Tarrant County Emergency Management Summer Heat Safety Tips

Grapevine's Main Street Station



When Tom Santora imagined opening a luxury hotel attached to the new TEXRail station in Grapevine, he didn't picture a grand opening in the midst of a pandemic. But the Managing Director of Hotel Vin and Chief Commercial Officer at Coury Hospitality has been pleasantly surprised by their early success. Less than a year in, despite all the challenges 2020 could

muster, Grapevine's Main Street Station and the attached hotel are a hit.

"In this marketplace, this truly is going to be a landmark for the city. The stature of the facility -- when you think about it, this building will be here for hundreds of years to come -- it is truly a fantastic structure.

It's really something we believe that is going to be where everything starts and stops in relation to historic Grapevine Main Street," Santora said in an interview for the *Dallas Business Journal*. "Early stats have proven that this will be a catalyst to drive new business into the marketplace, whether it is business travel, meetings and conventions, or even additional leisure travelers."

He's right to be confident. Main Street Station was the number one destination for weekend TEXRail riders almost as soon as the new space opened in September 2020. During the average week, only the stop at DFW Airport sees more foot traffic.

Harvest Hall, the station's attached food hall, has already served an estimated 74.4k customers since its grand opening in February. Foot traffic and TEXRail ridership continue to climb as well, thanks to Texans' collaborative effort to overcome the coronavirus pandemic.


TARRANT COUNTY LAW ENFORCEMENT MEMORIAL



A long-awaited permanent tribute to Tarrant County law enforcement officers who died in the line of duty now stands centered in a wide walkway leading to the historic 1895 Tarrant County courthouse's west entrance. The ring-shaped memorial rests on a slab of pink granite and features a Texas star with a bronze Tarrant County seal at its center.

The Tarrant County Law Enforcement Memorial dedication held on May 14, 2021, currently honors 16 fallen Tarrant County peace officers.

This memorial aims to pay tribute and create a place where the community can honor lost law enforcement officers.

A Historical Moment in Time

The Fort Worth Stockyards National Historic District - Hotel Drover and Mule Alley

With the recent grand opening of Hotel Drover and restoration of historic Mule Alley, the Fort Worth Stockyards National Historic District is poised to preserve its unique western heritage for generations to come.

Hotel Drover embodies rustic luxury design through modern hacienda décor that honors the historical past of the Fort Worth Stockyards and the legendary men and women who drove cattle along the Chisholm Trail in the 1800s. The hotel embodies the same pioneering spirit and key principles of honor and dignity exemplified by the drovers and great cattlemen during this time. Located on Mule Alley fronting Marine Creek, the western resort offers over two acres of outdoor living space, fire pits, flagstone courtyards. multiple water features, a music stage, and outdoor games. The hotel also offers horseback riding, whiskey tastings, and s'mores kits. A one-of-a-kind tribute to western lifestyle, Hotel Drover has fireplace suites, bunkhouse rooms, and vintage-inspired retreats, all with an eye on embracing the Stockyard's rich Texas history.

Recently restored Mule Alley, comprised of two 108-year-old horse and mule barns, features many of the region's most iconic western brands. Retail includes King Ranch Saddle Shop, Lucchese Bootmaker, Kimes Ranch, Wrangler, HBarC, Proper Supply featuring Stetson, and the American Paint Horse Association's PH Barn Door. For dining, Mule Alley embraces Texas cuisine with offerings by some of the region's finest chefs, including Marcus Paslay, Tim Love, and Grant Morgan. Mule Alley features Provender Hall, Biscuit Bar, 97 West Kitchen & Bar, Sidesaddle Saloon, Shake Shack, and soon to open, Second Rodeo Brewing Co.

Both projects are due to the efforts of the Stockyards Heritage Development Company, a partnership established in 2012 between nationally recognized Majestic Realty Co. and Fort Worth's Hickman Investments. Created with the intention of thoughtfully reimagining the historic Fort Worth Stockyards, the company is dedicated to preserving the National Historic District legacy for locals and visitors alike.

Precinct 3 Maintenance Department


Precinct 3 crews reconstruct more than 26 miles of roadway every year using a full-depth reclamation (FDR) process. This process reuses the existing roadbed materials and incorporates cement slurry to create a new, stronger road base. This process is environmentally friendly, cost-effective, and can be accomplished very quickly with minimal traffic disruption. This past year, Precinct 3 purchased a Wirtgen Reclaimer equipped with a slurry pump and injection system that optimizes this process. Precinct 3's implementation of the improved process has been so successful that the Precinct 3 crew was highlighted in the Kirby-Smith spring newsletter.



Precinct 3 Maintenance Center News June 2021



Precinct 3 continues to complete a record number of projects in our cities each year. We have implemented some new technologies and methods to improve our full-depth reclamation process, increasing our productivity and improving our quality.

We are on schedule to complete 66 projects in 12 cities this year and four major projects on our Precinct 3 county roads. This winter, we completed an extension of John Day Rd. in the City of Haslet. John Day Road now connects Blue Mound Rd. to Avondale Haslet Rd. We also added turn lanes at the Bonds Ranch Rd. and Wagley Robertson Rd. intersection to improve traffic operations and safety.

Currently, there is a shortage of some construction materials that has affected our production. Still, we are staying flexible and have adapted to these issues and continue to keep on schedule.

INTERLOCAL PROJECTS

Interlocal projects are a cooperative effort between Tarrant County and cities to complete needed resurfacing and rehabilitation on selected city streets. The city provides the material funding, and the county provides the labor and equipment to perform the work. Projects we have completed, are in progress, or scheduled within the past year include:

Welcome to our series "Northeast Tarrant County Cities," where we share information about one of the cities located in Precinct 3 in each newsletter. It's impossible to share everything on one page that makes a city great, but we hope to scratch the surface on what makes each city a wonderful place to live, work, and play.

Northeast Tarrant County is home to 14 municipalities in one of the most urbanized regions in the State of Texas. Commissioner Fickes, along with Tarrant County, partners with many entities, including our cities. With these partnerships, our communities continue to thrive via road projects, economic development, public health services, public safety, and emergency management.

Hurst, a town of approximately 38,655 people within 9.92 square miles, is a centrally located community within the heart of the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex in Tarrant County. Major attractions in the city include North East Mall, Tarrant County College – Northeast Campus, and Bell Helicopter.

Hurst-Euless-Bedford (HEB) School District serves the City of Hurst. With more than 22,834 students, HEB ISD is rich in diversity with more than 60 different spoken native languages. This gives the district a distinctly international flavor.


The City of Hurst offers well-maintained, active parks and community facilities. Some highlights include the Community Parks: Chisholm Park that brings the great outdoors into the city by providing family fishing opportunities; Central Park, which is home to the Hurst Recreation Center, the Central Aquatics Center, and the Tennis Center; and Hurst Community Park providing outdoor fun with baseball fields and soccer fields. Hurst's Public Library acts as a vital educational institution to all citizens by providing access to information and offering professional assistance, materials, and programs supporting life-long learning, social needs, cultural enrichment, and leisure interests. The Library has resumed in-person programming and continues to offer virtual options.

The Hurst Police Department is a nationally accredited law enforcement agency, providing 24-hour response to the community's needs. The two divisions within the Department, Administrative Services and Operational Services, provide numerous specialized public safety services to the citizens of Hurst. The Department is a diverse community-based agency offering modern, professional, and courteous service to Hurst residents and the Northeast Tarrant County area. Their Mission Statement reflects their dedication to providing exceptional service to citizens and employees through a problem-solving approach, emphasizing a commitment to "Excellence Through Teamwork."

Fire Operations consists of 3 shifts of 51 firefighters, who work 48-hour rotations and report to the Assistant Chief. Each shift consists of a Shift Captain, 3 Lieutenants, 3 Driver Engineers, and 10 Firefighter/paramedics. They handle two engines, a quint-aerial/ladder truck, and two ALS ambulances, which are always available for emergencies. Engines respond to all first aid calls to enhance available manpower and treatment.

Keep Your Eyes on Your Eyes

June is Cataract Awareness Month

Of all of our five senses, the one that many people hold most dear is the gift of sight. The ability to watch our children and grandchildren grow, to marvel at the majesty of a sunset, and to enjoy our favorite movie are some of life's most precious rewards. But as we get older, our eyes get older too, which makes June's Cataract Awareness Month so important.

A cataract is a clouding of the eye's lens, which blocks or changes the passage of light into the eye. When this happens, vision may become blurry or dim. More importantly, cataracts are the world's leading cause of blindness. In the United States alone, more than 25 million Americans are estimated to have cataracts. Furthermore, as the population in America continues to age, the number of cataract cases is projected to increase by 50 percent to 38.5 million by 2032.

Because a cataract does not generally cause pain, redness, or tears, it is important to be on guard for its symptoms. These include:

- Decreasing vision with age
- Blurred or double vision
- Seeing halos around bright lights
- Difficulty distinguishing colors
- Frequent prescription changes for glasses
- Difficulty reading

While age is the most common reason for cataracts (and a natural result of aging), other risk factors can contribute to the development of cataracts including certain hereditary and physical traits, along with certain lifestyle habits. Among these are:

- Intense heat or long-term exposure to UV rays from the sun
- Certain diseases, such as diabetes
- Inflammation in the eye
- Hereditary influences
- Events before birth, such as German measles in the mother

- · Long-term steroid use
- Eye injuries
- Eye diseases
- Smoking

Fortunately, surgical procedures to remove cataracts have evolved considerably and can literally restore vision within minutes (typically under 30 minutes) with a fast, minor, and virtually pain-free procedure. Because cataracts are so common, and because the issue can be easily treated at a



very high success rate, cataract surgery has become the most commonly performed surgery in the U.S. each year.

In cataract surgery, the natural lens of the eye is removed and replaced with an artificial intraocular lens which allows the patient to see clearly again. In addition to improving vision, cataract surgery has also been shown to improve quality of life. And better vision means you can get back to doing the things you love and have to worry less that poor sight could contribute to a devastating fall.

To make sure cataracts don't affect your vision, let Cataract Awareness Month be your reminder to get regular eye exams and watch for the warning signs. Doing so is the best way to make sure that you will see clearly today and in the years to come.

HEAT, STRESS and SENIORS

Heat stress may affect older people more than others. Some people aged 65 and over may be at an increased risk of heat-related illnesses and need special care in hot weather. Risk factors include living alone, chronic medical problems, and certain medications.

Heat stress occurs when the body can't cool itself and maintain a healthy temperature. The body normally cools itself by sweating, but sometimes sweating isn't enough and the body temperature keeps rising. Heat stress is also known as hyperthermia. Heat-related illnesses range from mild conditions such as a rash or cramps to serious and potentially life-threatening conditions such as heatstroke.

The symptoms depend on the heat-related illness but may include: hot and dry skin, paleness, rapid heart rate, muscle cramps, nausea and vomiting, disorientation and confusion, delirium, fainting or coma, and worsening of pre-existing medical conditions.

Some medications increase the risk of heat stress. Risk varies according to the medication, for example:

- Beta-blockers (heart tablets) reduce the ability of the heart and lungs to adapt to stresses, including hot weather.
- Diuretics (fluid tablets) act on the kidneys and encourage fluid loss. This can quickly lead to dehydration in hot weather.
- Opioids and sedatives can reduce the person's awareness of physical discomfort, which means symptoms of heat stress may be ignored.

This is only a small list of medications. Be sure to discuss your medications and heat reactions with your doctor or pharmacist.



It is crucial to be sensible in hot weather, remember to: stay indoors, avoid strenuous activities, wear lightweight clothing, and drink cool water throughout the day. Other simple actions that can reduce your risk of heat stress include:

- Watch Weather Reports temperatures above 98.6°F are particularly dangerous; also note the humidity level because sweating is not as effective at cooling you down when the weather is very humid.
- Reduce caffeine and alcohol caffeinated and alcoholic drinks have mild diuretic action. Limit tea, coffee, and alcohol in hot weather.
- Take note of the color of your urine brown or dark yellow urine suggests dehydration.
