Dr. Brad Schnautz, was named GCISD superintendent in March of 2023.

Dr. Schnautz joined GCISD in 2017 as Deputy Superintendent, leading the pre-kindergarten through 12th-grade instructional, athletics, and fine arts programs. While working closely with and supporting executive directors, directors, and principals, GCISD continued the tradition of academic excellence and success in fine arts and athletics.

A native Texan from Bryan, Dr. Schnautz began his career in education in

Dr. Schnautz is a civic leader in the community as well. He is a past president of the Grapevine Rotary Club and continues to serve as an active member.

He recently joined the Baylor Scott & White Regional Medical Center of Grapevine Board and serves on the Board of Directors for both the Grapevine Chamber of Commerce and the Colleyville Chamber of Commerce.





ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Opening of NTE 35W Segment 3C in Texas



The last segment of the North Tarrant Express 35W project, connecting downtown Fort Worth and the AllianceTexas development and Denton County to the north, officially opened on **Tuesday**, **June 20**. The 6.7-mile section of I-35W, spanning from the 81/287 Decatur cutoff to Eagle Parkway in AllianceTexas, was completed three months ahead of schedule. Construction began in 2020 and included:

- The reconstruction of the main lanes.
- Construction of expanded frontage roads.
- The addition of two new TEXpress-managed lanes in each direction.

This \$1-billion project, which Ferrovial Construction and Webber constructed at no cost to taxpayers, is part of a larger \$7-billion network of managed lanes throughout North Texas that accommodate over one million vehicle trips daily.

The NTE 35W, Segment 3C project, is one of three reconstructed segments along the most highly congested parts of the I-35W corridor. The \$1.4-billion Segment 3A project, extending from I-30 to I-820, was completed between May 2014 and July 2018. The \$256-million Segment 3B project, extending from I-820 to the US 81/287 cutoff, was completed between April 2013 and November 2017.



Texas A&M-Fort Worth Breaks Ground on First Building

A new project at Texas A&M-Fort Worth is underway to establish an urban research campus in southeast downtown. The goal is to boost the economy and create an innovation district in the region. The project includes the construction of the Law and Education Building, an eight-story structure that will cost \$150 million. This building will house the Texas A&M School of Law and other academic programs. In collaboration with the city of Fort Worth and Tarrant County, two more campus buildings will be constructed over four city blocks. The Law and Education Building is set to be finished by 2025, while the first three buildings will be completed by 2027. This project promises to benefit the region significantly, particularly in education and economic development. Texas A&M-Fort Worth is embarking on an exciting new project - creating an urban research campus in southeast downtown.





A Historical Moment in Time

"The Settlement of Roanoke"

Roanoke is a charming and historic city located at the intersection of U.S. Highway 377 and State Highway 114 on the Missouri Pacific line and Henrietta and Denton creeks. It is situated just two miles south of Grapevine Lake and seventeen miles southwest of Denton in south central Denton County.

The area was first settled in 1847 on the original land grant of Travis Wright. Twenty families from Missouri led by Louis and Charles Medlin settled near the confluence of Denton and Henrietta Creeks and named the area Medlin Center after their leaders. However, the site was often flooded, and in 1879, the community was moved to higher ground one mile south, called Garden Center or Garden Valley.

In 1881, the Texas and Pacific Railway crossed the area and missed Garden Center by only a few miles. The residents then moved to the rail line and began building the community known as Rawranoke or Roanoke. Roanoke quickly became a cattle center,



with a bustling community of cattlemen, a saloon, a horse trough, and a water tank in the center of Oak Street. The early days of Roanoke also saw the establishment of two hotels, the Pacific and Eureka, as well as the appointment of Gus Wiggs as the first postmaster in 1882. In 1902, Postmaster William Cowan inaugurated the first Rural Route for Roanoke. In 1933, Roanoke was incorporated during the Depression, with Mr. H.W. Jenkins elected the first mayor. Roanoke purchased its first fire truck in 1948, a 1923 American LaFrance, and in 2000, the city completed a mini-museum honoring all the volunteer firefighters.

Roanoke has seen significant growth over the years, becoming one of the fastest-growing cities in Texas. Despite this growth, the city remains committed to preserving its rich history and tradition. Visitors can explore Historic Downtown Roanoke and experience the city's timeless friendly charm.

Today, Roanoke offers easy access to major metropolitan amenities like airports, highways, entertainment, and shopping. It is a wonderful place to live or visit, with a rich history, friendly people, and a commitment to growth and progress.

NON-PROFIT HIGHLIGHTS

TARRANT FOOD BANK

Founded in 1982, the Tarrant Area Food Bank serves as the regional clearinghouse and primary source of donated food for hunger-relief charities and feeding programs in Tarrant County and 12 surrounding counties. As a member of Feeding America, the nationwide network of food banks, the Tarrant Area Food Bank benefits from various partnerships with the private industry and government sectors for sourcing and rescuing healthy donated foods from American farmers, national grocery retailers, fisheries, restaurants, food manufacturers and distributors. Because of these partnerships, the Tarrant Area Food Bank sources and rescues more than 60 million pounds of food each year and distributes 1 million meals each year to families in need of emergency food assistance through its network of over 500 partner agencies across its 13-county service area such as soup kitchens, senior centers, church food pantries, and schools.

The Tarrant Area Food Bank recently announced its plans to increase the fresh produce it distributes across its 13-county service area by establishing a regional Agricultural Hub. In March 2023, it hosted a ground-breaking ceremony to welcome the new Sid Richardson Foundation Agricultural Hub in Fort Worth. With the completion of the Agricultural Hub, the food bank will receive donated fresh produce via agreements with local farmers in the Tarrant Area and American growers regionally. The fresh produce will be sorted and prepared for distribution to over 500 TAFB local partner agencies and other Feeding America food banks in the region, providing nutritious food to neighbors in need. The Agricultural Hub was made possible through public-private partnerships with funding from the Texas Department of Agriculture, Tarrant County, and the City of Fort Worth, and private philanthropic funding from the Sid W. Richardson Foundation and other generous funders.



Led by President & CEO Julie Butner, the Tarrant Area Food Bank envisions communities where everyone has the food they need and works to empower our community to end hunger and improve health. Before joining the Tarrant Area Food Bank in January 2020, Julie spent most of her career working in the healthcare and hospitality industries, specifically on food and nutrition. She has held various leadership positions in operations and business development. Julie also served as a Captain in the United States Army during Operation Desert Storm.

Julie graduated from Texas Christian University with a Bachelor of Science in Nutrition and Coordinated Dietetics and holds a Master of Science in Food Systems Management with an emphasis in Health Promotion from the University of Oklahoma. Julie is a Registered, Licensed Dietitian.

Julie has served the Fort Worth community through leadership roles in many organizations, including Fort Worth Circle Theatre, Leadership Fort Worth, Delta Gamma Fraternity, Leukemia Society, The Cowtown Marathon, and Fort Worth Sister Cities.
