


Sexual Violence in Tarrant County

Sexual Violence (SV): any type of unwanted sexual activity (including non-contact forms) when <u>consent is not obtained or</u> freely given (including when the person is incapable of giving consent because of their age or due to temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity). SV can occur in-person and online (posting/sharing sexual content without consent). It impacts people from all backgrounds and communities. Anyone can perpetrate or experience SV. Perpetrators are typically someone the survivor knows. Due to stigma, fear, shame, distrust, etc. survivors may not report SV or wait to do so; therefore, SV is often underreported. In Texas, collected evidence from a sexual assault forensic exam ("rape kit") is stored up to five years in case survivors want to report the incident and release the evidence to law enforcement.

Figure 3. Sexual violence-related emergency department (ED) visits⁺, Tarrant County and Texas Region 2/3^{*}, 2019-2023




Figure 2. Sexual assault^{**} *crime rates by geographic* location, 2018-2022 Bexar County = 🗕 Dallas County 🛛 💻 Harris County 🗕 🗕 • Tarrant County 🛛 🗕 Travis County Texas 120.0 Tarrant County had over 7,100 reported sexual assault offenses during Rate per 100,000 Population 100.0 2018-2022 80.0 60.0 40.0 ** Based on the Texas Penal Code, Sexual Assault includes: Continuous 20.0 exual abuse of a child, Indecency with a child by contact, Indecency with a child by exposure, Sexual assault, Aggravated sexual assault, and Sexual performance by a child. Sexual assault is not included under Index Crimes. 0.0 2018 2019 2020 2021 2022

In 2022, Tarrant County's sexual assault crime rates were significantly higher than Texas and Dallas and Travis Counties.

From 2019-2023, there were over 3,200 sexual violence-related ED visits among Tarrant County residents which were predominately female (90%) and aged <25 years (60%)



Figure 4. JPS Health Network patients who agreed to a sexual assault exam, by gender and age group (in years), Tarrant County, 2023 (n= 480)




The Tarrant County Adult Sexual Assault Response Team (SART) reported that there were 1,758 reports of adult sexual assault crimes (aged 17 years+) received by various police departments in Tarrant County from October 2021 - September 2023.

During this same time period, the Women's Center of Tarrant County was called to hospitals 1,354 times and assisted patients (aged 18 years+) who experienced sexual violence.

In 2023, the Women's Center of Tarrant County:

- Trained 4,760 adults on sexual assault prevention
- Trained 4,109 professionals on sexual assault and child abuse issues
- Assisted 2,023 hotline callers
- Counseled 1,103 survivors at rape exam sites

Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) Sexual Violence Questions

Among high school students:

• Physically forced to have sexual intercourse when they did not want to.

• Being forced to do sexual things (kissing, touching, or being physically forced to have sexual intercourse) they did not want to do by anyone one or more times during the 12 months before the survey.

In 2017 and 2019, the percentage of high school students who reported forced sexual intercourse was significantly higher in Texas compared to the U.S. (Figure 5)
