TARRANT COUNTY HISTORICAL COMMISSION

All Texas county historical commissions are established under Chapter 318 of the State of Texas' Local Government Code.

Each local County Commissioner's Court appoints members to the County Historical Commission to preserve the county's historic cultural resources. To accomplish this, the Tarrant County Historical Commission members have two primary functions; resource identification and education.

Resource identification consists of three parts.

1) A continuing survey of the county to determine the existence of historic buildings and other historical and archeological sites, private archeological collections, important endangered properties, or other historical features within the county.

2) The commission should develop and maintain its inventory of surveyed individual properties and districts.

3) The commission should establish a system for the periodic review and assessment of the condition of designated properties in the county.

For the Education component, the commission should strive to create countywide awareness and appreciation of historic preservation and its benefits and uses. These directives are accomplished through committees that oversee various aspects of the TCHC's work.

- •Archeology & Endangered Properties Committee
- Archives Committee
- •Cemetery Committee
- •Community Outreach Committee
- •Executive Committee
- •Finance and Budget Committee
- •Heritage Tourism Committee
- •Historic Courthouse Committee
- •Historical Marker Committee
- •History Appreciation, Education, and Awards Committee

There is an education component to each of these committees while the bulk of the survey work is done through the Archeology & Endangered Properties Committee.

Each of these committees has set goals for this year and beyond that will help it accomplish these directives. For instance, a county survey of historical buildings, landmarks, etc. had not been done since the 1980s. Although a study of this type along with collecting other pertinent surveys and documents, may take a year or

more, at least the process has been started. From an educational standpoint, the TCHC has been conducting a variety of programs and is set to do even more from a community outreach viewpoint. Exhibits are available on several county history subjects that can be borrowed for a display to the public. The State Historical Markers program is well established and active in the county. We have plans for historical interpretive signage in cemeteries. Also, 12,000 people visit our Tarrant County Courthouse each year and we are putting plans together to enhance those visitor's experiences while at the courthouse and encourage school field trips to visit the 1895 Room exhibits.

Economic Development - City of Hurst

It all started in 1909 when William Letchworth Hurst made a deal with the Rock Island Railroad where he would donate his land on Highway 10 to them for tracks to be used for the first rail cars to connect Fort Worth and Dallas. His only demand was that they would use his namesake at the train stop. The popular fiddle playing entertainer was known as Uncle Billy, and he made history that year with the area being designated as Hurst, and it was eventually incorporated some 40 years later as a city. What Mr. Hurst and our original founding fathers diligently worked at was creating a framework of goods and services that allowed residents to thrive as they made history.

As Economic Development has progressed over the years, many new businesses and buildings have been built and are permanent to the Hurst landscape. In Uncle Billy's wildest imagination, he could not have predicted what a retail hub the city would become.

The third largest shopping center in the State of Texas opened in 1971 when the country's largest shopping center developer, Simon Property Group, opened North East Mall at one of Tarrant County's busiest highway intersections where Airport Freeway meets Interstate 820. Its success mounted over the years, and an expansion and full renovation occurred in 2000 with the addition of Dillard's, Macy's, and Nordstrom. This caused a "velcro" effect as new retail opened all around it and today the west Pipeline Corridor is the city's busiest. In 2014, the nearby highways, 121/183 were expanded and now carry over 230k cars per day. The shopping center stays nearly 100% occupied each year and aids greatly in the regional draw for the area.

Cities thrive on Economic Development. It is a good year when many new businesses choose your city to open a new location. Over the last ten years, the City of Hurst has averaged the opening of



125 new businesses per year occupying 350k. sq.ft. Of that group that opened over the last 12 months, 19 of them have been restaurants. Food service establishments represent the most popular merchandise category amongst citizens and also help to extend shopping visits. They are also popular with landlords and Hurst has been fortunate to experience the opening of several new shopping centers that enjoy new restaurant offerings that have added to their immediate popularity. Examples include Chicken Salad Chick, Burning Rice Korean BBQ, Rusty Taco, Ono Poke, Tropical Smoothie Café, Tiff's Treats, and Corner Bakery. These four new shopping centers have enhanced the retail mix and selection and have aided the City in enjoying 95% occupancy of the 6.6M.S.F. of retail properties.

The Hurst Conference Center continues to be a strong economic development generator since its opening in 2010 and averages 360 events per year. This past year the new Hilton Garden Inn which is attached to the Conference Center opened and has complimented the 61,000 event attendees nicely as they can now enjoy any one of four business hotels in the Hurst Town Center. Candlewood Suites is also under construction now in Town Center and will open after the first of the year. Precinct 3 Maintenance Center News June 2019



Our construction season schedule is busting at the seams. We have a record number of Tarrant County and Interlocal Projects completed, in progress and planned for the FY 2019 year.

After completion of two large projects on Cheek-Sparger Road in Colleyville last fall, we took on a couple of significant projects over the winter months. In December, we partnered with Northwest Independent School District, TxDOT, and the City of Fort Worth to construct a plan to extend the southbound US 287 frontage road and relocate the southbound entrance ramp near V.R. Eaton High School. The new frontage road extension and ramp opened in March and has greatly improved traffic operations in the area.

The other winter project was the construction of a new county roadway, Wagley Robertson (extension). This new roadway is on the City of Fort Worth Master Thoroughfare Plan and will help meet the traffic needs of the developing area.

Other Interlocal and County Projects we have completed, in progress or scheduled include:

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For more than a century, ACH Child and Family Services have provided needed resources and skills to children and families struggling with life's challenges. ACH offers a wide range of services including foster care, adoption, Emergency Shelter Care, services to homeless youth, and free Crisis Counseling. In 2014, ACH was asked by state leaders to launch Community-Based Care in seven North Texas counties, a program designed to improve foster care services in Texas.

Now, as the coordinator of services for over 2,400 youth in foster care annually, ACH is clear on what services are needed to help youth heal from the trauma they have experienced. ACH has identified a significant lack of programs for teenagers with more challenging behavior problems.



These youth—with trauma so unimaginable—are at high risk of hurting themselves and others, abusing drugs, and running away. However, by helping them understand that they are safe, that some adults can be trusted, and that they can relax and not worry about protecting themselves from an abuser, ACH can help heal their trauma.

That's why we're just weeks away from introducing an innovative new program. Tarrant and the other counties we serve will now have a secure facility staffed by treatment teams who will put our highest-needs teenagers on an *accelerated* path to success. With this kind of help, these youth can make amazing strides in their development.

ACH will then connect them to a


support system with the vision of eventually living successfully in a family—the best setting to continue to develop and learn to be an independent, contributing member of society.



It's Time to Chill!

Too much heat is not safe for anyone. It is even riskier if you are older or have health problems. It is important to get relief from the heat quickly. If not, you might begin to feel confused or faint. <u>Your heart</u> could become stressed and stop beating.

Being hot for too long can be a problem. It can cause several illnesses, all grouped under the name hyperthermia:

- ⇒ Heat syncope is a sudden dizziness that can happen when you are active in hot weather. If you take a heart medication called a beta blocker or are not used to hot weather, you are even more likely to feel faint. Rest in a cool place, put your legs up, and <u>drink water</u> to make the dizzy feeling go away.
- ⇒ Heat cramps are the painful tightening of muscles in your stomach, arms, or legs. Cramps can result from hard work or exercise. Though your body temperature and pulse usually stay normal during heat cramps, your skin may feel moist and cool. Find a way to cool your body down. Rest in the shade or a cool building. Drink plenty of fluids, but not those with <u>alcohol</u> or caffeine.
- \Rightarrow Heat edema is a swelling in your ankles and feet when you get hot. Put your legs up to help reduce swelling. If that doesn't work fairly quickly, <u>check with your doctor</u>.
- ⇒ Heat exhaustion is a warning that your body can no longer keep itself cool. You might feel thirsty, dizzy, weak, uncoordinated, and nauseated. You may sweat a lot. Your body temperature may stay normal, but your skin may feel cold and clammy. Some people with heat exhaustion have a rapid pulse. Rest in a cool place and get plenty of fluids. If you don't feel better soon, get medical care. Be careful—heat exhaustion can progress to heat stroke.

Heat Stroke—A Medical Emergency If you have heat stroke, you need to get medical help right away. Older people living in homes or apartments without air conditioning or fans are at most risk. People who become dehydrated or those with chronic diseases or alcoholism are also at most risk. Signs of heat stroke are:

- Fainting (possibly the first sign) or becoming unconscious
- Body temperature over 104°F (40°C)
- A change in behavior—confusion, agitation, staggering, being grouchy, or acting strangely
- Dry, flushed skin and a strong, rapid pulse or a slow, weak pulse

• NorthGate will open three new bridges this summer – the northbound SH 26 off-ramp to northbound SH 121, eastbound Bass Pro Drive and southbound SH 121 off-ramp to I-635. Opening these bridges will allow crews to move to new work areas on the project.

• Once the new bridges are open to traffic, crews will begin demolishing the old structures. This will require full weekend highway closures to accommodate this work safely. We encourage everyone to check the website for up-to-date lane closure information.

• Utility, drainage, grading, and paving work will continue on the project throughout the summer.



• Construction activity on the east side of SH 26 continues with concrete placement of driveways, sidewalks, and lighting foundations from John McCain Road to Pleasant Run Creek. Construction of the remaining segments of the side streets that tie into SH

26 from the east side is ongoing. Work on the west side of SH 26 also continues from north of Little Bear Creek bridge to north of Centerpark Drive with concrete pavement placement and driveway and sidewalk installation as well as the reconstruction of Centerpark Drive west of SH 26. Project completion is estimated for Late 2019.

• FM 1938 construction activity on the north end of the project continues with the construction of the new southbound lanes from near Brook Forest Drive north to Randol Mill Avenue and the reconstruction of Fawkes Lane at FM 1938. Future con-

struction activity on the north end includes installation of the remaining irrigation, landscaping, and lighting. On the south end of the project, the screen wall construction on the east side of FM 1938 is progressing. Project completion is estimated for Summer 2019.







FHWA Work Zone Facts and Statistics

Work zones play a key role in maintaining and upgrading our nation's roadways. Unfortunately, daily changes in traffic patterns narrowed rights-of-way, and other construction activities often create a combination of factors resulting in crashes, injuries, and fatalities. These crashes also cause excessive delays, especially given the constrained driving environment.

- ⇒ Work Zone Exposure. In the US, one work zone fatality occurs for every 4 billion vehicle-miles of travel.
- ⇒ Work Zone Fatalities. Between 2016 and 2017, fatal crashes in work zones increased by 3 percent while fatal crashes outside of work zones decreased by 1.5 percent.
