Education Foundation Supports Students and Teachers

The HEB ISD Education Foundation was established in 1995 as a non-profit organization designed to support the school district. The Foundation has four goals:

- Encouraging all students to work to their highest potential;
- Rewarding teachers for innovative efforts and exemplary teaching;
- Building public awareness and confidence in our schools;
- Involving the community in assuring a quality education for the leaders and workers of tomorrow.

Innovative Teaching Grants

The Foundation has a Board of Directors with school district staff, business leaders, and community volunteers, who work on annual projects to meet their goals. Each year, the Foundation provides

\$32,000 or more in Innovative Teaching Grants to teachers who need extra funds to teach special lessons or to purchase books or materials not normally provided for by the school district. Teachers submit grant applications, which are evaluated by a committee that includes members of the Foundation. Many teachers would not be able to carry out these special projects without the annual grant program. Teachers apply for grants each spring, and winners receive the grant funding at the beginning of each new school year. Teachers then have the entire school year to use the funds.

Awards of Excellence Dinner

Each spring, the foundation hosts the Awards of Excellence dinner, which

honors 31 students in 15 fields of study from LD Bell, Trinity, KEYS, and the Technical Education Center. The Foundation also recognizes the students' mentor teachers at this event. Business and community leaders sponsor students and present medals to each winner. Sponsorships start at \$250.

Cornerstone Club

The Cornerstone Club encourages individuals and businesses to donate \$100 each year to support the Foundation. When donors reach the \$200 level, they can purchase a commemorative brick, which will be engraved and then placed in front of the Pat May Center to create a paved walkway. Those who donate recognize that the Cornerstone Club is an ongoing support project to keep the dollar level high enough to continue to fund the teaching grants.

Hall of Fame

Beginning in 2008, a group of outstanding alumni and community individuals who have helped support the HEB ISD are inducted into the HEB ISD Hall of Fame. These inductees are recognized and honored at a gala event in the fall.

NORTHEAST TRANSPORTATION SERVICE (NETS) - A PARTNERSHIP IN TRANSPORTATION

Transportation Services in NE Tarrant County



Transportation is an important issue facing Tarrant County, especially when it comes to providing affordable transportation options to both elderly and disabled citizens. Seven cities throughout Tarrant County have come together in a partnership to provide these transportation needs to their residents.

The Northeast Transportation Service (NETS) is a partnership of the cities of Bedford, Euless, Grapevine, Haltom City, Hurst, Keller and North Richland Hills.

NETS is a door-to-door, demand respon-

sive para-transit service and is available to any resident of a participating city who is disabled or 55 years of age or older. NETS may be used for medical appointments, socialization, employment, essential shopping and education purposes.

NETS brings many organizations together to provide this service to its customers. The Board of Directors of the NETS Urban Transit District is comprised of the city manager of each member city. The NETS Board establishes the annual budget, fare policy, and passenger eligibility requirements. The Board meets every other month to discuss the services provided and how to better serve its customers.

In addition to the cooperation of the seven cities, NETS has partnerships with

both the Fort Worth Transportation Authority (The T) and the American Red Cross. An inter-local agreement is in place with The T to provide transit services and oversight of operations. The T then contracts with a non-profit agency, the American Red Cross, to operate the service and maintain the NETS vehicles. The T and American Red Cross report monthly operating and performance statistics to the NETS Board.

An Historical Moment In Time

Lake Erie



The Northern Texas Traction Company was organized by the Stone and Webster group of Boston in March 1901 and began acquiring street railway lines in Fort Worth with plans to consolidate, extend, and improve properties and service. One of the company's major projects was the Fort Worth-Dallas Interurban. The original site generated electrical power for the Interurban and included a new electric generating plant, car barns, and operating headquarters and was located at Handley, a village six miles east of Fort Worth, where the company owned some 234 acres of land. To provide condensing water for the power plant, a creek was dammed creating an artificial lake covering about 30 acres just south of the plant. This was Lake Erie.

Land surrounding the lake and plant was covered in native post oak trees which provided abundant shade and an attractive setting for picnicking. The company developed this land into a free public park with a small open air concert pavilion that attracted riders on the electric trolley to Handley even before the Interurban was completed to Dallas in 1902. Early newspaper accounts refer to this as "Handley Park" (later called Lake Erie Park and Interurban Park). Amusement seekers arrived at the Interurban depot and followed the wide wooden boardwalk over a bridge to the Lake Erie Park area.

Boating was especially popular in the afternoons as well as the evenings, and the boat docks were located on the pier connecting the small peninsula to the south

shore. A large white two-story auditorium pavilion, built on the end of the peninsula extending out over the water, was known for its excellent dance floor and cool lake breezes. Crowds from Fort Worth and Dallas were entertained there with gala social events, public dances, musical concerts, and a variety of other activities.

In 1903, the Traction Company ran ads to attract customers to the Interurban. With the coming of summer, the company offered free entertainment each Sunday



afternoon and evening and public dancing three nights a week. The roundtrip fare from Fort Worth was 20 cents and from Dallas, one dollar. Cars left every 30 minutes on Sunday afternoon and when special events were being held. Entertainment events included sacred music concerts; July 4th picnic and dance; Madam Josephine Riffle, the celebrated lady

whistler; J.B.D. Wilson, a famous trombone soloist; concert by Ellery's Royal Italian Band; a balloon ascension and double parachute leap by the famous trained balloon dog "Gip" and his master; Madame Green, a lady balloonist holding the record for having jumped from the highest altitude of any living aeronaut; and Professor Charles Felton, the most intrepid of living high divers. Later entertainment also included a skating rink, motion pictures, and vaudeville.

A 1917 layout of the Northern Texas Traction Company's facilities at Handley shows a covered walkway connecting the depot, a restaurant and store and the power plant. By the 1920's, the popularity of the Lake Erie resort had waned, due to competition from the new and much larger Lake Worth resort. The coming of the motor car and the improvement of roads and highways also led to decline in riders on the Interurban. The Handley property was acquired by a trustee June 1, 1930, when the Northern Texas Traction Company went into receivership. When Texas Electric Service Company purchased the property from the trustee on December 31, 1932, all amusement devices and buildings had been removed.

Through the years, Lake Erie continued to serve its prime purpose—to furnish condensing water to the Handley power plant. The present Handley Plant has a total of 1,375,000 kilowatts of installed generating capacity, whose cooling water needs are met by the 2,275-acre Lake Arlington. The history of the Handley Plant chronicles the transition from reciprocating engine to the steam turbine and the change from 25-cycle railway load to 60-cycle power and light. Lake Erie was constructed in a day when central-station power was in its infancy—600 kw generators were common and 30-acre lakes were more than adequate—and it passed from the scene with those first small generating units as new technology and modern society required ever increasing amounts of electricity.

TARRANT COUNTY ELECTIONS



Tarrant County Elections Center

One of the most important functions of county government is to facilitate the electoral process for its citizens. The Elections Department provides voter registration services and conducts all federal, state, and county elections. The Department also conducts certain elections for municipalities, school districts, and other political subdivisions that contract with Tarrant County for election services. Elections Administrator Steve Raborn, along with Assistant Administrator Gayle Hamilton and a full-time staff of 35 employees in three divisions work year-round to fulfill the Elections Department's mission.

The Voter Registration Division, managed by Patricia Benavides, is responsible for conducting voter registration and maintaining accurate registration records. The GIS section within the Voter

Registration Division maintains records pertaining to political subdivision, district, and precinct boundaries, and prepares detailed maps for election purposes.

The Election Services Division, led by Jana Johnson, recruits and trains polling place workers and ensures that polling places are available and ready for each election. This Division also conducts early voting, both in-person and by-mail.

The Operations and Technology Division, managed by Stephen Vickers, is

responsible for maintaining and supporting the Elections Department's technology systems, including the county's fleet of voting equipment.

Operations also prepares the supplies and ballots that are sent to each polling place, and conducts the tabulation of votes on election night.

Many hands are needed to perform all the work necessary for conducting an election. The Elections Department relies heavily on citizen involvement from regular people just like you. There is

always a need for people willing to work as pollworkers during early voting and/or on election day. Bilingual workers are especially needed. Get in on the election day excitement and get paid for it!
