In recognition of National Work Zone Awareness Week, April 11-15, 2022, this is a friendly reminder to drive safely when passing through the state's more than 3,400 active work zones. In 2020, more than 22,000 traffic crashes occurred in work zones in Texas, resulting in 186 deaths, a 9 percent increase in traffic fatalities over the previous year. Another 680 people were seriously injured.

Driver Safety: Work zones often present a challenging environment for drivers to navigate. Drivers may encounter uneven pavement, narrow lanes, concrete barriers, slow-moving heavy equipment and vehicles that make sudden stops. Driving too fast and not paying attention are the leading causes of work zone crashes. Watch for warning signs and stay alert when driving through work zones. We want to ensure everyone and their passengers get home safely.

Please keep the following tips in mind when driving through work zones:

- Plan ahead to avoid delays.
- Pay attention and put the phone away
- Don't tailgate
- Obey road crew flaggers
- Slow down and follow posted work zone speed limits
- Remember, traffic fines double when workers are present and can cost up to \$2,000.00

Euless, TX

Glade Parks is an exciting destination in the growing and impressive Euless community, with constant energy and comfort in popular and excellent retail and residential just five miles from DFW Airport. Glade Parks enhances community opportunities for the City of Euless while at the same time enabling the city to serve regional needs. With easy access from adjacent Grapevine and Colleyville at the southwest quadrant of State Highway 121 and Glade Road, Glade Parks brings you choice and convenience, with more than 800,000 square feet of retail, dining, and entertainment on 194 acres.

Development within Glade Parks continued steadily over the past six to eight months. This master-planned development intends to promote contained, mixed-use development consisting of restaurants, major retail, and residential neighborhoods.



Recently Glade Parks has announced two new tenants for the current vacated spaces of 24-Hour Fitness and Forever 21. These spaces will be occupied by EOS Fitness and Kids Empire, an active playground and events center for children.

In addition, Navy Federal Credit Union is one of the latest additions to Glade Parks. Work continues on Walk-On's Sports Bistreaux, located beside 54th Street Restaurant and Drafthouse. Valvoline Instant Oil Change, located adjacent to Quik Trip, is nearing completion. Site development work has begun for Glade Parks Block C, Lot 5, which will be the location of a new six tenant in-line commercial building. Lot 5 is located between Rio Grande Boulevard and Highway 121, north of Goodnight Trail.

John has been employed with Precinct 3 for 18 years. John welcomes the responsibilities of the new position.


Heather Montoya

A Historical Moment in Time

"The History of Bob Jones"



John Dolford "Bob" Jones was born a slave in 1850, the son of white slaveholder Leazer Alvis Jones and his slave girl, Elizabeth, known as Lizzie. Leazer left his white wife and four children in Arkansas before the Civil War and traveled with Lizzie and their mixed-race children to Texas, where he bought land in northern Tarrant County.

As a young teen, Bob worked his father's land as a slave. At the end of the Civil War, Leazer freed him and returned to his white family in Arkansas, leaving Lizzie and her children behind. Bob and his brother, Jim, bought the 60-acre farmstead from their father. Bob started buying more land, amassing more than 1,000 acres, one of the largest holdings in present-day Southlake, according to the Southlake Historical Society.

In 1874, Bob married Almeady Chisum, the mixed-race daughter of Texas cattleman John Chisum and his slave, Jensie. The couple had 10 children and built a log house that was eventually expanded to a two-story structure with a balcony and wraparound porches. A successful farmer and rancher, Bob hired black and white sharecroppers and workers for his operation. He built a family church and the one-room Walnut Grove School for his children and other nearby black children, who were banned from attending white schools. "He hired teachers from Dallas during the summer to come teach at the school," recalled his grandson Bobby Jones, who grew up on the farm and became an epidemiologist for Tarrant County.

After Bob's death in 1936, his children intended to carry on the family tradition of farming and ranching the Jones land, but that was not to be. First the landmarks Bob created began to disappear: Mount Carmel Baptist Church and the family home burned down, and the school closed and eventually fell apart. After that, most of the land was lost to the construction of Lake Grapevine, which began in the 1940s, Bobby said. Some Jones family descendants held small plots until the 1990s, but most of the heirs were forced to go elsewhere for work. "They needed to figure out some other way to make a living," Bobby said. "So my daddy [Emory Jones] and uncle Jinks [Jones] opened an auction barn." Auctions were held several times a week on a dusty site at White's Chapel Boulevard and SH 114 from 1947 until 1984. The brothers' wives ran a café to feed the many auction-goers, passers-by and truckers who hauled rocks to Grapevine for the lake dam. It is regarded as the first integrated café in Texas. "It was a café for anyone who wanted to come," Bobby said. "Segregation was not something we were really aware of other than the fact that we couldn't go to school with white kids."

Besides the park and the nature center and preserve, the Carroll school district named its newest elementary school Walnut Grove in tribute to the legacy of Bob Jones. "Bob Jones was truly an American success story," said Debra Edmondson, president of the board of the Bob Jones Nature Center and Preserve. "And I'm proud to say that we continue to tell that story."

Tarrant County Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP)

The 2020 Care 4 Tarrant program provided rental assistance to over 2,300 households within Tarrant County, but a large need still exists. Through ERAP, Tarrant County hopes to continue providing rent and utility assistance to residents financially hurt by COVID-19. ERAP is open to Tarrant County renters outside the cities of Fort Worth and Arlington.



Applications opened on Monday, March 29th, 2021 and will close Saturday April 30th at 5 p.m.

Specialty Utility Assistance Program (SUAP)

The Special Utility Assistance Program (SUAP) offered by Tarrant County Department of Human Services provides assistance with the utility bills for low income Tarrant County residents who receive monthly Social Security benefits (SSA-Retirement, SSI, SSDI) or another long-term federal disability or retirement program income (Pension, VA) and if working (wages).

The gross benefit amount cannot exceed the current Human Services assistance level guidelines based on the number of individuals residing in the home.




Research tells us that older people with an active lifestyle:

VITA is an IRS supported, free income tax preparation program for low- to moderate-income individuals and families. Community volunteers, certified by the IRS, help taxpayers prepare their tax returns at no cost and make sure they claim valuable tax credits for which they're eligible, including the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) and Child Tax Credit (CTC).

VITA helps taxpayers who make less than \$60,000 per year and need to file a return for the prior or current tax year.

Taxpayers must have an appointment. No waiting rooms will be available. This service began January 15, 2022 and ends April 30, 2022.

Curbside Drop-off Service

Curbside drop-off allows taxpayers to drop off their tax documents beginning in early January at a choice of several VITA locations. Schedule a drop-off appointment <u>online</u> or call 682-428-2939.

In-person Help

Traditional, in-person service will be offered at three locations. Taxpayers must have an appointment; no waiting rooms are available. Schedule an appointment <u>online</u> or by calling 682-428-2939. *Do not call the centers directly,* you will be redirected to the appointment line.
