Judge Ralph Swearingin, Jr.

Justice of the Peace

Precinct 1



Judge Swearingin grew up in East Fort Worth, graduated from Eastern Hills High School and is now a resident of North Richland Hills. His lovely wife Julie is a Sergeant with the Fort Worth Police Department and they have 5 children, 4 grown, and a 6 year old daughter at home along with two dogs, a bird and a bunny. They have also been blessed with two grandchildren.

He was elected Judge of the Tarrant County, Justice of the Peace Court, Precinct 1, since January 2007.

Prior to entering the judiciary, Judge Swearingin had a career in policing with more than 30 years of diverse law enforcement experience including 19 years at the command level. He received the Fort Worth Police Department's Medal of Valor and is a 1988 graduate of the 155th session of the FBI National Academy. He holds a Master Police Officer Certification from the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education, and retired from the Fort Worth Police Department in December 2006.

Judge Swearingin graduated from Texas Wesleyan University's School of Law with honors and is an attorney licensed by the State of Texas since 1994. He currently

serves as Immediate Past President of TWU's School of Law Alumni Board.

Since taking office, he has implemented three innovative pilot programs in his Court.

The first is an evictions program known as "RISP" (Resident Independence Stabilization Program.) Working with the court through referrals, Tarrant County's Human Services Department coordinates and administers RISP through a collaborative effort with social service providers offering needed assistance to persons who have been evicted through no fault of their own (victims of unpreventable circumstance).

Another program, one developed to address truancy, is known as "ASAP" (Assuring School Attendance Program). ASAP is a collaborative effort between the Court, Keller ISD, the Ft. Worth and Keller Police Departments, Lena Pope Home, and other social service providers. ASAP employs the earliest intervention and prevention methods to identify and address the underlying reasons

for a child's failure to attend school, then assists the student and family to keep the student in school.

Lastly, a mediation advocate, he implemented a Pre-Trial Mediation pilot program which uses in-court attorney mediators as an approach to resolve civil suits between parties. For this program, he recently received the Texas Association of Counties, 2009 Best Practices Award in the category of innovation in court services.

arrant County is one of several ■ Texas counties that have no County Attorney. The Criminal District Attorney prosecutes both felony and misdemeanor offenses. It also represents the county in civil matters. The current Criminal District Attorney is Joe Shannon Jr. Joe was appointed by Governor Rick Perry to complete the unexpired term of longtime DA Tim Curry who passed away in April. Joe has been with the office for over 16 years. Just prior to his appointment he supervised the Economic Crimes Unit which investigates and prosecutes "white collar" crimes. He has tried many high profile cases while serving under Curry.

He now supervises the entire staff of 329 including 162 attorneys. The DA's office prosecutes over 45,000 criminal cases annually.

For over 20 years the District Attorney had a substation at the Northeast Sub Courthouse. It served as a satellite facility so that police officers in the Northeast area did not have to travel to the courthouse in downtown Fort Worth to file cases. This arrangement permitted officers to remain on duty in the northeast area. Several years ago the District Attorney, with the help of Tarrant County's Information Technology department, created the state's first Electronic Case Filing System. This system permitted police agencies to send in their case reports and information electronically. Officers no longer had to hand carry reports to the prosecutor's office. Other prosecutors' offices in Texas are now beginning to utilize this method of case filing. The system has further reduced travel time, costs, and manpower requirements for our local police agencies. In addition, with the Electronic Case Filing

System in place, Tarrant County has been able to transfer personnel from the sub courthouses to the downtown office.

The Commissioners Court designated a heritage room in the 1895 Courthouse on December 23, 1985. First used for meetings and preparatory area for Courthouse tours by the County Historical Commission, under the direction of Howard McPeak the room evolved into a history museum outfitted with displays and historic artifacts. In 1997 casework for museum displays was donated by the Wiseda Foundation in memory of Howard and an 1895 Room Committee was formed.

Initially the Cross-Timbers Historical Military Memorials Foundation installed an exhibit related to the "Fort" period of



Fort Worth history. Artifacts included rifles, pistols, saddles, uniforms reproductions of drawings

and water color representations of how the Fort buildings might have appeared. A table top replica of the Fort was also installed.



Future exhibits will include a restored portrait, office and personal artifacts of B.B. Paddock, prominent early Fort Worth newspaper owner and an avid pro-



moter of Tarrant County. Portraits of Thomas Jefferson Jennings and of his wife. Sarah Hyde Jennings, donated to Tarrant County by the Amon Carter Museum will also be shown. These and other historic artifacts and memorabilia will be exhibited in the planned museum expansion space on the east side of the Courthouse entry hall. Additional new exhibits will also include individuals, founding families and early historic events of Tarrant County. The 1895 Room is open Monday through Friday, 8 am to 5 pm and when special tours are planned on weekends and holidays.



GRACE

Since 1987, GRACE has been providing for the basic needs of families in Northeast Tarrant County who are struggling with limited income or a recent emergency. Today, programs offered at GRACE include assistance with food, clothing, finances, medical care and transitional housing. Additional programs are offered seasonally, such as *Christmas Cot*-

tage, which provides gifts for the children families who would not otherwise receive them. Feed Our Kids provides lunches for school age children during

the summer months when they are less likely to receive a nutritious meal. Each year, more than 1,400 families are touched by GRACE programs. The aim of each program is to help families become self-sufficient, many of them for the first time.

The impact that GRACE has had on the community can be measured by the countless stories of families and individuals whose lives have been transformed. However, none of these stories would have been possible had it not been for the generosity of this community. Each year, the people of northeast Tarrant County donate their talent, their time or their treasure to support the GRACE mission. The challenge facing GRACE now is finding the resources to keep pace with an increase in need. This year, GRACE has seen as much as a 40% increase in requests for services.

CARROLL ISD

Carroll ISD is a K-12 public school system located in the heart of the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex. The 21-square-mile district consists of 11 schools serving more than 7,750 students and 1,000 employees. The district is the largest in the state of



Texas to earn the top rating of *Exemplary* and all 11 s c h o o 1 s are also rated *Ex-*

emplary. In addition, the district and all campuses met the federal guidelines for the *No Child Left Behind Act*.

The state of Texas does not rank public schools, but they do rate them based on performance on standardized tests, attendance, and drop-out rates. CISD has a 0 percent drop-out rate, a 97 percent attendance rate and consistently scores above the state and national averages on assessments. The state holds districts to a high standard of 90 percent passing to obtain the *Exemplary* rating. In addition, each subgroup must receive a 90 percent for a district or campus to earn the top rating. Car-

roll students have not only passed at *Exemplary* levels, but have continued to increase Commended scores on the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) test.

Five of CISD's schools have been named National Blue Ribbon Schools by the U.S. Department of Education, and eight of 11 campuses were named to the Texas Busi-

ness Education Coalition's 2008 and 2009 Honor Rolls. Last fall, Durham Elementary School received the Blue Ribbon Lighthouse School Award.

Most recently, Carroll High School teacher Keeley Lowry was one of three finalists for the Secondary Teacher of the Year, and Durham Elementary Principal Betty McIlvain earned the State Advocate for the Gifted award for Texas.

Approximately 98 percent of Carroll's seniors attend a college or university after graduation. The Class of 2009 was

awarded an incredible total of \$18 million in college scholarships. More than 90 percent of Carroll students take a college entrance exam, with composite scores on the SAT and ACT that exceed state and national averages. Carroll Senior High School received the prestigious *College Readiness Award* in 2009 for consistently high scores on the ACT.

The zone will dedicate a portion of future property taxes and sales taxes generated from inside the zone to paying for public improvements in the zone such as sidewalks, enhanced landscaping, and utility improvements. JPS opens 2nd HEBISD School-Based Clinic December 1st

December 1st JPS opened it's second HEBISD schoolbased clinic. The first clinic is currently seeing over 600 students and their siblings, (under 18 years of age), per month. The second clinic is located at 3115 W. Pipeline Rd., Bldg. D in Euless, the same site as the first clinic, to accommodate overflow. The cost is \$5.00 per visit for uninsured patients, with no financial precertification. Other school-based clinics are located at Haltom City, Birdville, and Grapevine/ Colleyville schools. In addition, the Watauga Health Clinic has been well received and heavily utilized since it's opening in June of 2008.

H1N1 vaccinations offered FREE to all Tarrant County residents

Since December 1st, Tarrant County Public Health (TCPH) is offering the H1N1 vaccine to all Tarrant County residents. In addition to the seven health clinics, TCPH has opened five of six store front clinics dedicated specifically to dispense the vaccine to

Tarrant County residence. A sixth store front will open later this month. Dr. Parker, Tarrant County Medical Director and Health Authority is urging the public to get vaccinated before beginning any Christmas travel. Some areas around the country are more severely affected by the H1N1 virus than Tarrant County, she noted. These five

new store fronts, combined with the seven public health centers, means that Tarrant County residents can go to any of 12 convenient and easily accessible locations to receive a free H1N1 vaccine.

- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or


Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose or mouth.
