Message to Tarrant County Precinct Four



To Our Northwest Tarrant County Neighbors:

Happy New Year! What an exciting start to 2026 following the tremendous achievements we accomplished together in 2025. We've hit the ground running, remaining laser-focused on addressing our region's most pressing needs: traffic congestion and mobility.

As your Commissioner, I've taken a leading role in uniting multiple cities across Northwest Tarrant County, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), and the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG). Through this strong collaboration, we're advancing critical plans and projects backed by more than \$1.5 billion in combined funding. These efforts are designed to deliver safer, more efficient roads, better connectivity, and long-term solutions that keep pace with our explosive population growth.

Handling this historic growth while fixing decades-old infrastructure challenges is a massive undertaking, but our team is working tirelessly every day to deliver the roads, bridges, and transportation systems our families and businesses deserve.

Major Progress in Public Safety

We've heard your serious concerns loud and clear about in-custody deaths and conditions at the Tarrant County Jail. I'm proud to report significant improvements achieved through close partnership with the Tarrant County Sheriff's Office and JPS Health Network. Thanks to enhanced medical staffing, better protocols, and the dedicated efforts of our jail staff, we've seen a 40% reduction in jail deaths from 2024 to 2025, and zero in-custody deaths in the first quarter of 2026. This remarkable turnaround reflects the hard work and commitment of the men and women who serve in our facilities every day. We're determined to maintain the highest standards of safety and care, striving for a world-class operation that protects staff, inmates, and leads to enhance public safety.

Improving Our Roads and Infrastructure

Right out of the gate in 2026, the Tarrant County Precinct 4 Maintenance division has been hard at work. We've rebuilt and resurfaced hundreds of miles of roads in unincorporated areas and successfully completed dozens of interlocal agreements to support improvements in our 20 member cities. These projects enhance safety, reduce maintenance backlogs, and ensure smoother commutes for everyone in Northwest Tarrant County. From pothole repairs and bridge upgrades to storm preparation and routine upkeep, our Road and Bridge team continues to deliver results you can see and feel every day.

North Tarrant Transportation Meeting Recap

Nearly 200 residents gathered at Leo Adams Middle School for the North Tarrant Transportation Informational Meeting on March 12th to discuss mobility challenges and learn about major upcoming projects in North Tarrant County. The event conveyed by Commissioner Ramirez brought TxDOT, NCTCOG, and regional partners to provide updates on key collaborative efforts, including the Spur 170 flyover, grade separations at Avondale Haslet and SH 156, improvements along the US 287 corridor, the widening of Avondale Haslet through Fort Worth, and the Avondale Haslet bridge at US 287. Residents expressed concerns about congestion, safety, and long-term growth. In response, Agencies emphasized how coordinated planning across state, regional, local, and private partners is providing solutions. The communities strong turnout demonstrated a shared commitment to providing transportation in North Tarrant County.

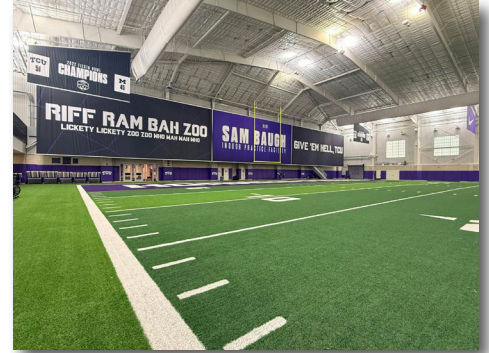


Highlights from Precinct 4

Practical tips for a “greener” lifestyle



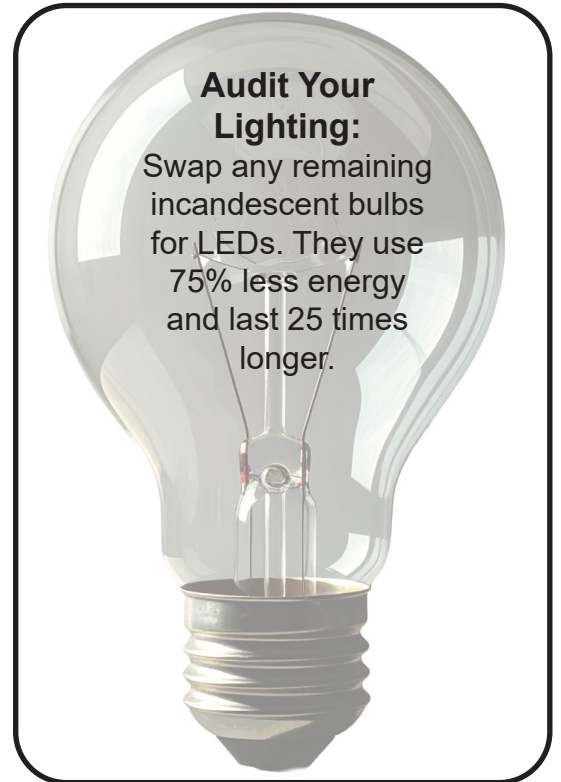
Plant Native:

Replace patches of lawn with native plants. They require less water, zero pesticides, and provide vital habitat for local pollinators like bees and butterflies



Audit Your Lighting:

Swap any remaining incandescent bulbs for LEDs. They use 75% less energy and last 25 times longer.



Smart Power Strips:

Plug electronics into “smart” strips to eliminate “vampire power”—the energy devices draw even when they are turned off



Cold Water Wash:

Do your laundry in cold water. About 90% of the energy used by a washing machine goes toward heating the water

Support Farmers Markets:

Buying local reduces “food miles”—the distance food travels from farm to plate—which cuts down on transportation emissions



Ditch Single-Use:

Keep a “go-bag” in your car or by the door with reusable grocery bags, a water bottle, and travel cutlery to avoid plastic waste while out

Rain Barrels:

Install a rain barrel to collect runoff from your roof. This free water is better for your plants than chlorinated tap water and reduces local stormwater runoff

Eagle Mountain High School Lady Knights Volleyball Team

Eagle Mountain High School Lady Knights Volleyball Team finished the season with a 38-11 record, earning the Class 4A Division II State Championship, the first in school history. The team represented their school, families, and community with discipline, determination, and a strong commitment to excellence.

a testament to their hard work and dedication, but they weren't done just yet! They moved on to compete at the UIL State Championships in Cypress, Texas where the Lady Hornets took home the State Title and the boys finished as state runner-up, a historic success for both teams.

Multiple players earned All-District, All-State, All-Tournament, and Academic All-State honors, highlighting the program's depth, talent, and work ethic.



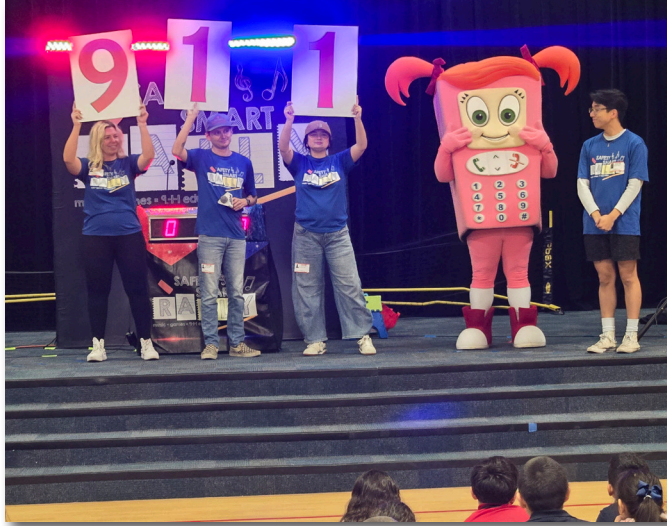
All-Saints Episcopal School's Field Hockey Team

Community Spotlight

Our community partner, Tarrant County 9-1-1, hosted its Safety Smart Rally for the students at EMSISDs Northbrook Elementary this past December. Aimed at promoting emergency preparedness and safe behavior among young students, this engaging and educational event delivered a hands-on, high-energy program that left a lasting impact on the school community.



A Day of Learning and Fun

The Safety Smart Rally program is a jeopardy-style game show where students compete against their classmates to answer 9-1-1 trivia questions and win prizes. The Rally is part of Tarrant County 9 1 1's Public Education Department and their efforts that blend entertainment with essential lifesaving lessons. The Safety Smart Rally series features interactive games, music, and scenarios that illustrate when to call 9-1-1 and how to stay safe in everyday environments. Northbrook students were introduced to "Cellphone Sally," a mascot who helped teach the correct way to use phones in emergencies.



Reinforcing Safety Through Engagement

Tarrant County 9 1 1's Safety Smart Rally isn't just informative, it's memorable. As part of their mission, they use programs like this to bring knowledge and awareness through free educational programs to schools across Tarrant County. Helping to increase understanding of how 9-1-1 works, when to use it, and what callers should be aware of. At Northbrook Elementary, students cheered while learning essential information on how to use 9-1-1, memorizing their home address for emergency situations and what information to give the dispatcher. While some may not know, that if you're not able to call, Text to 9-1-1 is available!

A Tailored Approach for Elementary Students

The event's design ensures age-appropriate delivery. Content is structured around engaging formats: interactive storytelling, role-play, music, and visual demonstrations. Presenters broke complex topics into simple, practical lessons of how to stay safe on the bus, at home, or in unfamiliar places.

These Rally visits are offered free to elementary schools inside the Tarrant County 9 1 1 District. The Safety Smart Rally is part of a public education initiative aimed at spreading awareness throughout the community. 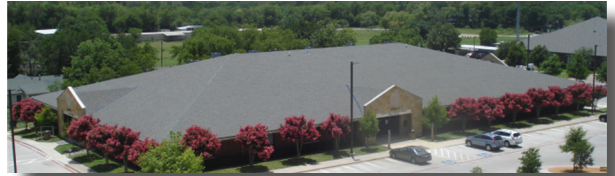
