

NE Community Leader Spatight



Larry Darlage, President Tarrant County Community College

Larry Darlage was born and raised in a farming community in southern Indiana. He developed a love for science early in his life when he heard the announcement about Sputnik in October, 1957. He built and launched model rockets which influenced his decision to major in chemistry when he attended college. He received his B.A. degree from the University of Indianapolis in 1967. He obtained teaching and research fellowships at Iowa State University where he completed a Ph.D. in Organic Chemistry in 1971.

After a two-year postdoctoral appointment at the University of Florida where Larry studied the liquefaction and desulfurization of coal, he began his career in teaching and education at Pikeville College, a small, four-year liberal arts college located in eastern Kentucky. While he taught chemistry at Pikeville, he received several grants to continue his

research of coal as a clean energy source.

In 1978, Larry moved to Dallas to help start up Brookhaven College. He served as Division Chair of Science and Mathematics for nine years and then was promoted to be the Vice-President of Instruction. During his tenure at Brookhaven, he was instrumental in starting technical programs in Nursing and Robotics. He also served as the interim president of the college for a period of six months.

In 1996, Larry was hired by Tarrant County College to serve as the president of the Northeast Campus in Hurst. In the sixteen years that he has been at TCC Northeast, he has provided the leadership to help the campus grow from about 9,000 students to more than 17,000. Pharmacy Technology and Long-term Care programs were added to complement the many Allied Health programs already at the campus. He also had the opportunity to serve as the interim chancellor of the TCC District in early 1997.

In the community, Larry serves on the following boards: The Colleyville Area Chamber of Commerce (past chairman), the HEB Chamber (past chairman), the Northeast Tarrant Chamber (past chairman), the Northeast Leadership Forum (past chairman), the Arts Council Northeast (past chairman), the Harris Methodist HEB Hospital, the HEB ISD

Education Foundation (past chairman), the North Texas Consortium of Colleges (past chairman), the American Cancer Society, and the Northeast Leadership Forum Foundation. He is a founder and the past chairman of the Colleyville Executive Organization and currently chairs the Heart of North Texas Business Conference Committee. He is active in the Southlake Executive Forum, and the Metroport Rotary Club, where he is president-elect. He is also a very active member of the Crown of Life Lutheran Church where he serves as elder and small group facilitator and is a past chairman of the Board of the Crown of Life School.

This year, he and his wife Mary Linn will celebrate 45 years of marriage, and they reside in Southlake, Texas.

Groundbreaking for the new Tarrant County Civil Courts Building

Groundbreaking for the new Civil Courts Building took place Tuesday, May 29th on Weatherford Street, between Jones and Calhoun Streets.

The 231,934 square foot, seven-floor building will include 12 civil district court-rooms and one large courtroom for complex cases as well as offices for Jury Services and the District Clerk. About 32,000 square feet will be left as a shell on the sixth floor for future expansion.

The construction cost is estimated at \$57 million. It will be completed by the winter of 2014-15.

Precinct 3 Receives "Best Practices Award for Innovation"

The Texas Association of Counties recognized Tarrant County Precinct 3 Commissioner Gary Fickes and his staff with their innovative program developed to provide direct assistance to seniors and aging baby boomers with health, transportation, financial and other issues.

The Association presented Fickes and his "Empowering Seniors" program with their "Best Practices Award for Innovation"

"I set up a task force to see if we could directly address some of the issues our older generation is now facing," said Fickes. "We identified six major issues that we needed to focus on - isolation, transportation, health care, financial security, identity theft and employment."

"Empowering Seniors" is an annual, one-stop resource for Northeast Tarrant seniors and caregivers to meet their most pressing needs. Businesses sponsor this event so that no taxpayers' dollars are used, and it is free for all attendees.

The annual event brings together health care providers, financial institutions, transportation providers, employment resources, and other community partners and presents informational seminars, provides booths and exhibits, and conducts a variety of free on-site health screenings. With the Empowering Seniors program entering its fourth year, the event has grown from 300 to over 1300 participants.

"As one of the fastest growing counties in Texas, Tarrant County is dealing with an explosion of retirees," Commissioner Fickes said. "Many Northeast Tarrant County seniors have modest means and forego life saving (and taxpayer saving) medical screenings. They also have many other significant needs."

Thank you to all of our volunteers; senior centers, organizations, facilities; non-profits; vendors; sponsors; and participants who definitely assisted us in making this event happen.

Tarrant County Community Development Department

Community Development Department of the County Administrator's office develops and administers several development and housing programs, including those funded under the following federal grants: Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnership (HOME), Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) and competitive grants such as Supportive Housing Program and Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS. Offered great latitude by federal funding agencies, the Division has devised several innovative and comprehensive programs to meet the County's housing and community development needs.

The Community Development Department has a strong working relationship with the individual cities throughout the county working closely with staff and the Mayors through the Mayors' Council. The CD Department works with approximately 35 cities which includes all the cities in the Northeast Tarrant County area.

Since 1974, cities within Precinct 3 have been funded approximately \$36 million in federal U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds for public infrastructure projects. Water, sewer, street and drainage improvements have been made while ADA barriers are removed; new sidewalks and senior centers have been constructed. In Euless, a new senior's center was built on Midway Drive. Streets were reconstructed with new sidewalks and lighted cross ways installed around the elementary school to ensure safety and improved residential neighborhoods on Bellaire Drive in Hurst. Lastly, in cities where major projects are located, projects are completed using CDBG and city paid funds. For example, Perdido Drive in Watauga, was a four year project utilizing approximately \$325,000 in federal CDBG funds and approximately \$1 million in city funds.

HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) funds are used to rehabilitate qualified single family owner-occupied homes with substantial problems. The majority of HOME funds are assisted within precinct three as cities within the precinct will supply required match for this program. Other HOME funded projects include acquisition and rehabilitation of multi-family complexes for rental.

ESG funds are used to prevent homelessness and rapidly re-house homeless. As GRACE is one of a few agencies who assist homeless in Precinct 3, thus it gives Tarrant County the ability to assist GRACE and other agencies that serve the homeless outside of Fort Worth and Arlington.

Back to School Roundup to provide low-income children with school supplies

Since 2005, the Back2School Roundup (a countywide collaboration) has provided low-income children with essential school supplies, a backpack, vision and dental screenings, a fresh haircut and immunizations, if needed. Tarrant County students who will be entering Pre-K through 12th grades in the upcoming school year and who also qualify for the Free or Reduced Lunch Program are eligible to participate in the Roundup.

A day-long event that is held before the start of each school year, the Roundup is a fun, family event that helps children prepare for and get excited about attending school. Roundup 2012 will be held on Wednesday, August 8, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Amon G. Carter Exhibit Hall in Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum. Families also will have the opportunity to learn about a variety of community resources and Tarrant County social services agencies will be available to share information.

Pre-registration is required, guaranteeing each child the supplies and enabling families to spend more time to take advantage of the wealth of opportunities and services available at the Roundup.

According to the Tarrant Area Food Bank, 1 in 5 children live in extreme poverty in Tarrant County – many families struggle just to put food on the table and are unable to provide the essential school supplies necessary to start the school year prepared to learn. In this difficult economic time, those families struggling could be your neighbor, co-worker or friend!

Last year marked a banner year for Roundup! We were able to extend our reach throughout all of Tarrant County with over 30 pre-registration events. Most importantly, Roundup distributed nearly 11,000 school supply packs, conducted over 2,500 vision screenings, and performed 1,200 dental screenings. This year we plan to 'grow' the number of children we serve to 12,000. Also by increasing the health and community partners at the fair we can truly make the Back to School Round Up a "one stop shop" for getting the students of Tarrant County ready for a new school year.

Donations needed

The 2012 Back to School Roundup needs individual donations to fulfill its goal to serve 12,000 children this year. **Twenty-five dollars** will provide one child with school supplies, backpack, health screenings, and a haircut. Back to School Roundup is a 501(c)3 organization and is coordinated entirely by volunteers. One hundred percent of funds raised go directly to help the children who need it most. All donations are tax-deductible.

A young Arlington teen Wished for a tuba to play with his high school marching band. Still others Wish to meet their favorite sports hero or celebrity, or shopping sprees for toys, games, computers and electronic equipment. One 5-year old girl simply Wished to go shopping at Wal-Mart.

To be eligible for a Wish, children must meet these simple criteria:

- 1)Reside in, or be receiving treatment in, Texas.
- 2)Be between the ages of 3-17 when the Wish is received.
- 3) Have a diagnosis of a life-threatening condition.
- 4) Have not received a wish from another Wish-granting organization.

When one child life specialist was asked why she recommends a Wish with Wings over other wish-granting organizations, she replied, "Because you treat our kids like family. You stay in touch with the families and include them in events and activities throughout the years. You never just grant their wish and close the door."



An Historic Moment In Time Sundance Square



Sundance Square in downtown Fort Worth is rich in Western history and lore. During the great cattle drives of the late 1800's, Fort Worth was one of the major stops on the legendary Chisholm Trail. Cowboys on the trail would visit downtown Fort Worth for some much needed recreation. The downtown area was filled with saloons, gambling parlors, shooting galleries and dance halls, which attracted a rough mix of gamblers, cattlemen, outlaws, and lonesome doves.

The area was named for the Sundance Kid who - along with his partner Butch Cassidy - was a frequent visitor to the area, then known as Hell's Half Acre. Wyatt Earp and Doc Holliday, well-known

participants in the "Shootout at the OK Corral," could also be spotted from time to time in Sundance Square. Most of the buildings in Sundance Square date from the turn of the 20th century, and have been beautifully restored to provide a wonderful architectural view of the past. The red brick streets and lush courtyards add to Sundance Square's authentic aura.

A few of the notable buildings in Sundance Square include the Knights of Pythias Hall (1901), the Land Title Building (1889), and the Jett Building (1907), which features the Chisholm Trail Mural painted by Richard Haas in the mid 1980s and spans the building's southern façade. The mural commemorates the Fort Worth segment of the Chisholm Trail cattle drives of 1867-1875.



Today in Sundance Square, you'll discover something for everyone, and you can enjoy a different experience each time you visit. The many restaurants appeal to all palates and range from casual to elegant atmospheres, from intimate dining perfect for two, to a family-style gathering place for as many as you can invite. Each block is lined with notable

stores like Barnes & Noble, Jos. A. Bank, Pappagallo Classiques and Leddy's Ranch at Sundance and nestled among them are locally-treasured specialty boutiques like Earthbones and Retro Cowboy.

If you're looking to be entertained, Sundance Square is home to two live theatres, several museums and art galleries, a movie theatre, a comedy club and Bass Hall, one of the world's finest concert and performance halls. Live music from area venues spills out into streets,



creating an unmatched ambiance that draws patrons into the action.

Sundance Square is also a premier address for urban residential properties: it seems some people just don't want to leave once they get here.

Progress continues to be made on the SH 26 project in Grapevine. This is a \$12 million project that

will improve safety and mobility for motorists traveling through the SH 26 corridor.

Brumlow Avenue/Pool Road to Kimball Avenue - Traffic continues to drive on the new northbound pavement while crews work on reconstructing the southbound lanes. Construction

includes the installation of drainage and paving.

Kimball Avenue to SH 114 - Work continues on the new SH 26 northbound main lanes. Motorists will be switched to the new pavement in June, weather permitting. Once motorists are completely shifted to the new northbound lanes, the southbound lanes can be reconstructed through the entire length of the project.

During construction, two lanes of traffic will be maintained in each direction. Completion is estimated for summer/fall 2013. We appreciate motorists' patience while crews complete this work.
