



# Tarrant County Jail 2025 Fact Sheet

The number of in-custody deaths at the Tarrant County Jail must be viewed in context. Tarrant County is the third-largest county in Texas, and the jail ranks fifth in the number of custodial deaths in the state.

**The Tarrant County Jail is seeing a DOWNGWARD trend in the number of custodial deaths.**

Half of the people entering the jail have chronic medical conditions, and about 65% have mental health issues, **making the jail the county's largest psychiatric facility.**

"These deaths have increasingly been framed as a political issue, but the reality is we're dealing with a medical and behavioral health crisis. This isn't just a Tarrant County problem, Sheriff's statewide are facing the same challenges as they manage a high-needs population in facilities never designed to function as healthcare or mental health institutions".

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The Tarrant County Jail operates similar to a small city.  
Municipalities with comparable populations average 5 times more deaths annually.

TCDO do not administer medication—not even an aspirin.
