new City Point development, including streets, sidewalks, street lighting, water lines, sewer lines, and drainage improvements.

## TARRANT COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES

Tarrant County Department of Human Services provides temporary rent and utility assistance to low-income county residents thanks to the County Commissioners' support and generosity. The department's mission is to prevent homelessness for people experiencing a crisis causing a reduction in income.

This department helps people when they need it the most. A 73-year-old woman lost her job after she became ill. Her \$794 monthly Social Security stipend was enough to cover rent, food, and medicine, but not enough to pay for utilities. Human Services kept her gas and electricity from being shut off. The agency is a safety net designed to help keep people safe and healthy and remain in their homes. The department does not supplement income but helps stabilize people - some are just one crisis away from being homeless.

Tarrant County Department of Human Services continues to operate during the pandemic. Although the office is closed to the public to protect staff and the public, dedicated employees provide needed financial assistance to applicants/clients during this tragic time through the telephone call center, drop box, and mail.

### **ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS**

There are basic requirements to be met to receive assistance. These include but are not limited to the following:

- Tarrant County resident;
- U.S. Citizen or permanent documented resident;
- An adult over 18 or emancipated minor;
- No accessible resources or assets;
- Must apply for SNAP and other resources;
- Must be disabled or registered for work;
- Must meet specific income guidelines;
- All income is counted and must be verified. Income includes child support, child's SSI, TANF, the income of any person living in the household, ongoing contributions from outside sources, and other income benefits.

### CATEGORIES OF ASSISTANCE

**DISABLED** - Clients must have a currently written verification from an MD or DO stating they are unable to work. Those with longterm disabilities are required to apply for Social Security benefits and may be assisted until they receive a decision from the Administrative Law Judge. Others with short-term disabilities are assisted until their physician releases them for employment.

**UNEMPLOYED** - Unemployed clients must have no ongoing income, including unemployment benefits. They are required to do job search contacts and attend employment classes. There is a 30-day waiting period for clients who have quit their job or were terminated. Unemployed clients may be assisted three times during a 12-month period.

**NEWLY EMPLOYED** - Clients who have been unemployed and have just been hired to a new full-time position but have not received their first paycheck may be eligible for assistance under this category.

**SPECIAL UTILITY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (SUAP)** - Applicants who receive Social Security benefits or similar income and who meet income guidelines may be eligible for limited utility assistance under this program. All adults living in the household must verify that they are on Social Security or are permanently disabled. The average household income for clients under this program is \$794 per month.

**CRISIS** - This assistance permits intervention when an unanticipated, time-limited financial emergency occurs, which is unplanned and could not be prevented, that causes deprivation of basic human needs such as food, shelter, and utilities.

**TRAINING ASSISTANCE PROGRAM -** Low-income residents of Tarrant County who are in the last six months of training for a demand occupation may be eligible for rent and utility assistance.

**COVID-19 (Disasters)** - Recently, the department created a category of assistance for rent and utilities related to a reduction in income due to disasters such as COVID-19.

The Call Center is open Monday-Thursday, 8:00 am -12:00 pm at 817-531-5620.



Welcome to our series "Northeast Tarrant County Cities," where we share information about one of the cities located in Precinct 3 in each newsletter. It's impossible to share everything on one page that makes a city great, but we hope to scratch the surface on what makes each city a wonderful place to live, work, and play.

Northeast Tarrant County is home to 16 municipalities in one of the most urbanized regions in the State of Texas. Commissioner Fickes, along with Tarrant County, partners with many entities, including our cities. With these partnerships, our communities continue to thrive via road projects, economic development, public health services, public safety, and emergency management.

Alliance Airport and I-35W in Tarrant and Denton Counties. Established in 1883, Haslet has matured from rural beginnings to become the home of unique residential and commercial opportunities fostering wellness, safety, and civic engagement. Haslet is poised for substantial growth for the next several years with five new residential subdivisions and multiple Haslet -based corporations offering jobs such as Amazon, JCPenney, and Williamson-Dickie.

Students attend the award-winning Northwest Independent School District (NWISD). The NWISD has a vision of empowering learners and leaders to impact the world positively and is one of the State's largest school districts. The new state-of-theart Haslet Elementary facility opened in 2020 to replace the decades-old existing school. Future plans have this campus joining with new middle and high schools to accommodate Haslet's growing student population.

Haslet is home to the award-winning Haslet Public Library fostering life-long learning and cultural enrichment. The Library provides a gathering place for area residents to take advantage of numerous programs for children and adults of all ages. In addition to traditional library materials, the library provides access to computers onsite and checkout of devices for personal use, e-books, audiobooks, and online access to multiple library collections through its membership in the North Texas Library Consortium. The Northwest Independent School District has recognized the Library as a community partner. It offers books listed on the NWISD student reading lists and online tools to assist students with researching assignments such as The Portal to Texas History and other databases.

The parks and trails are enjoyed by residents and visitors alike. John Gammill Park features a covered pavilion and a fenced-in play area with recently updated all-inclusive playground equipment. The adjacent Haslet Community Park features a perimeter walking trail with solar lighting, covered basketball/multi-use sports court, 18-hole disk golf course, covered picnic area, and restrooms. Other recreational offerings include tai chi, yoga, the senior and community center, and area sports organizations including the Haslet Sports Association for youth baseball, softball, basketball, and volleyball and the Haslet Area Soccer Association for youth soccer.

Haslet offers an annual slate of special events including the signature Wild West Fest and Rodeo, Christmas in the Park, Annual Easter Egg Hunt, Independence Day Celebration, National Night Out, and Haslet Hustle.

The Haslet Fire Department is a regional emergency services agency that provides fire and medical emergency response to citizens and residents of the immediate unincorporated surrounding area of north Tarrant County. Police protection services are contracted through and provided by the Tarrant County Sheriff's Department.

# **Decluttering: Why Less is More**

Decluttering is a trend that is sweeping the nation, and for good reason.

Clutter can be the source of stress, memory problems, and can make you less safe in your own home. Decluttering an entire home may seem like a daunting task, but benefits are absolutely worth the effort.

Why Declutter?

**SAFETY**. Whether you're downsizing to a smaller space or planning to age in place, home safety should be a top priority. Reducing clutter can help decrease your risk of dangerous falls and accidents that could lead to a loss of mobility and independence. # TAX PREPARATION ASSISTANCE

Note: The locator tools are updated throughout the filing season, so check back if you don't see a nearby site listed. Please review the other online resources and tax help tools on IRS.gov, including tax forms, instructions and publications, online payment methods, and options to file with IRS Free File – free for most tax-payers. The American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA), and Tax Consulting for the Elderly (TCE) offer free tax help to people who generally make \$57,000 per year or less. Tax counselors will answer your questions and assist with preparing your 2020 tax forms utilizing IRS-approved, professional computer programs.

# How Does Sleep Affect Your Heart Health?

Getting adequate sleep isn't just important for your energy levels—it's critical for your heart health, too. Sleep helps your body repair itself. Getting enough good sleep also helps you function normally during the day. Most adults need at least 7 hours of sleep each night. While it may be fine for a day or two, not getting enough sleep over time can lead to serious health problems—and make certain health problems worse.

### What can I do to get better sleep?

- Stick to a regular sleep schedule. Go to bed at the same time each night and get up at the same time each morning, including on the weekends.
- Get enough natural light, especially earlier in the day. Try going for a morning or lunchtime walk.
- Get enough physical activity during the day. Try not to exercise within a few hours of bedtime.
- Avoid artificial light, especially within a few hours of bedtime. Use a blue light filter on your computer or smartphone.
- Don't eat or drink within a few hours of bedtime; avoid alcohol and foods high in fat or sugar in particular.
- Keep your bedroom cool, dark, and quiet.

Work with your health care team to identify obstacles to good sleep, including other medical conditions.
